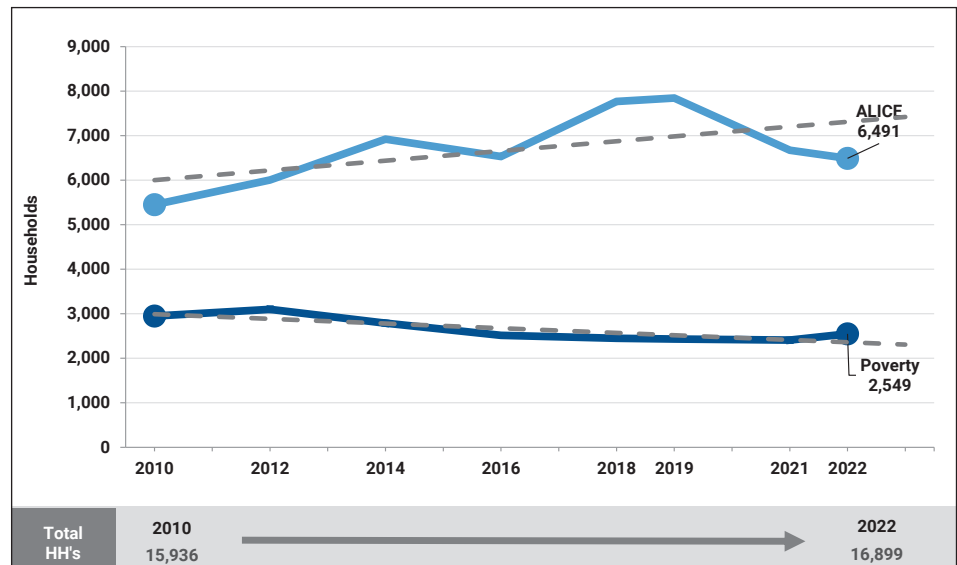

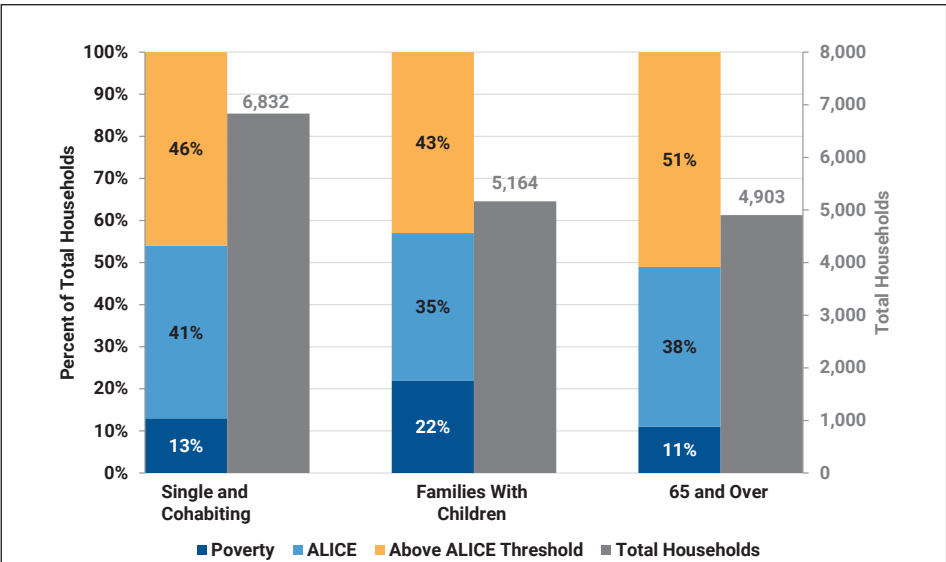

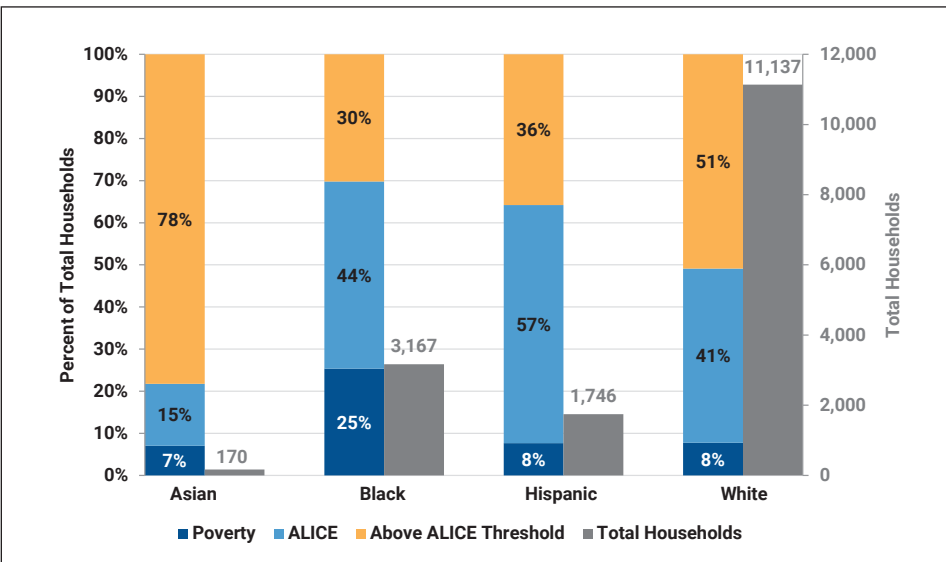

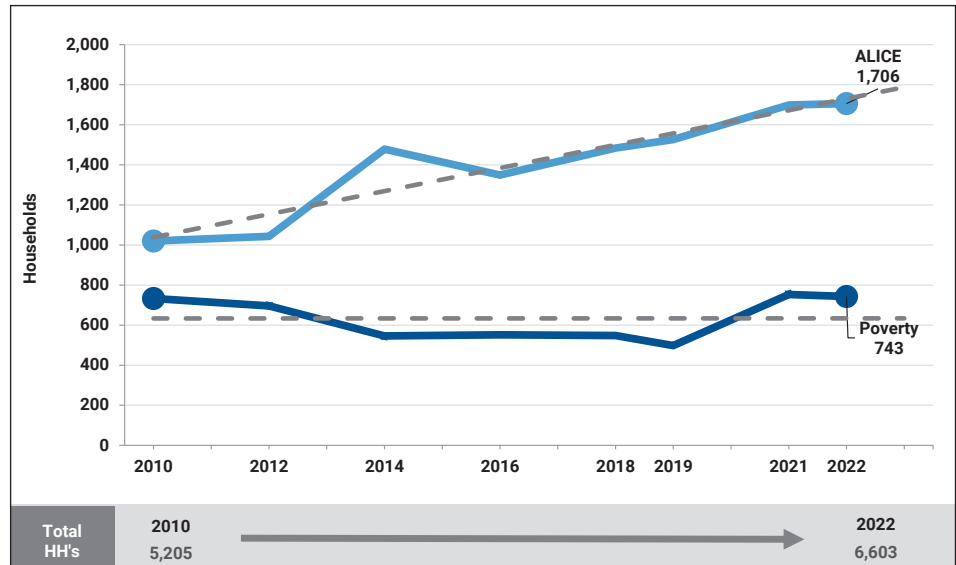

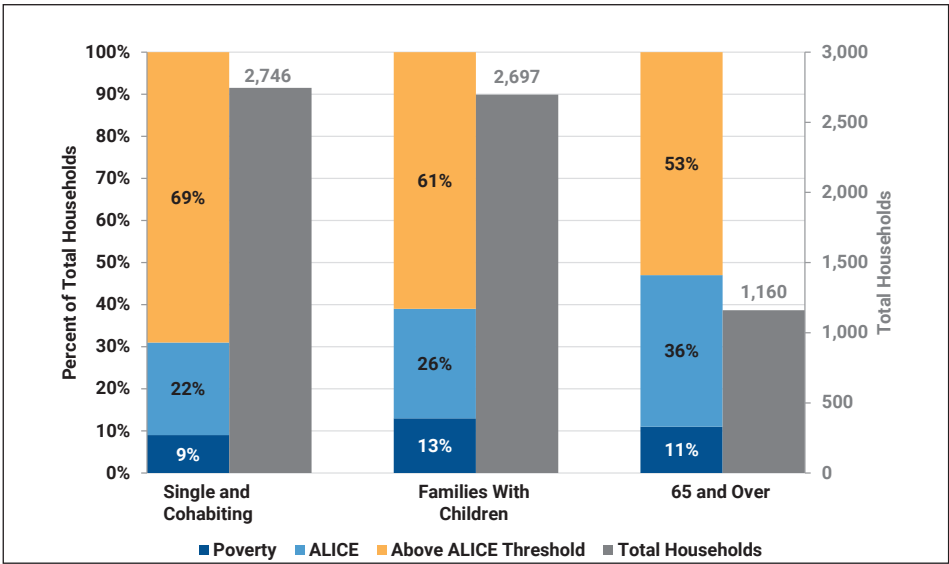

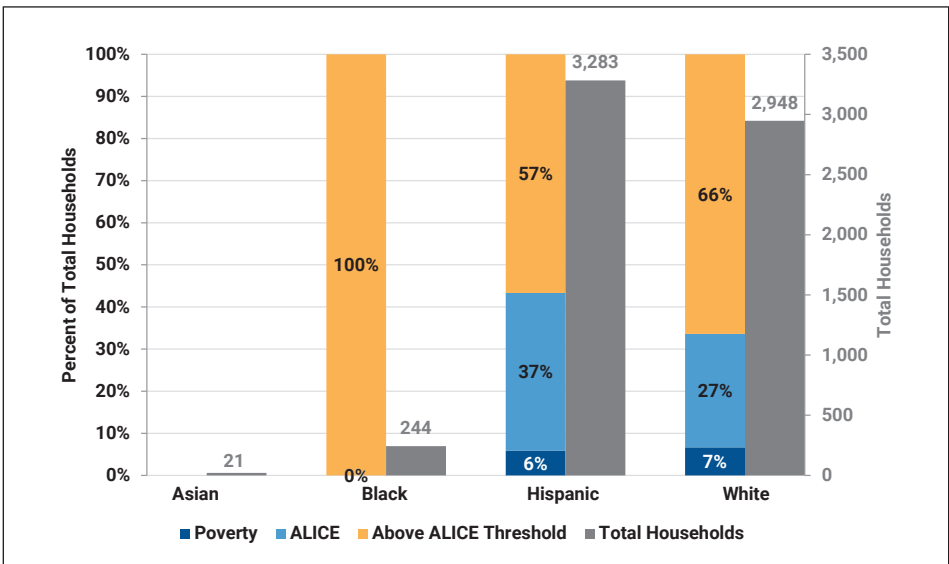

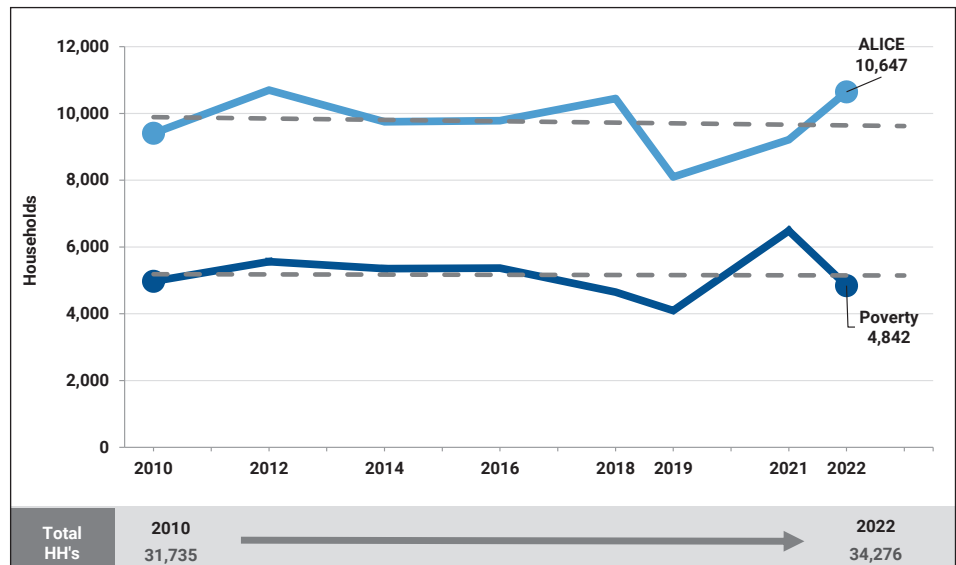

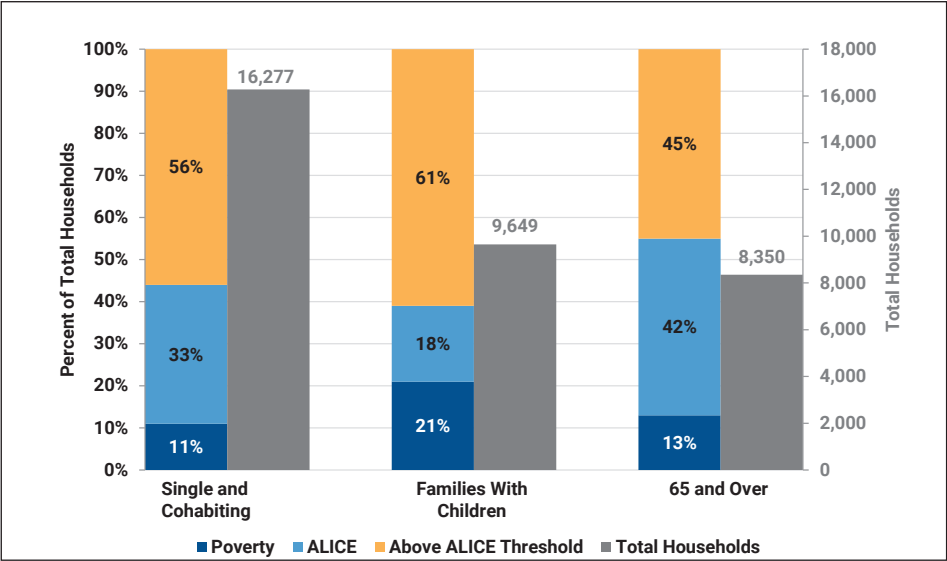

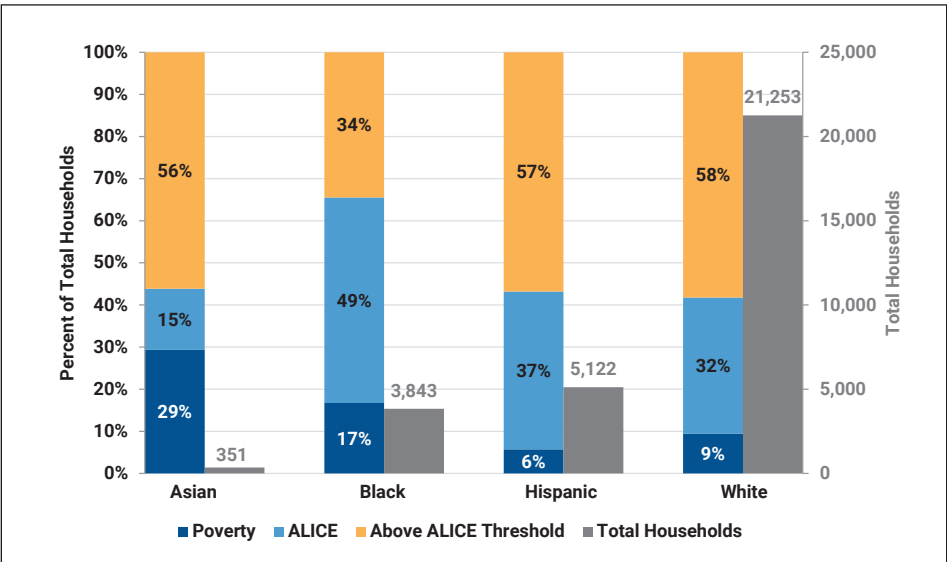
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Angelina County, 2022

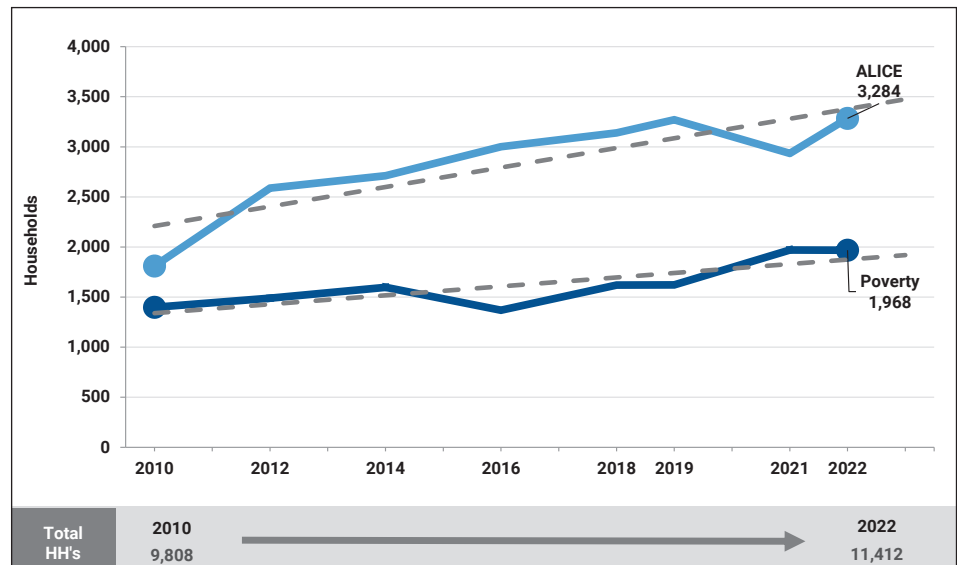

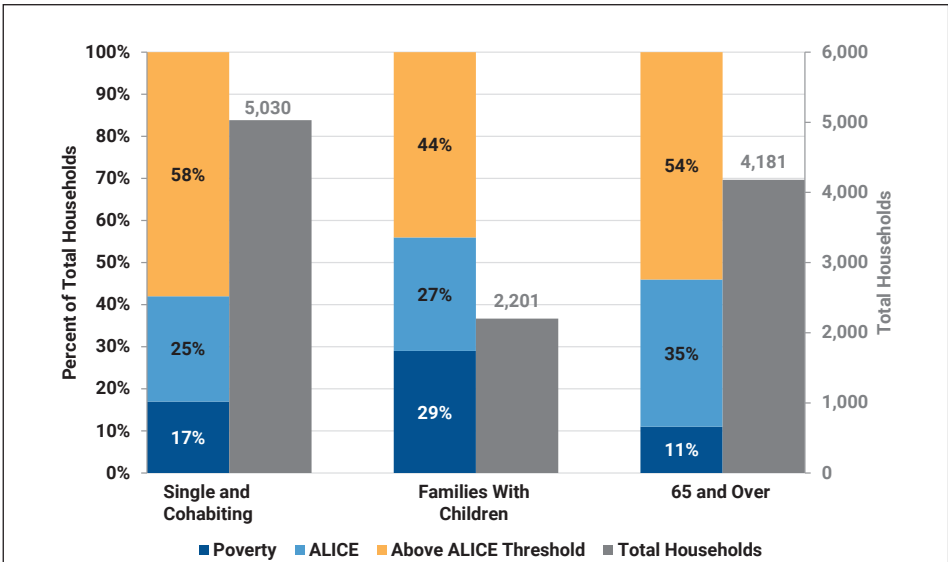

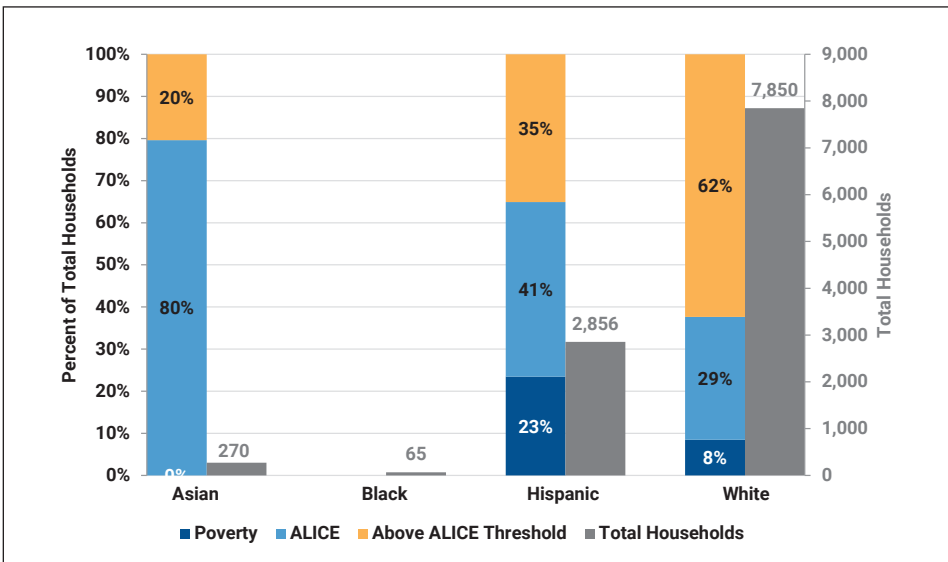

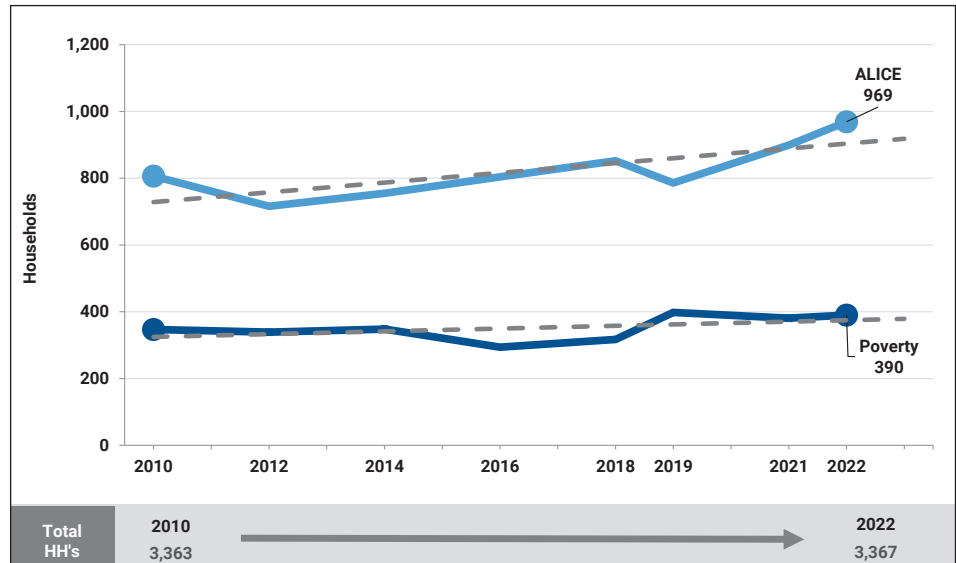

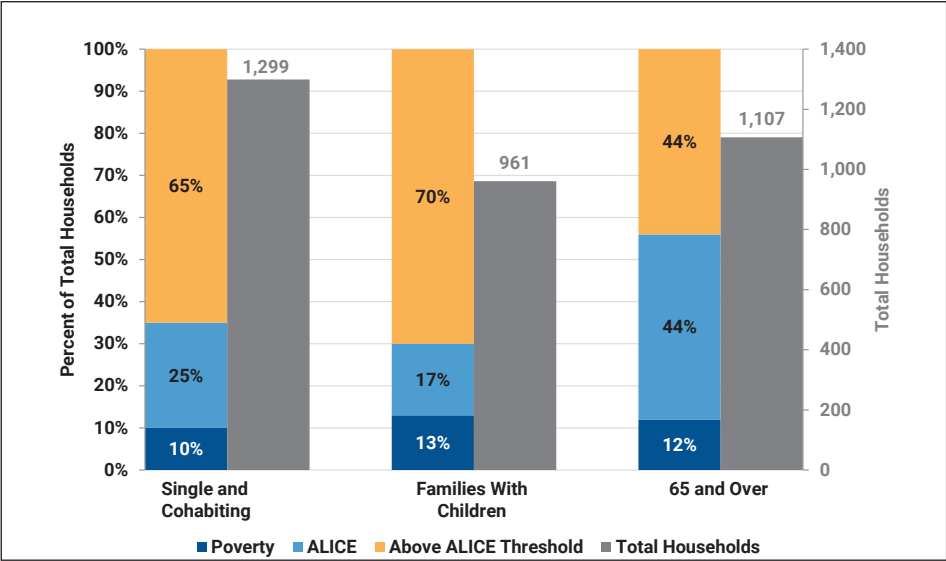

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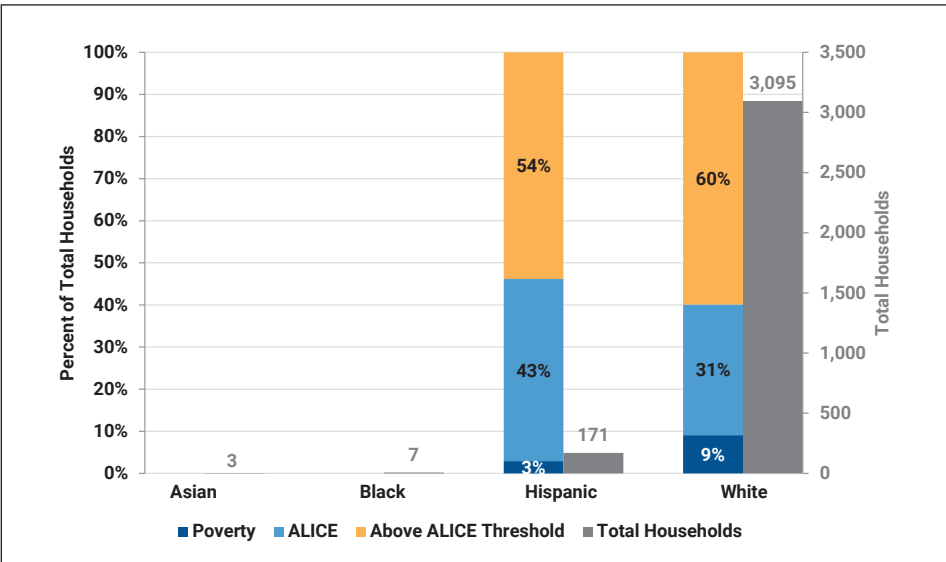
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Archer County, 2022

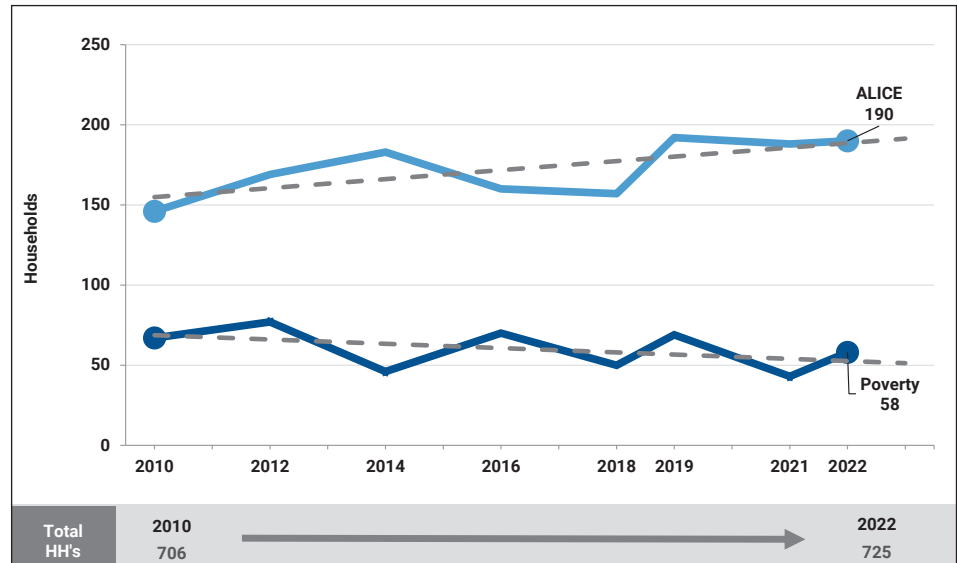

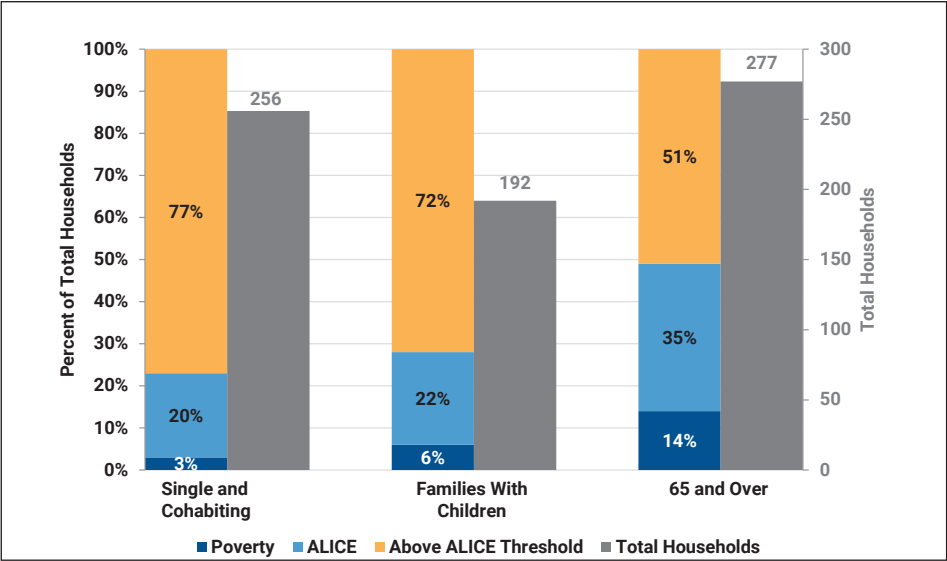
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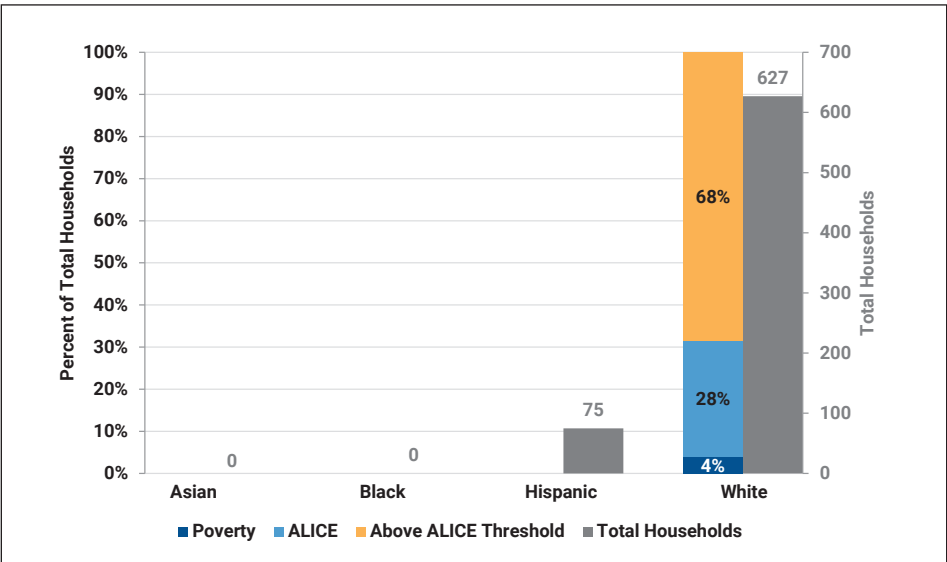
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Armstrong County, 2022

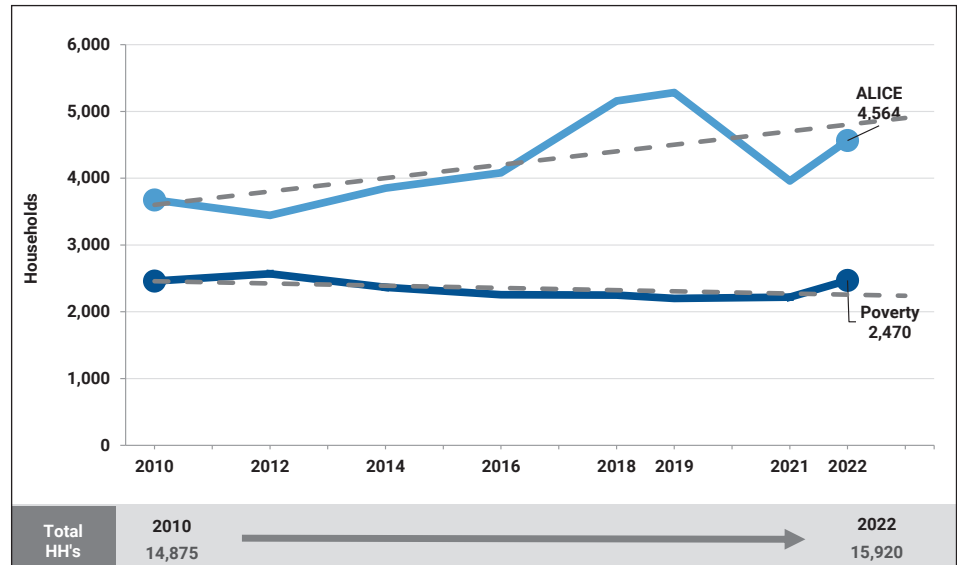

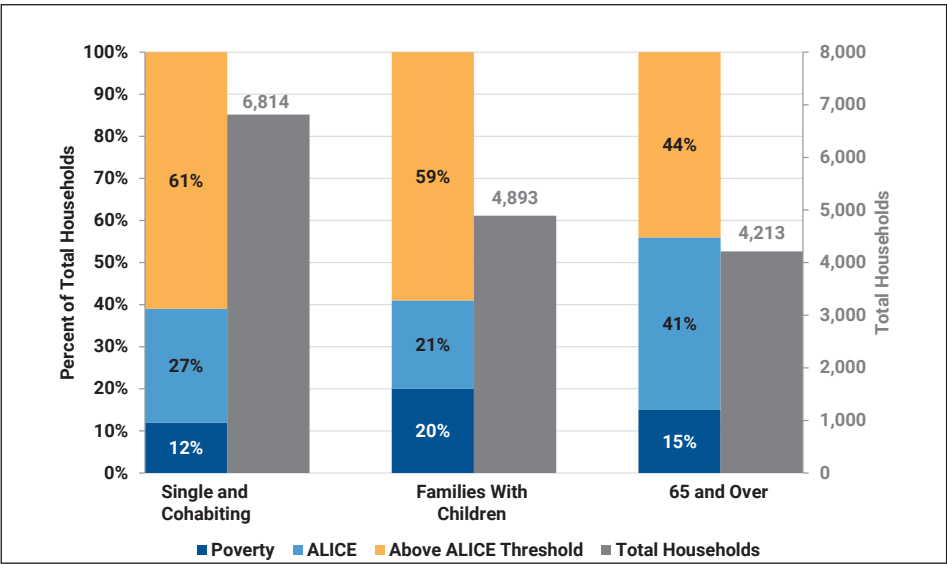

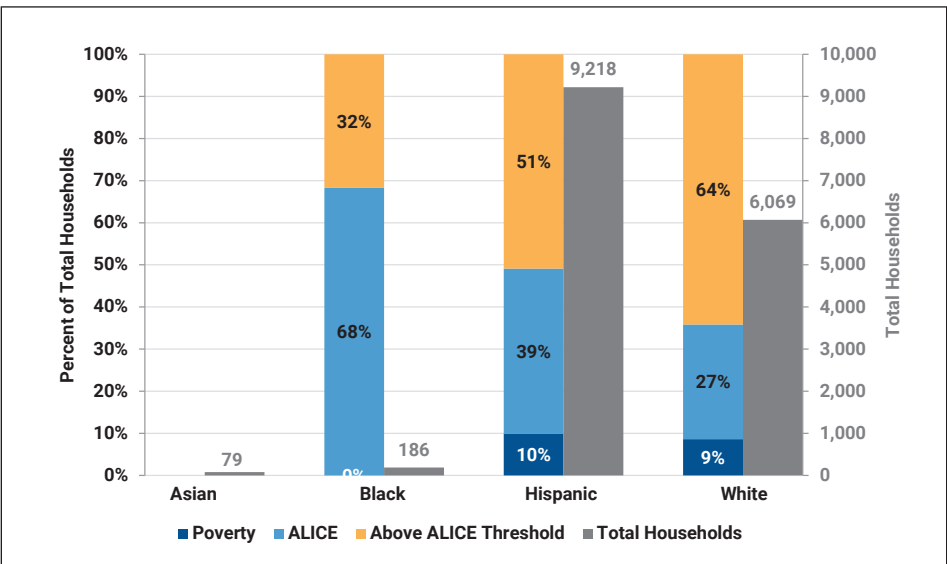

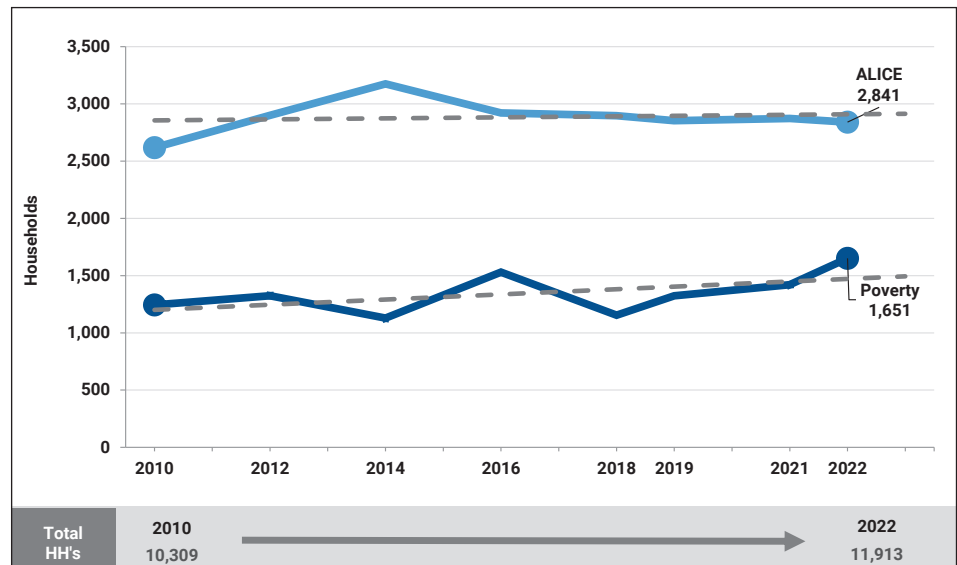

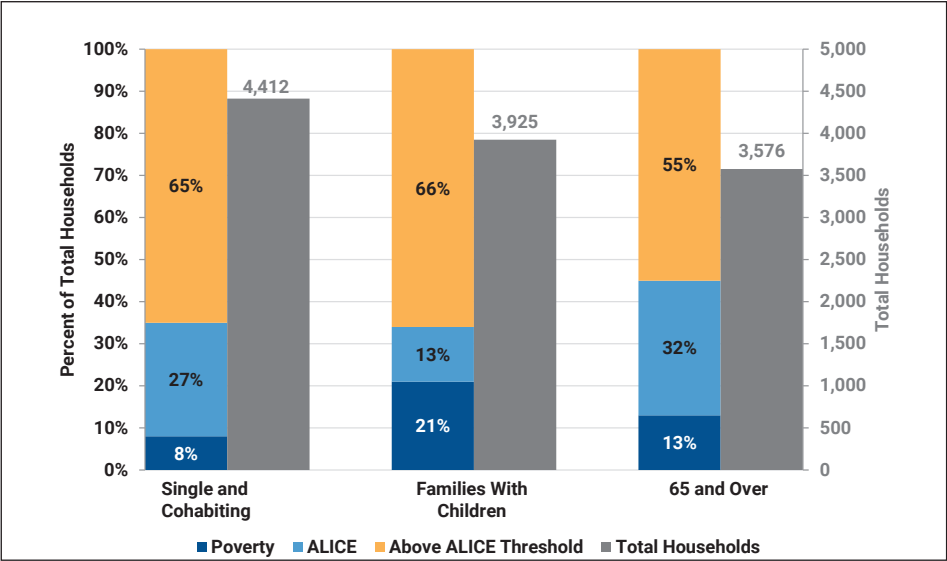

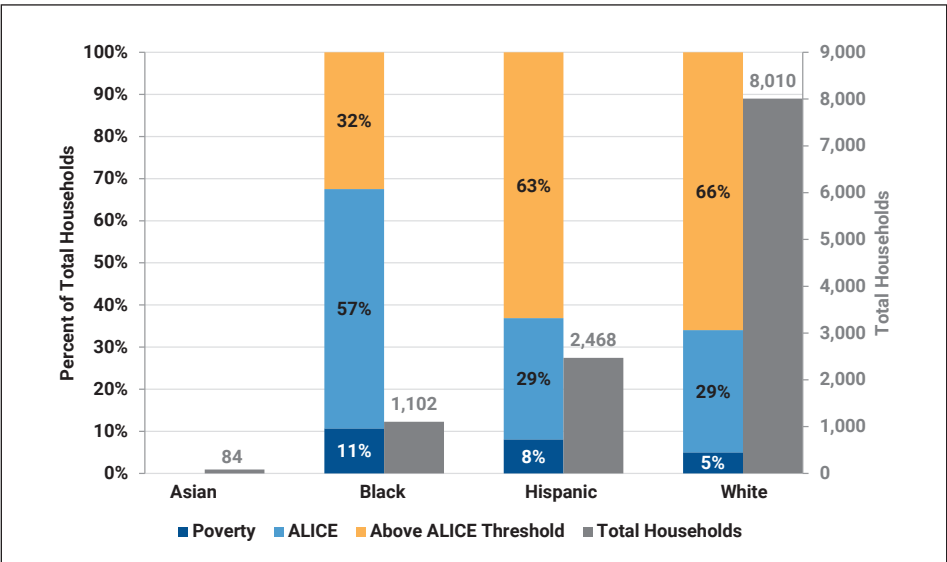

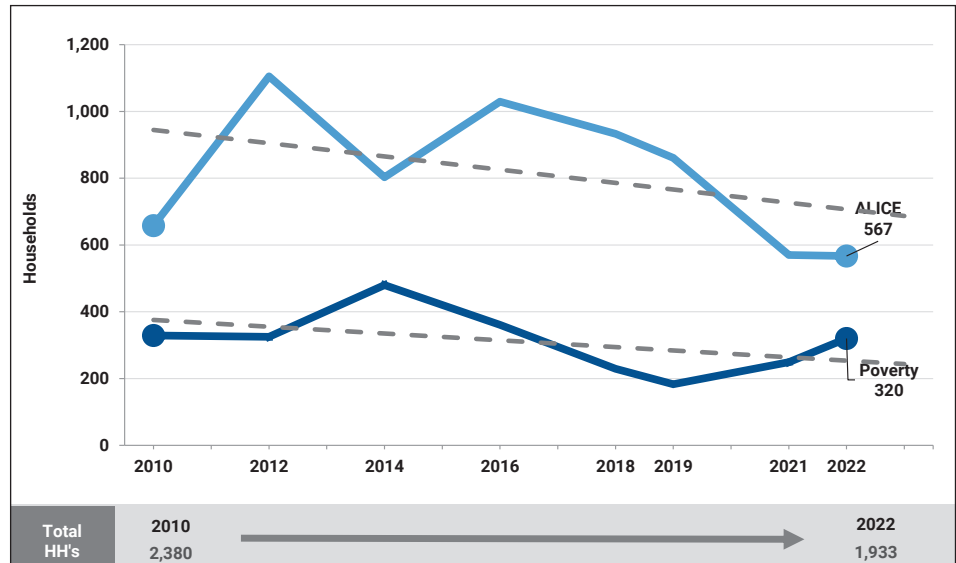

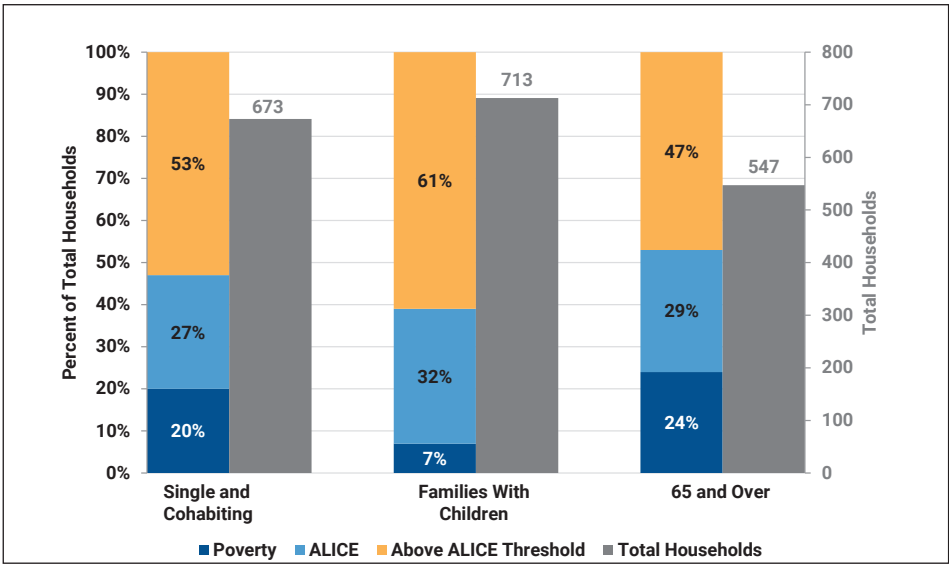

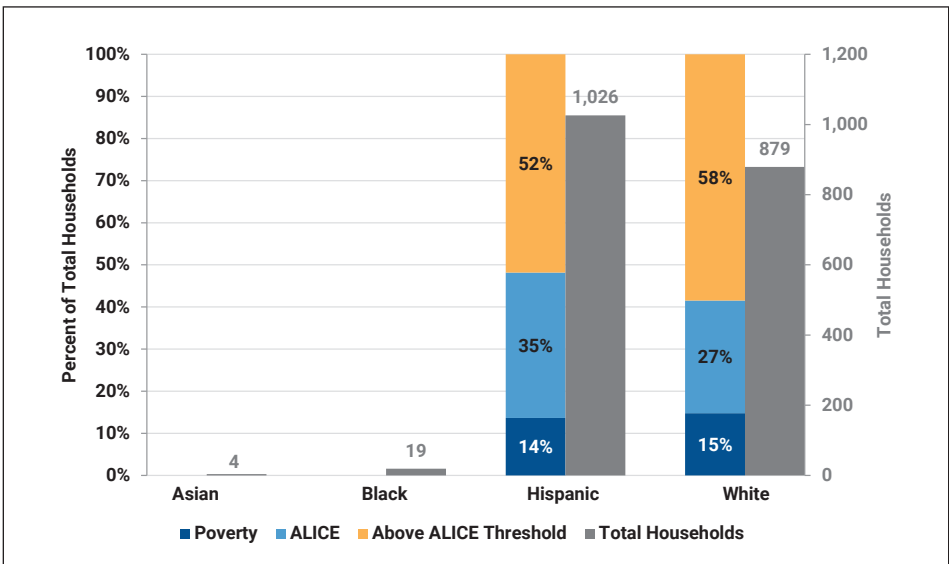

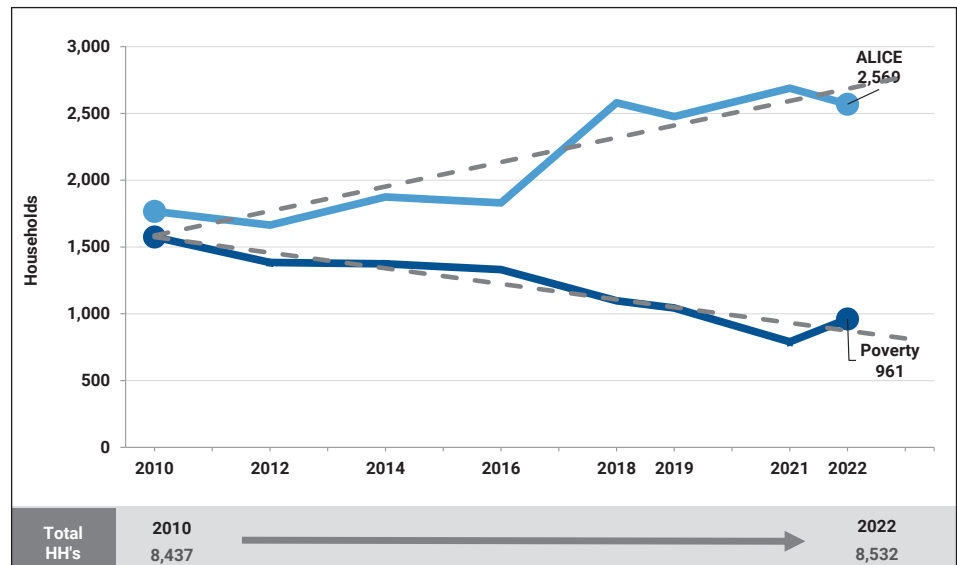

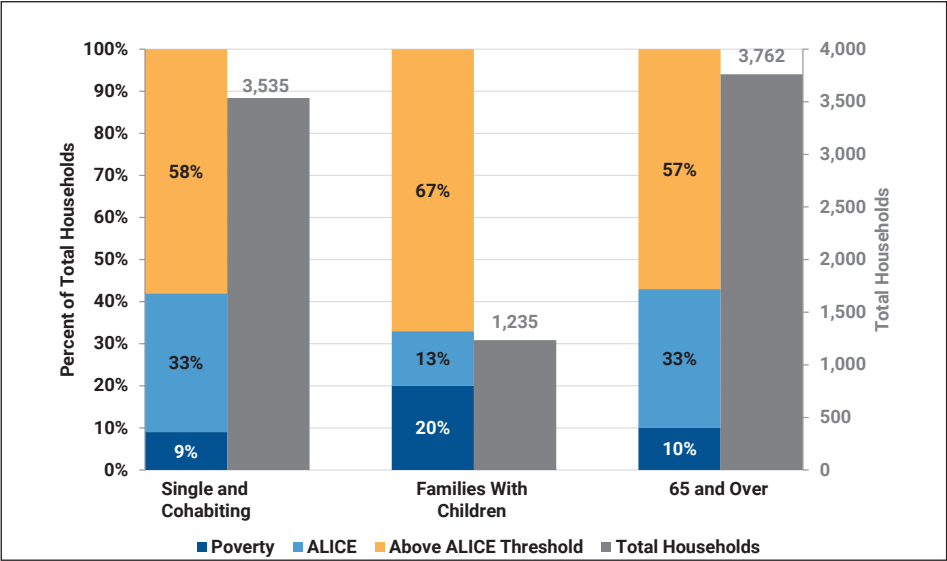

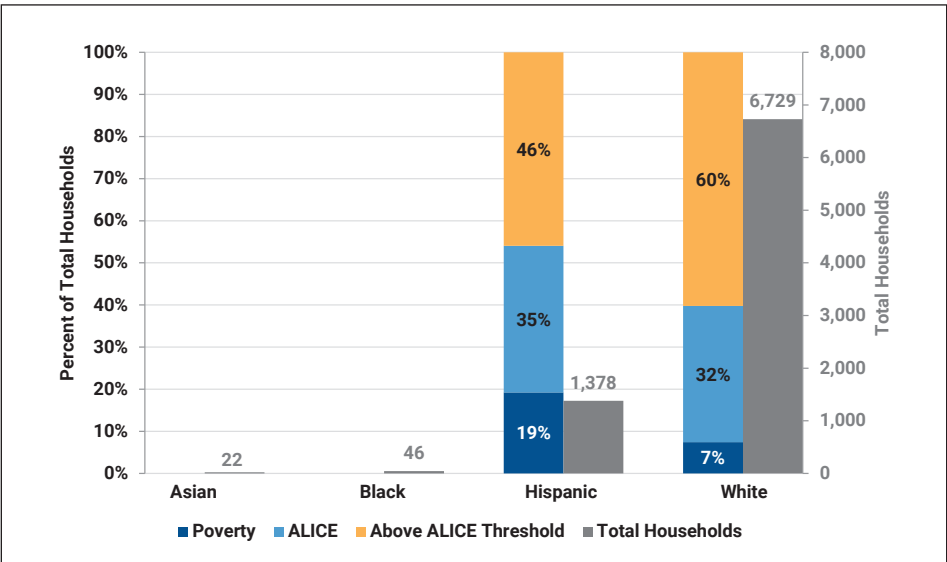

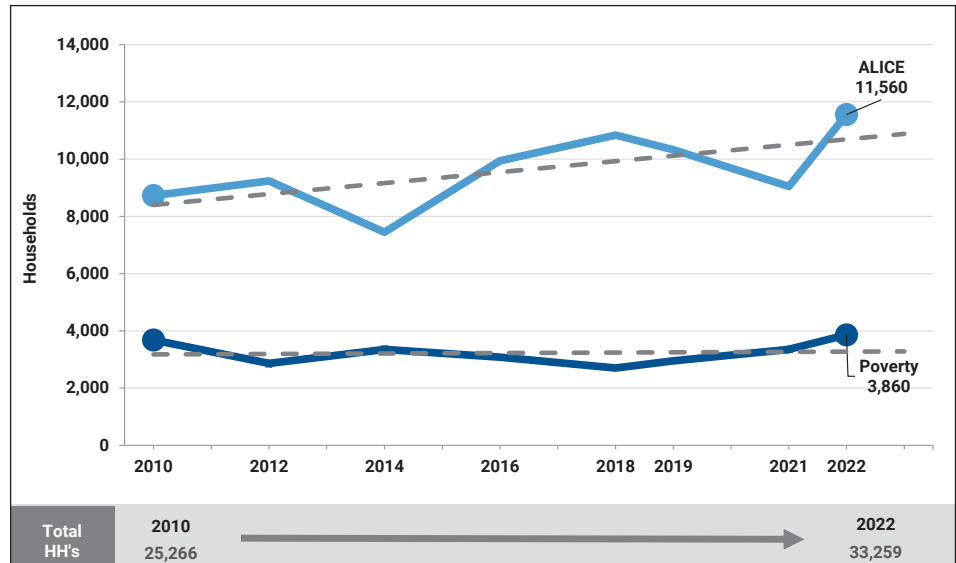

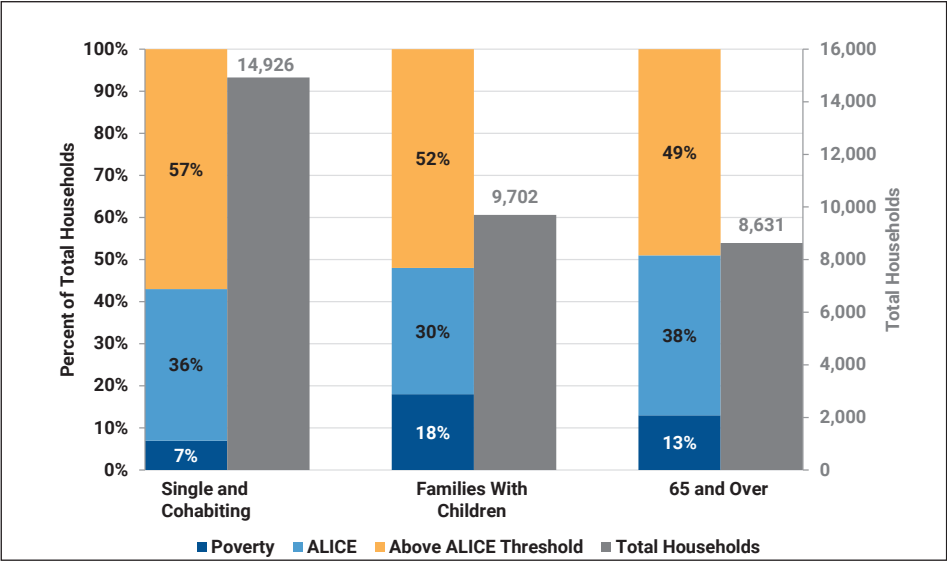

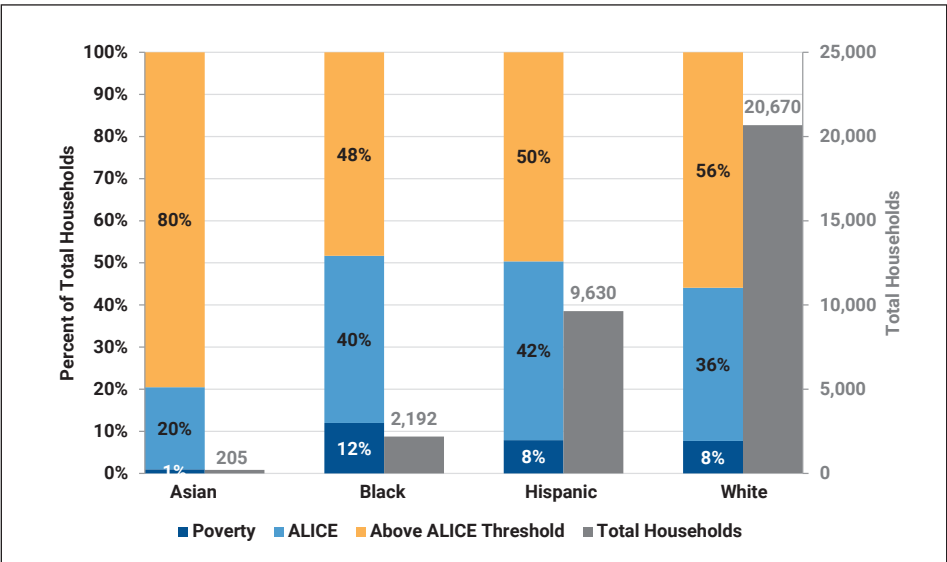

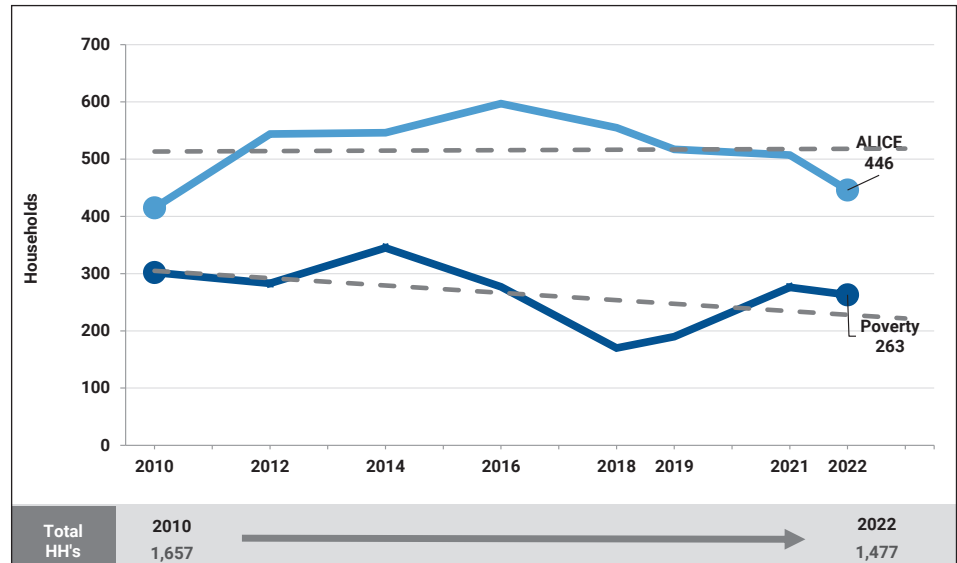

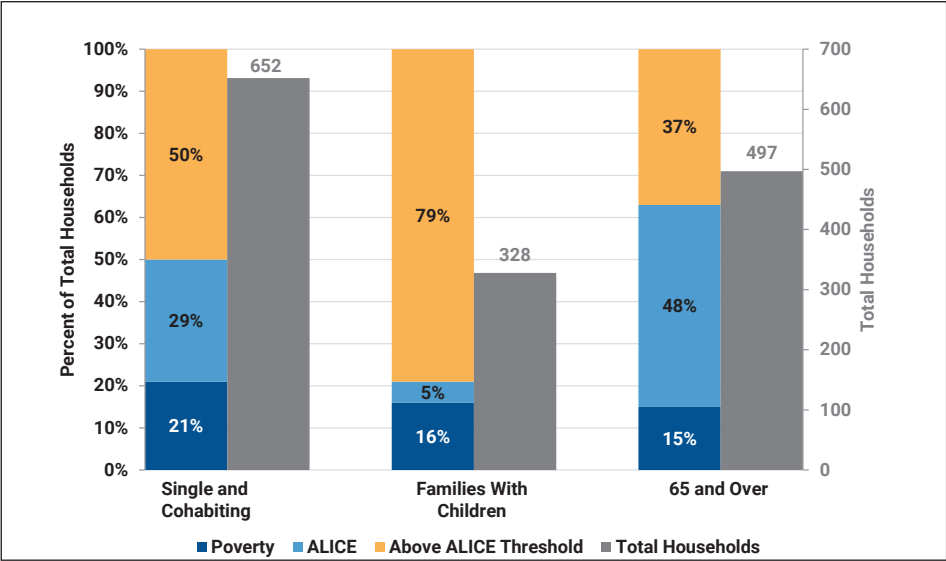

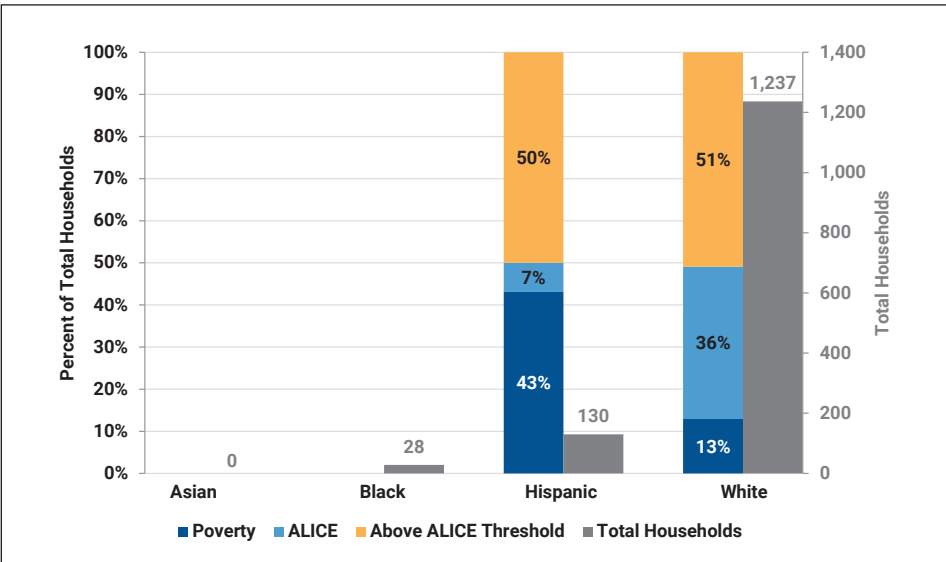

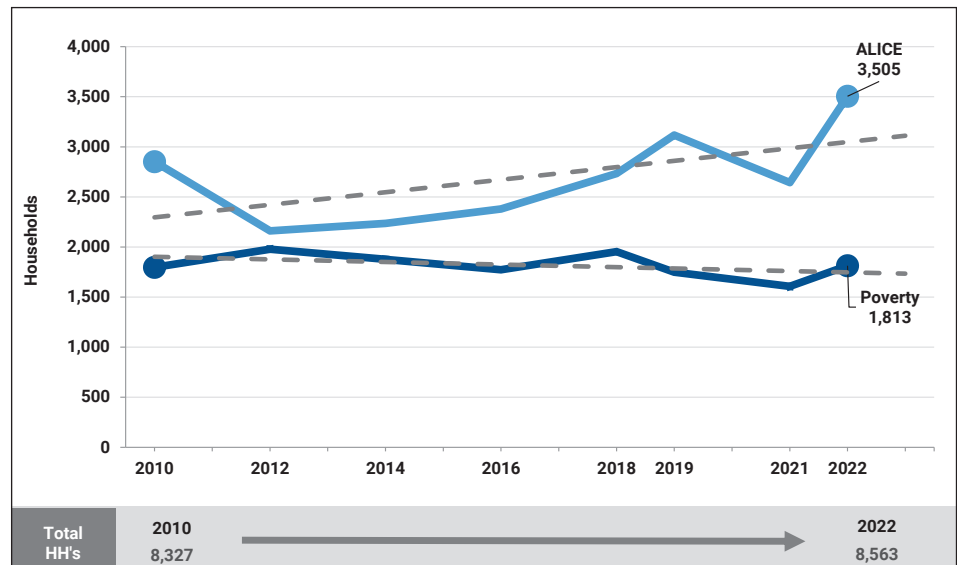

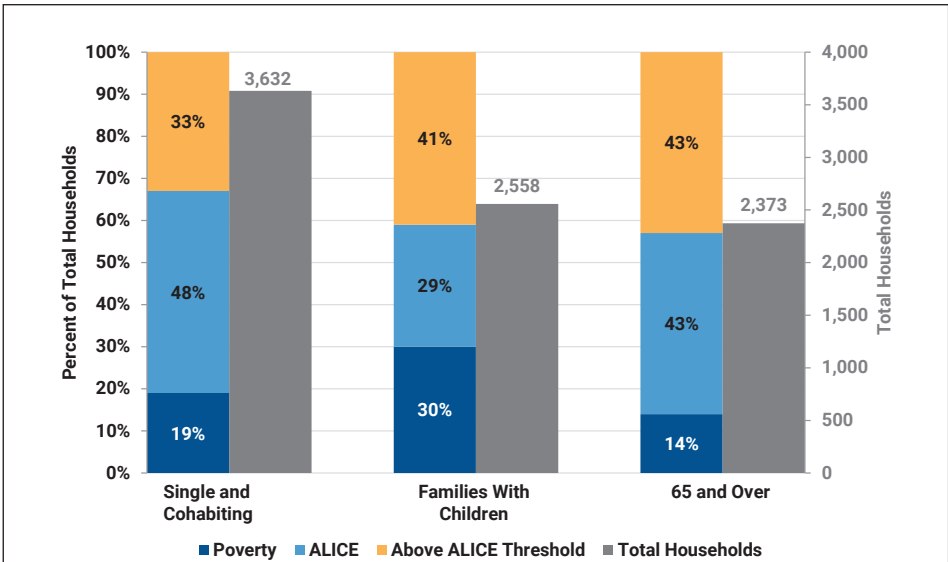

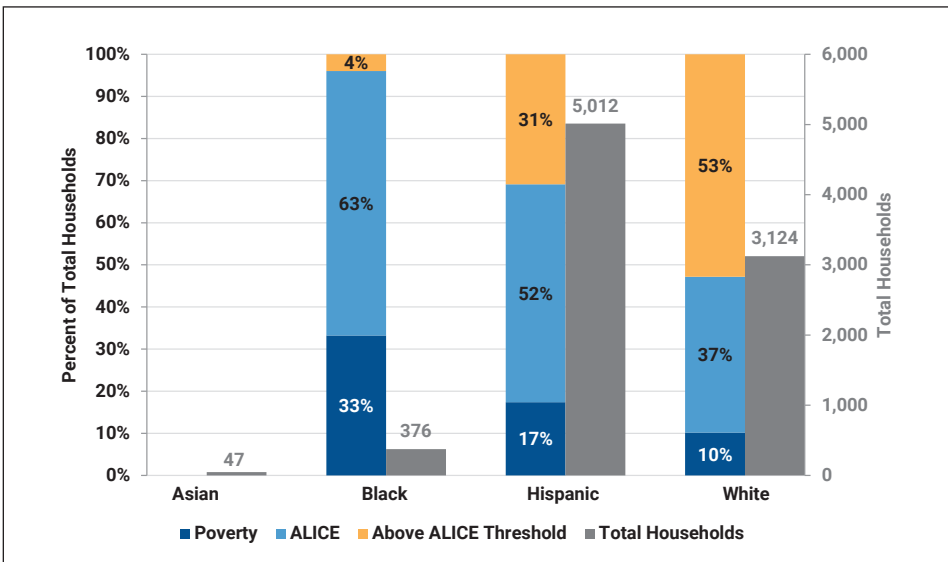

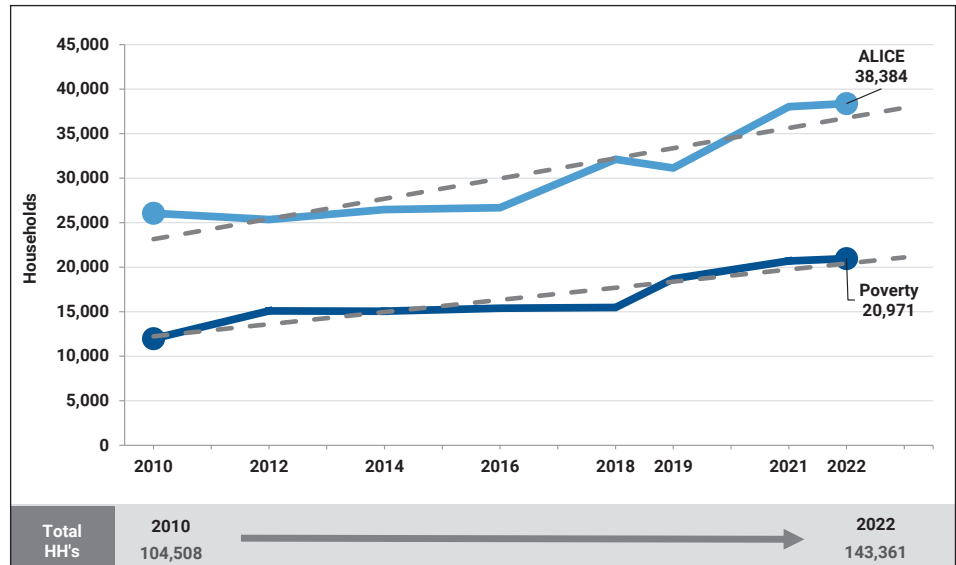

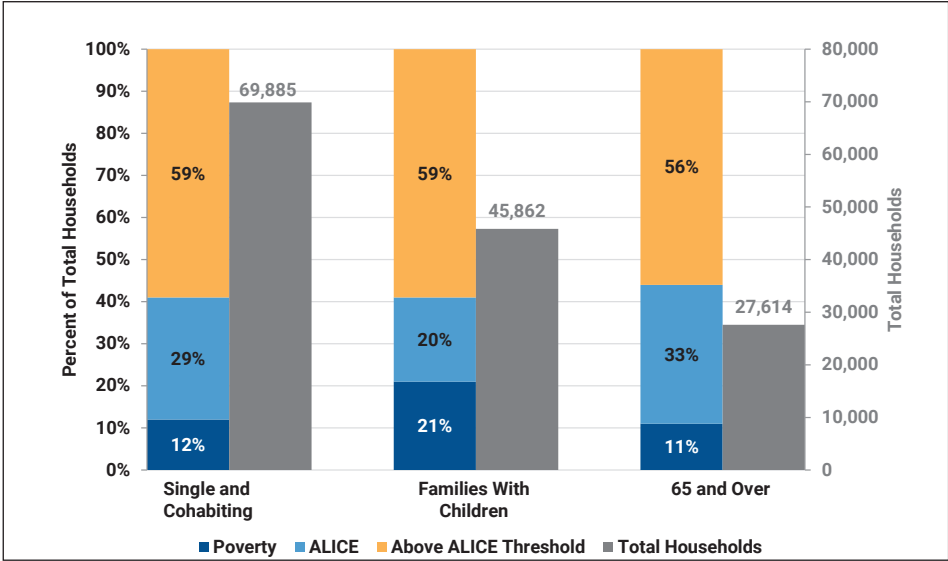

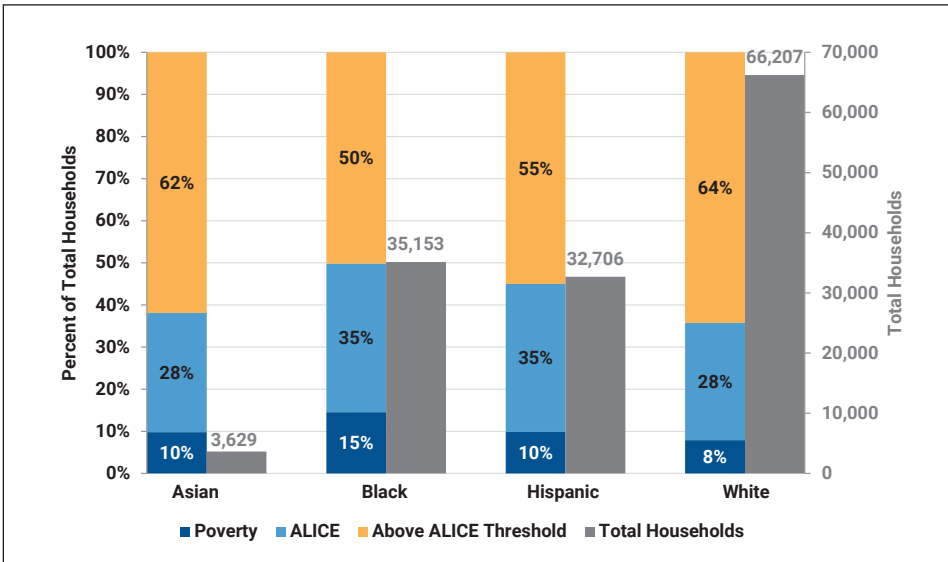

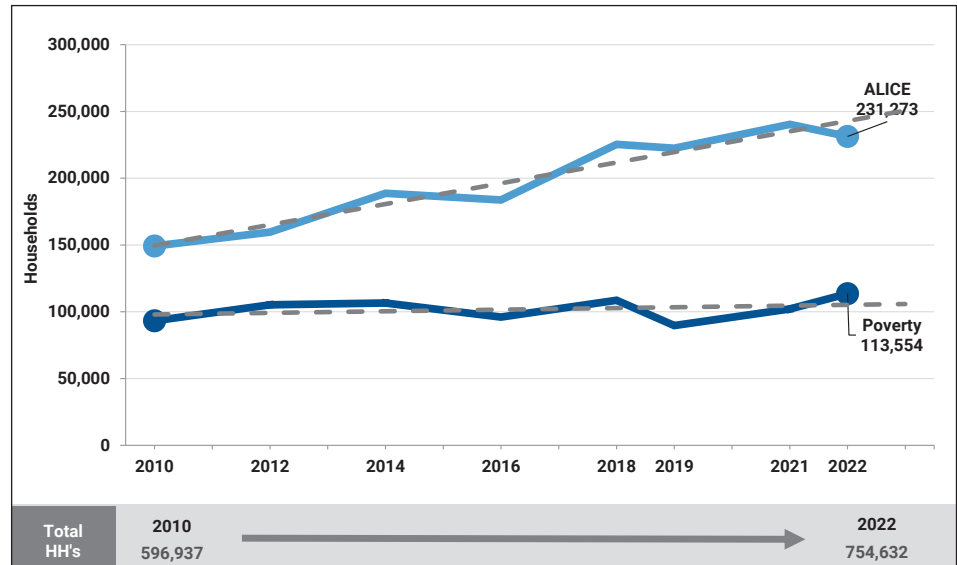

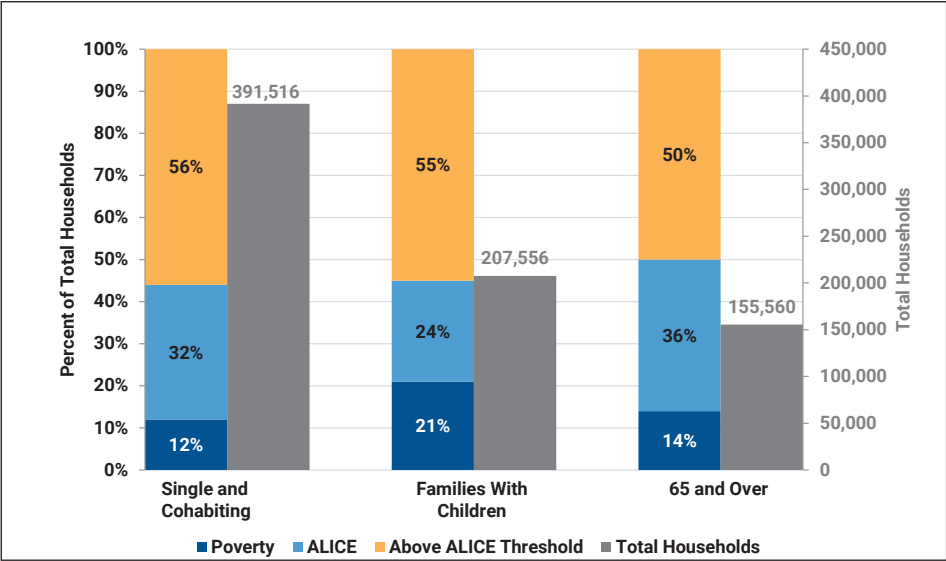

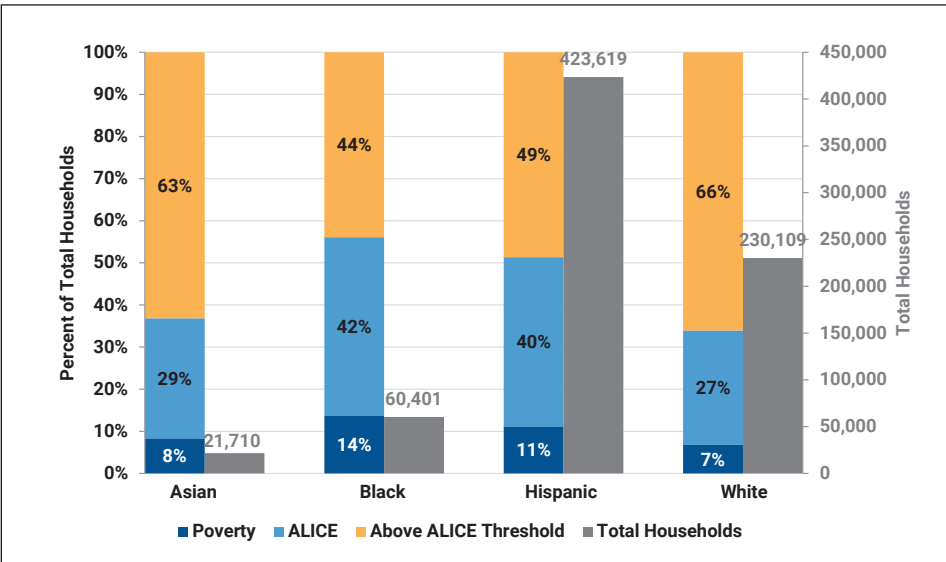

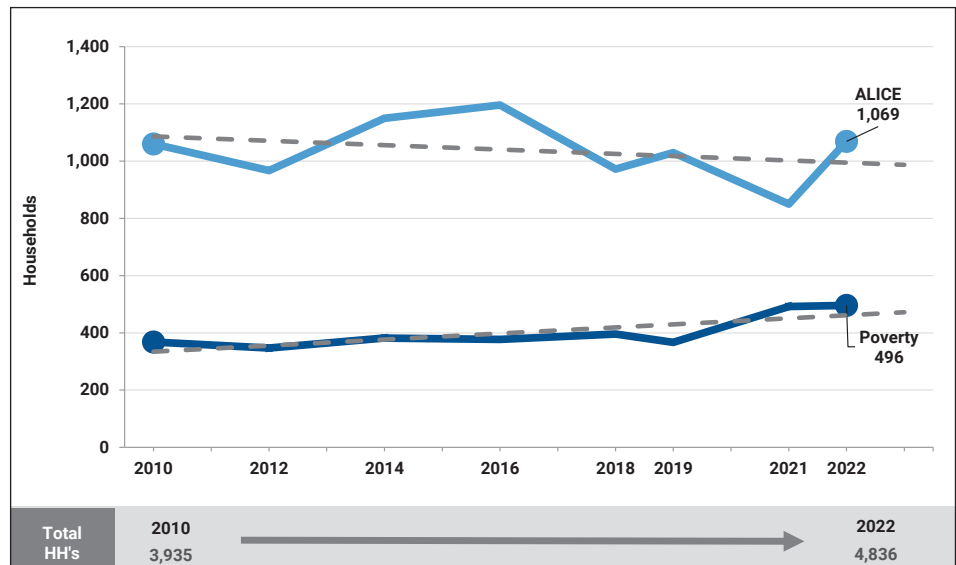

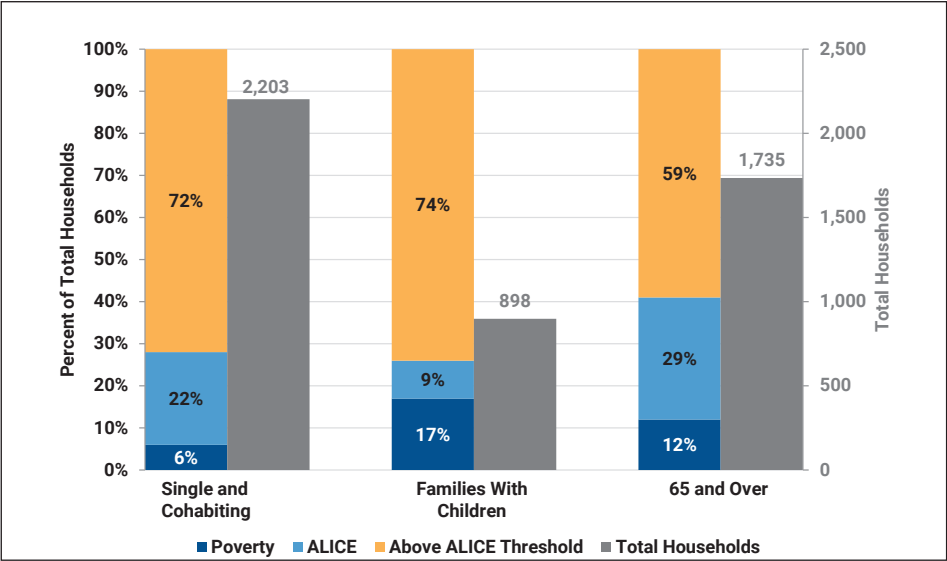

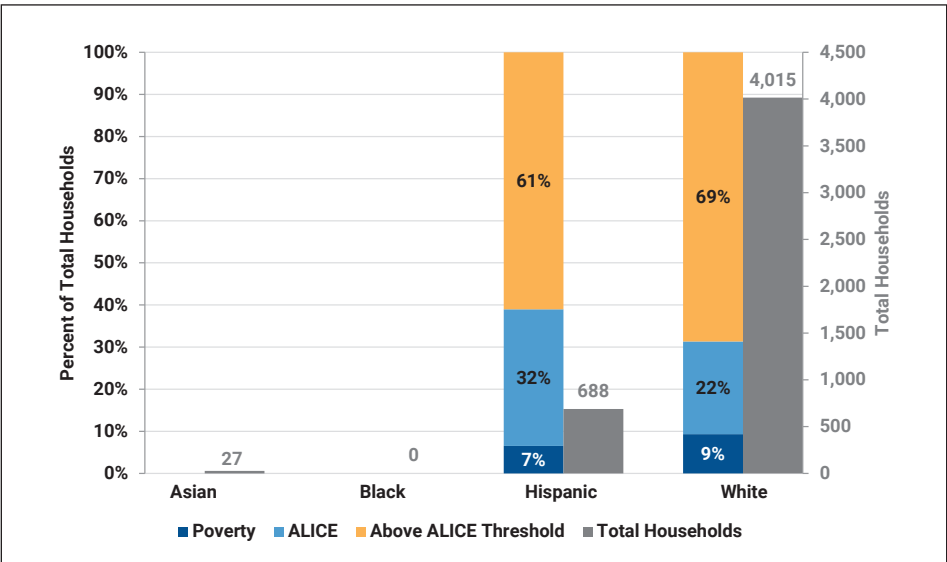

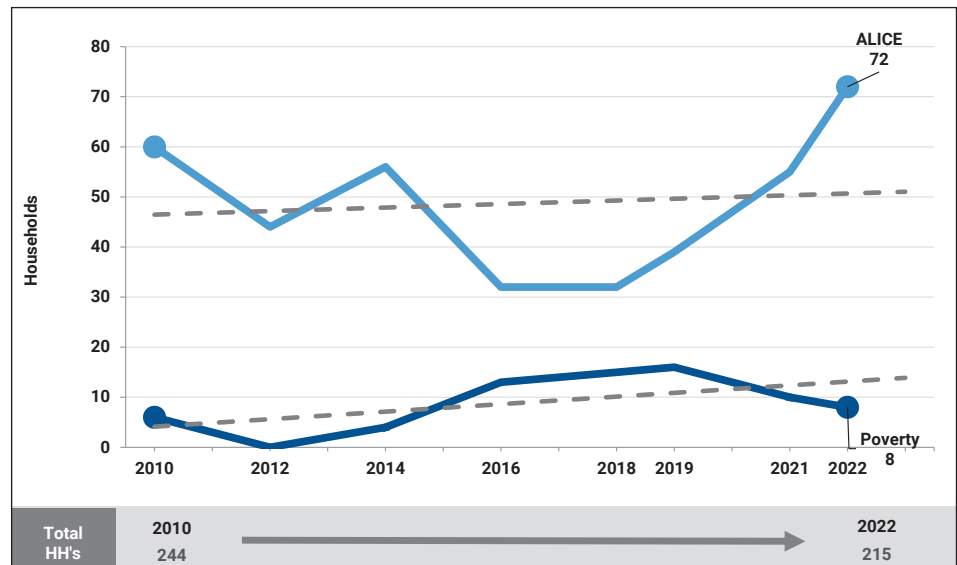

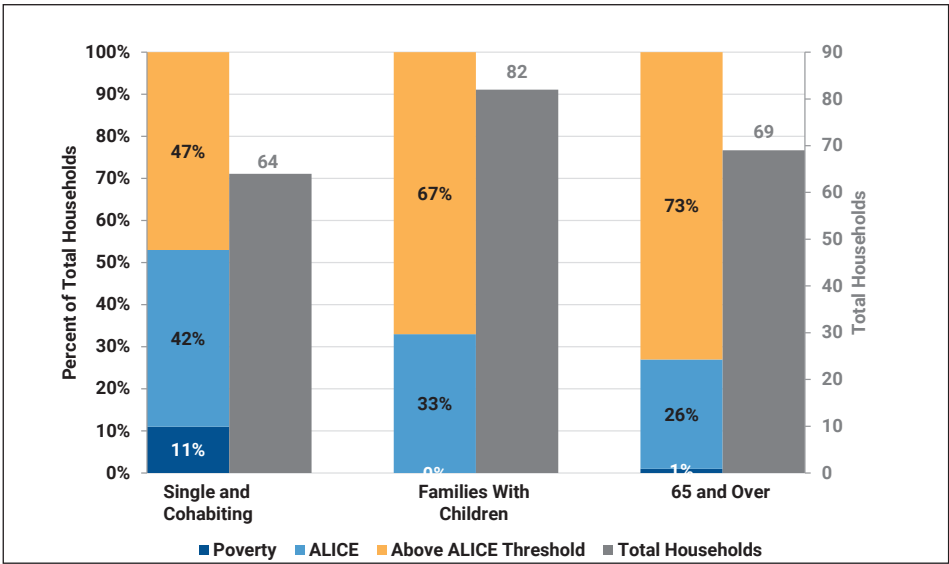

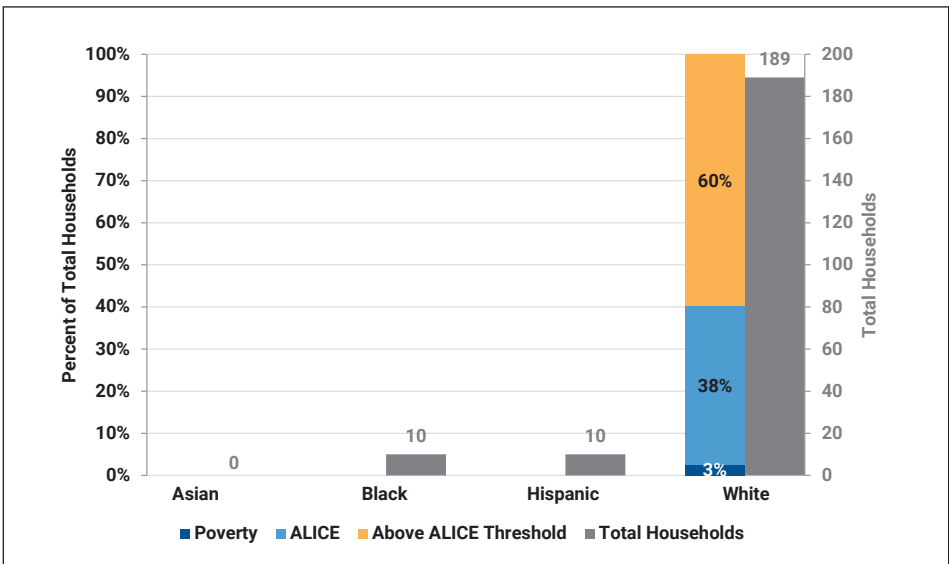

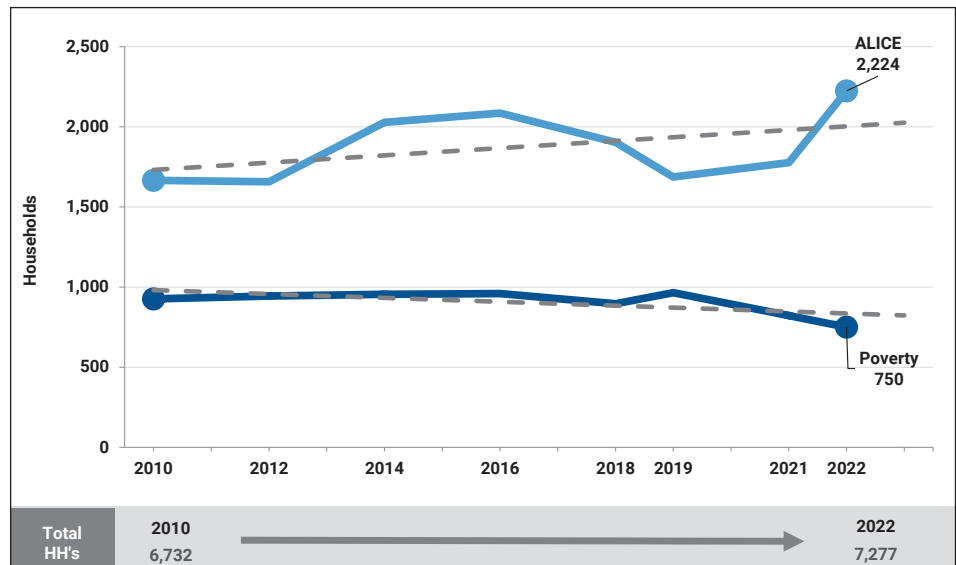

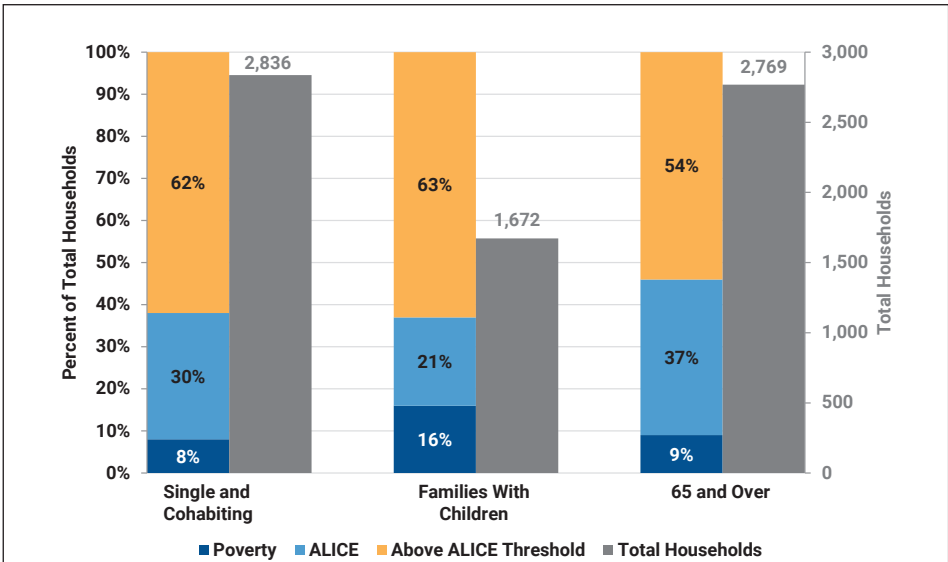

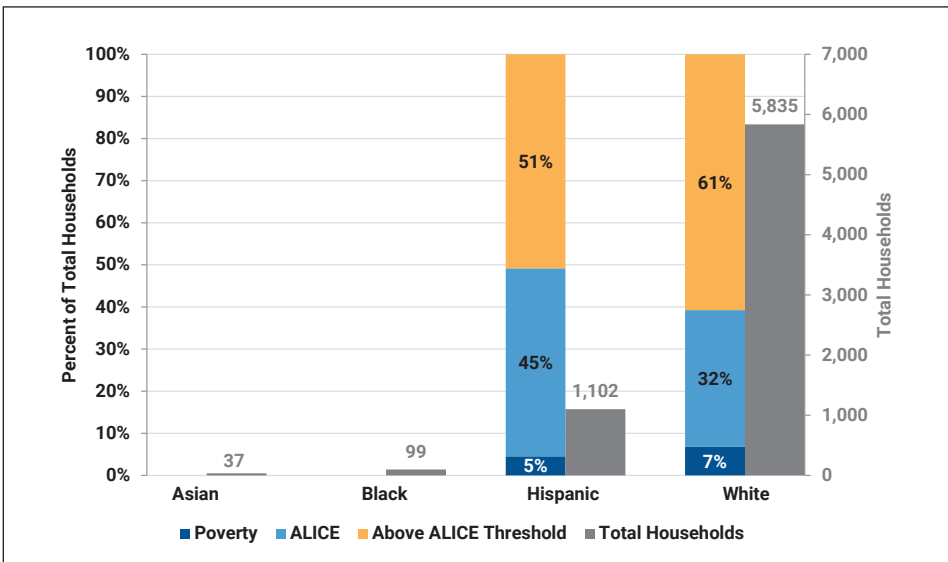

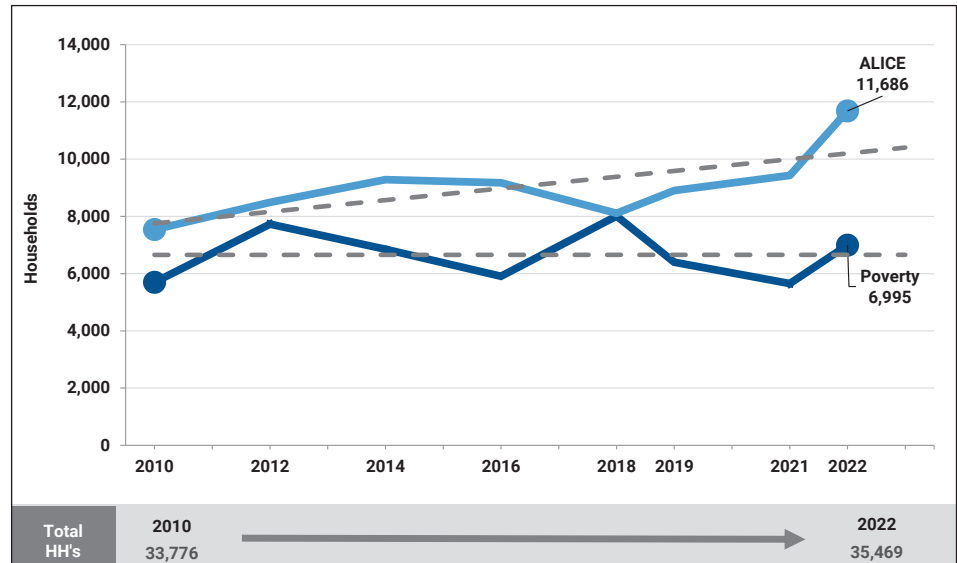

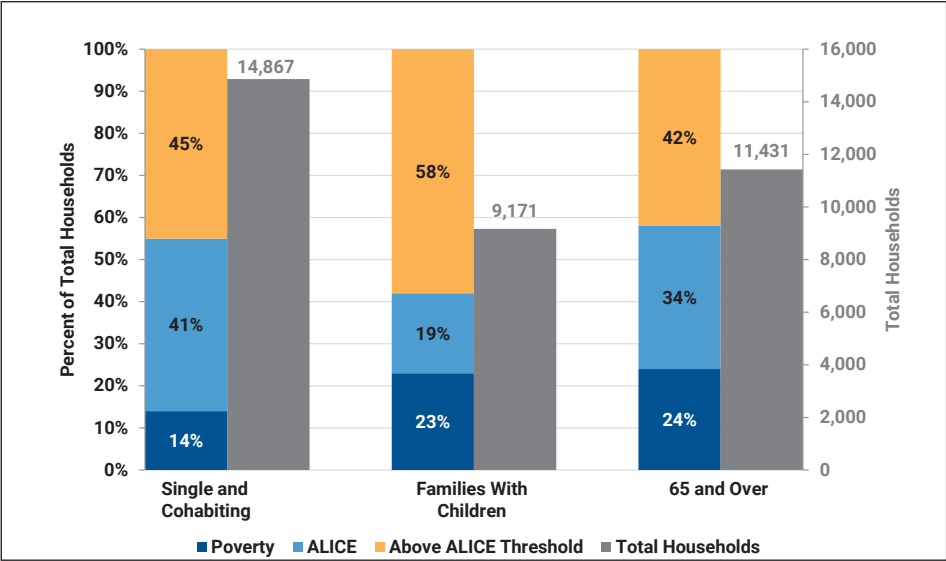

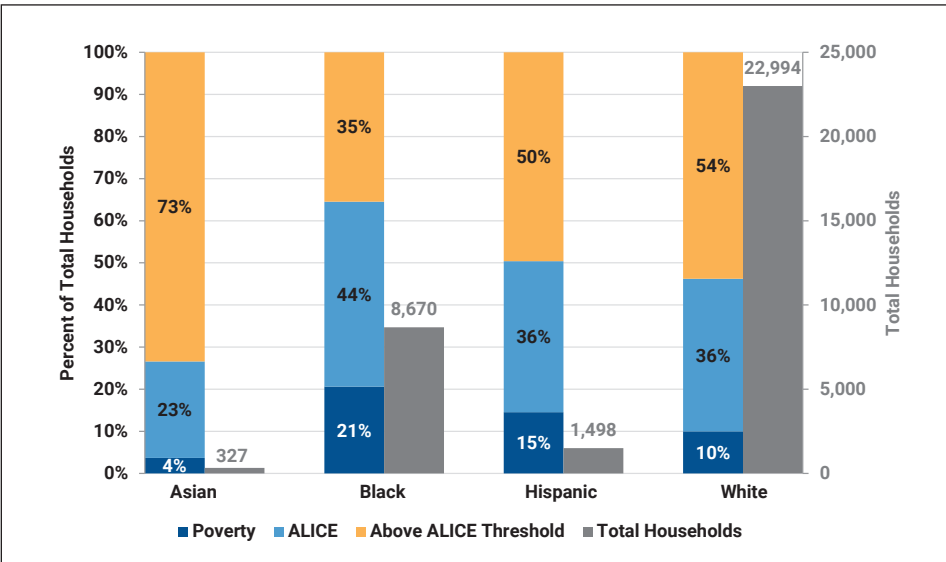

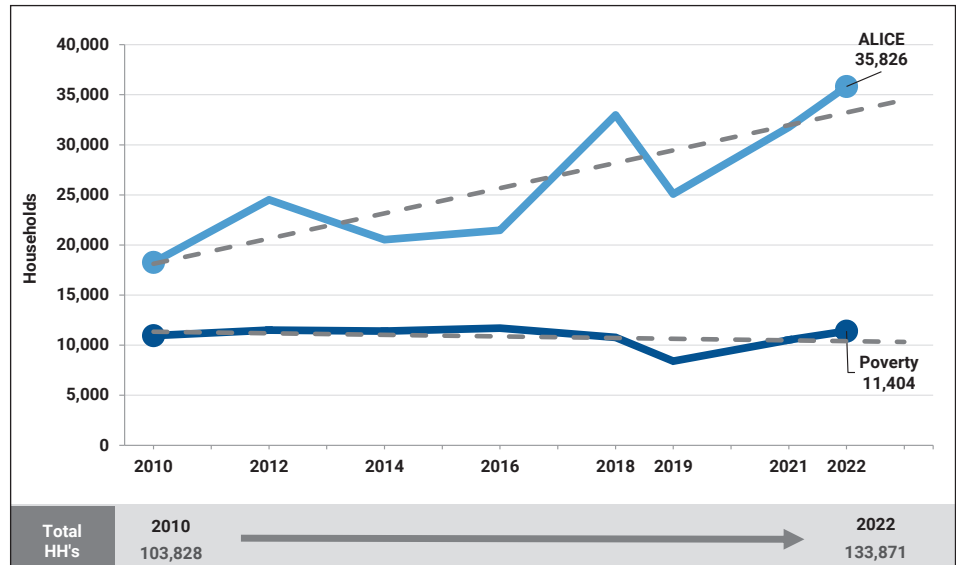

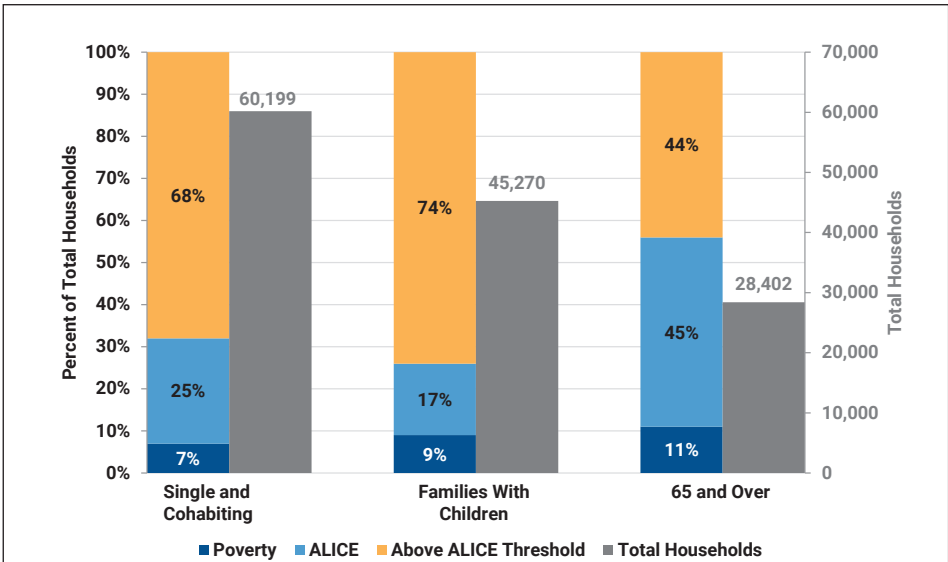

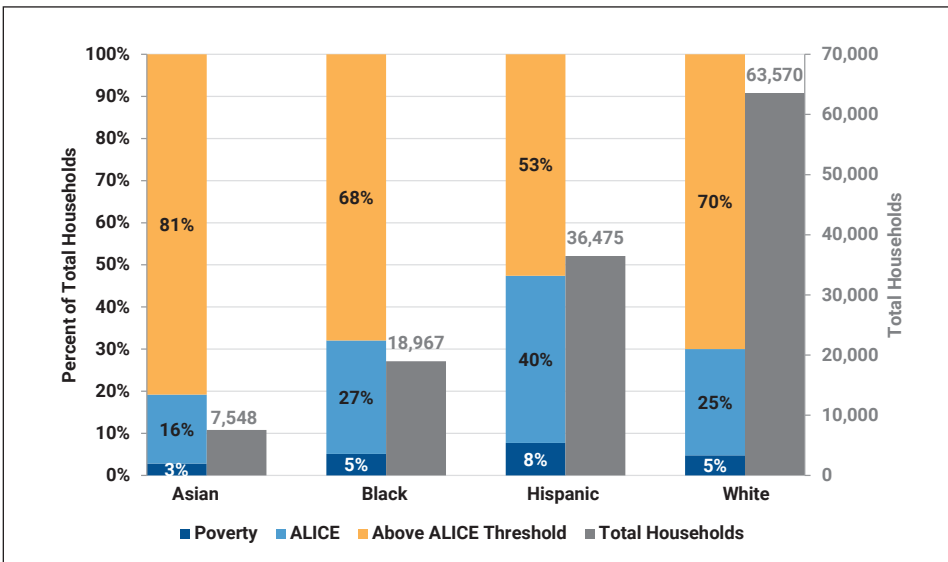

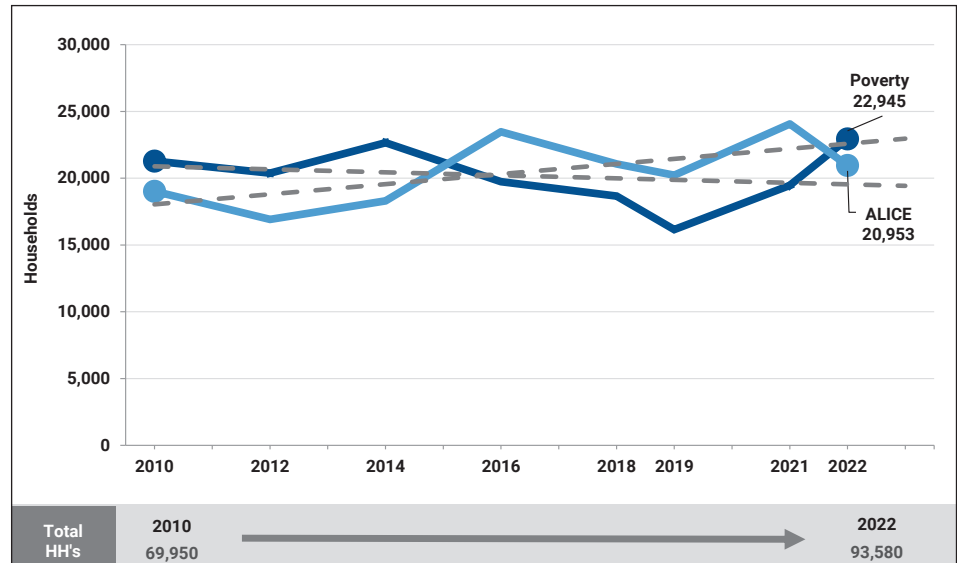

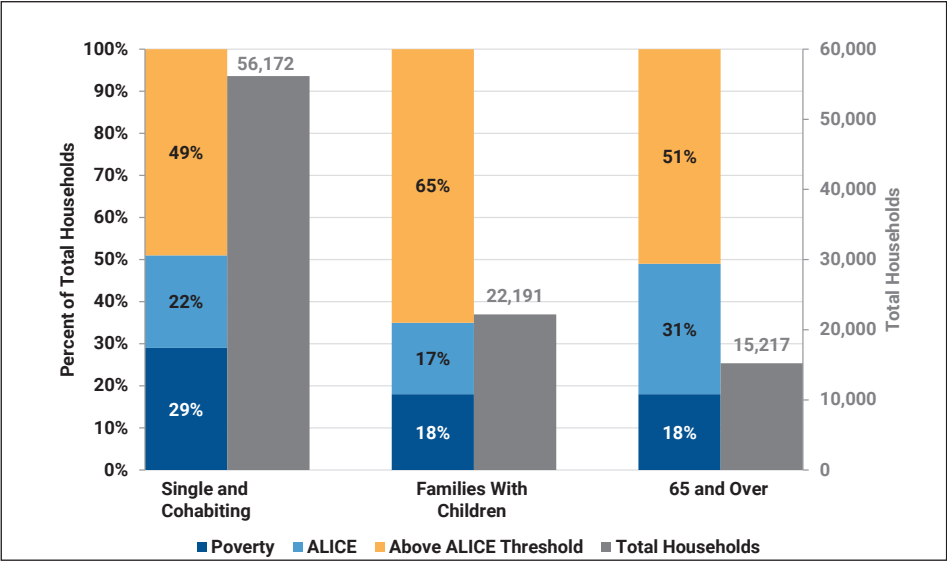

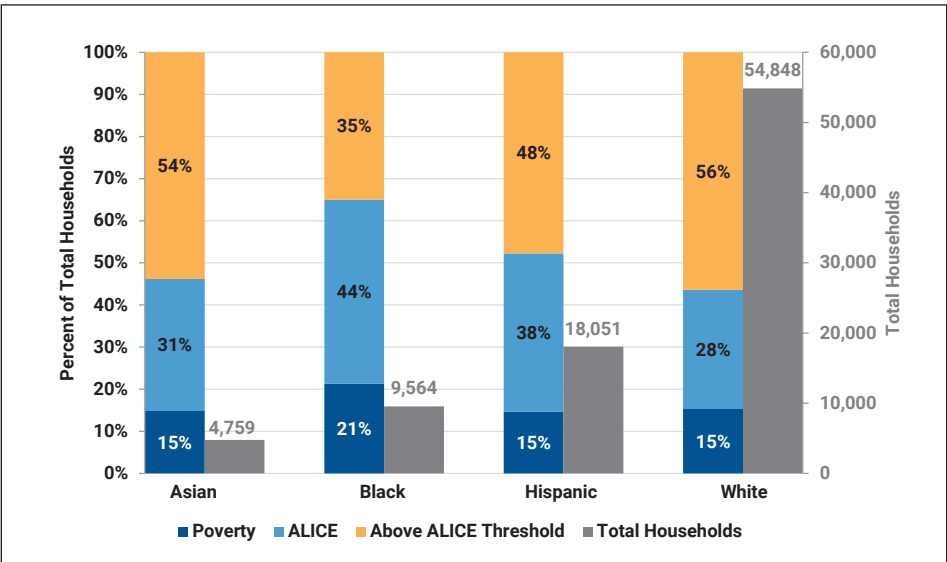

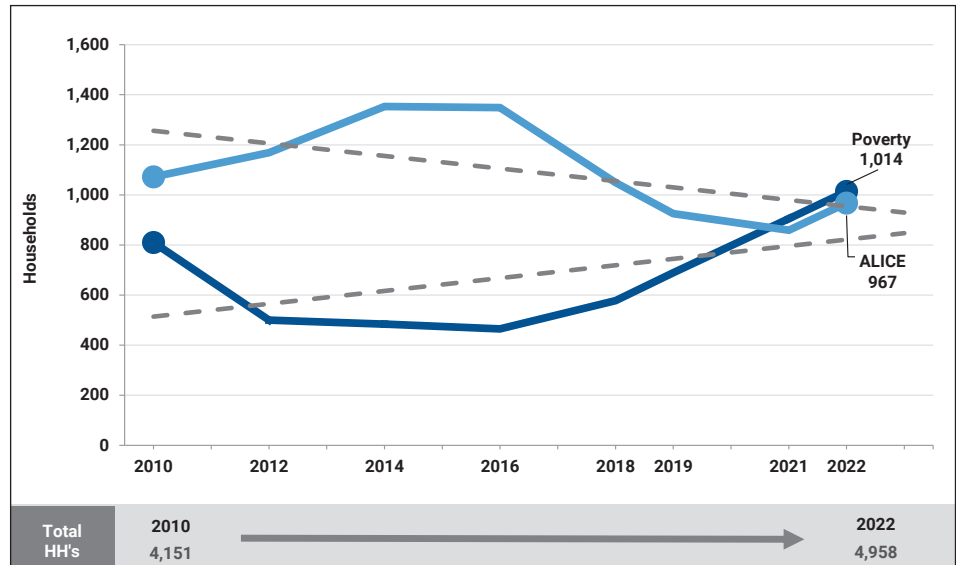

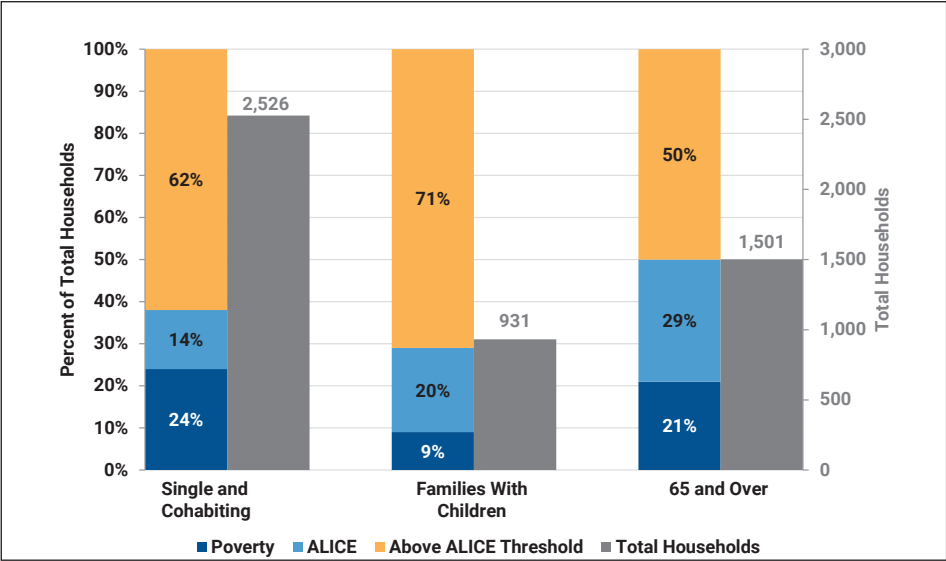

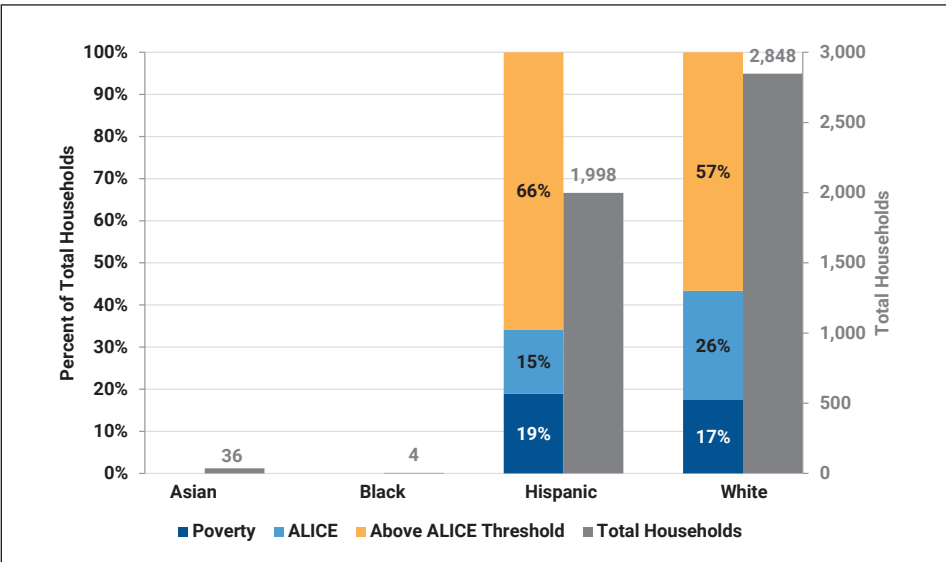

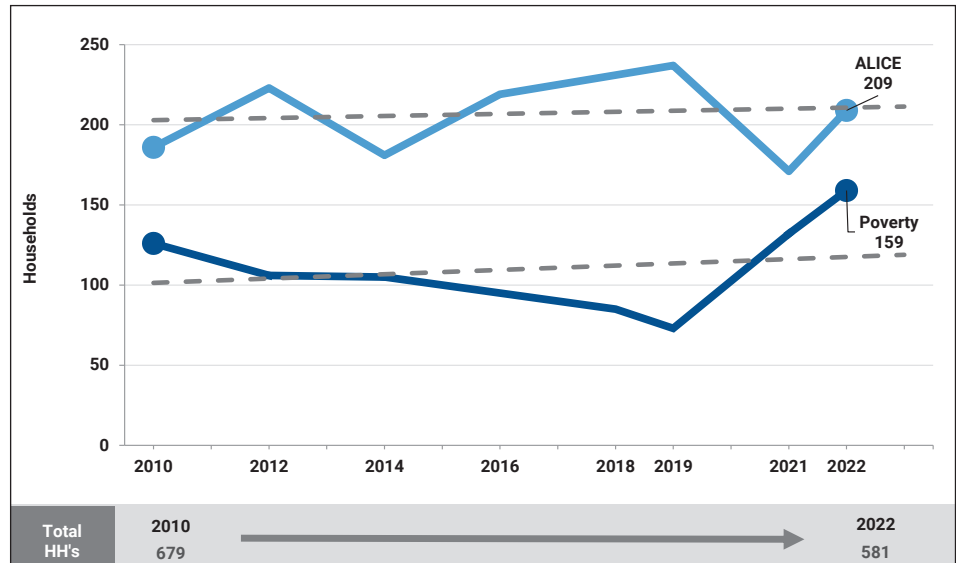

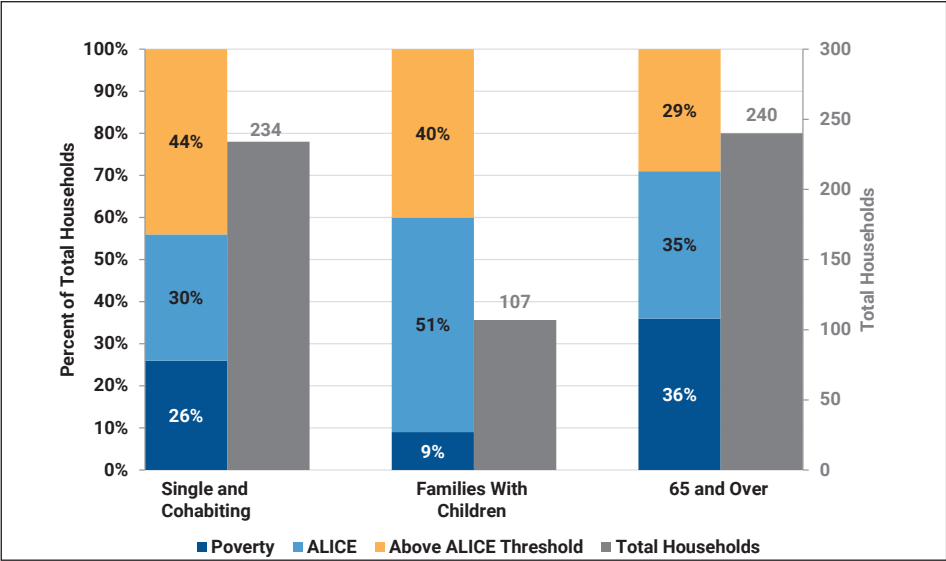

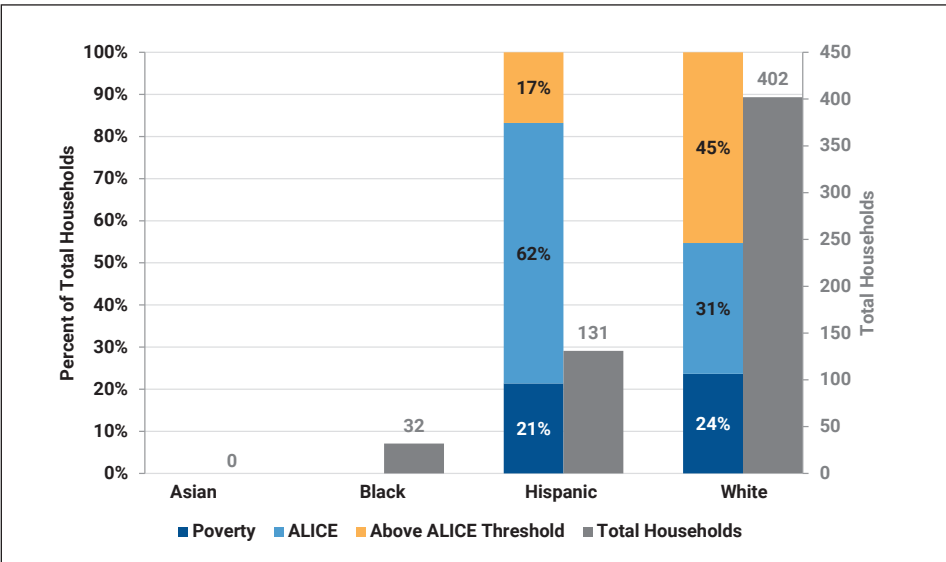

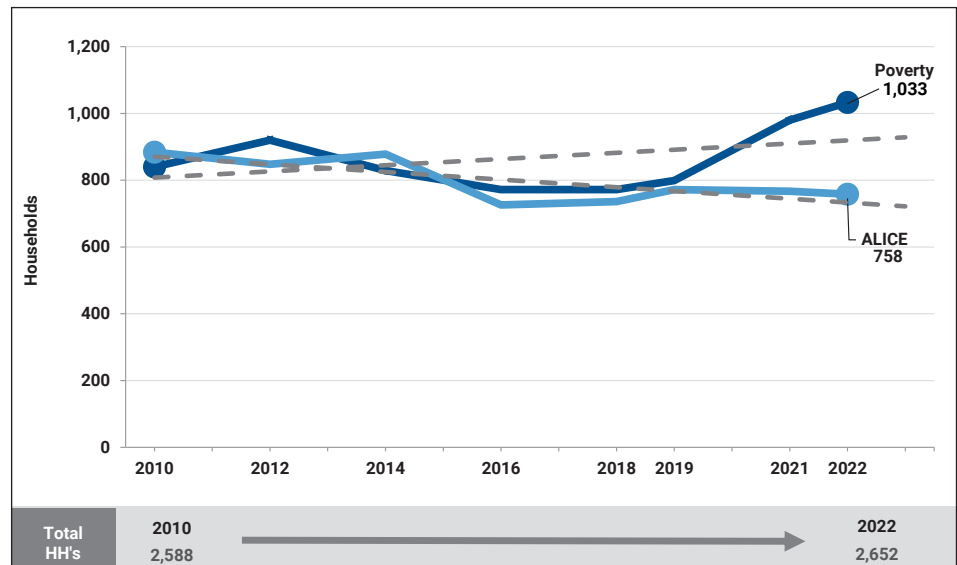

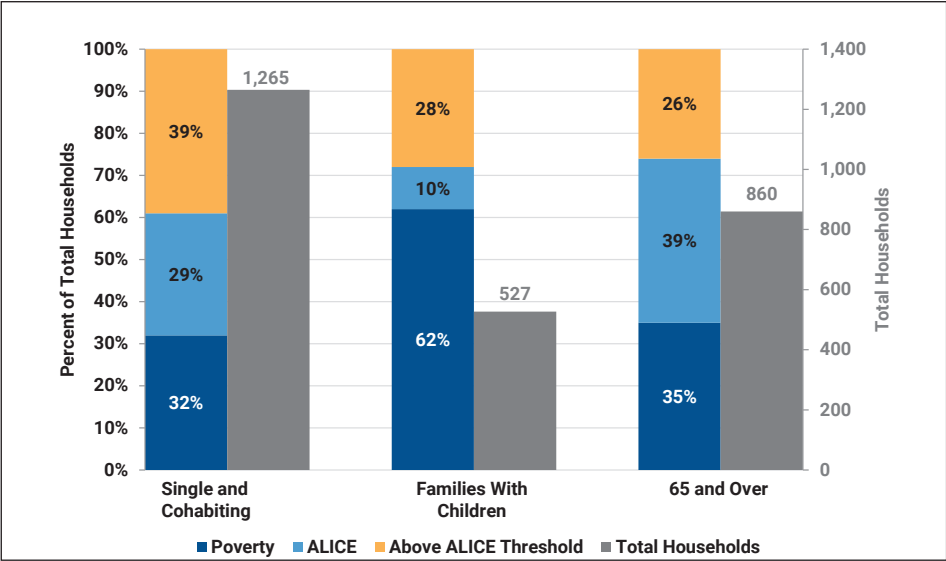

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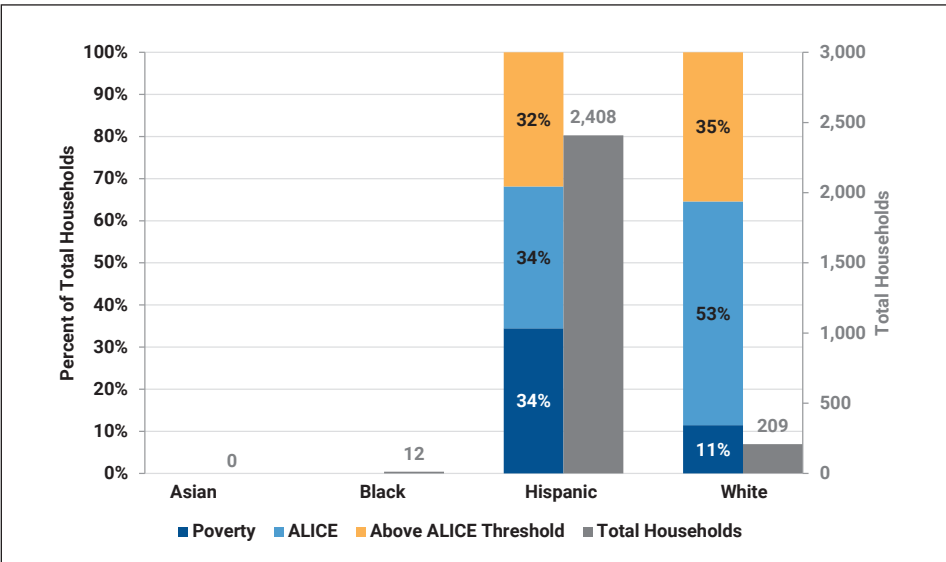

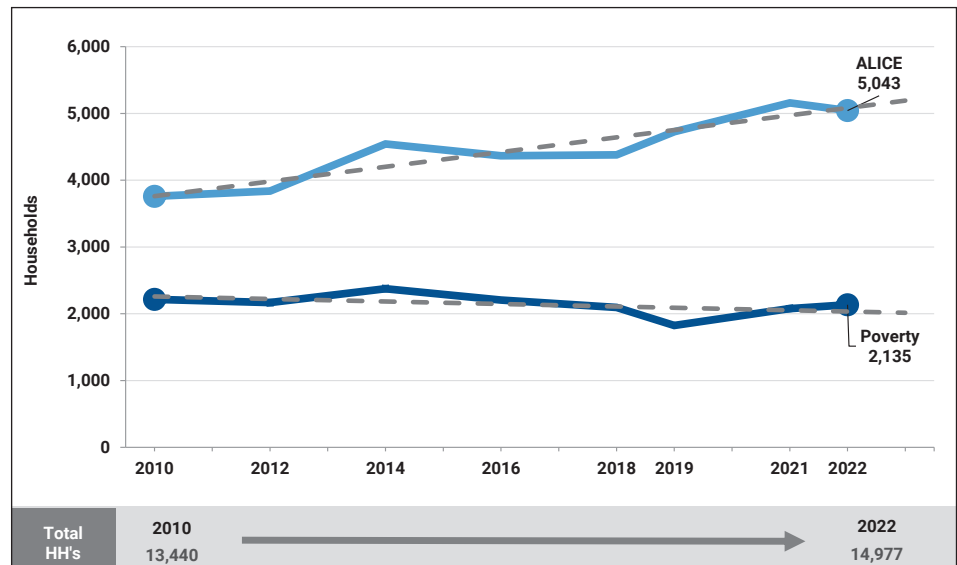

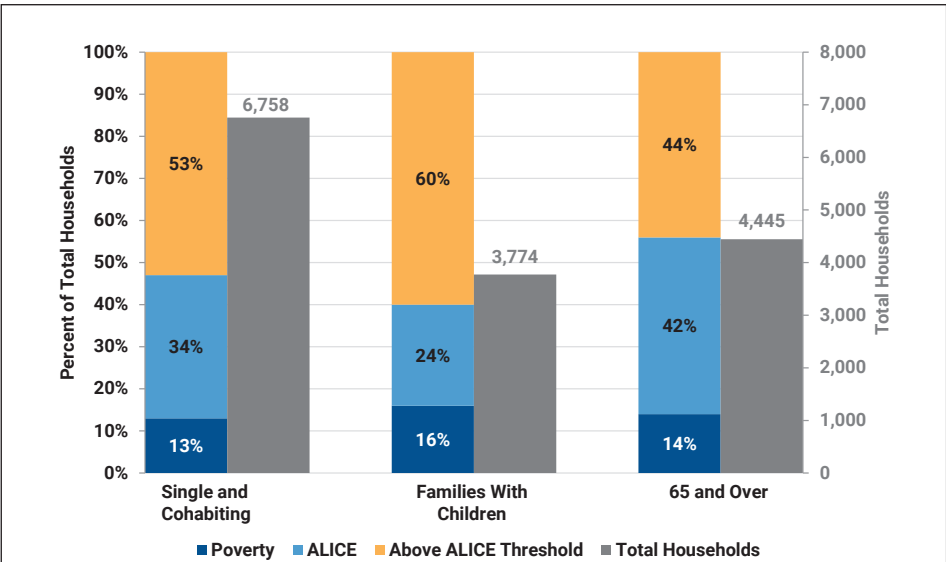

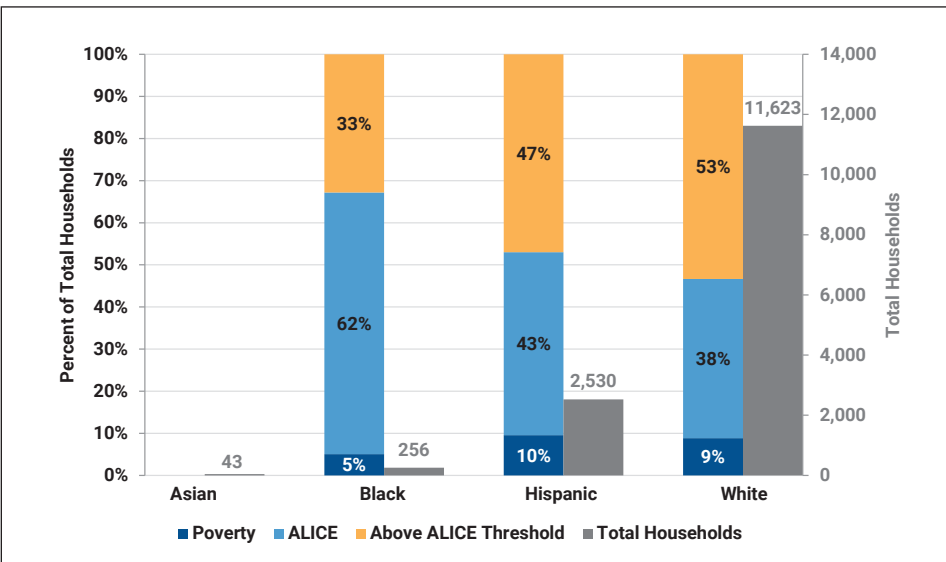

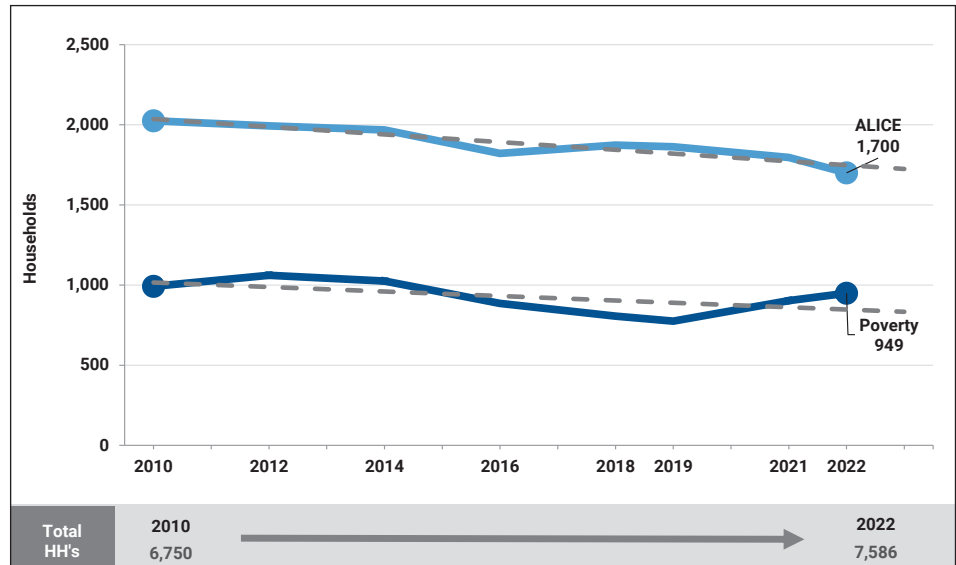

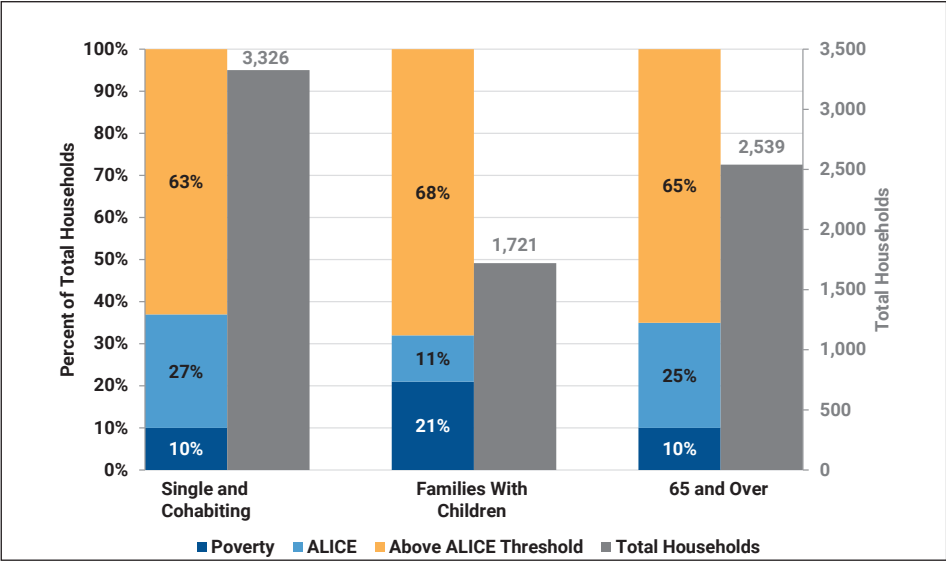

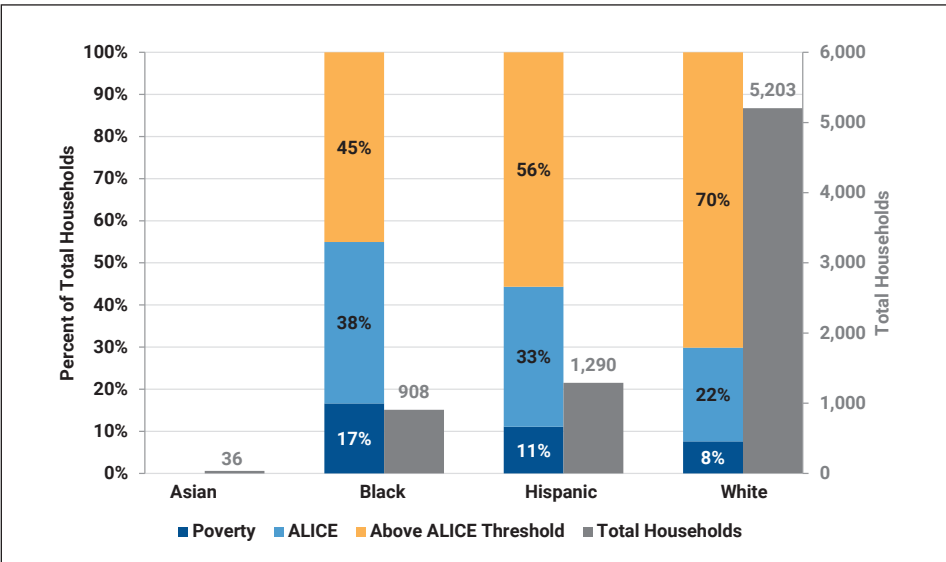

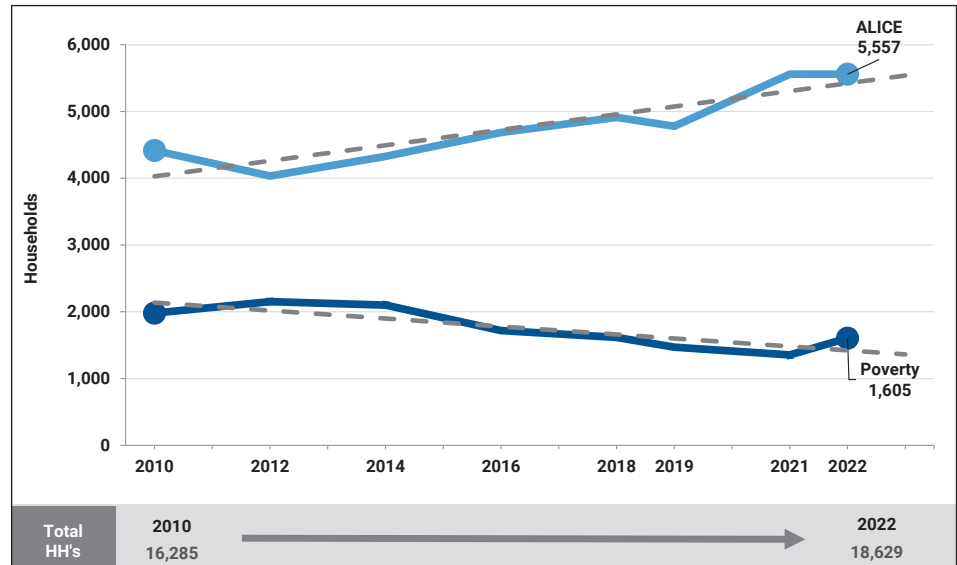

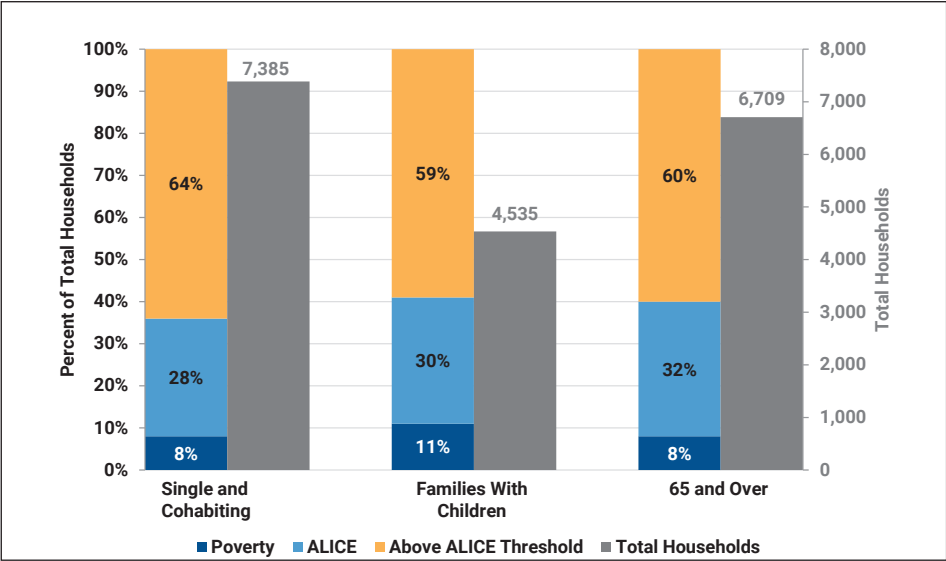

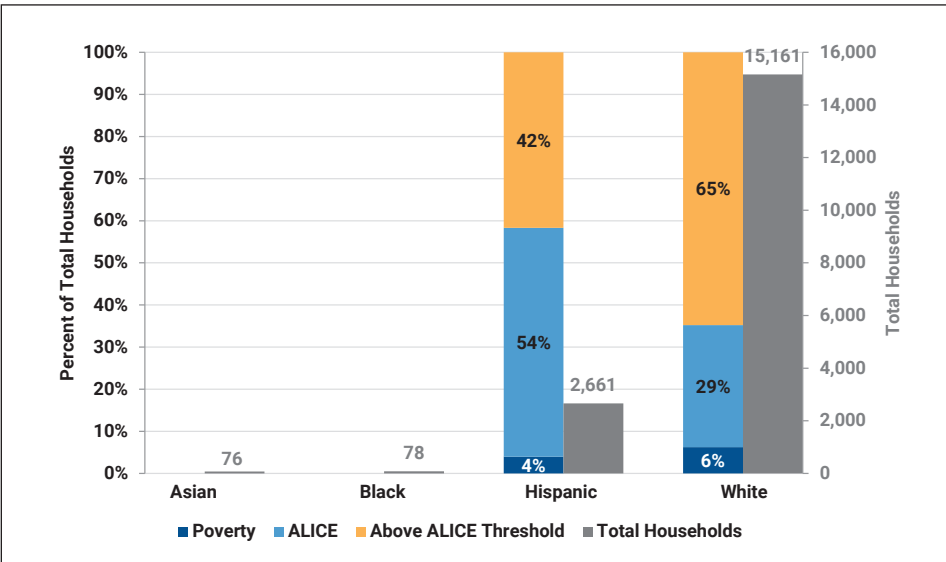

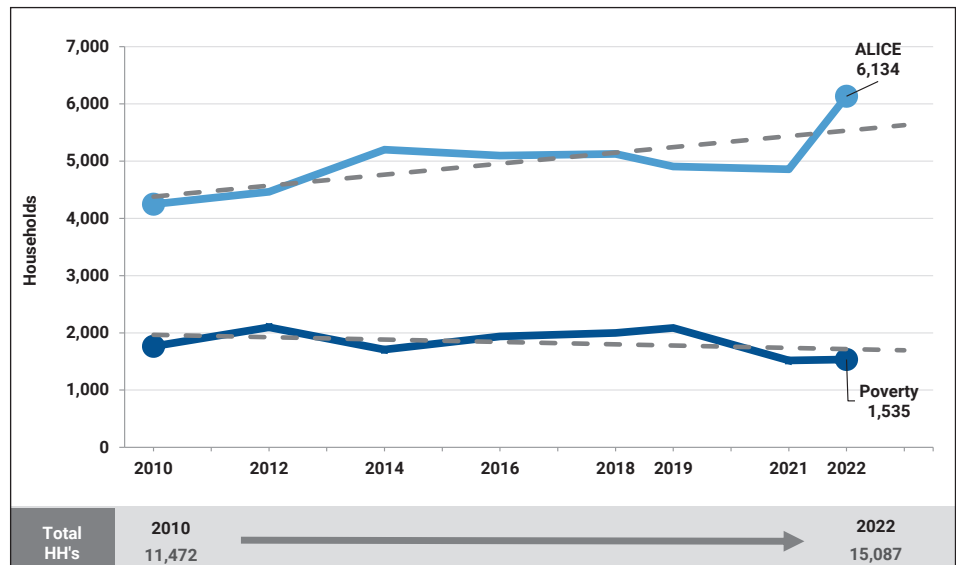

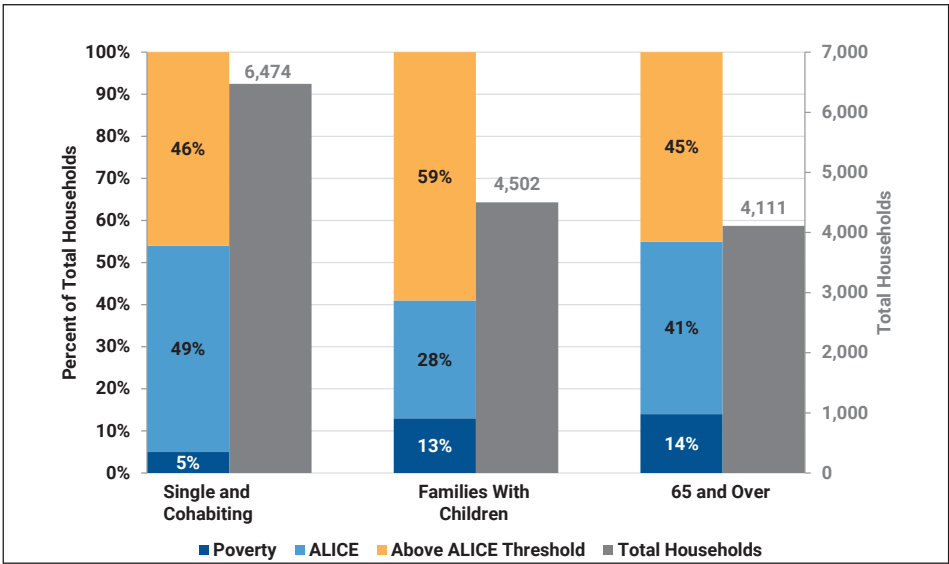

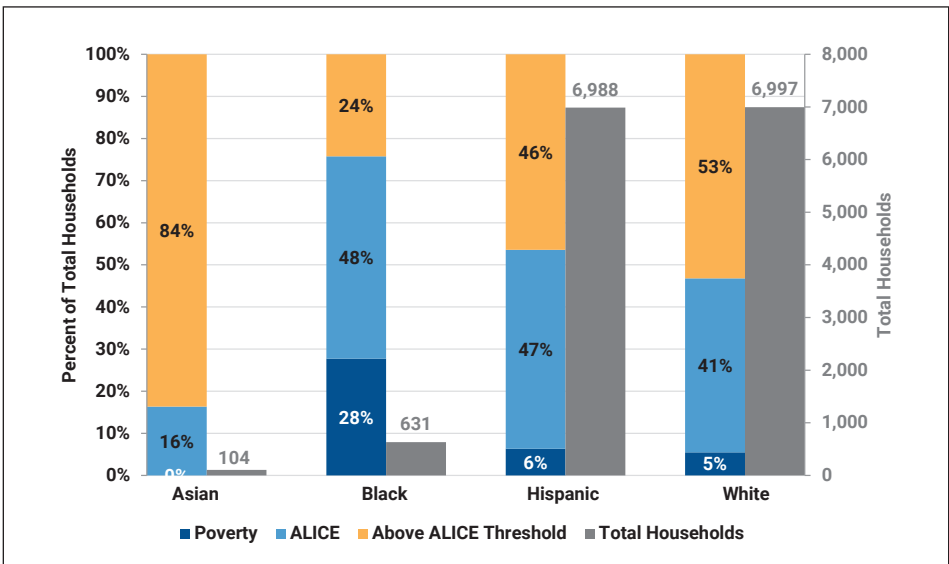

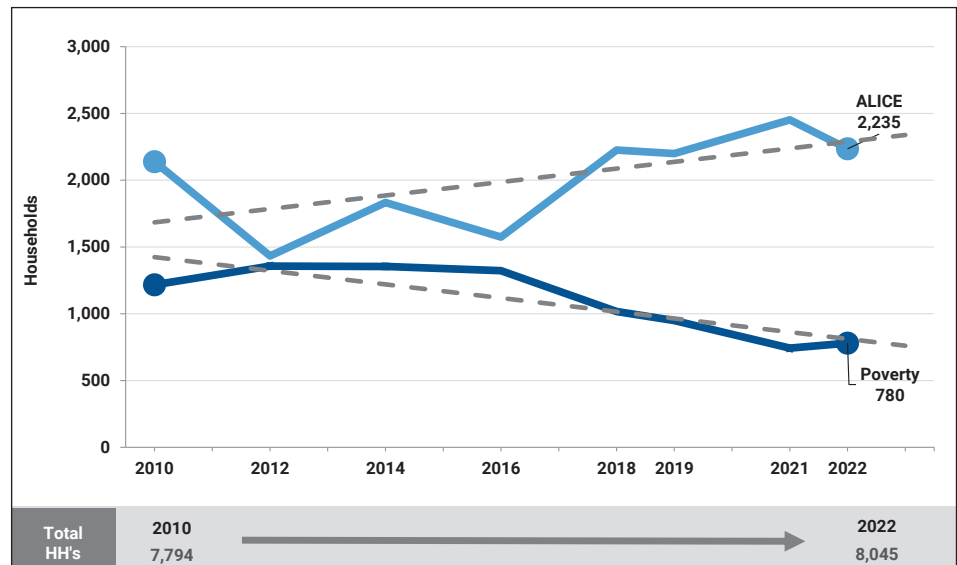

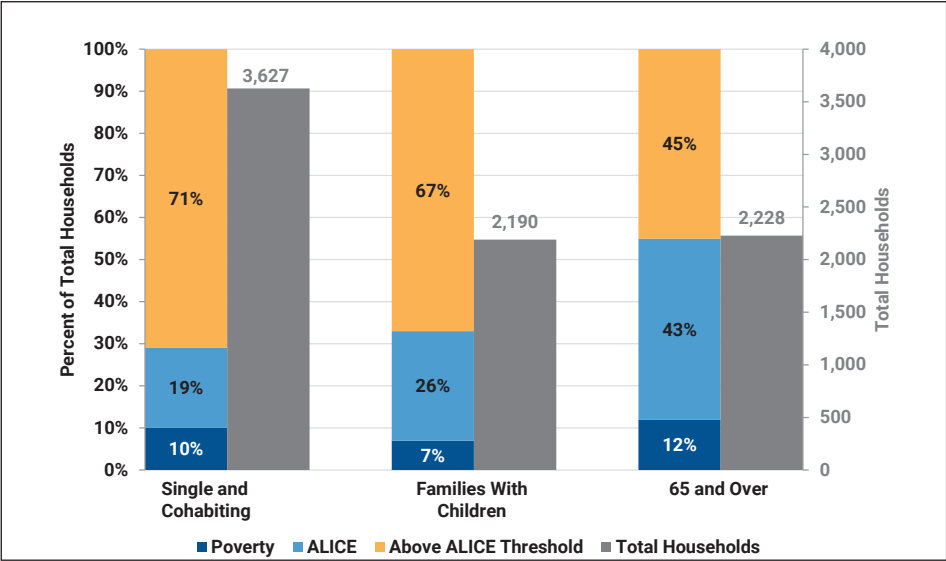

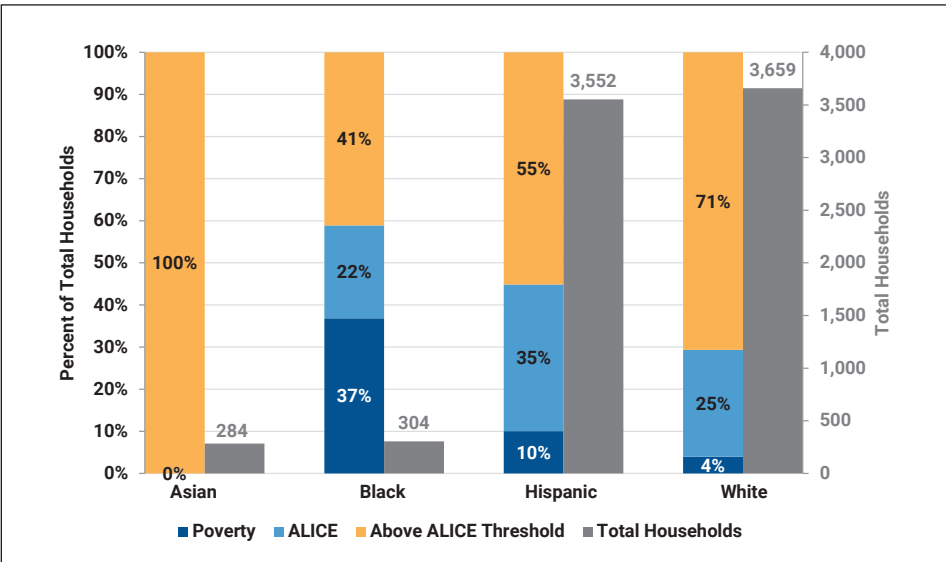

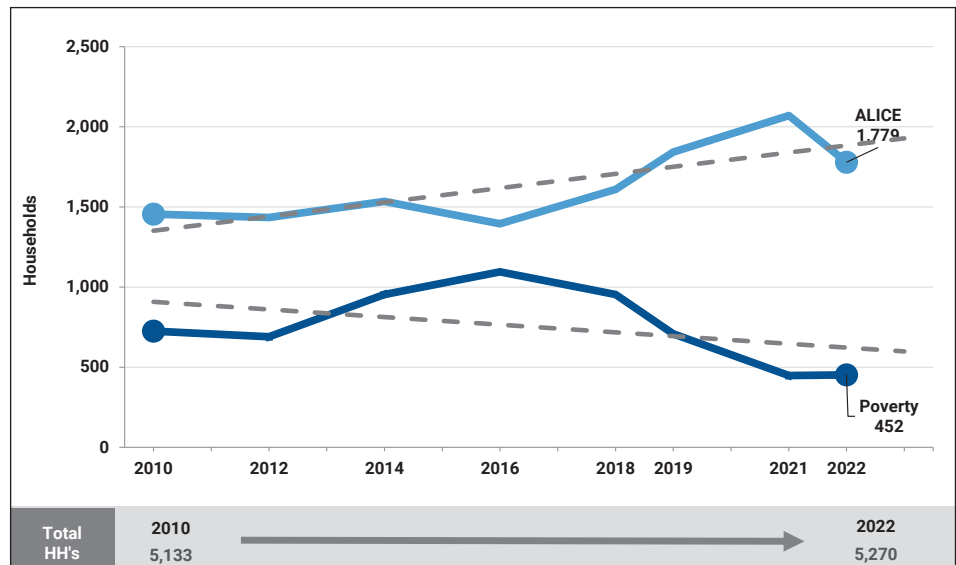

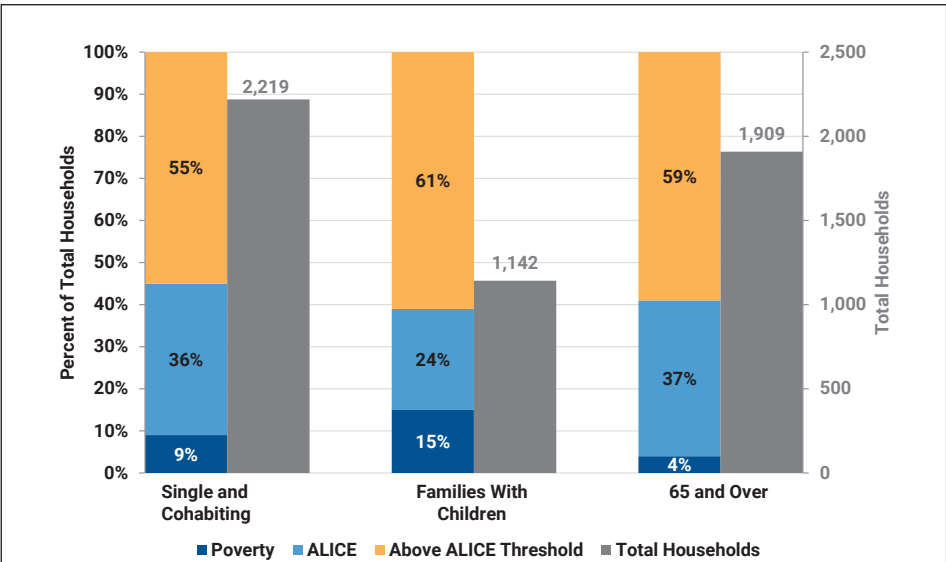

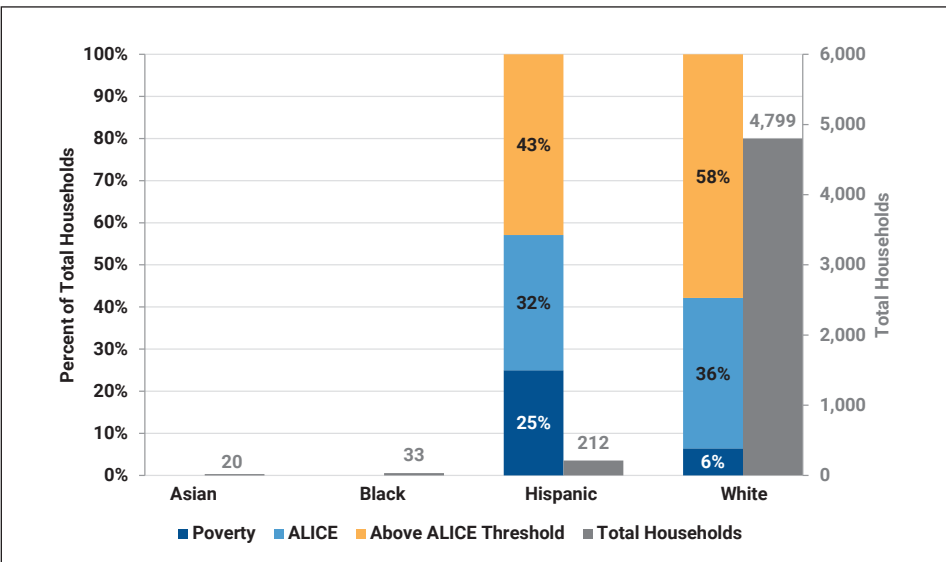

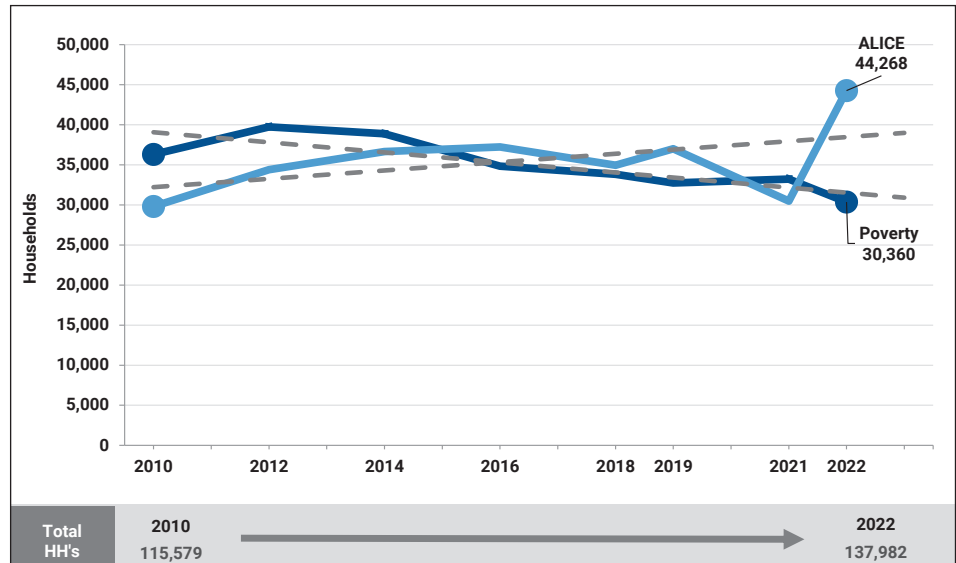

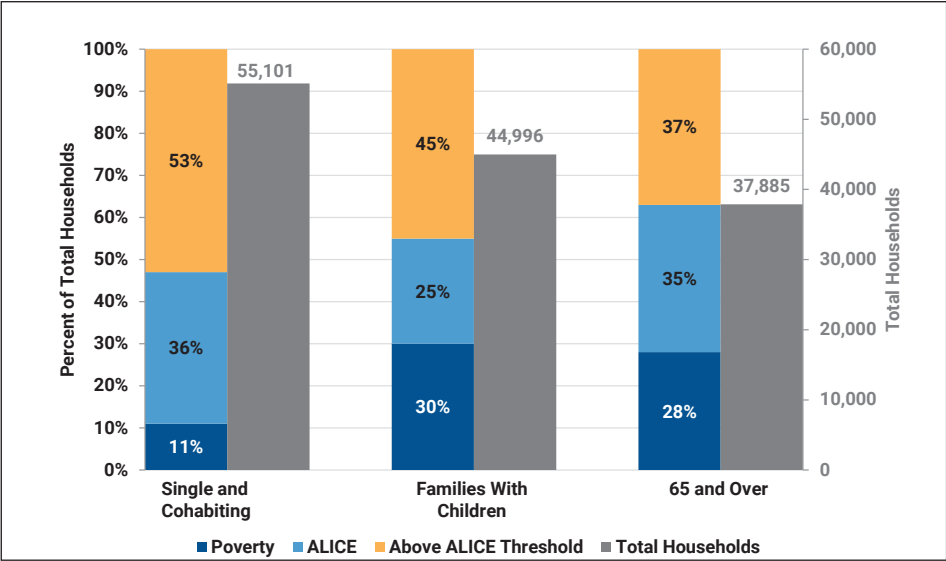

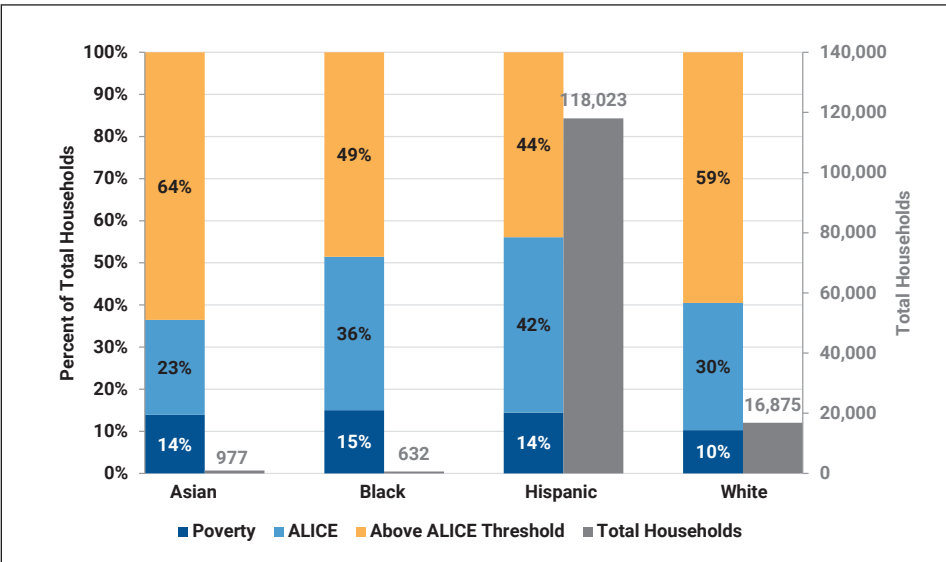

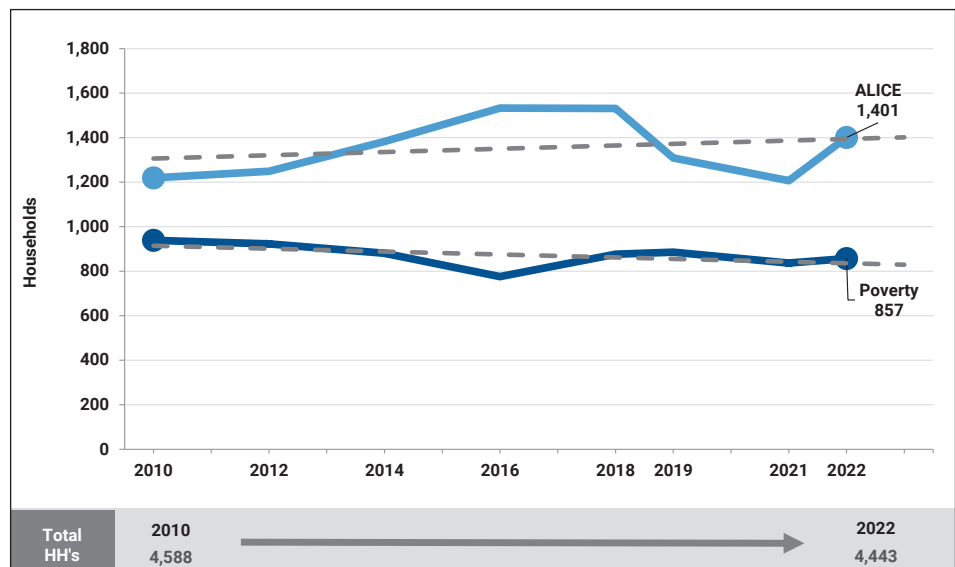

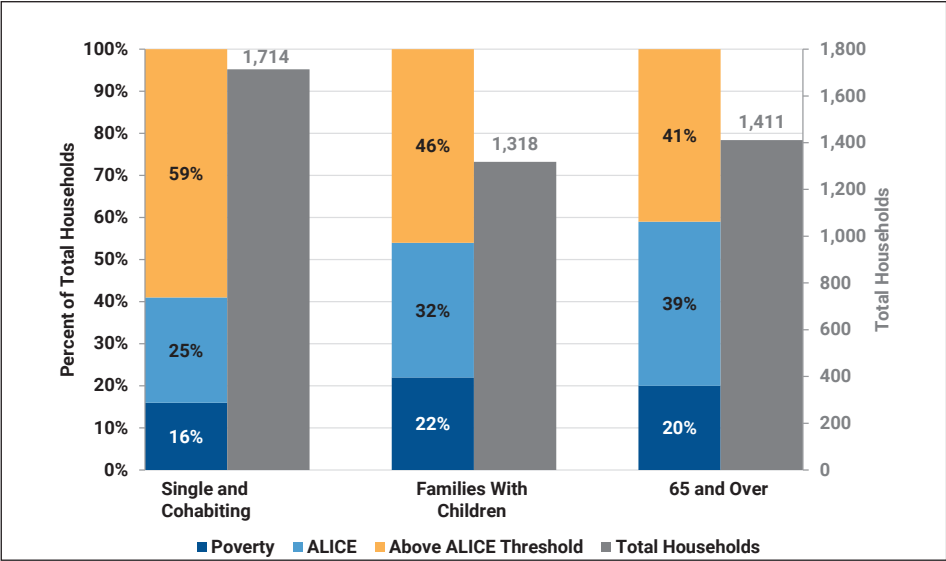

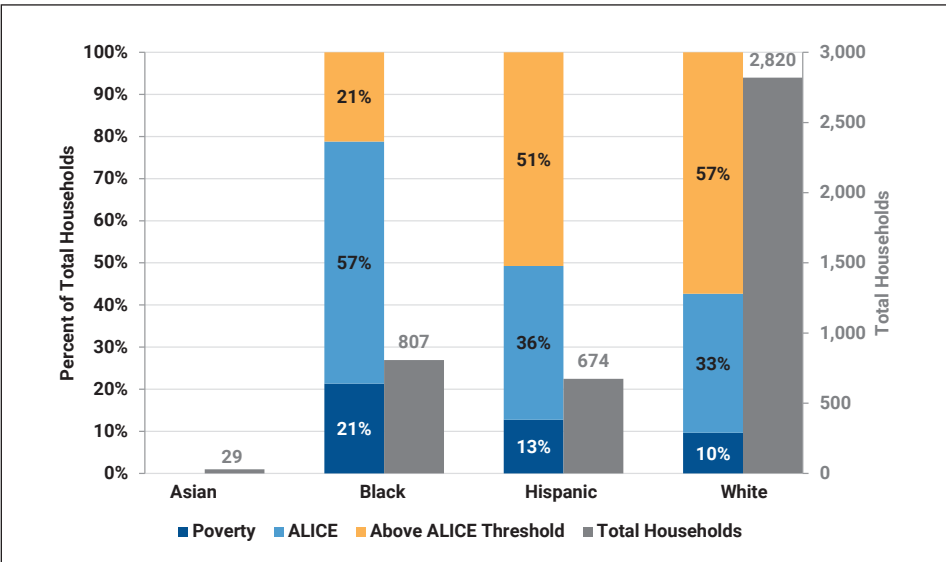

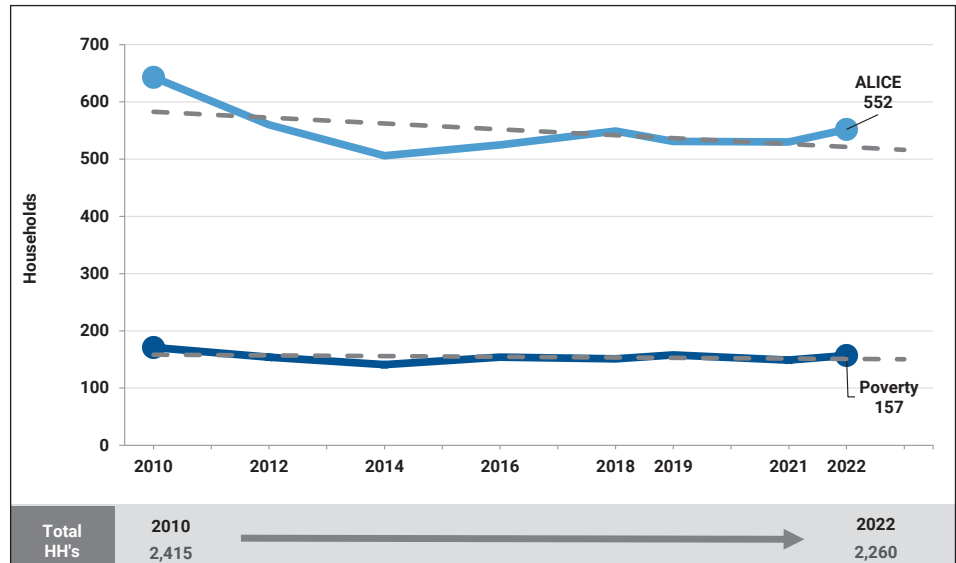

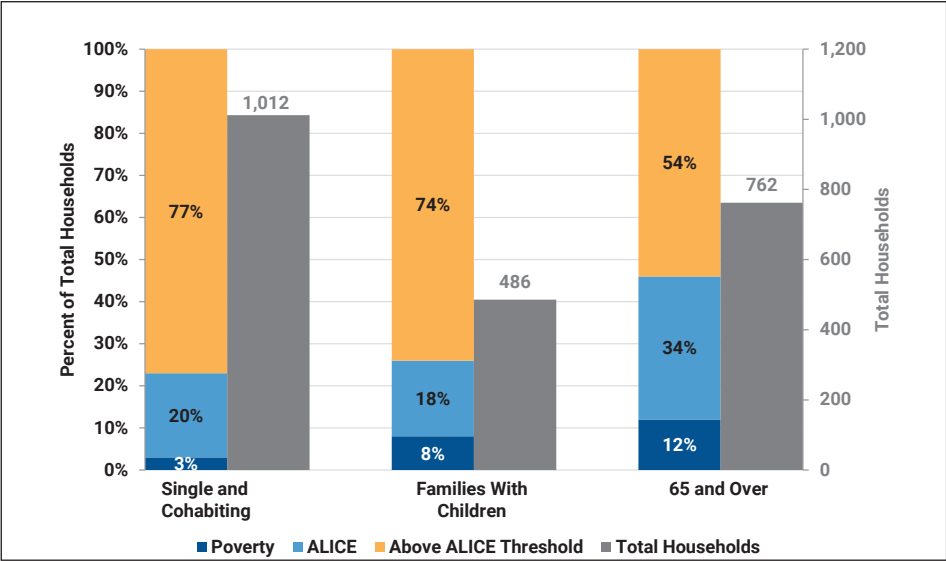

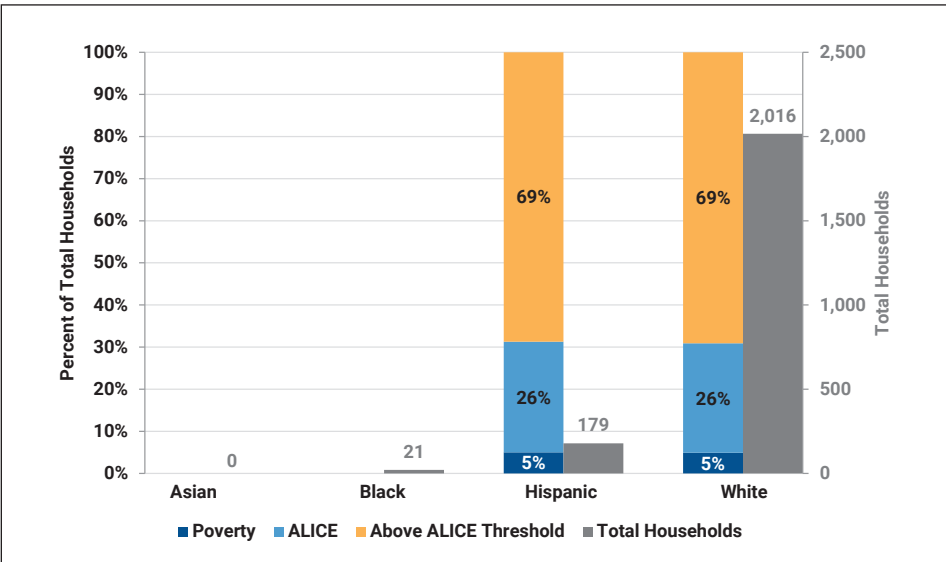

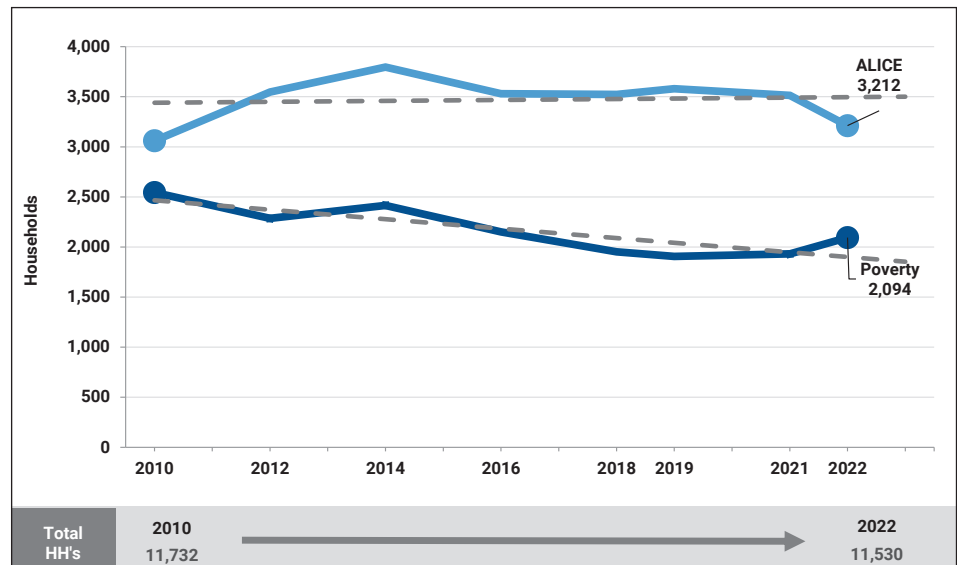

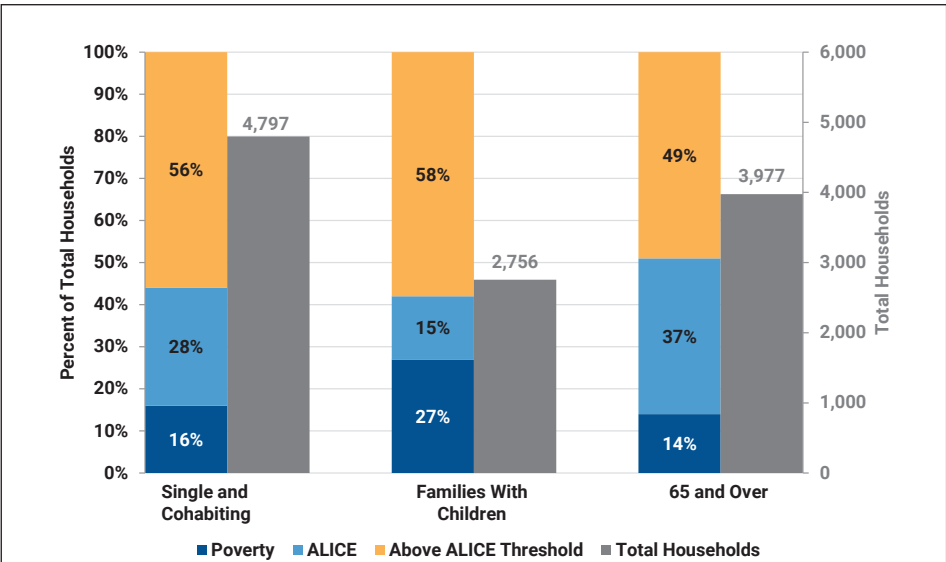

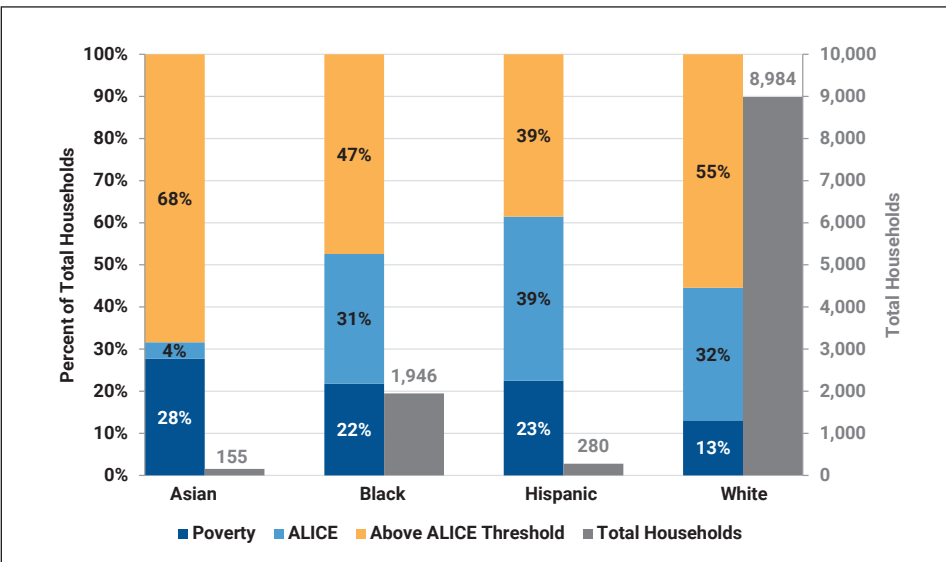

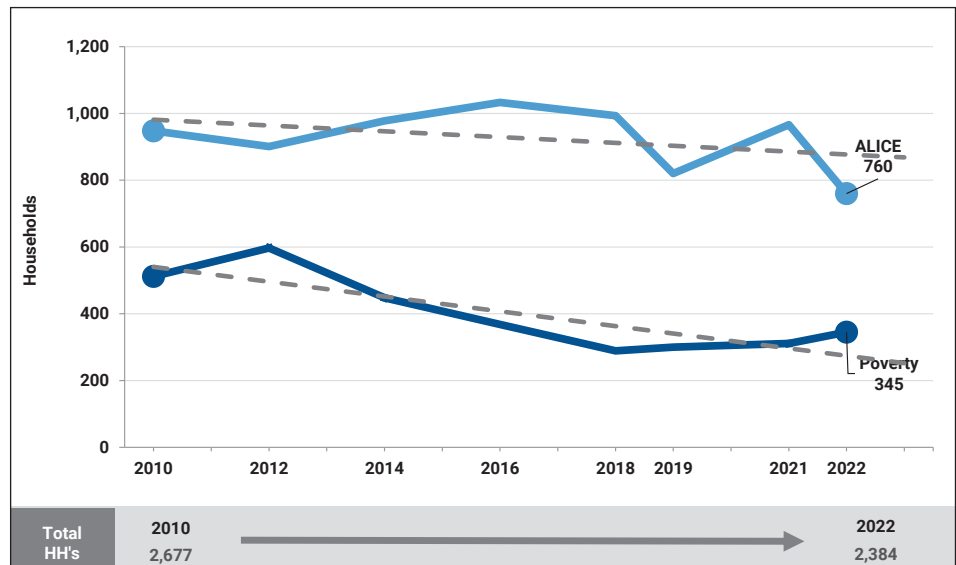

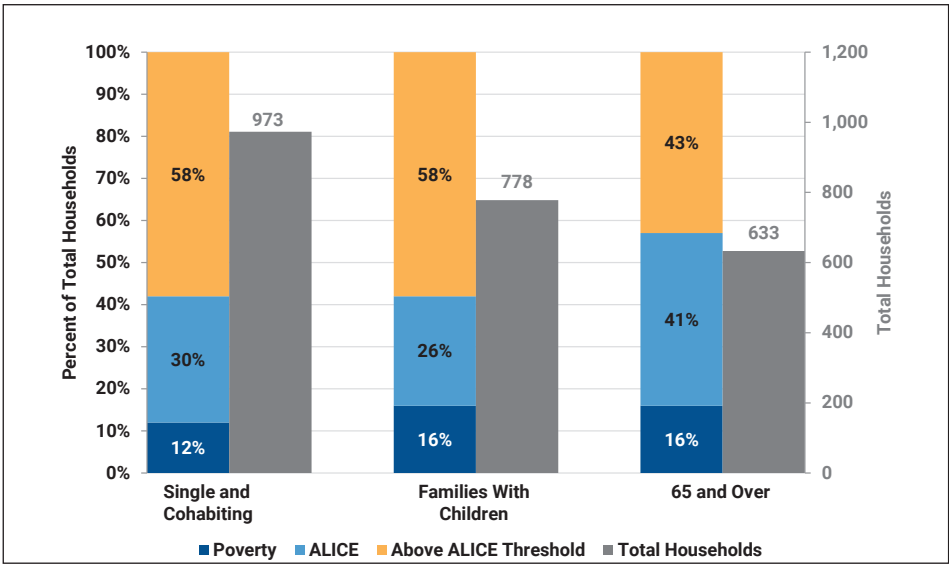

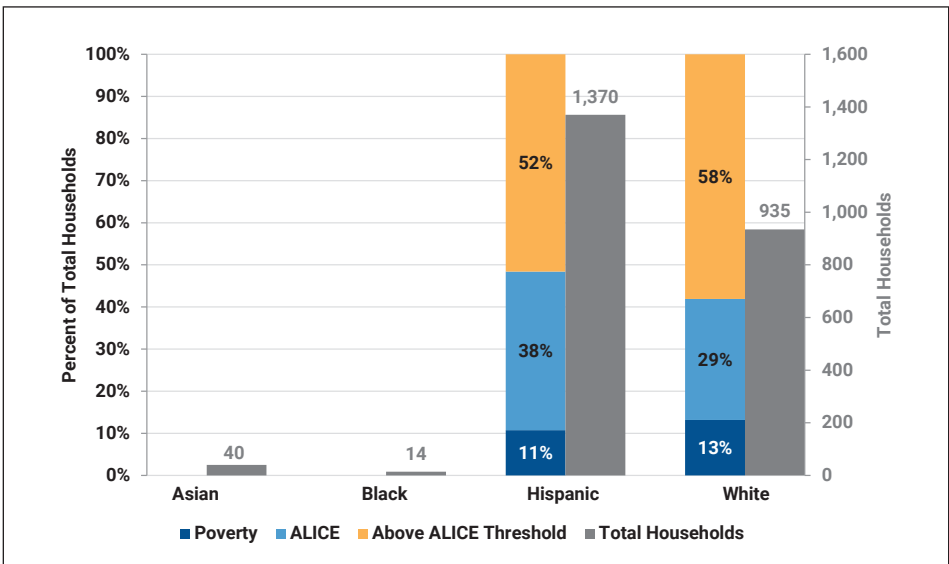

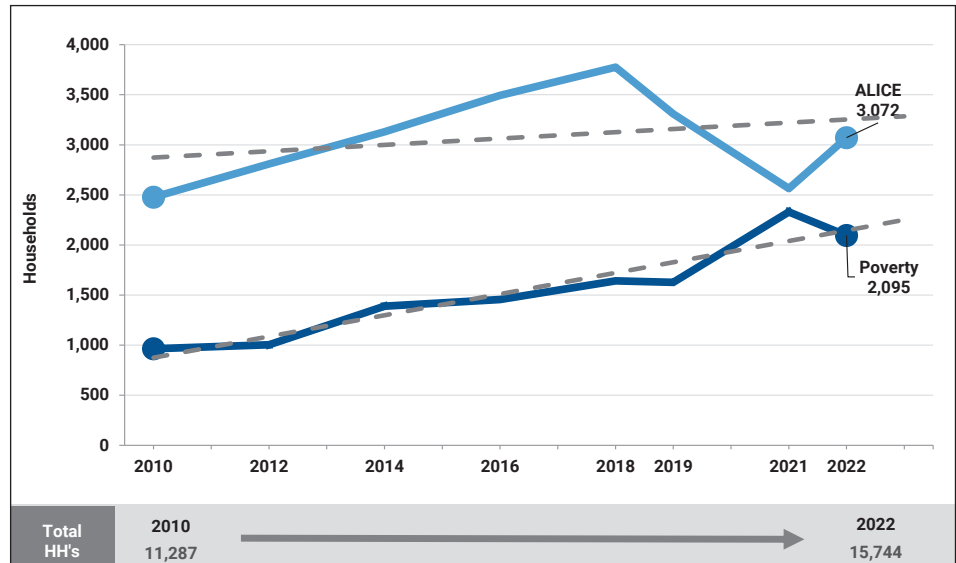

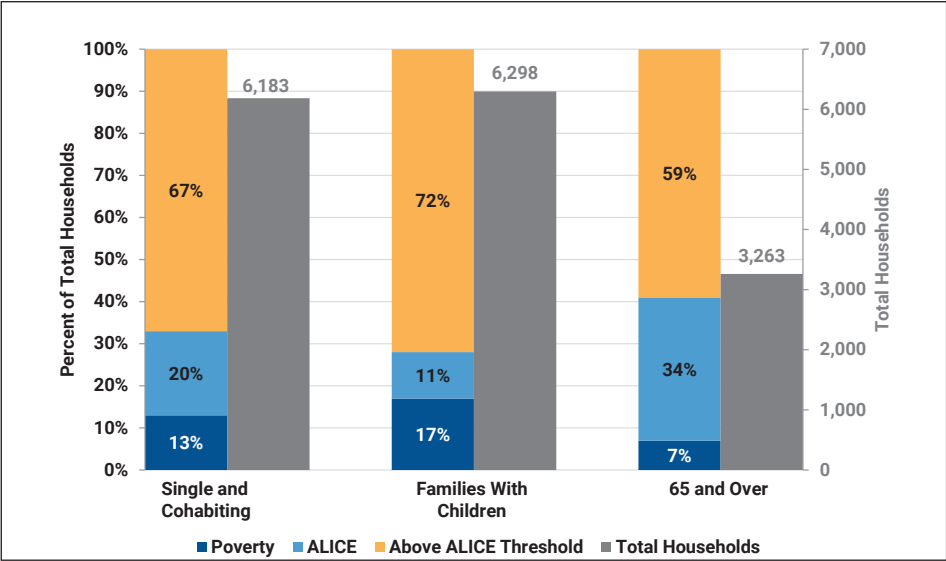

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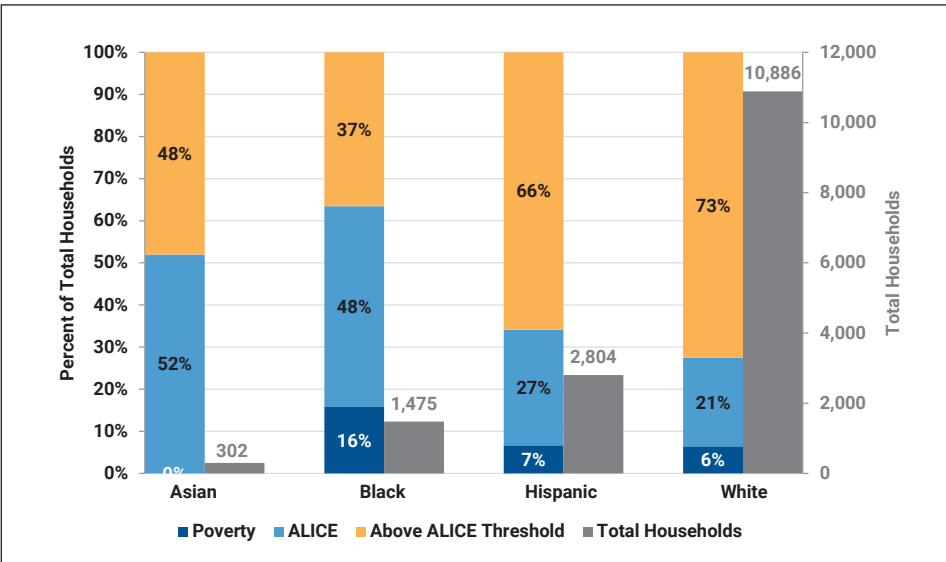

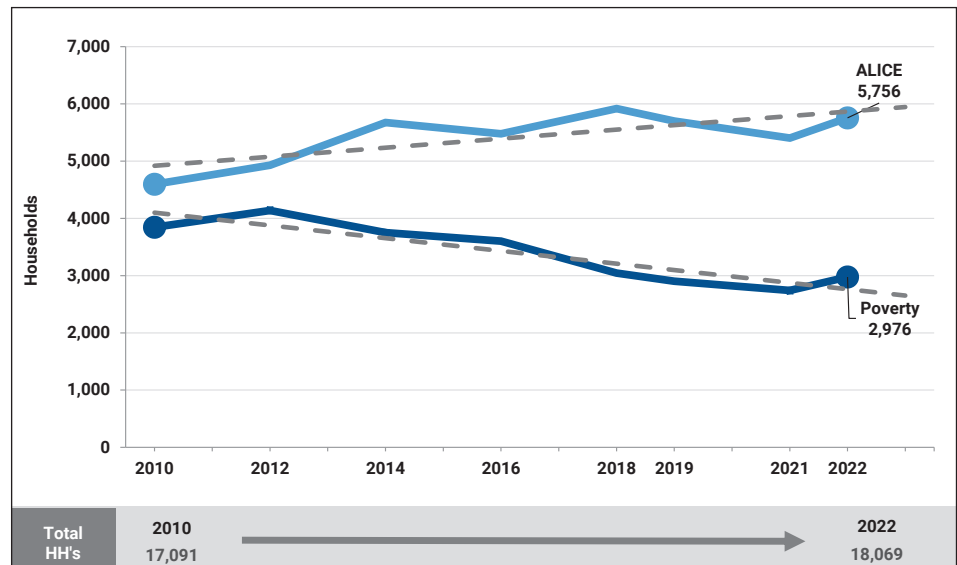

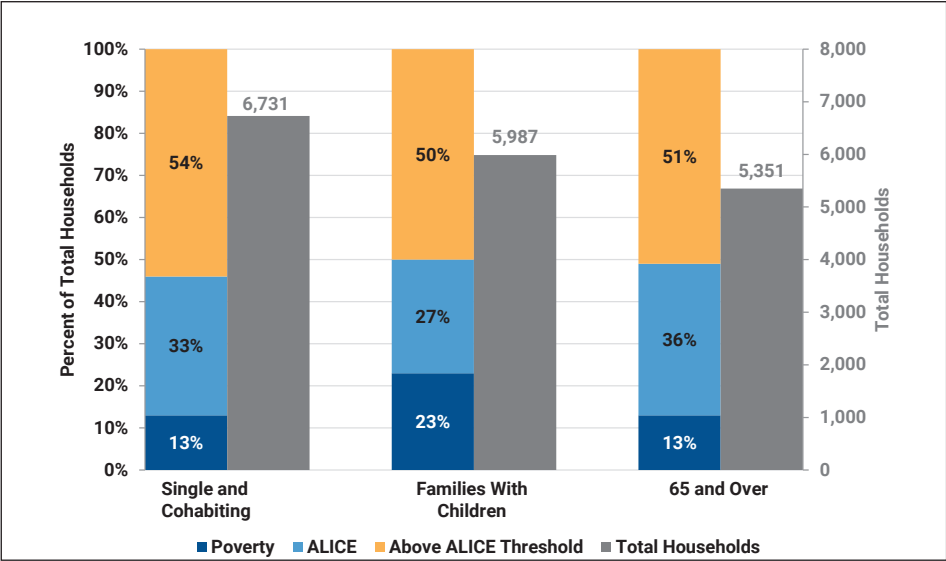

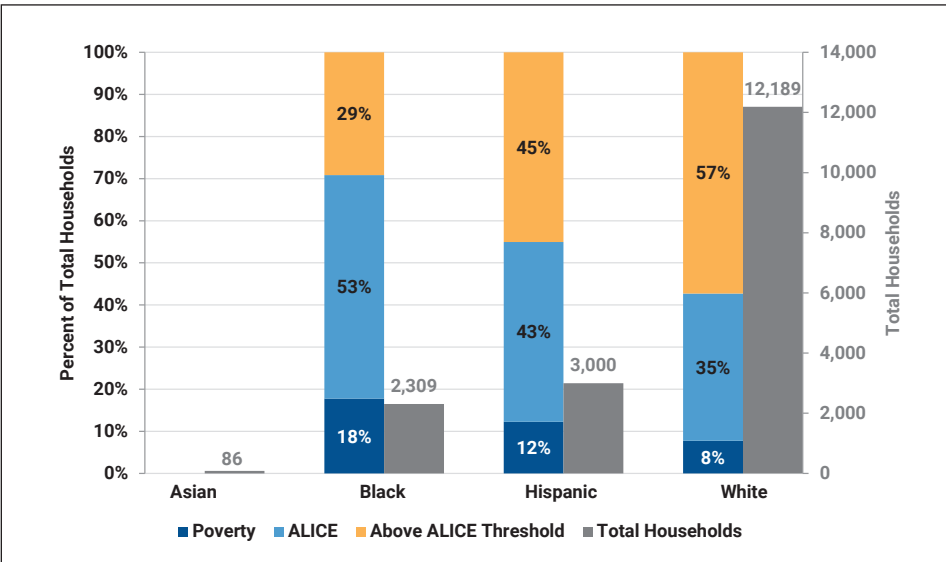

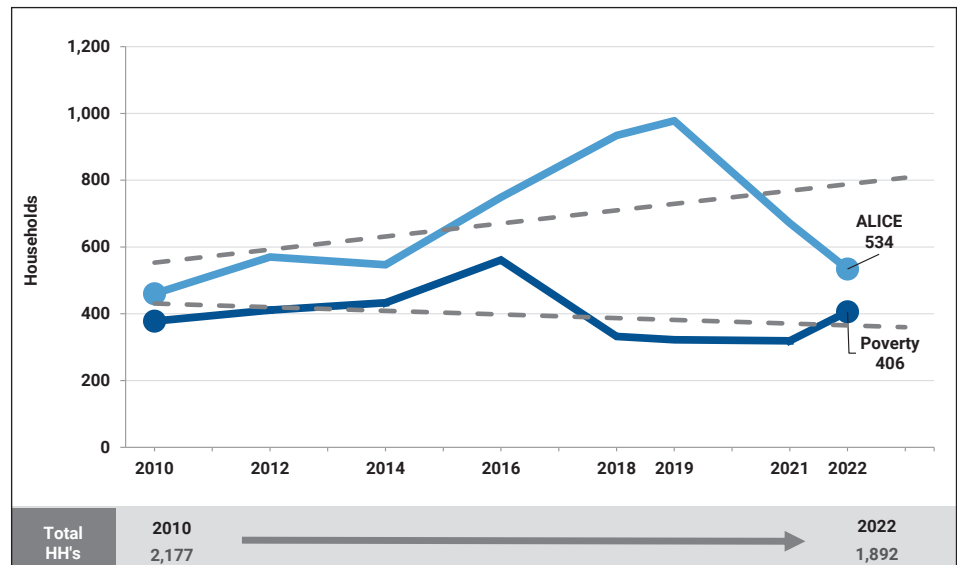

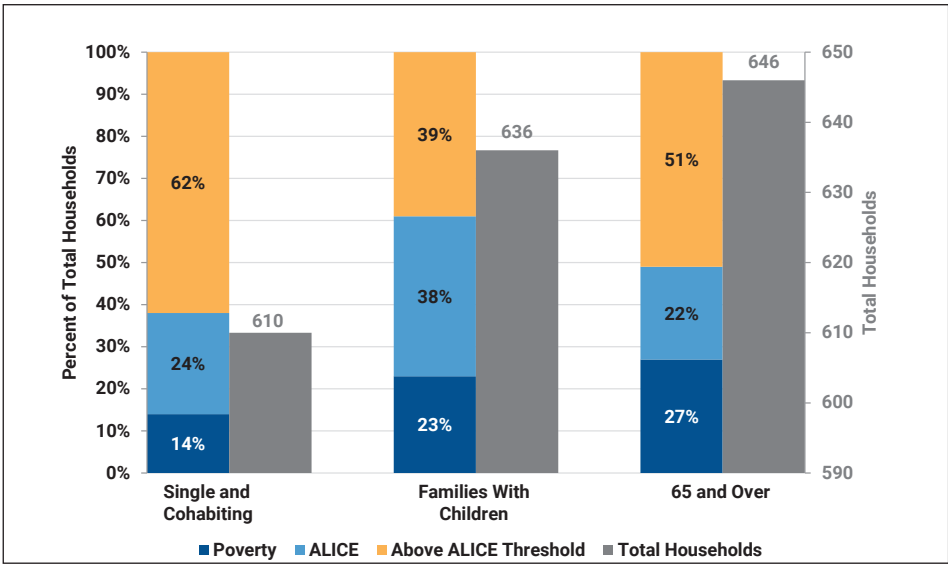

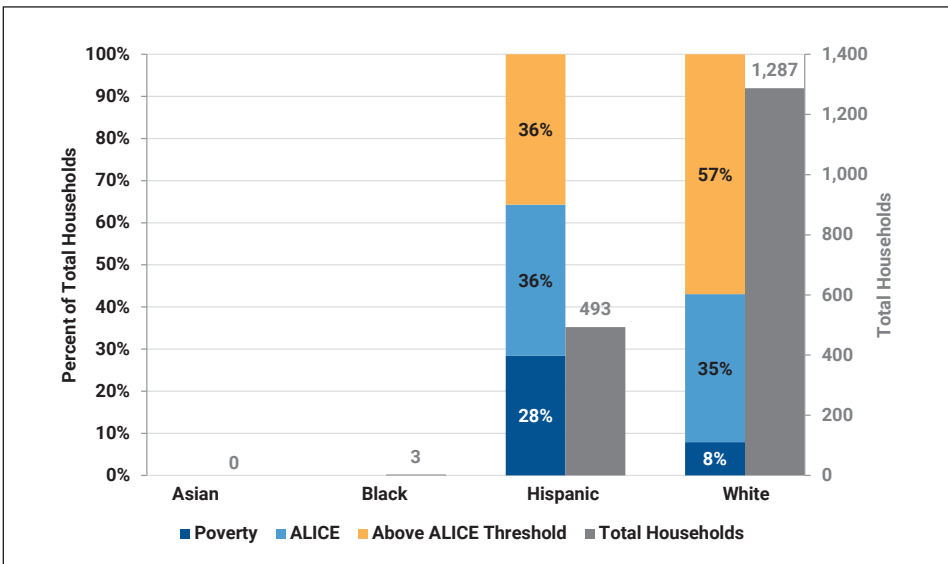

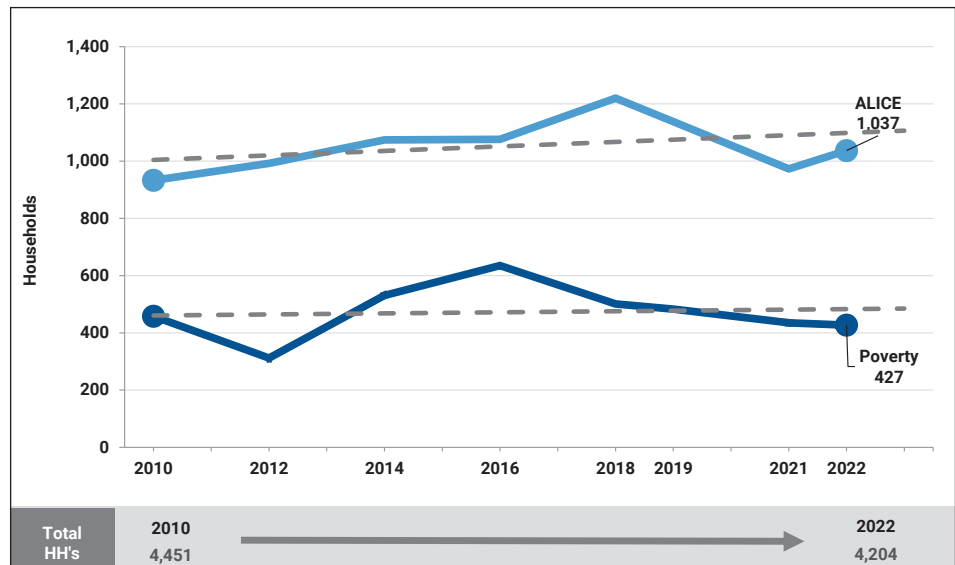

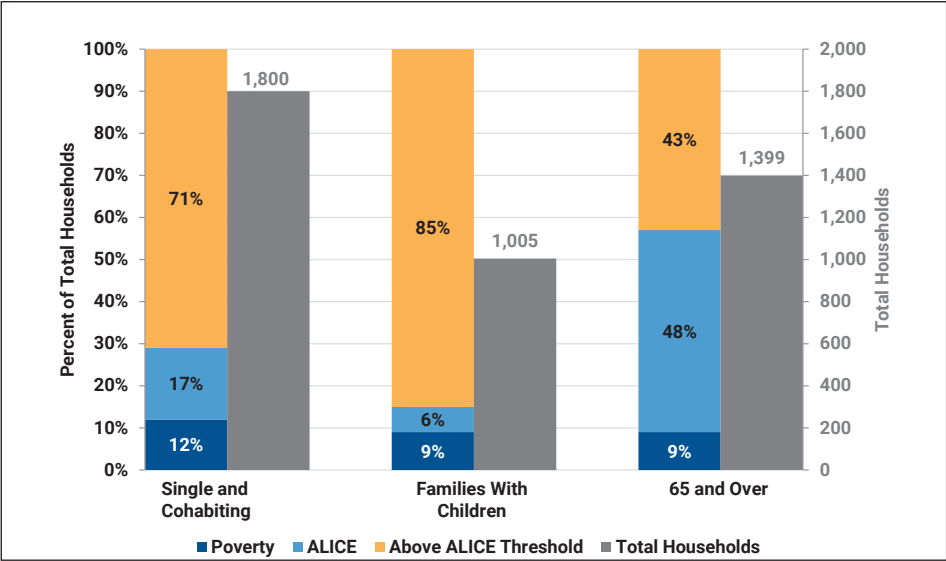

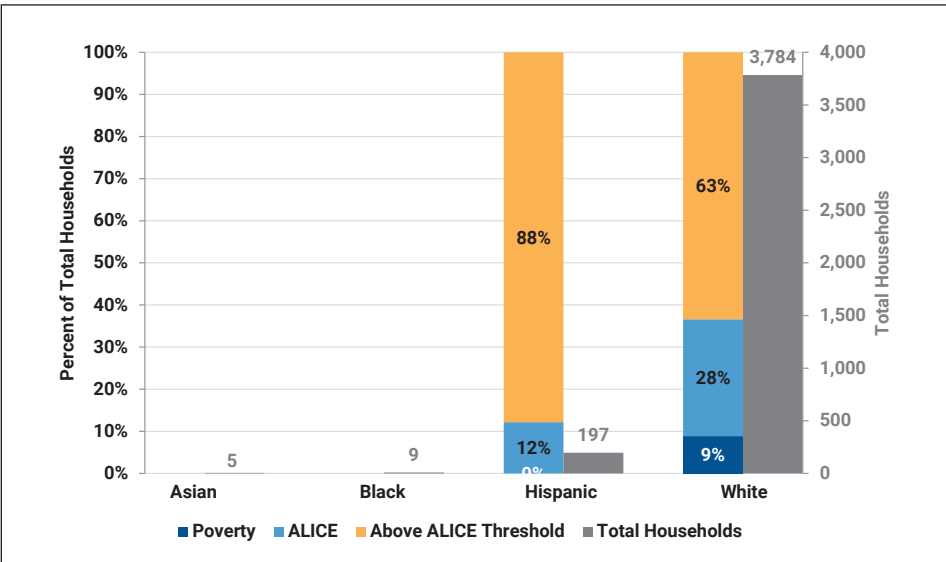

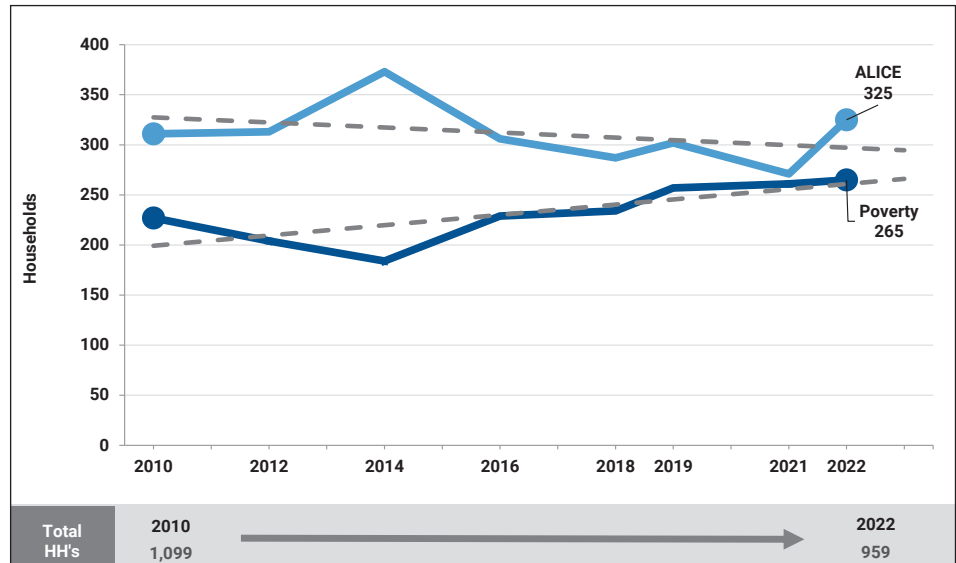

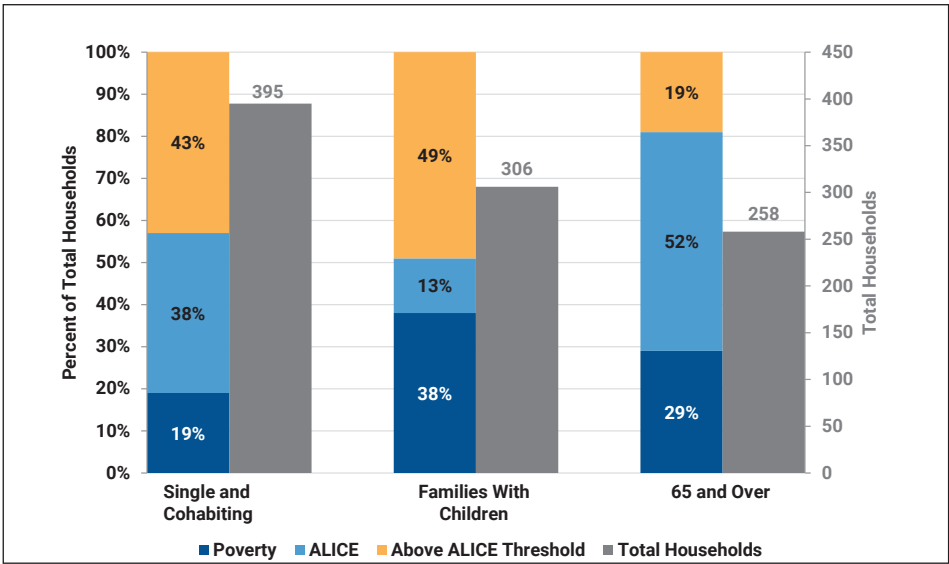

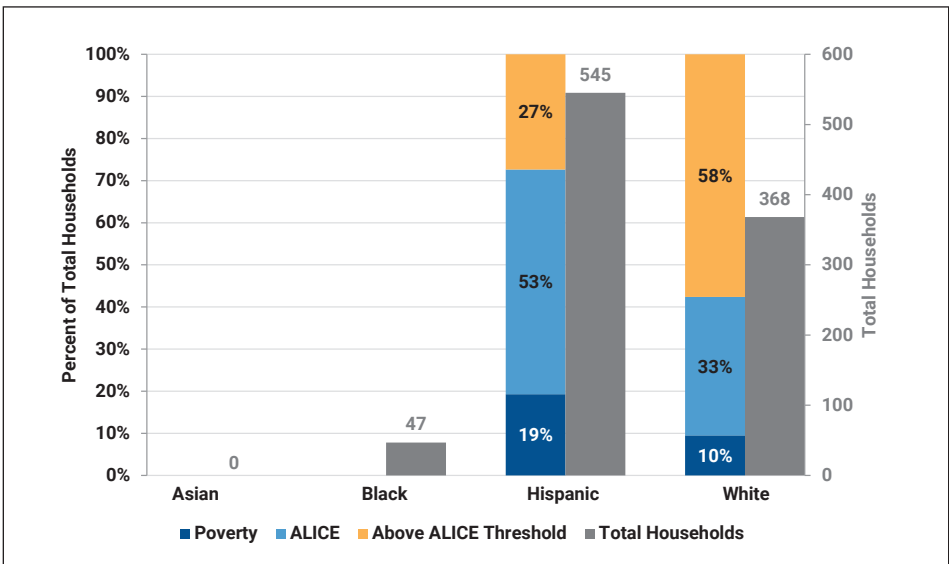

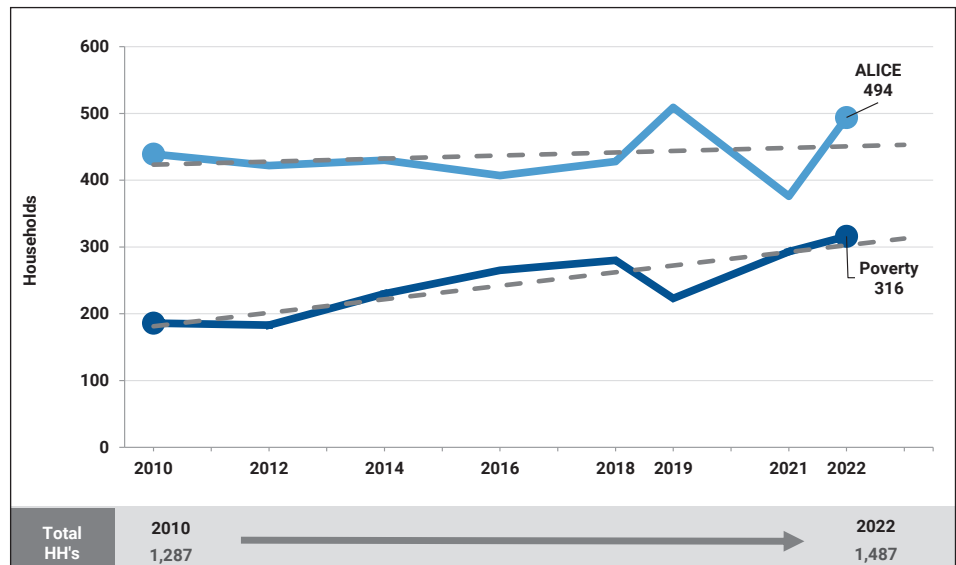

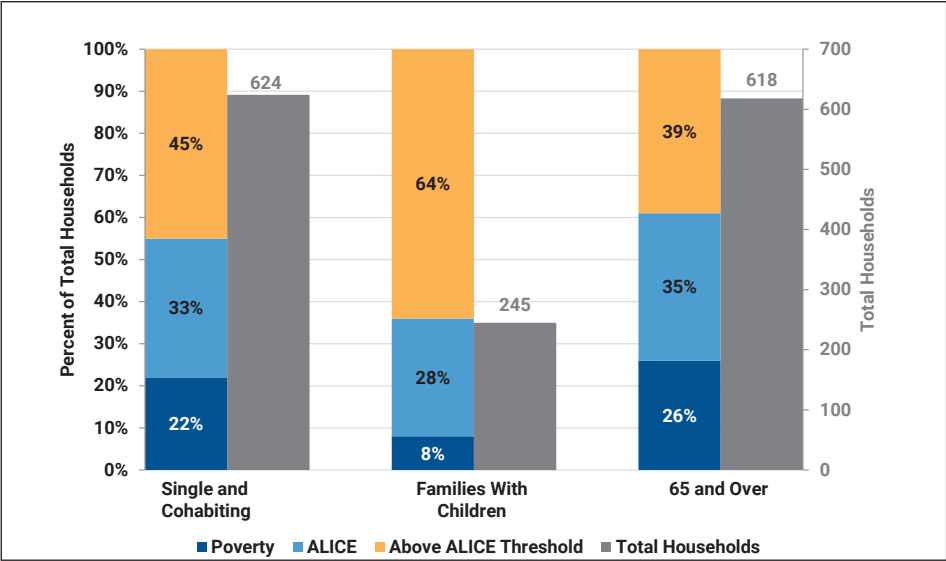

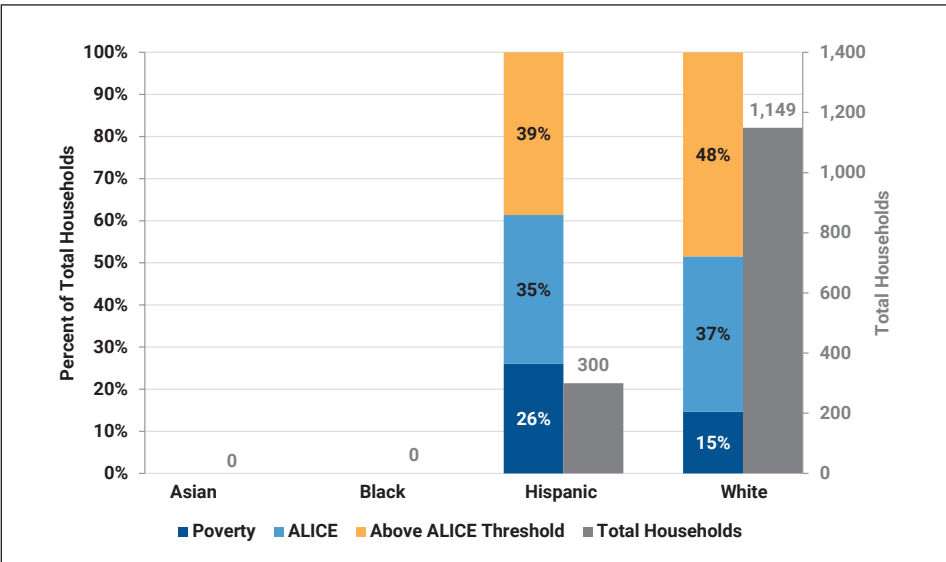

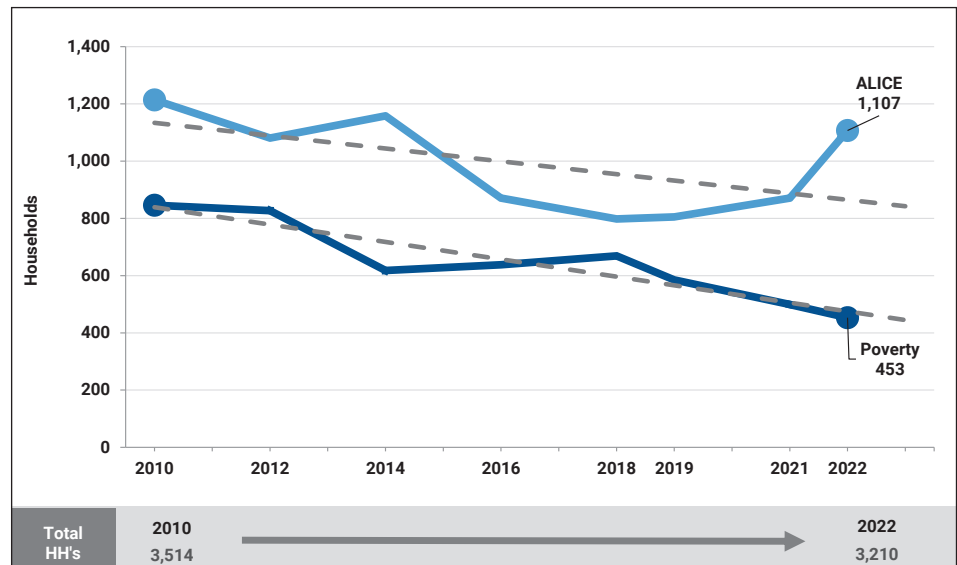

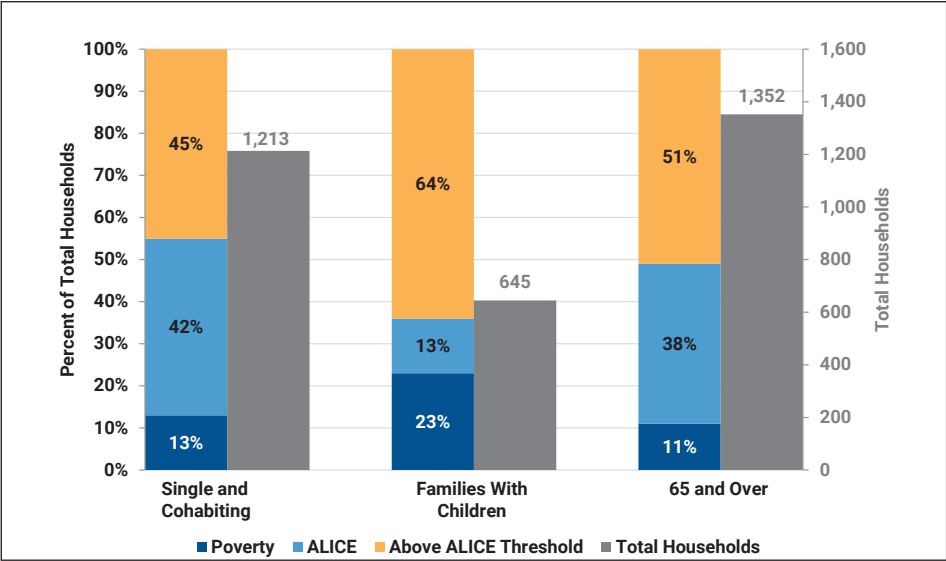

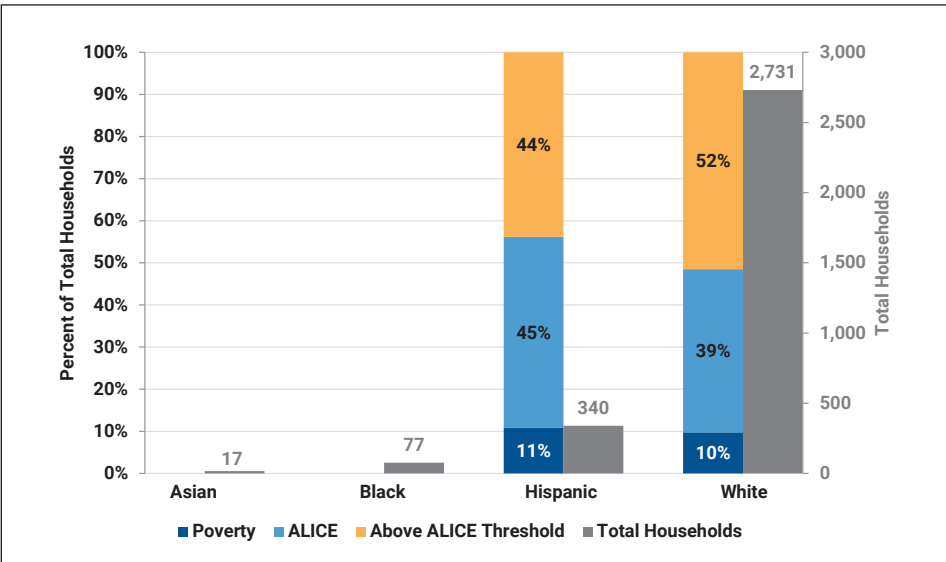

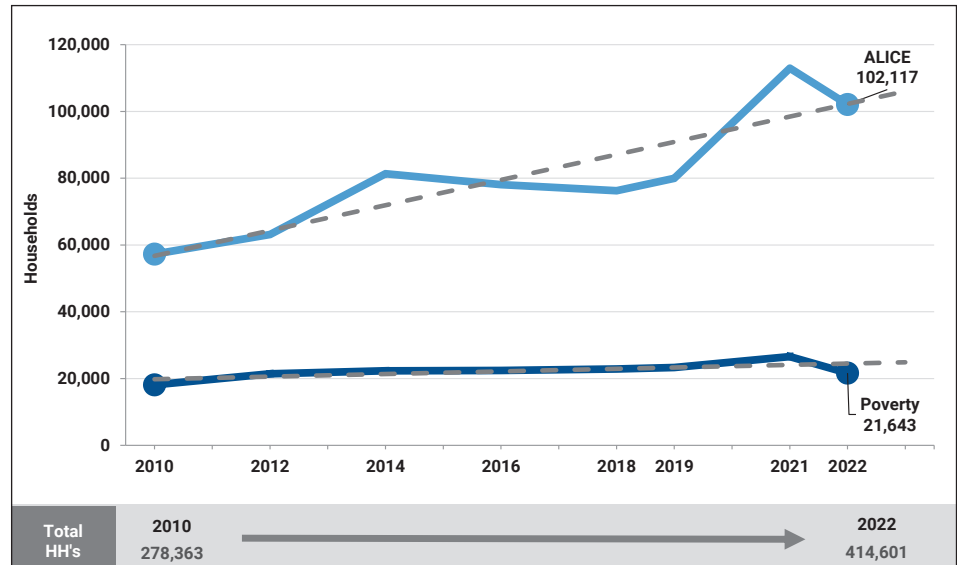

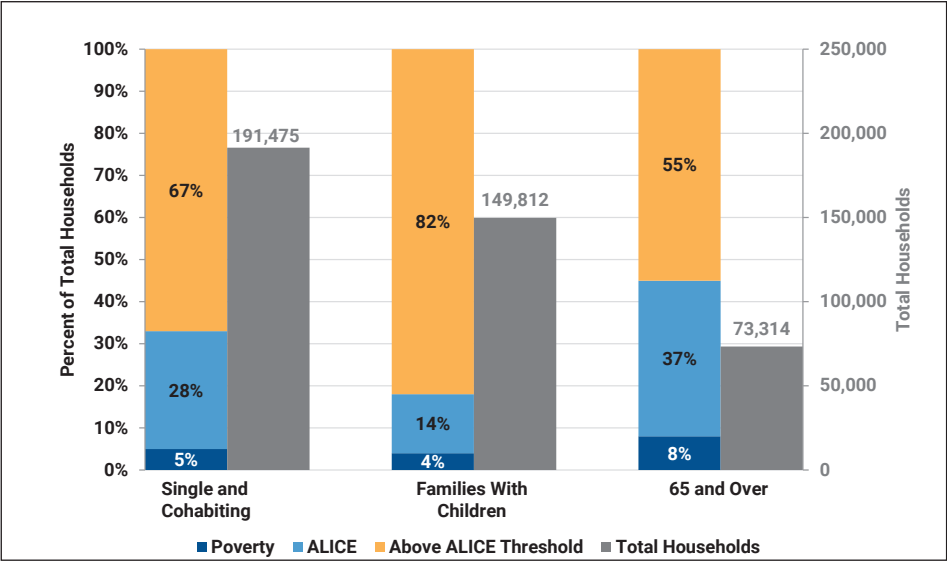

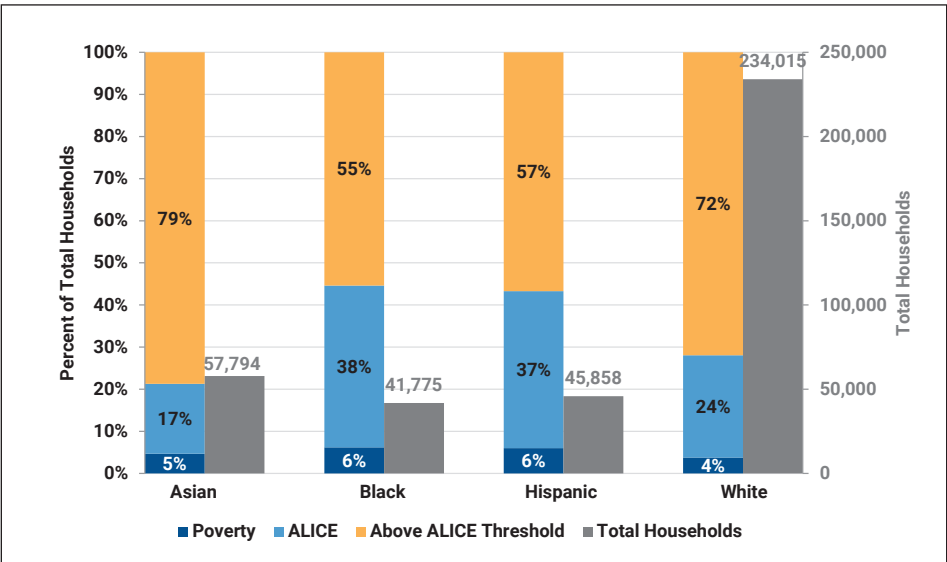

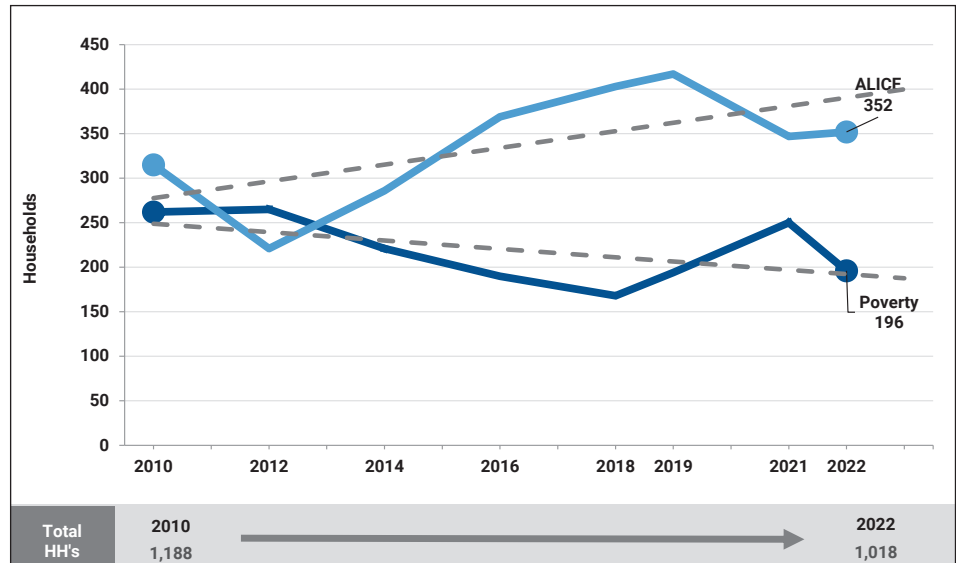

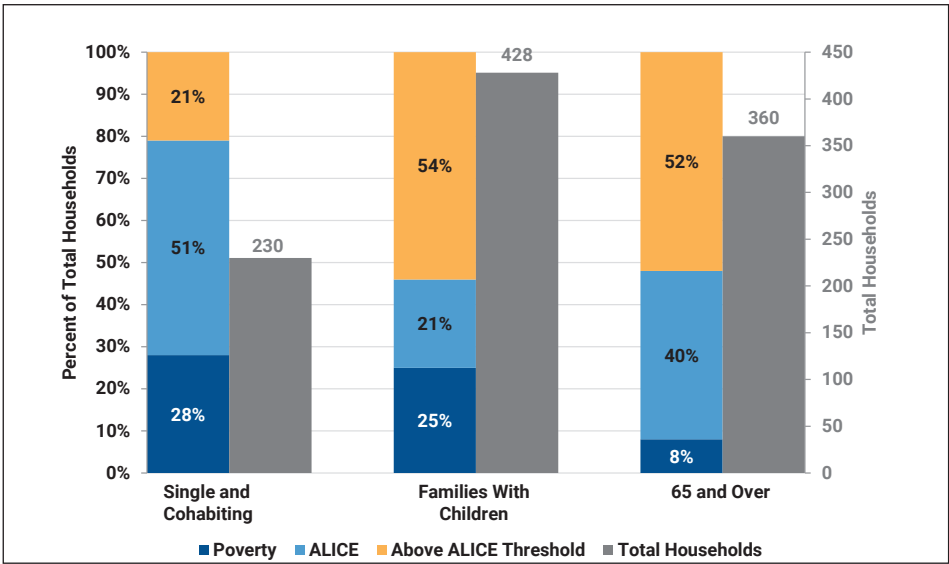

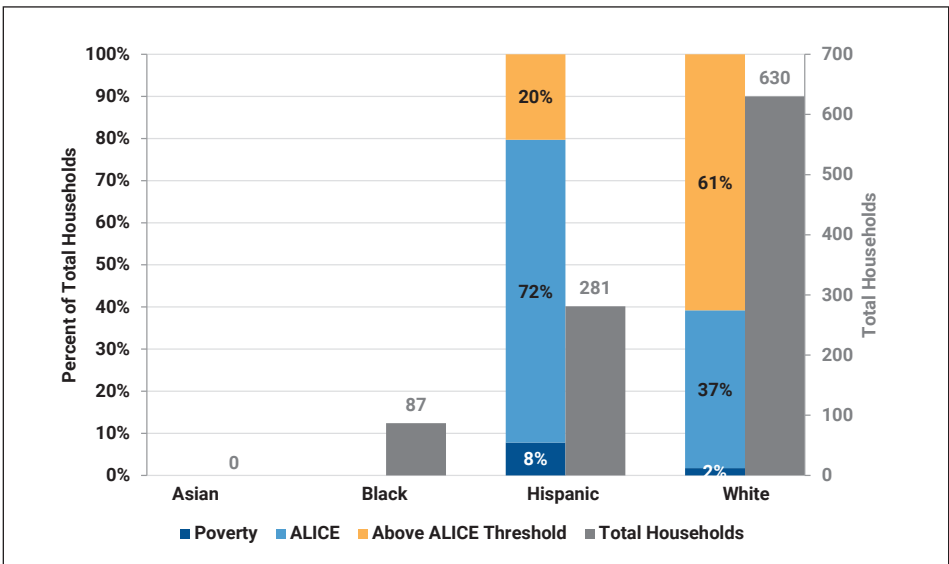

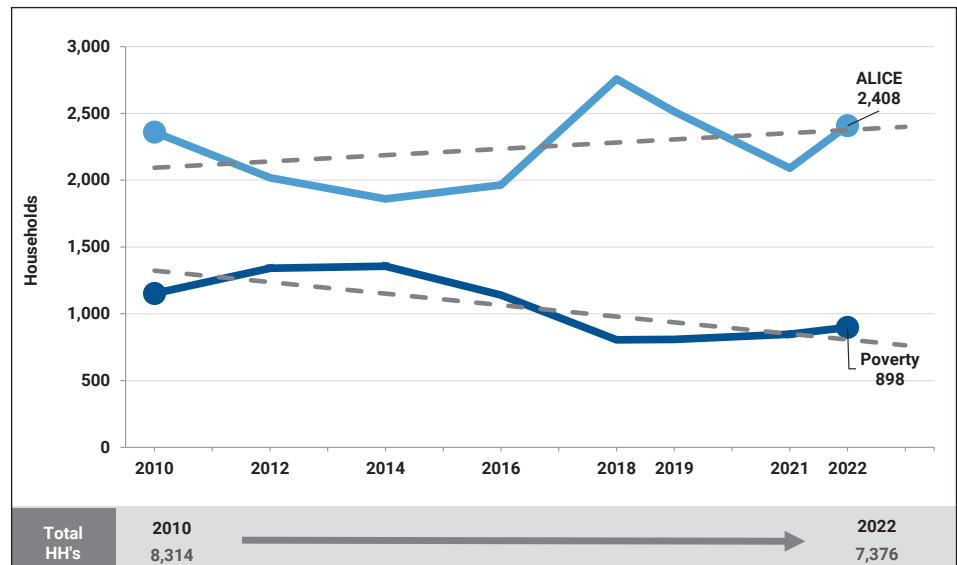

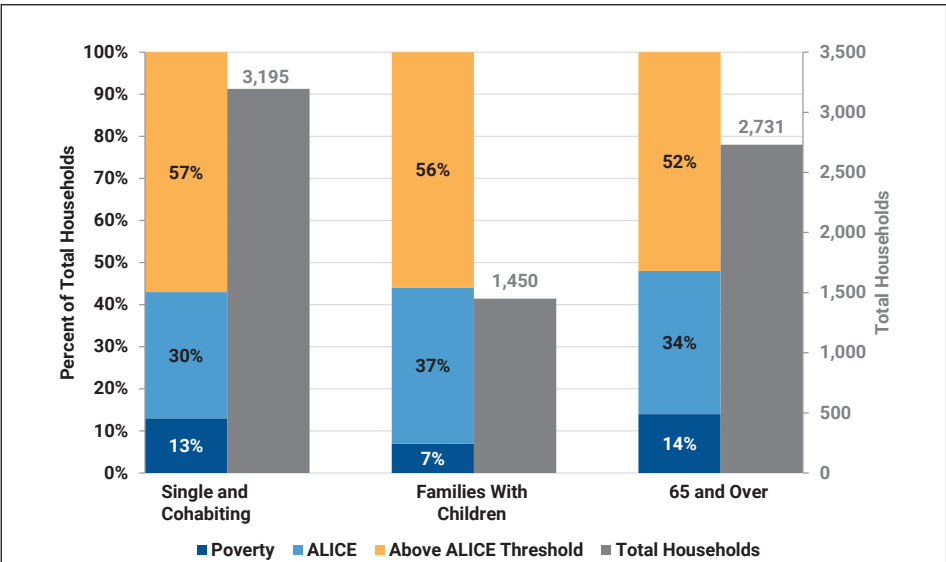

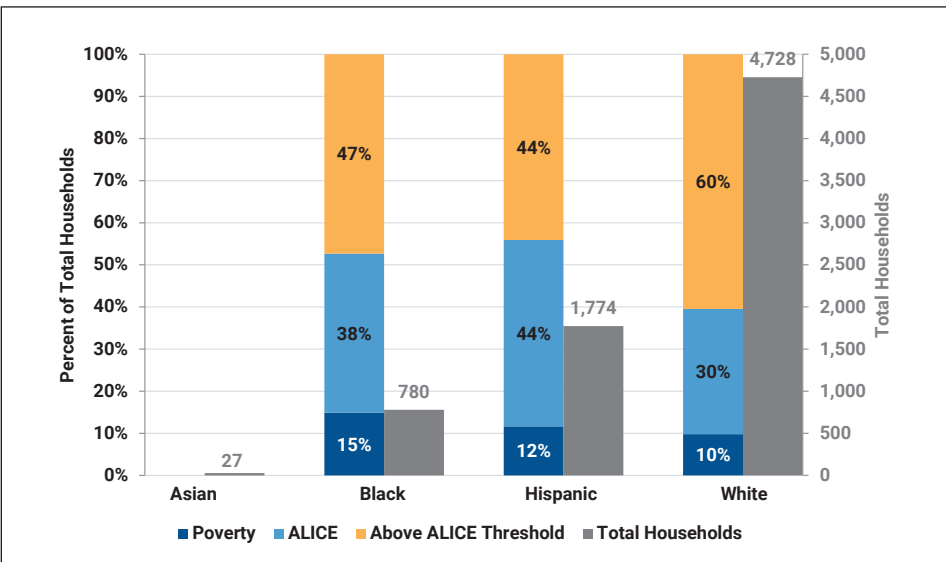

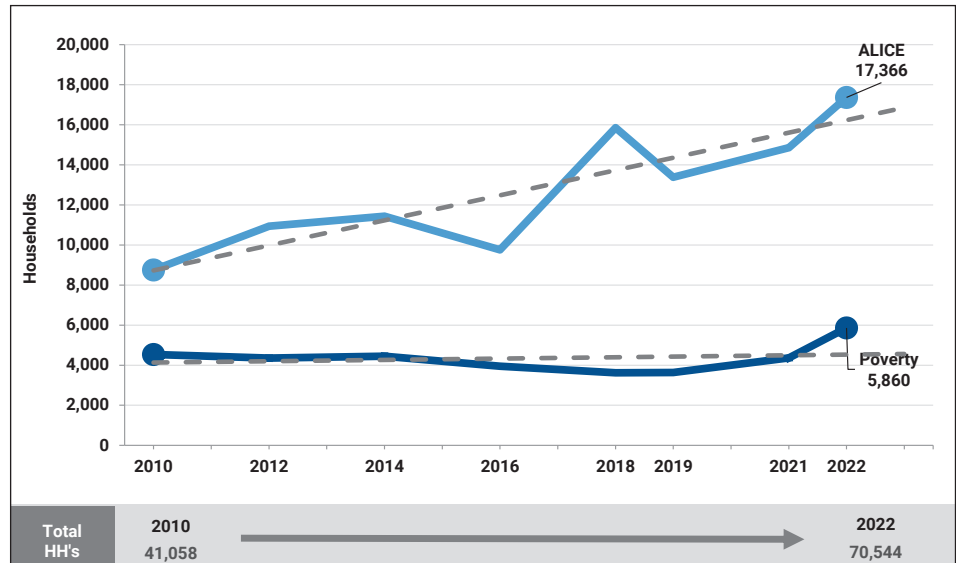

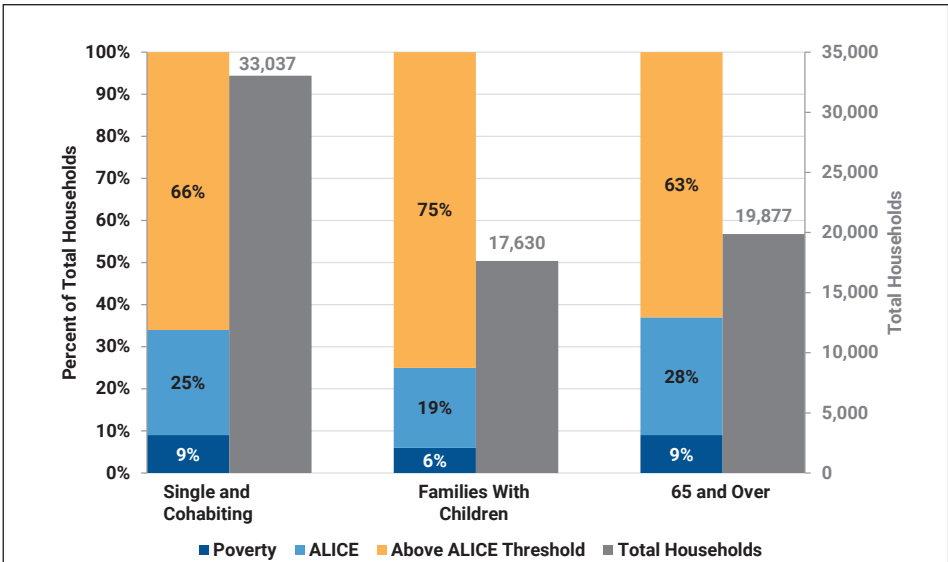

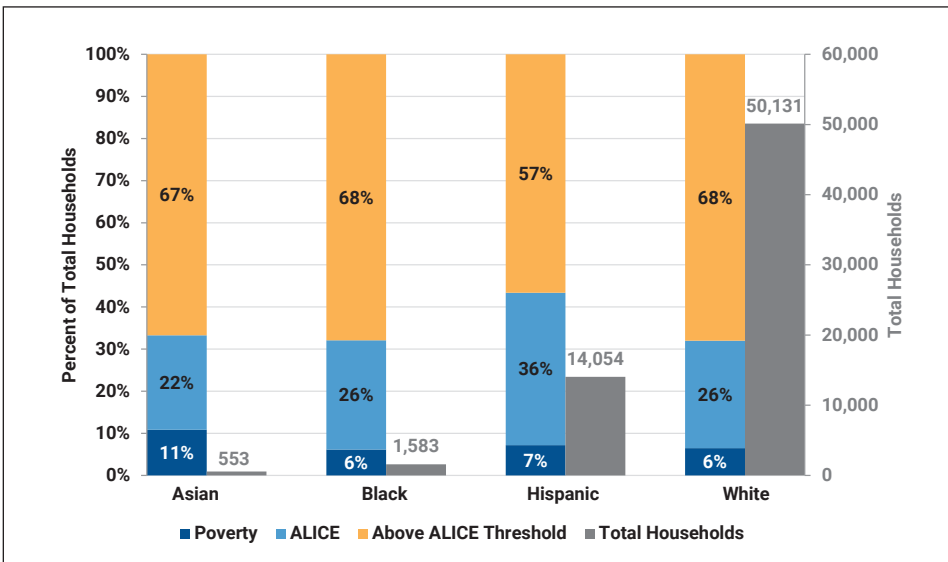

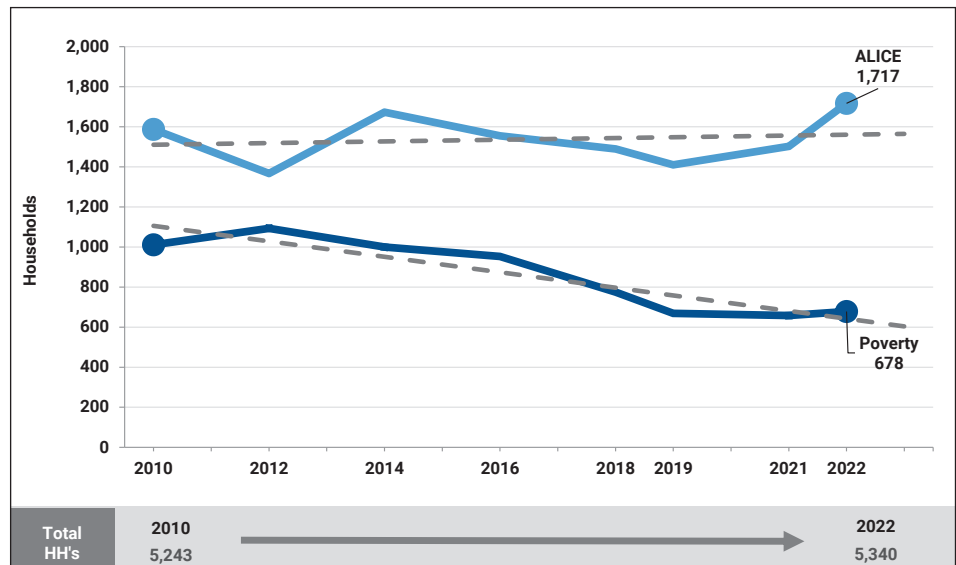

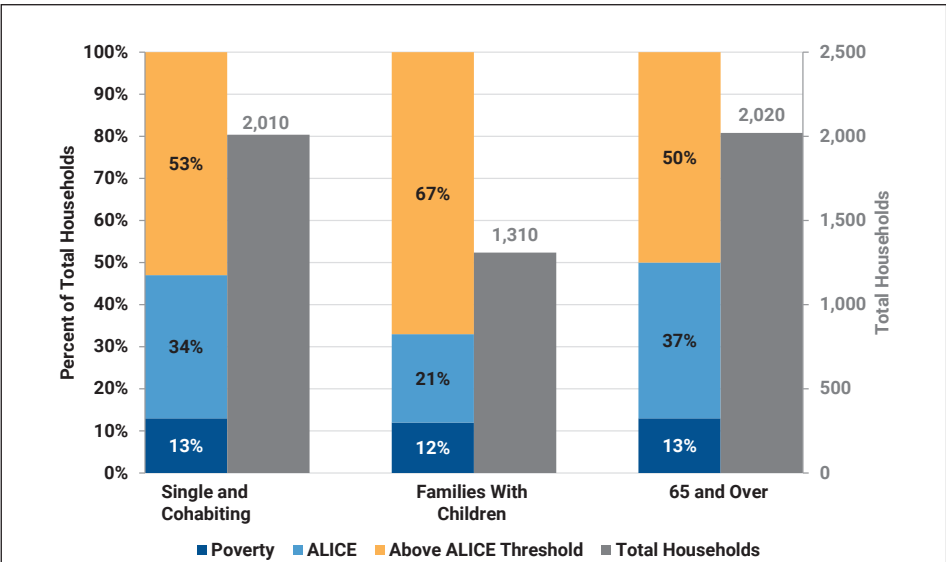

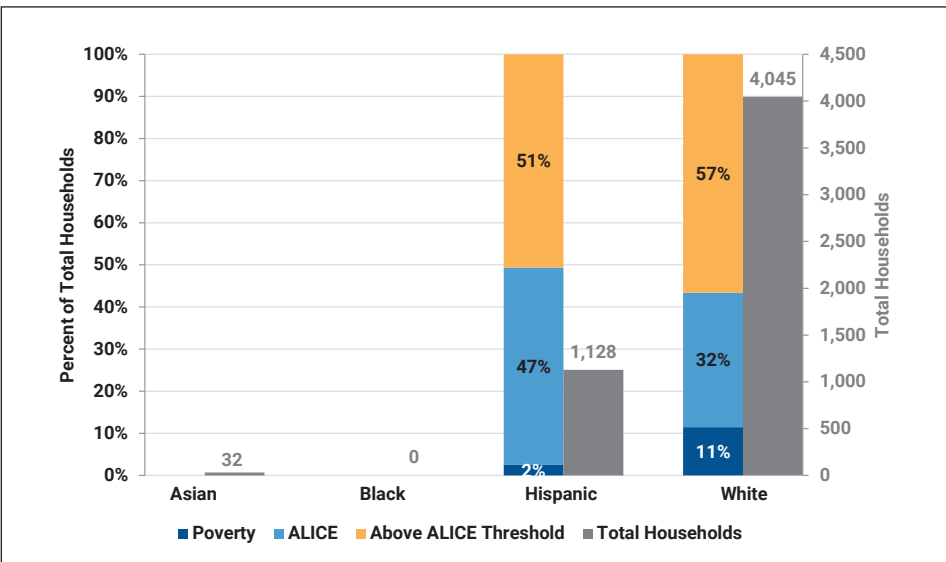

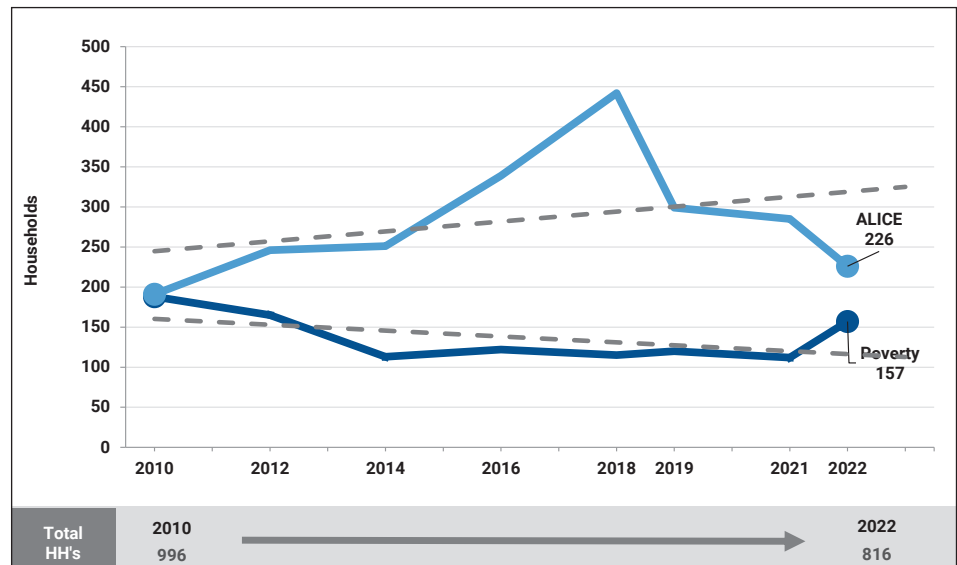

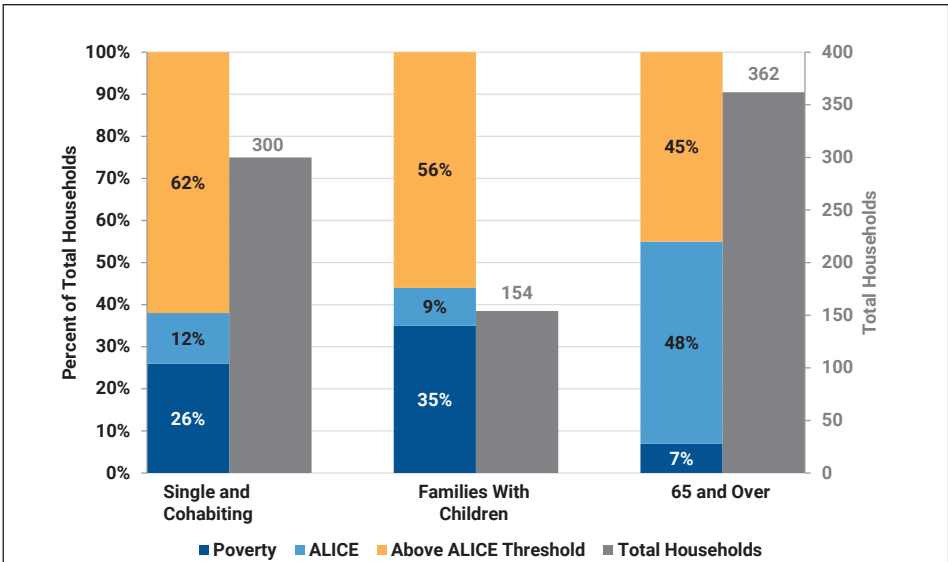

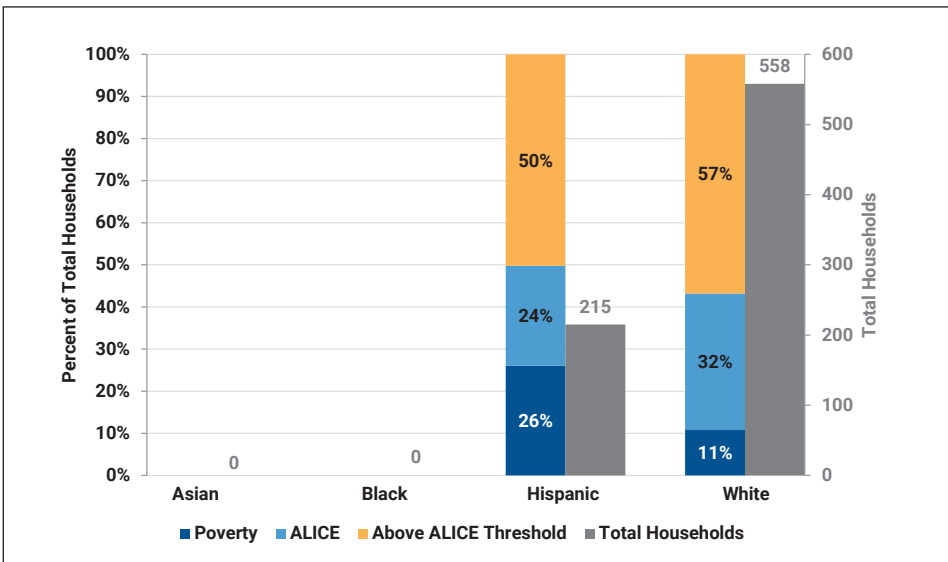

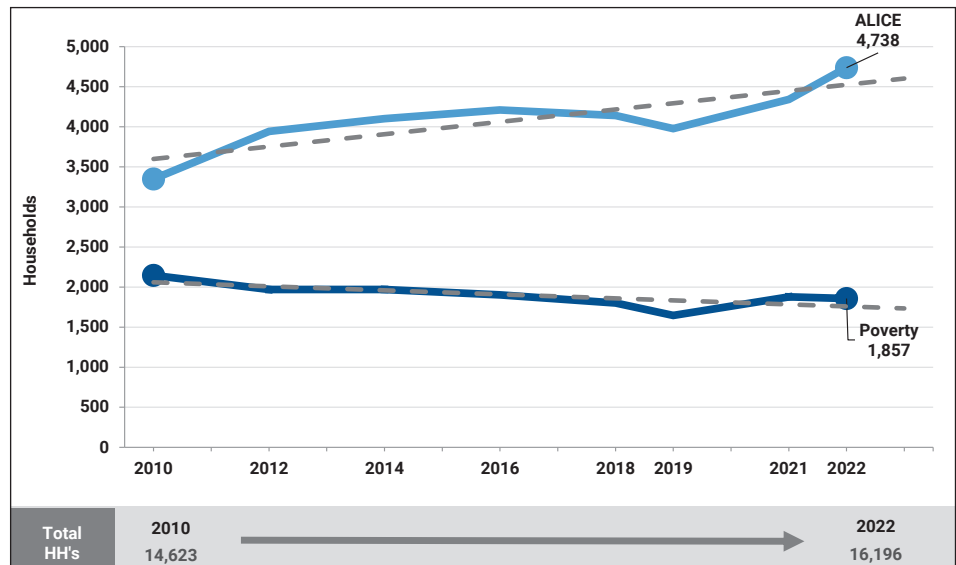

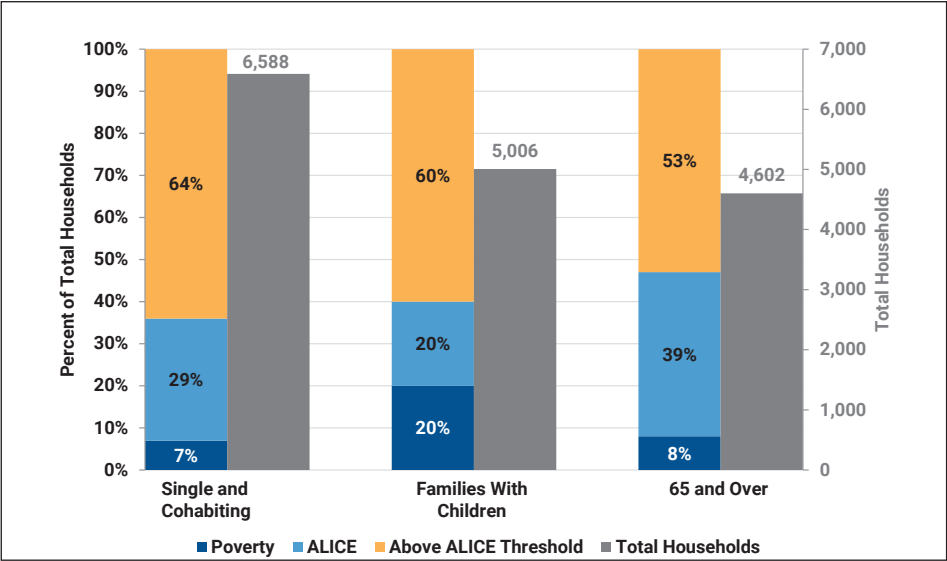

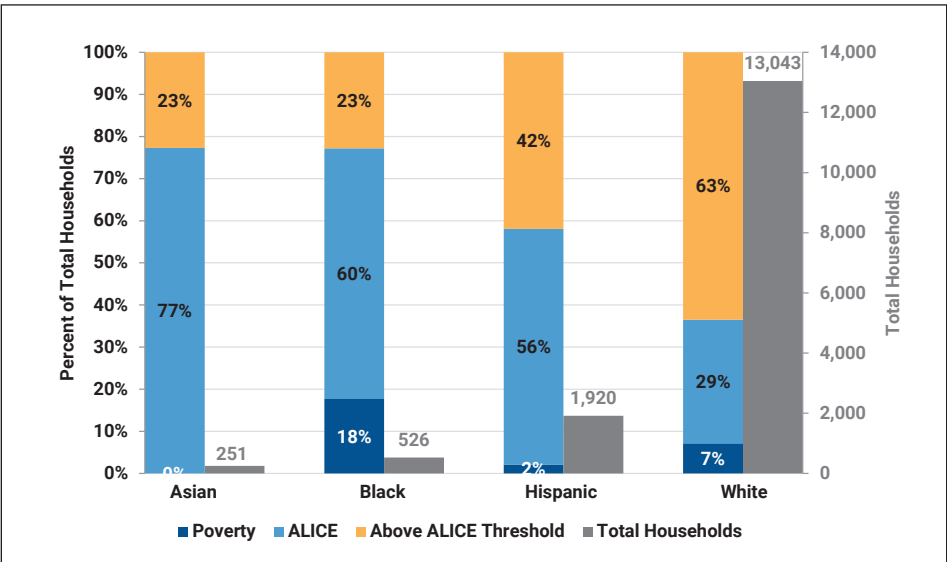

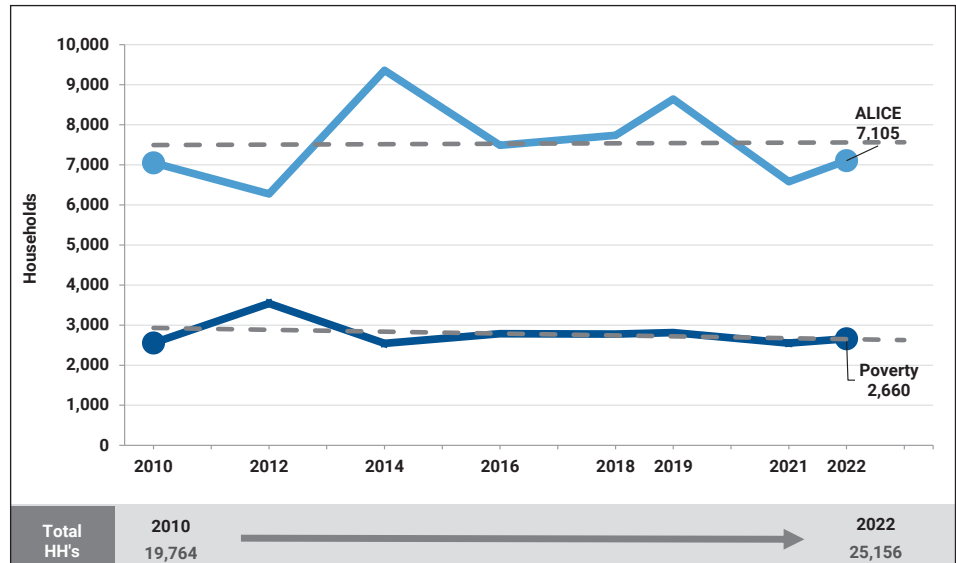

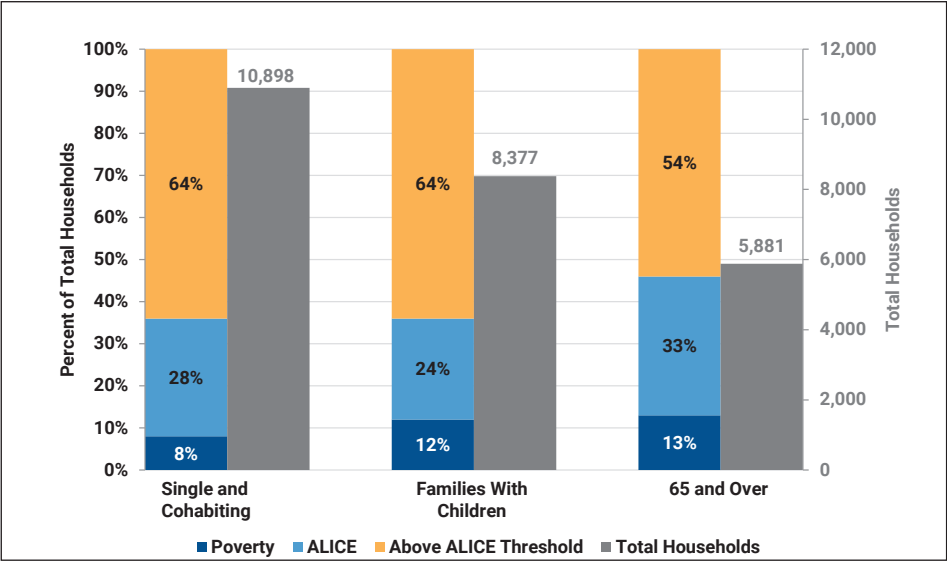

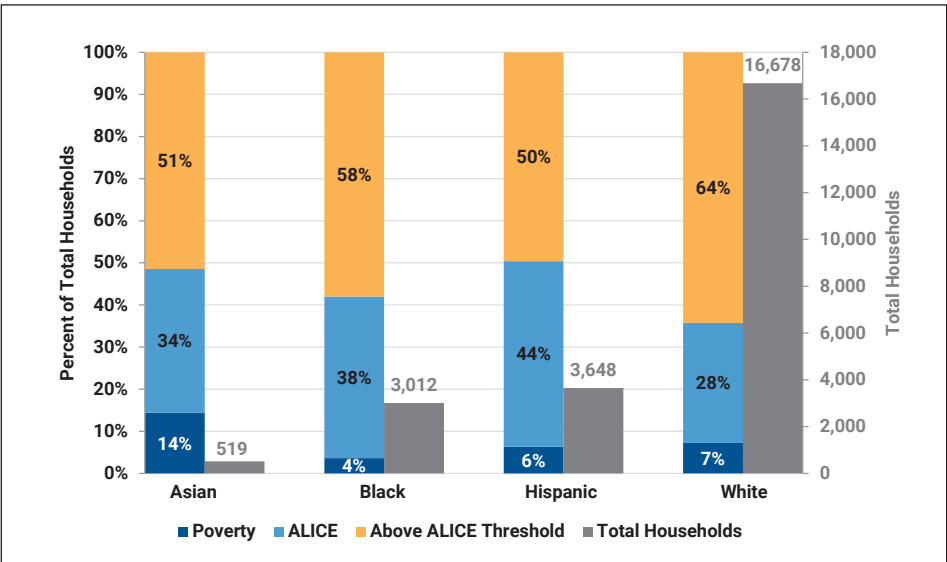

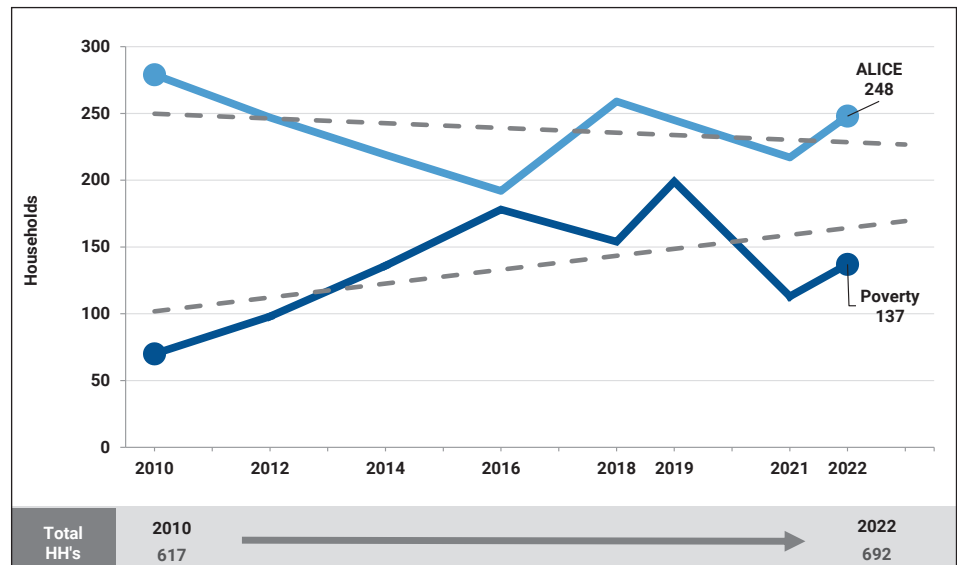

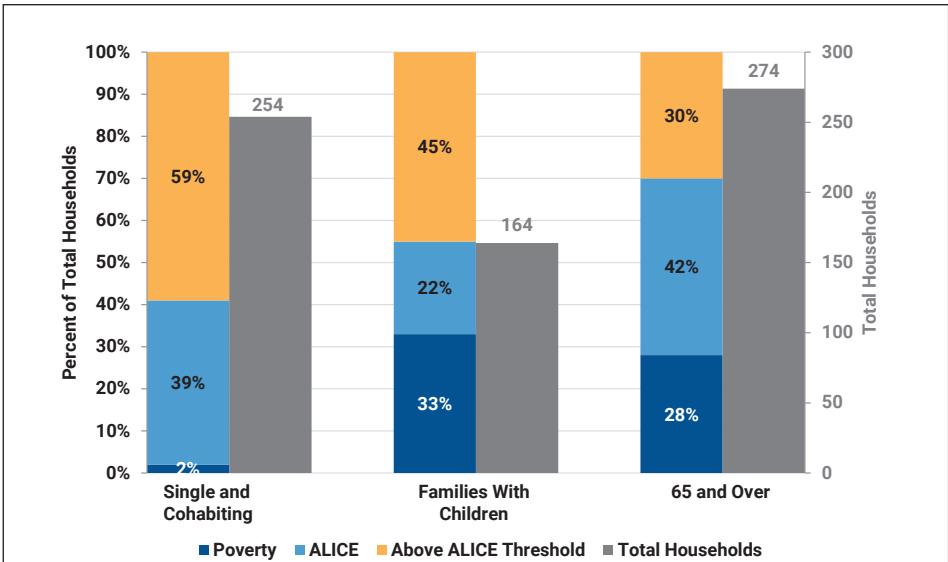

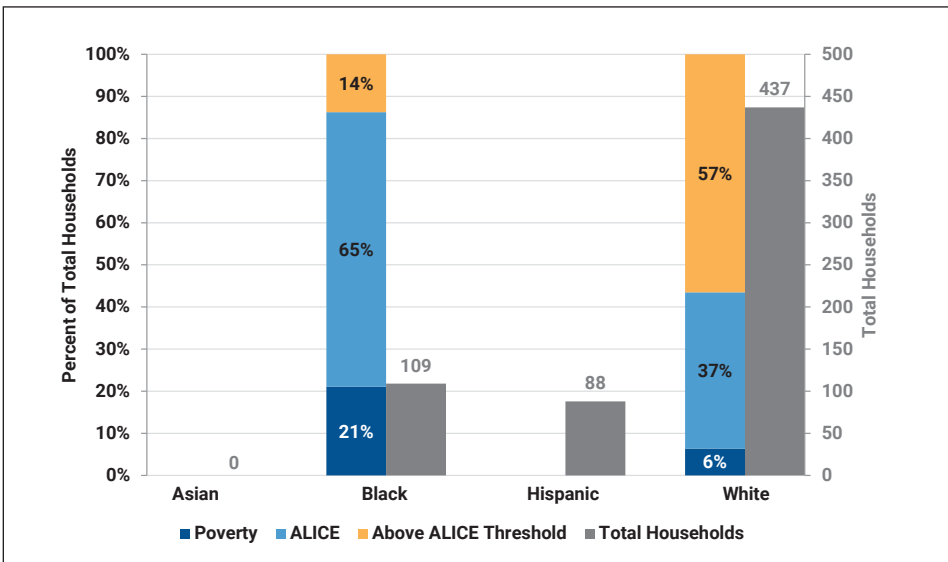

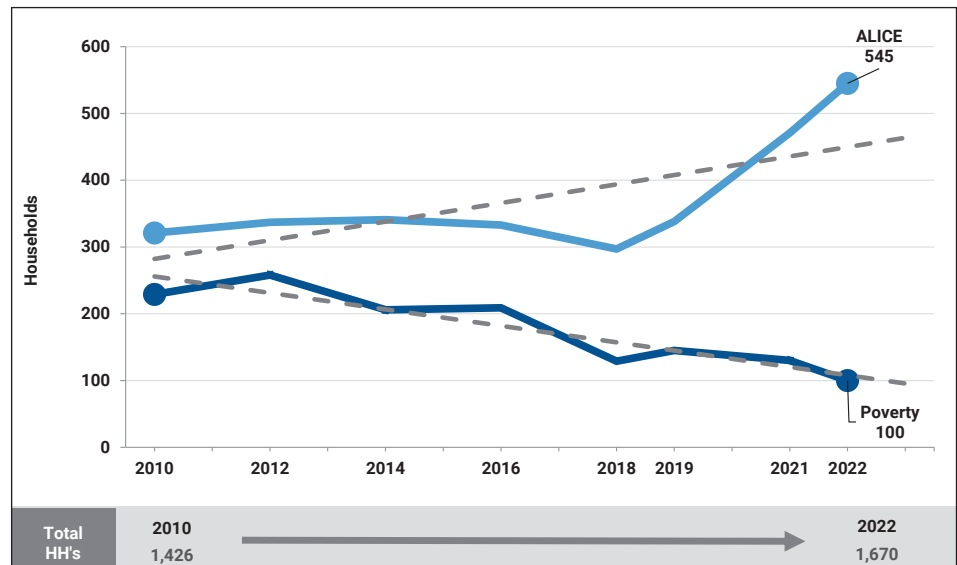

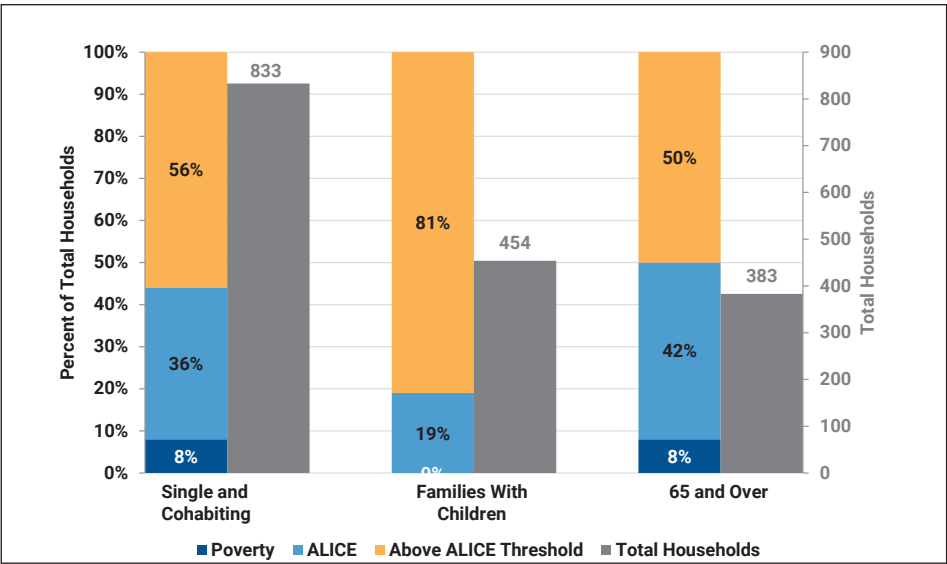

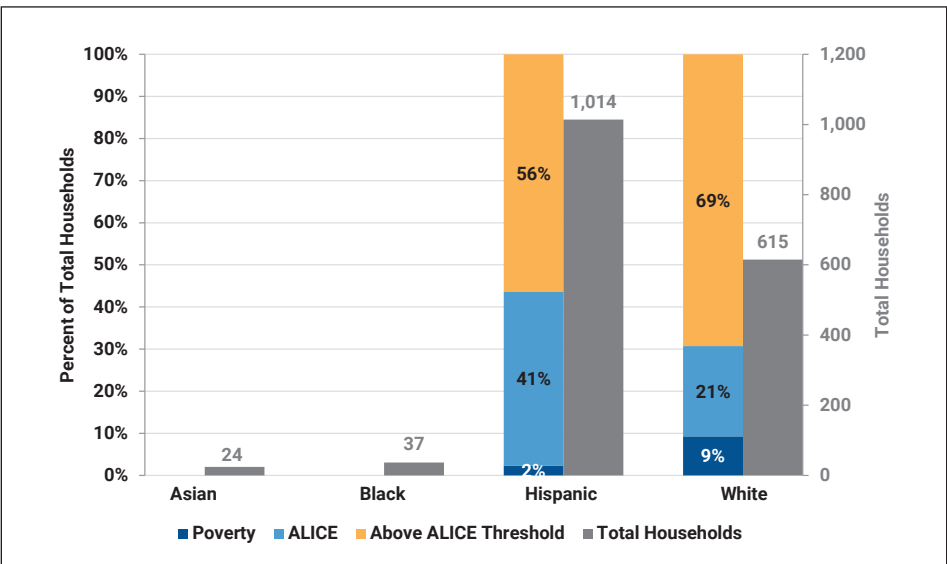

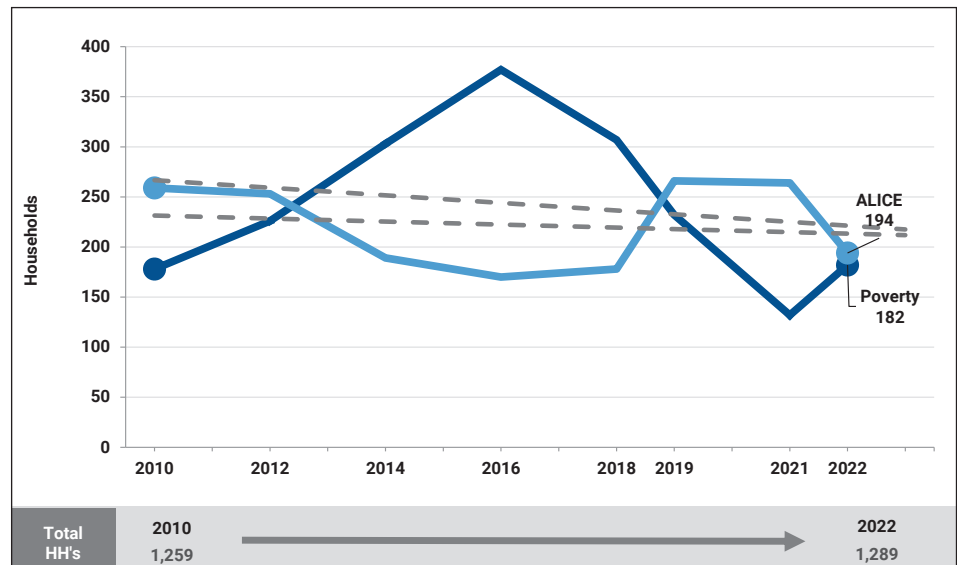

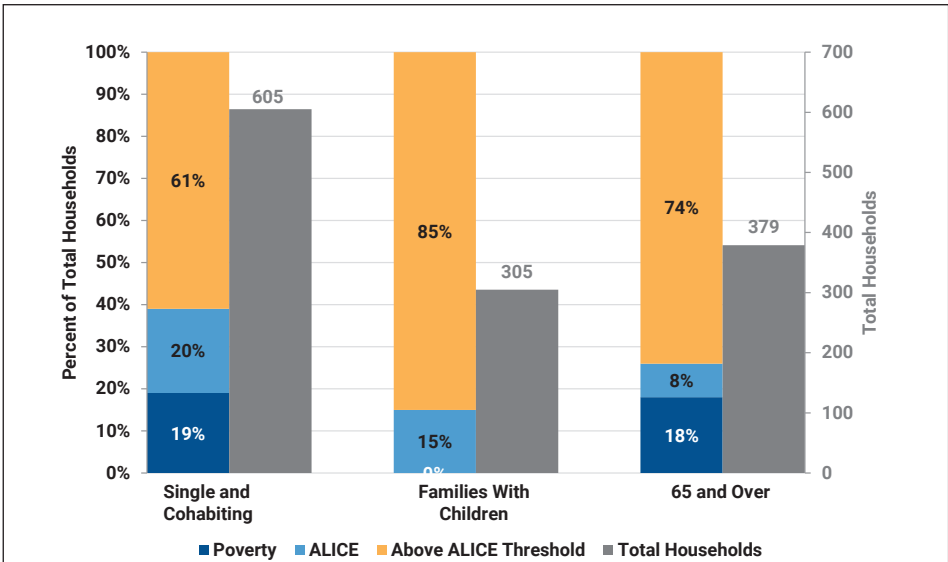

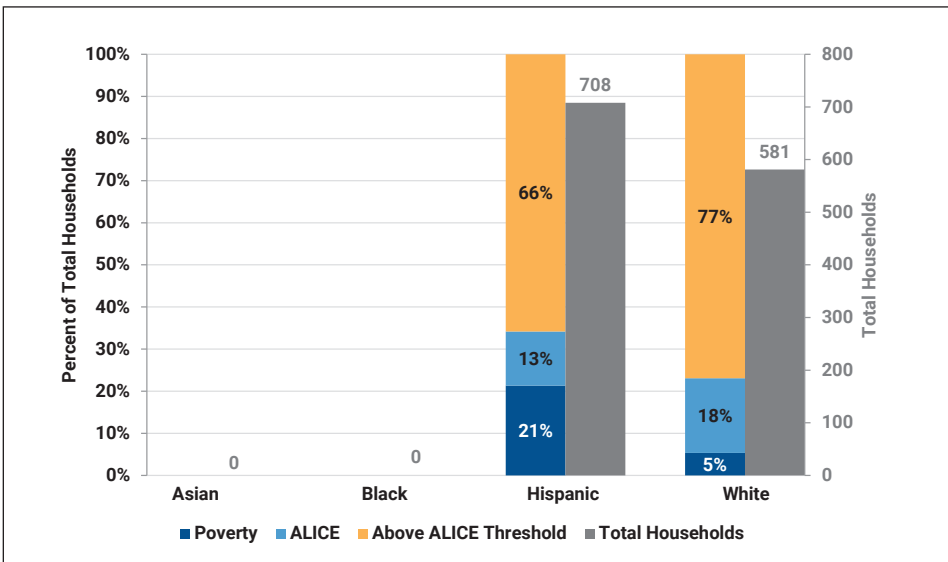

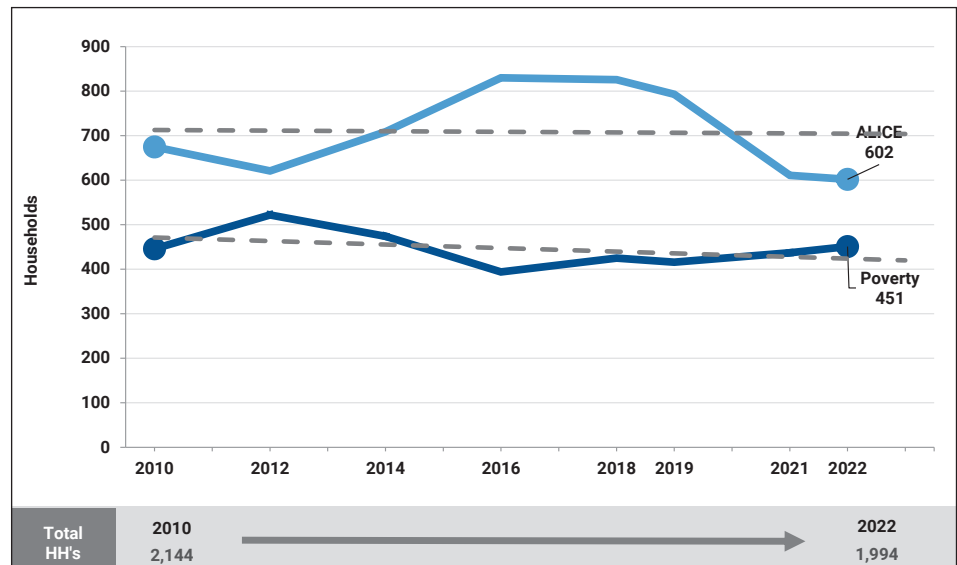

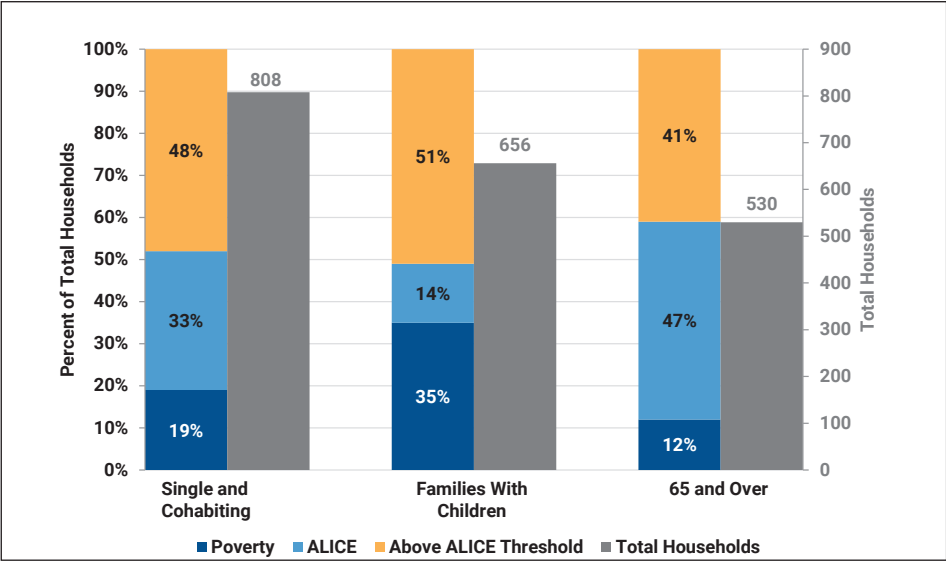

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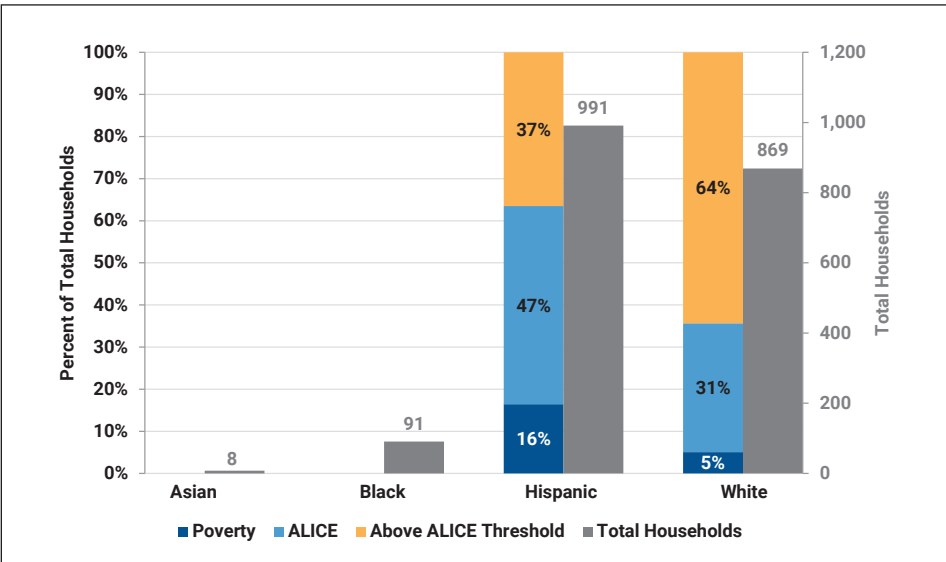

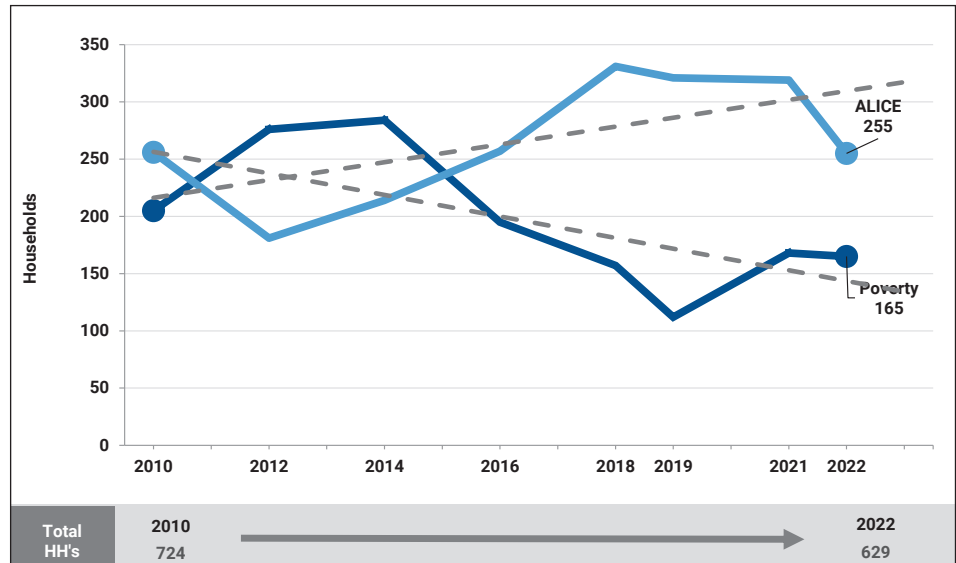

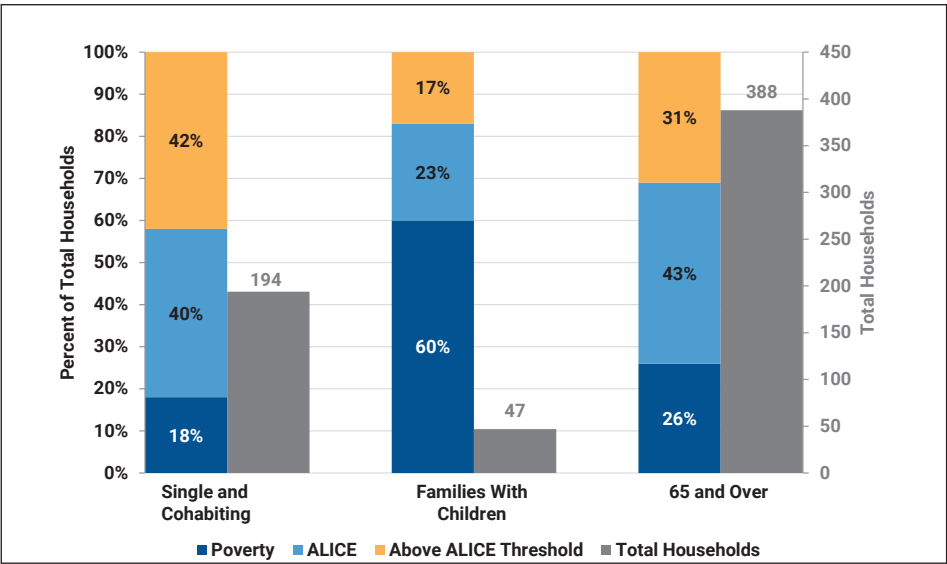

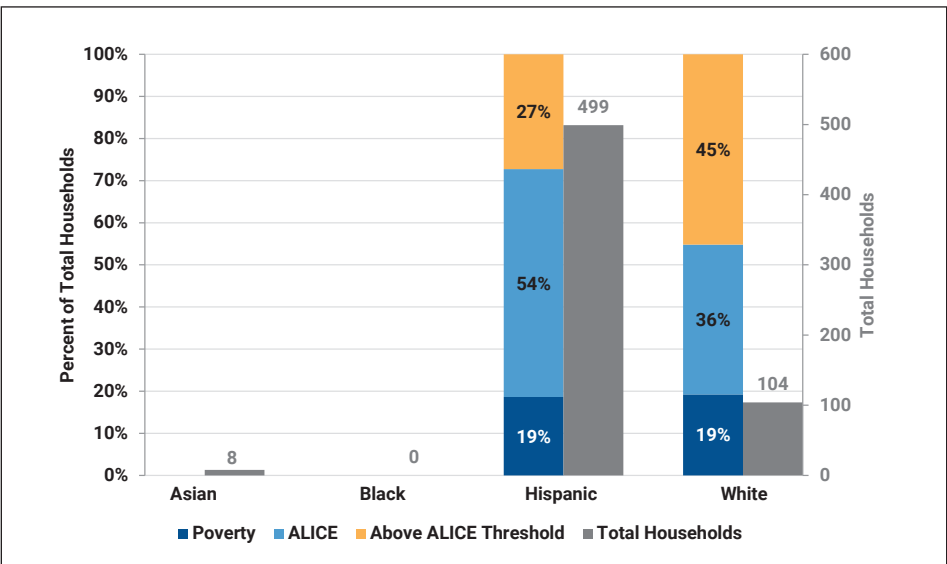

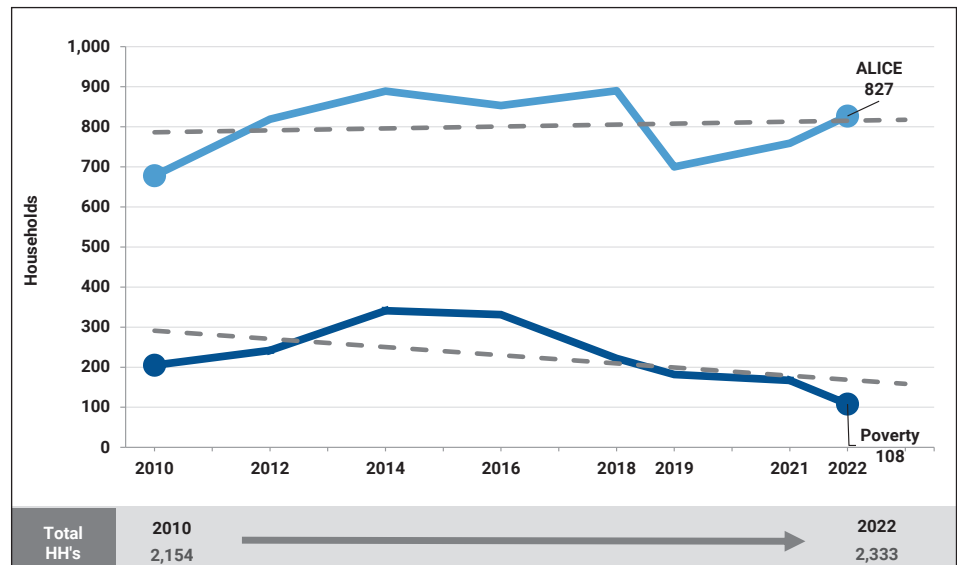

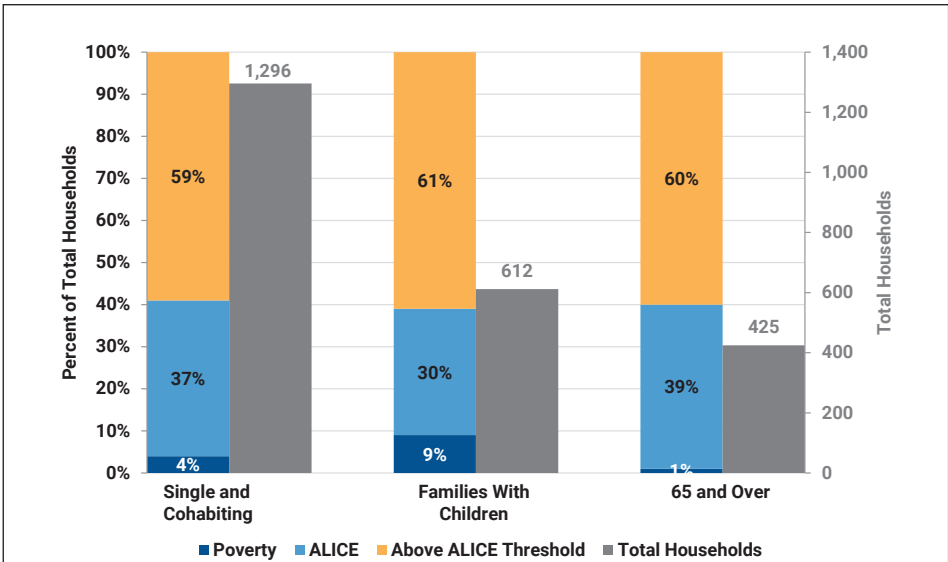

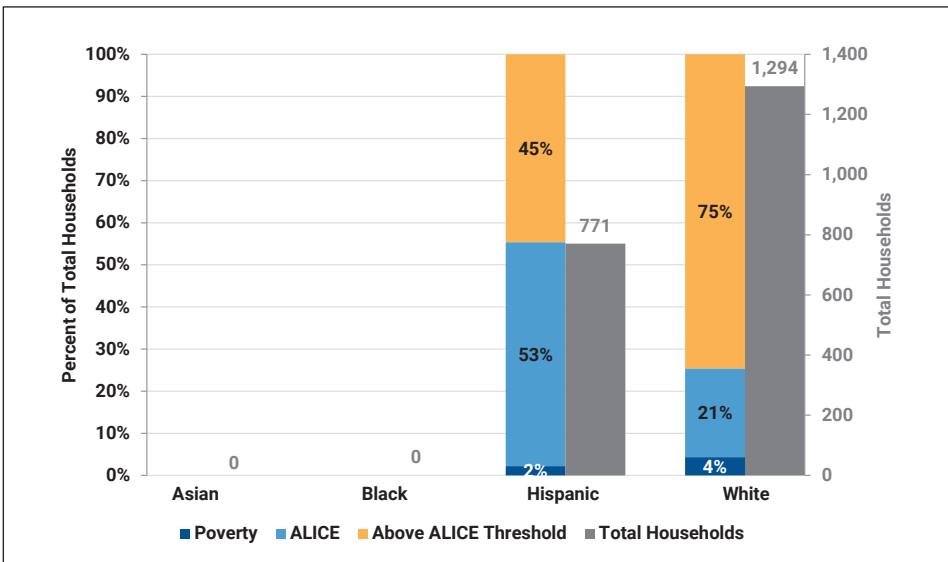

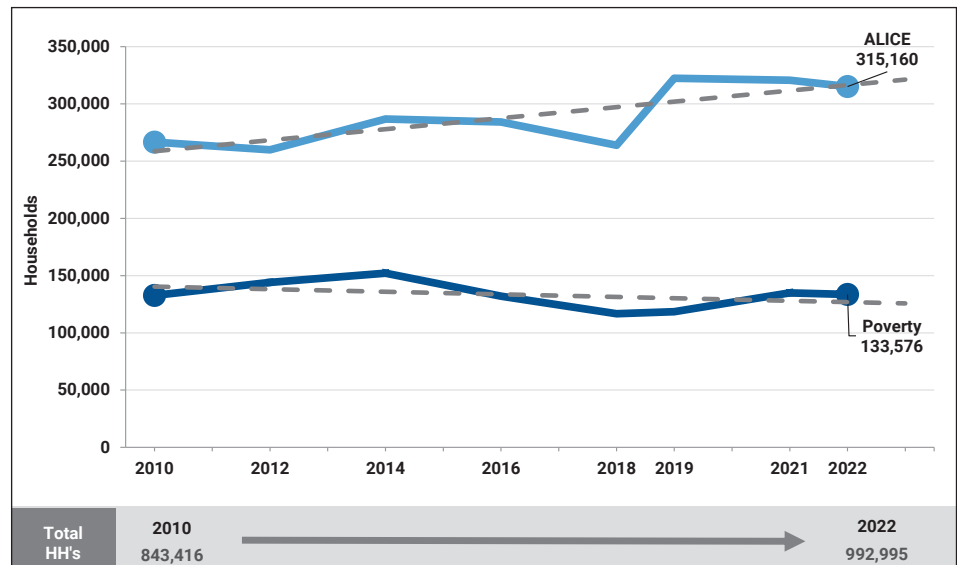

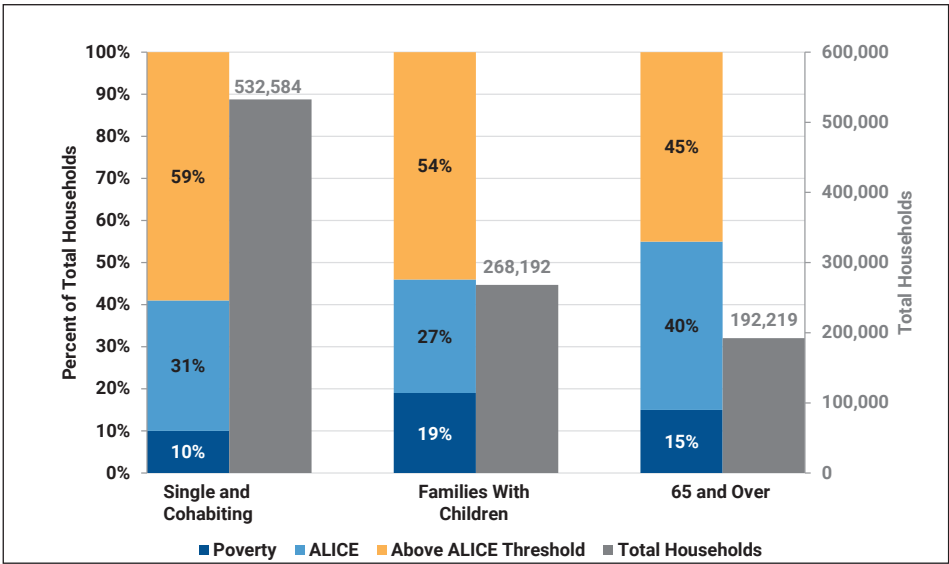

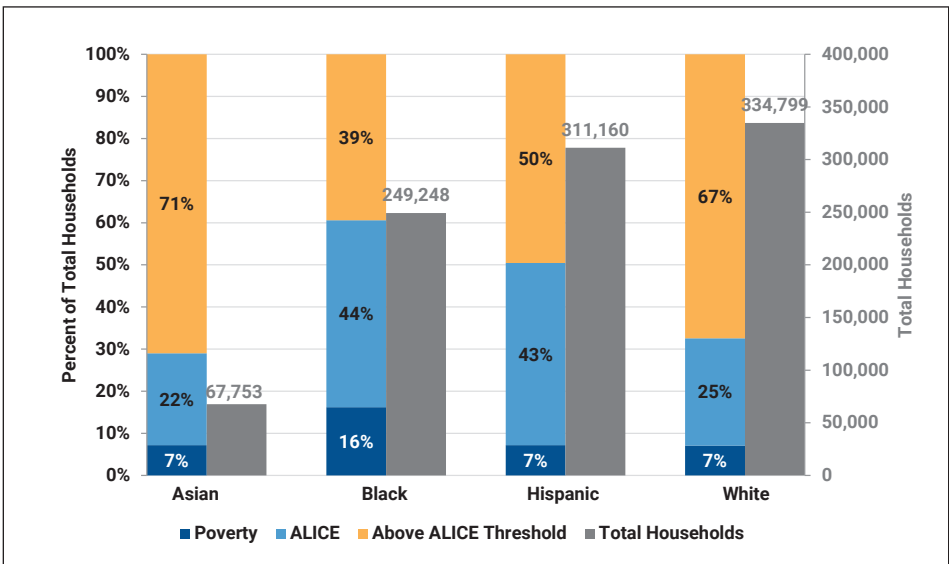

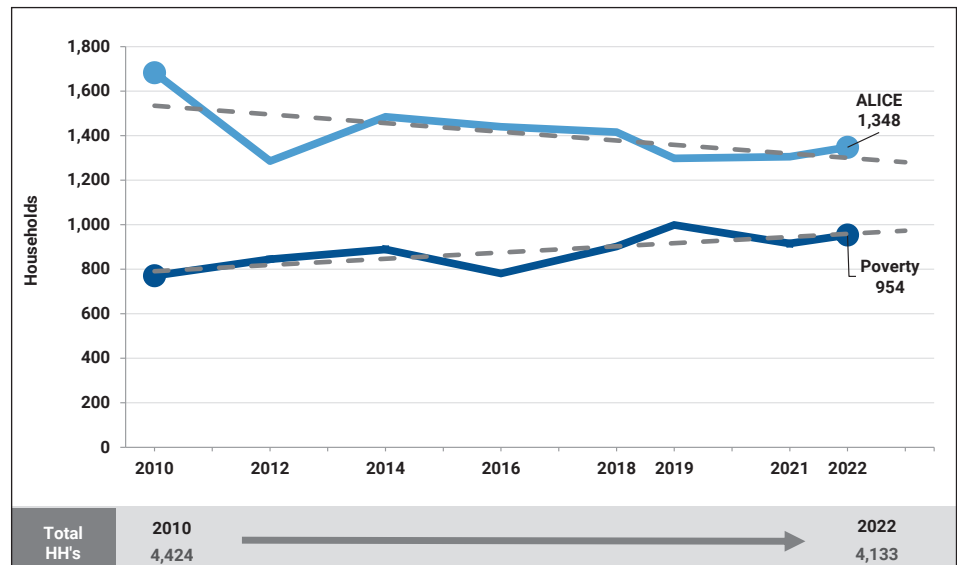

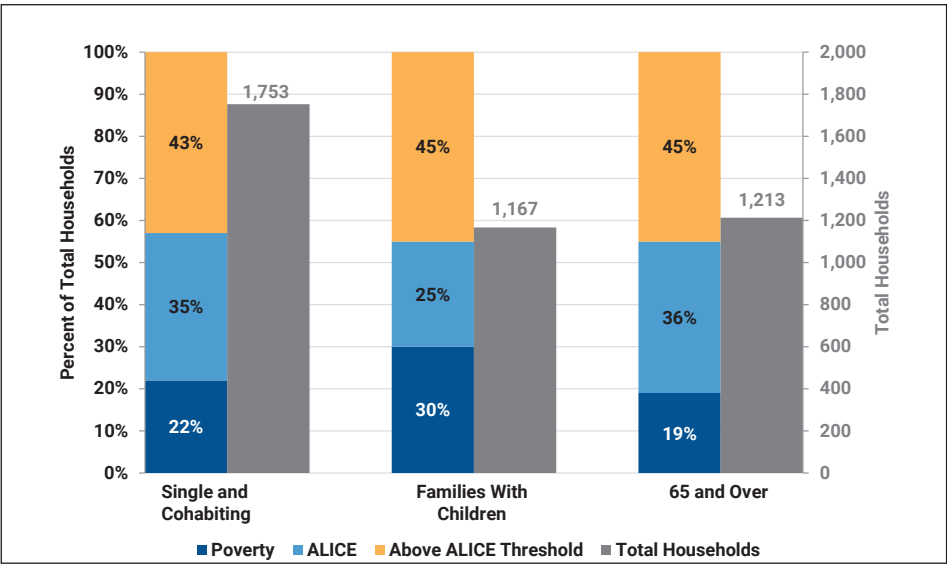

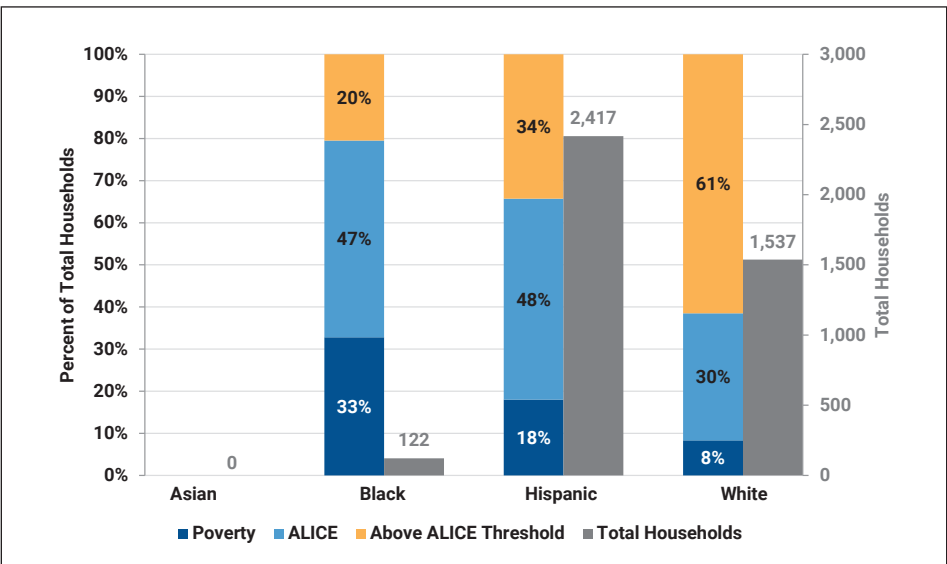

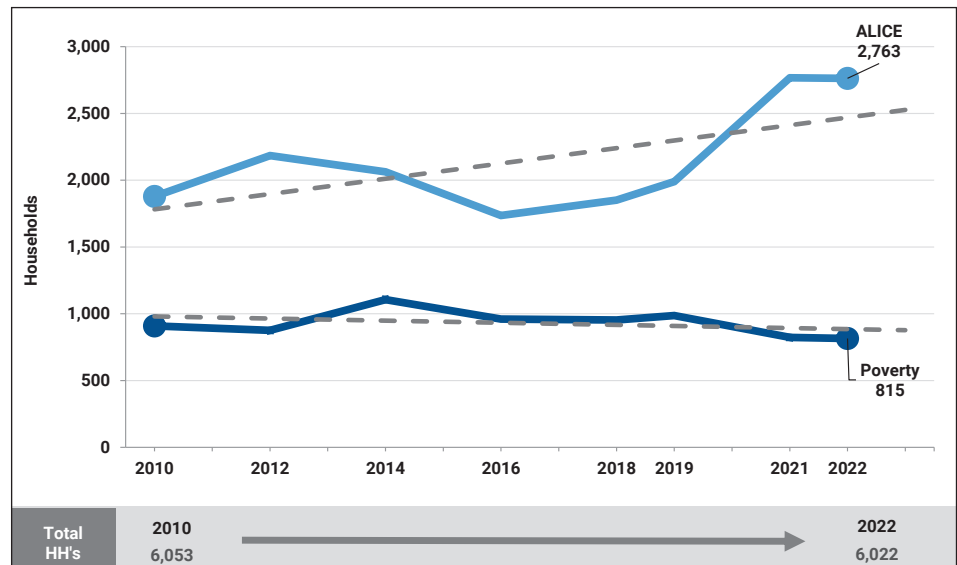

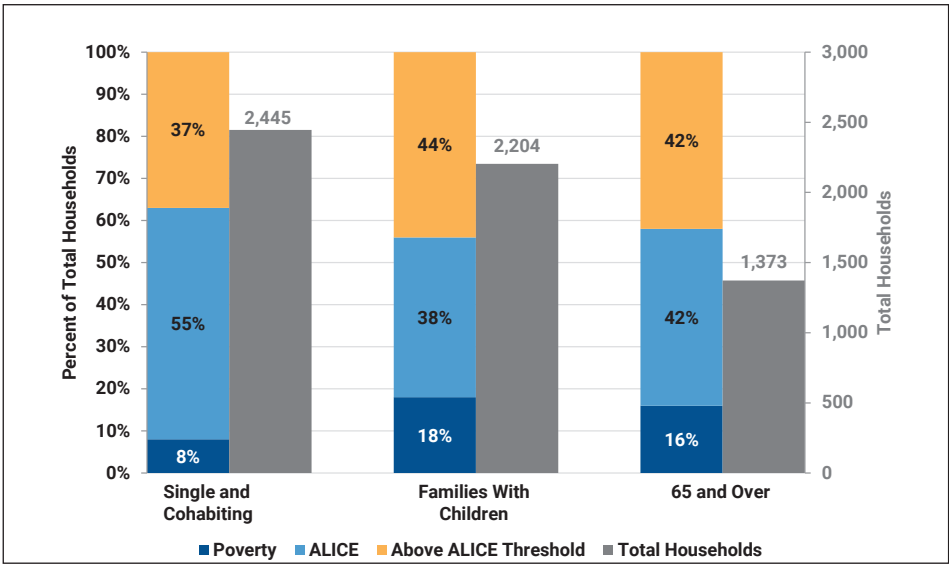

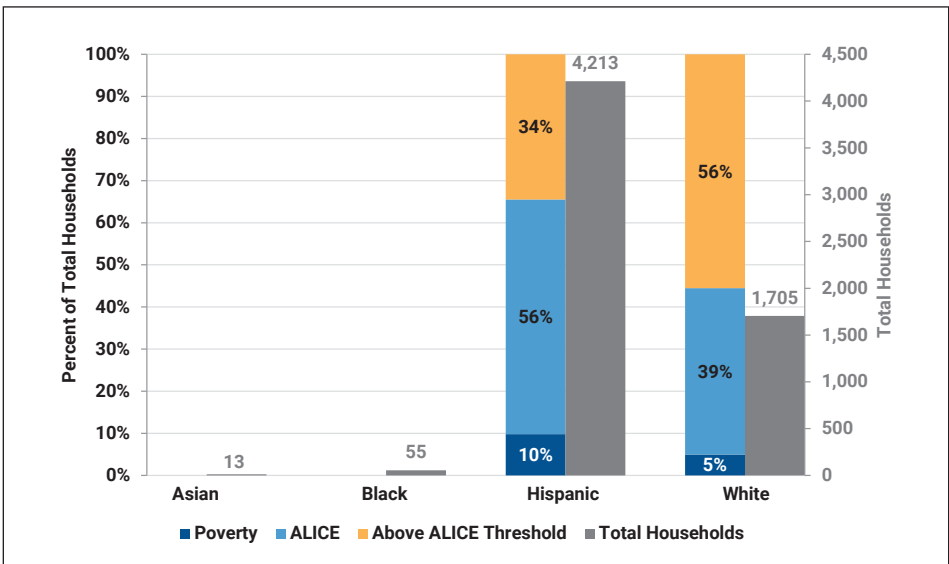

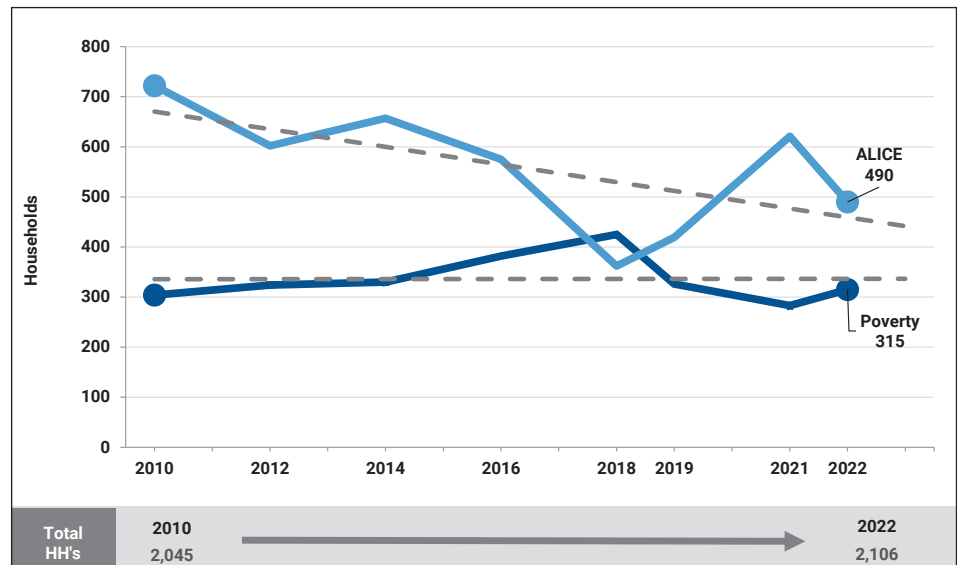

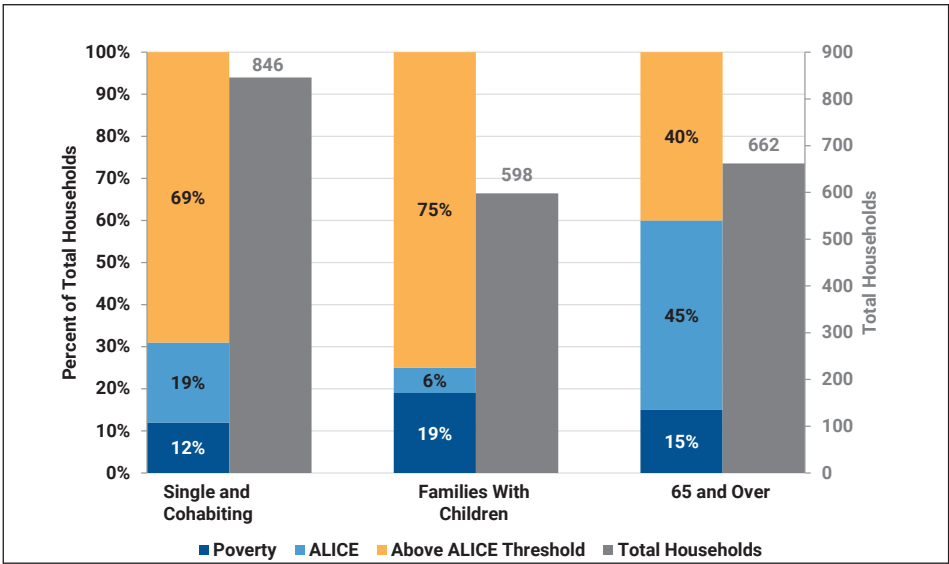

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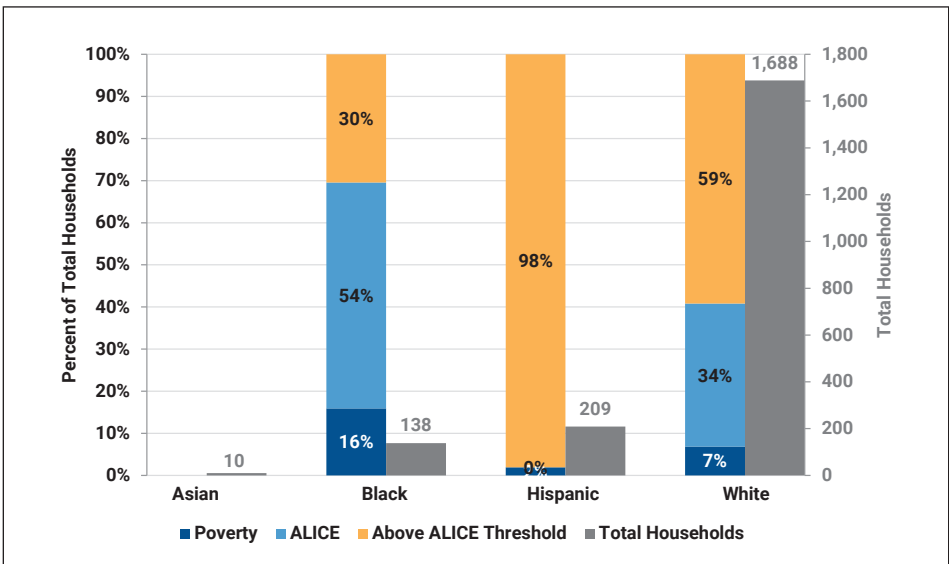

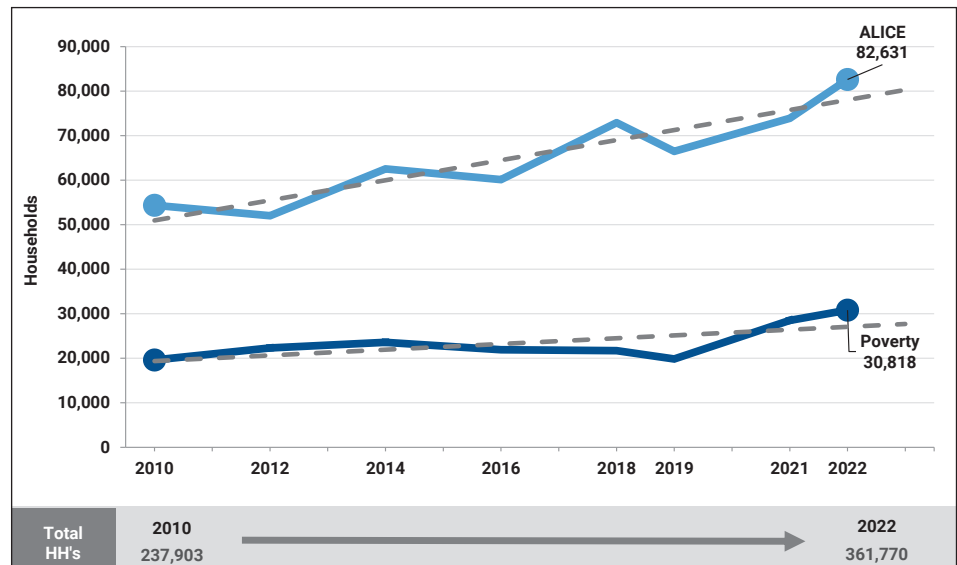

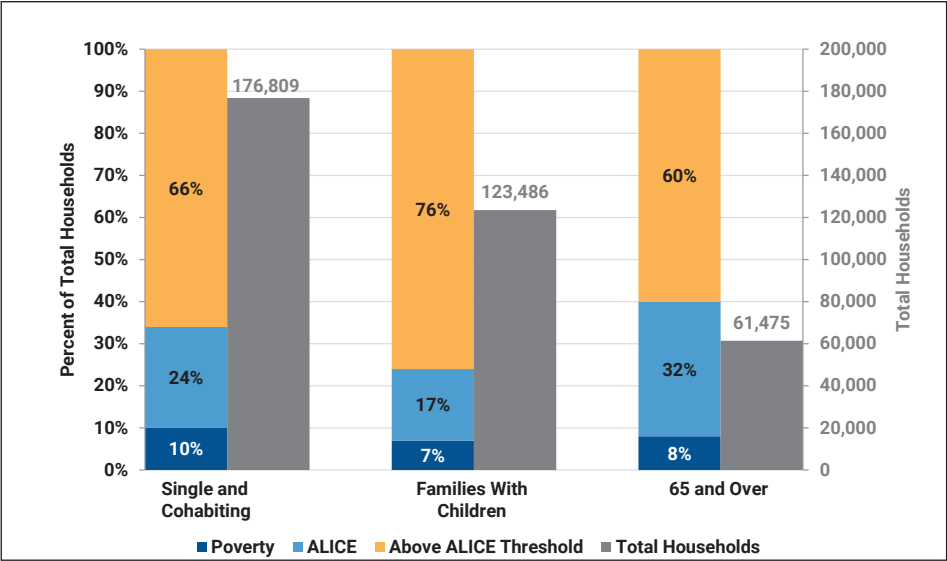

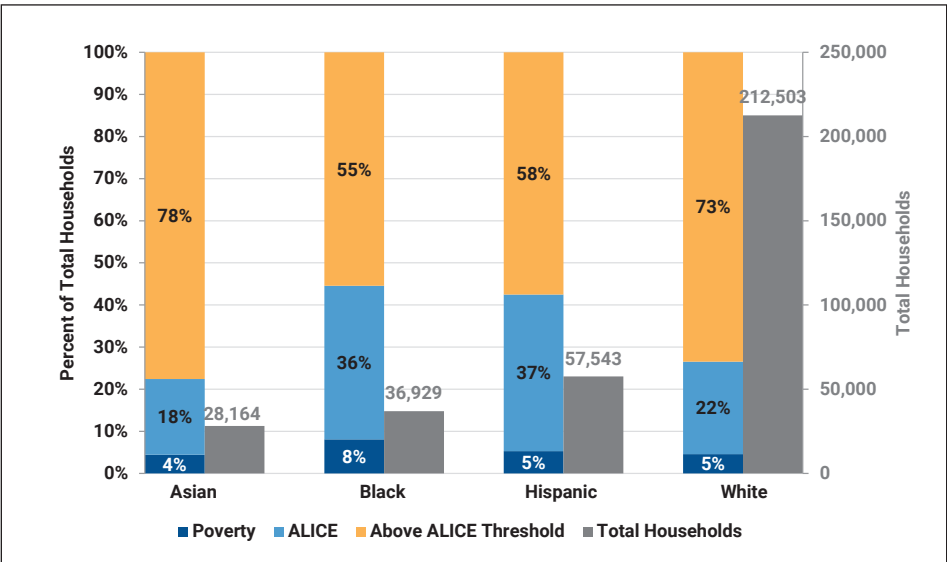

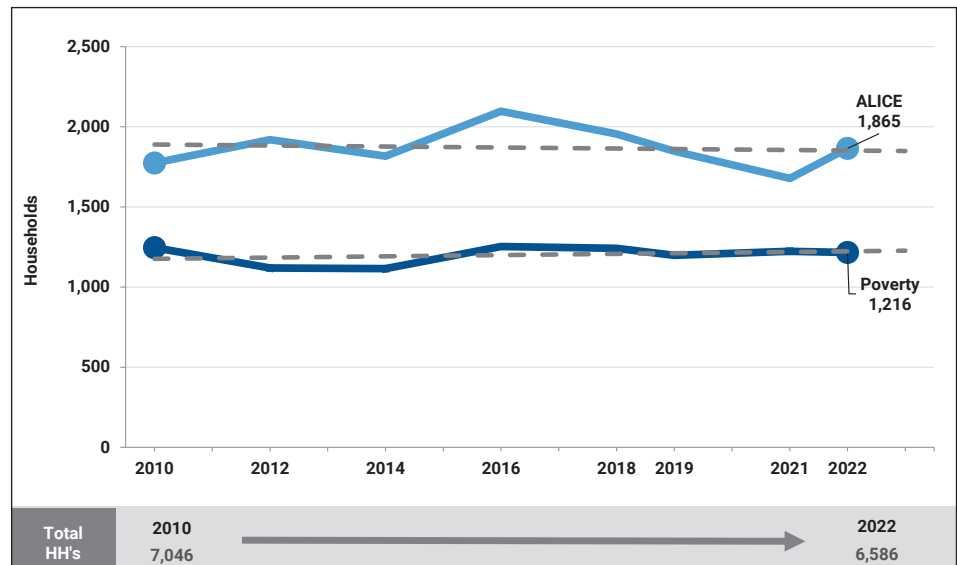

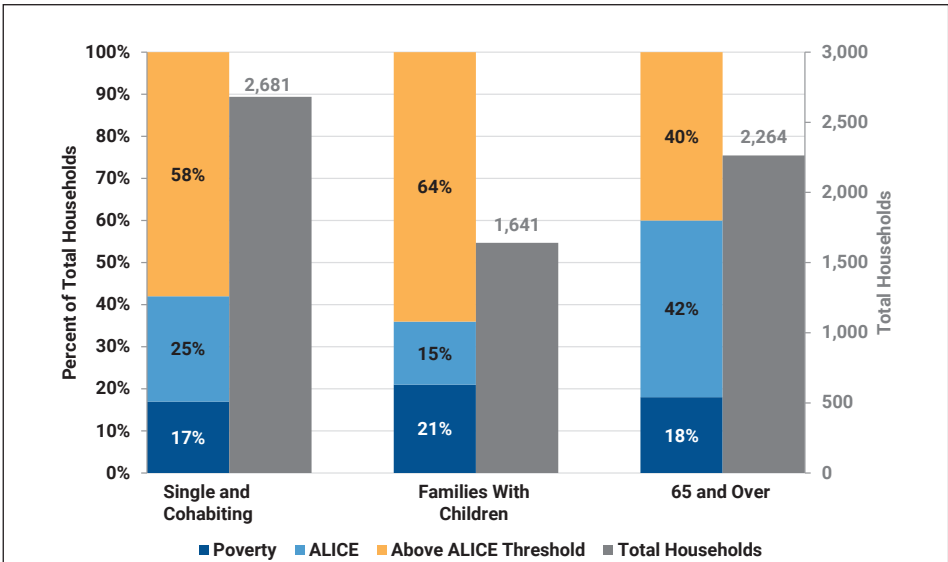

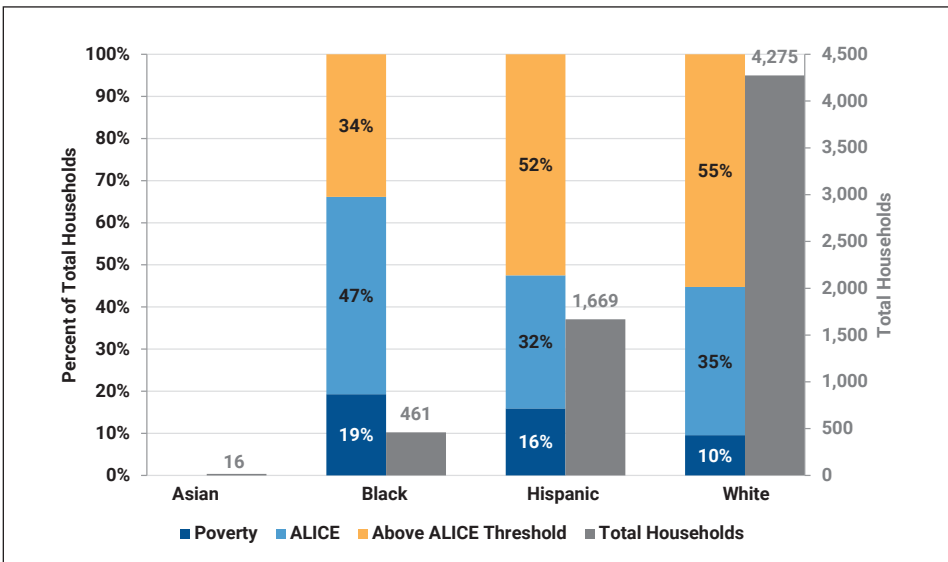

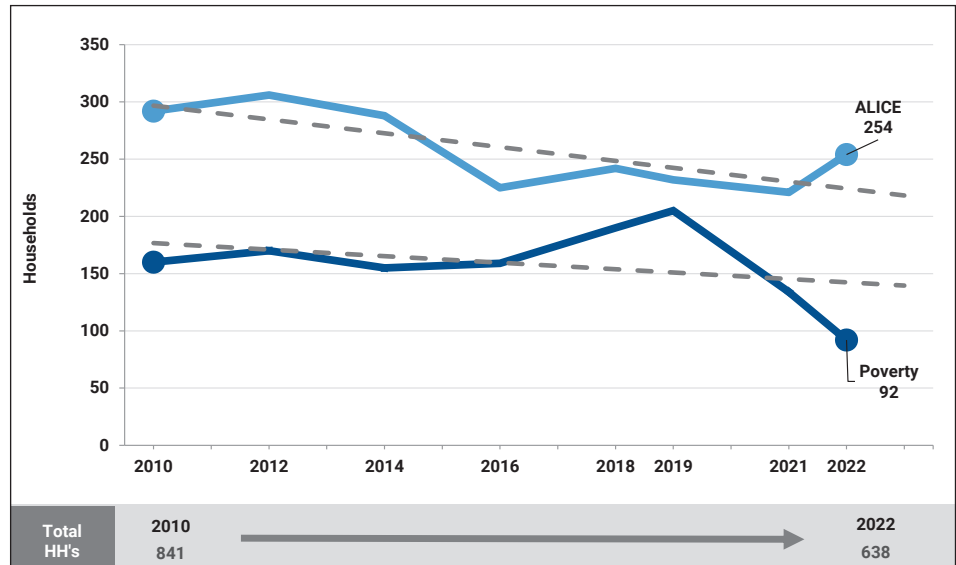

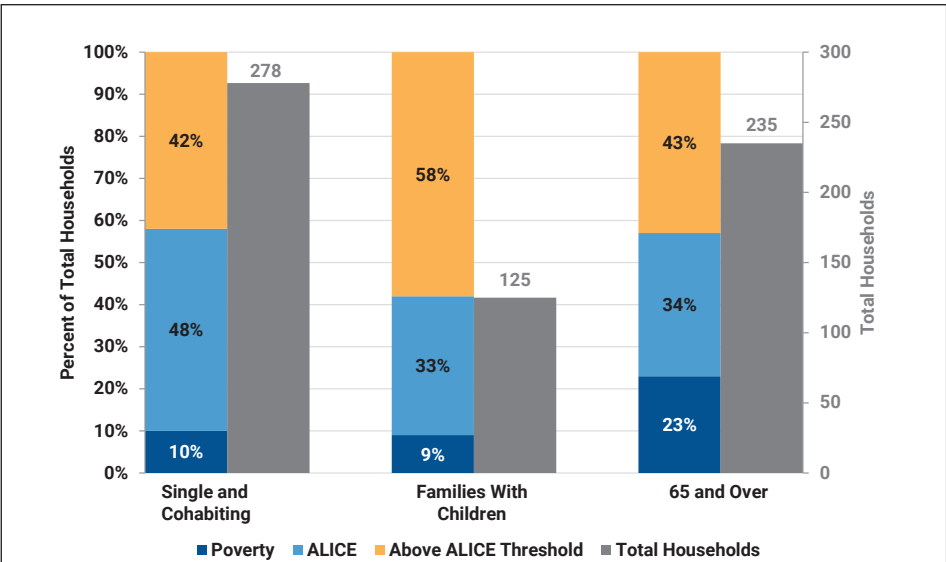

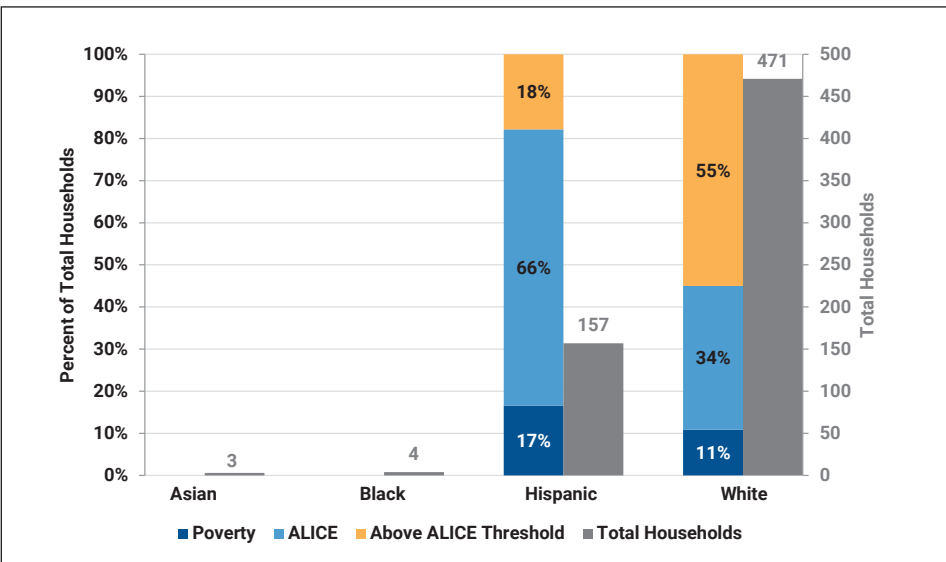

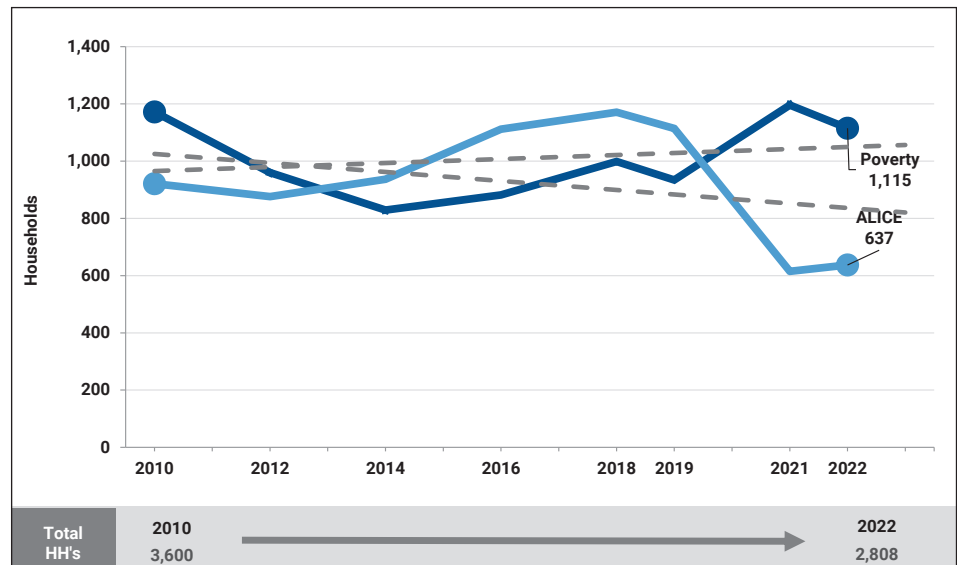

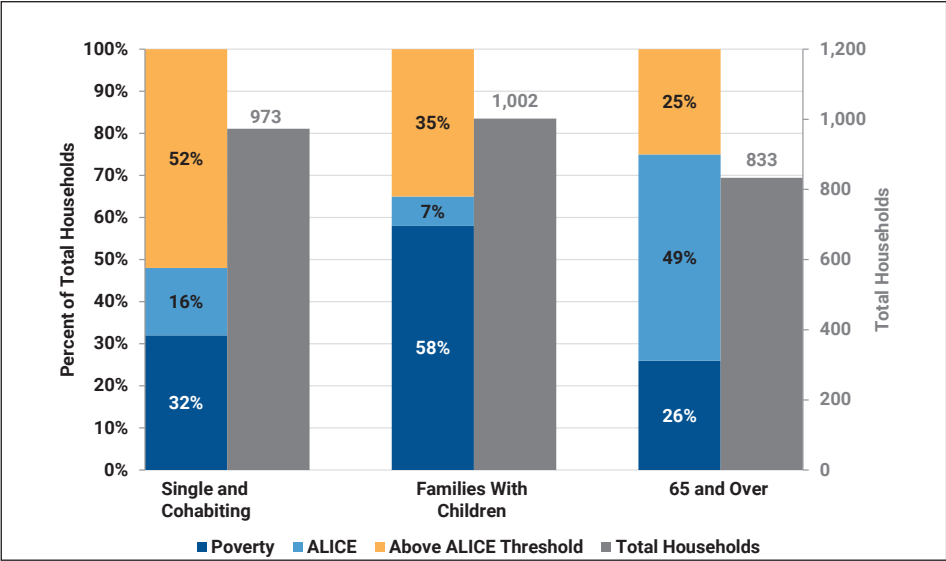

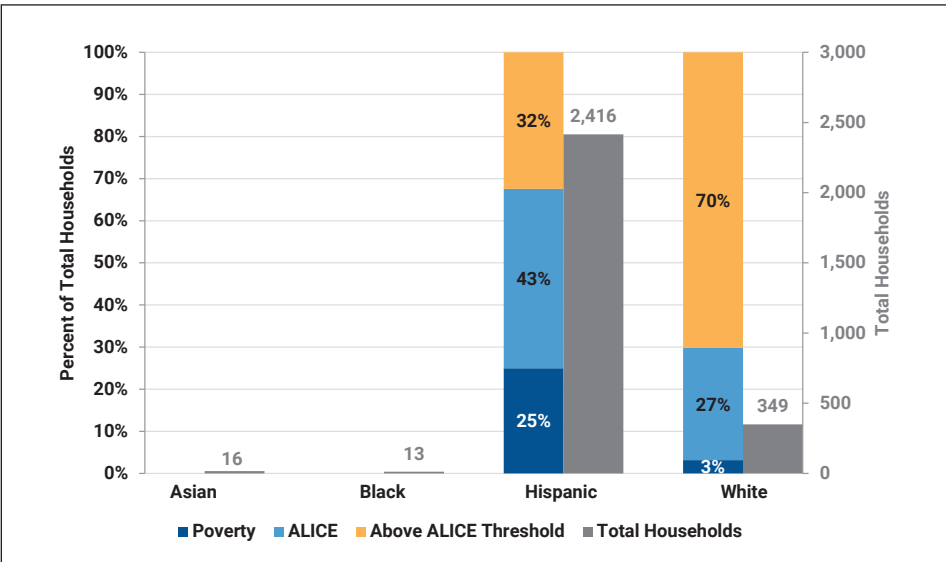

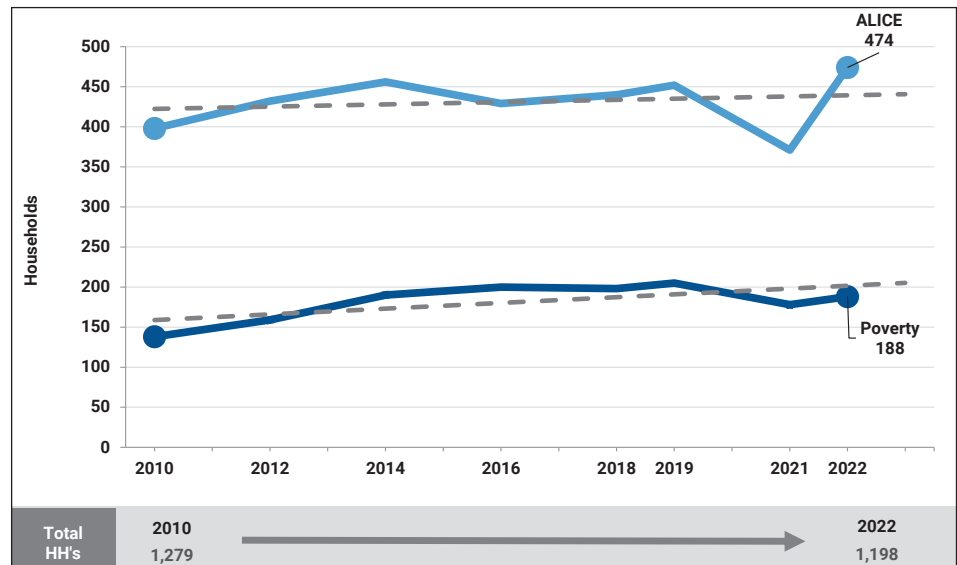

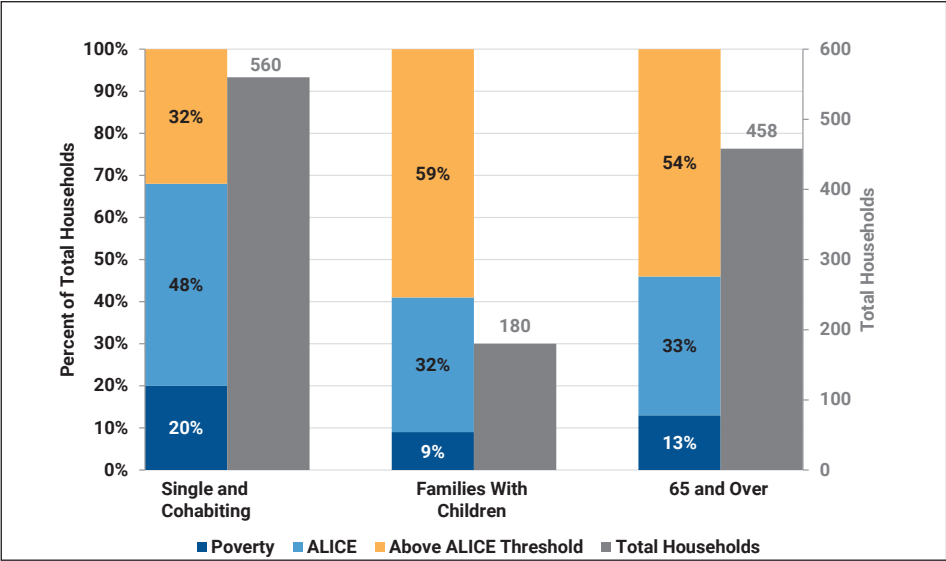

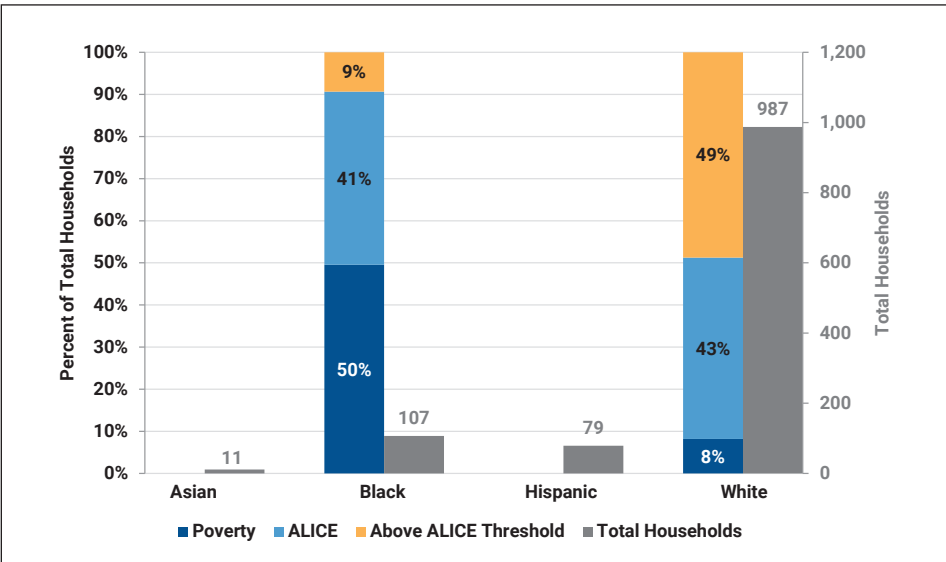

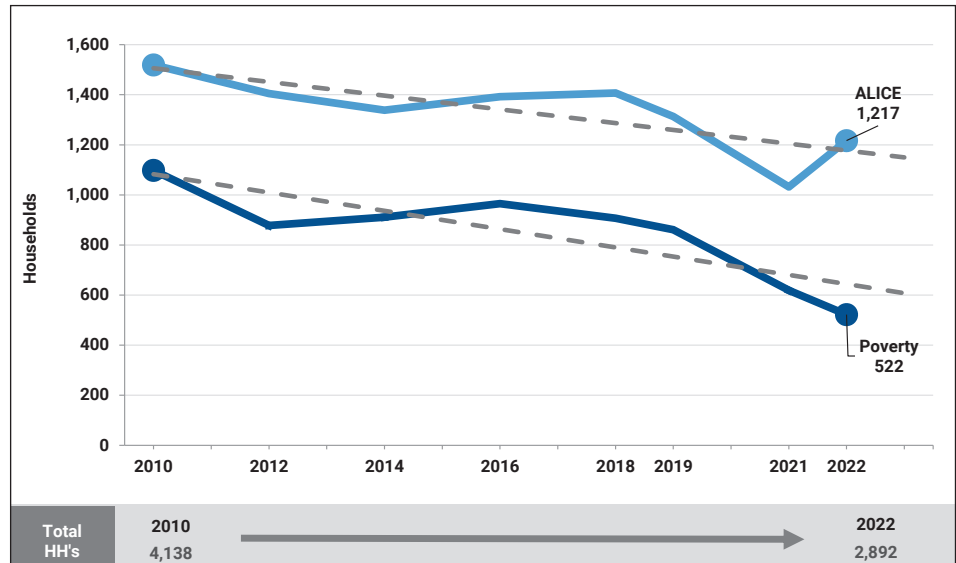

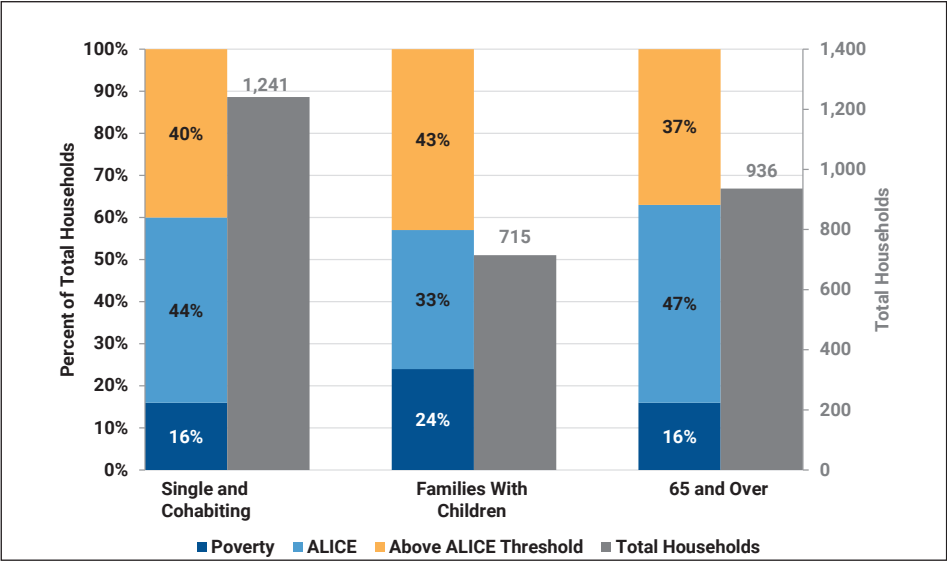

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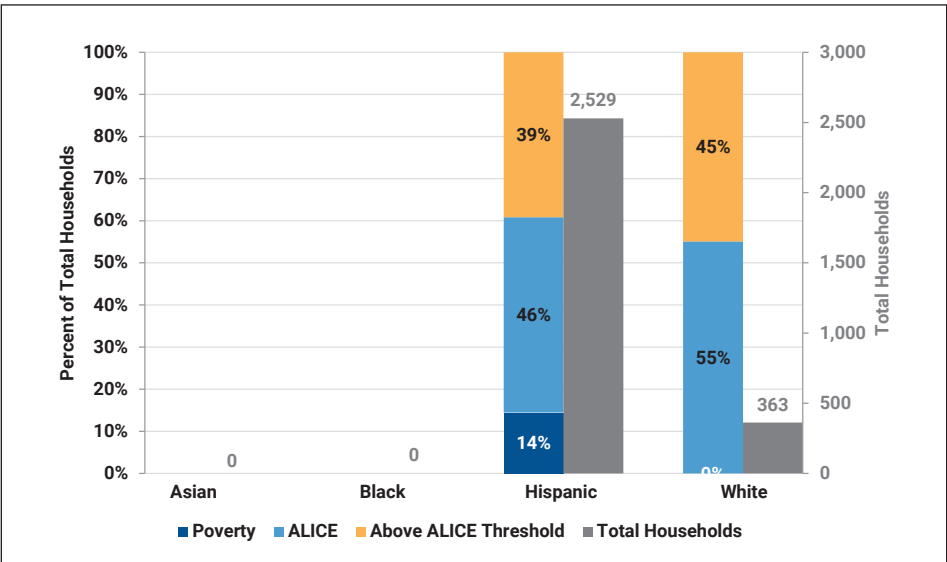

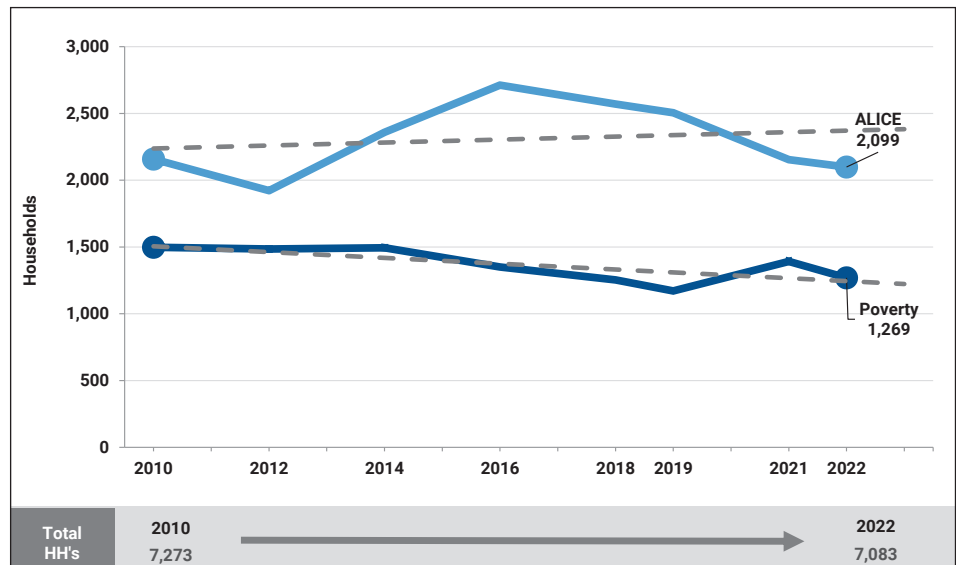

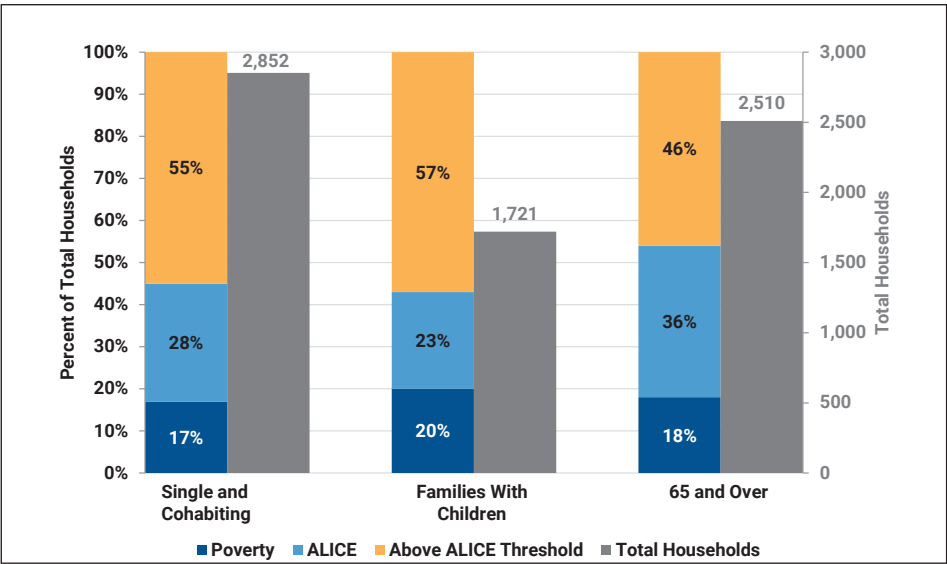

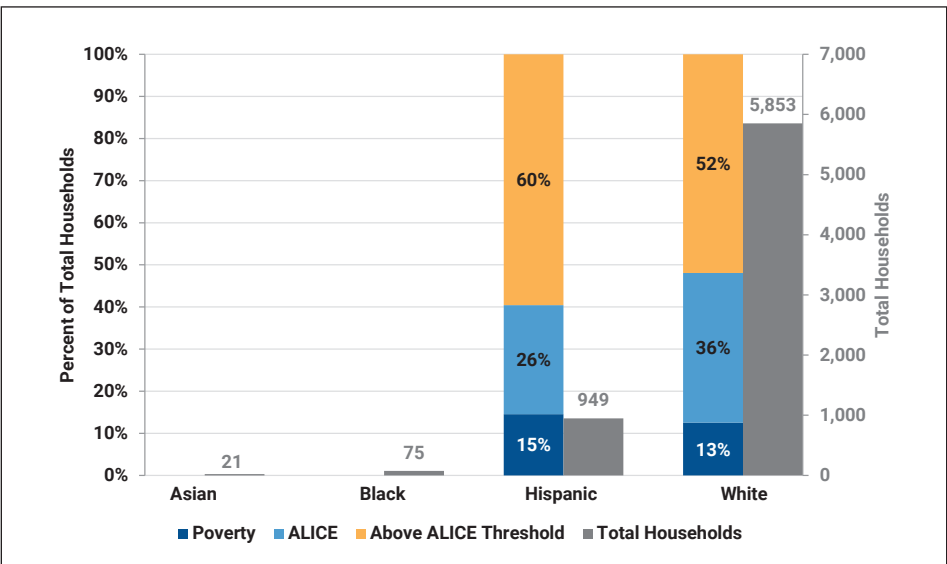

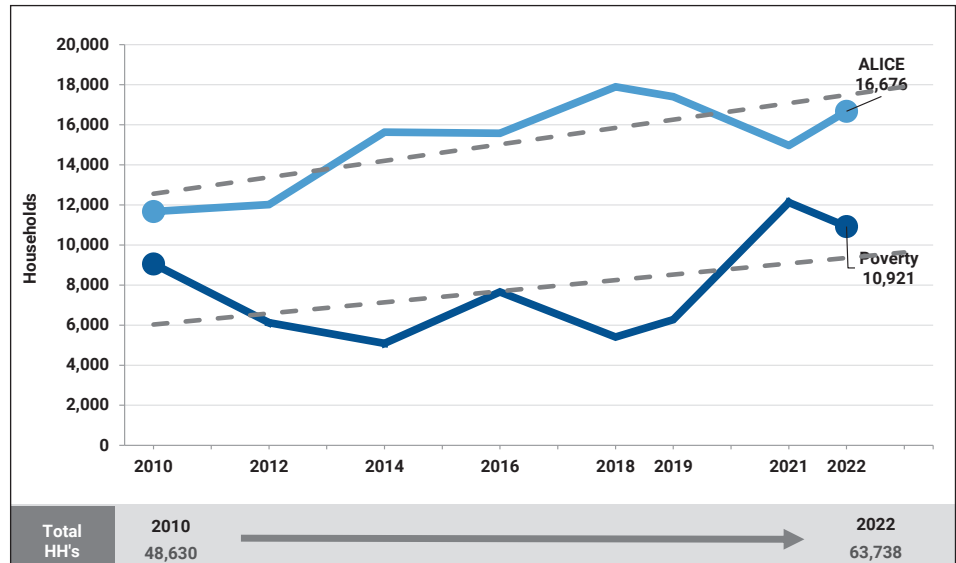

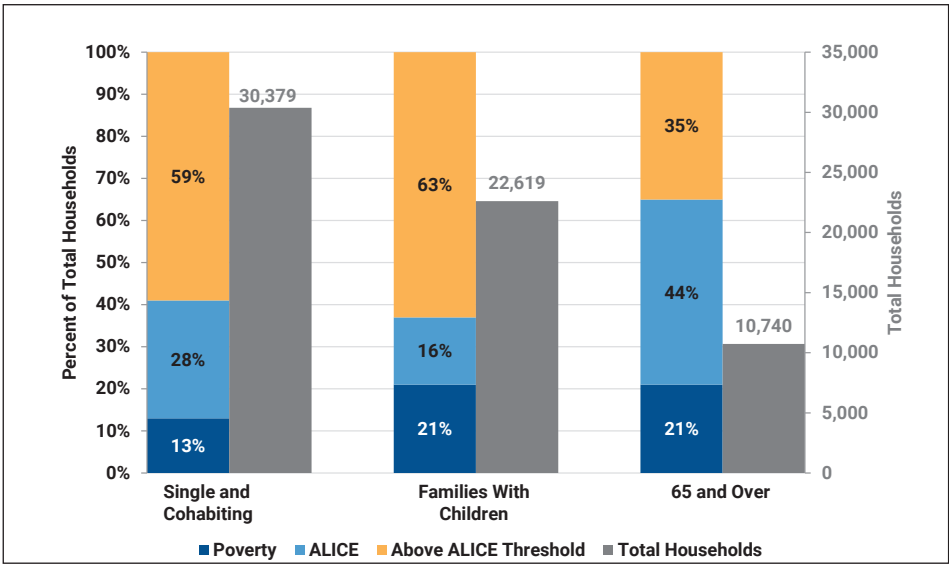

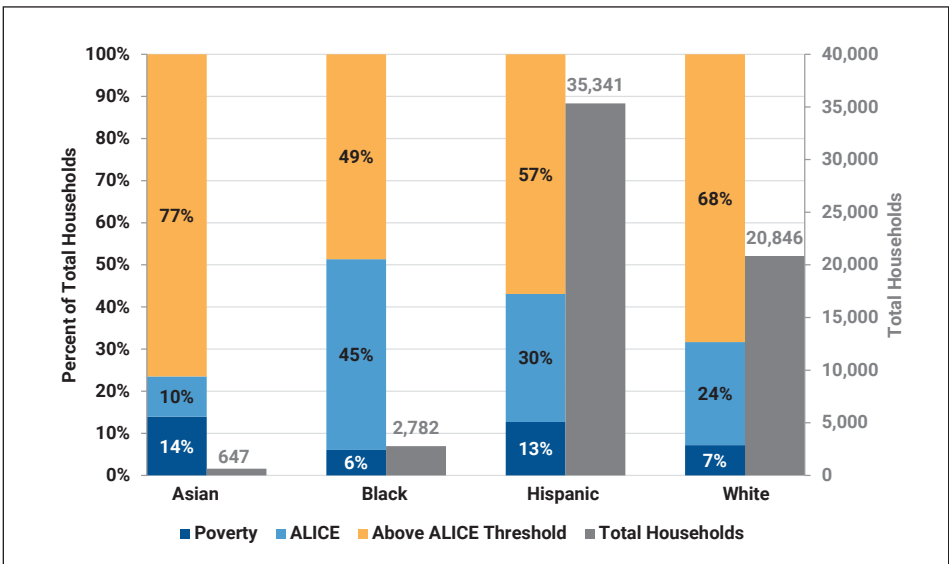

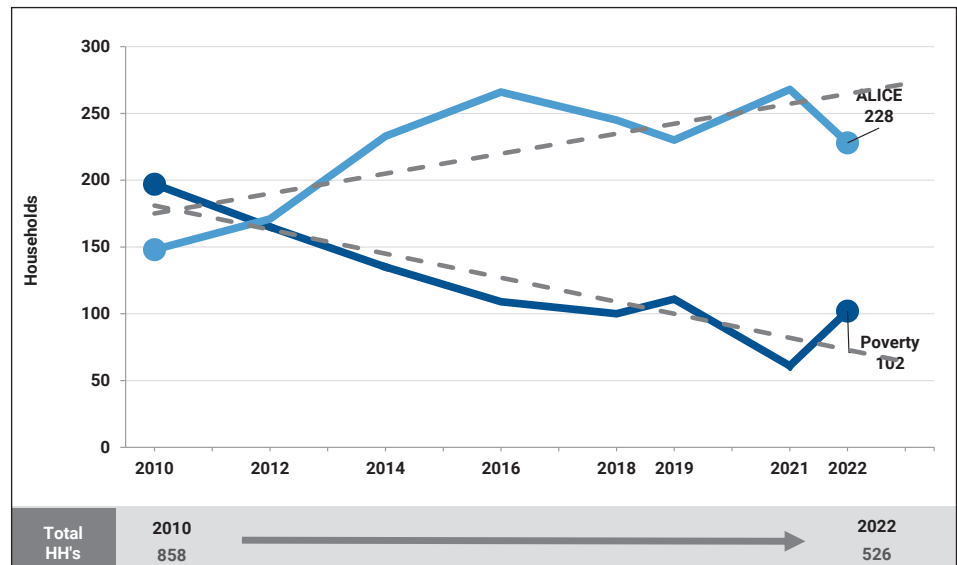

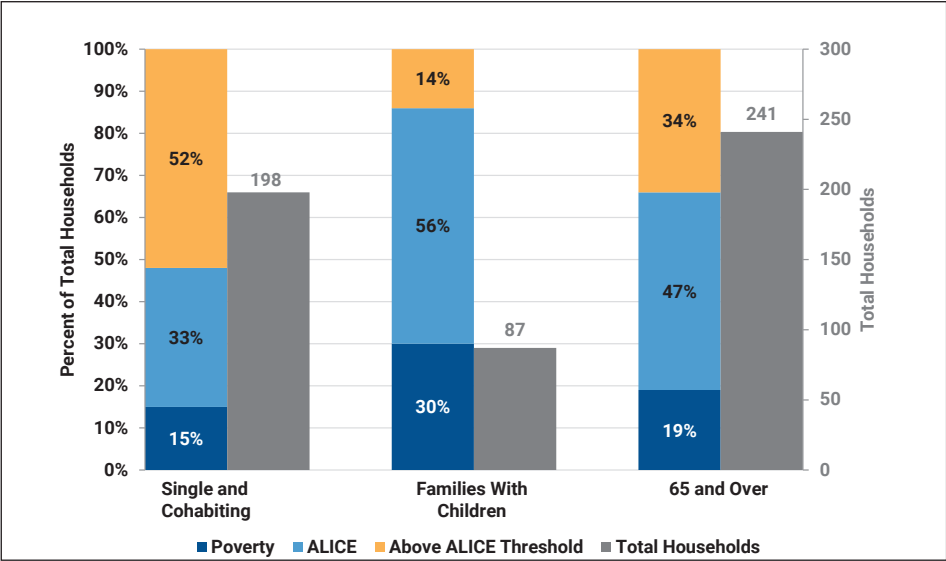

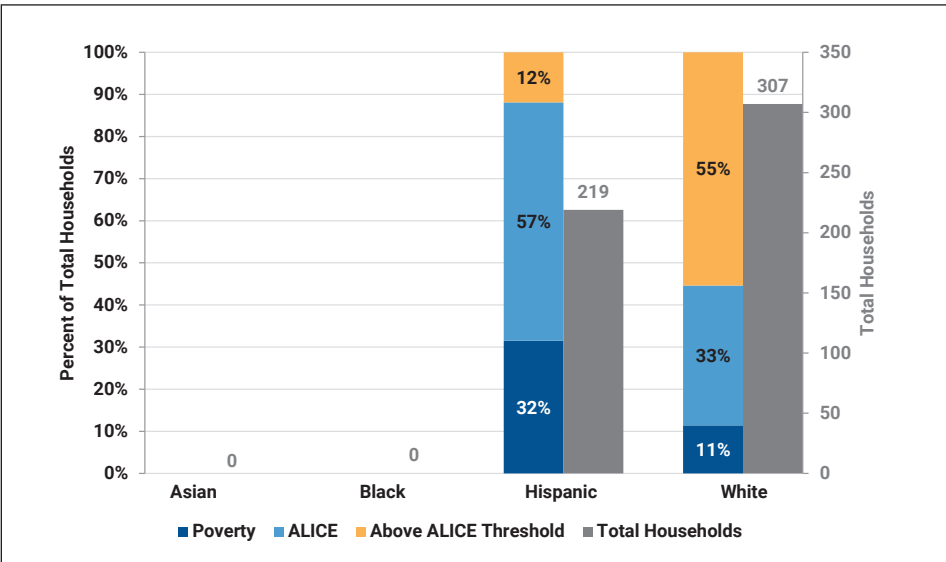

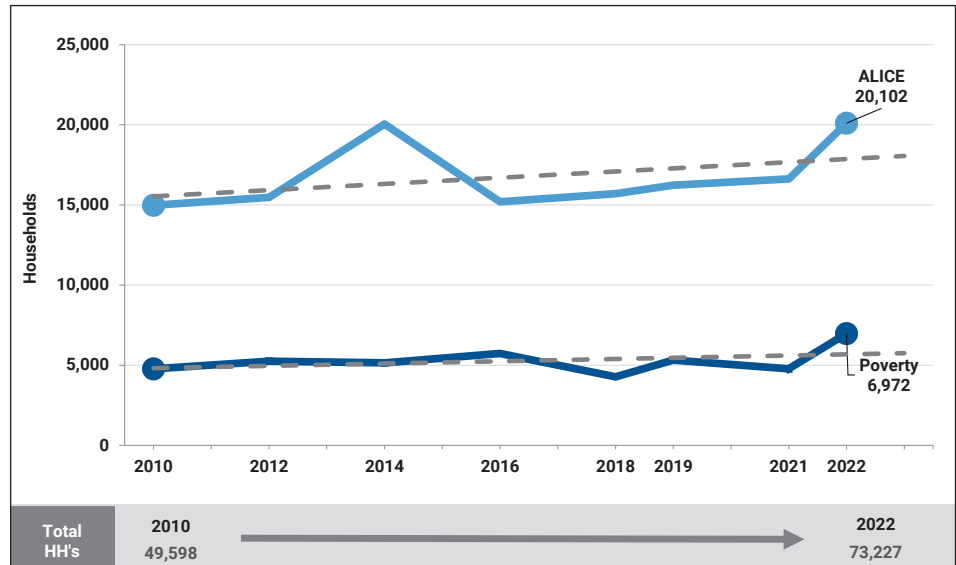

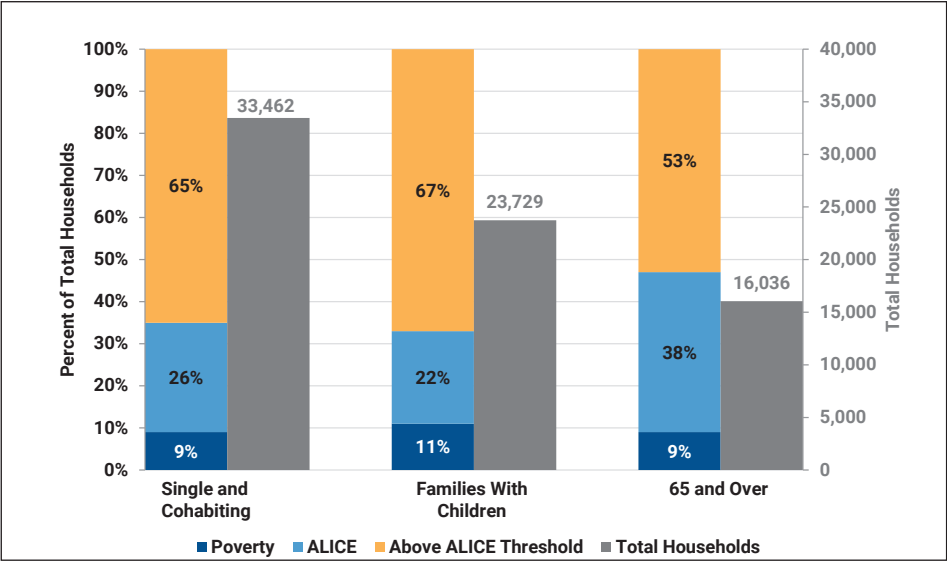

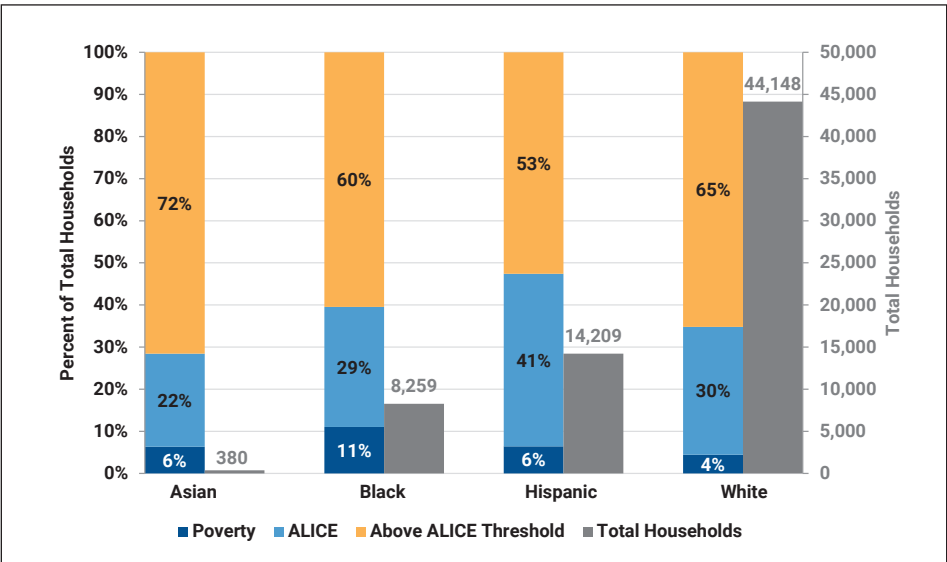

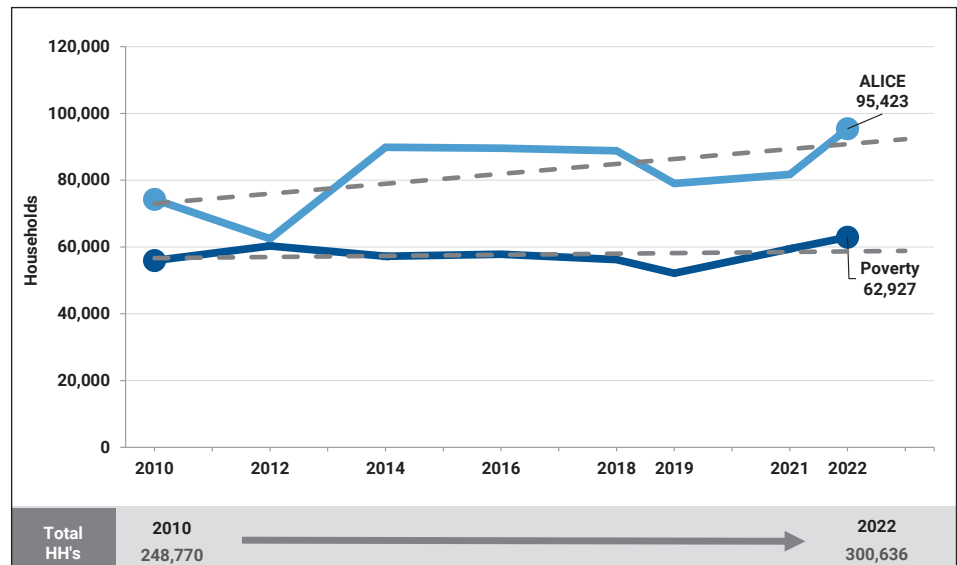

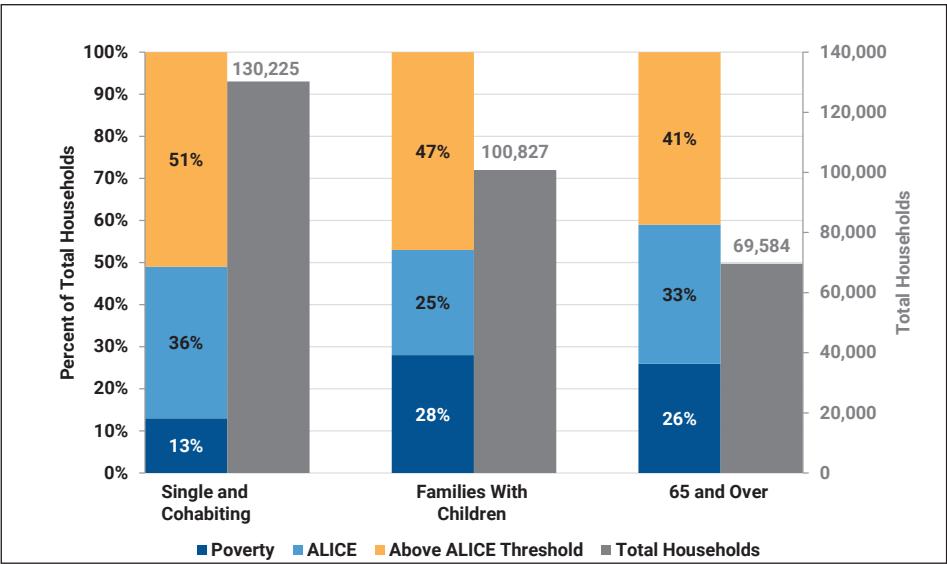

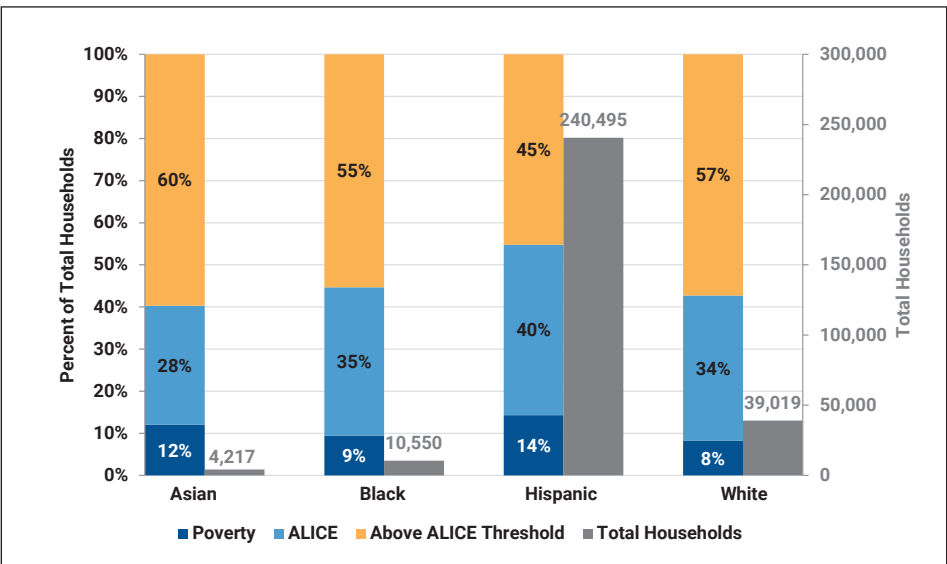

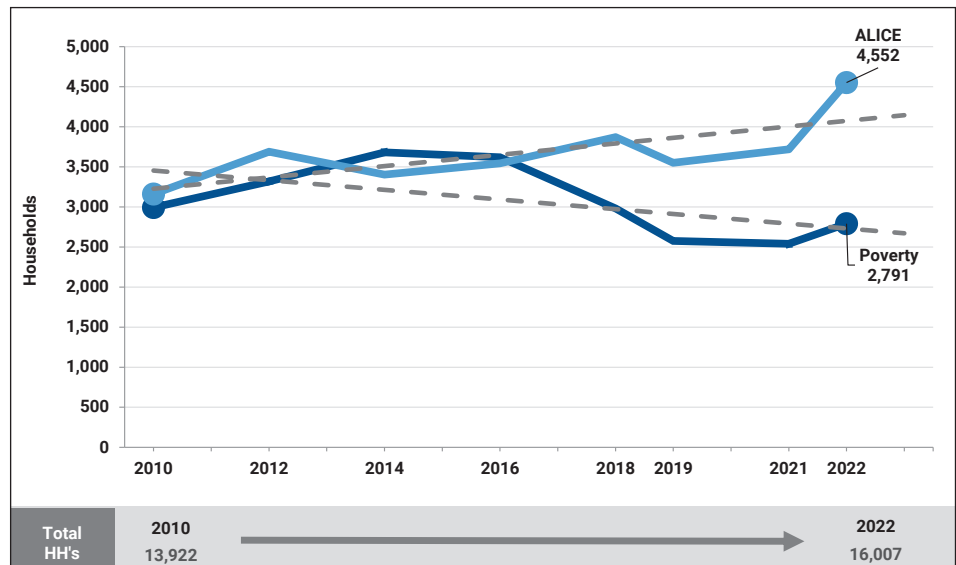

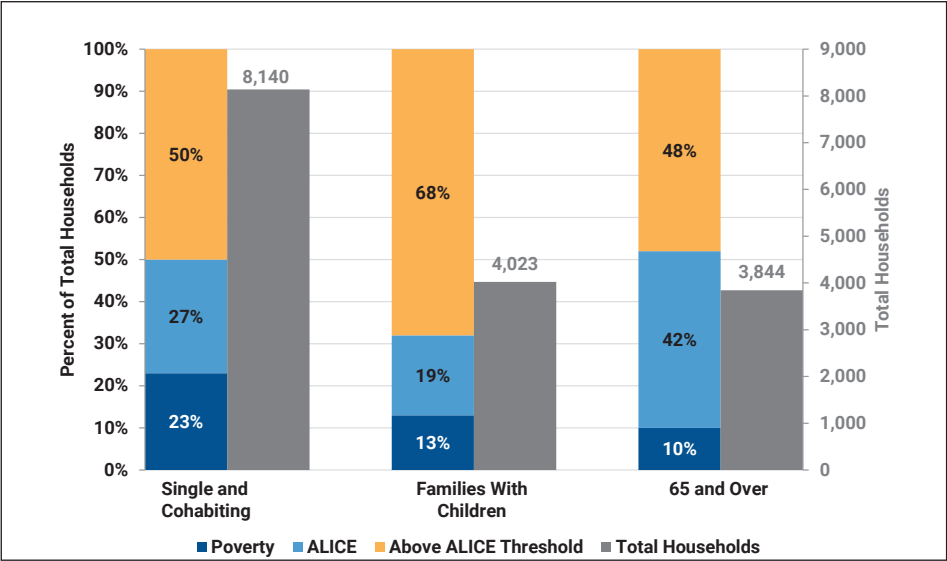

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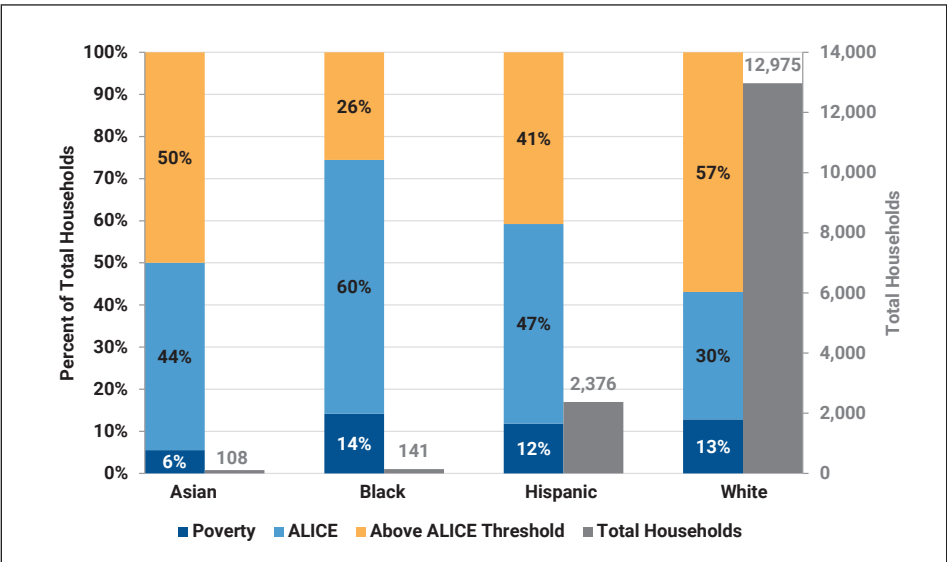

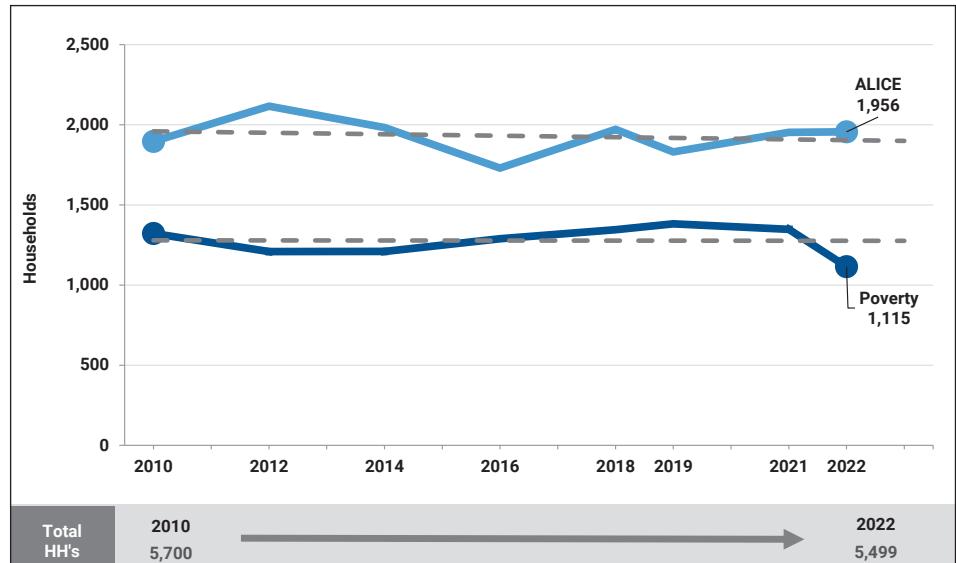

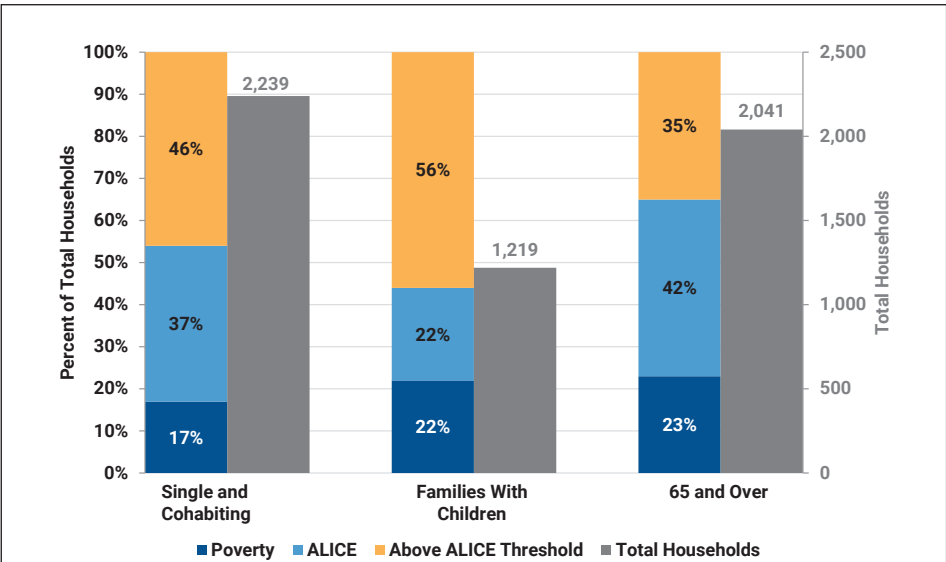

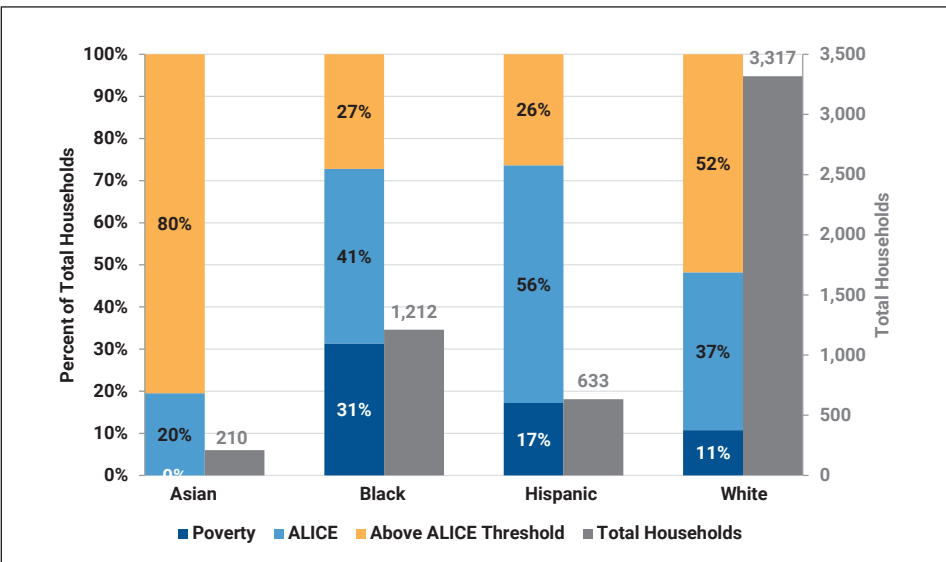

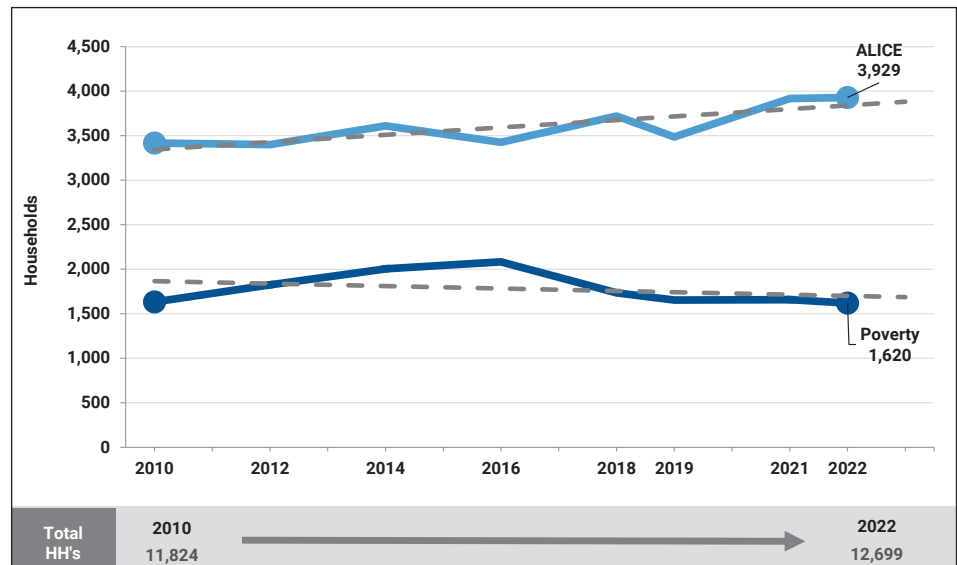

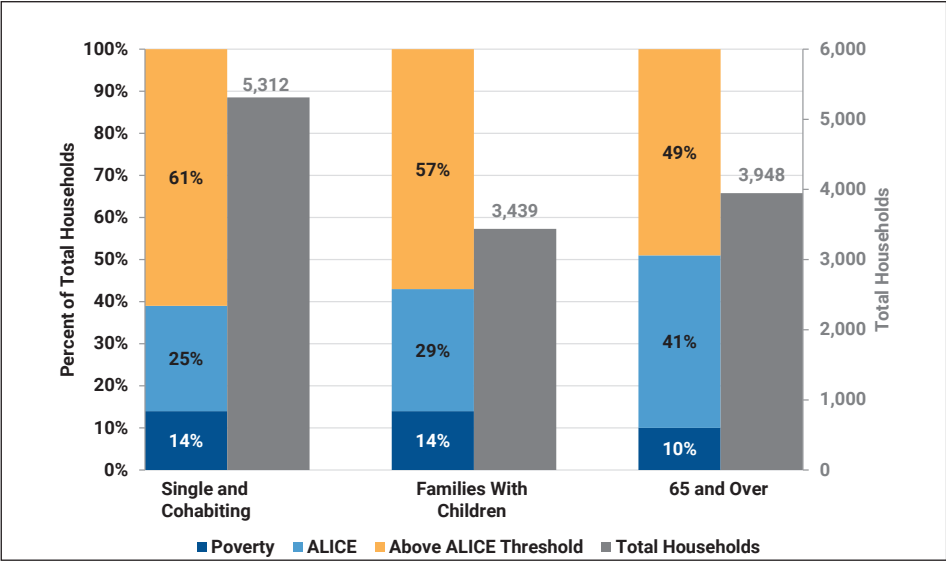

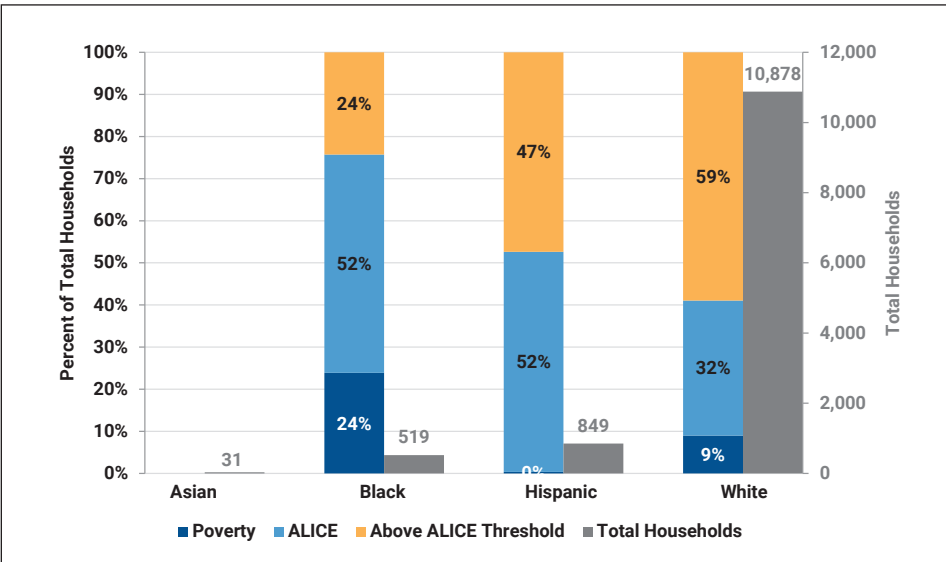

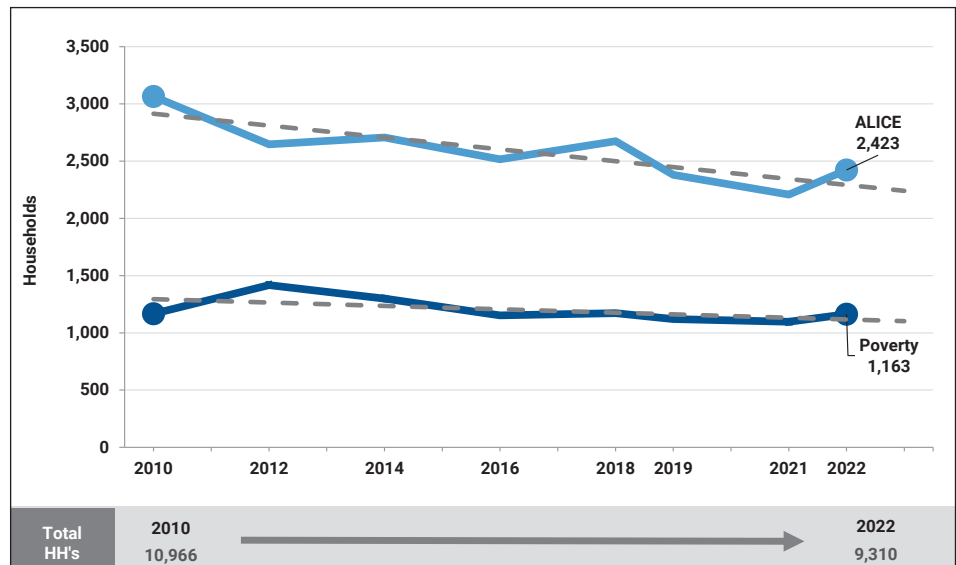

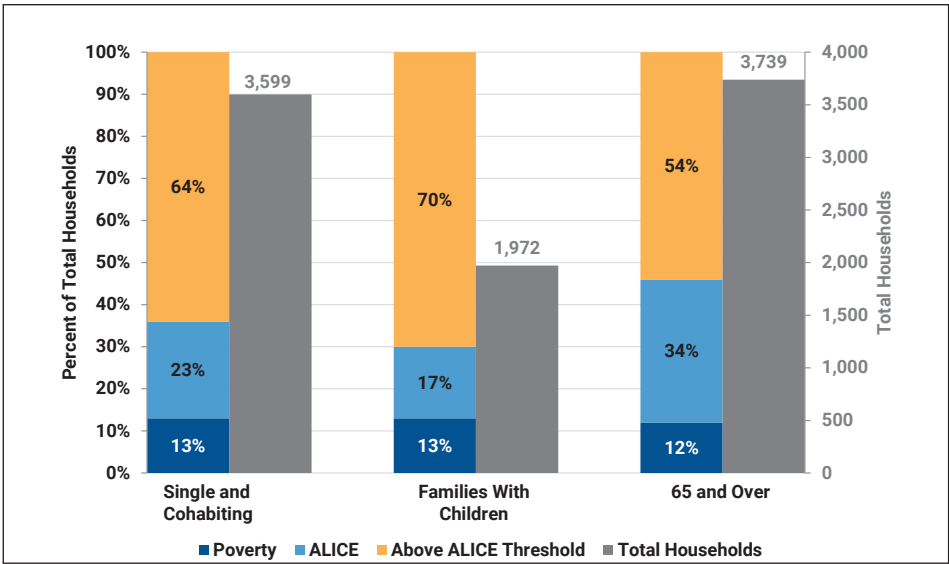

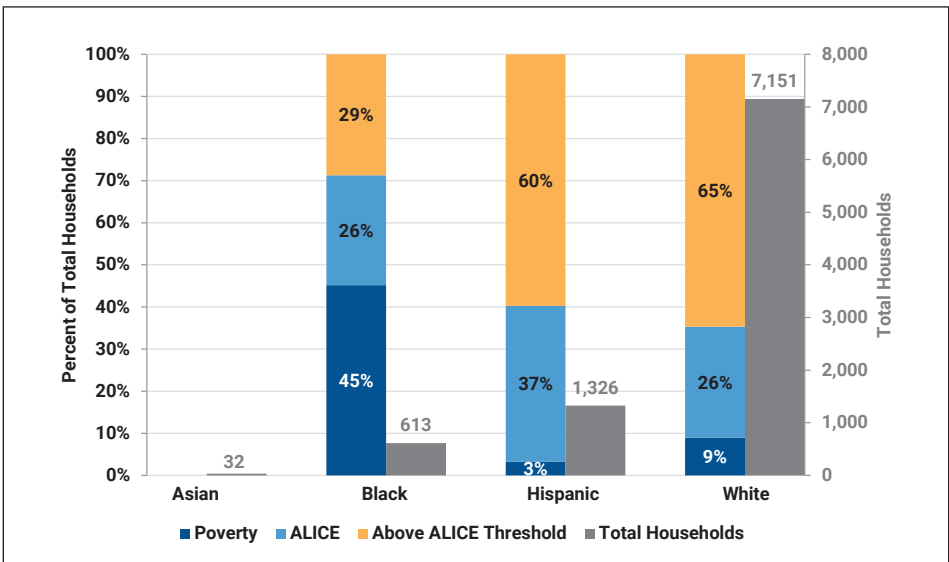

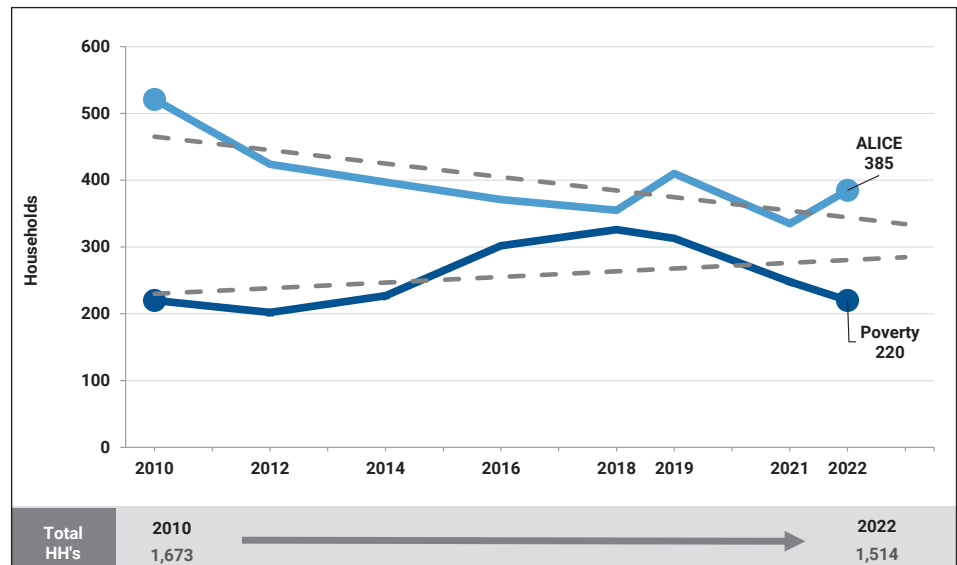

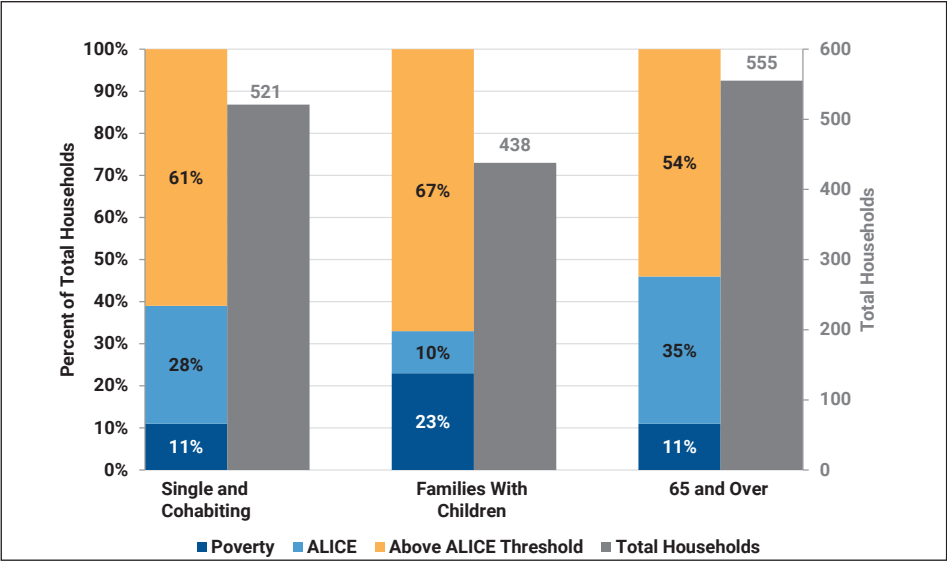

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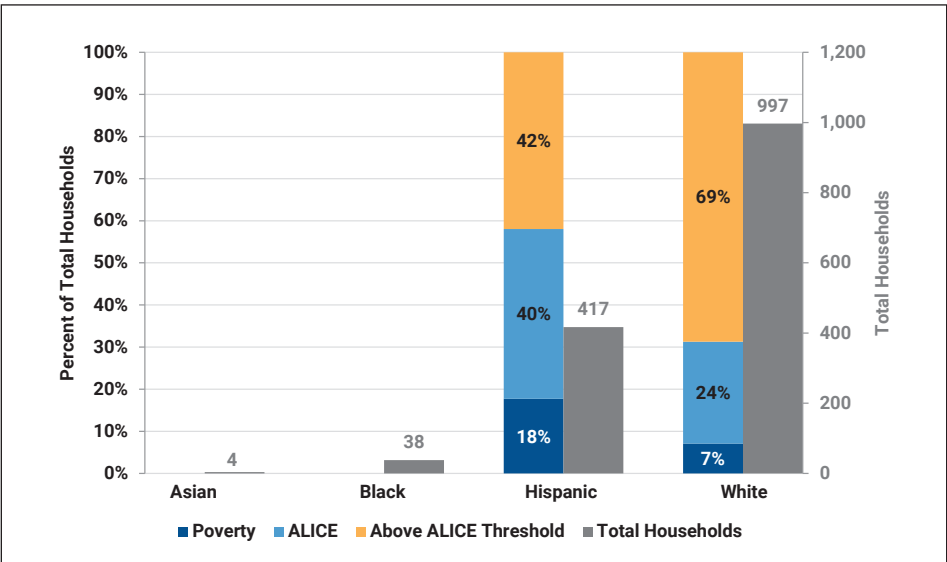

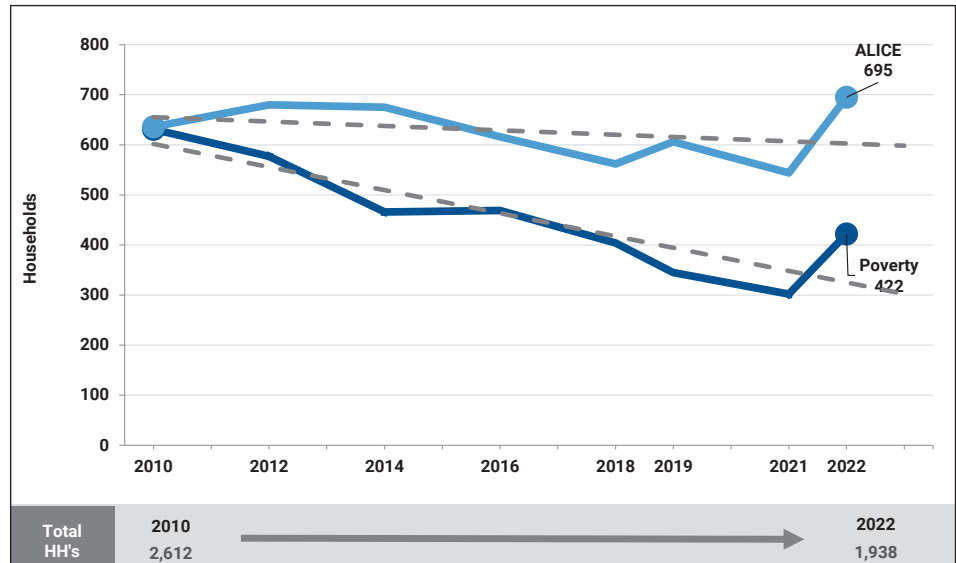

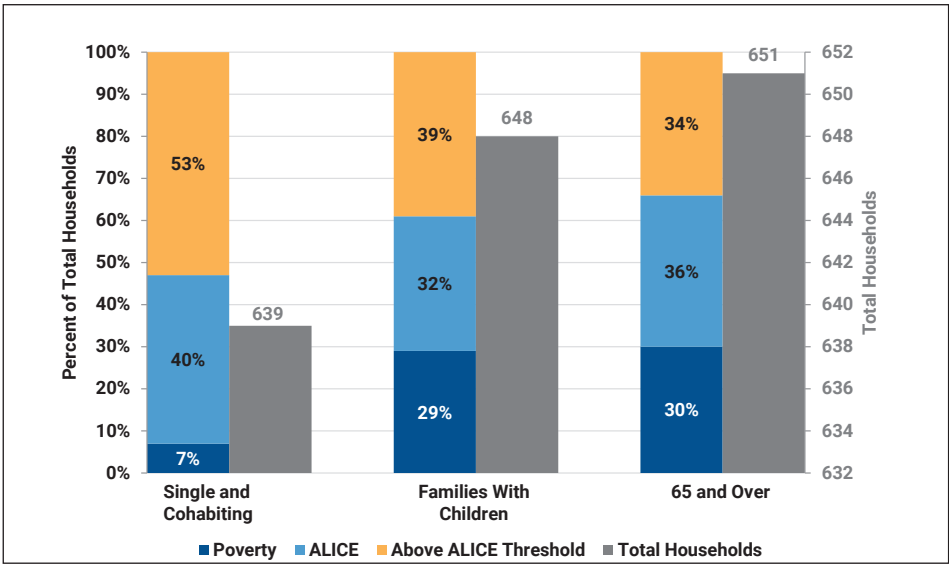

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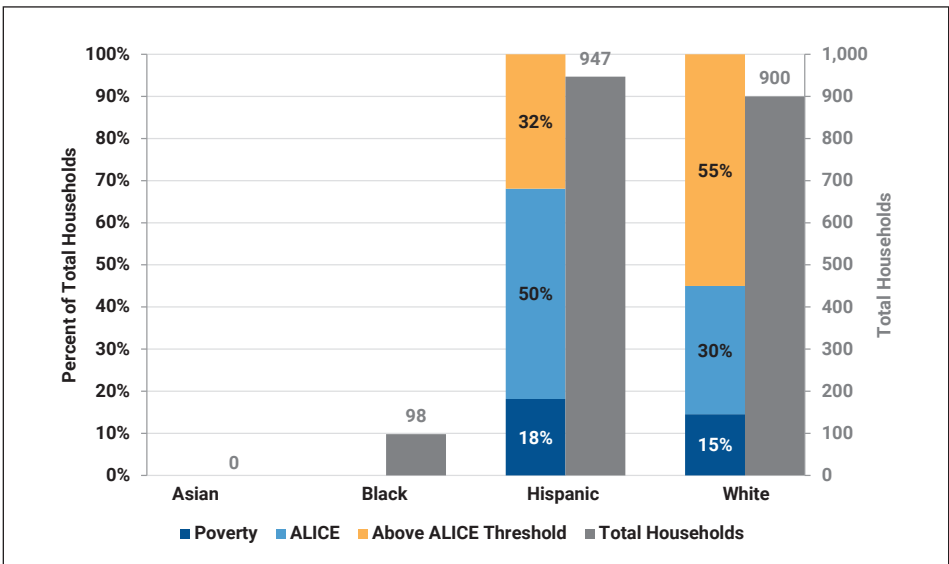

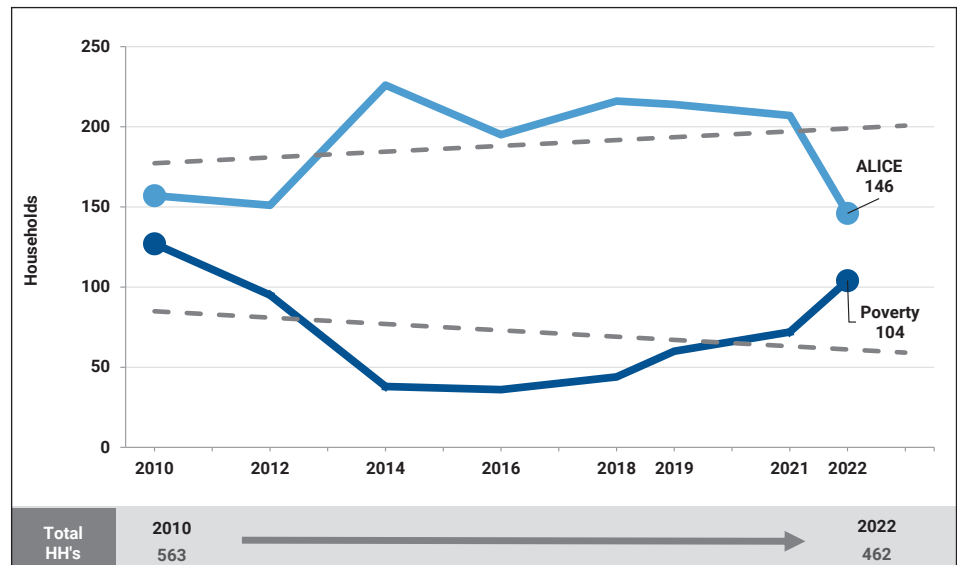

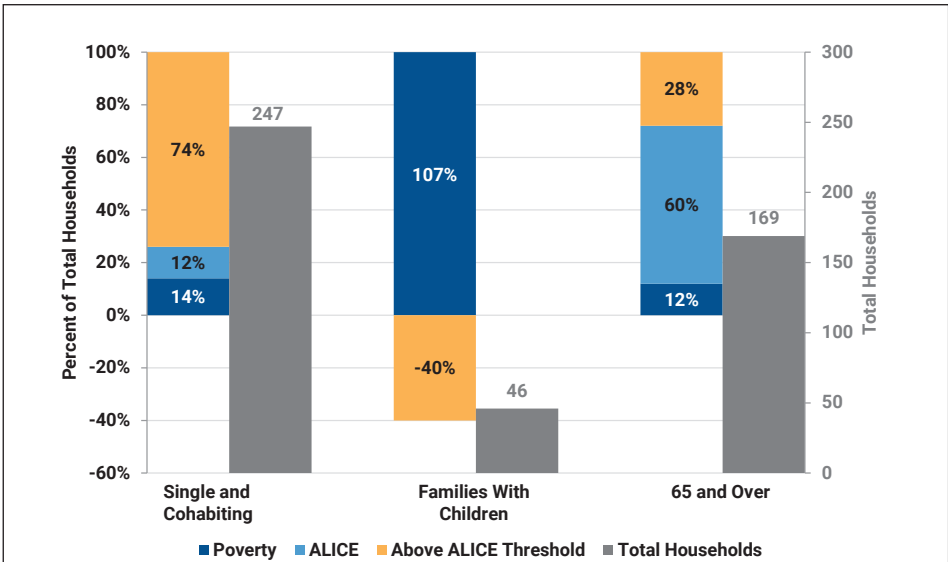

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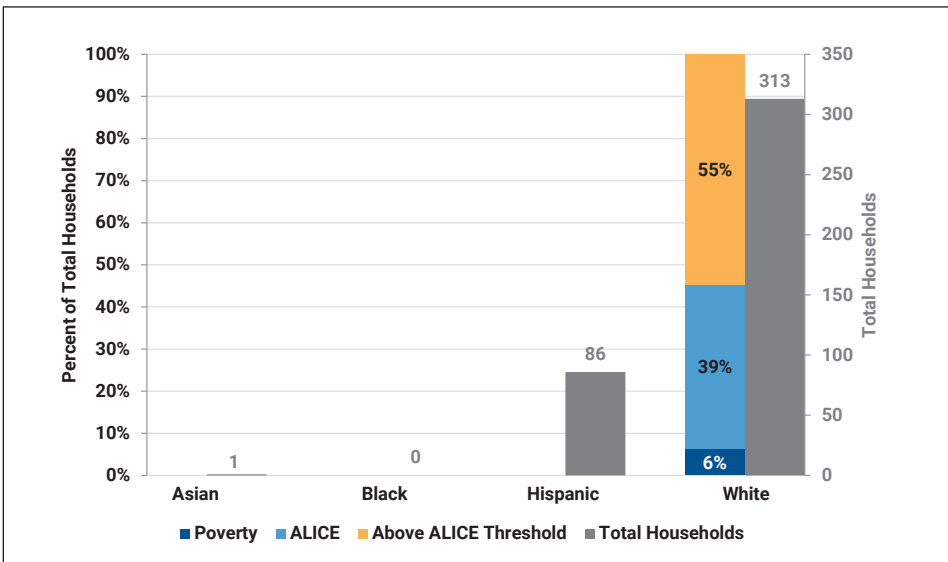

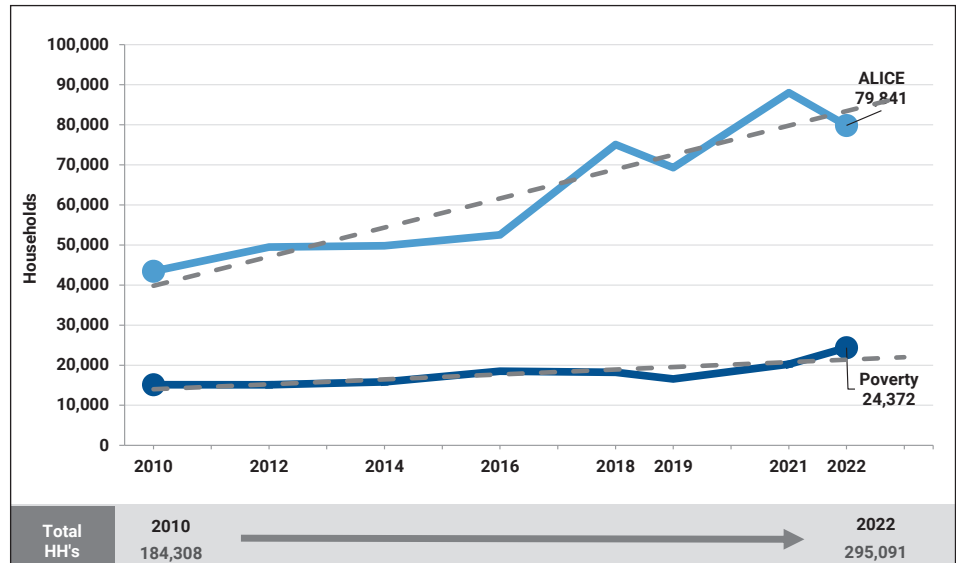

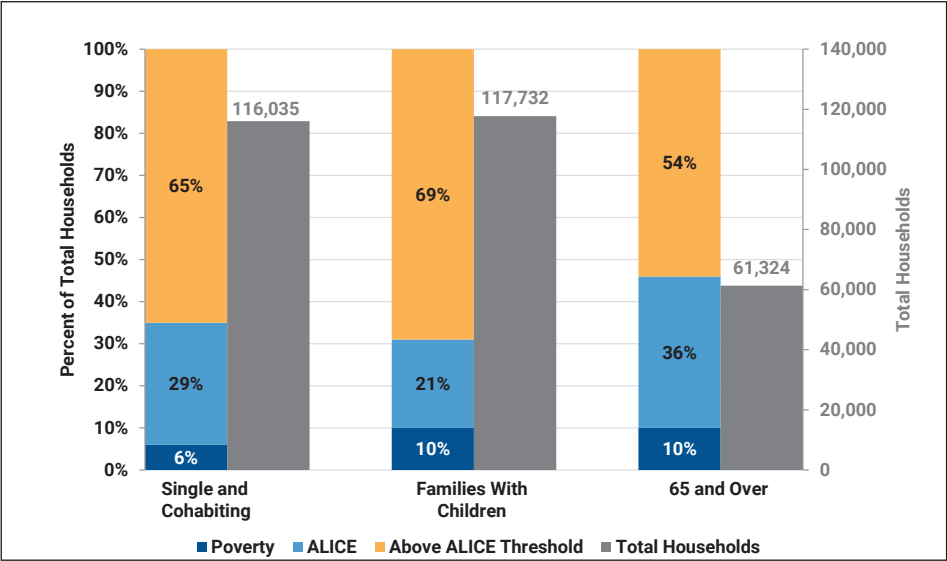

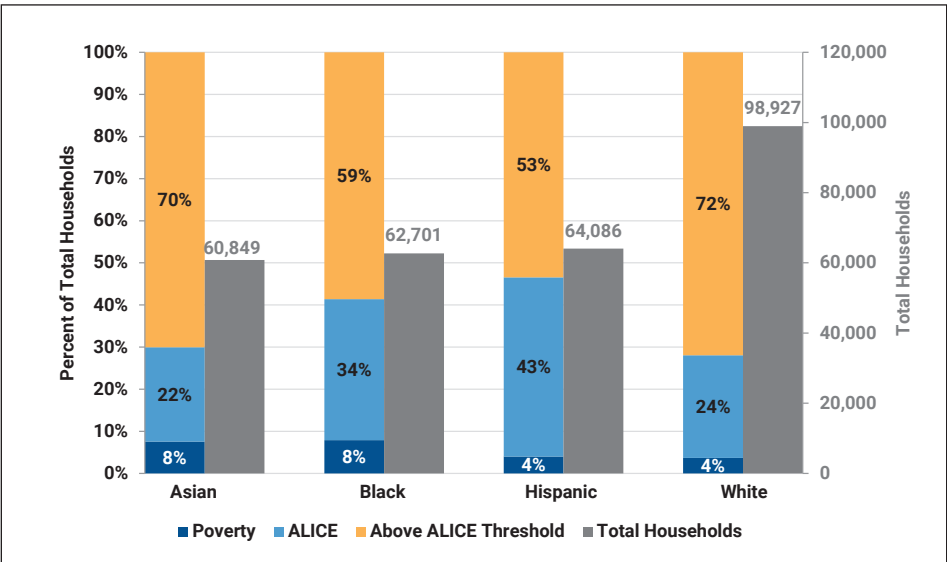

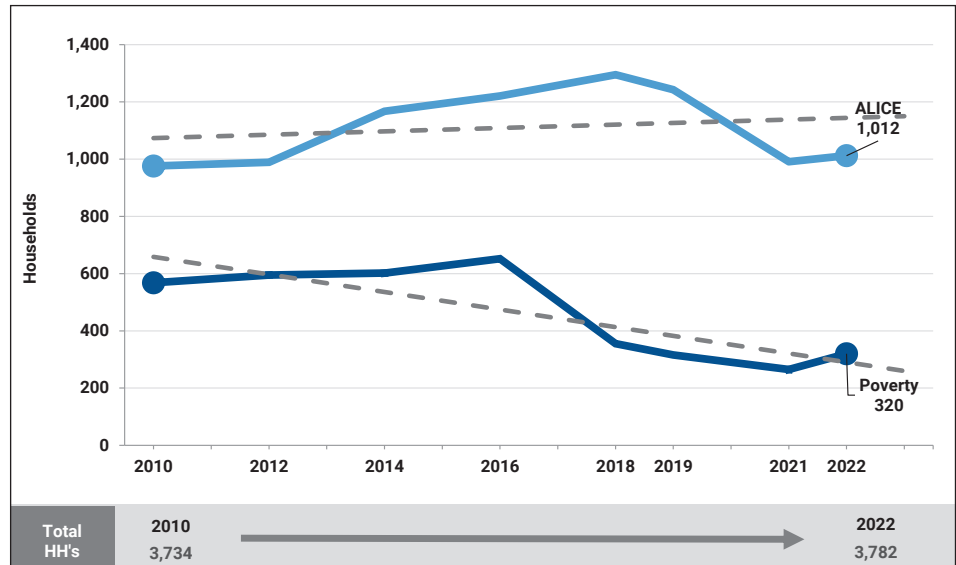

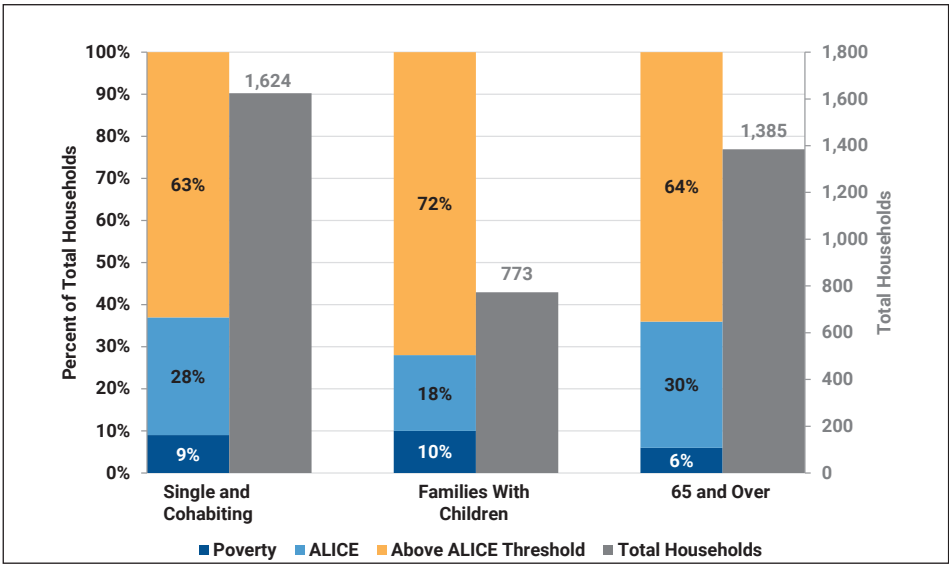

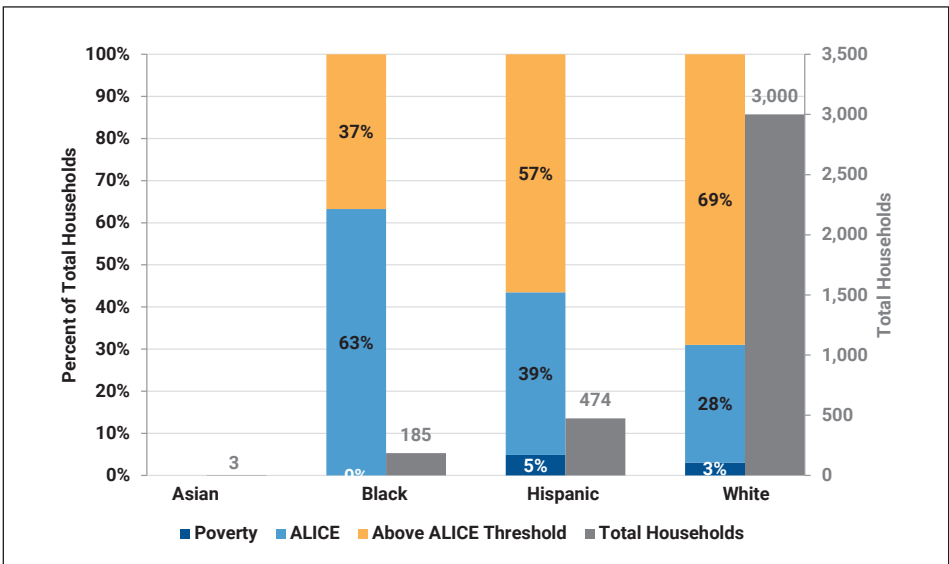

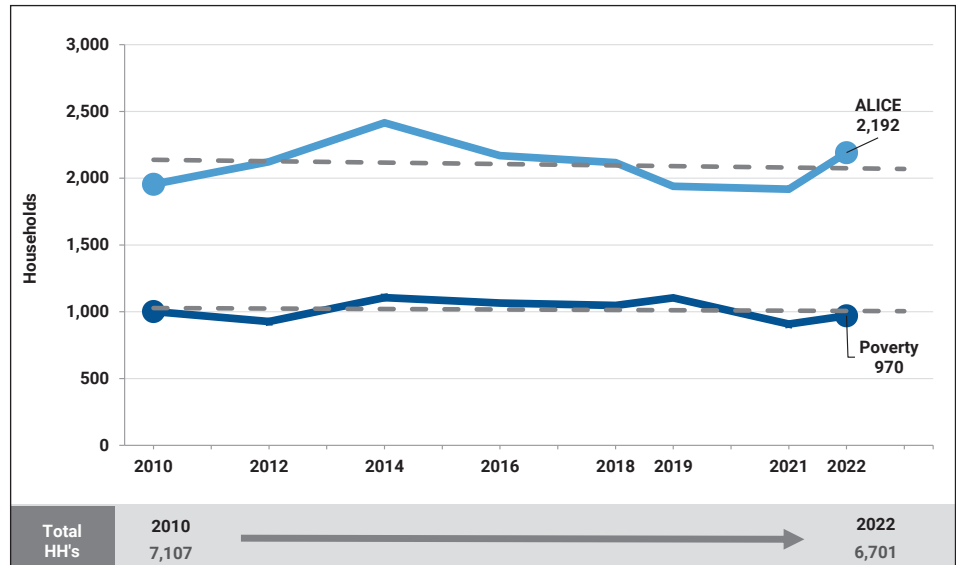

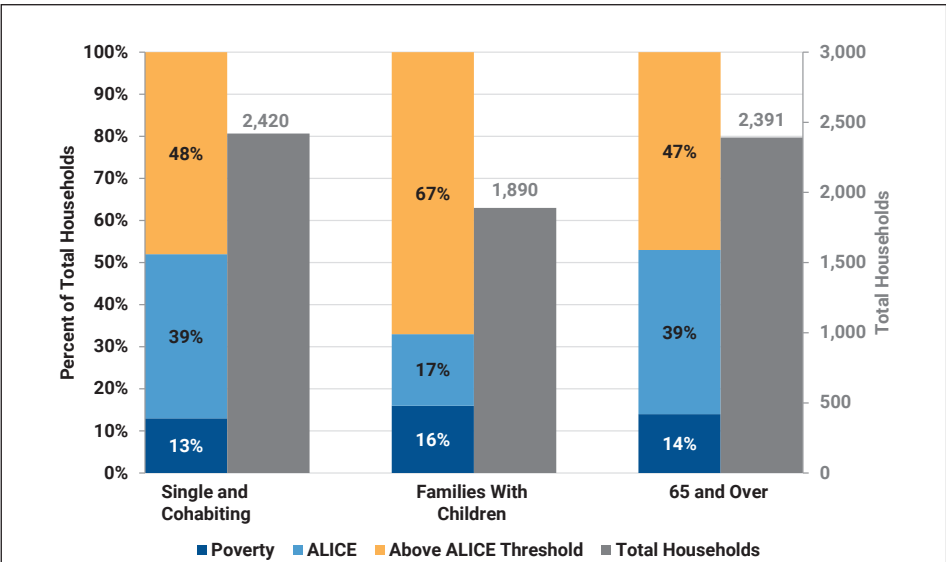

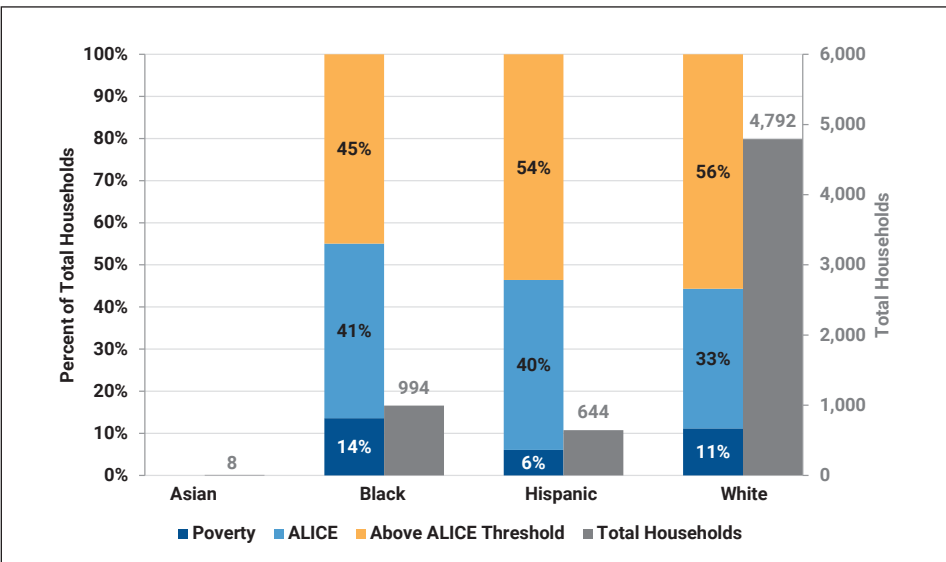

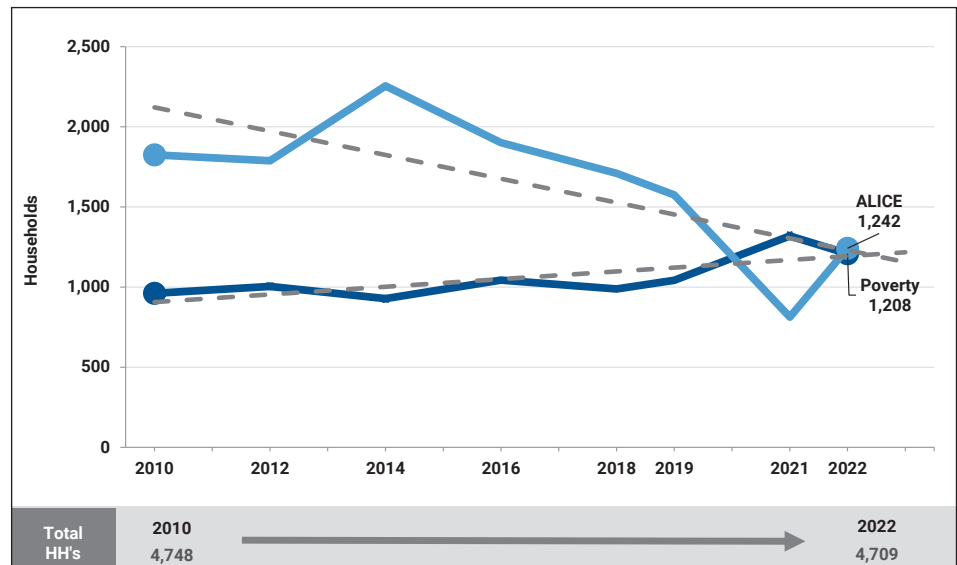

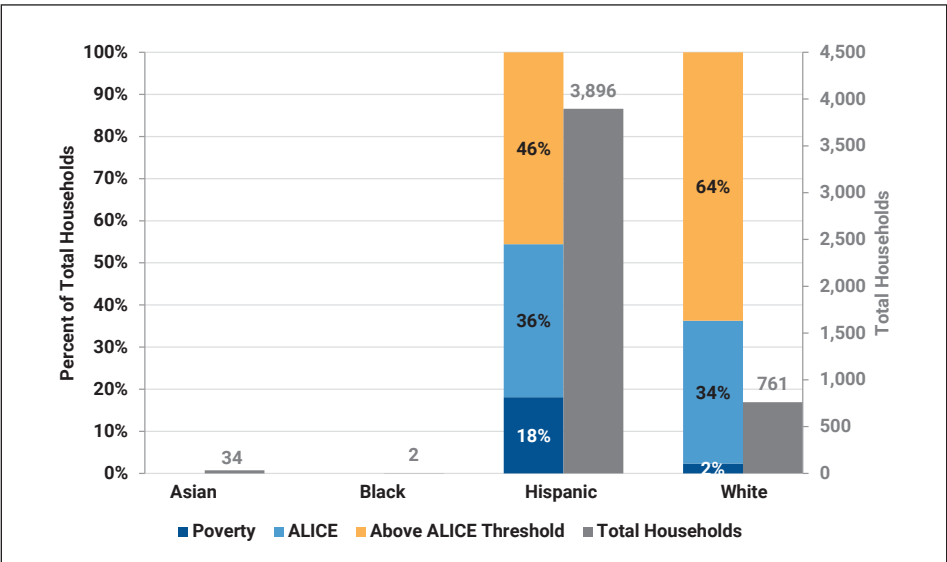

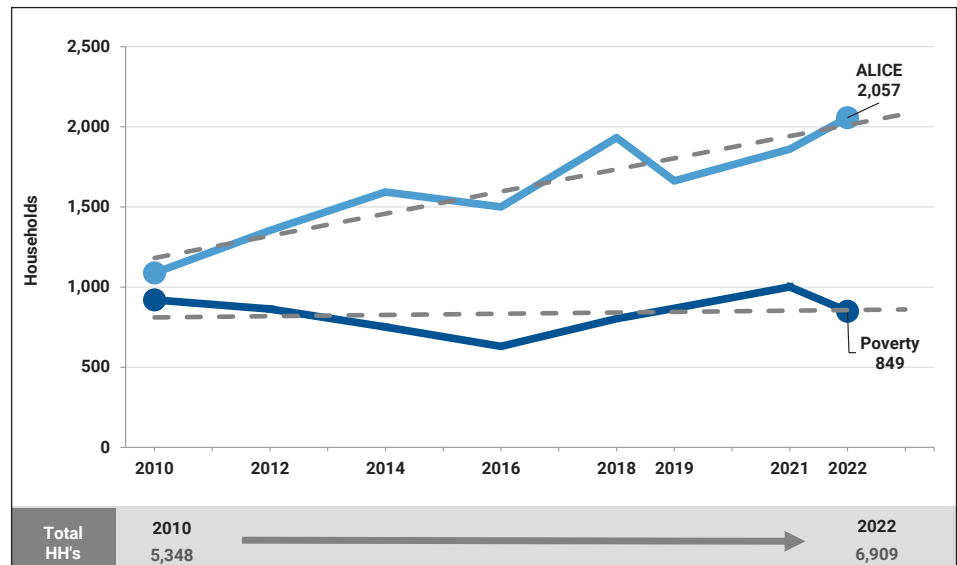

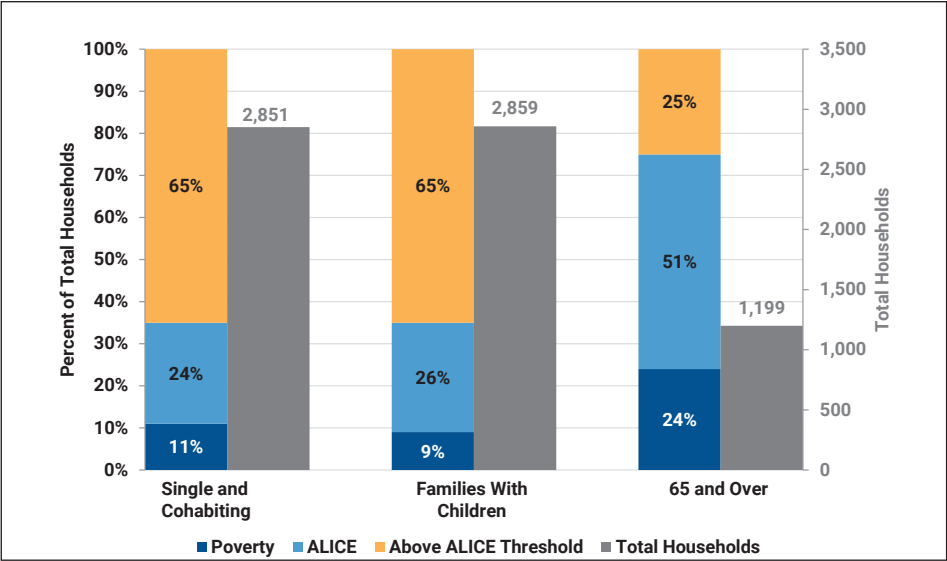

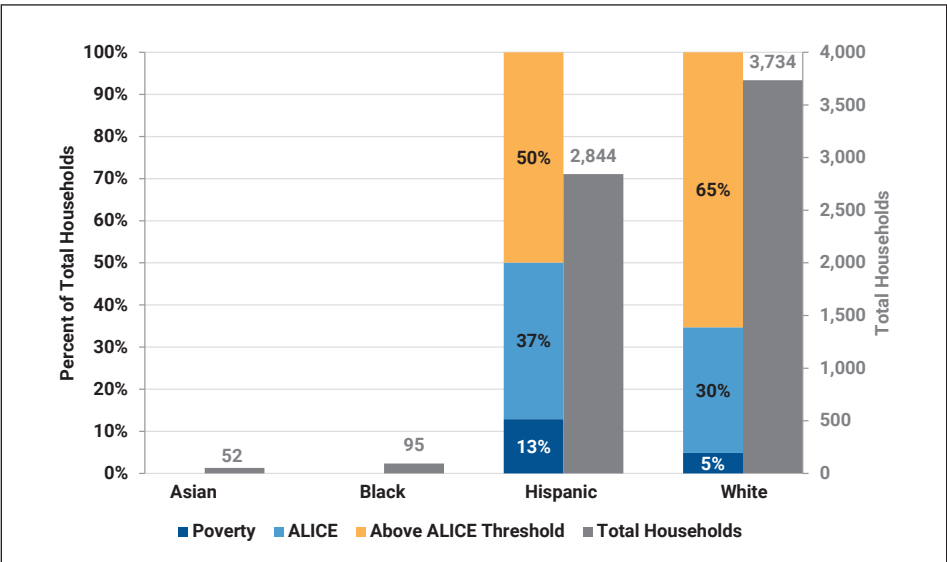

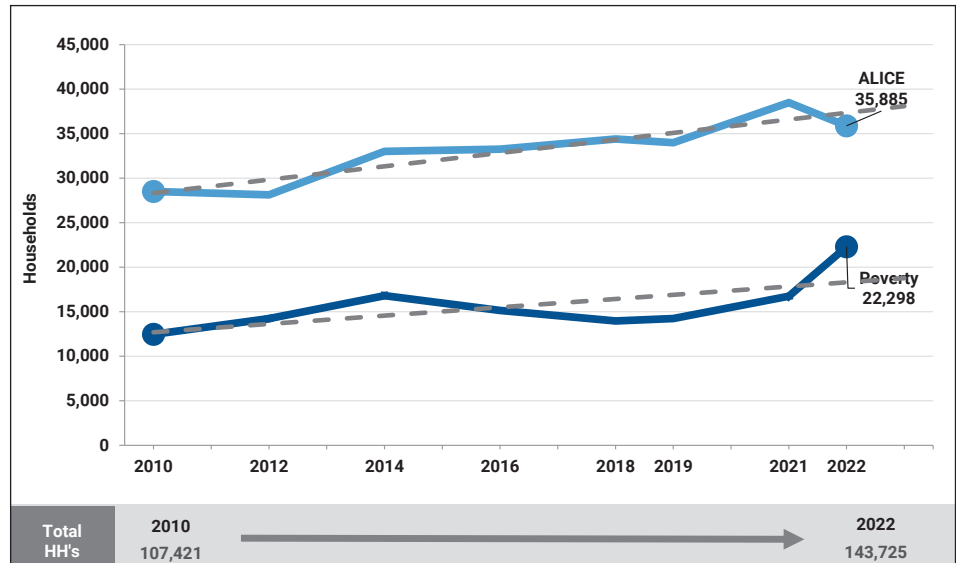

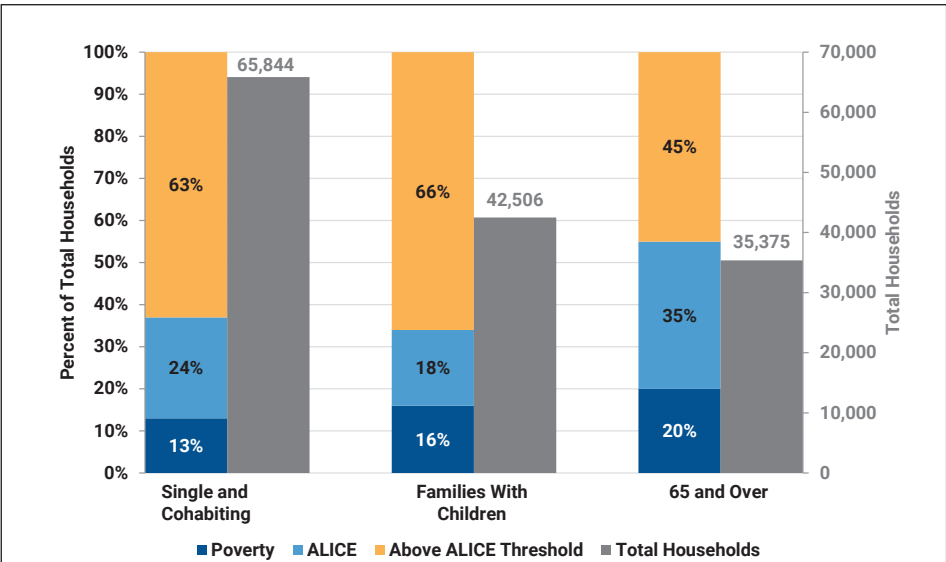

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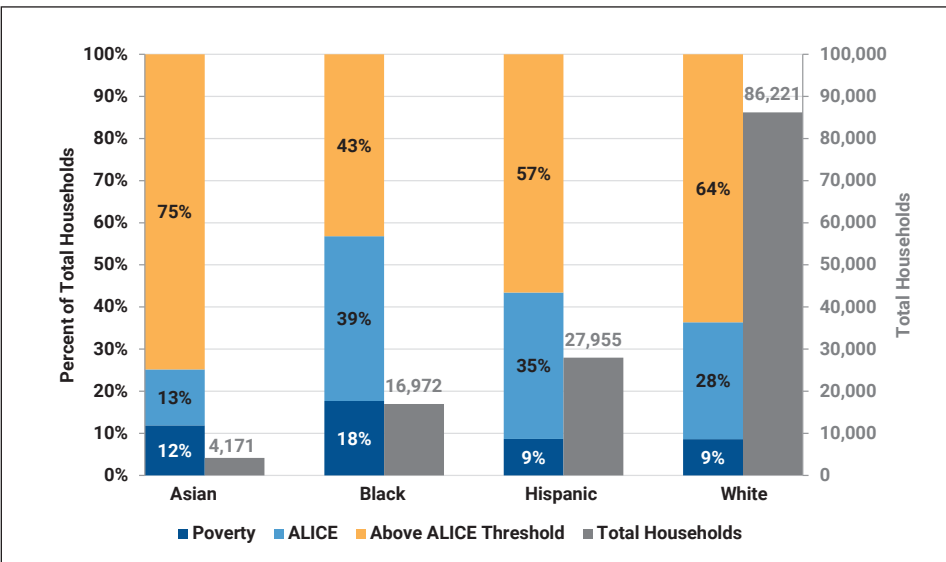

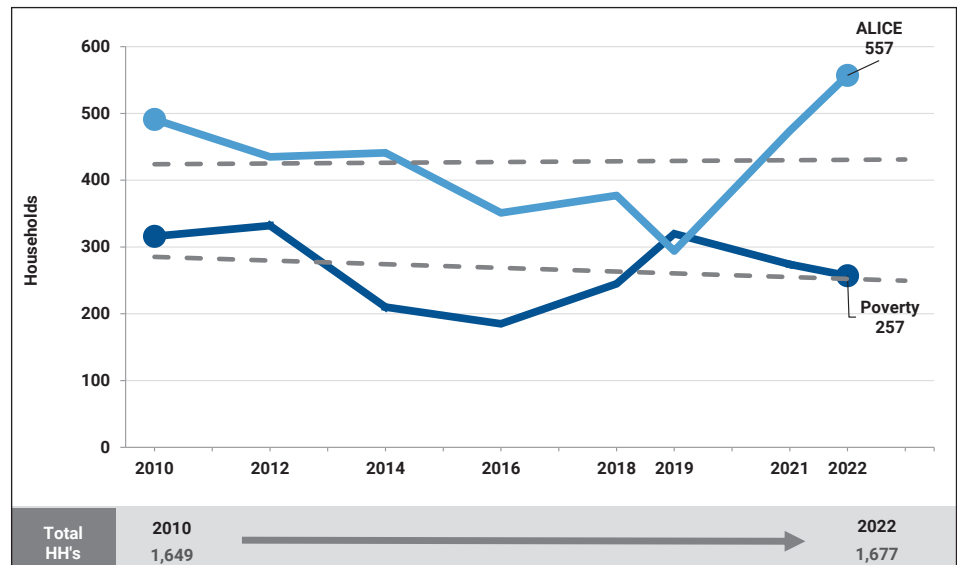

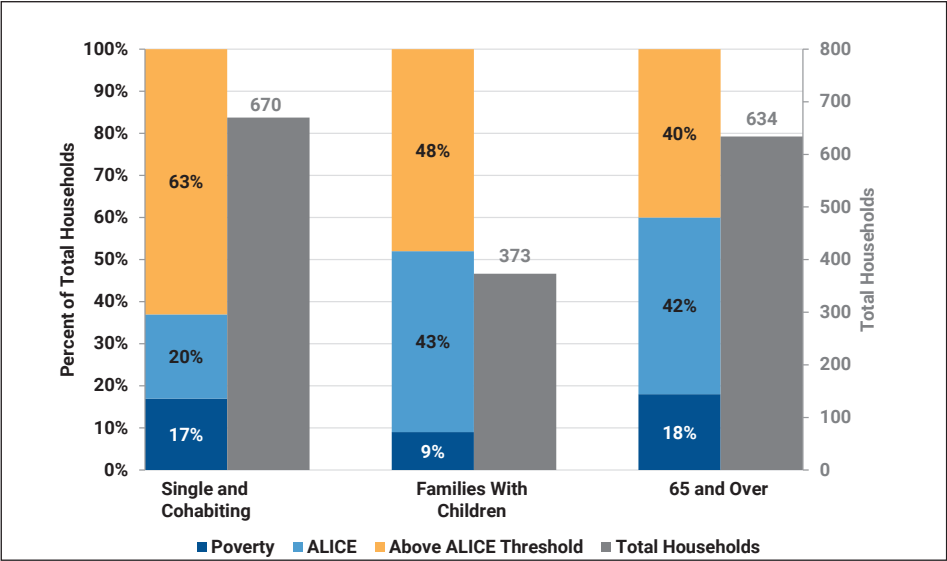

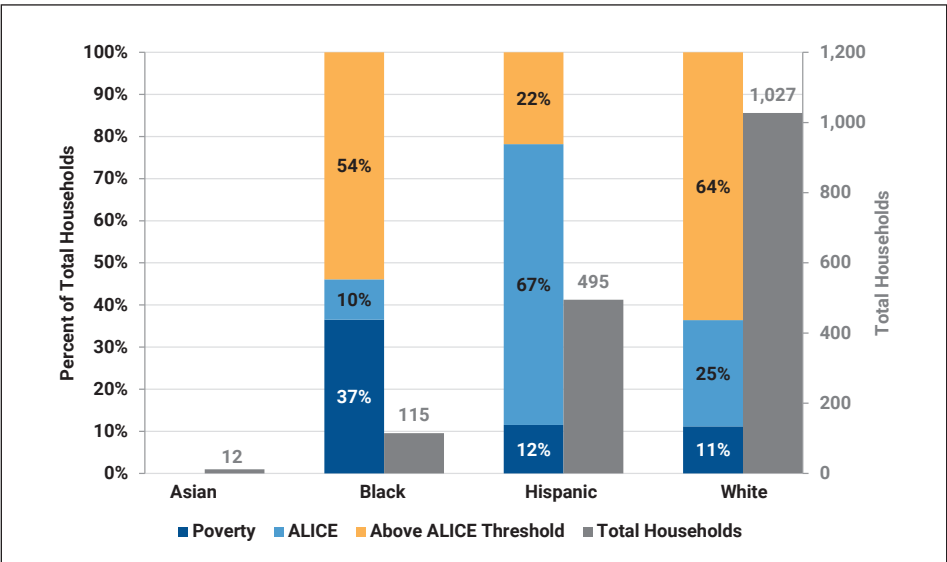

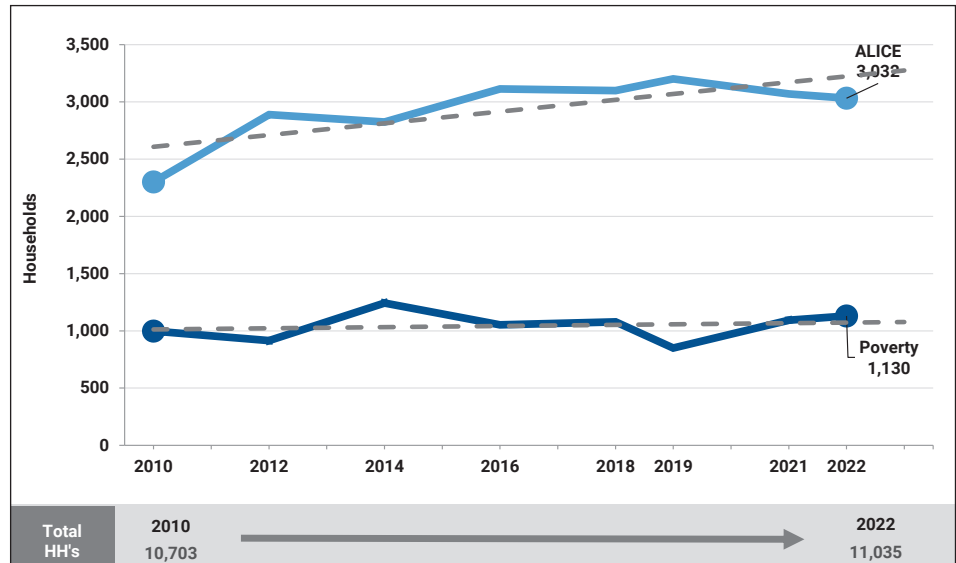

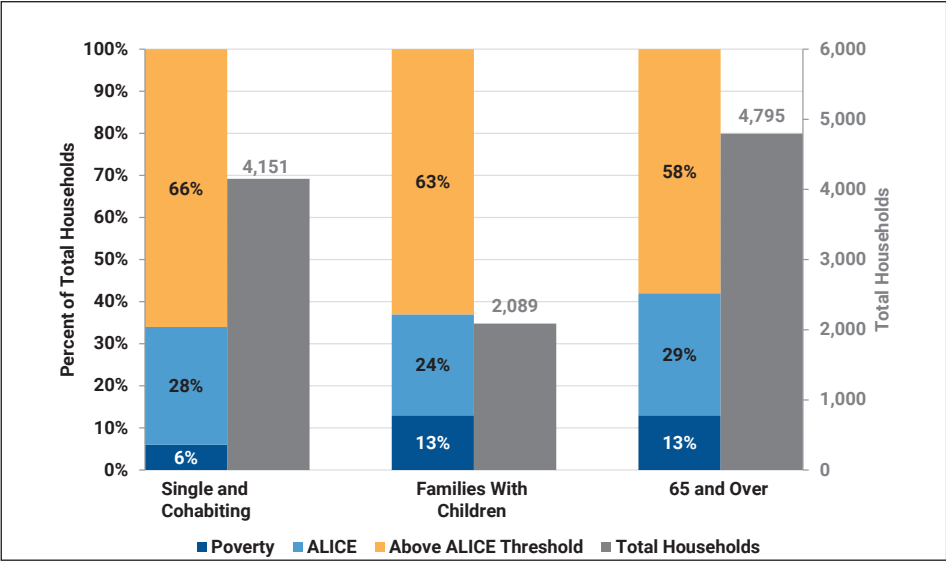

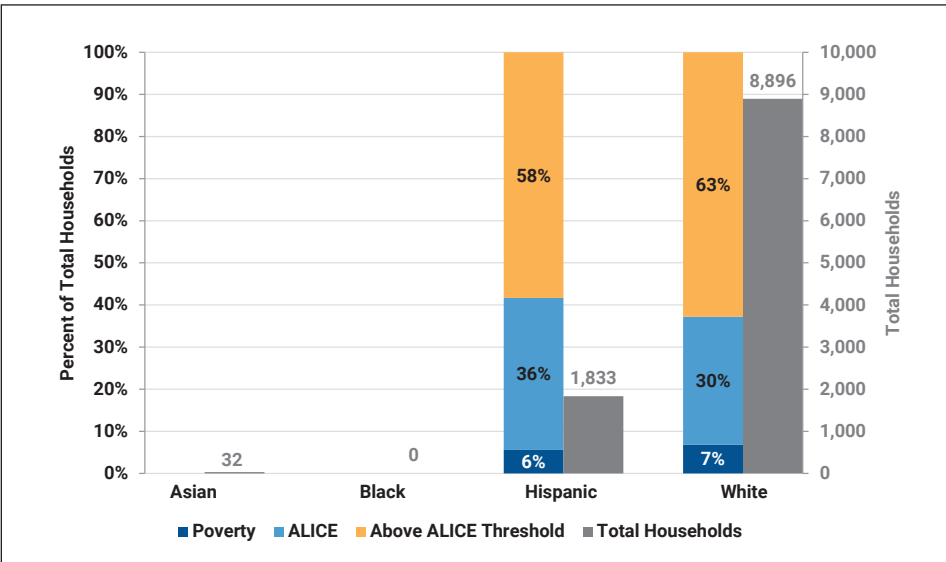

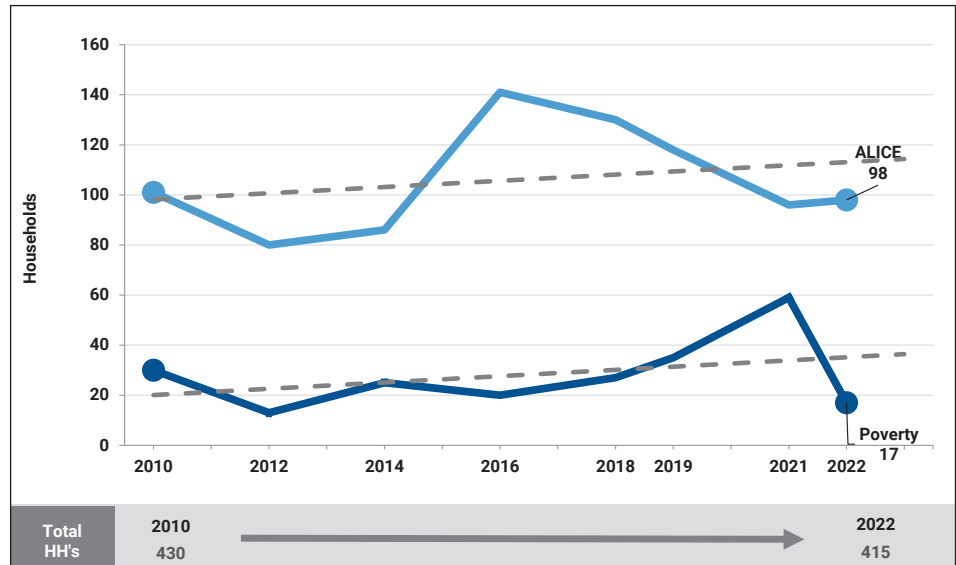

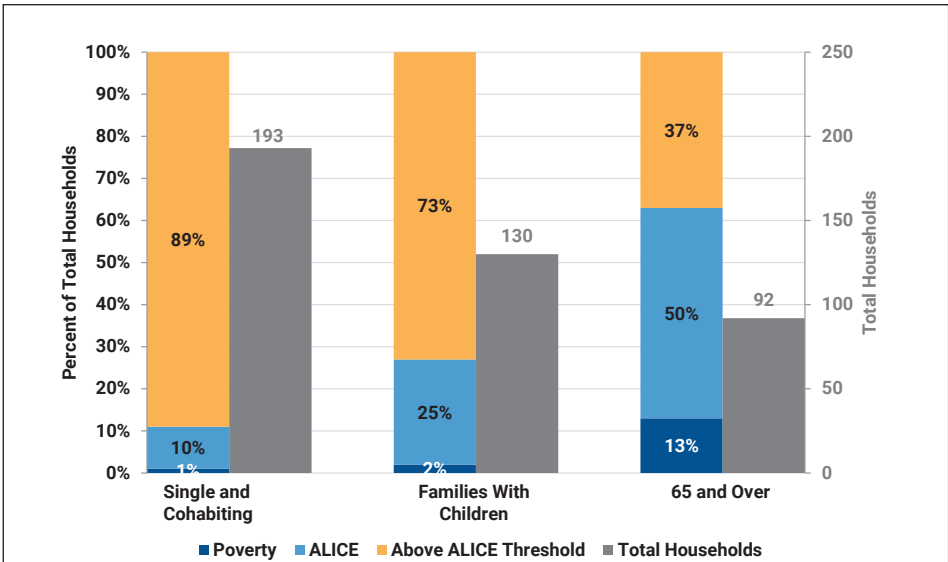

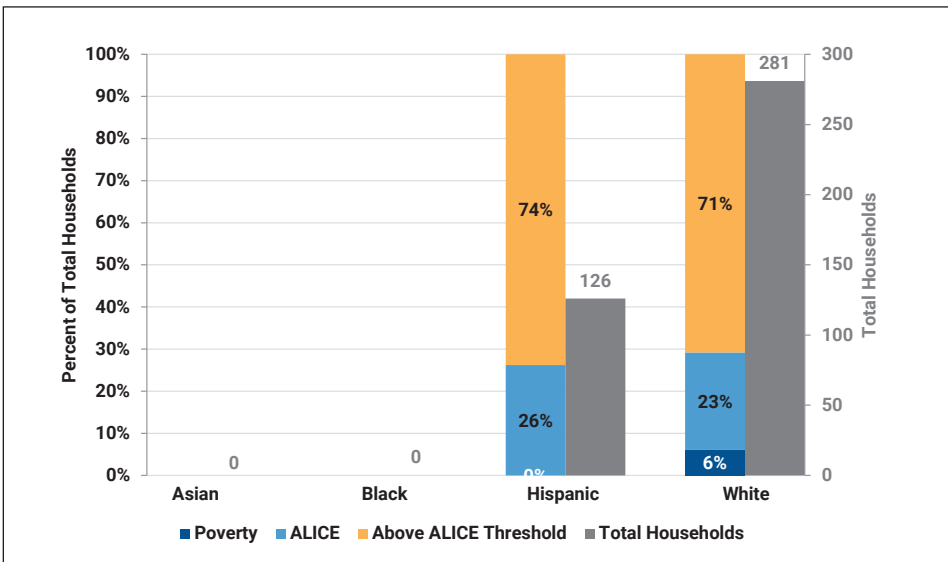

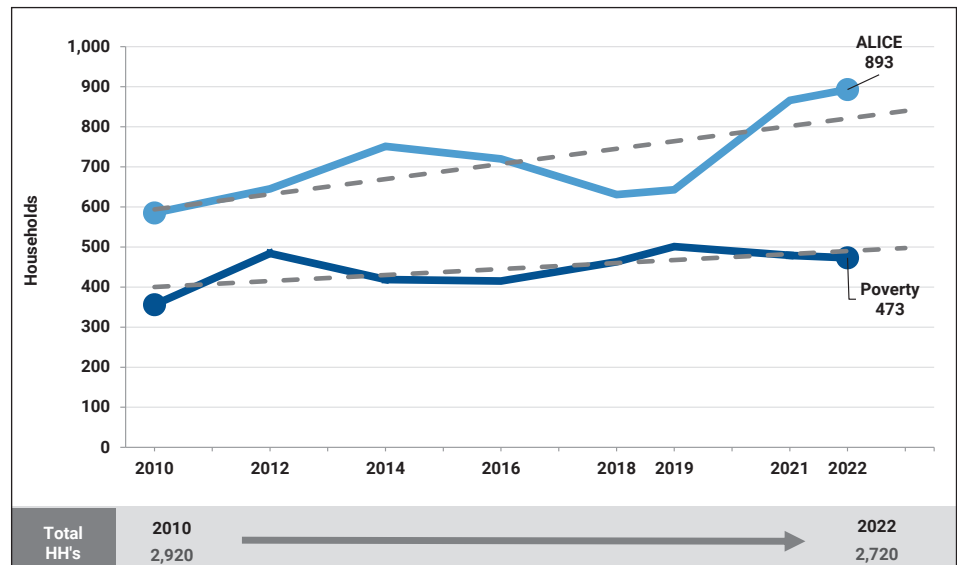

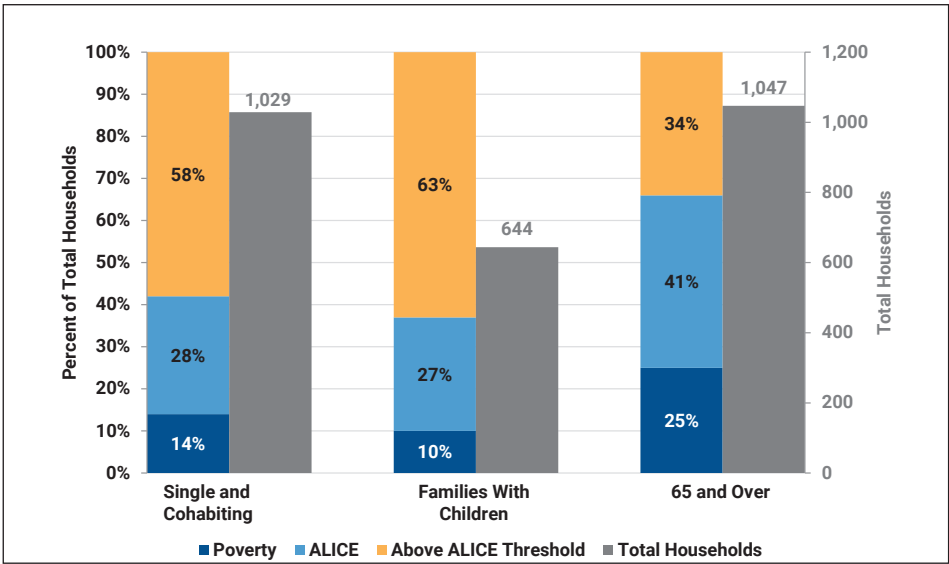

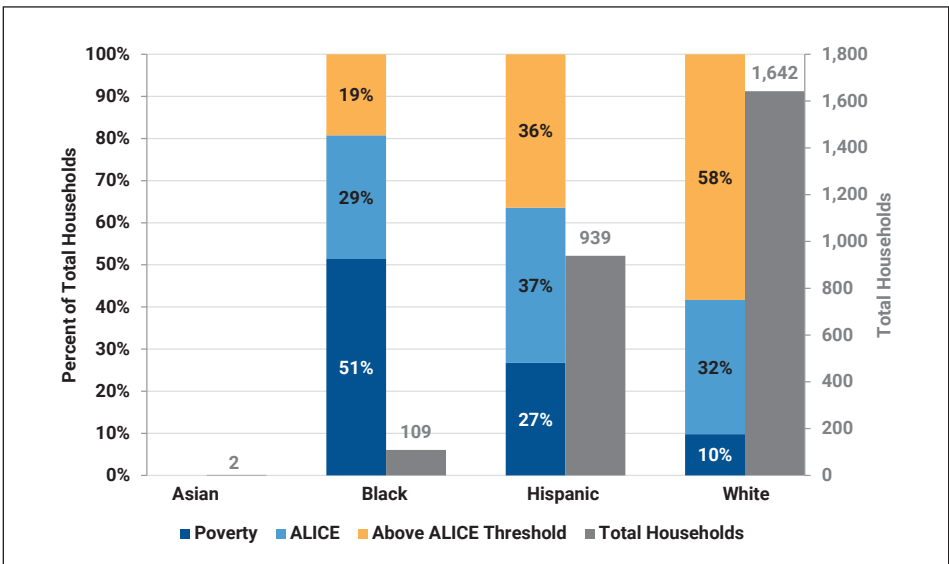

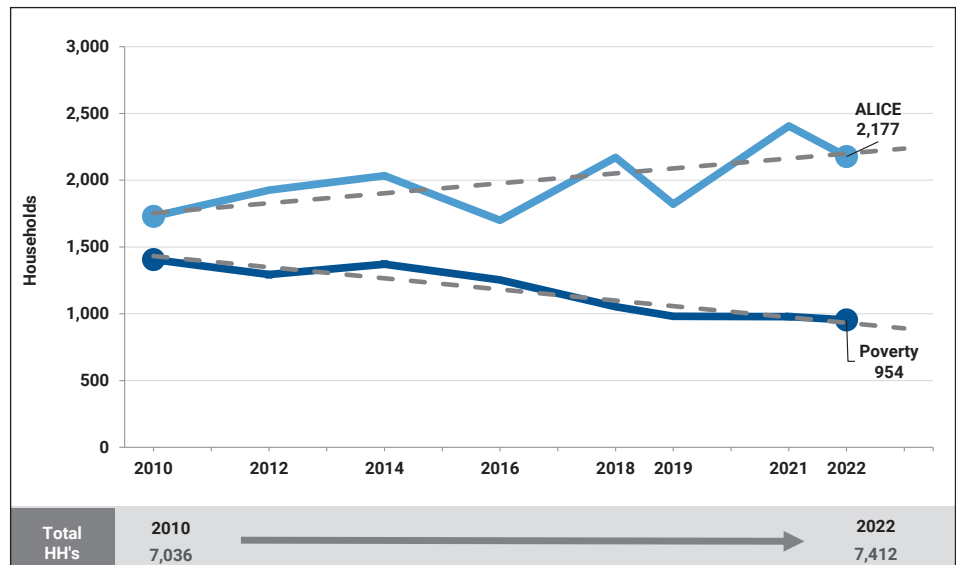

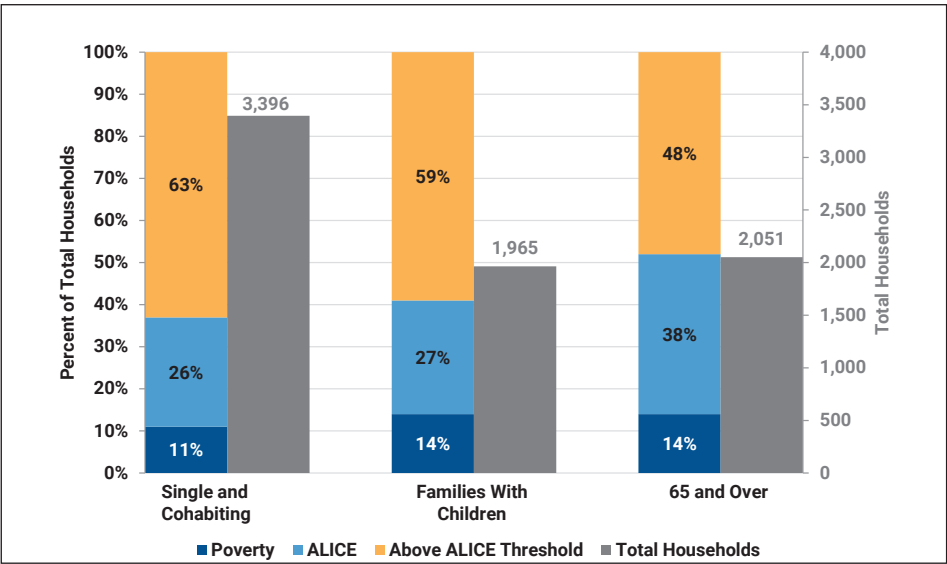

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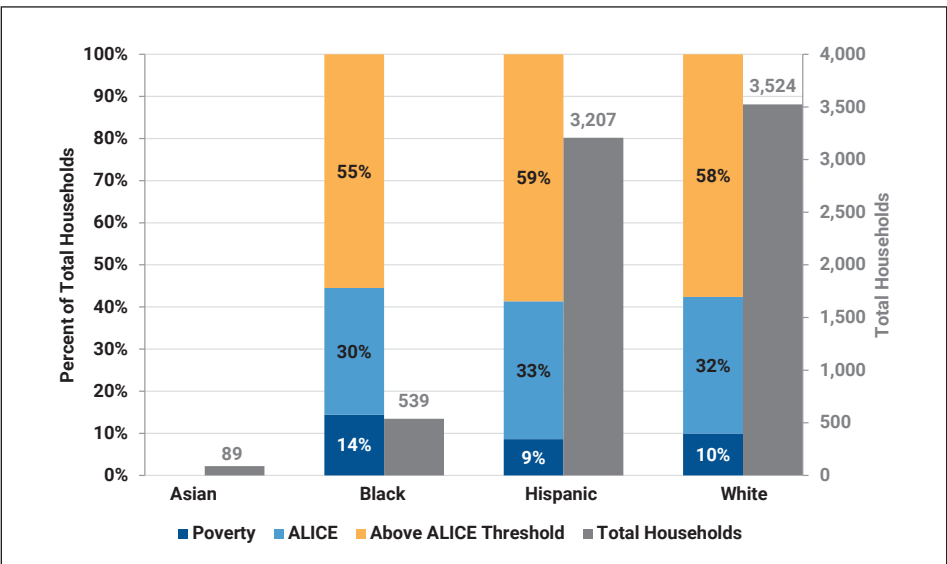
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Gonzales County, 2022

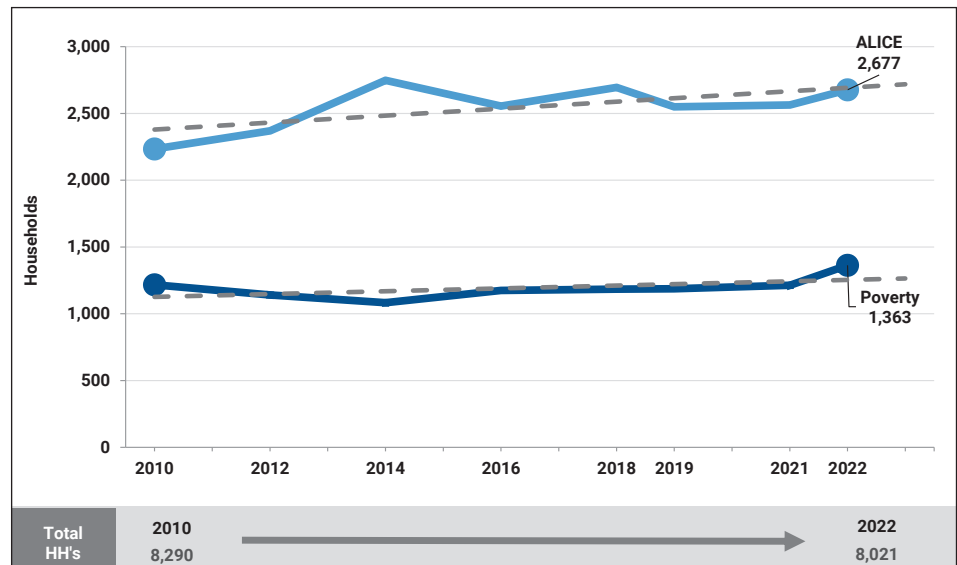

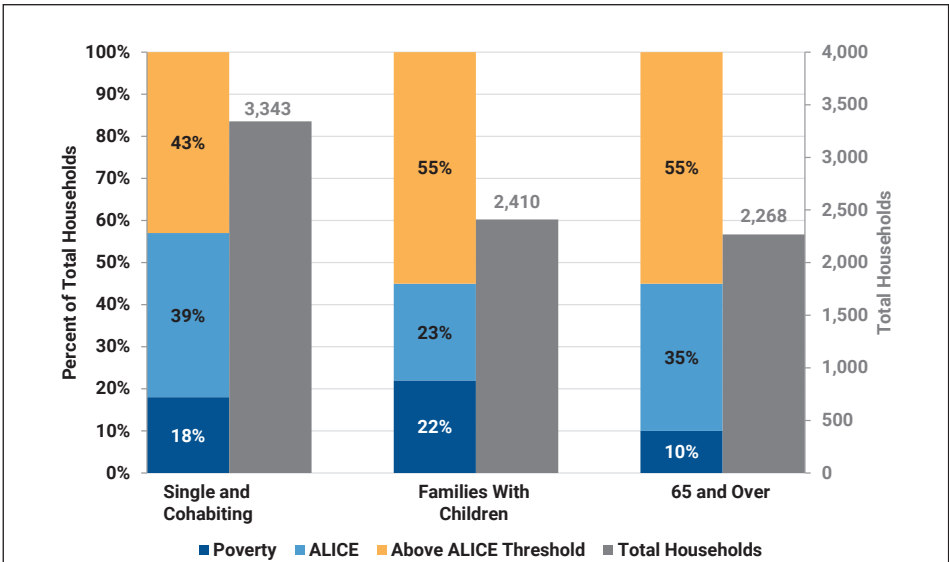

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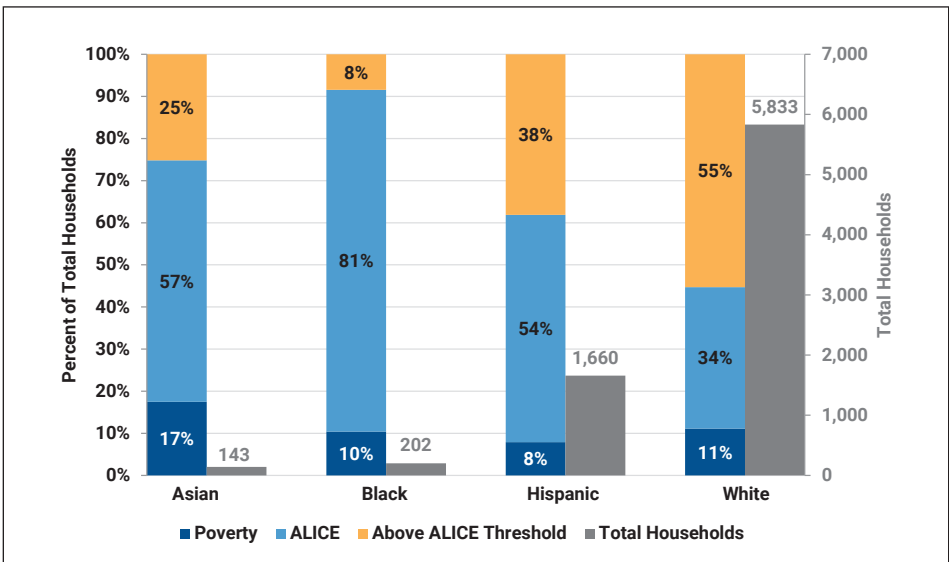

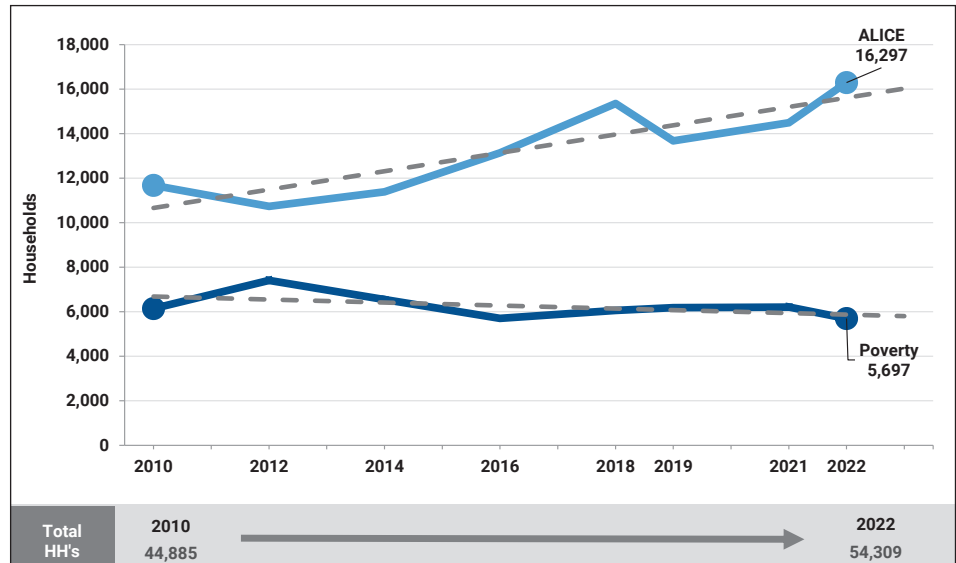

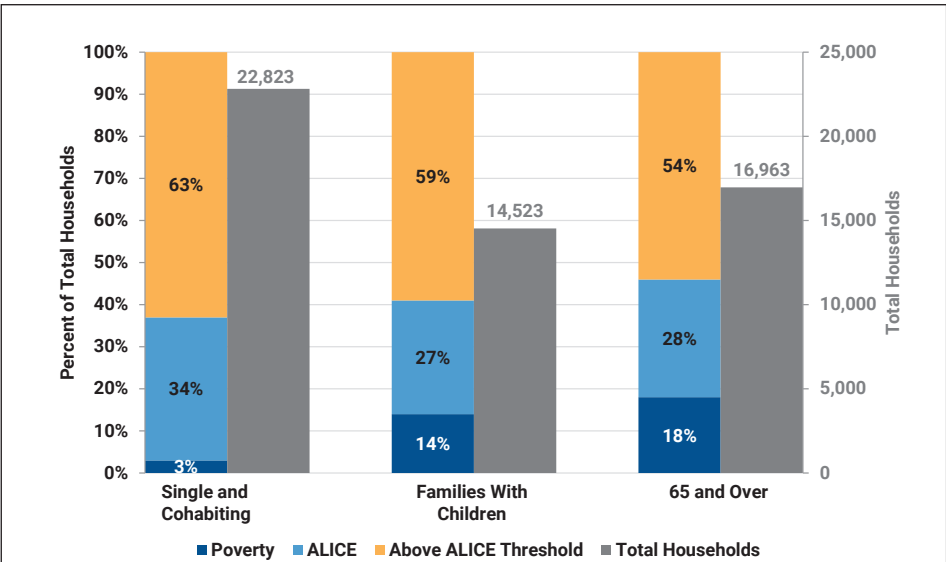

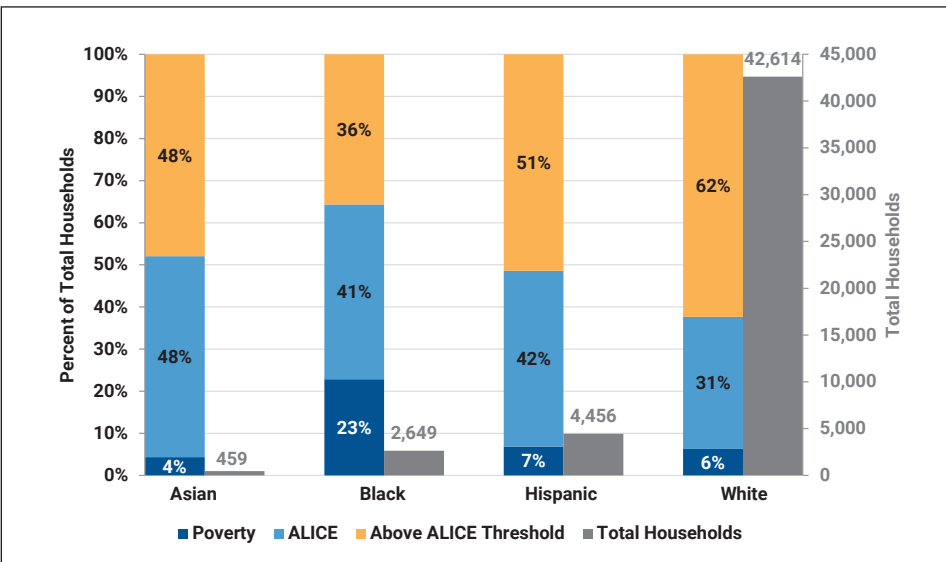

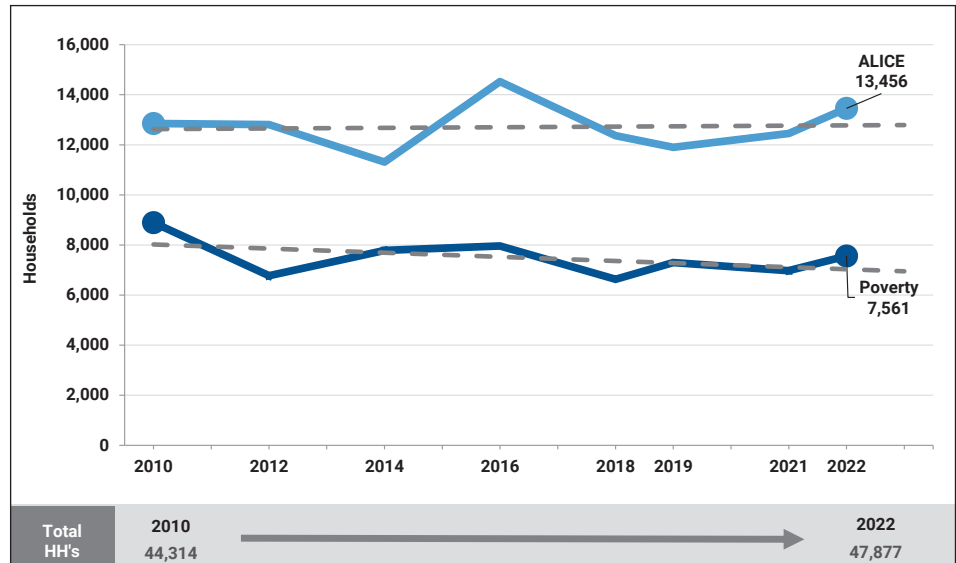

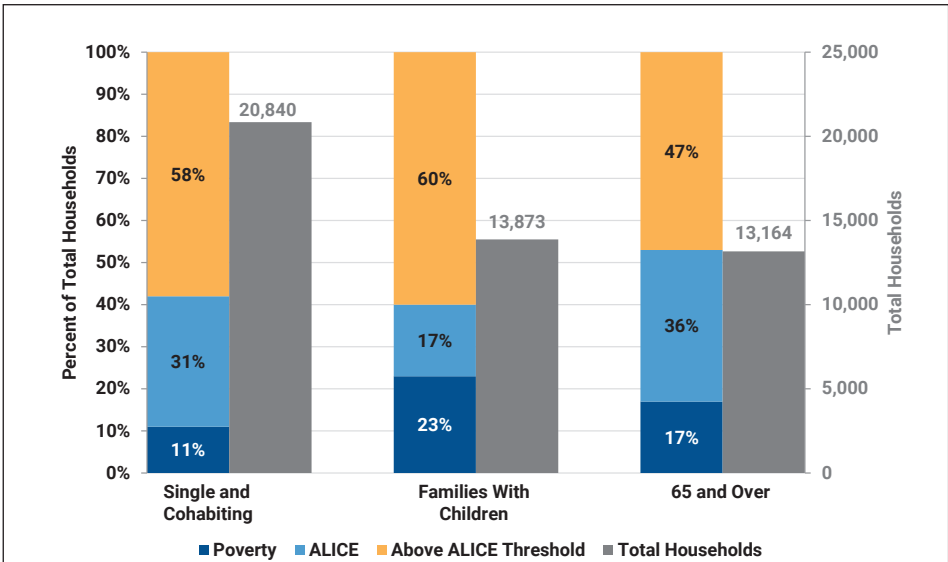

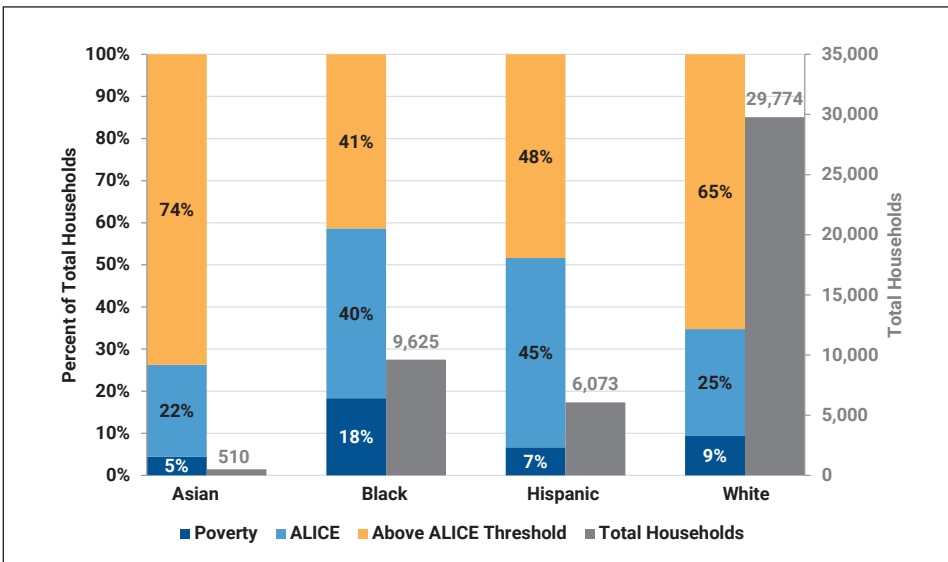

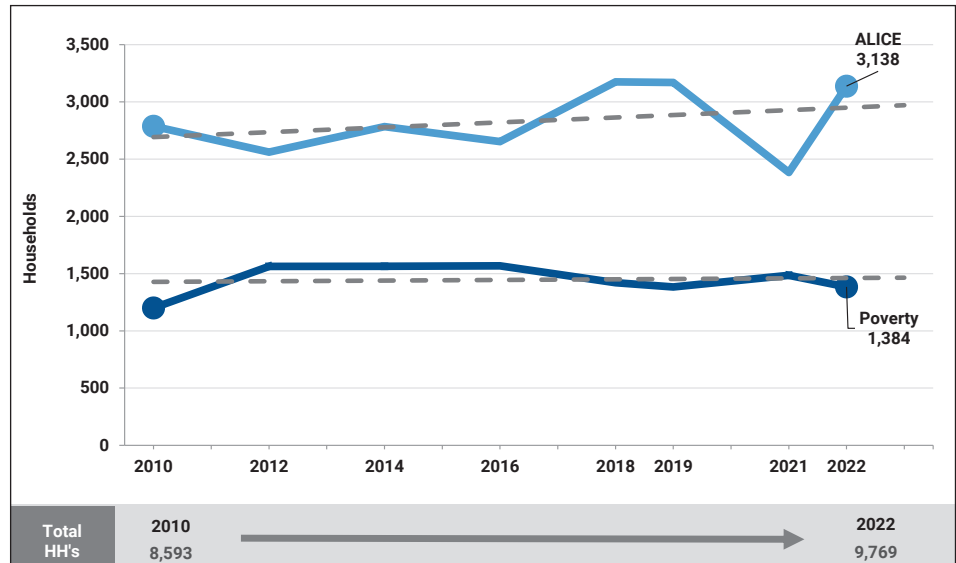

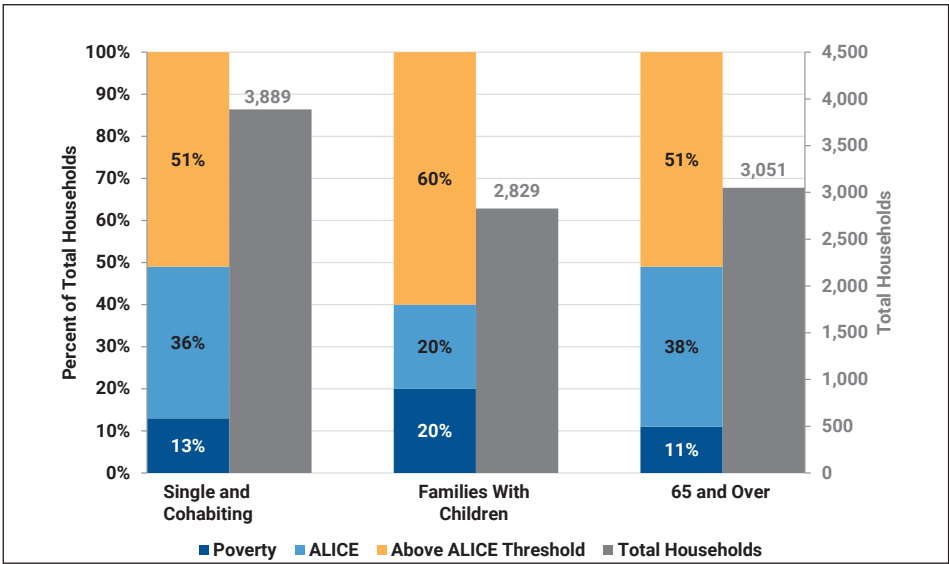

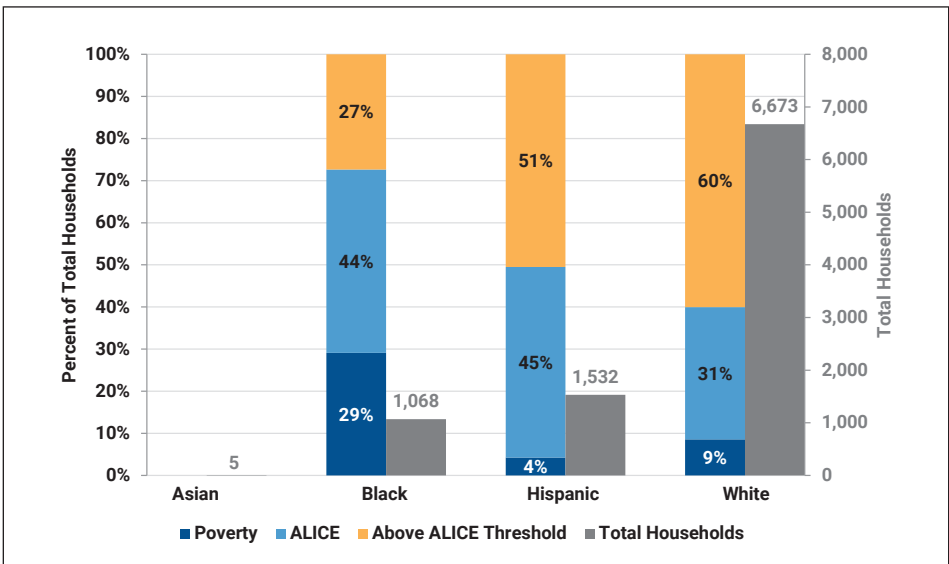

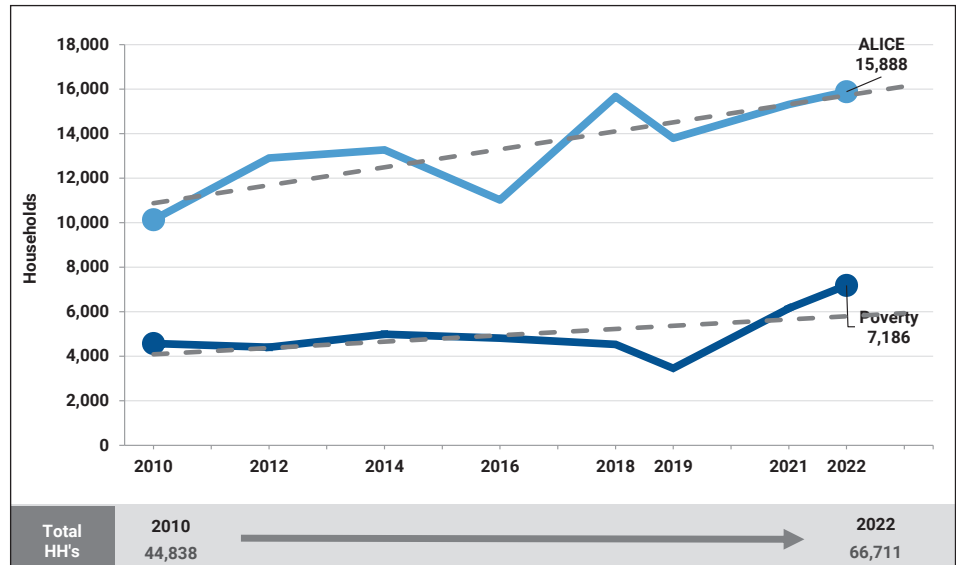

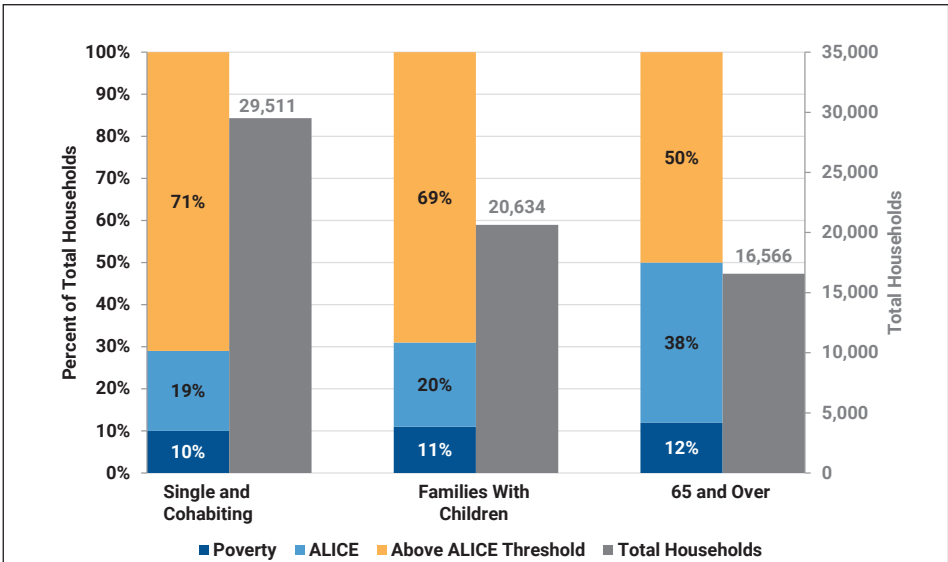

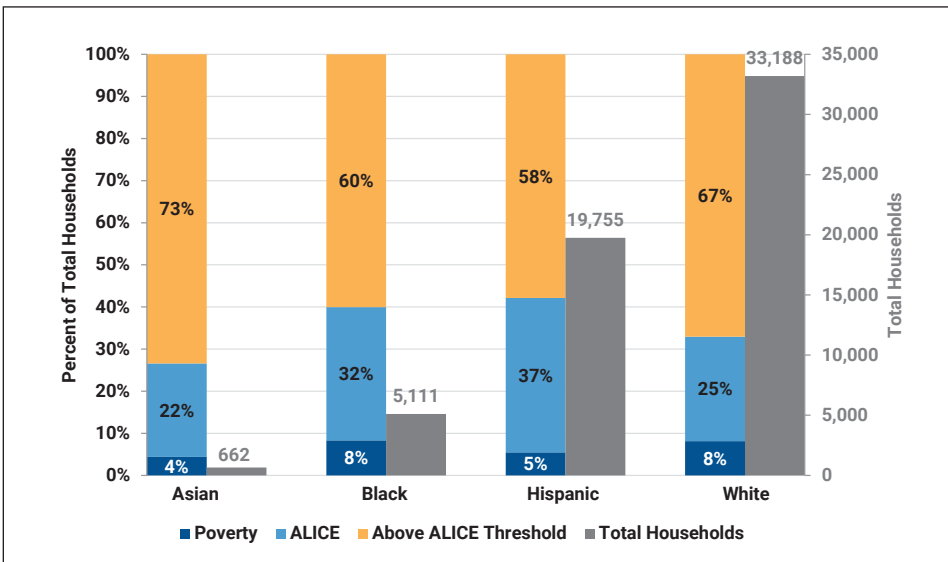

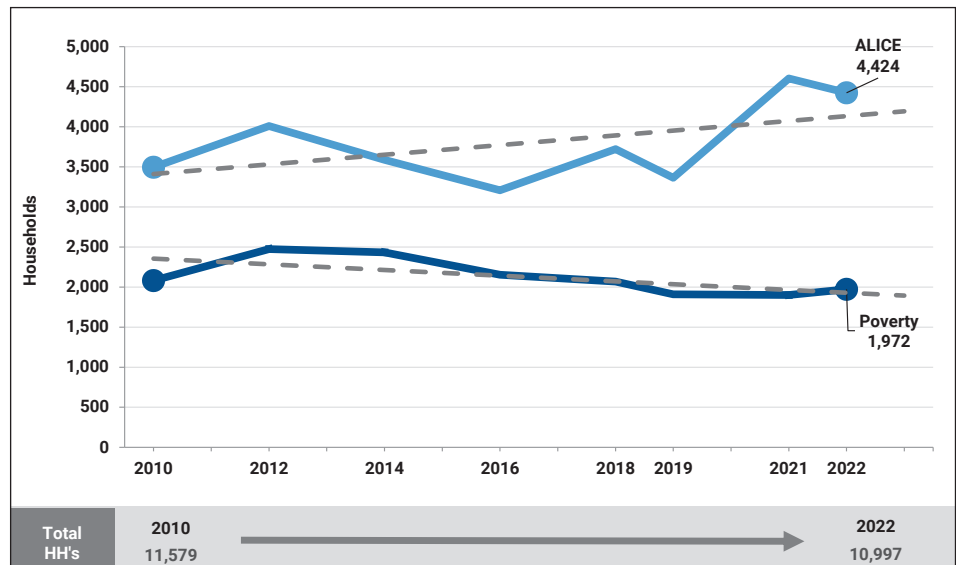

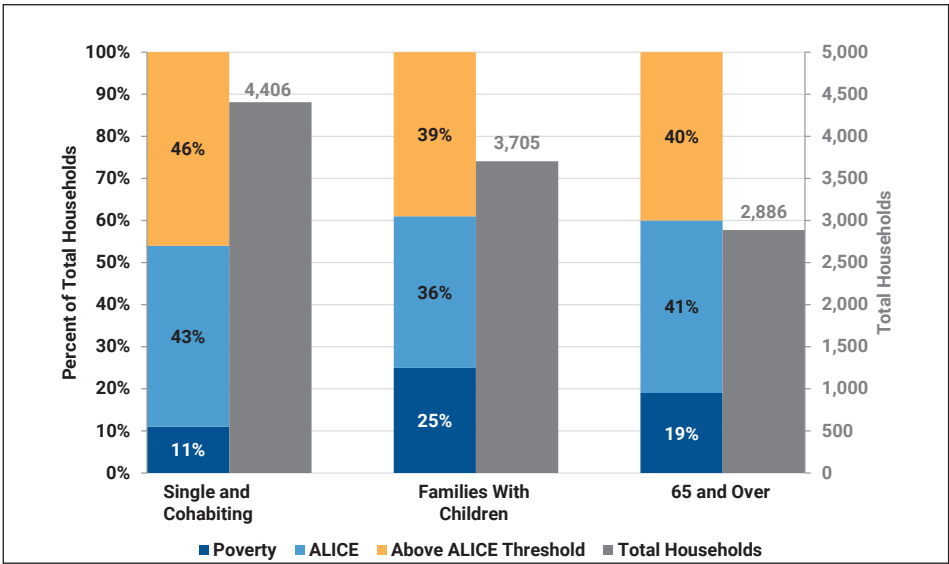

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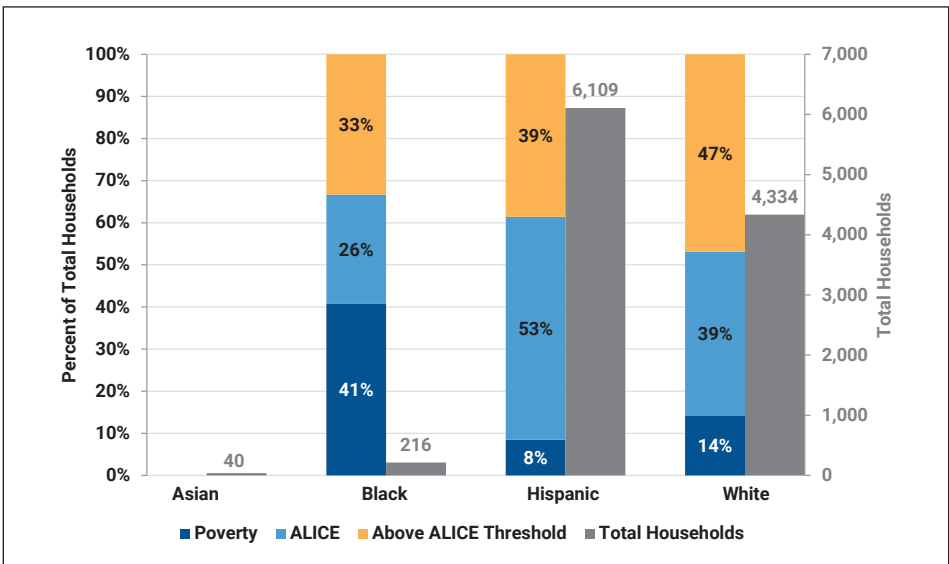

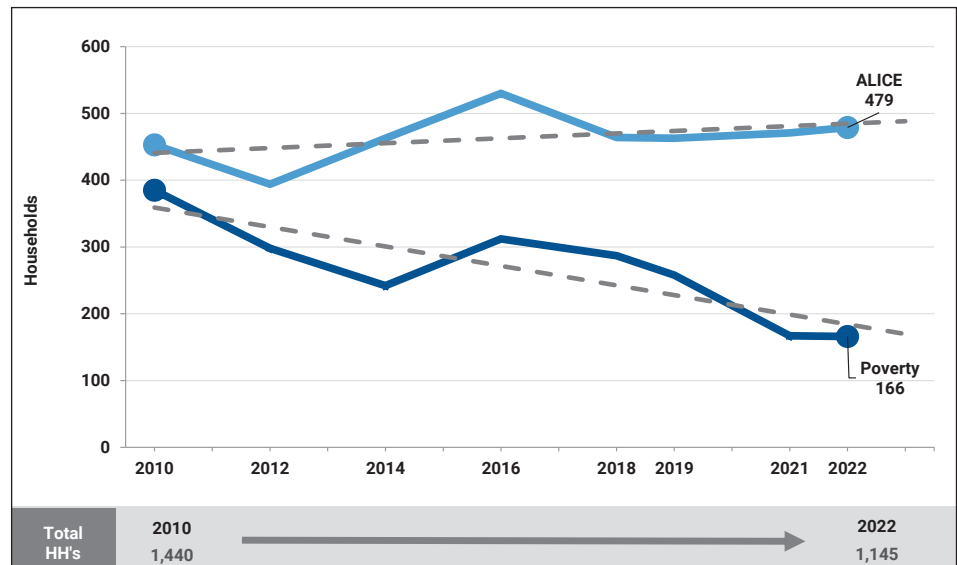

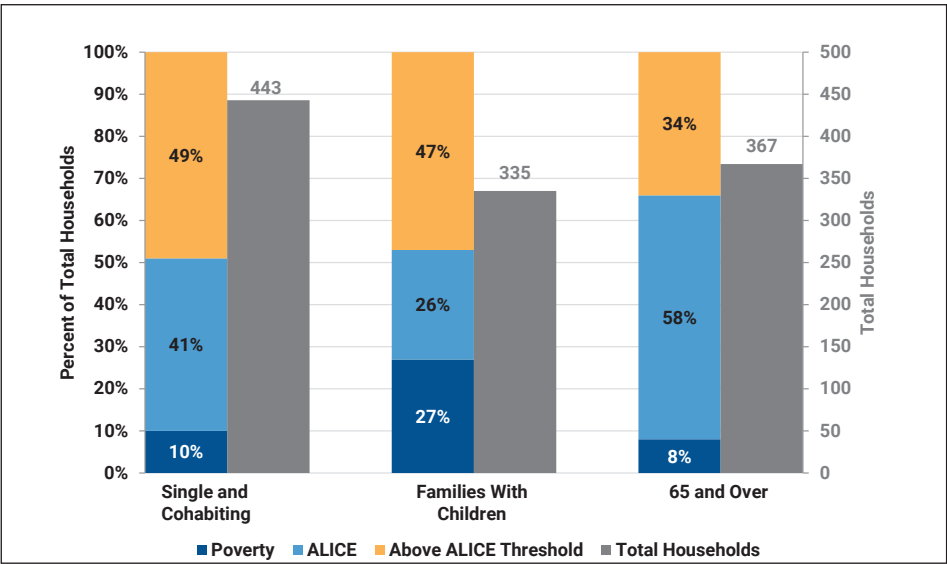

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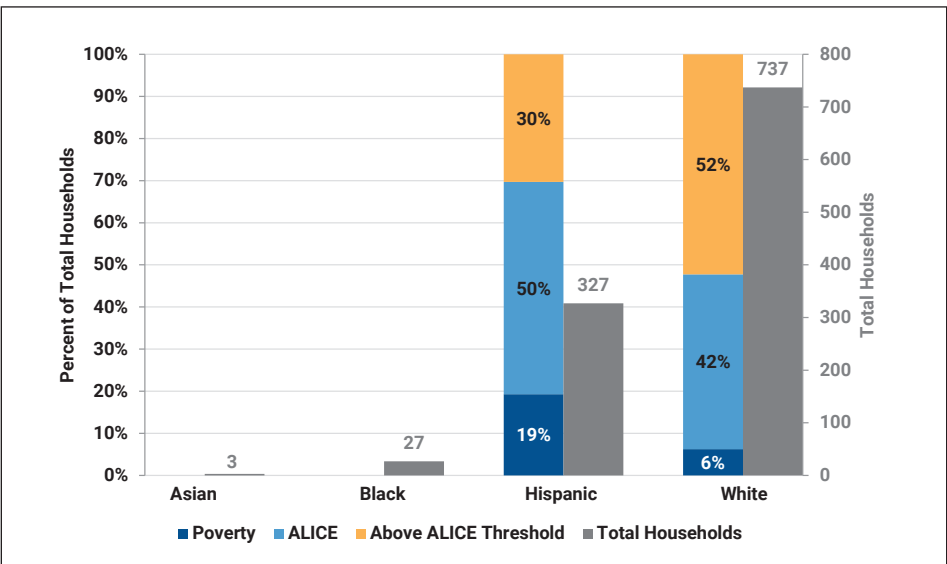

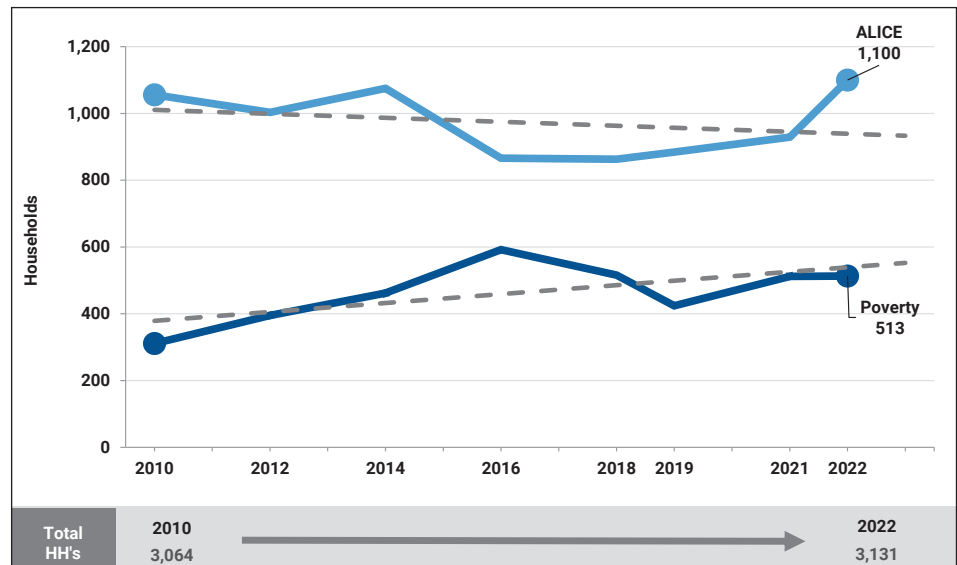

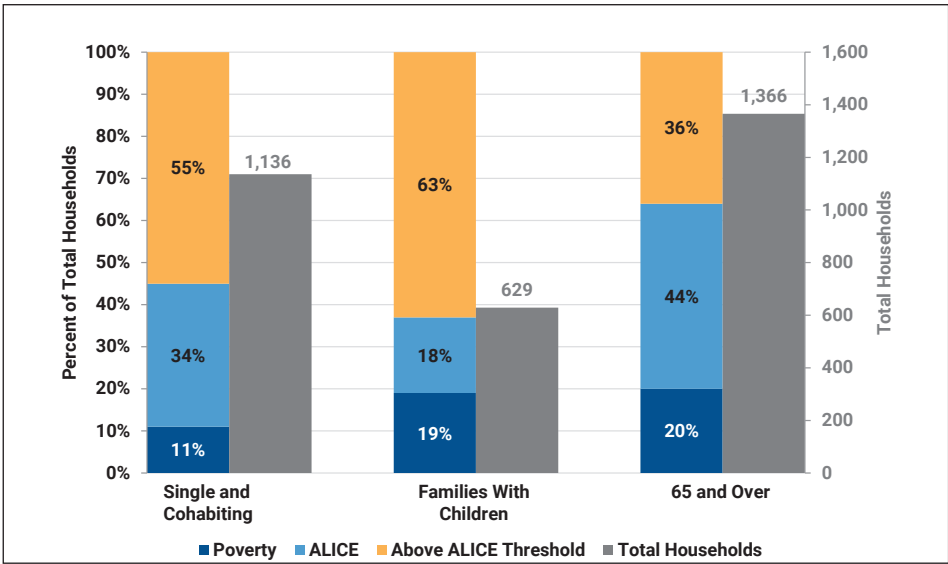

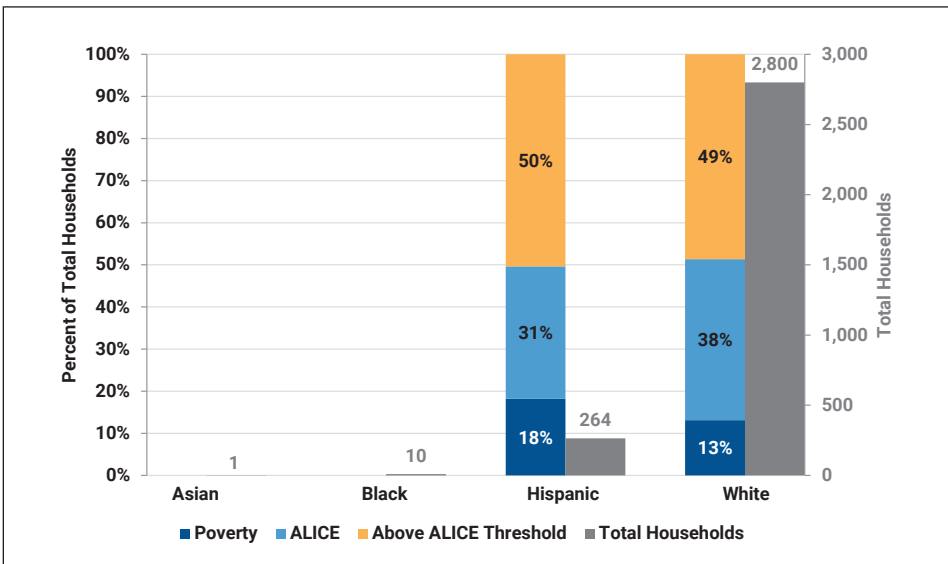

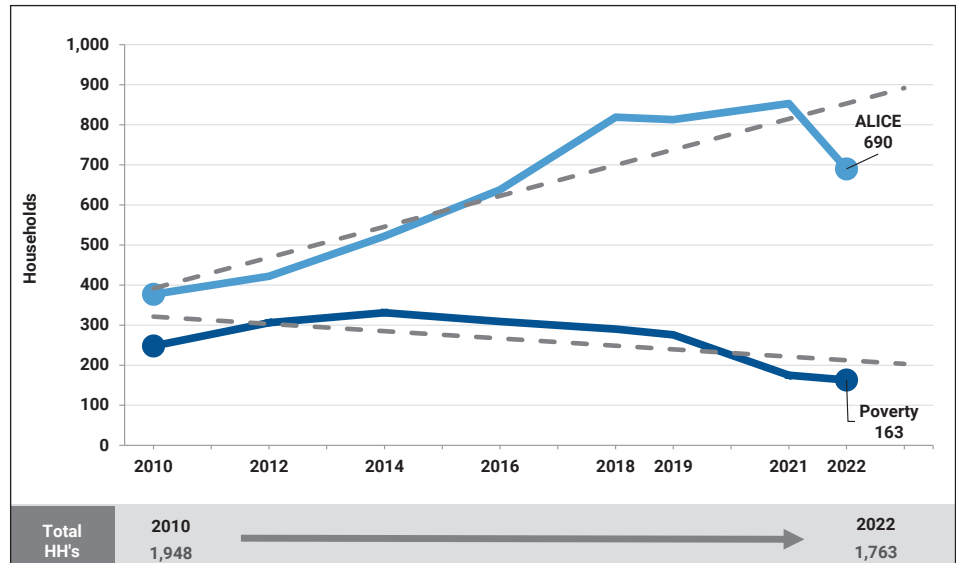

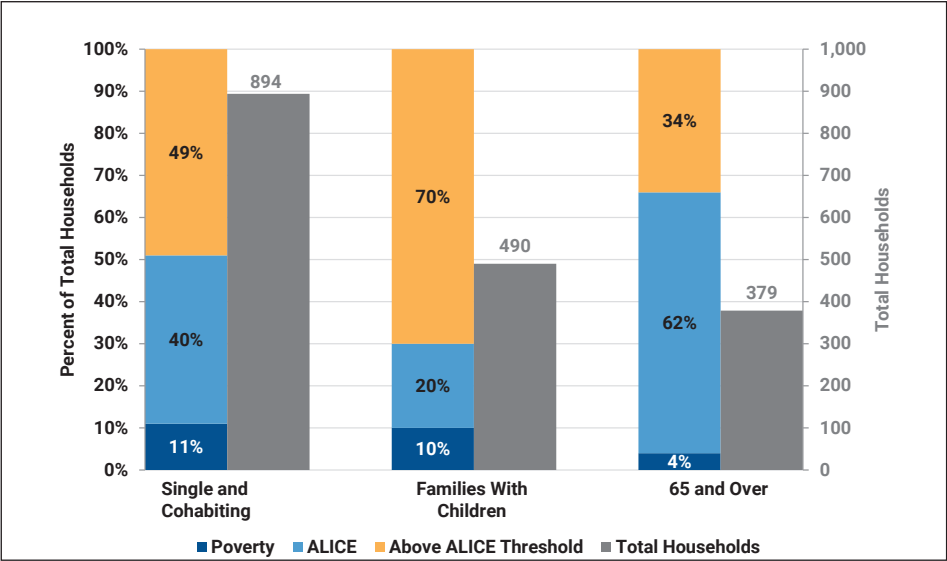

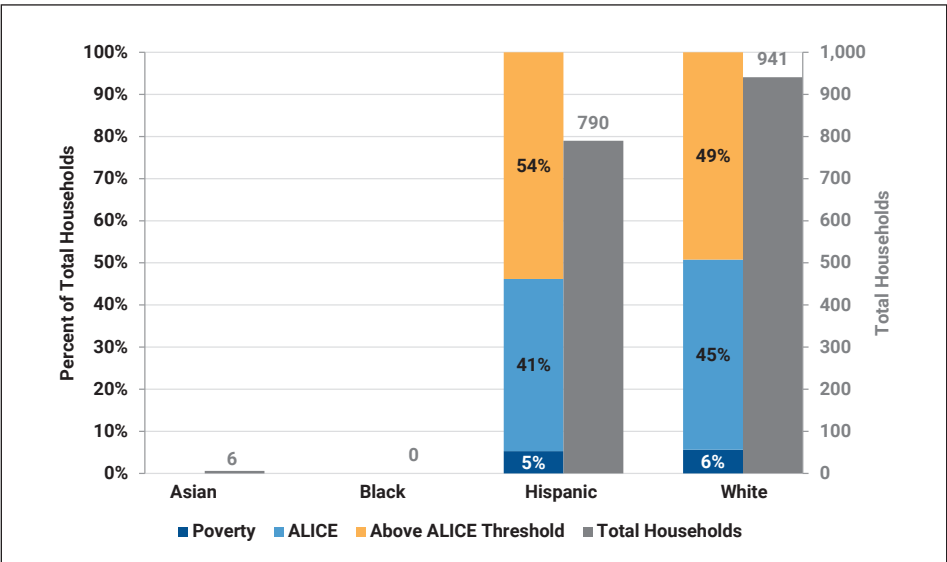

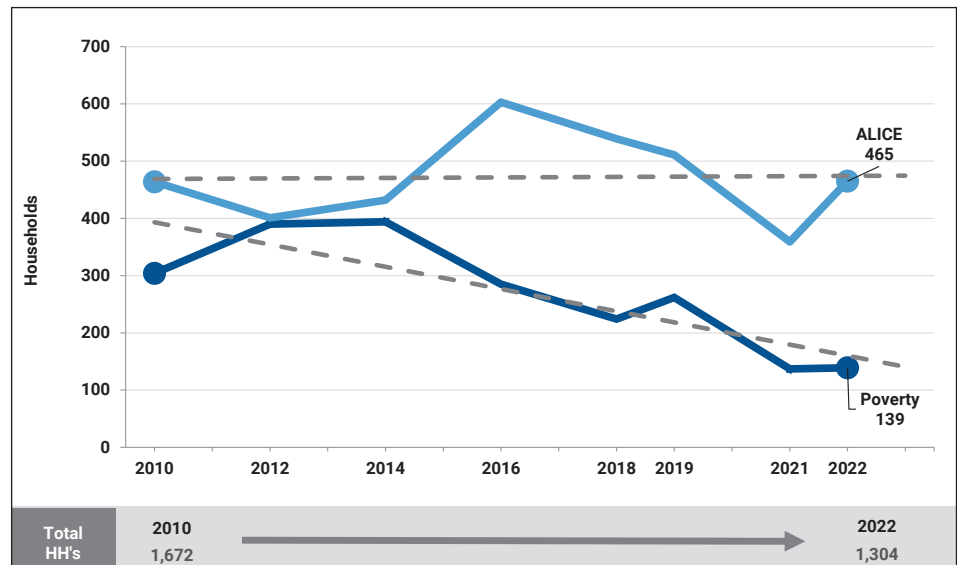

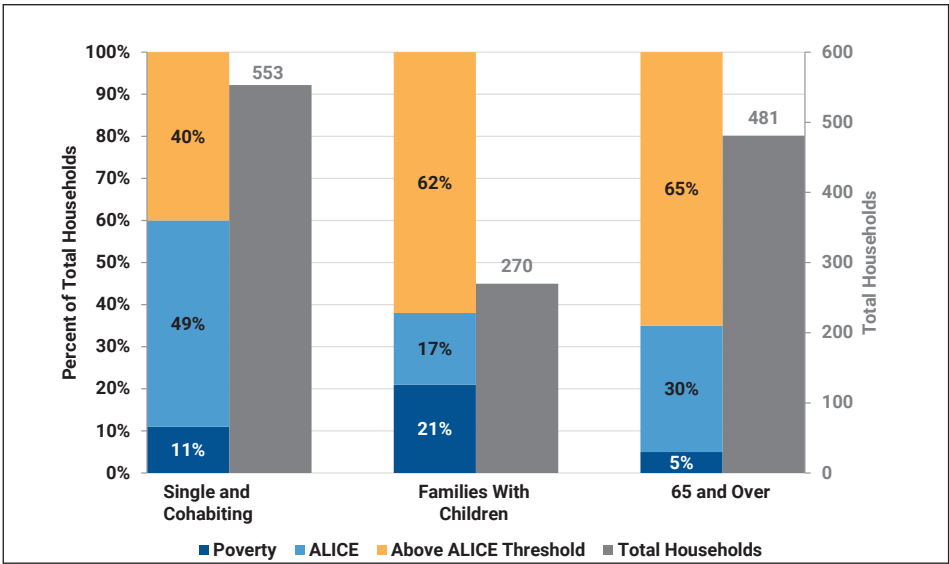

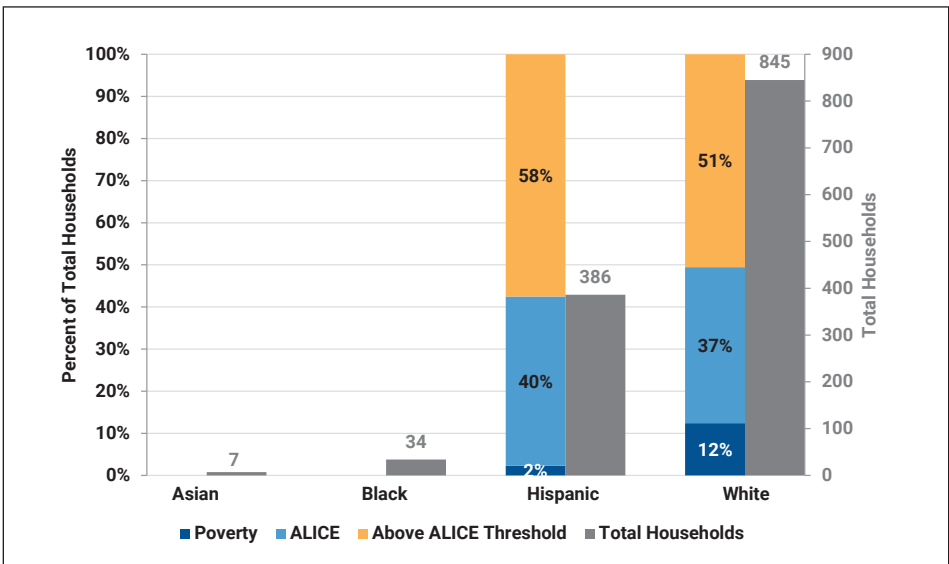

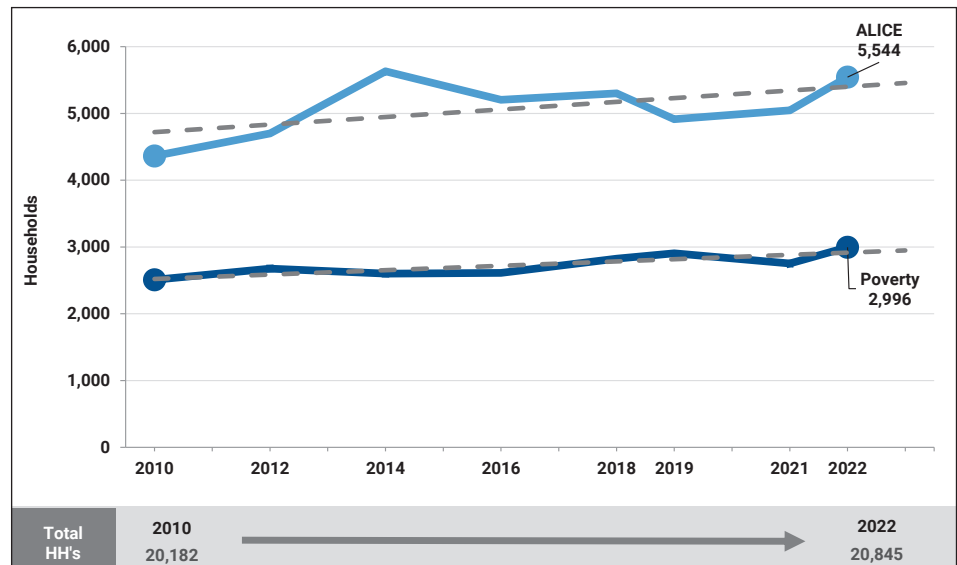

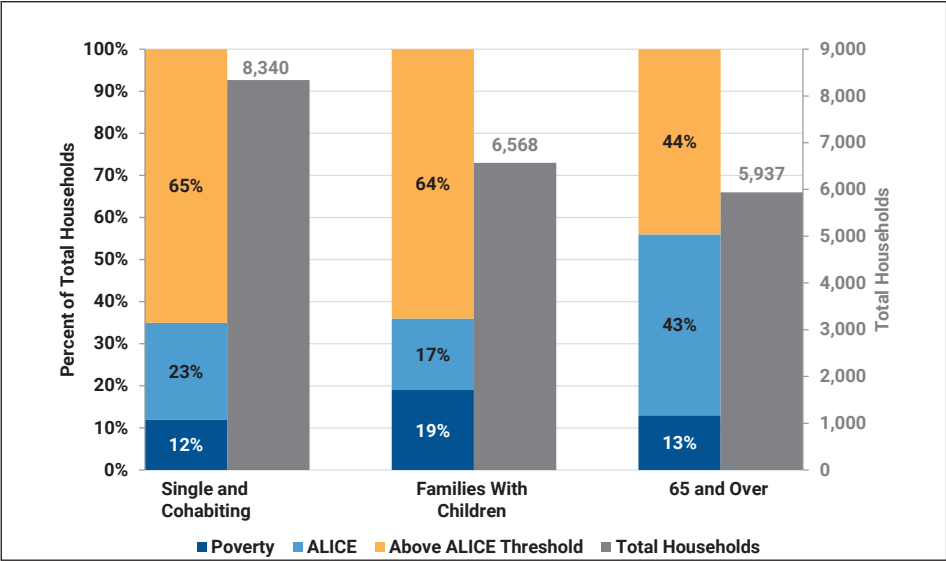

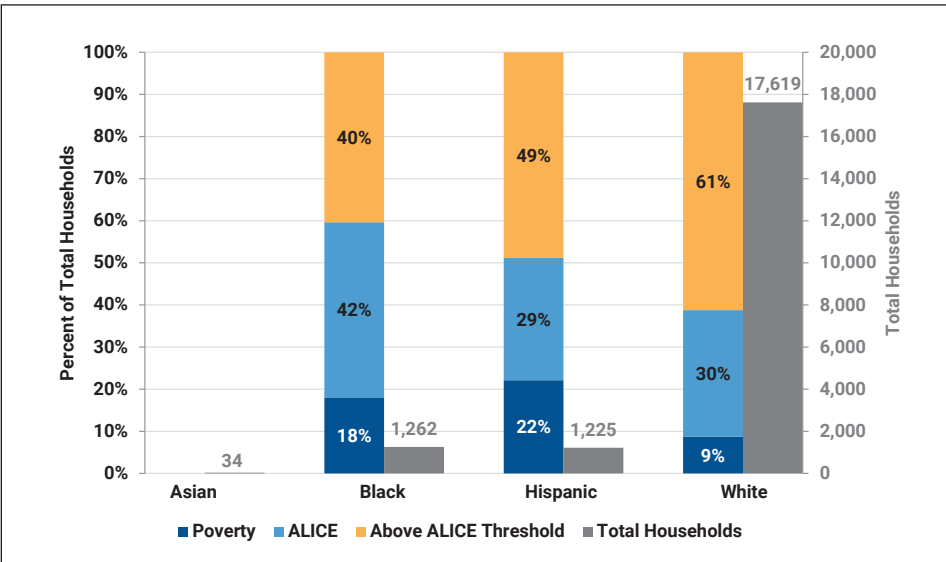

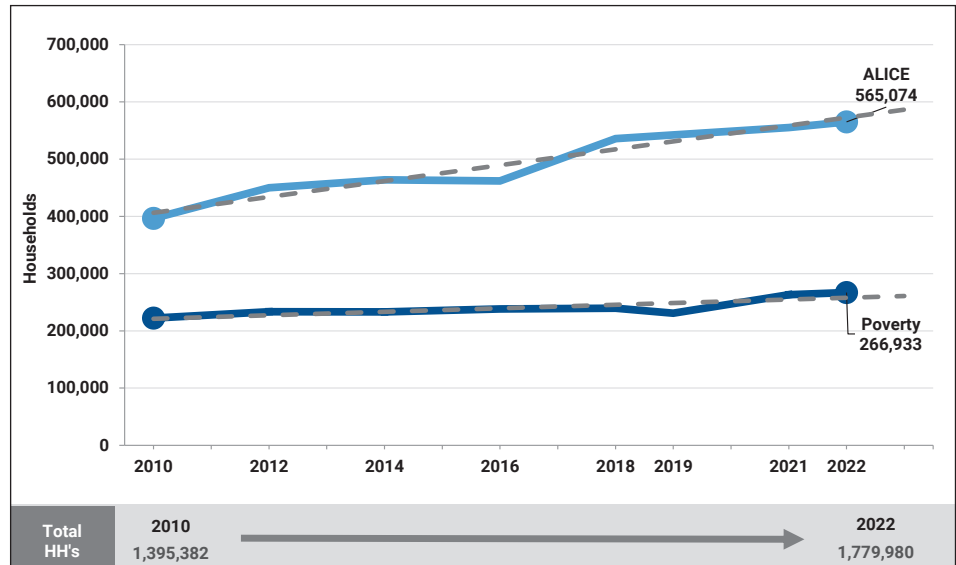

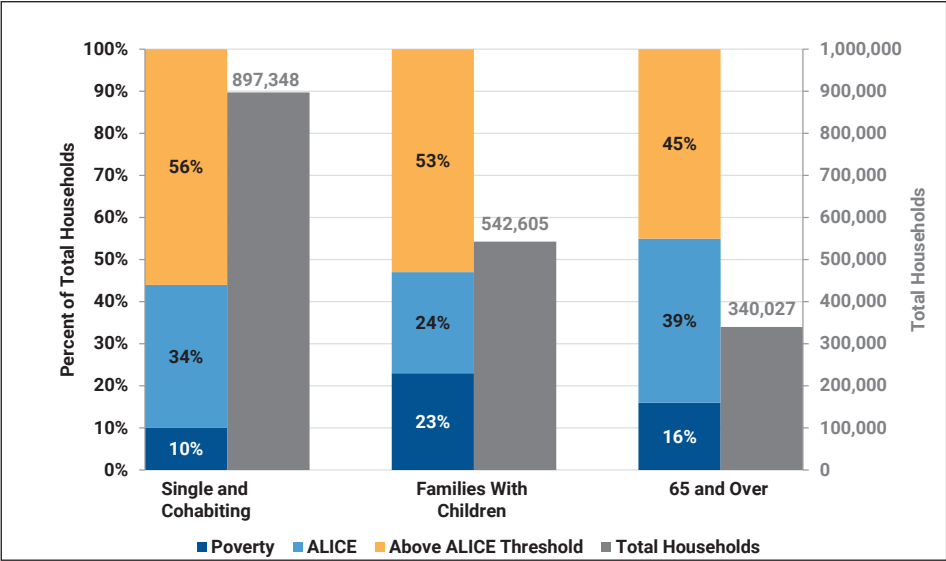

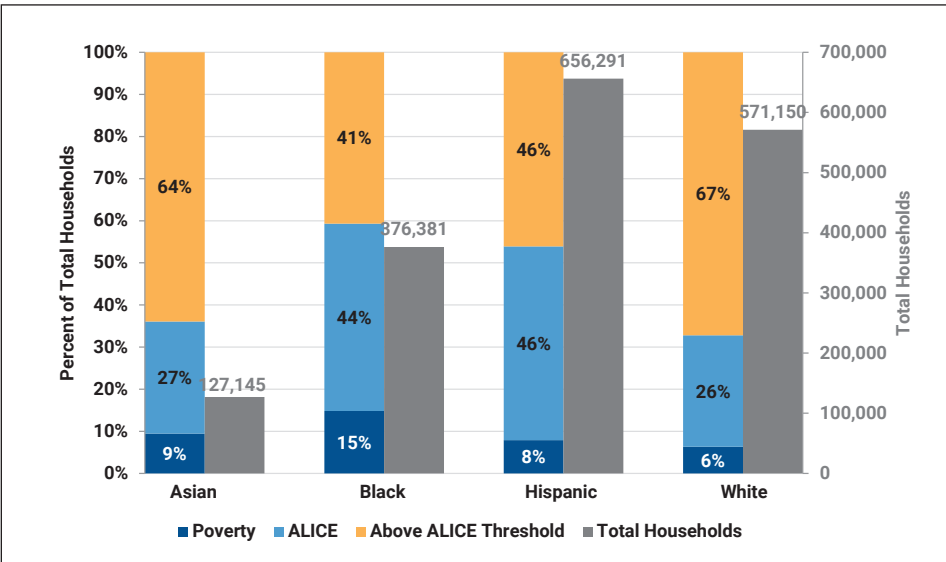

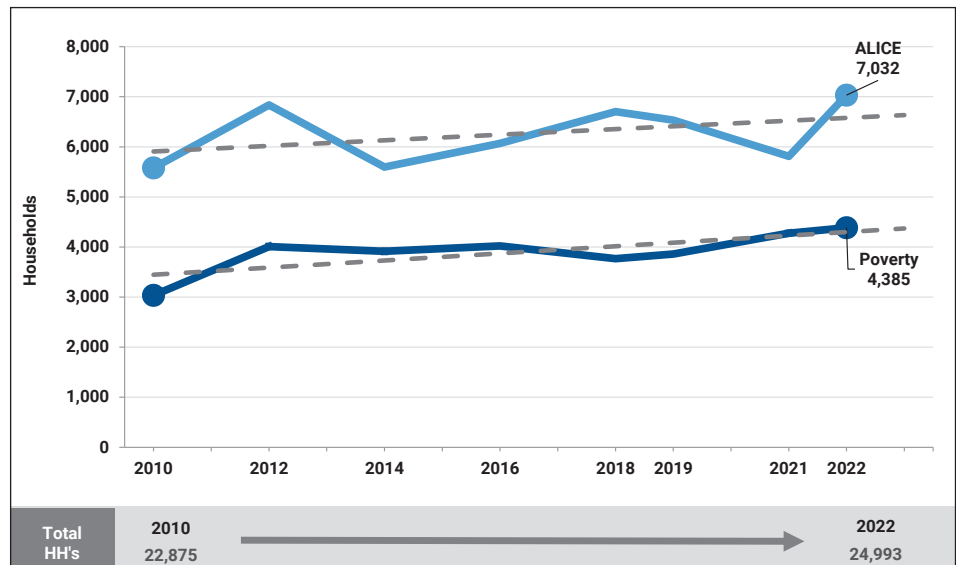

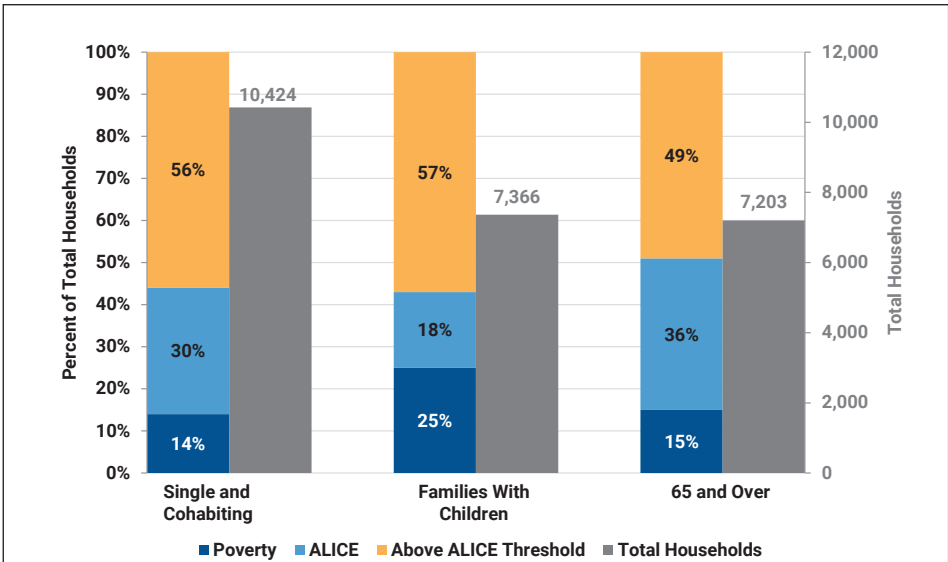

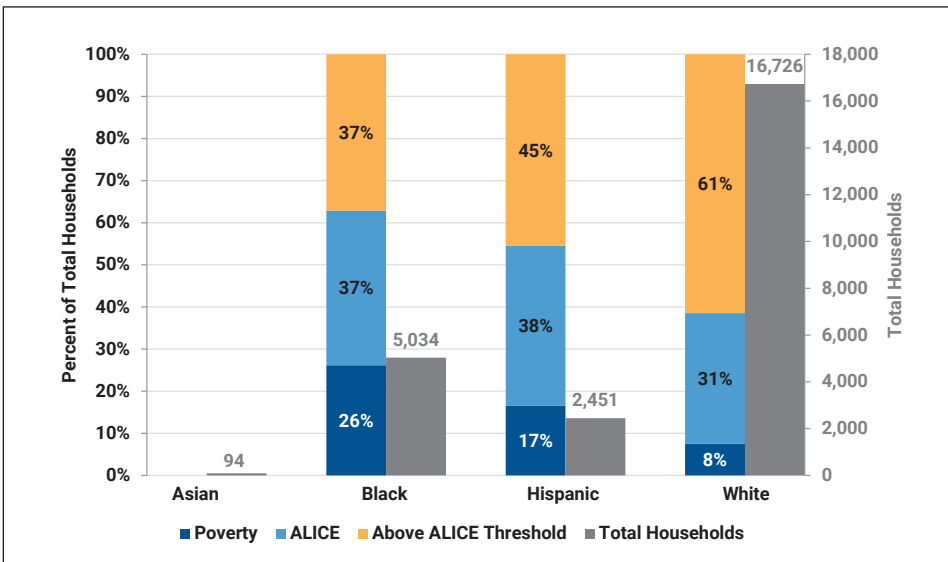

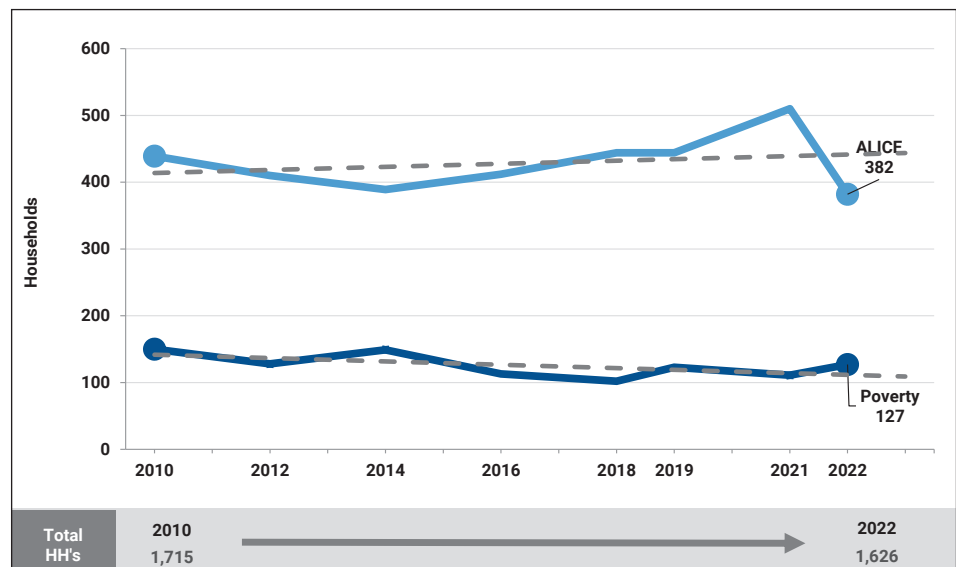

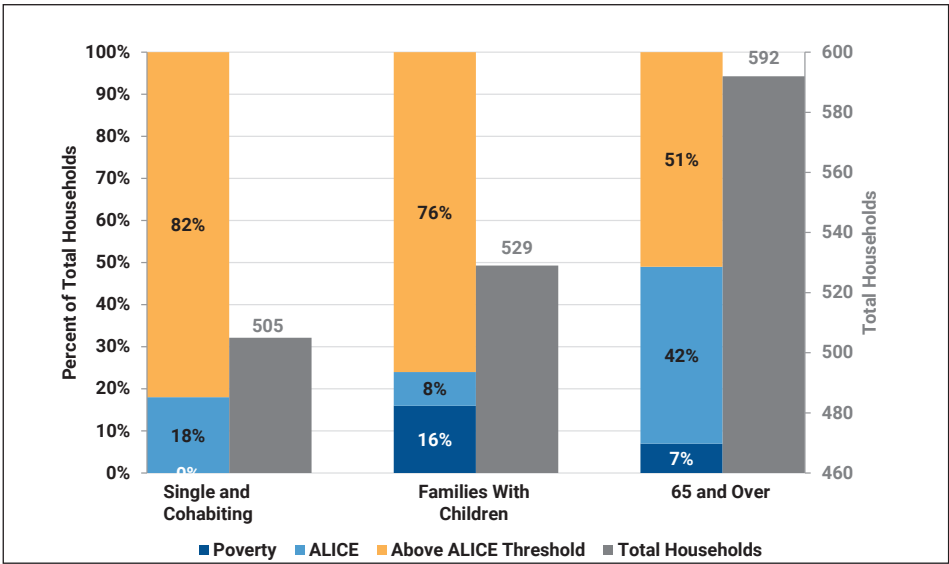

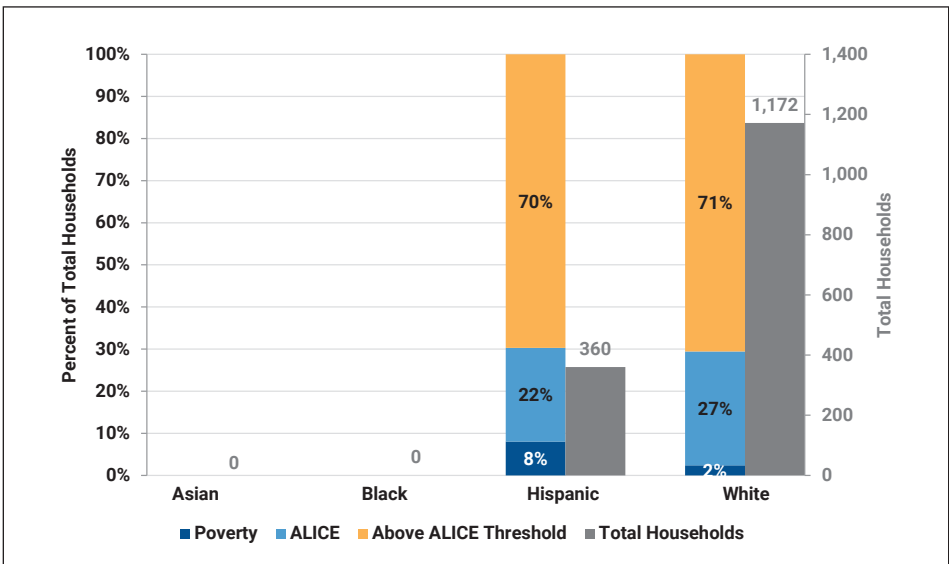

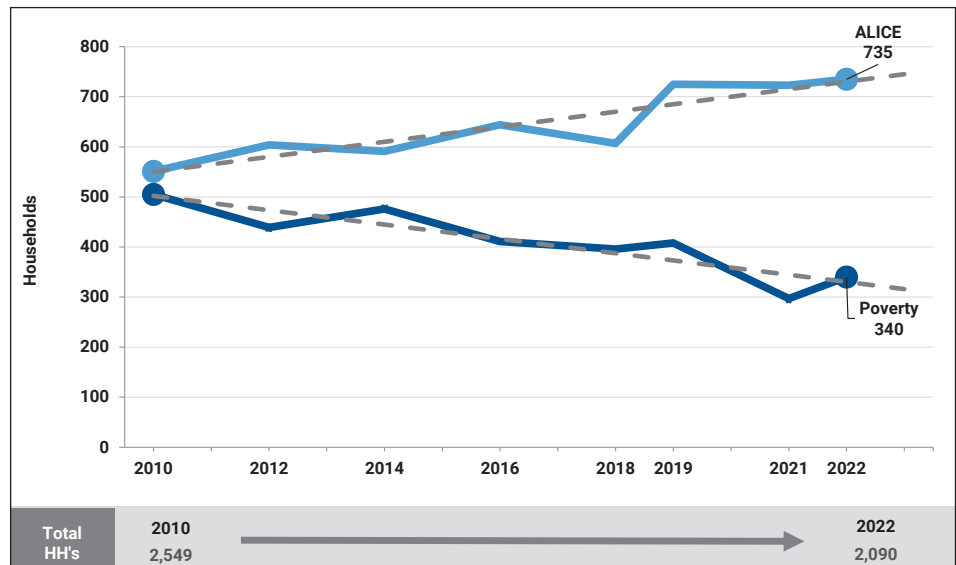

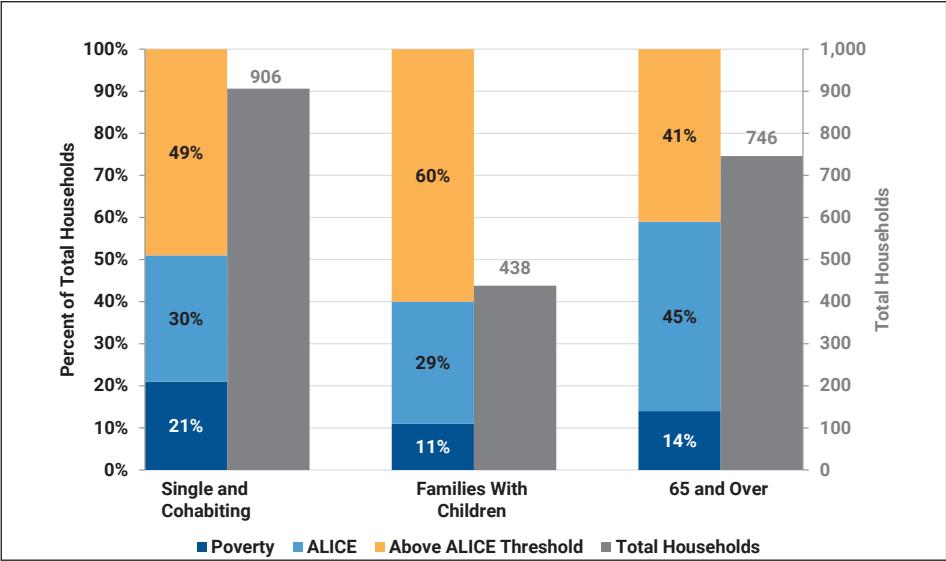

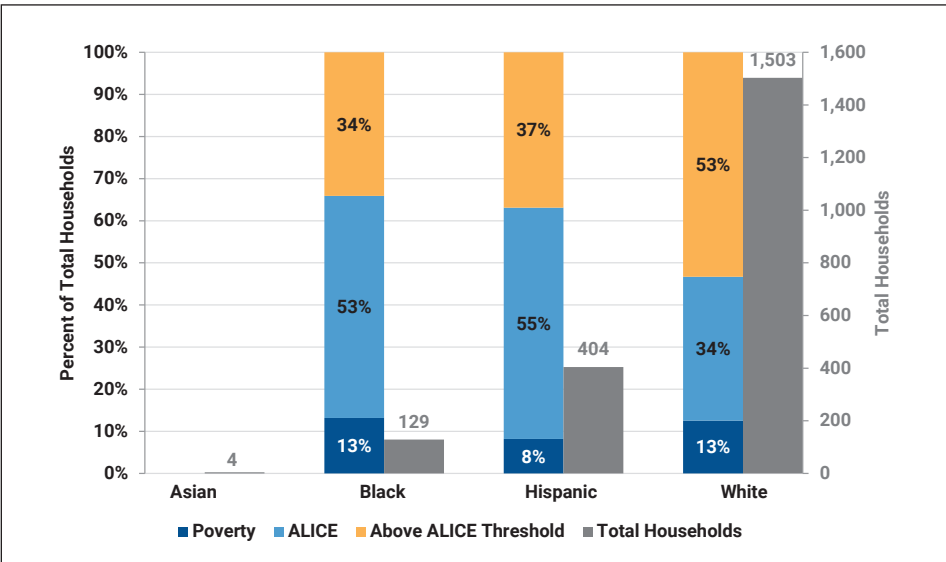

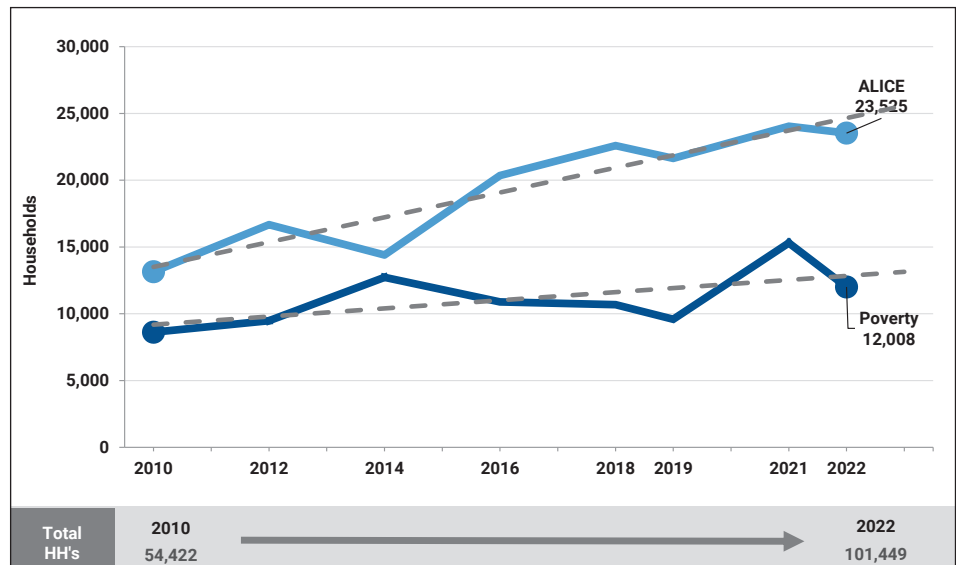

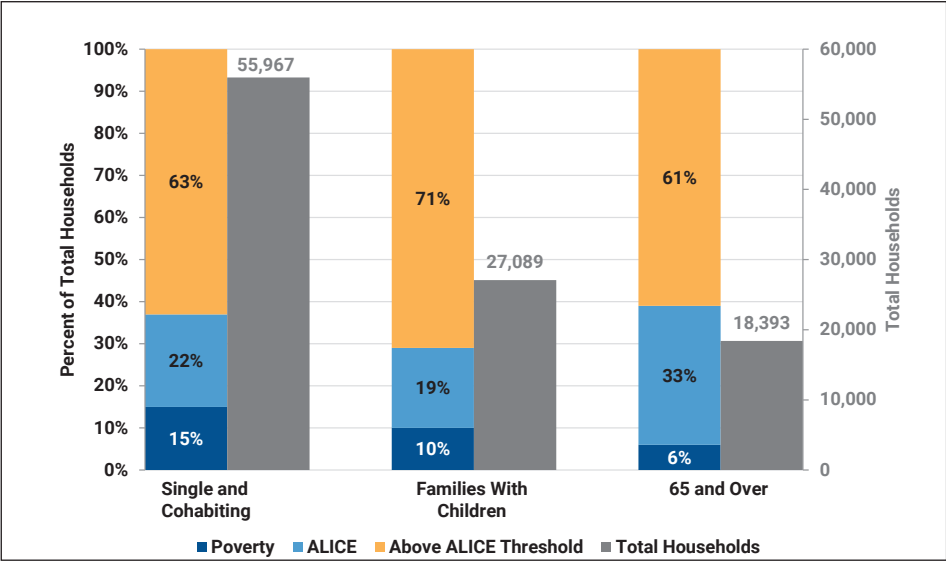

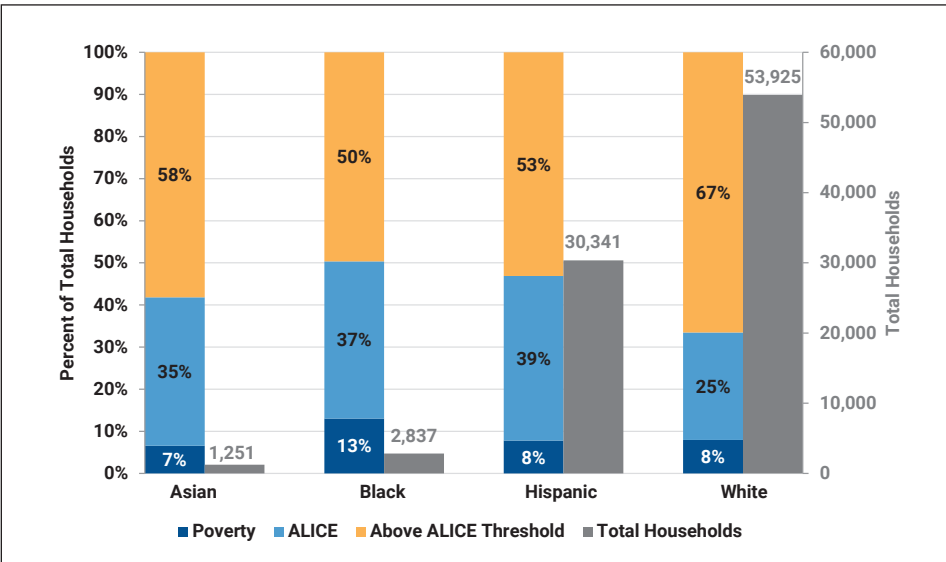

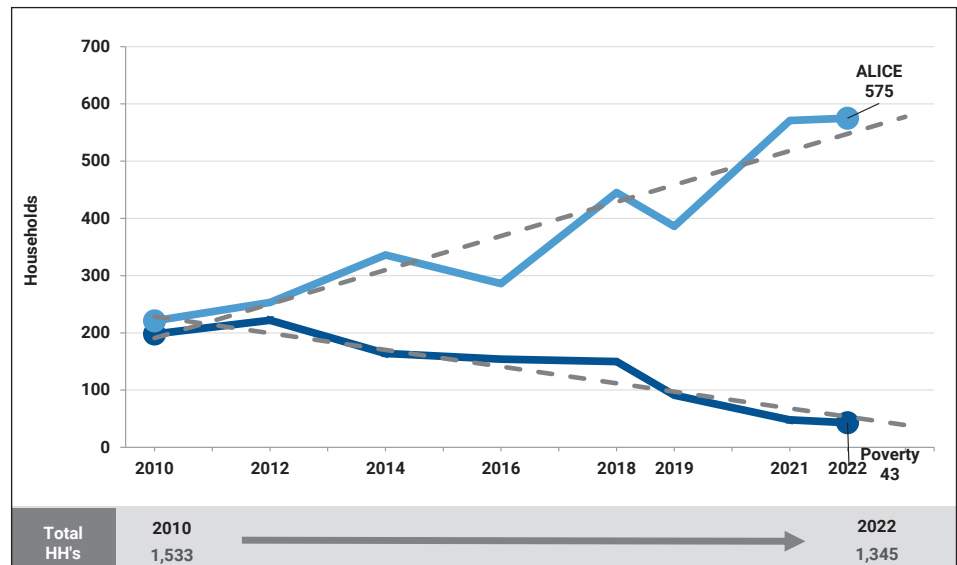

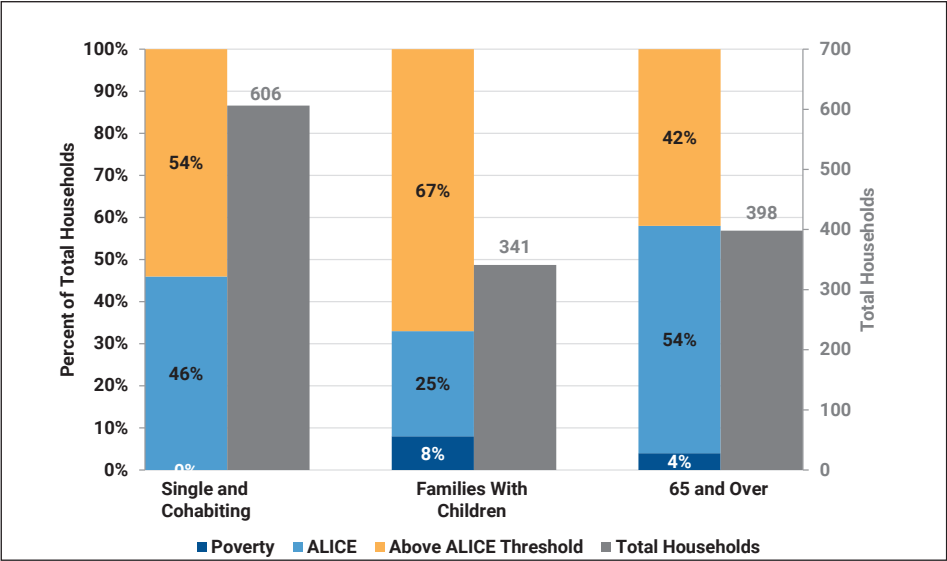

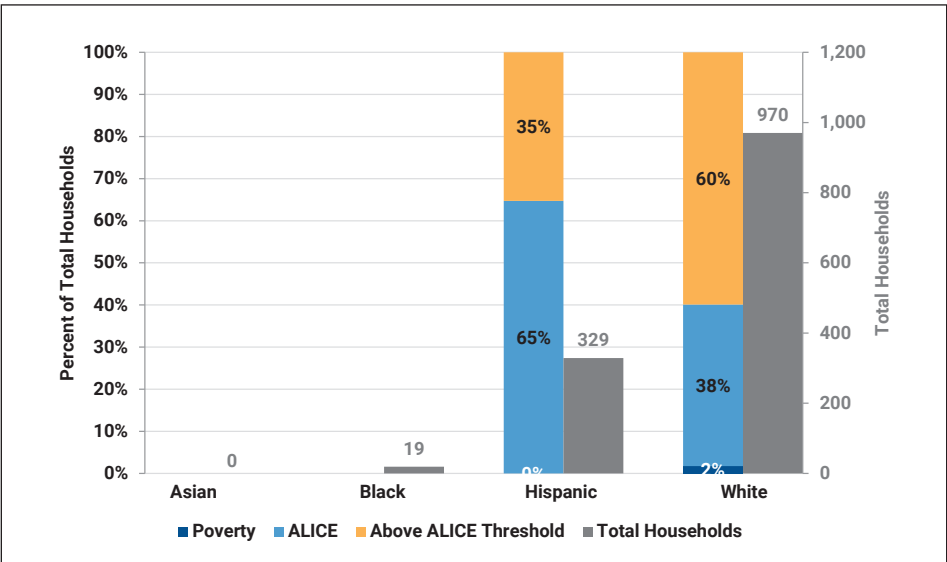

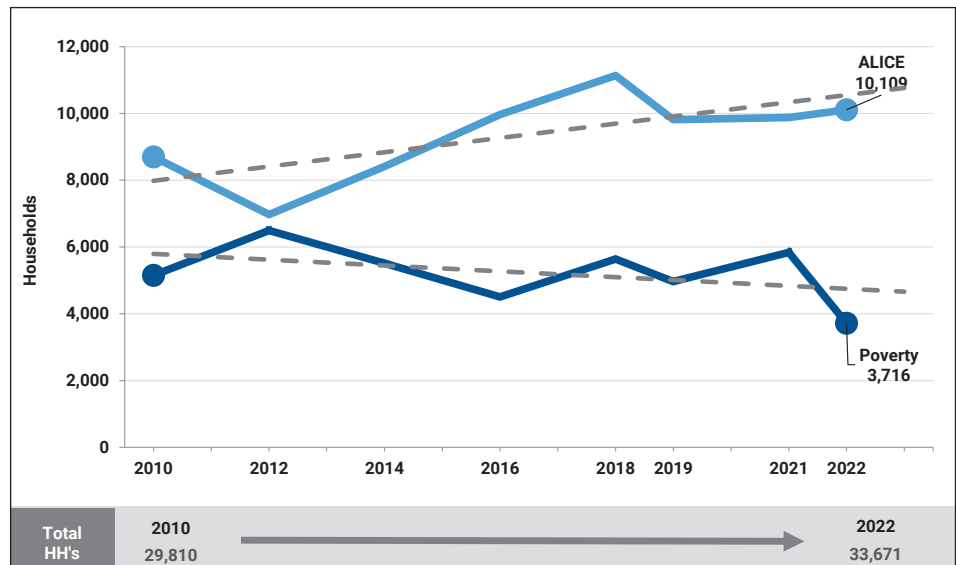

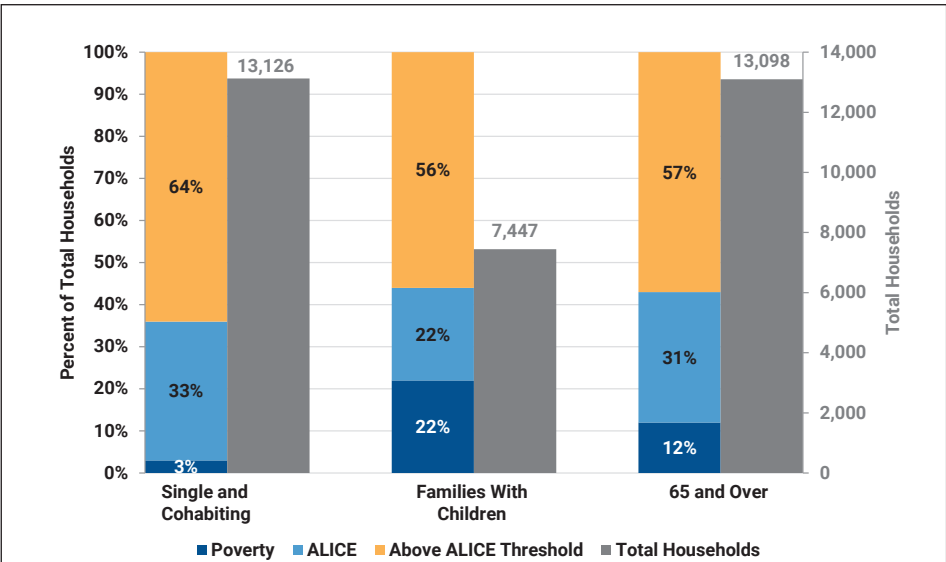

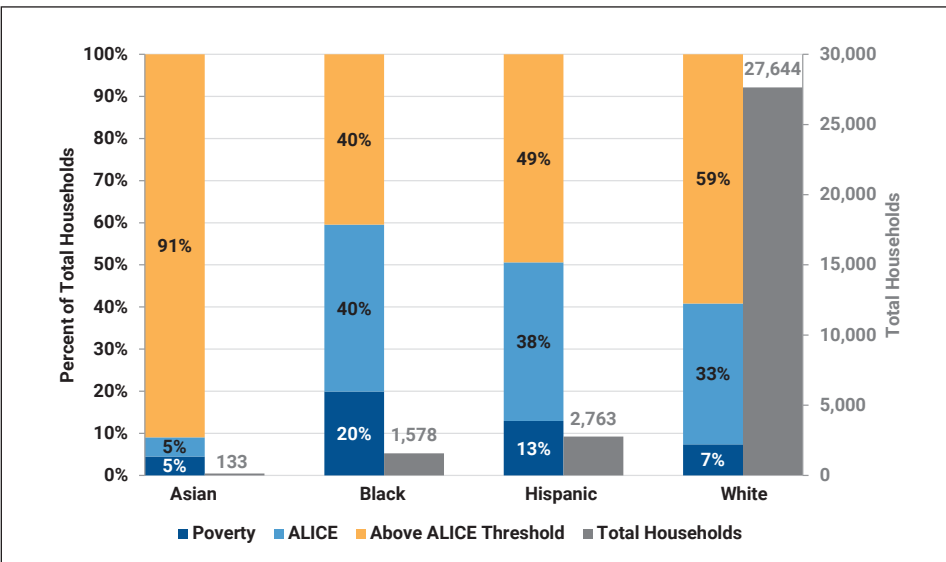

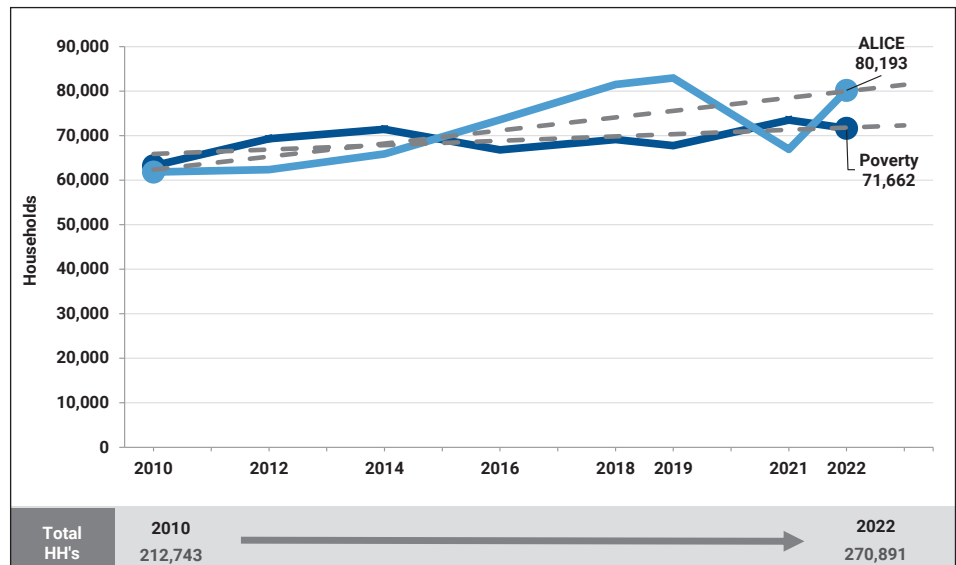

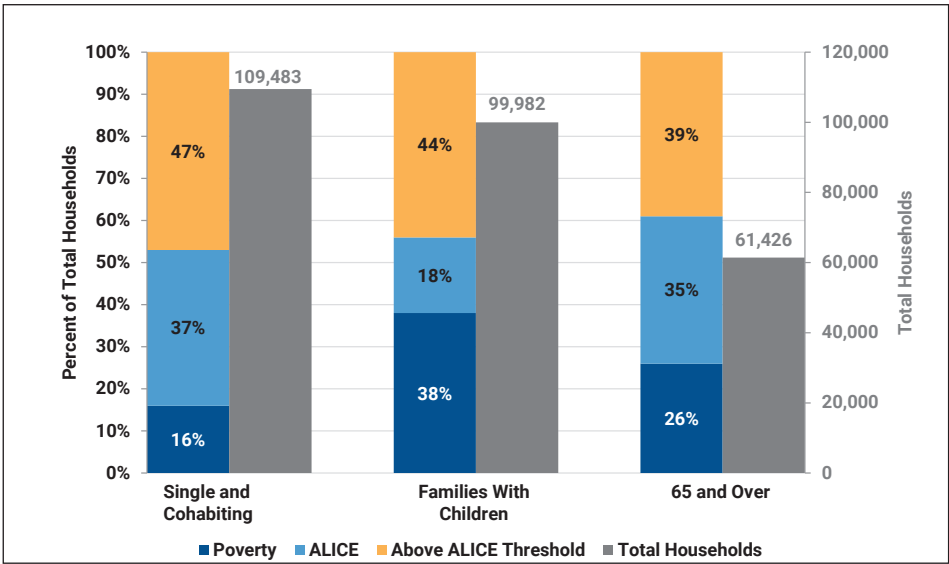

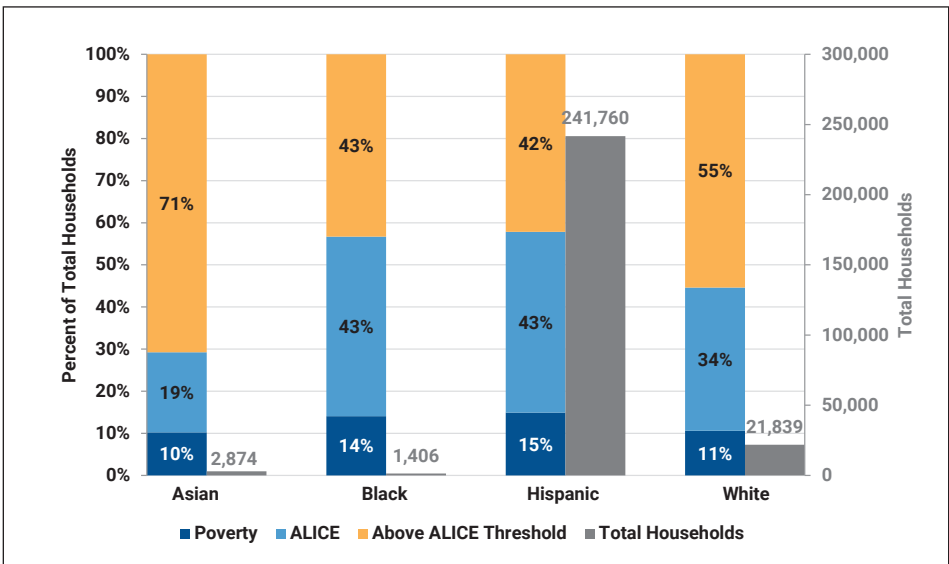

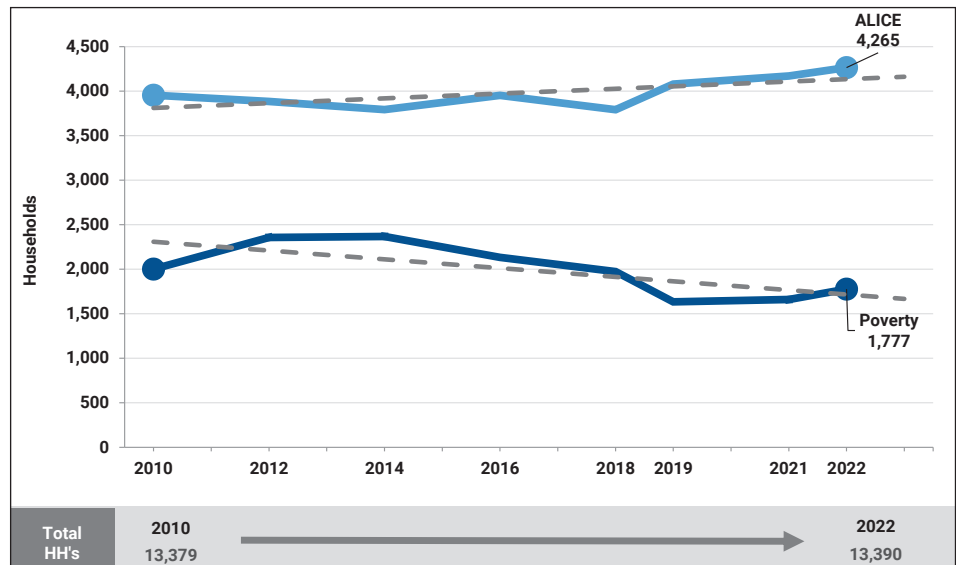

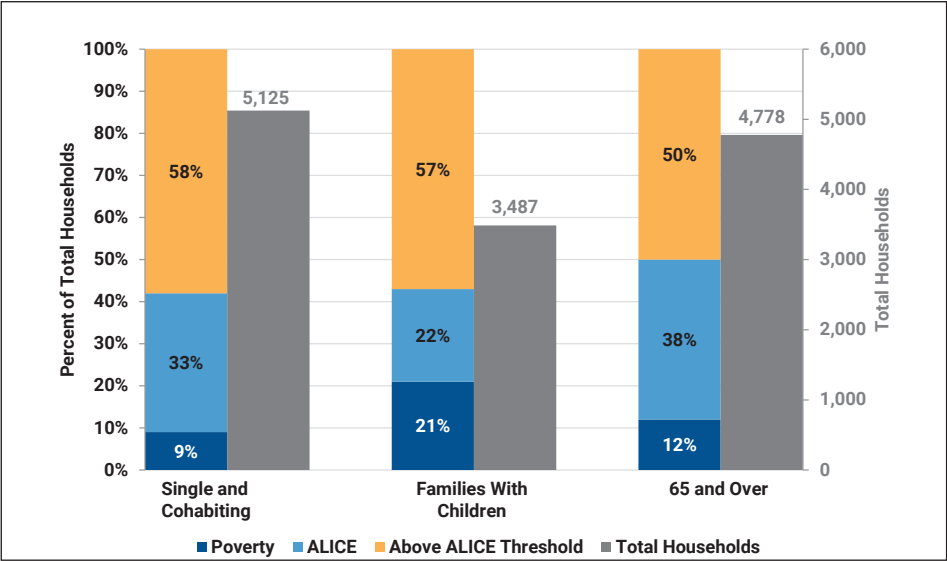

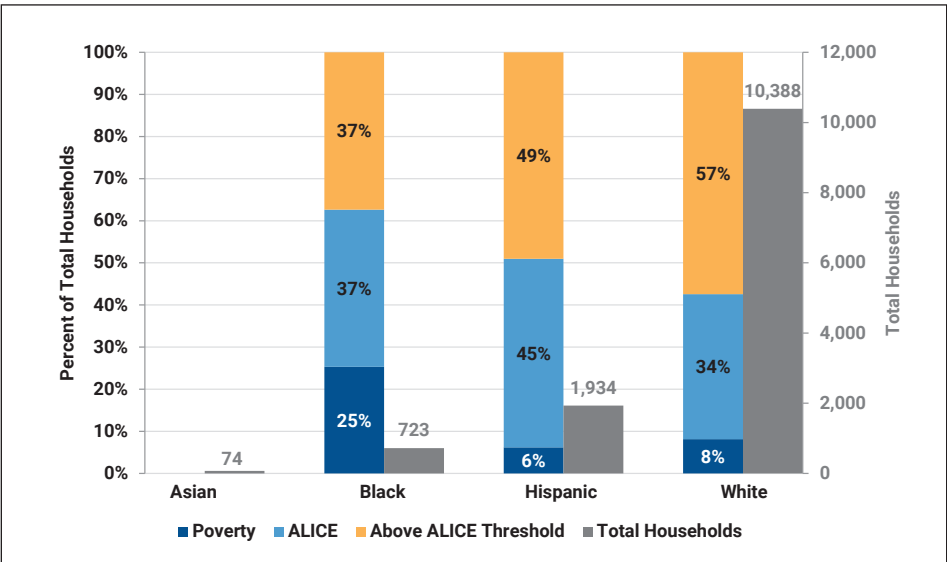

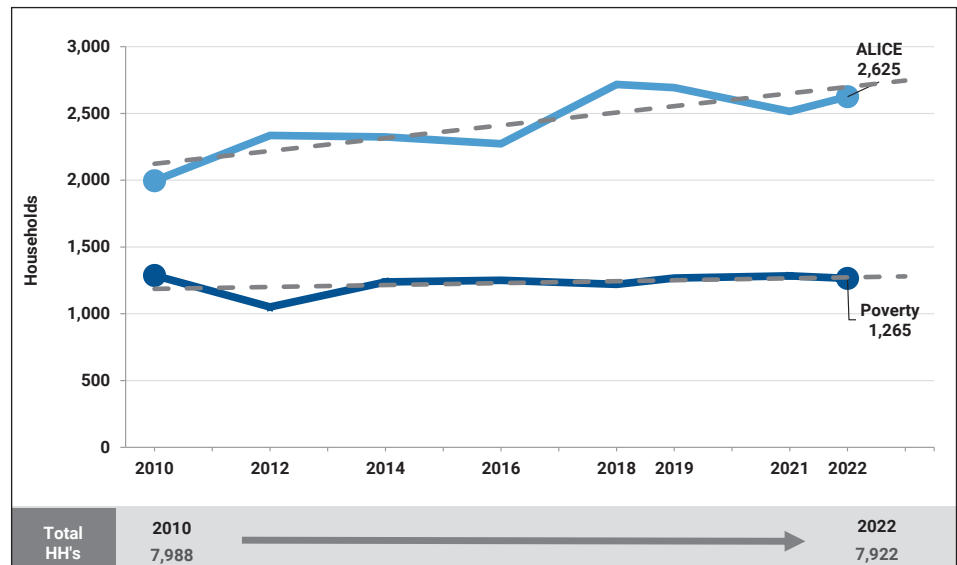

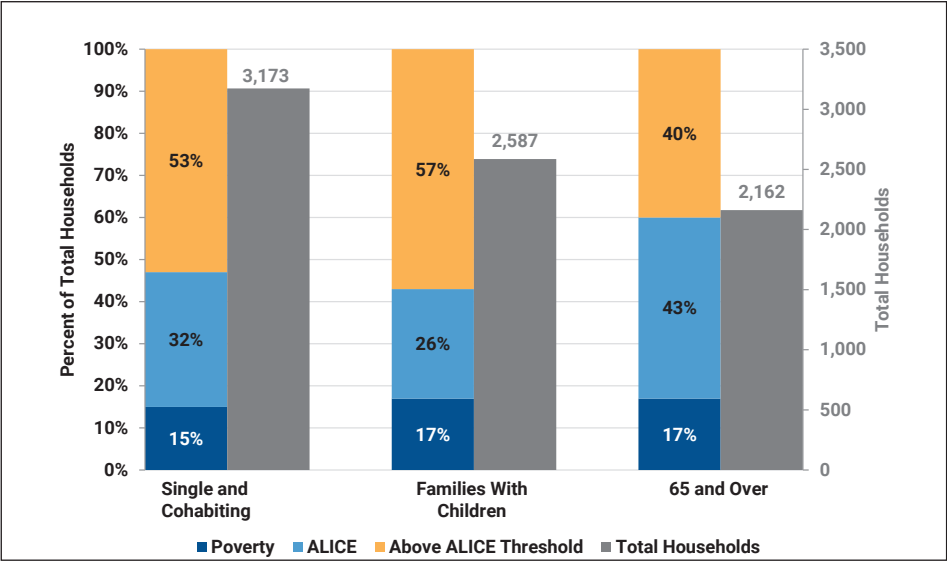

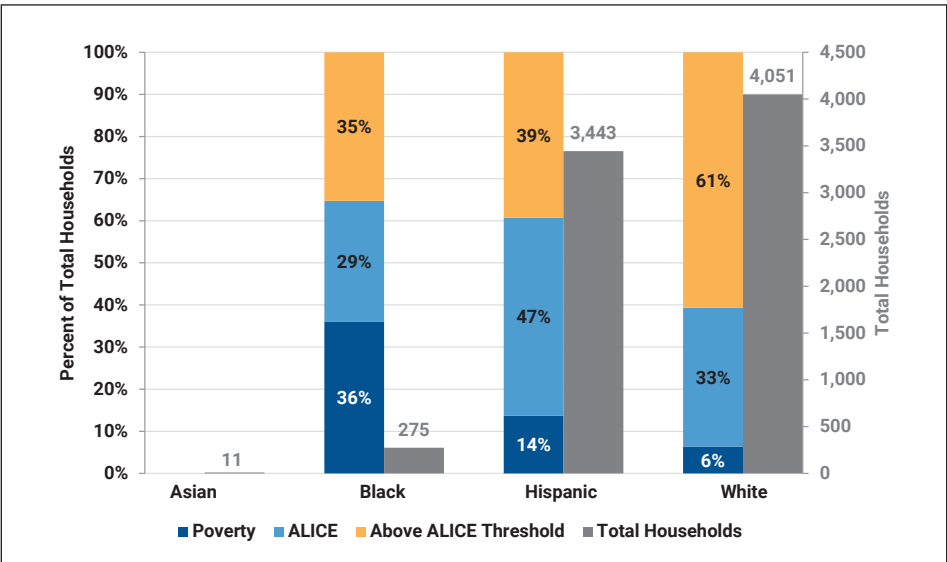

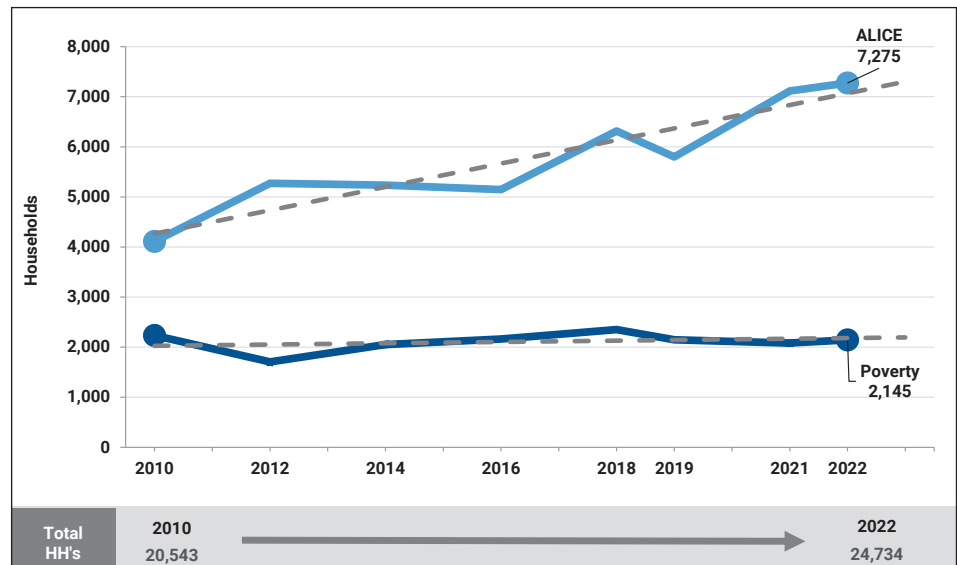

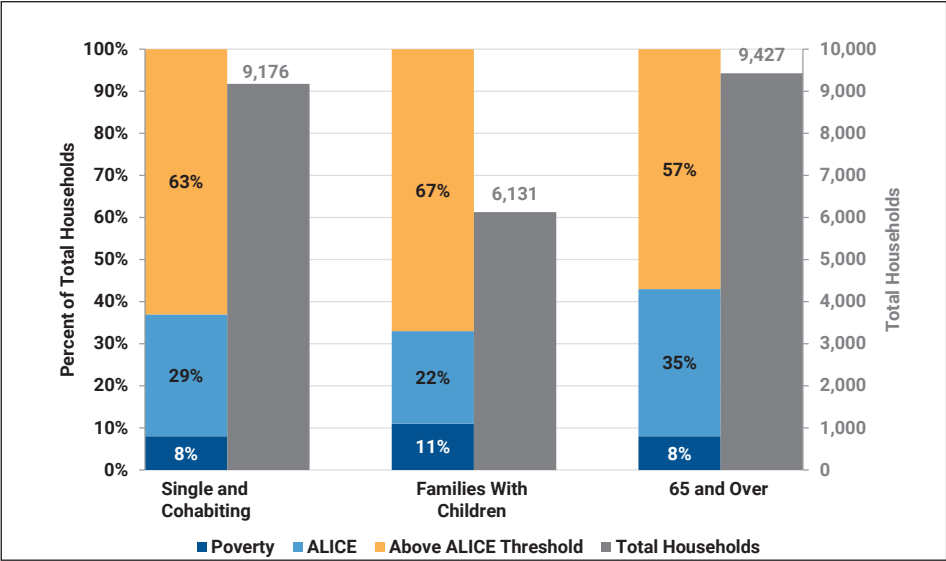

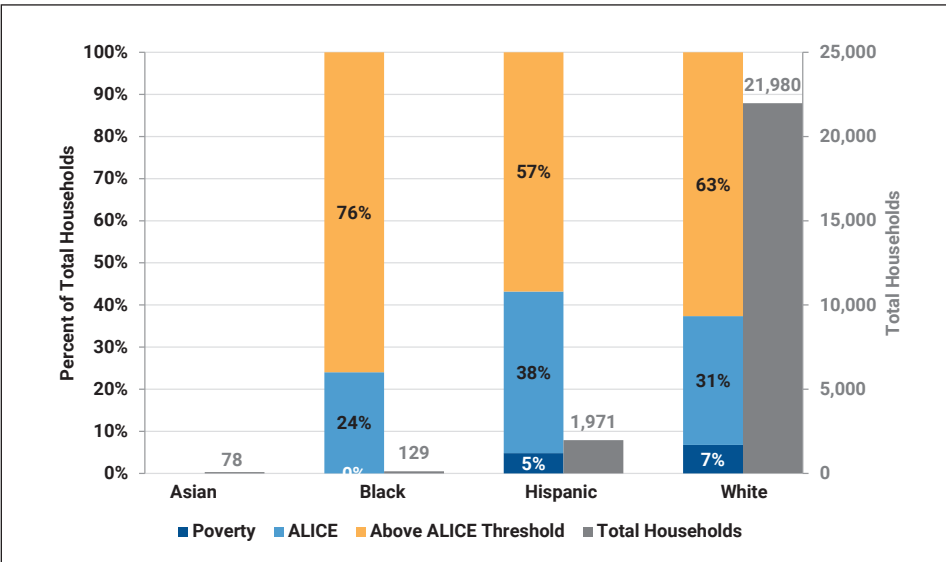

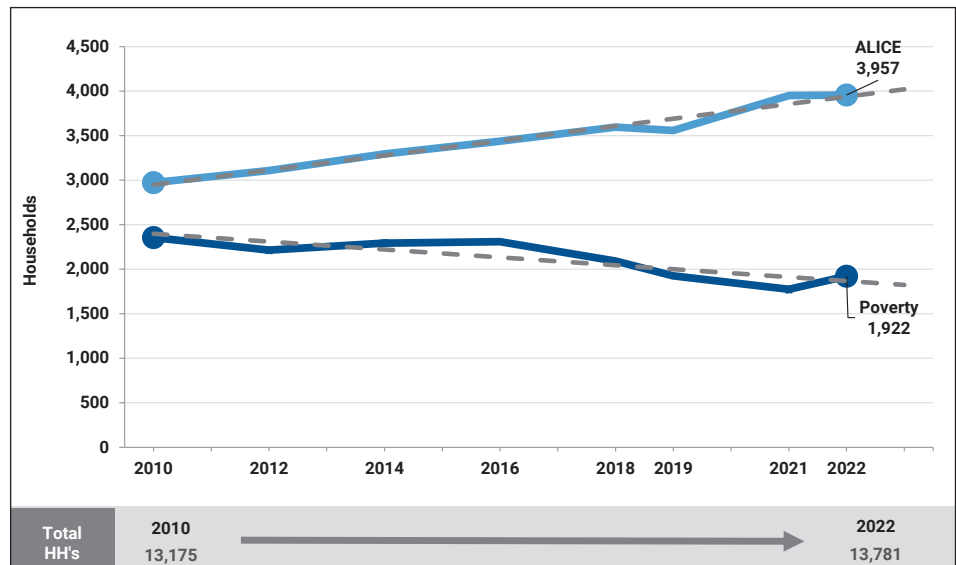

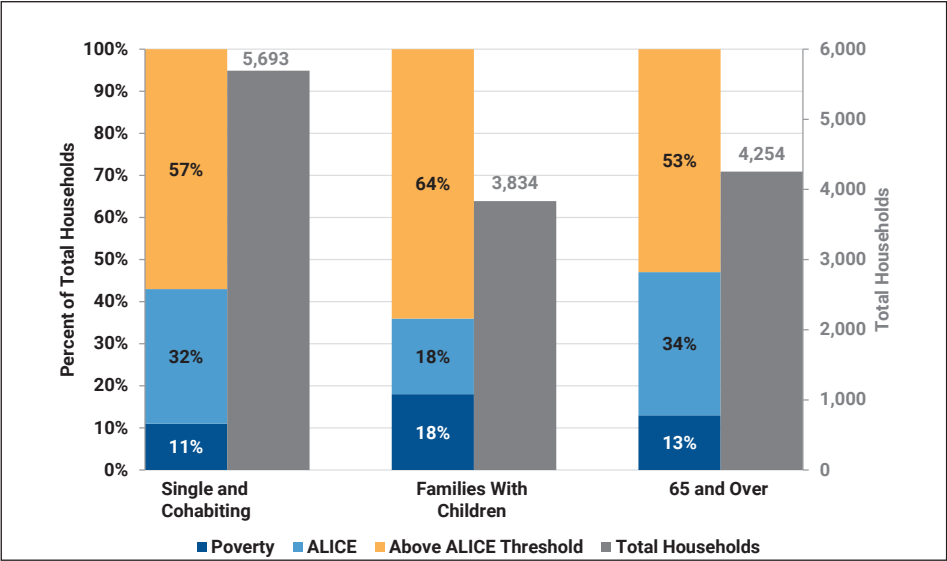

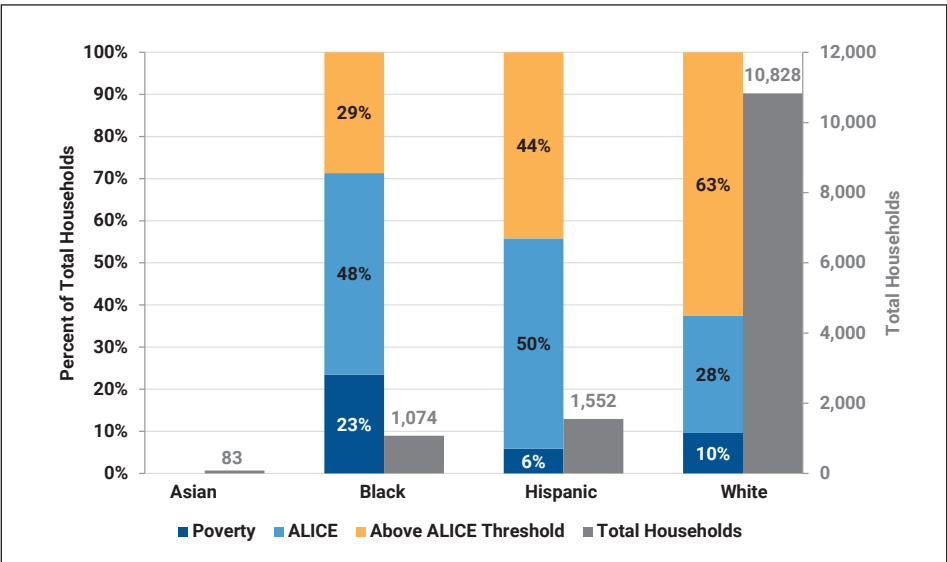

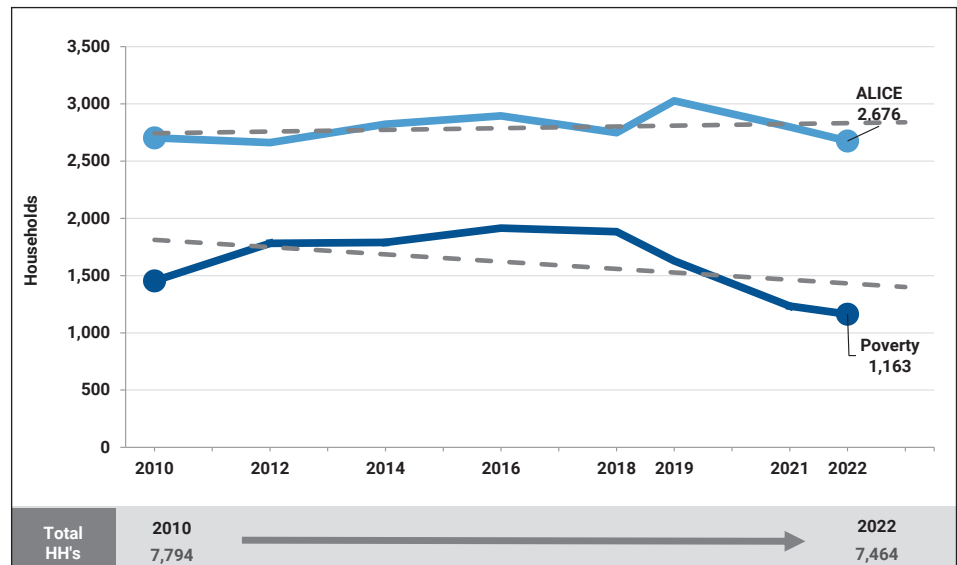

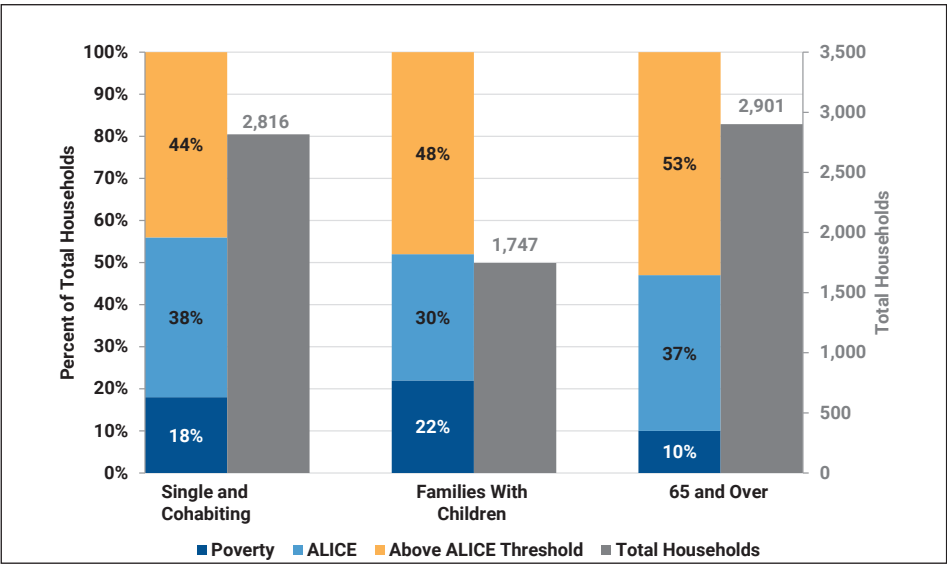

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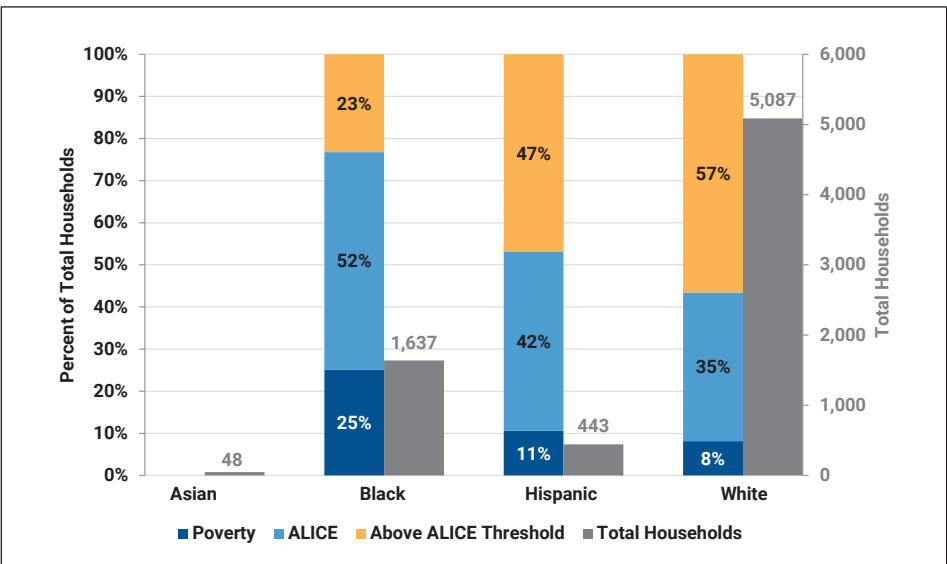
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Houston County, 2022

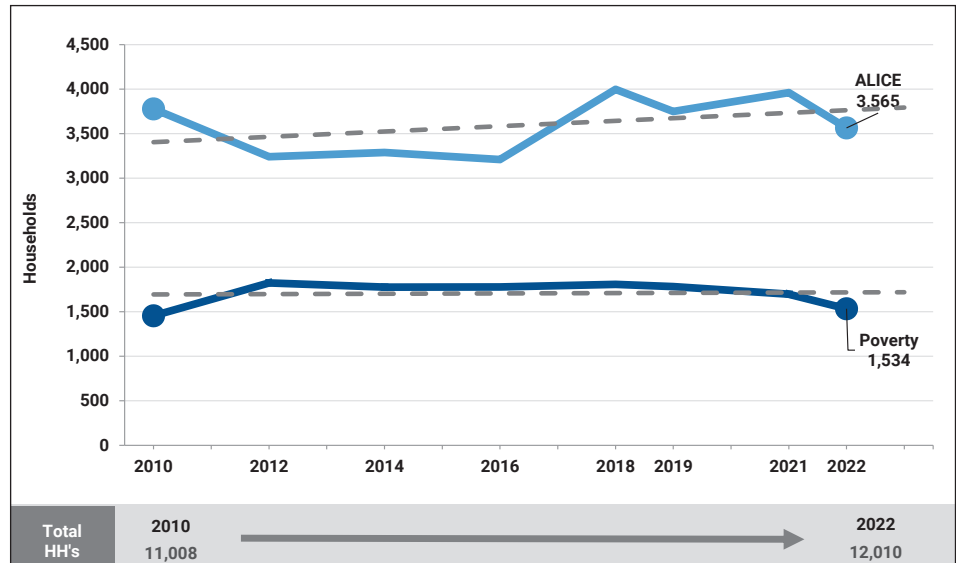

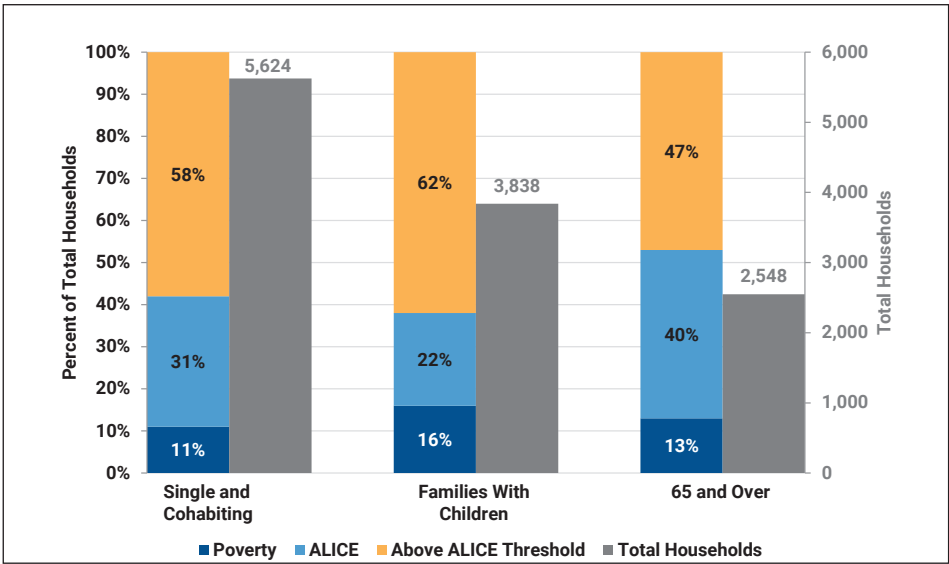

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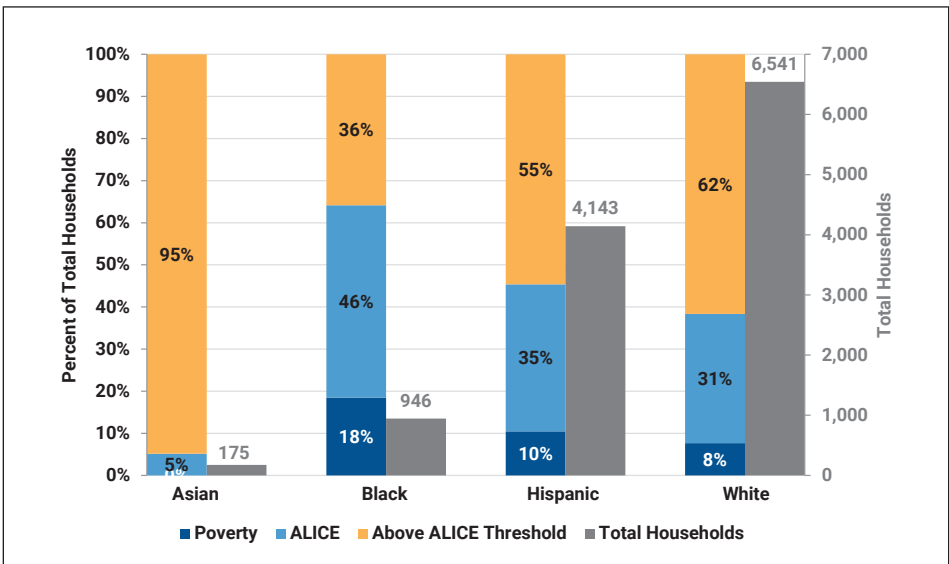

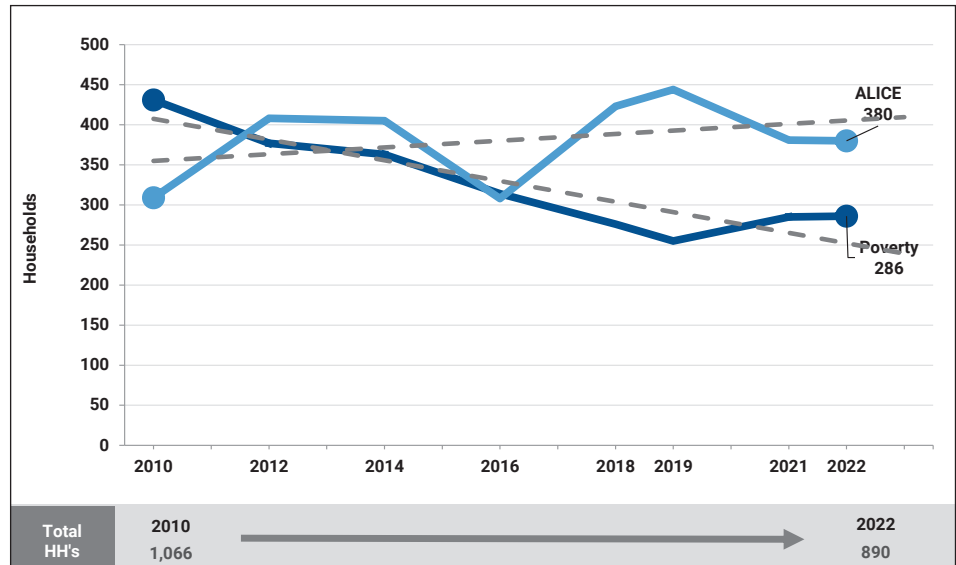

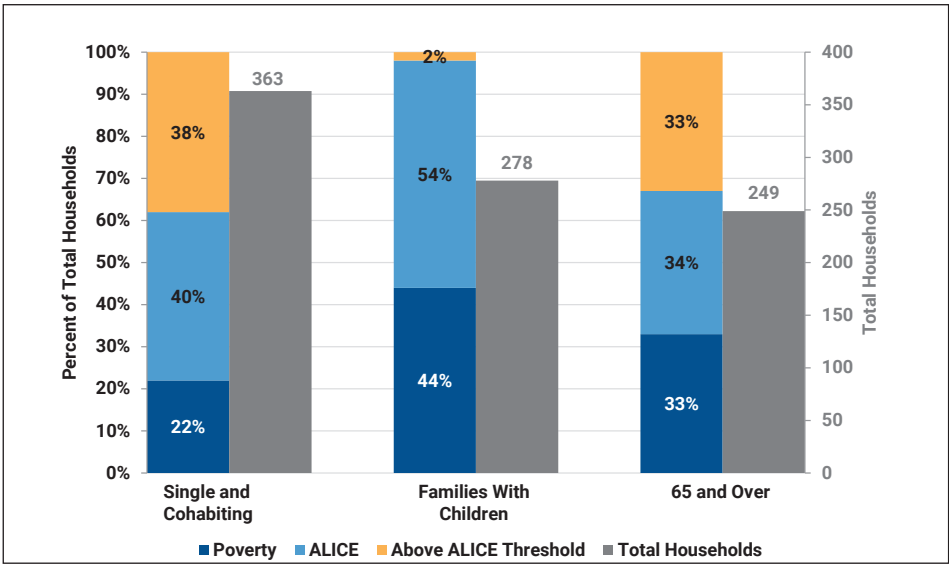

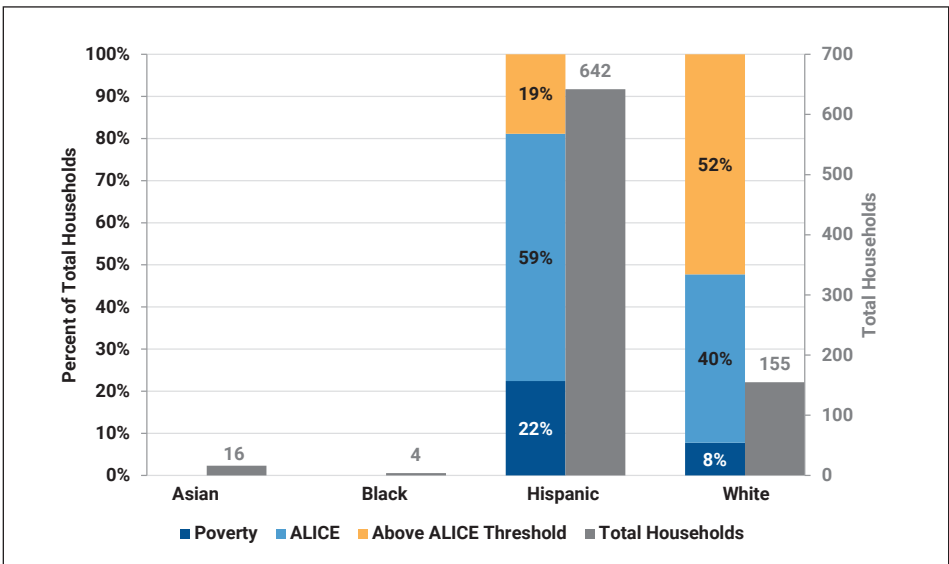

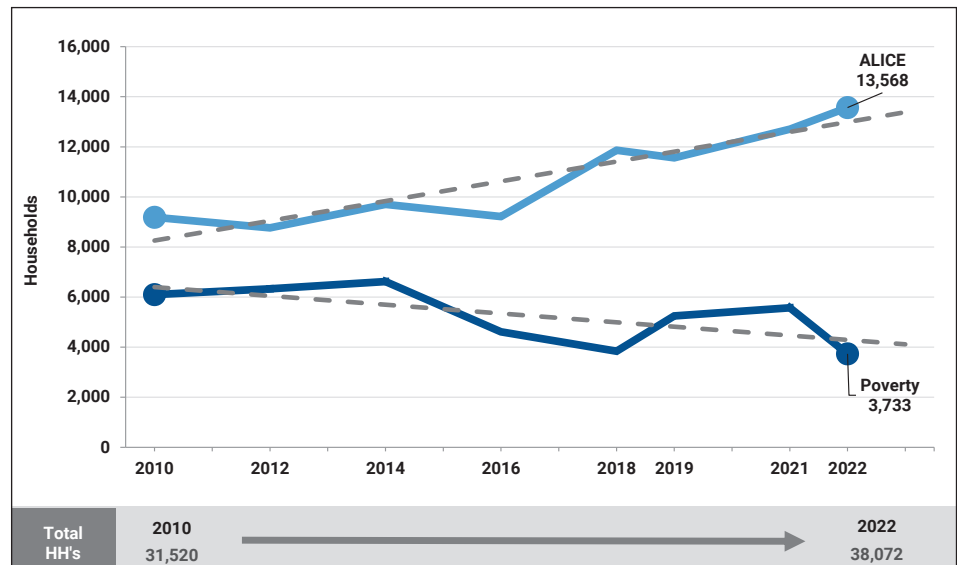

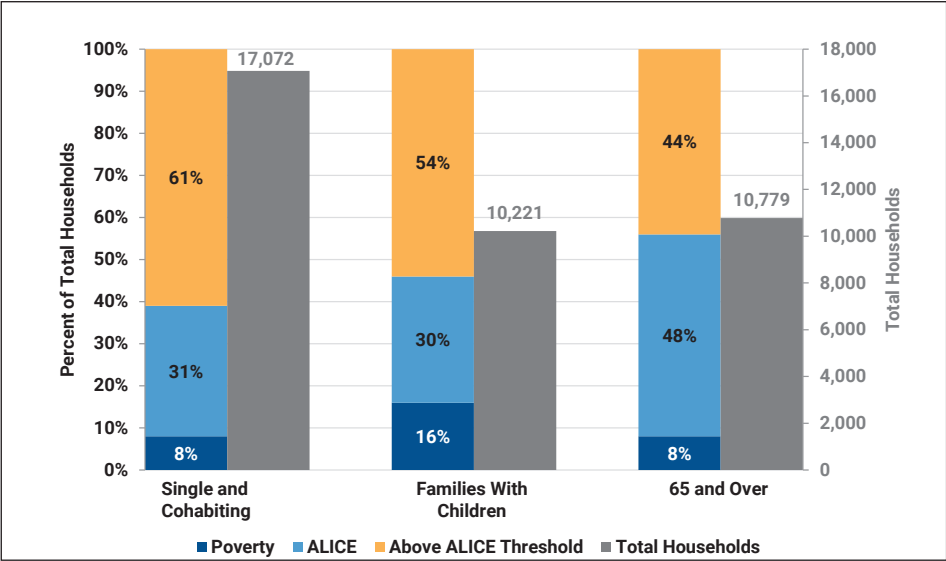

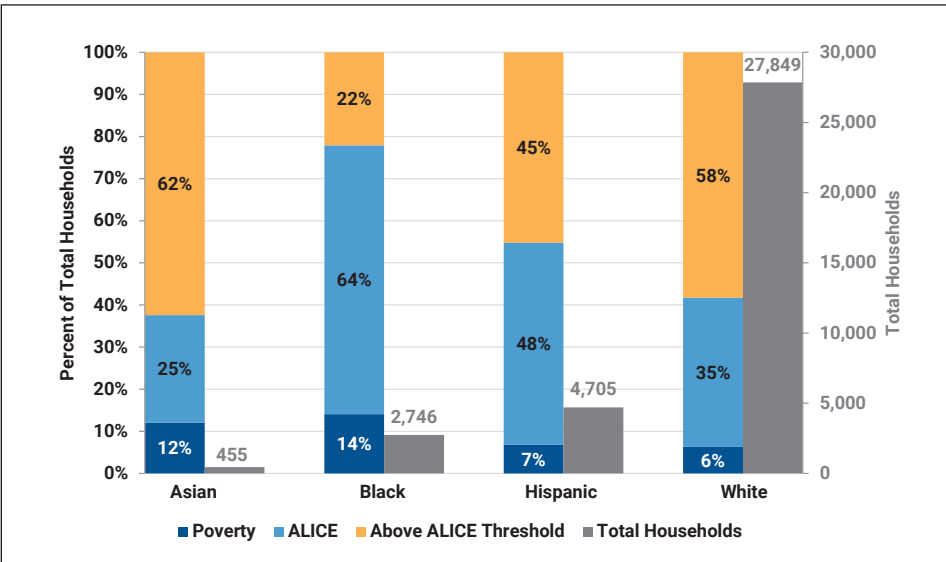

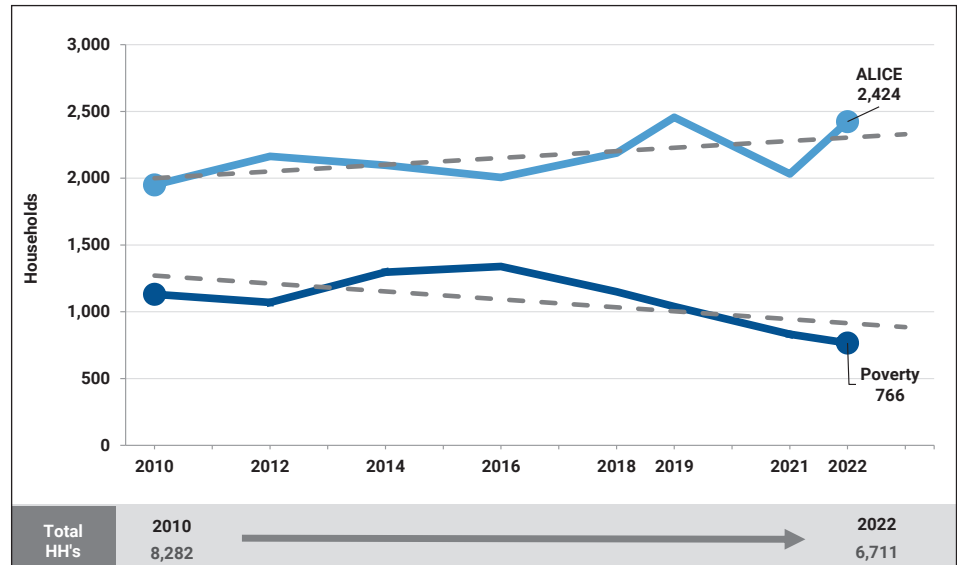

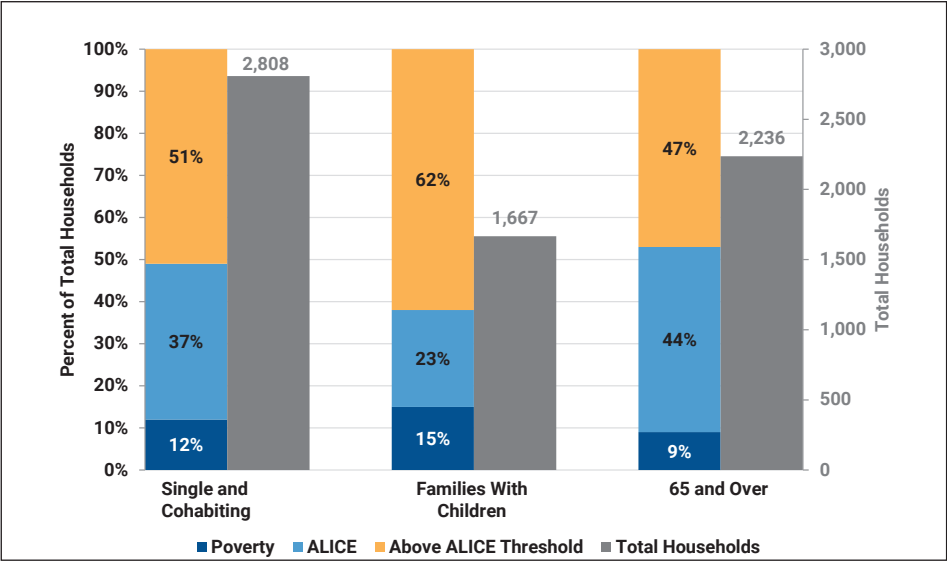

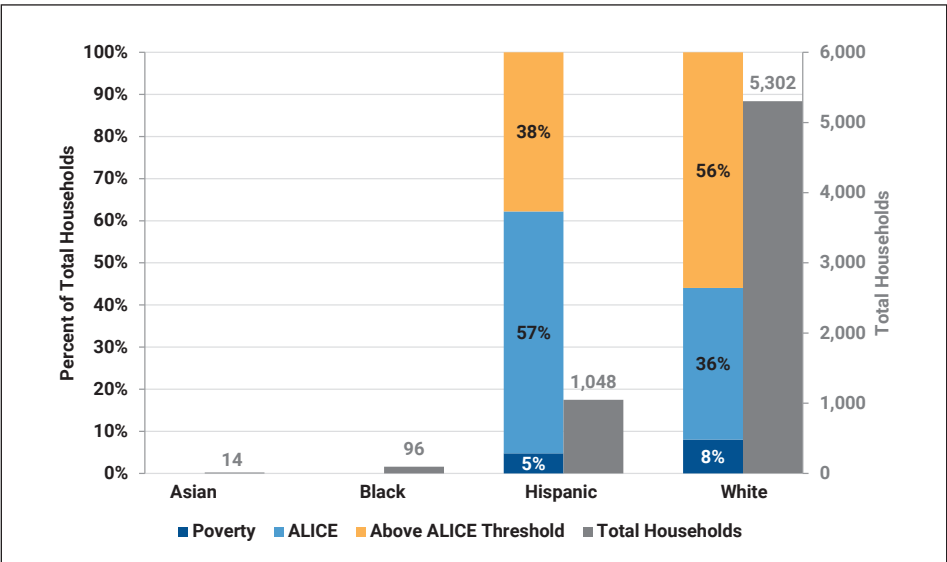

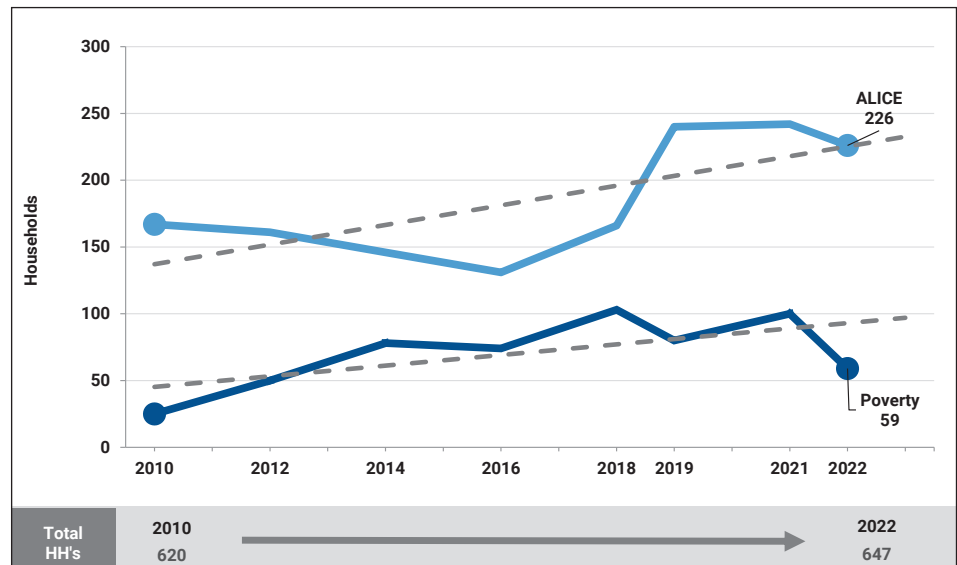

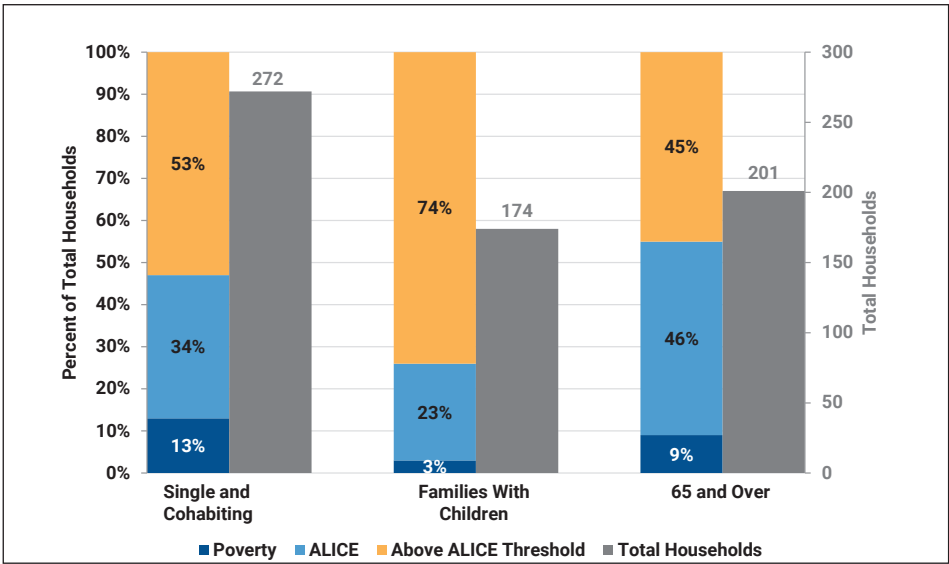

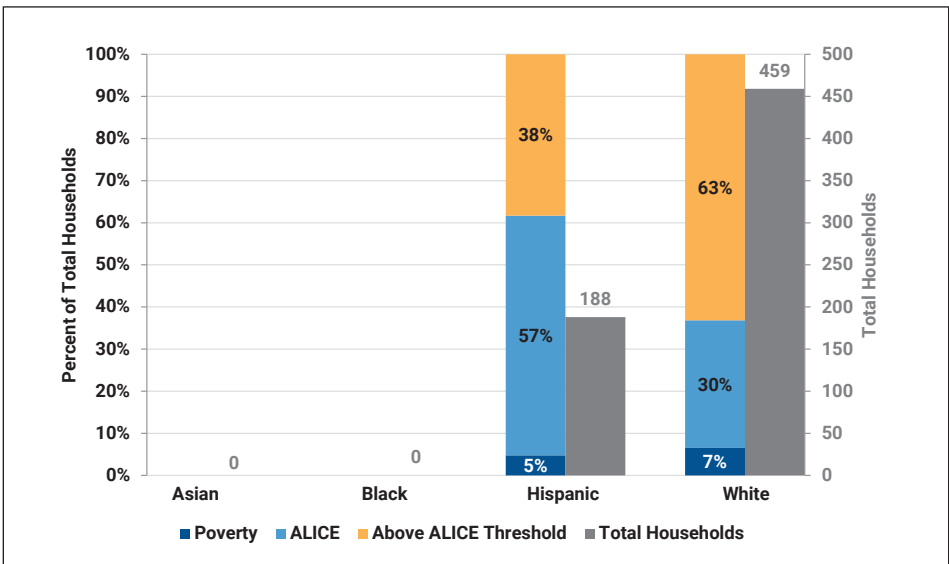

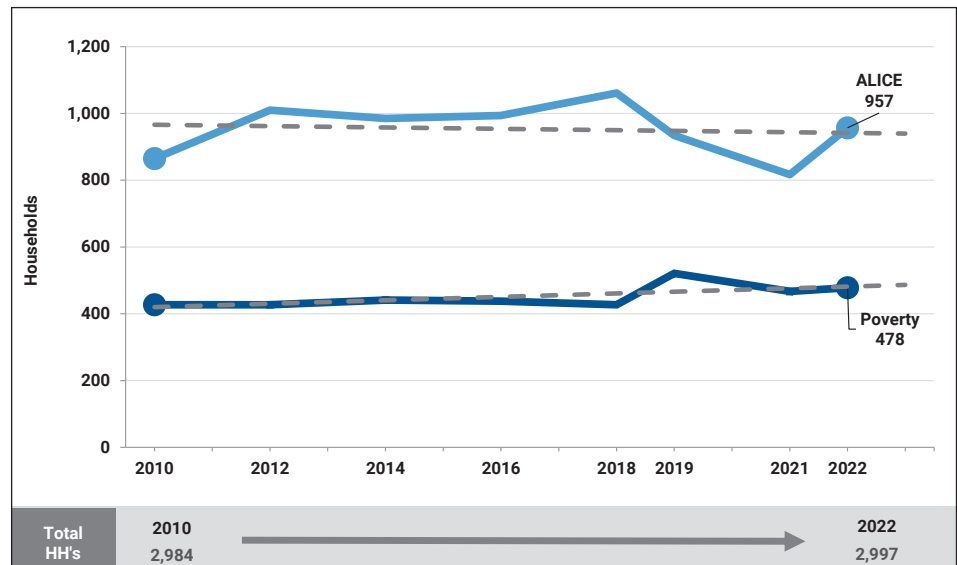

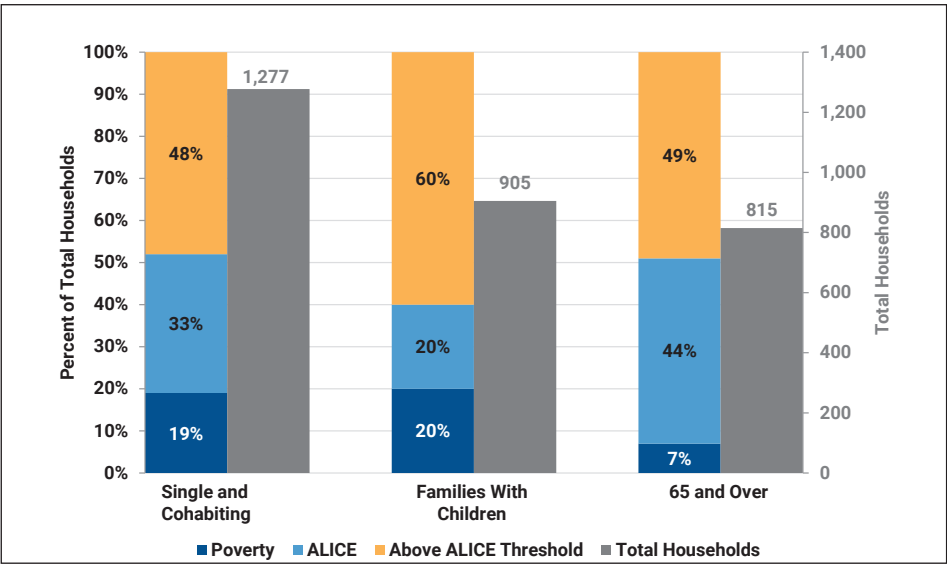

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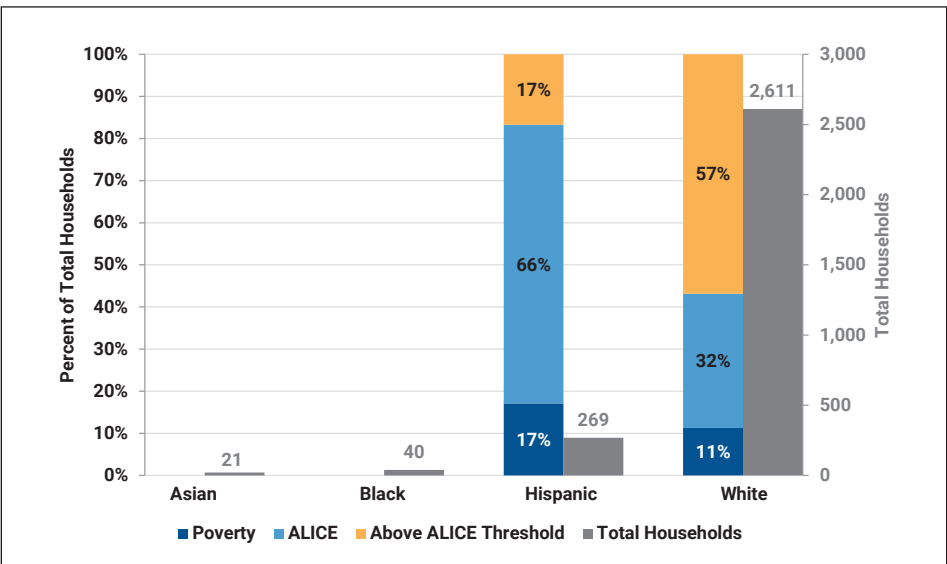

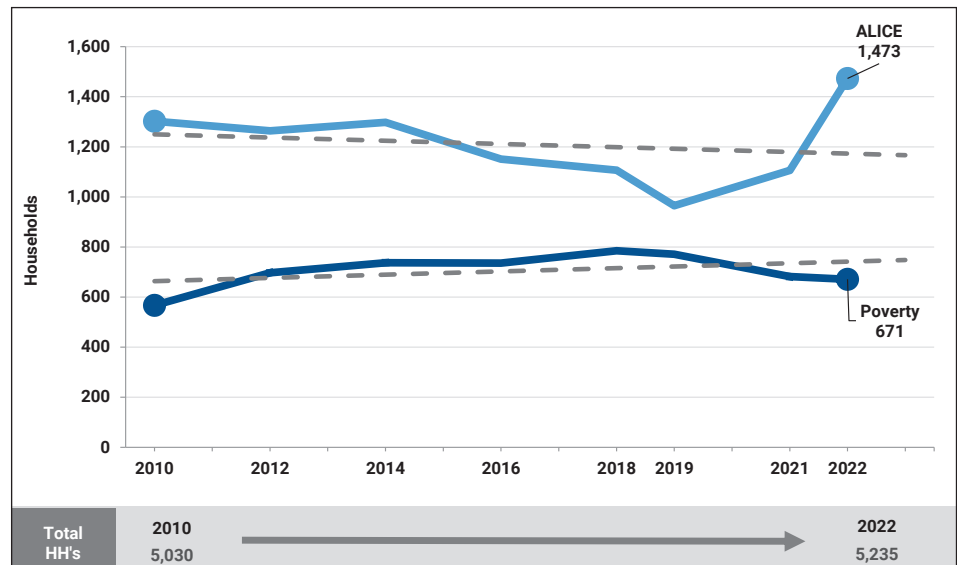

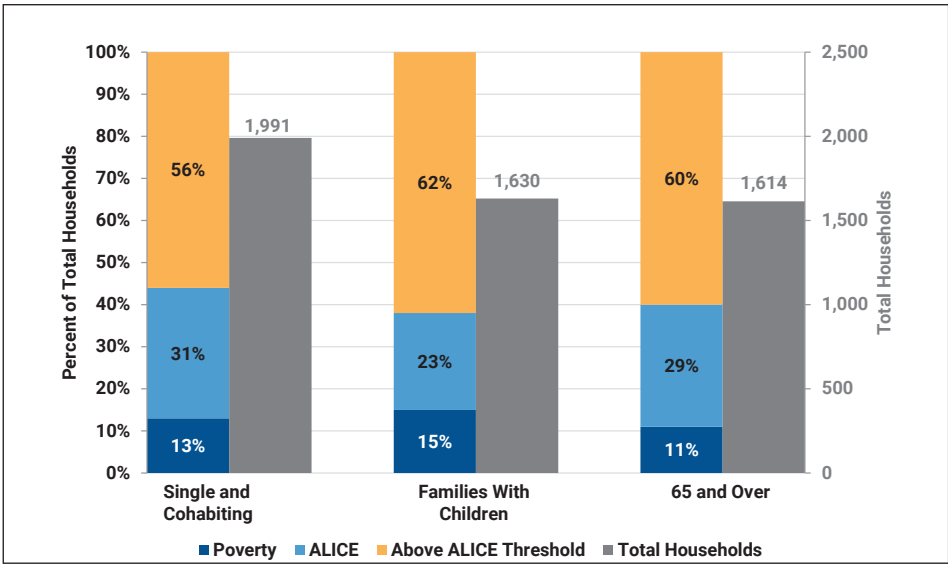

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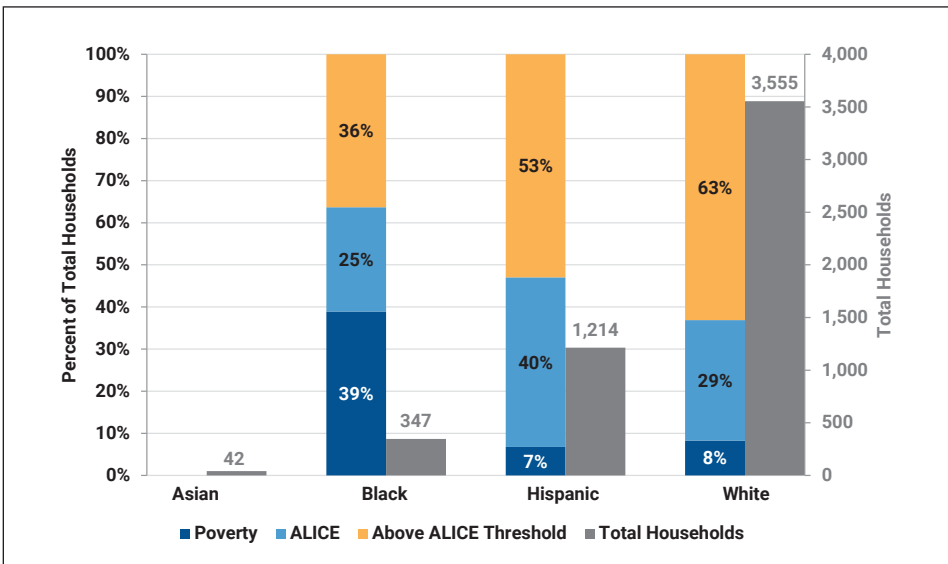

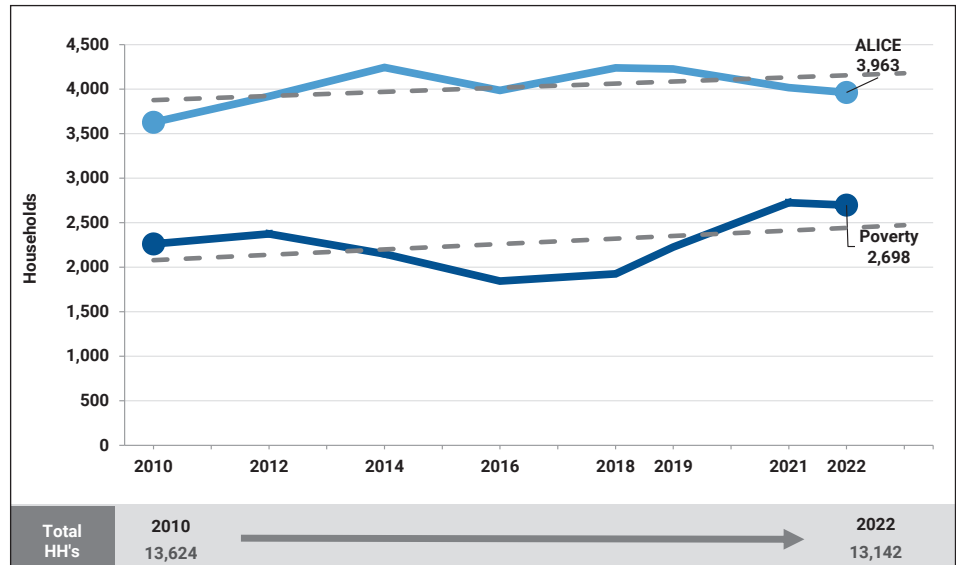

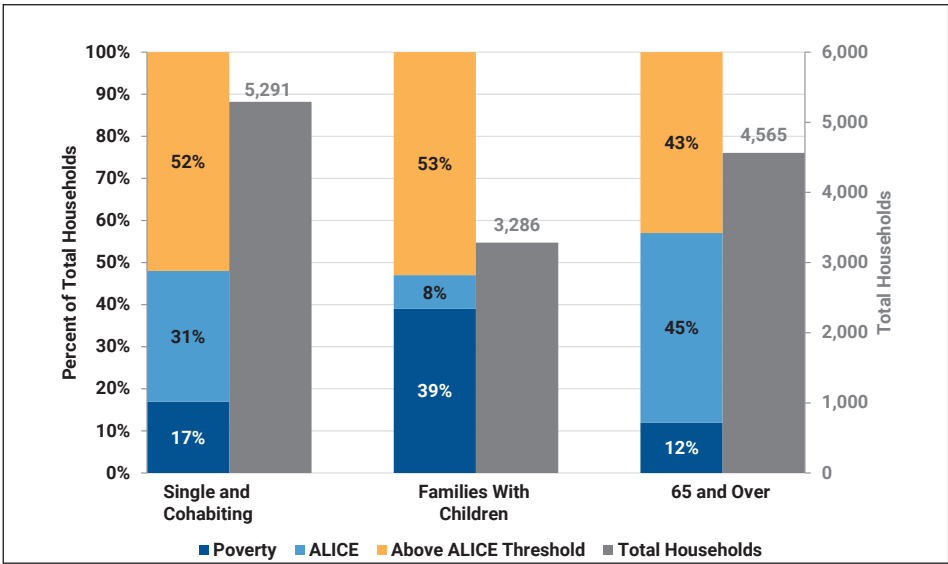

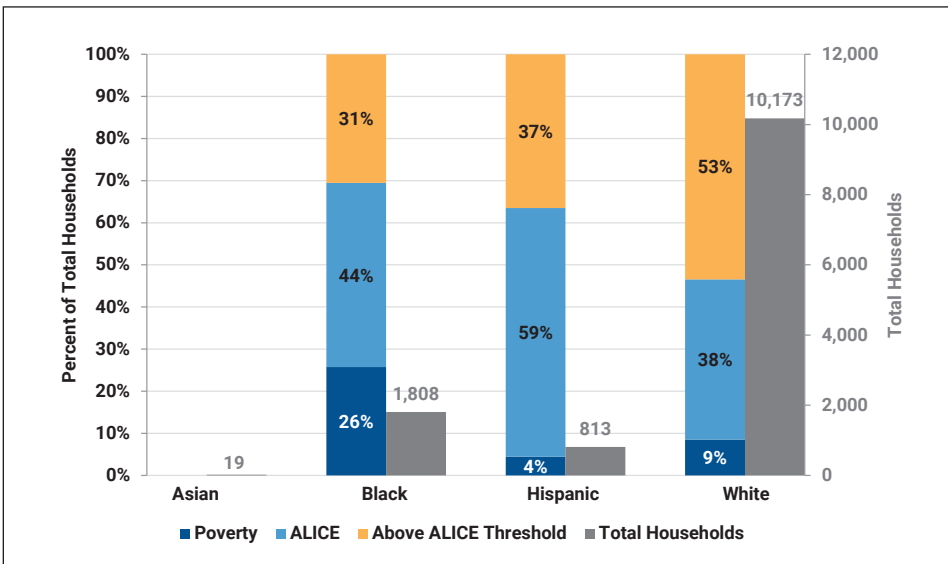

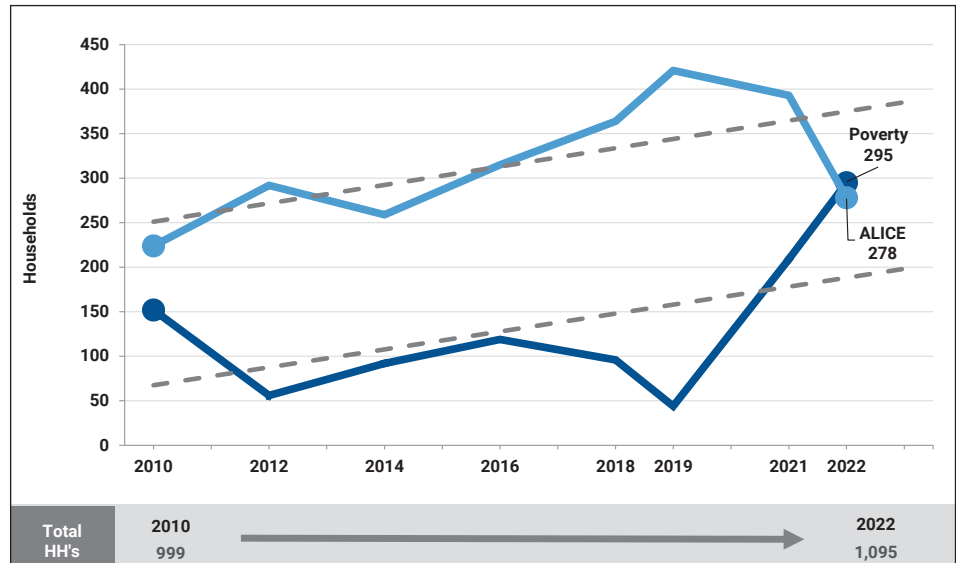

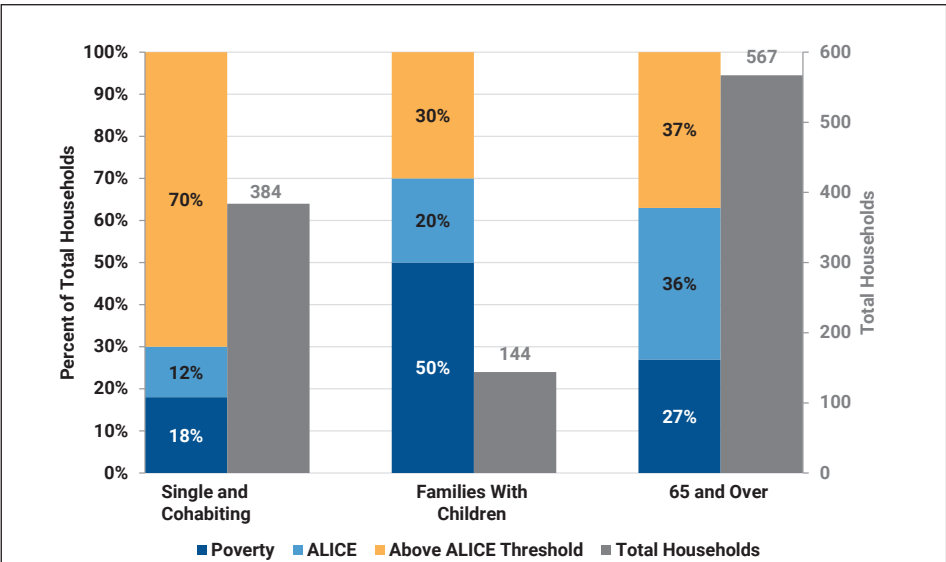

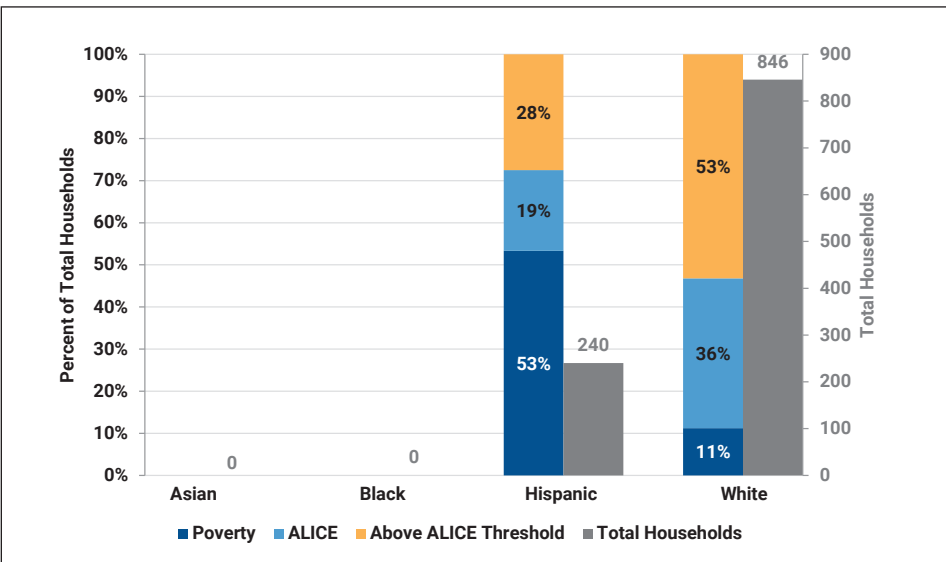

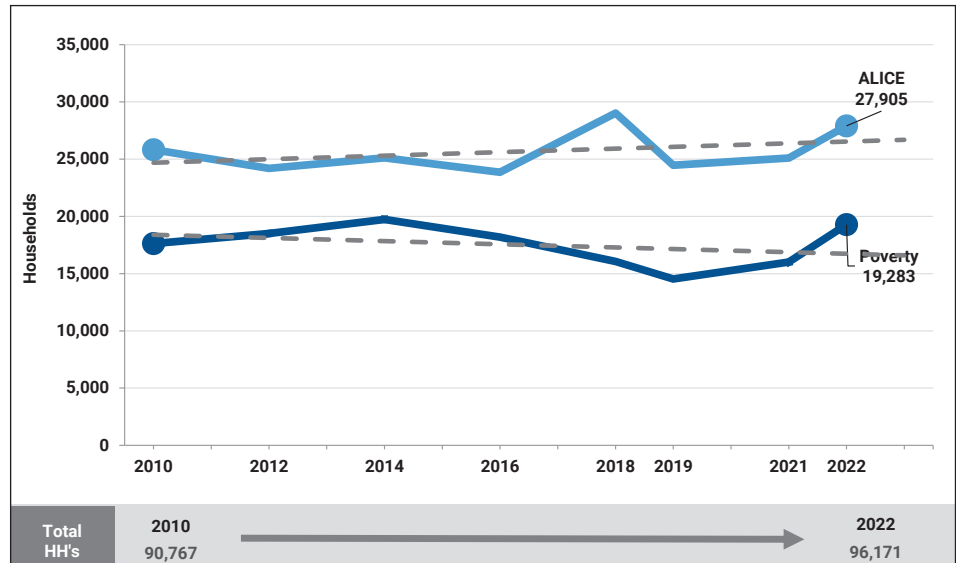

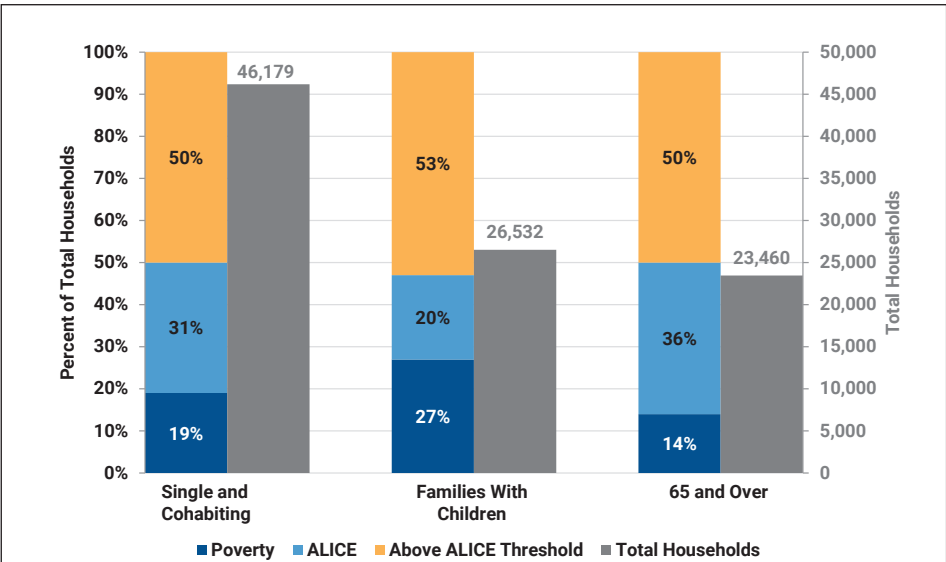

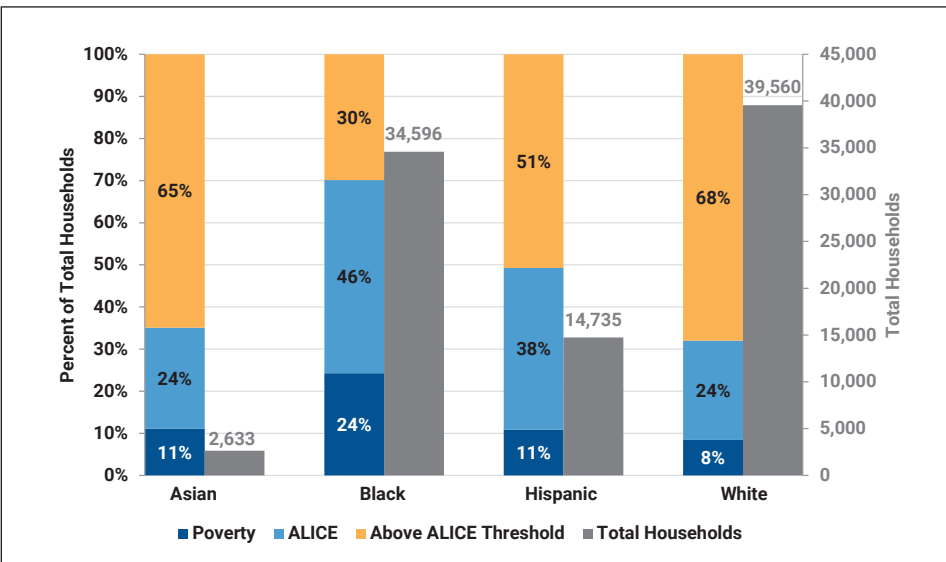

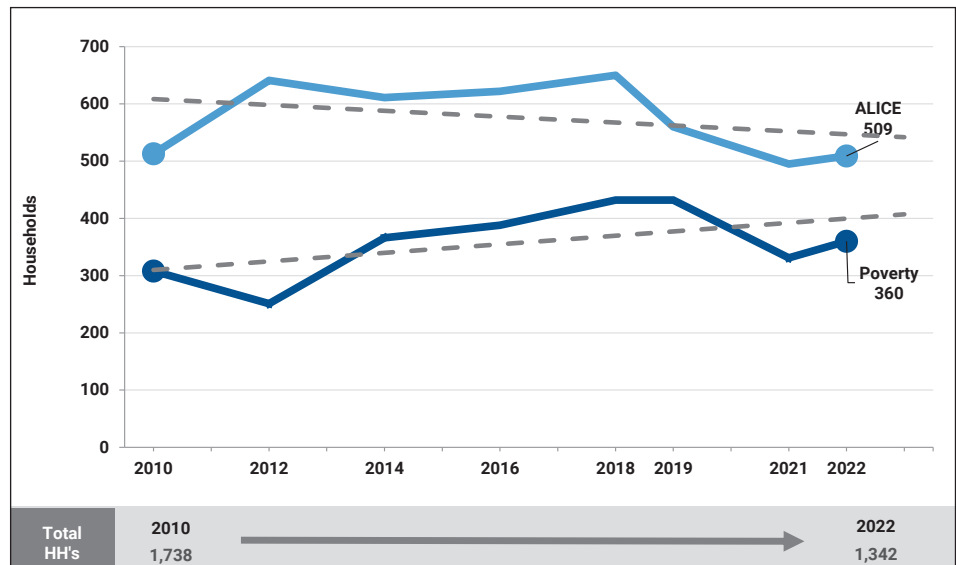

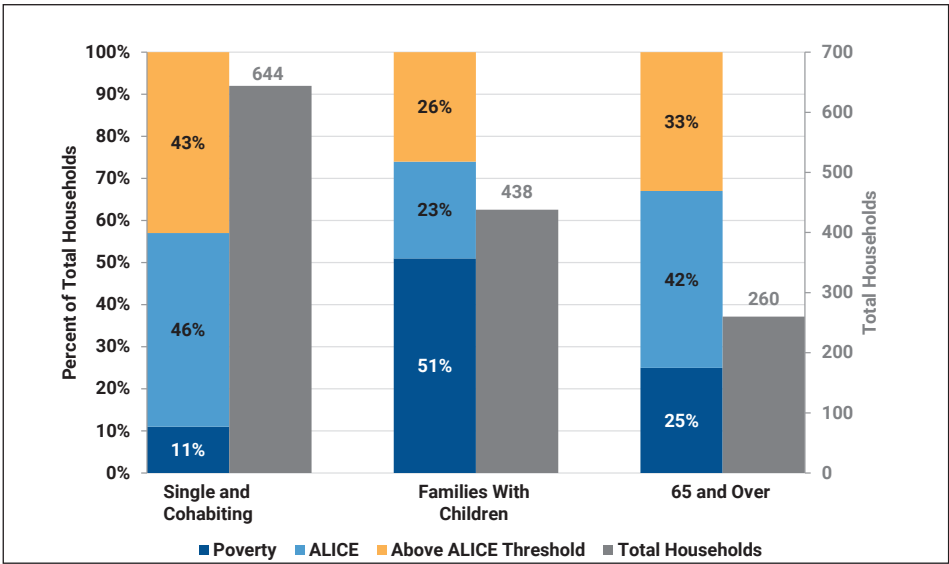

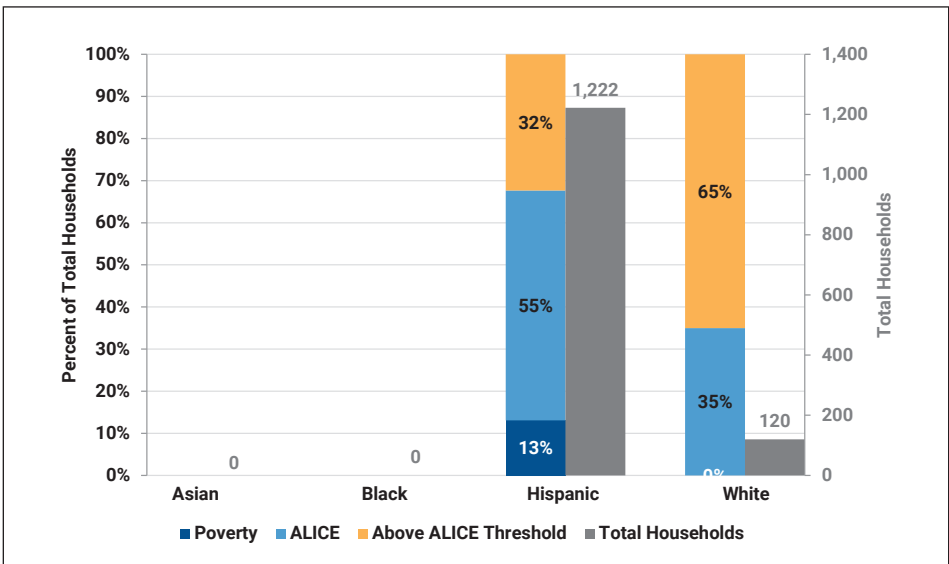

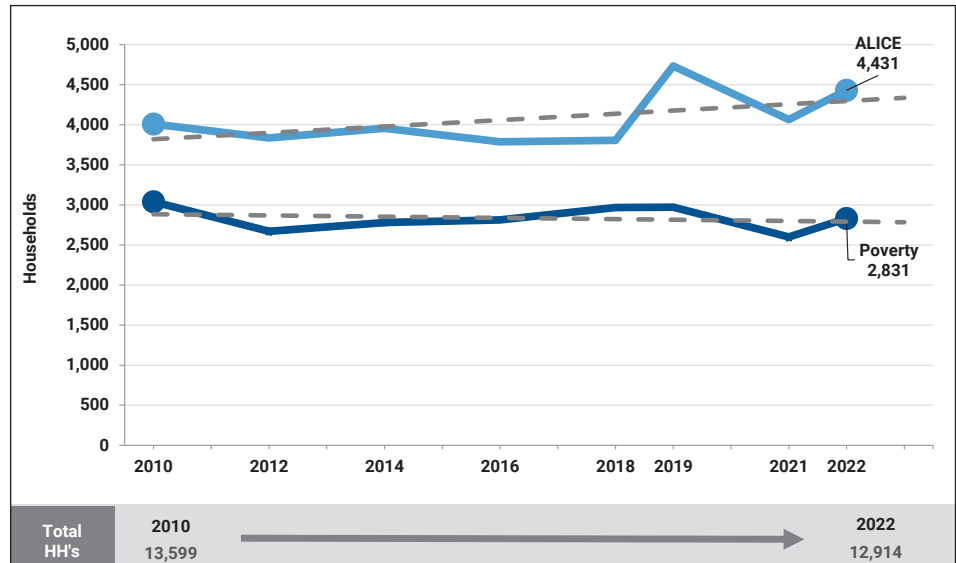

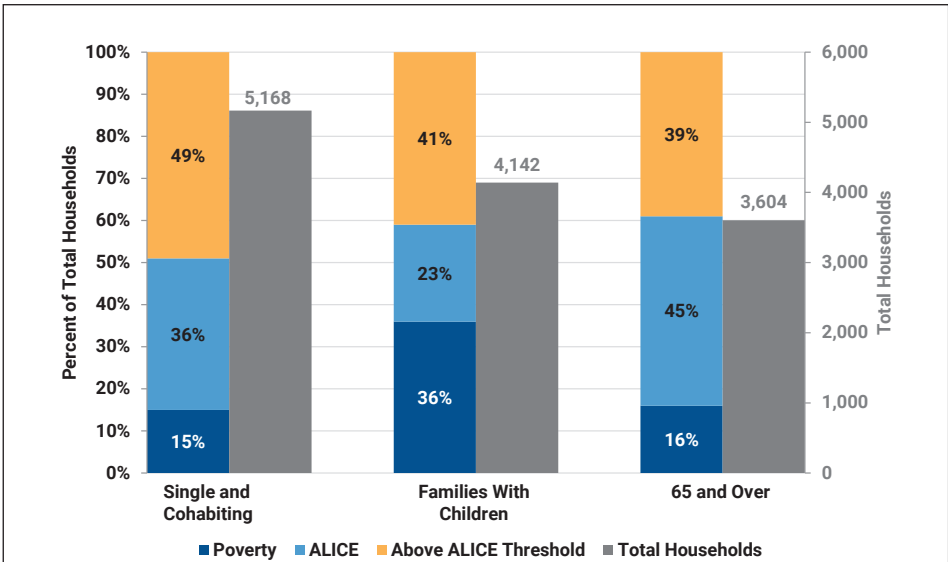

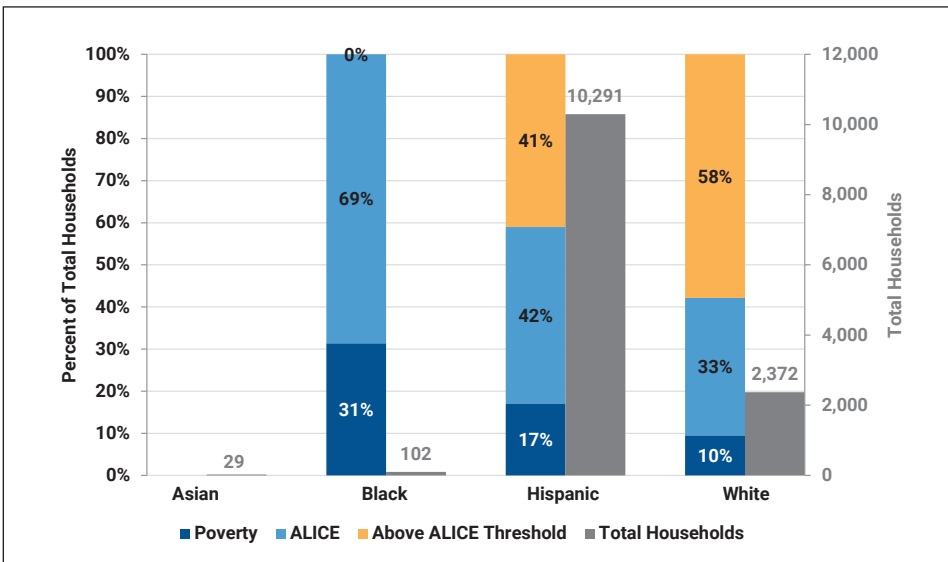

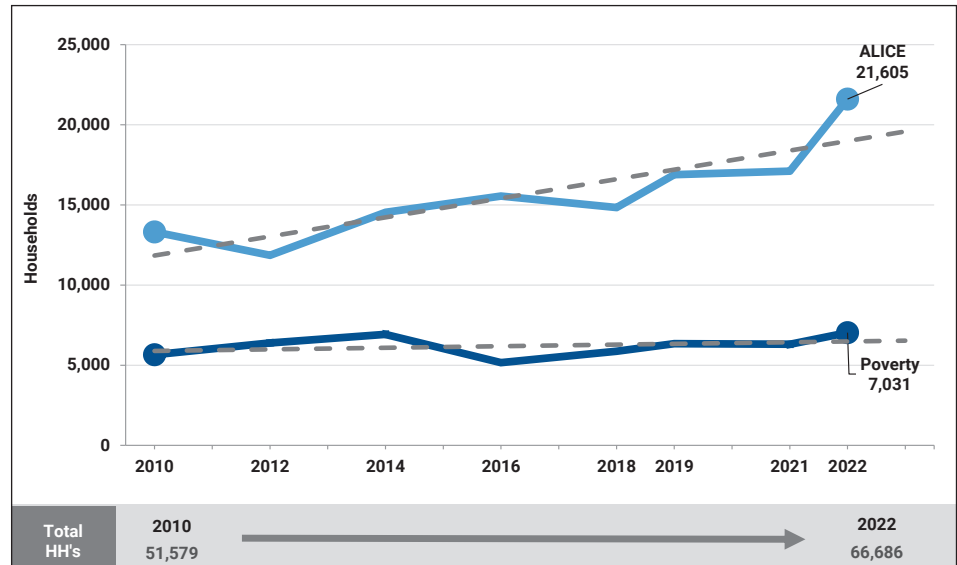

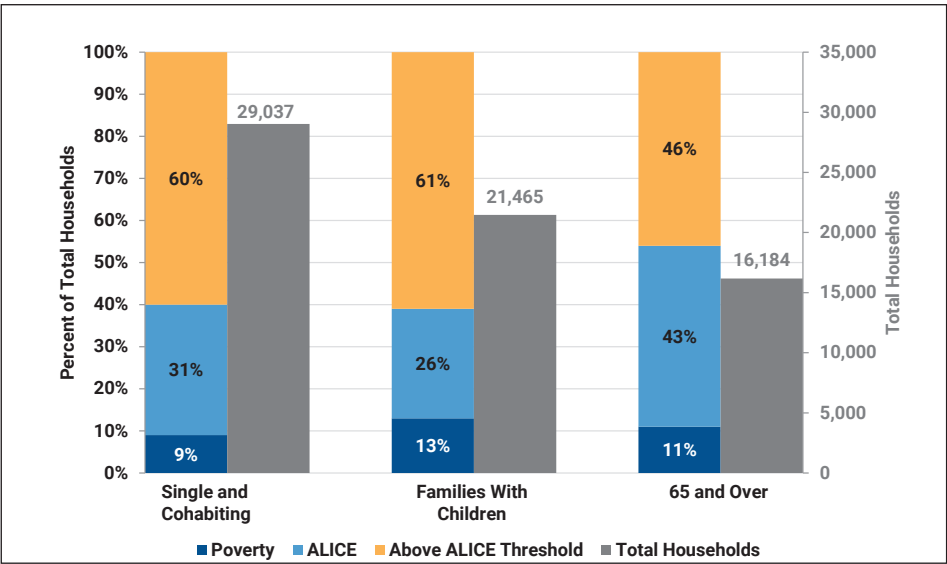

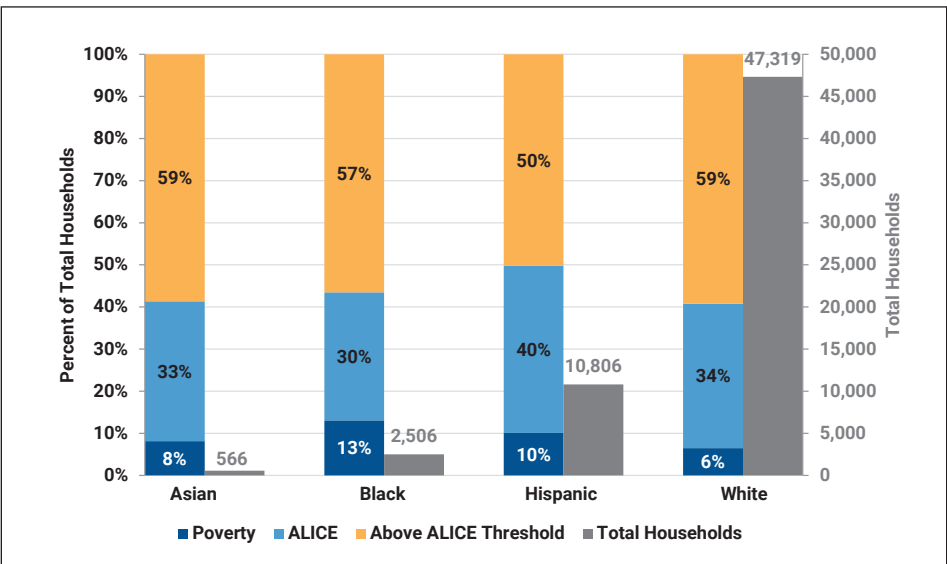

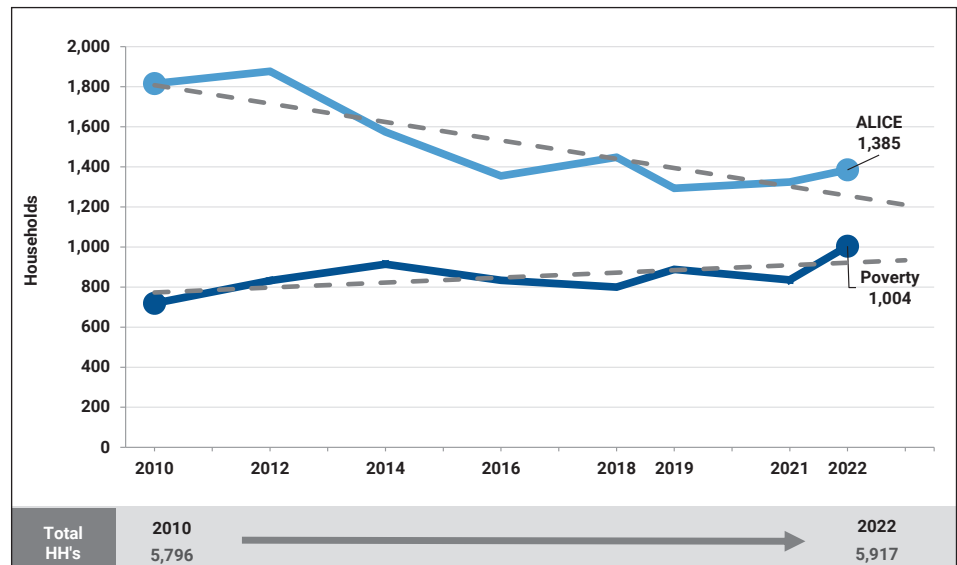

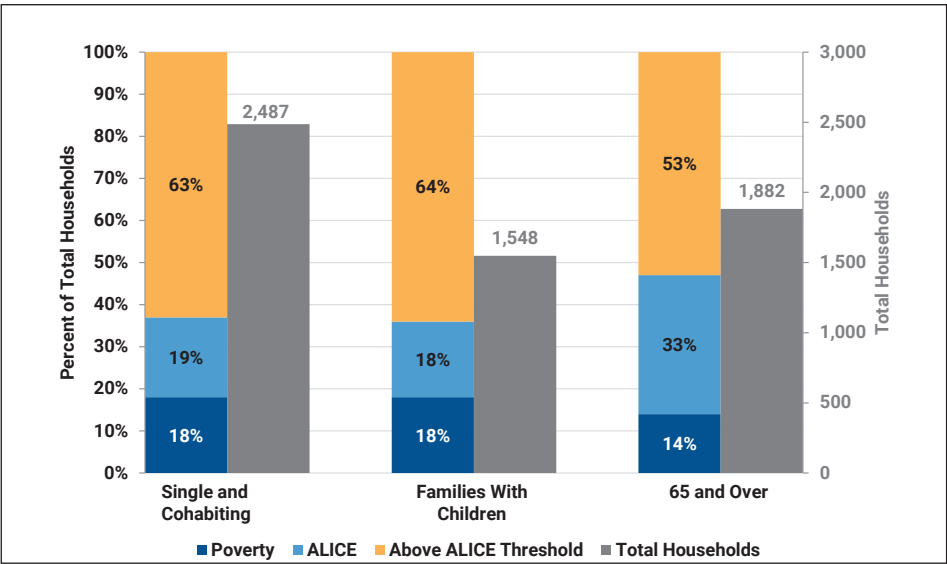

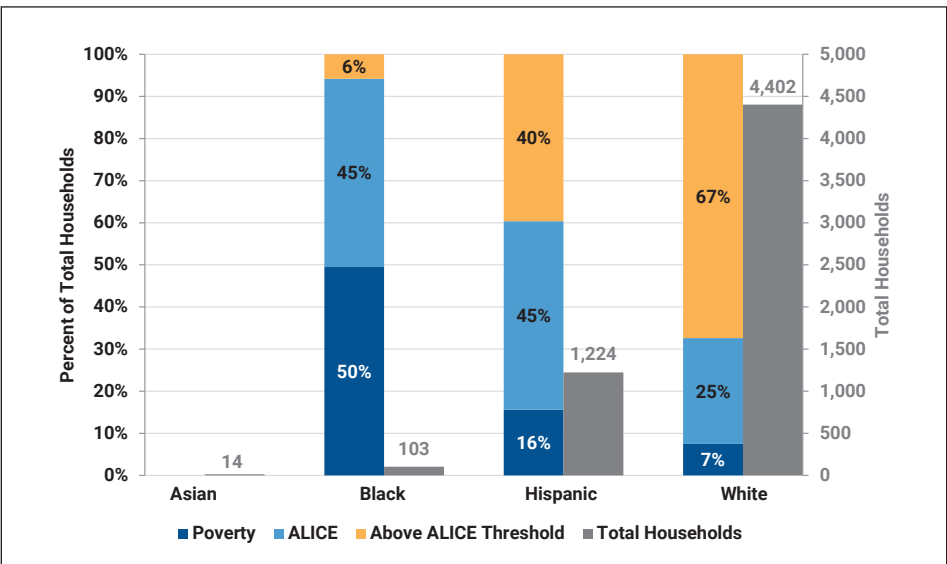

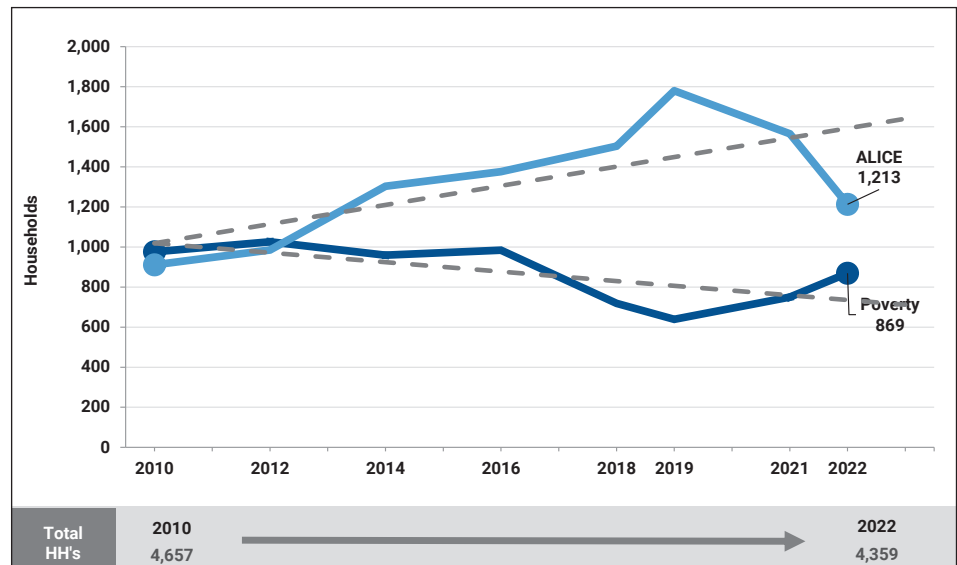

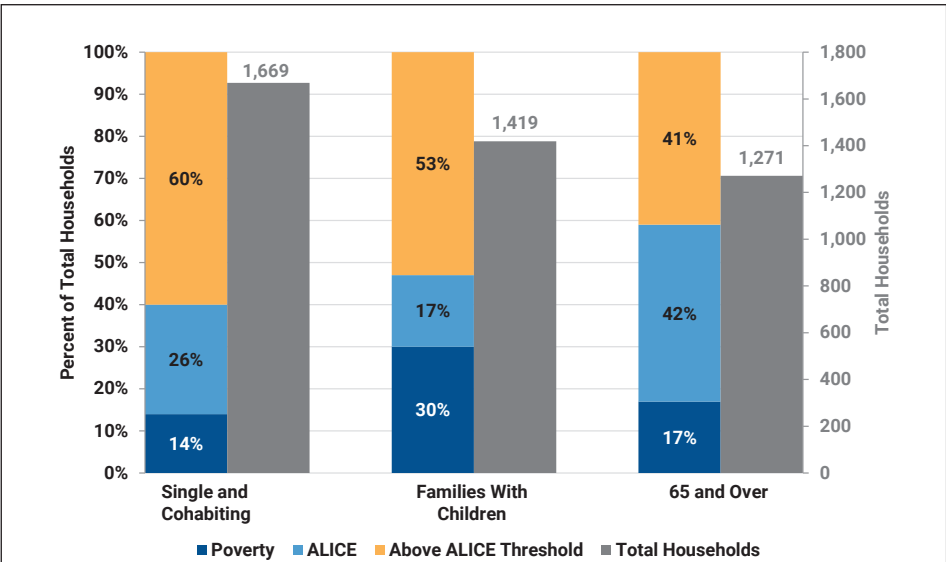

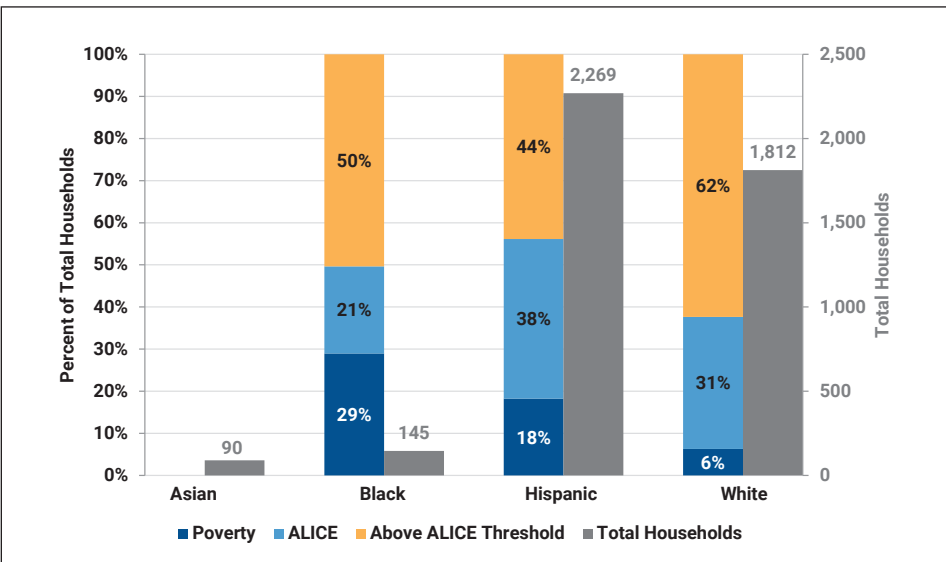

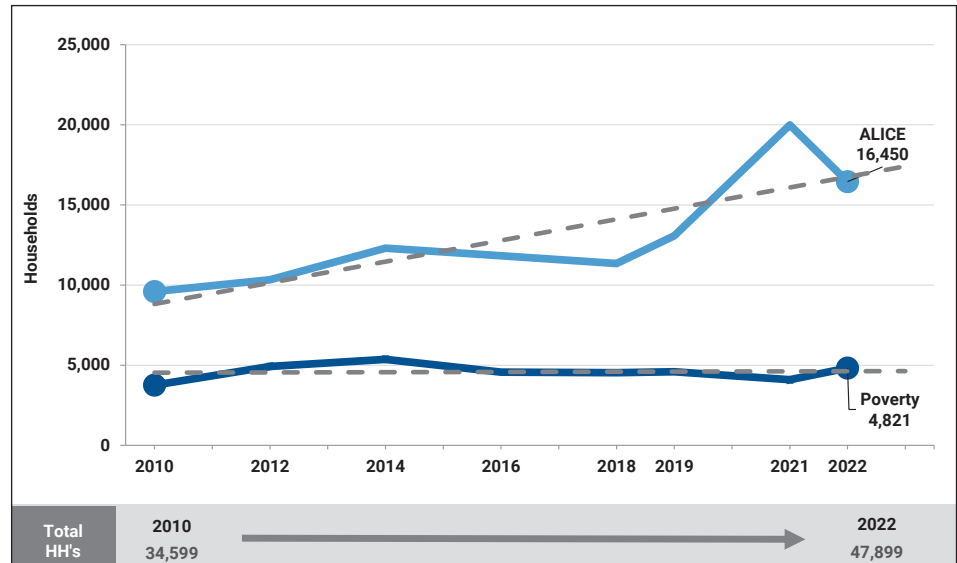

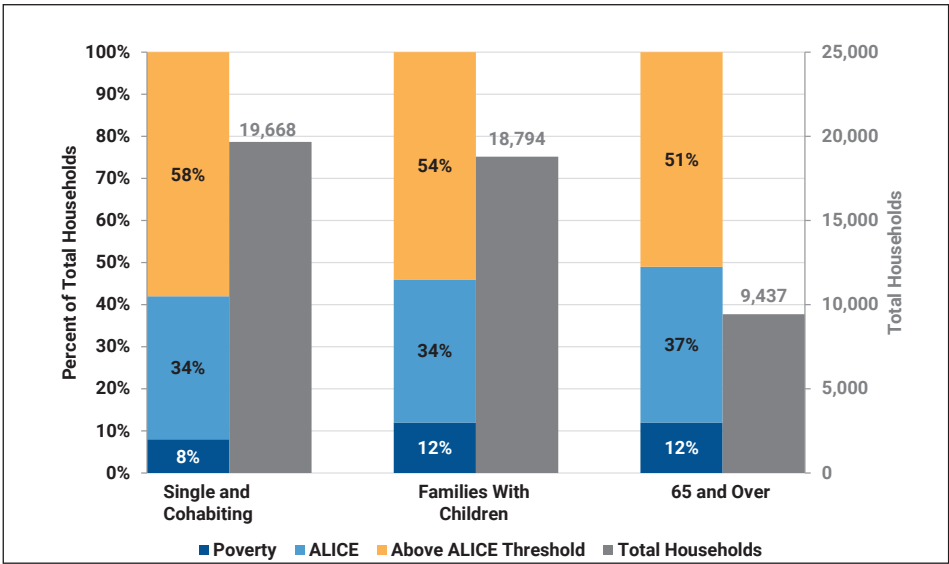

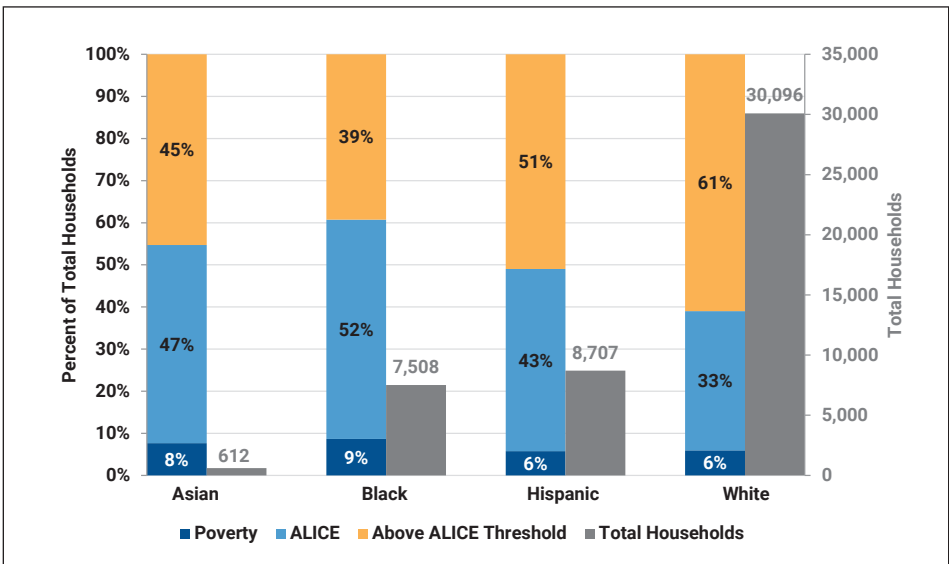

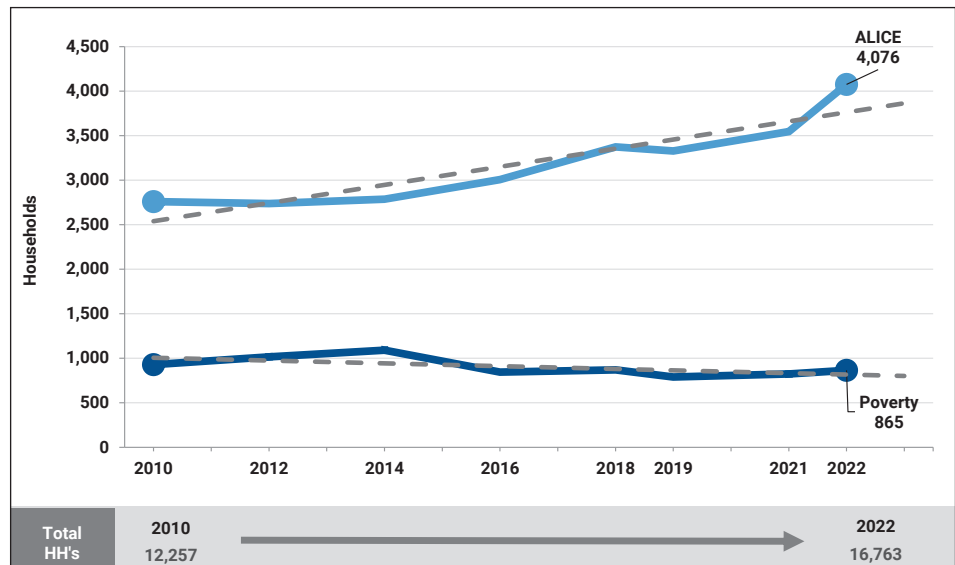

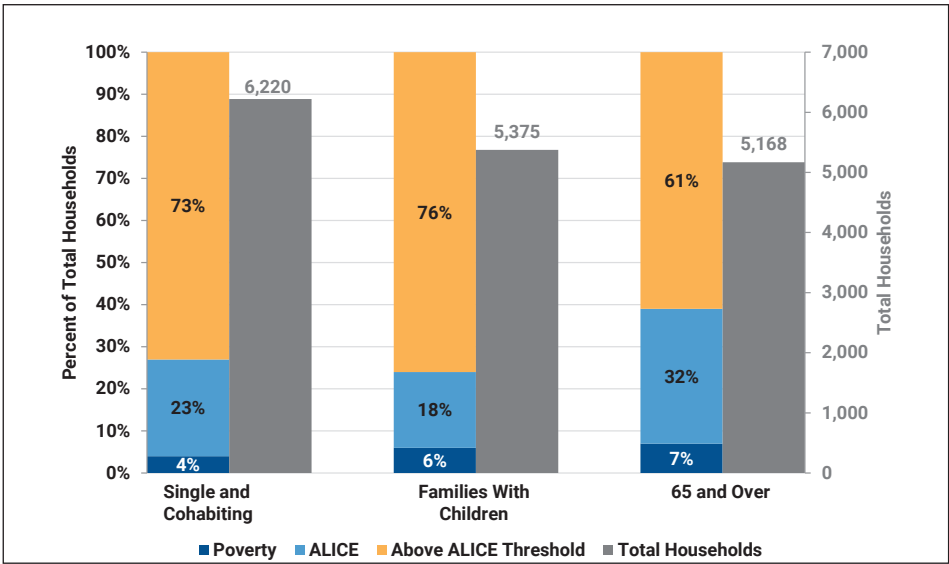

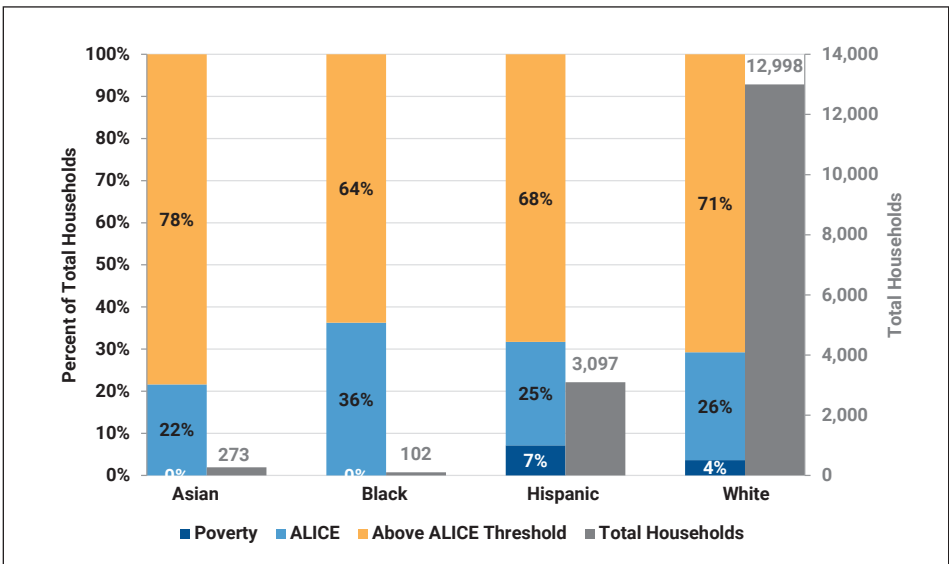

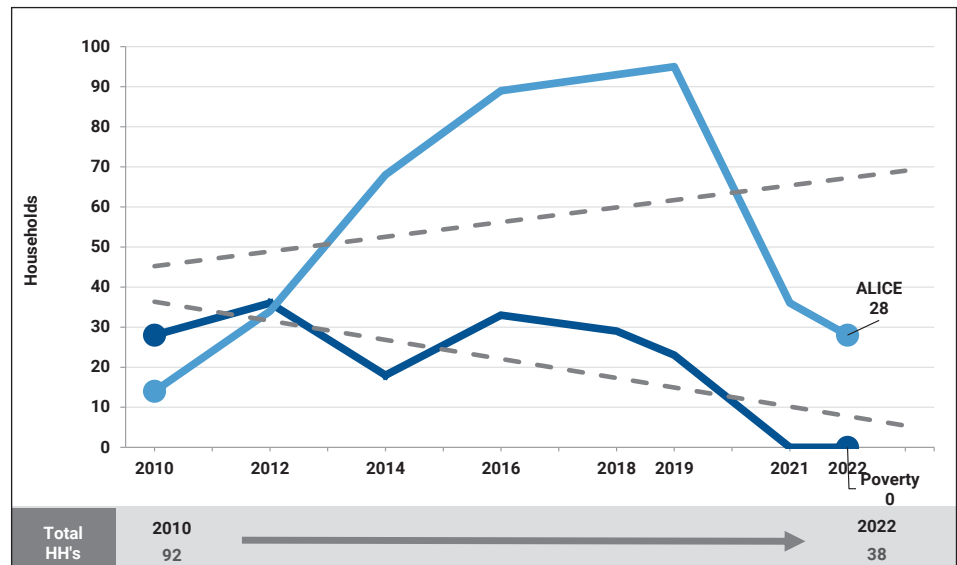

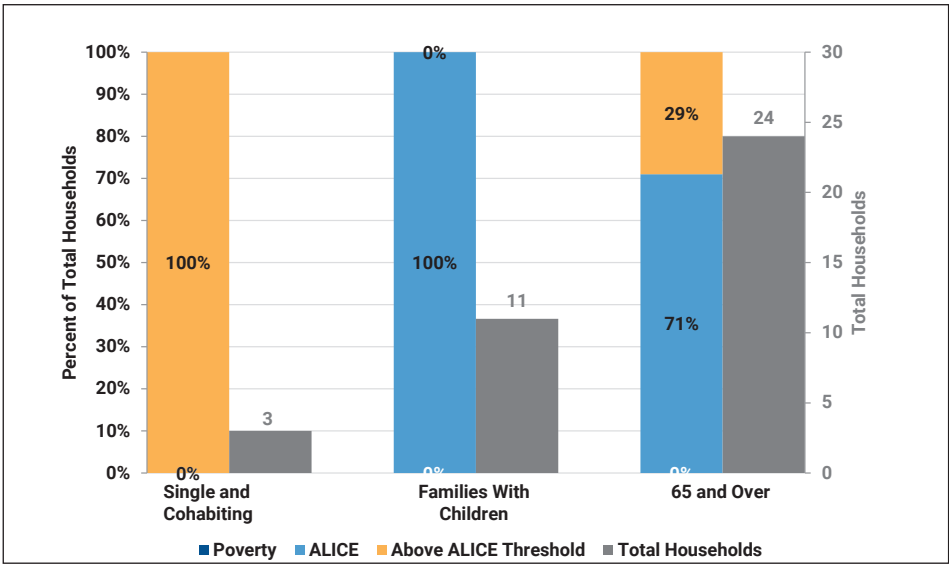

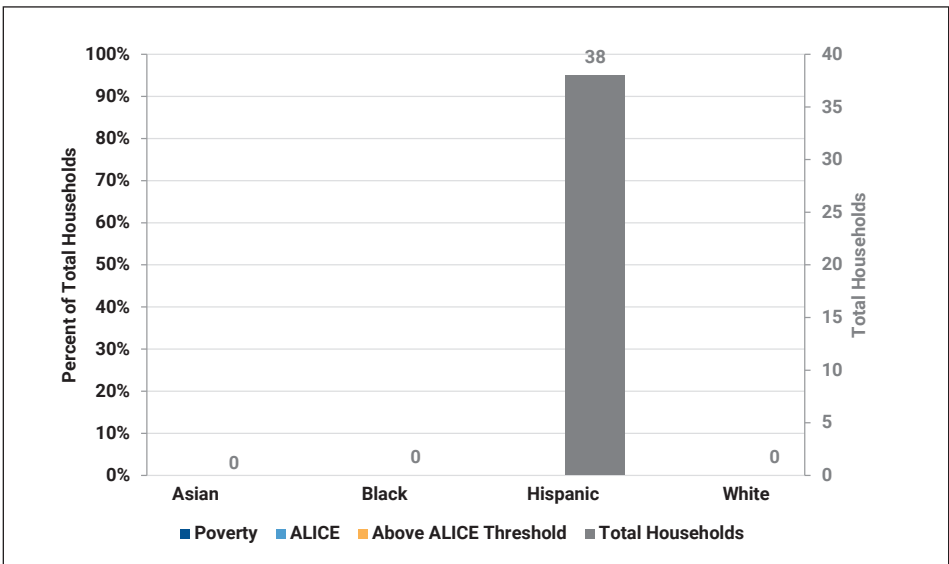

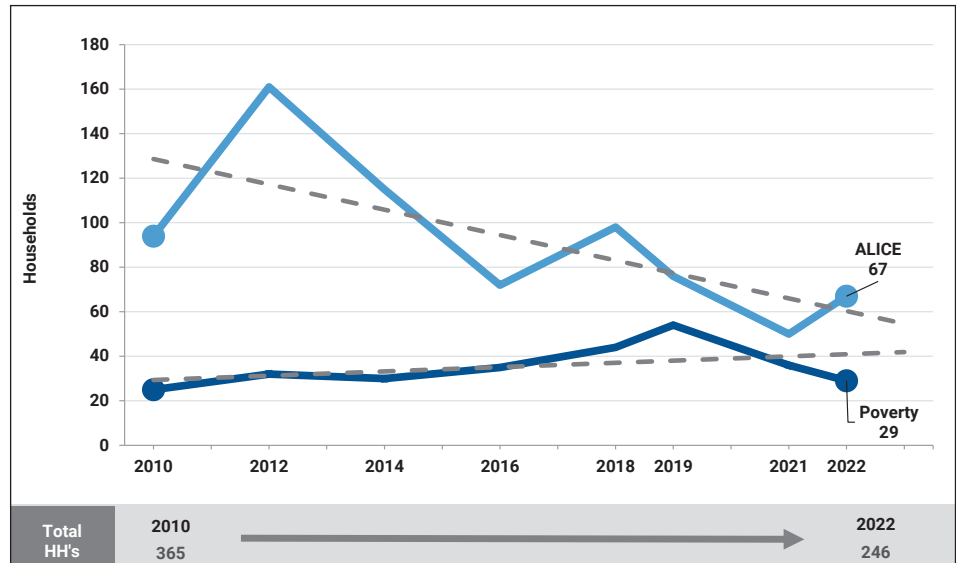

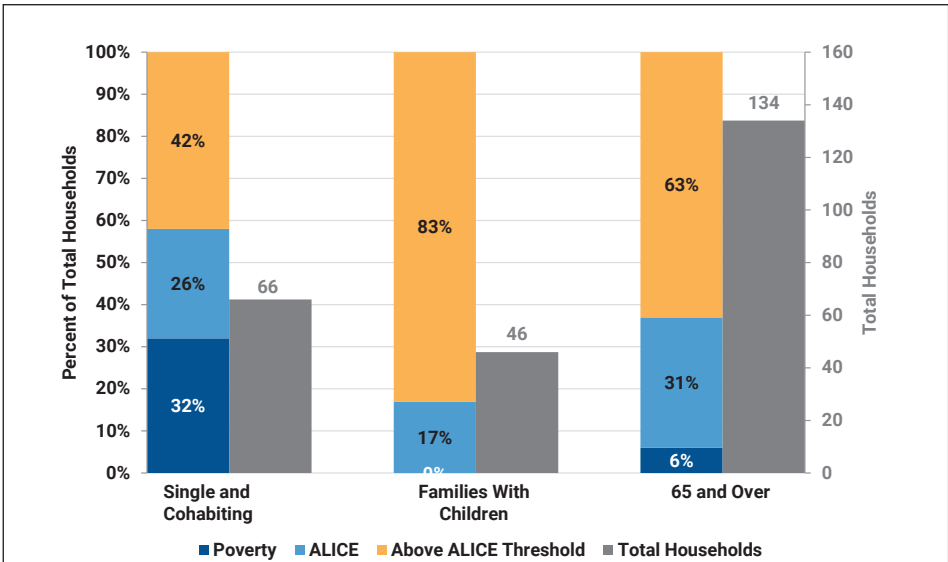

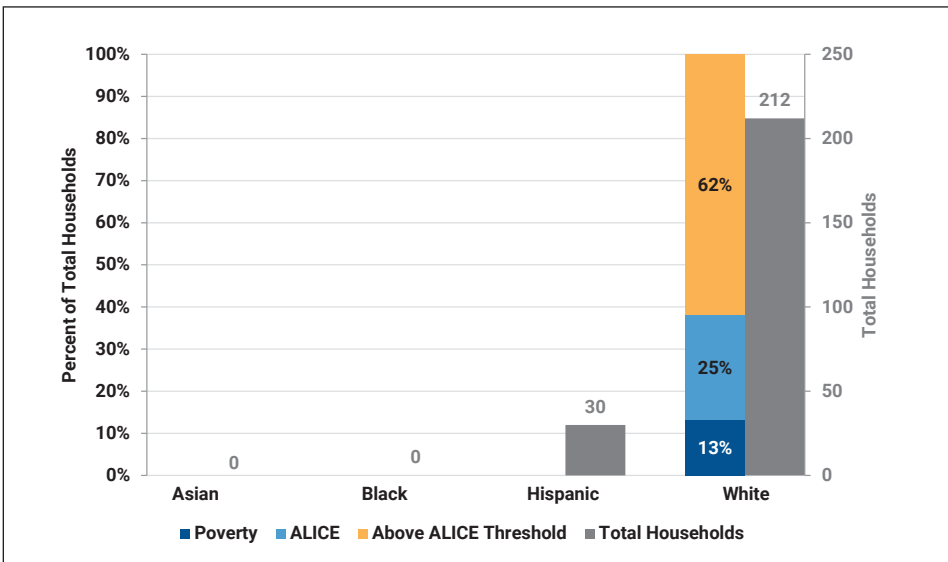

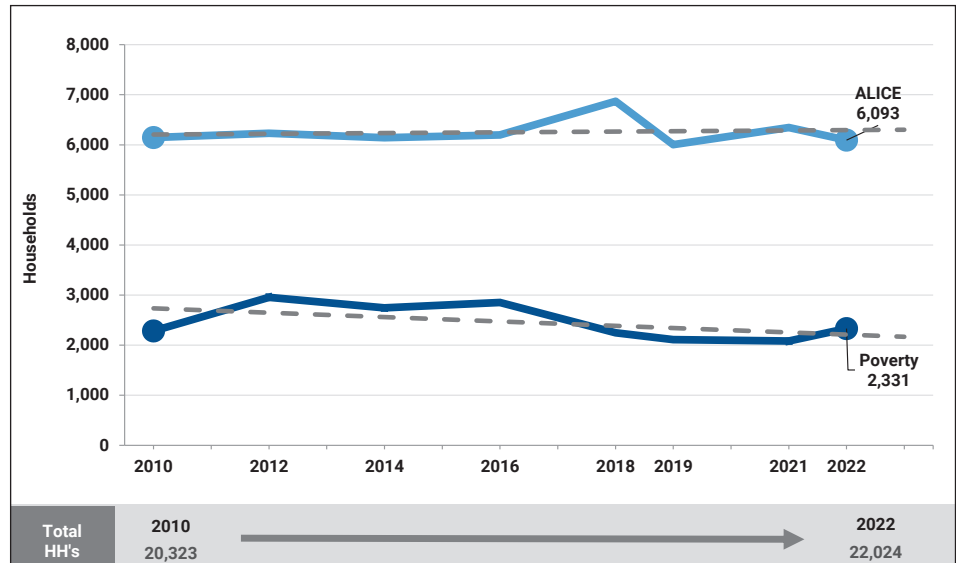

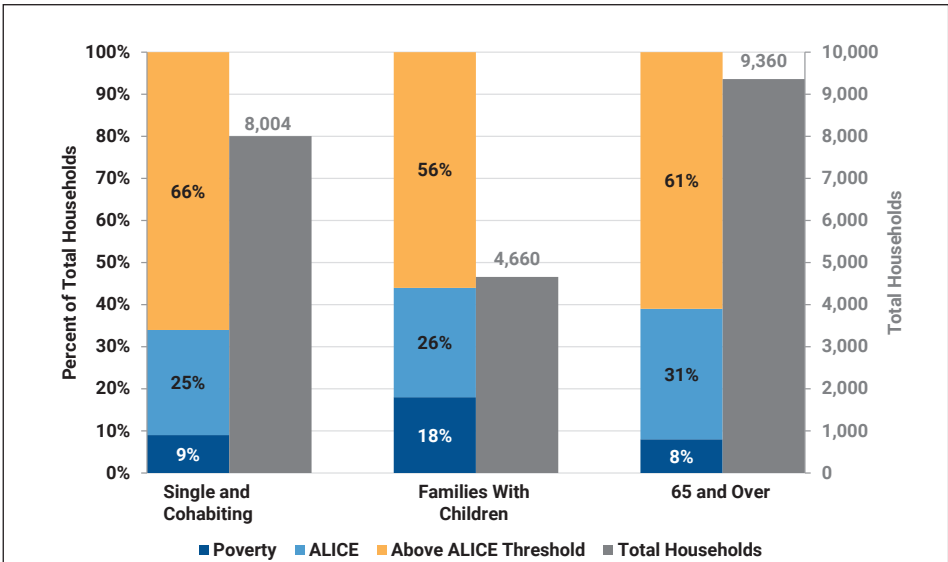

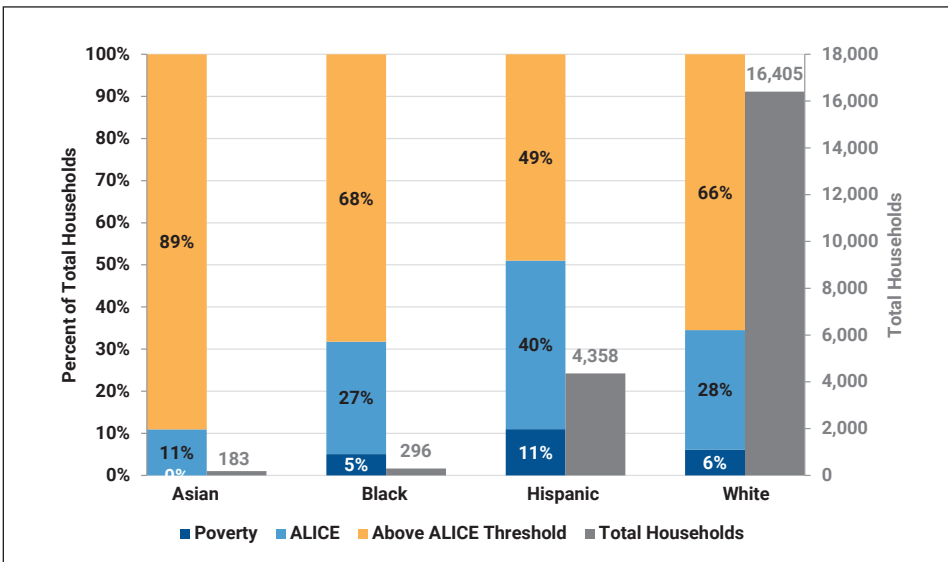

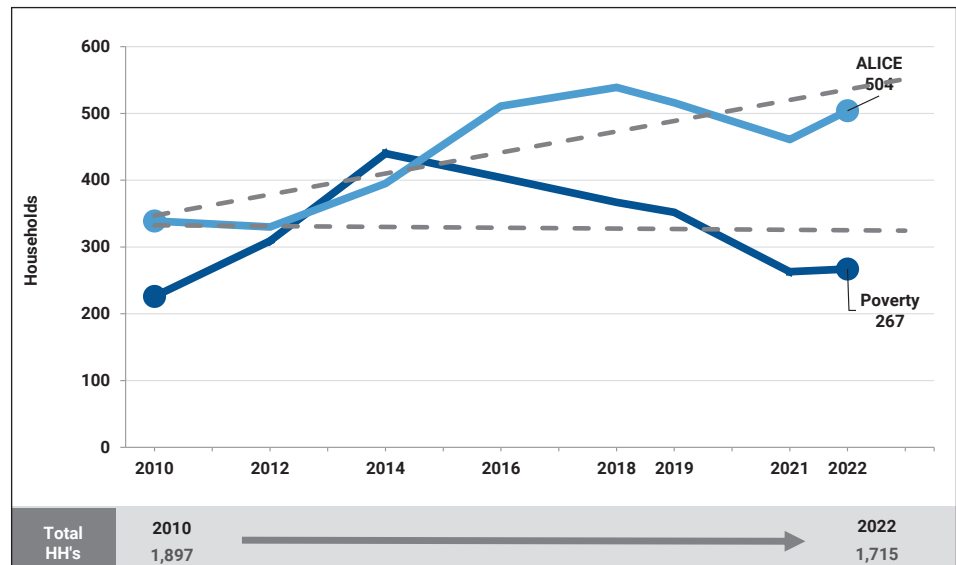

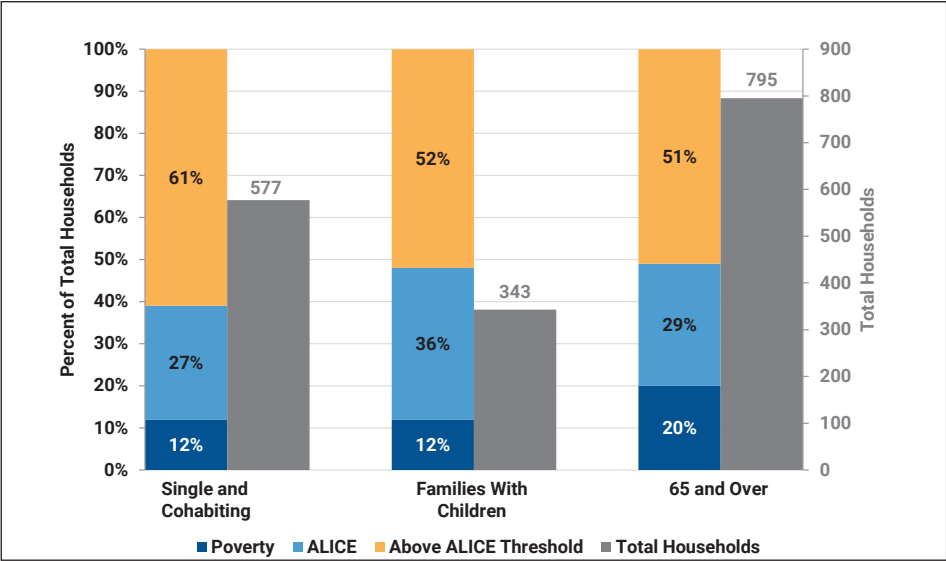

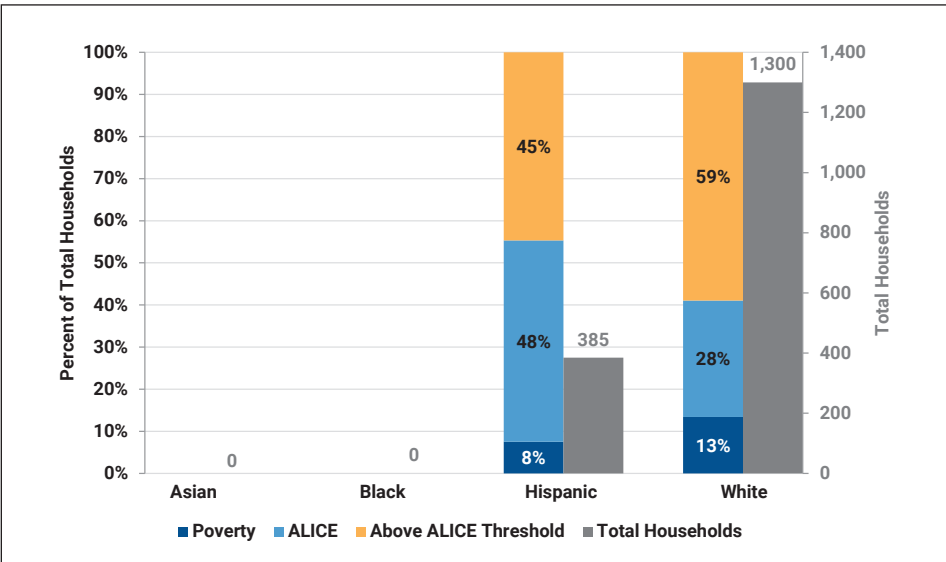

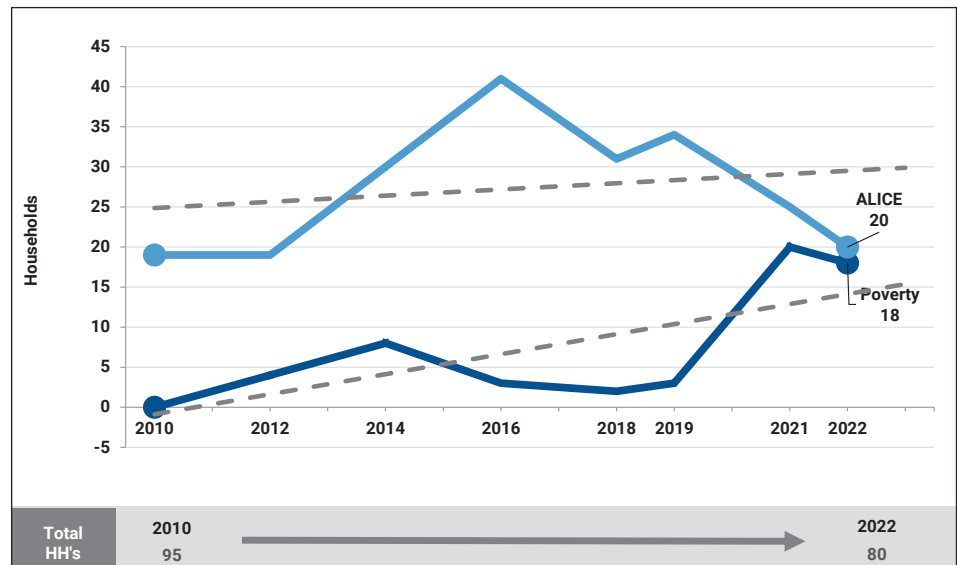

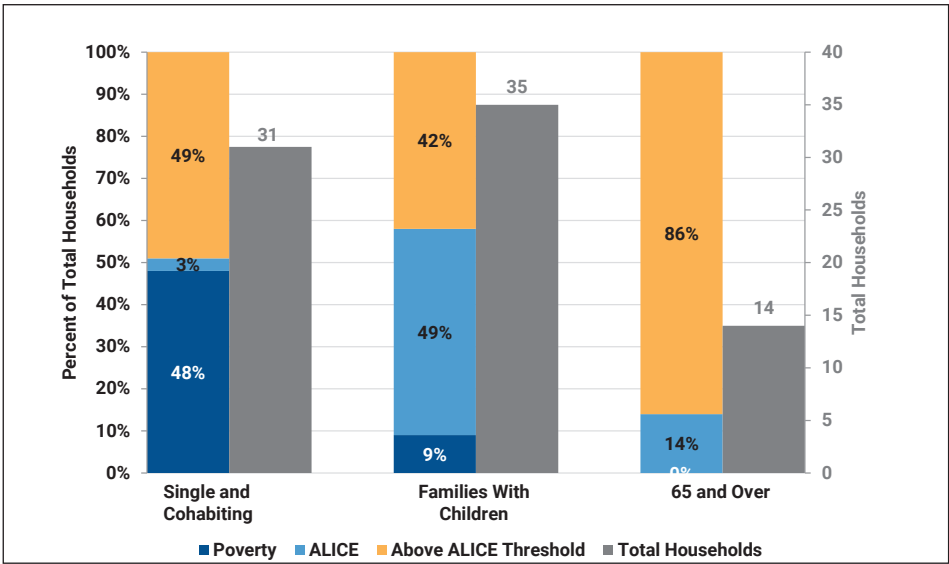

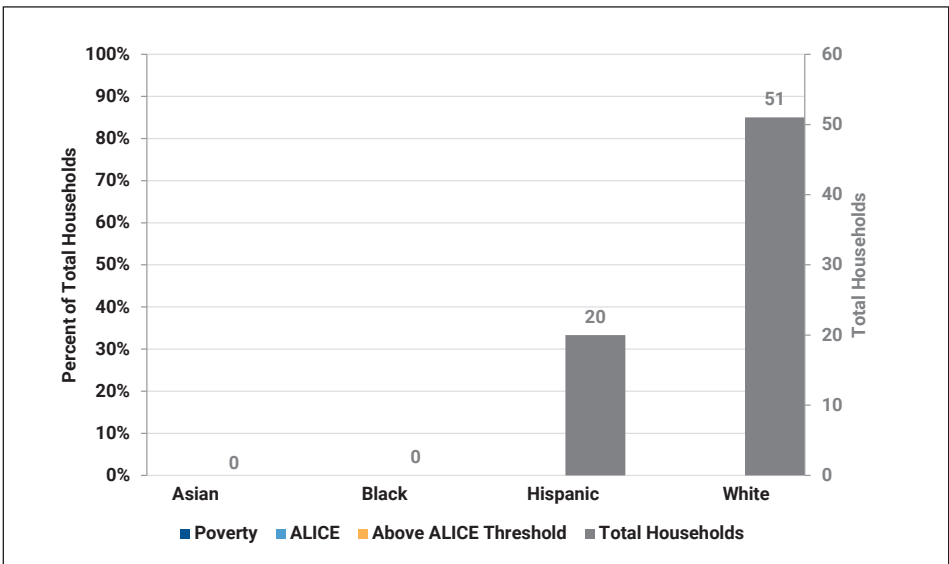

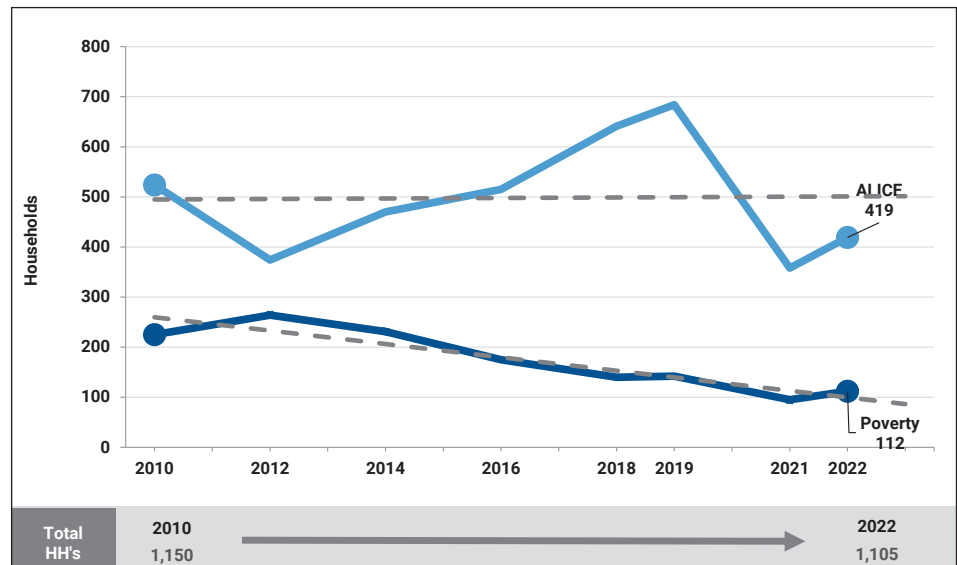

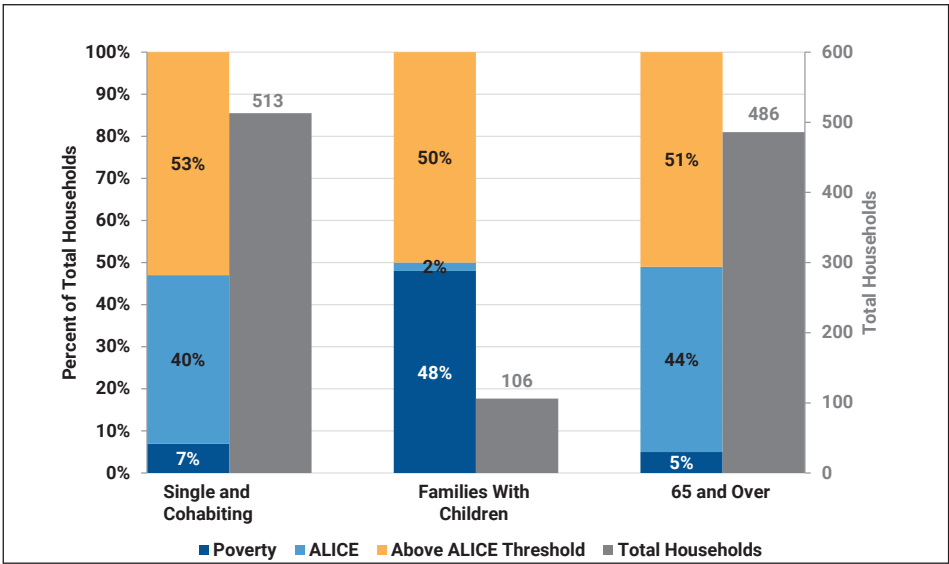

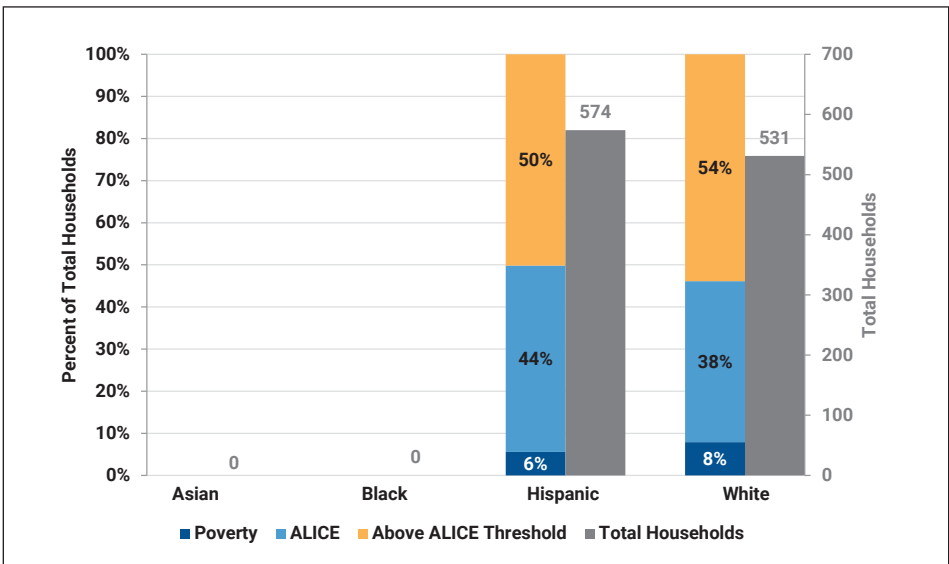

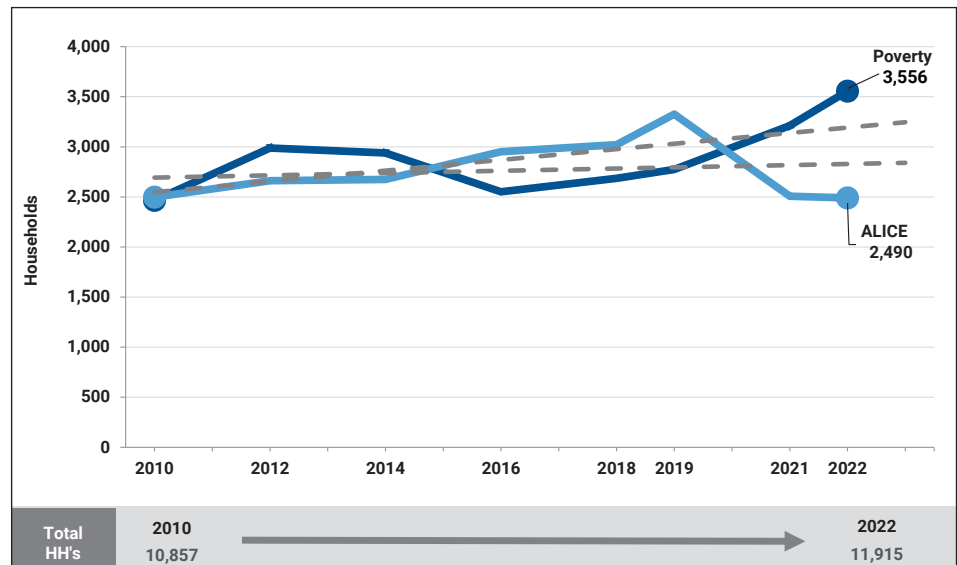

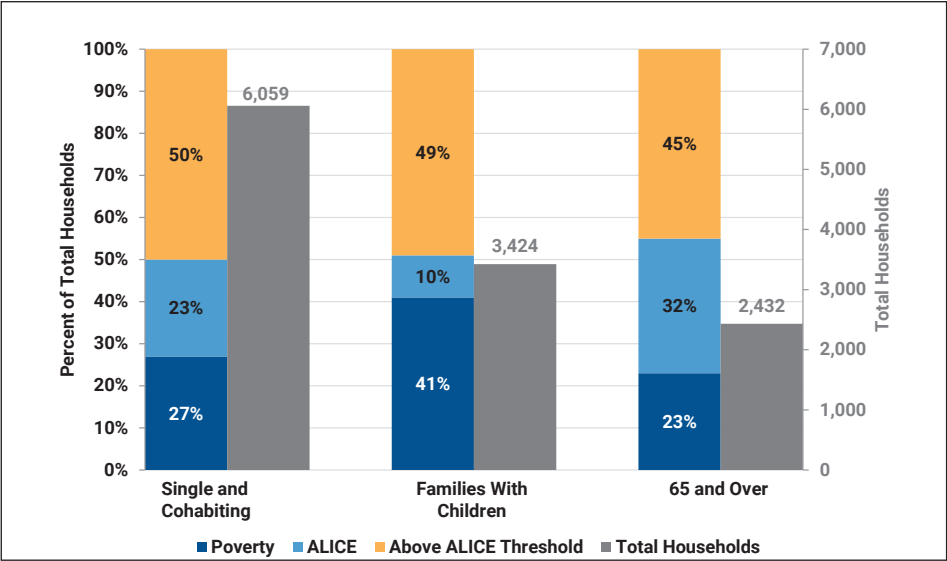

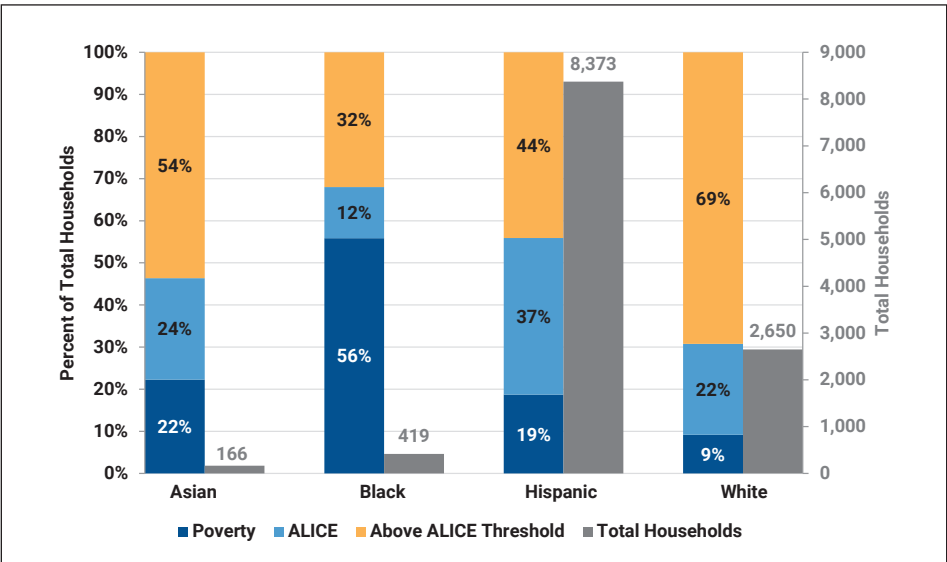

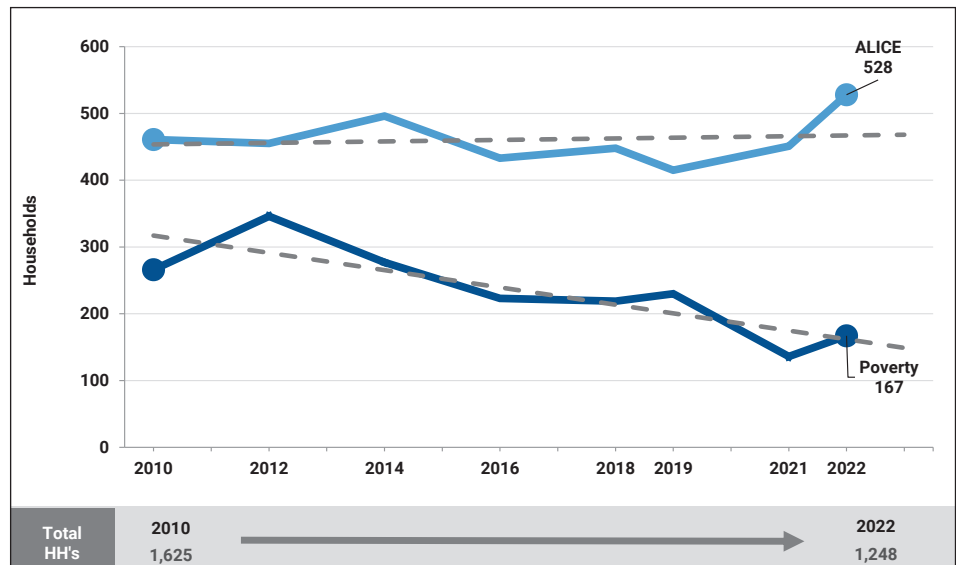

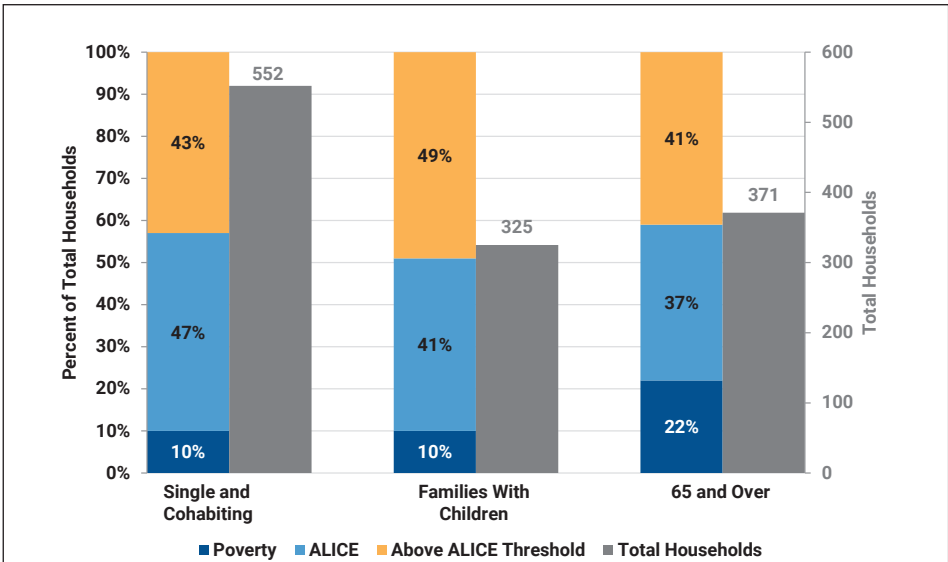

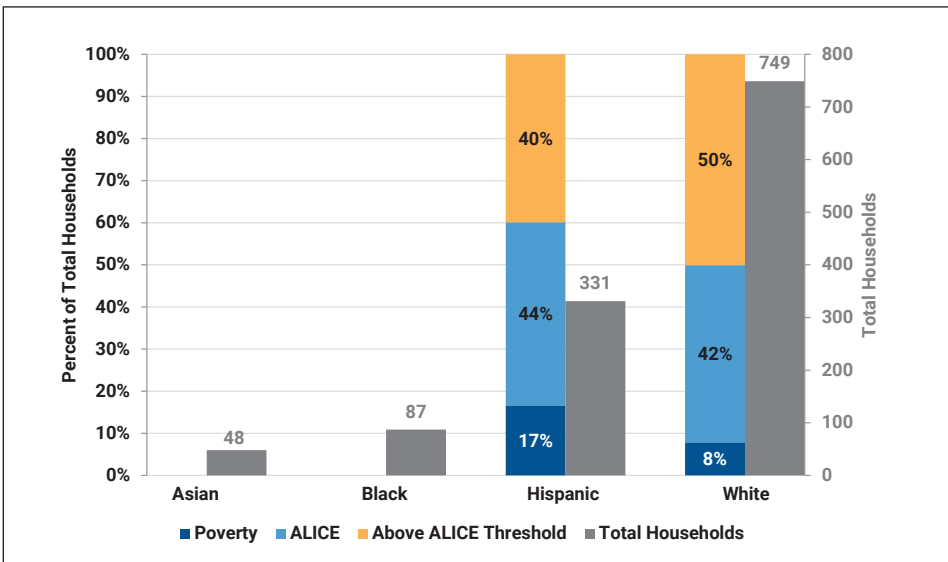

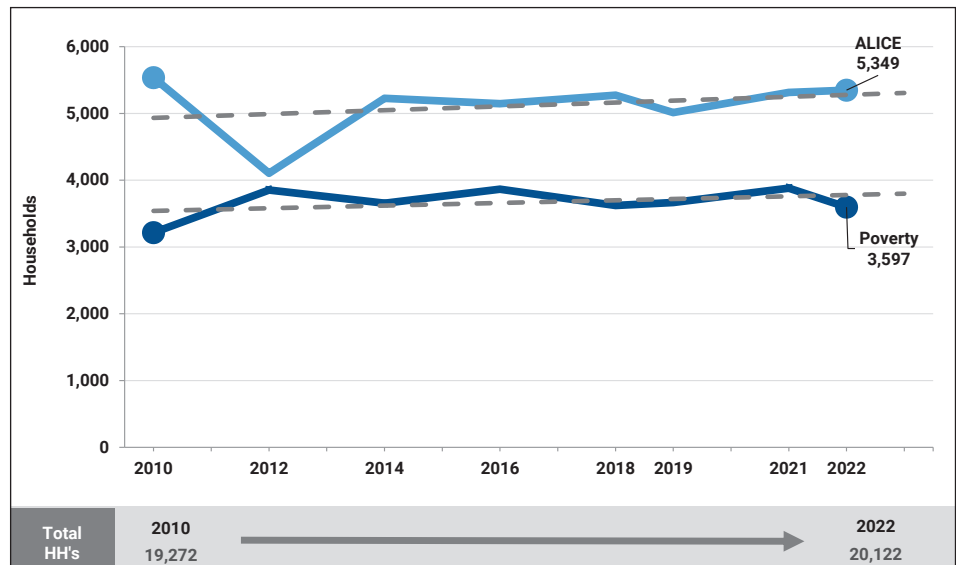

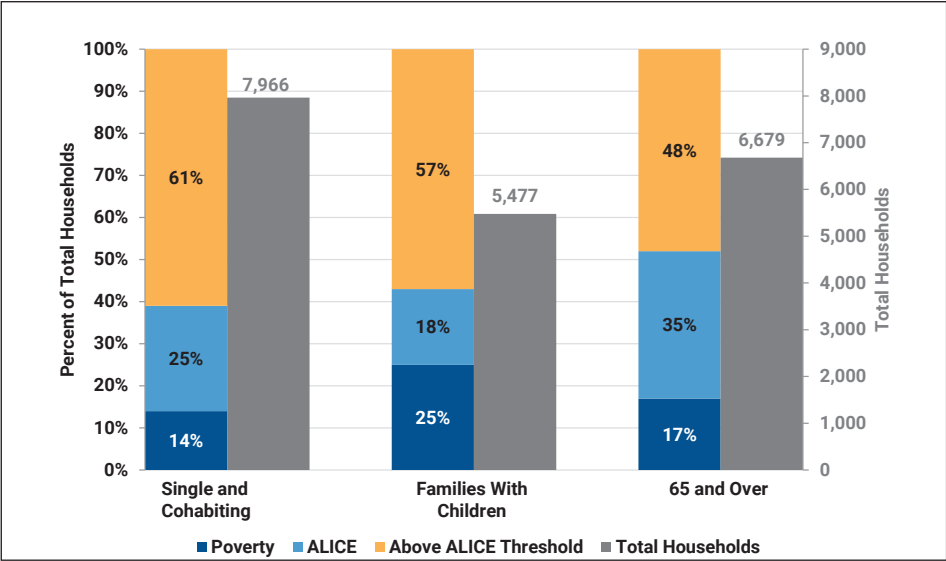

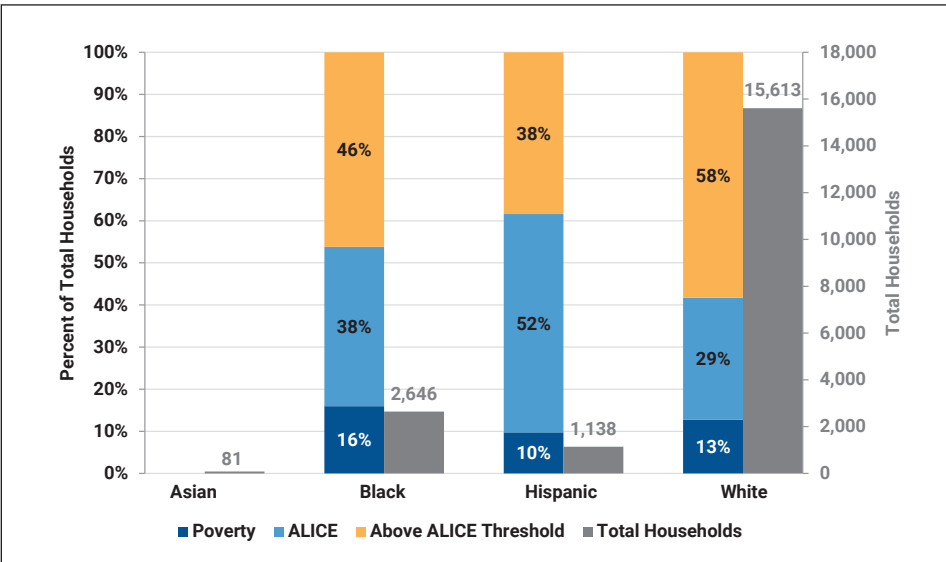

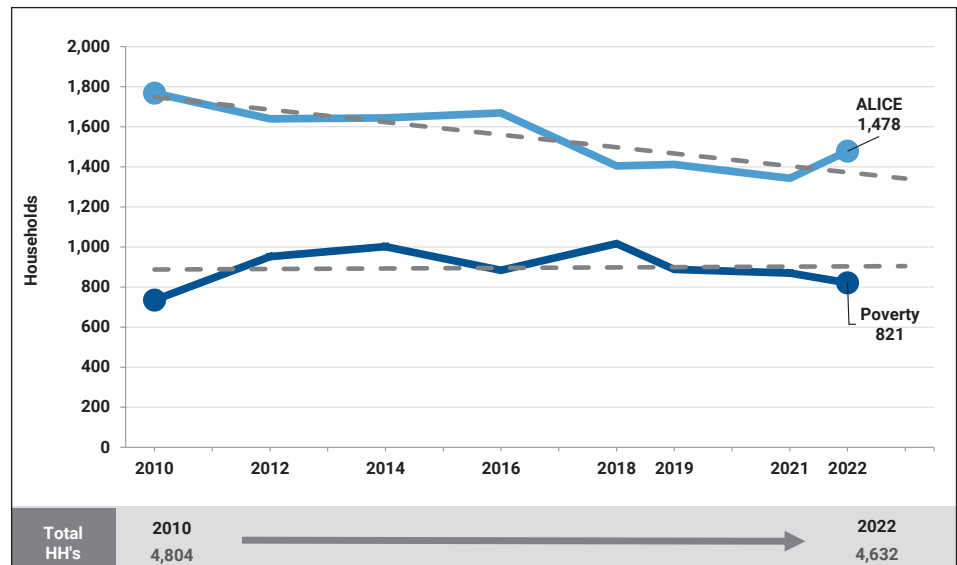

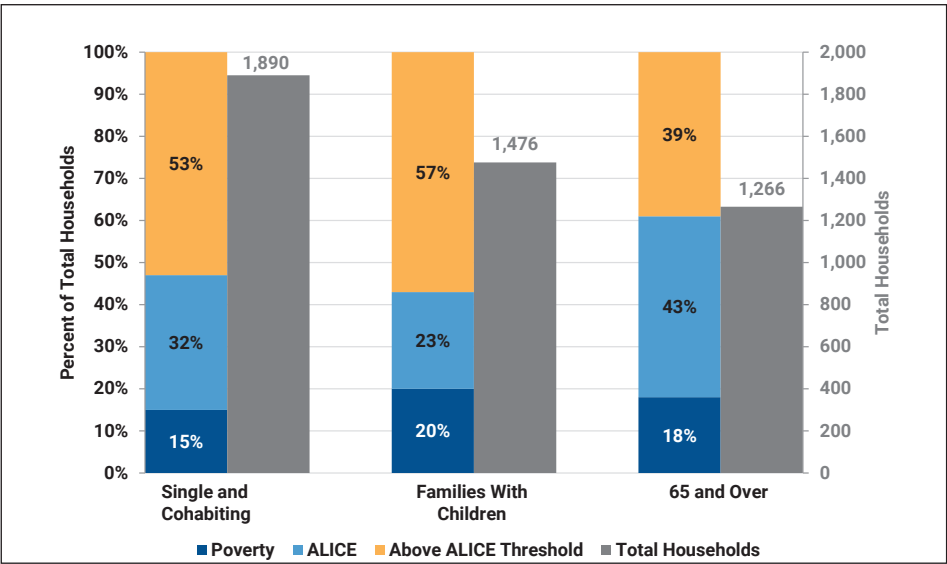

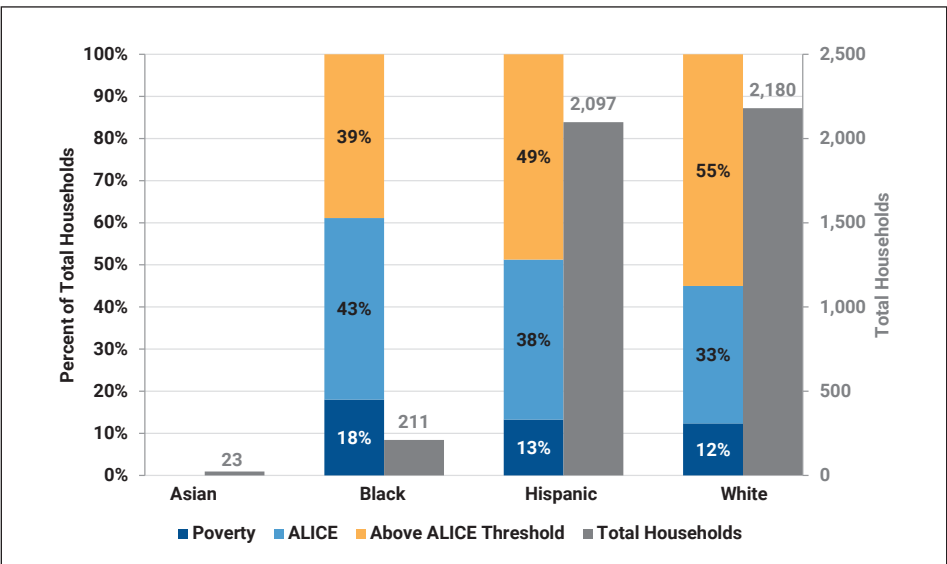

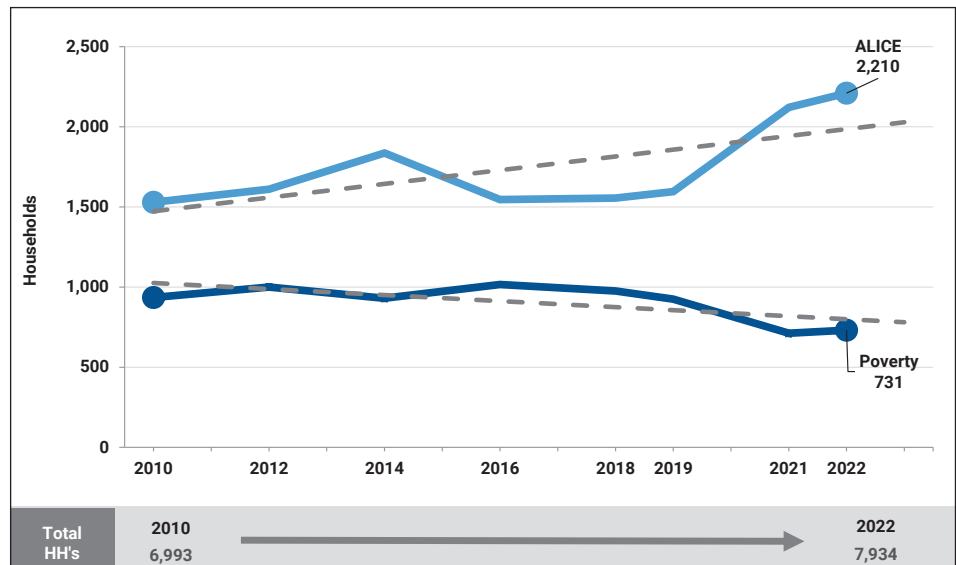

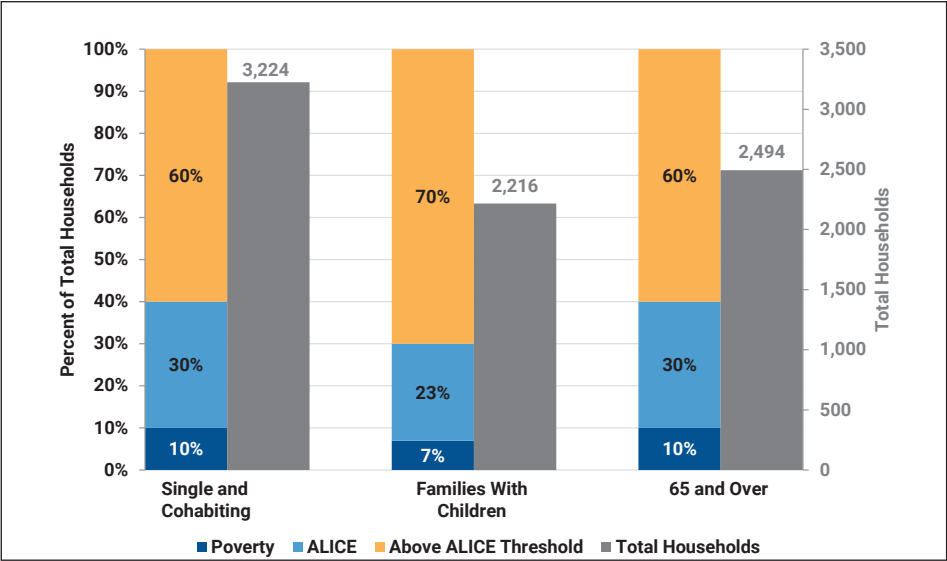

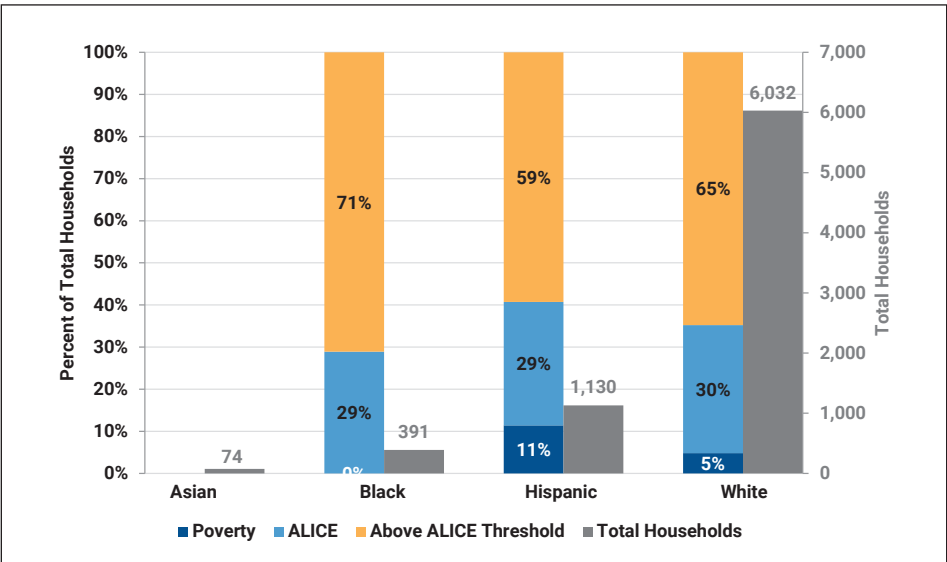

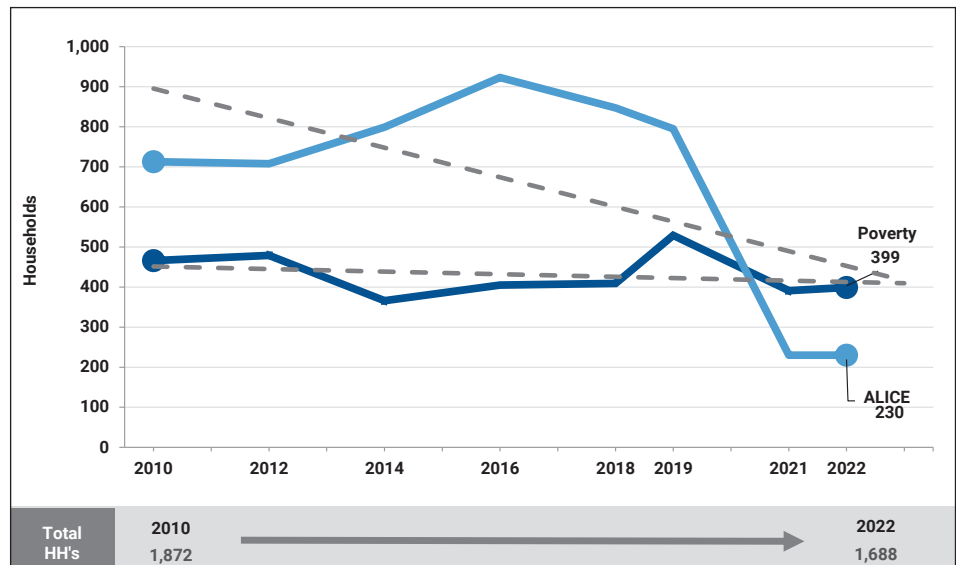

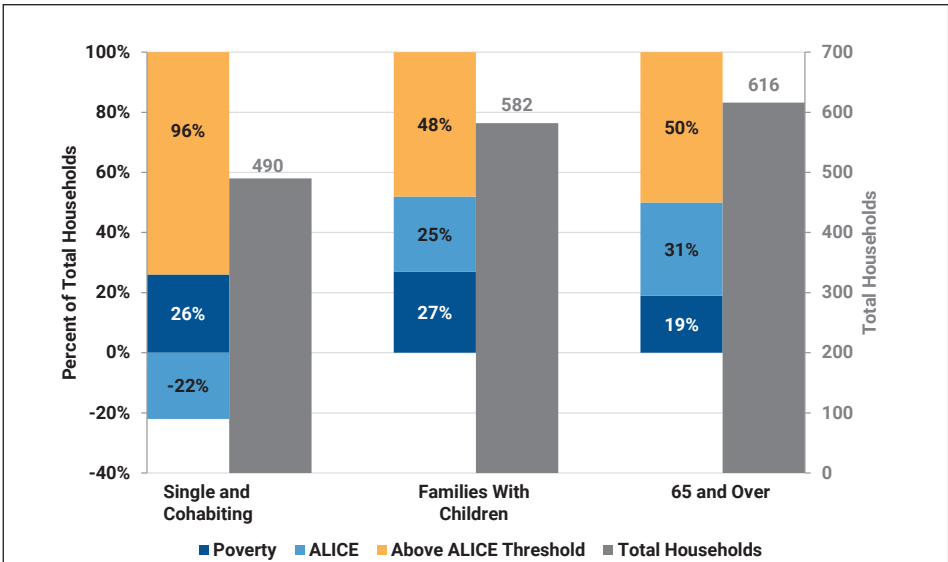

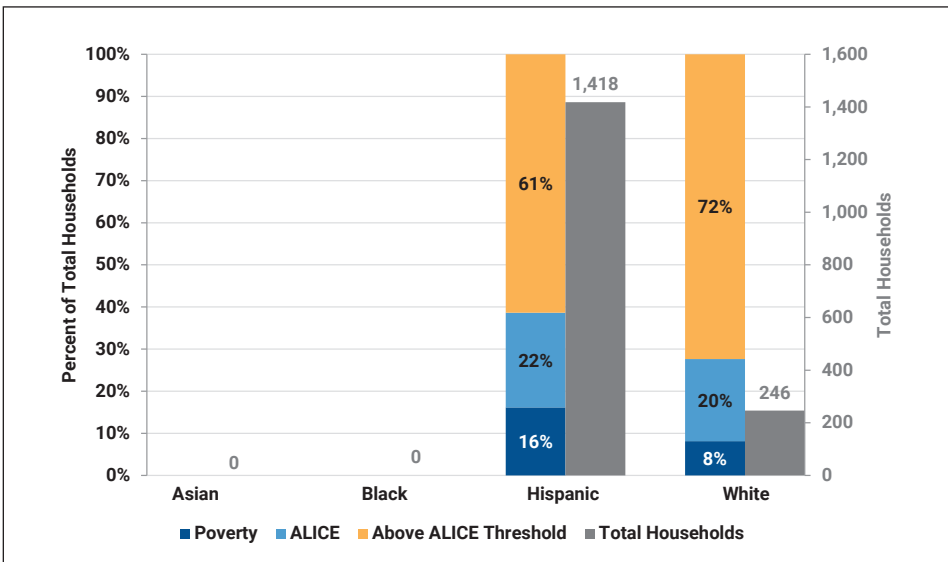

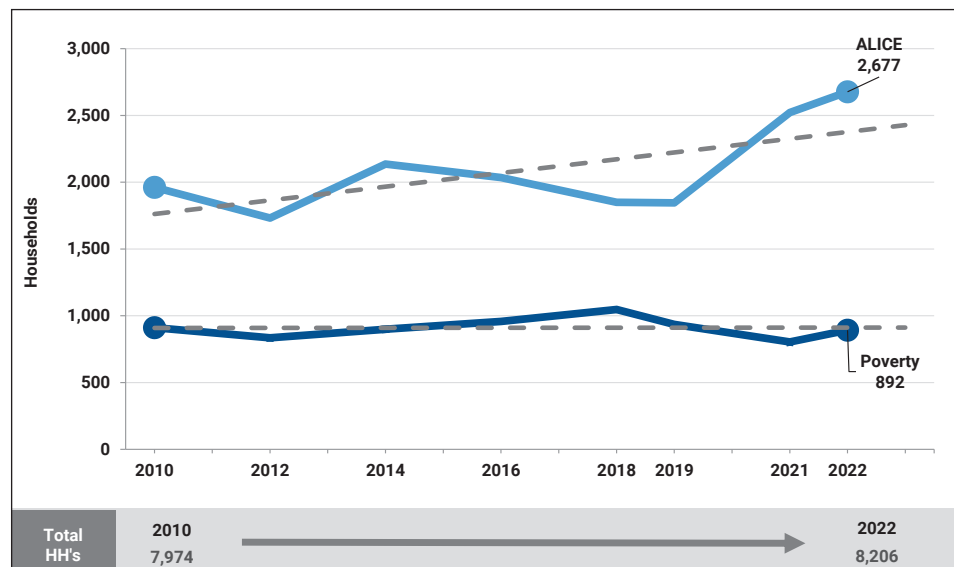

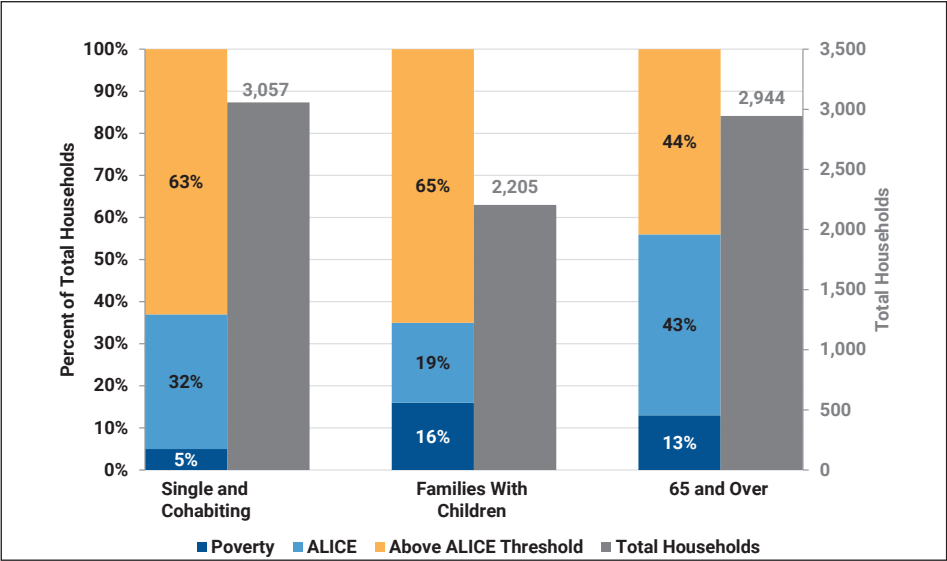

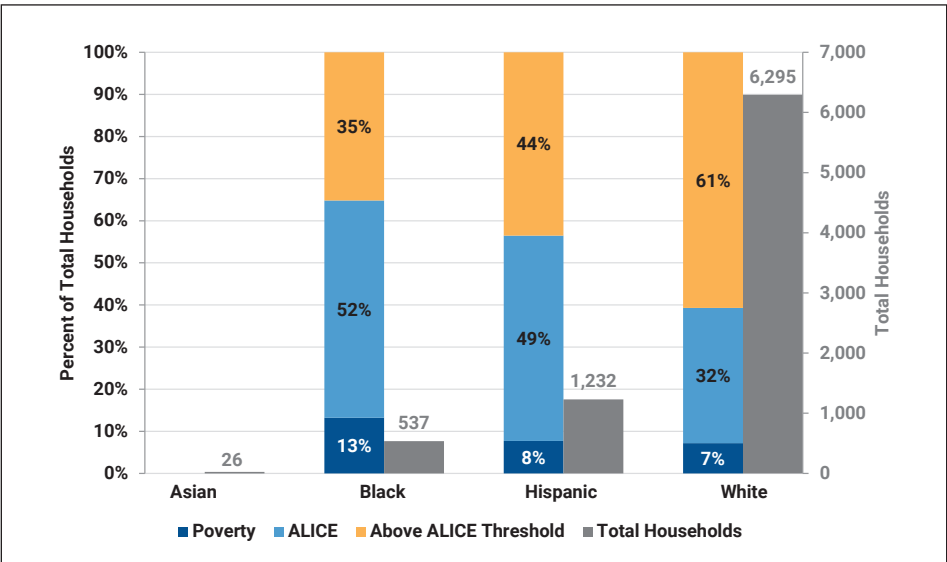

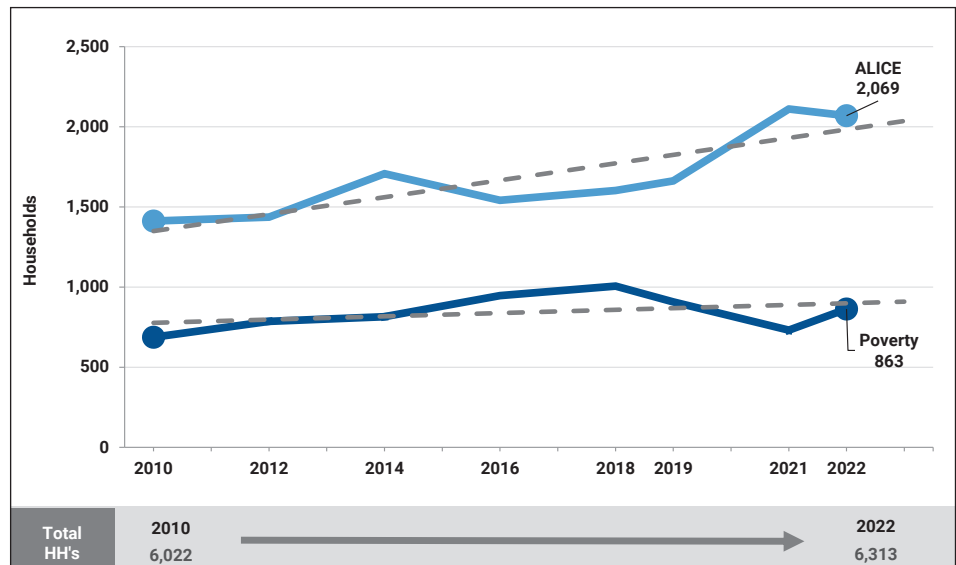

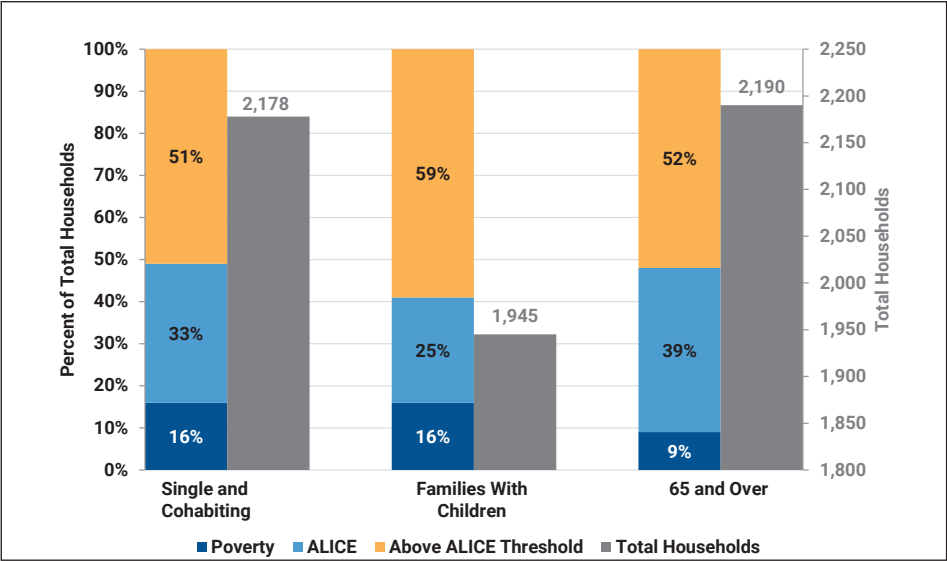

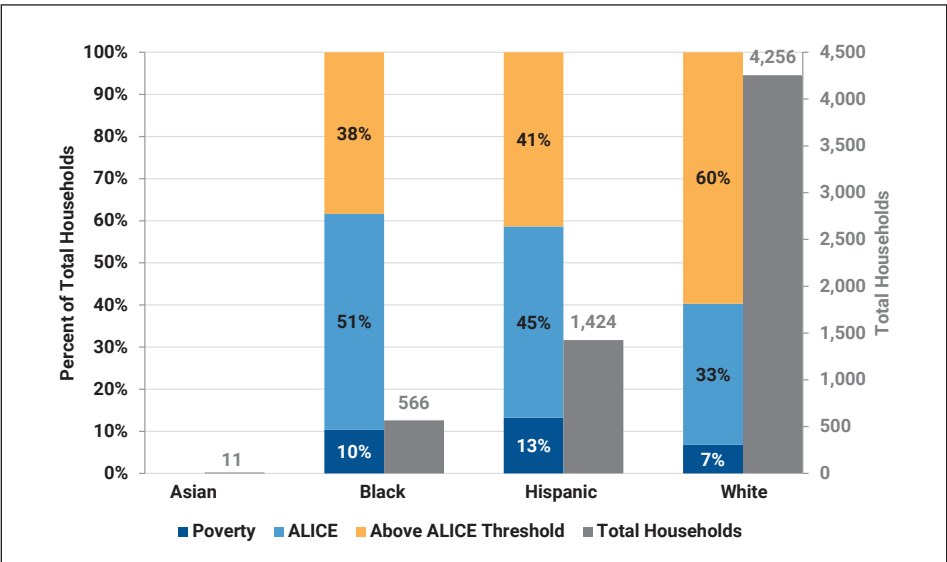

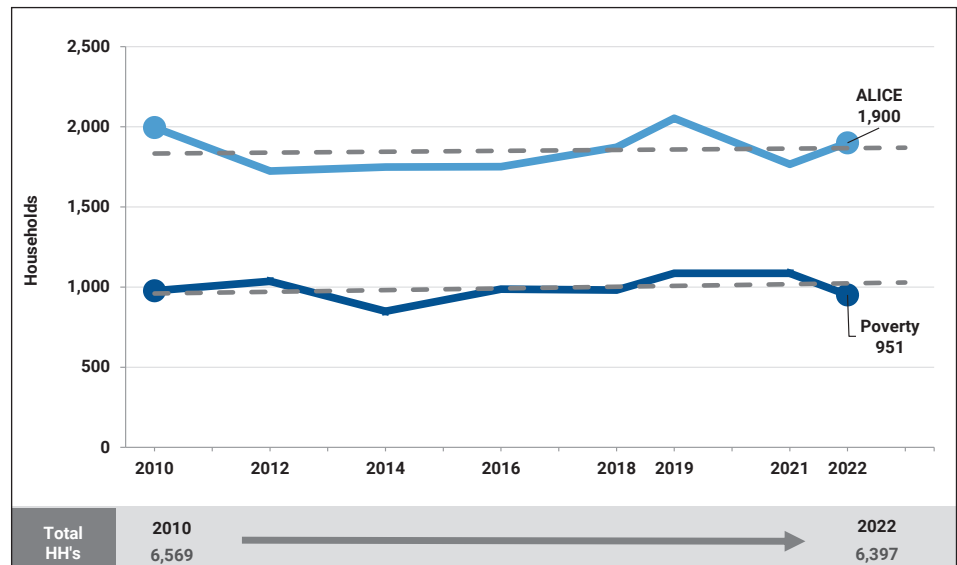

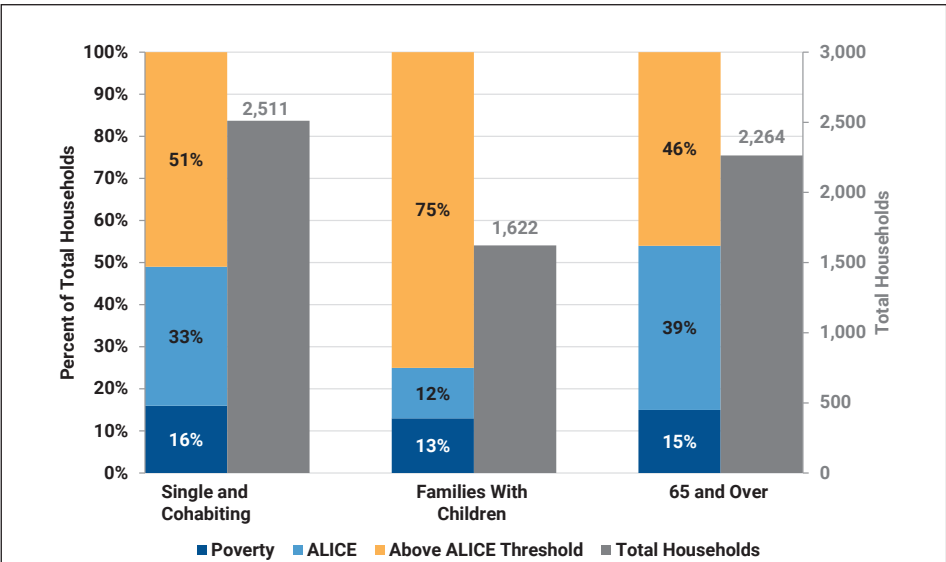

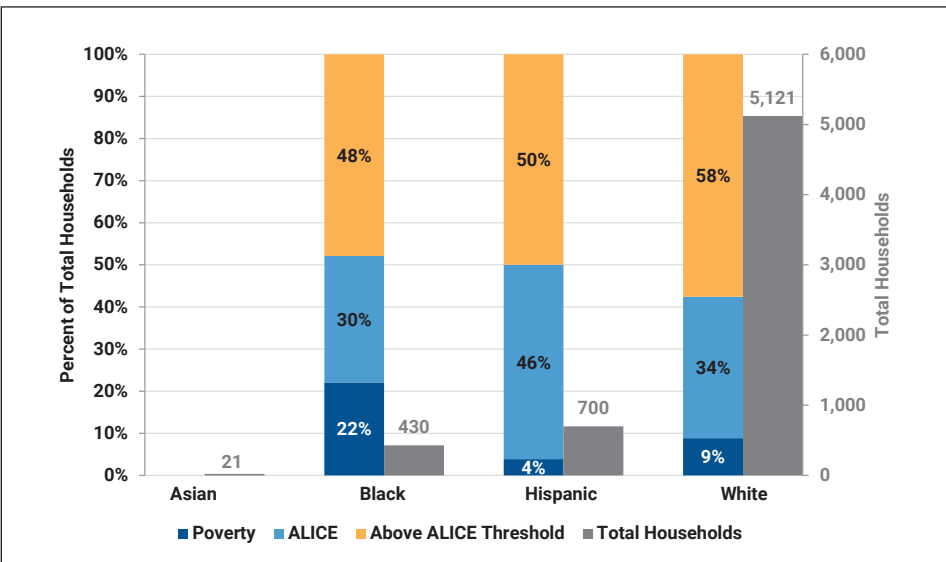

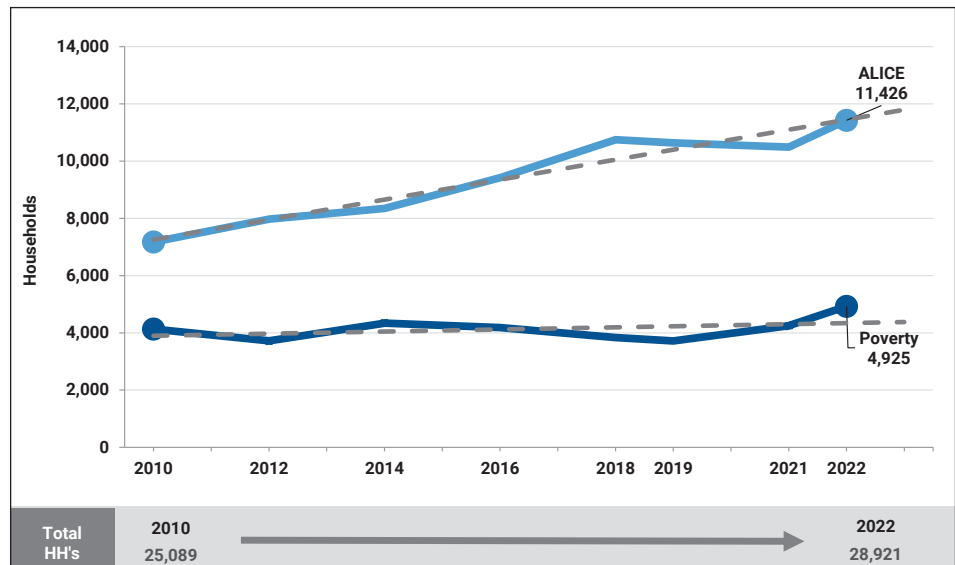

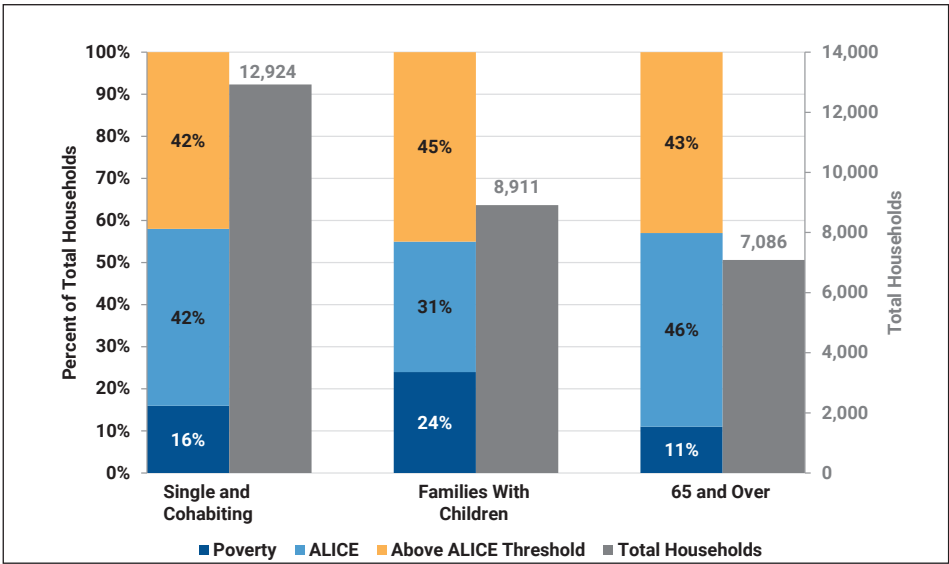

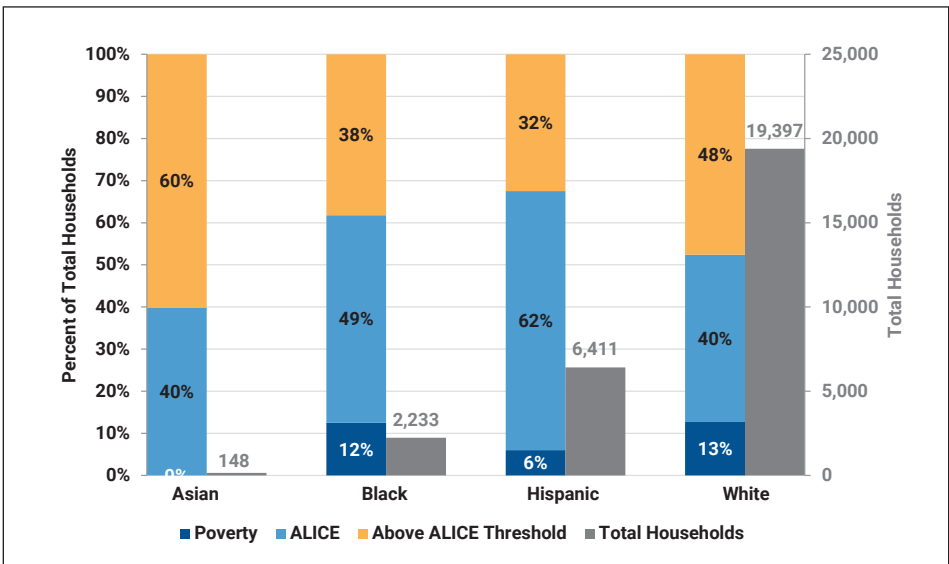

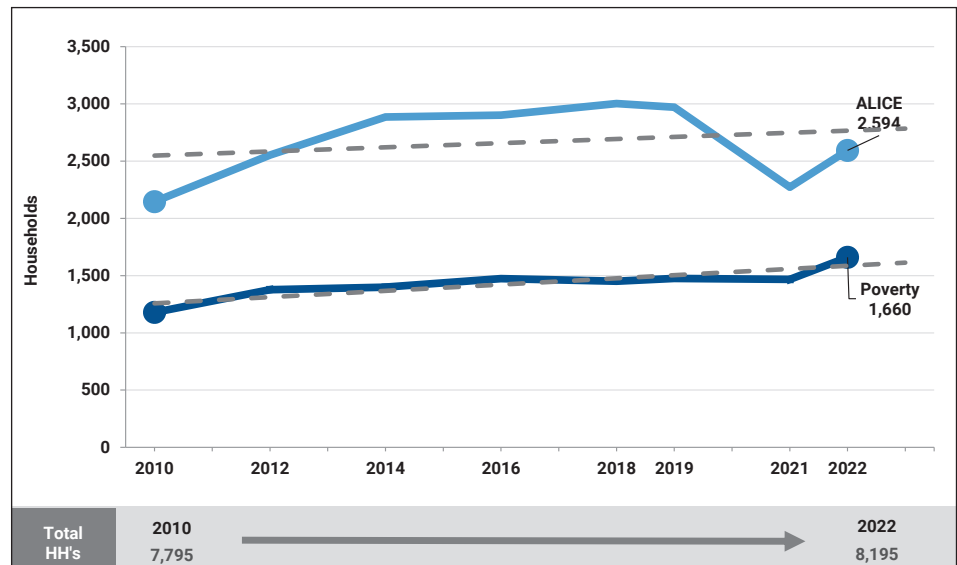

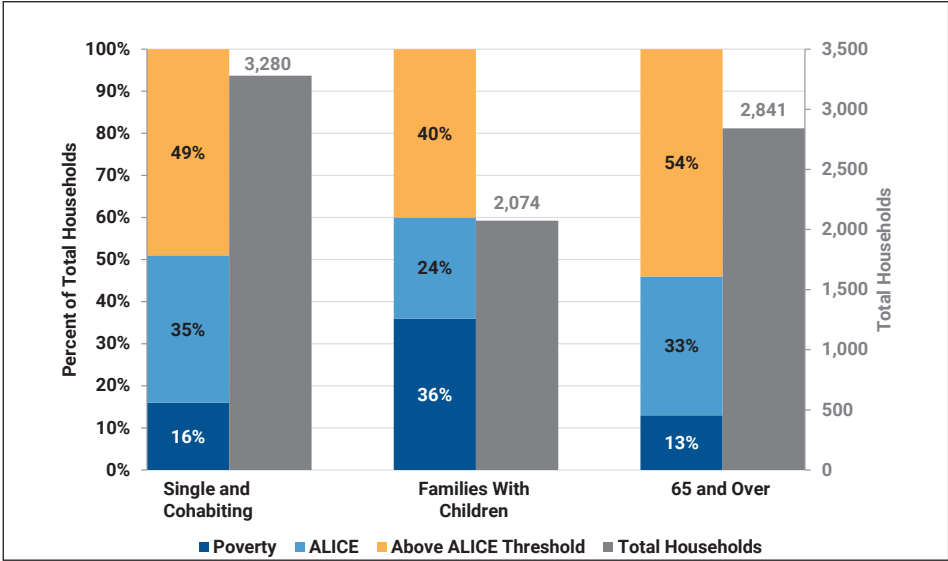

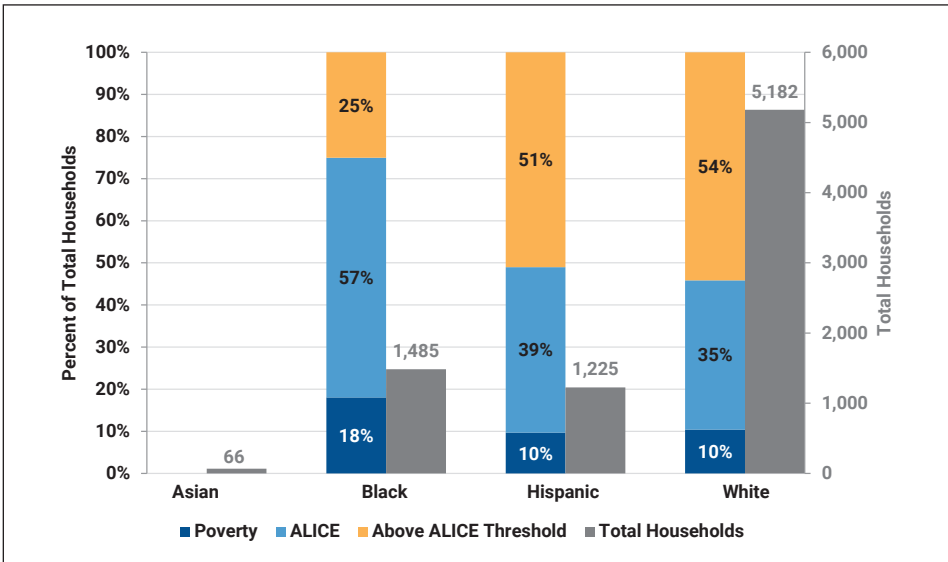

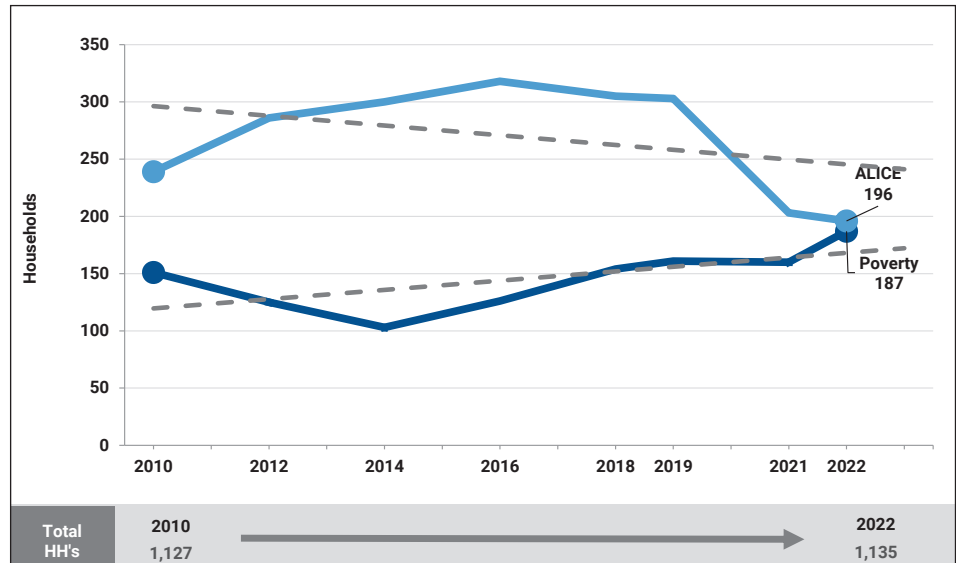

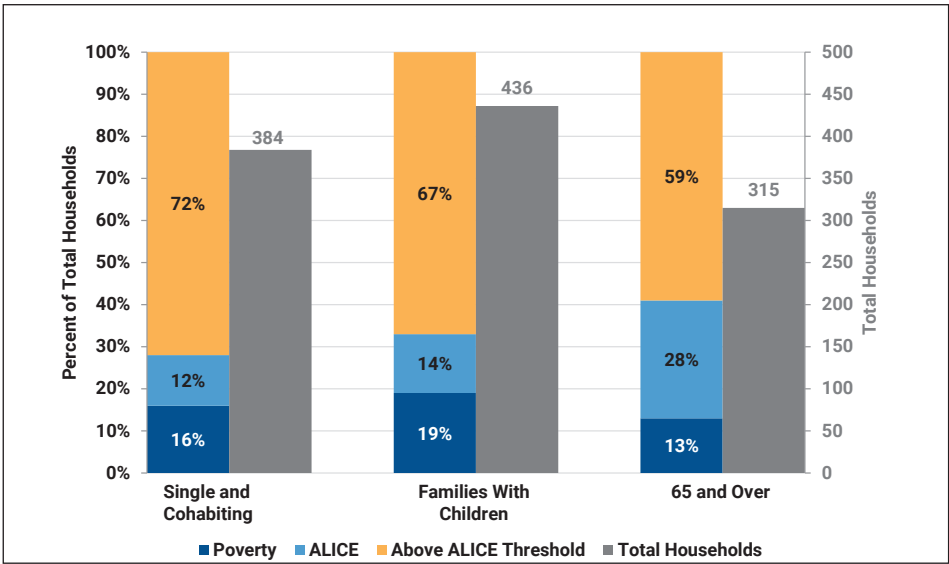

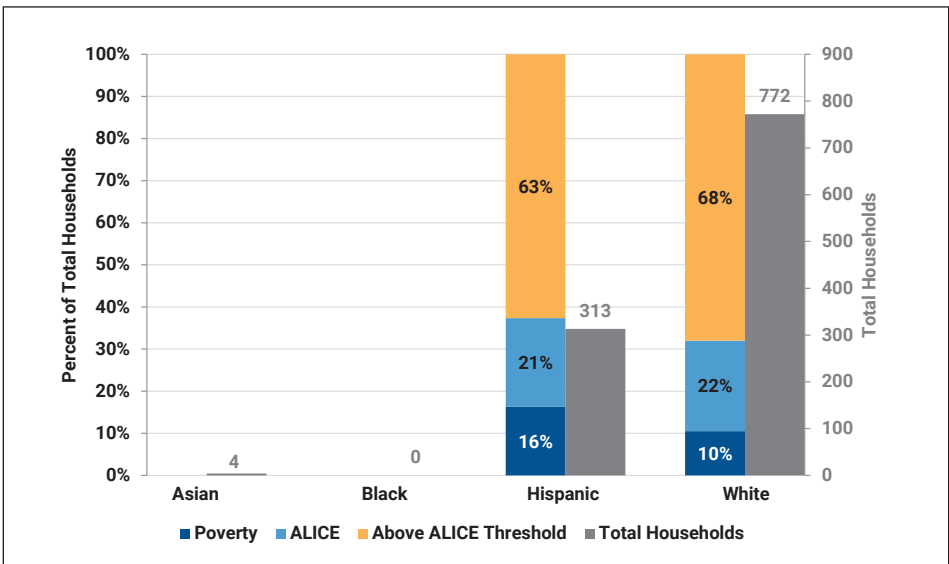

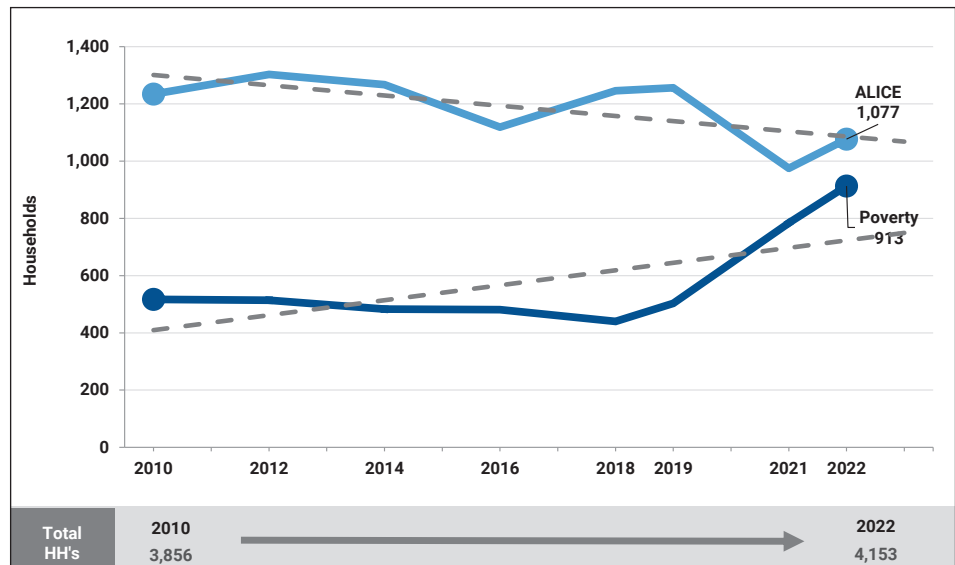

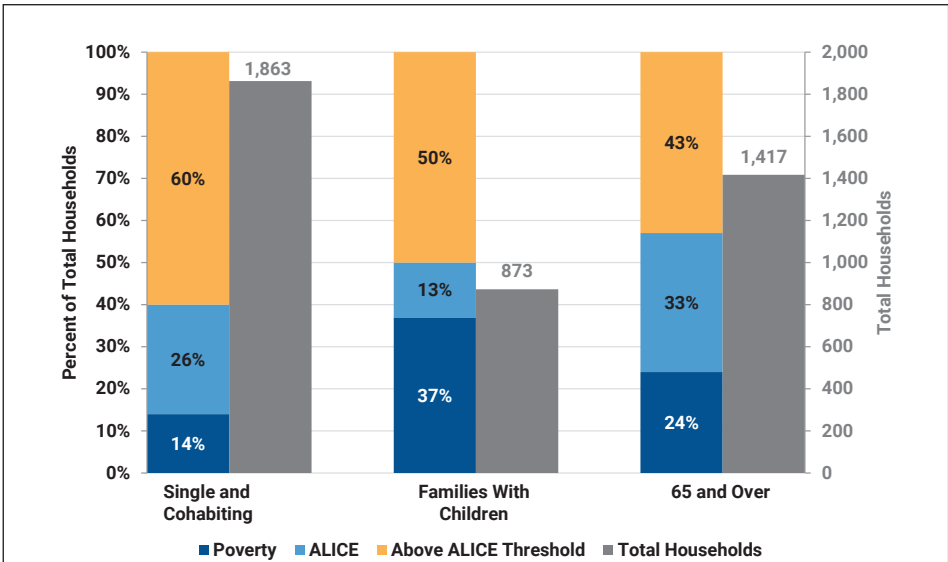

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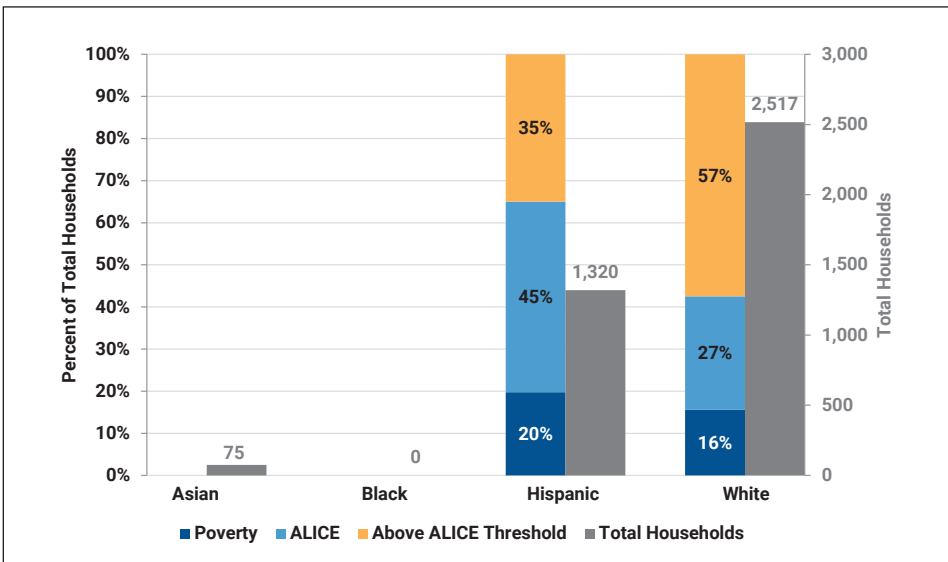

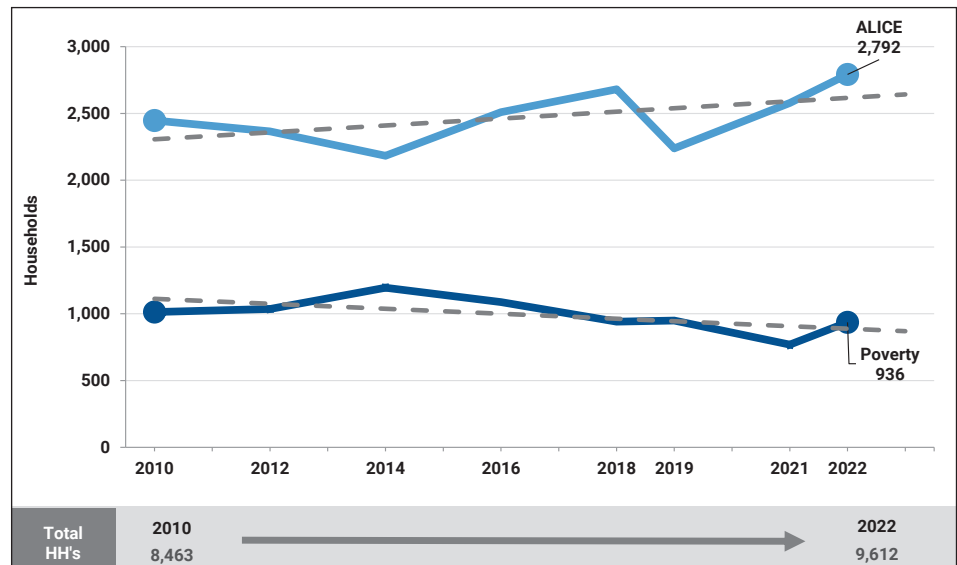

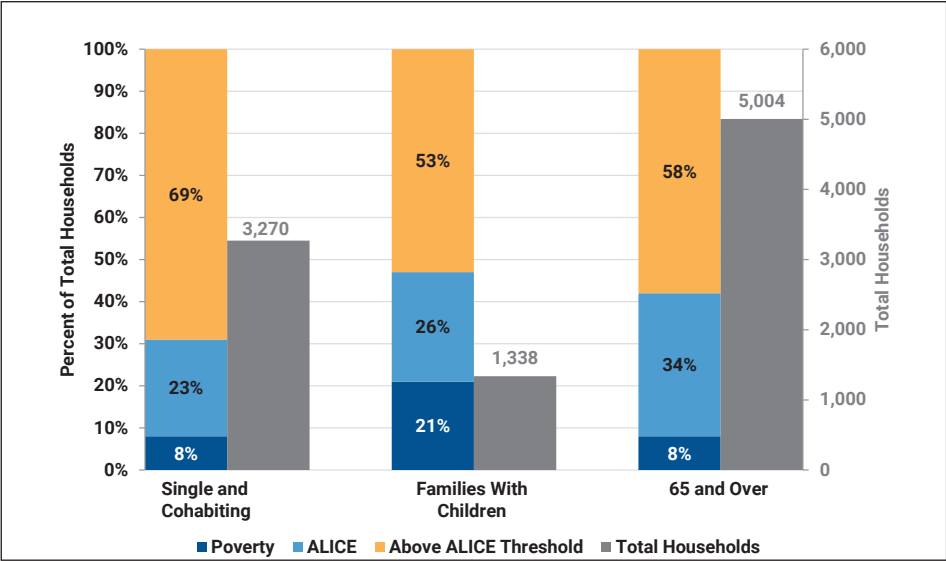

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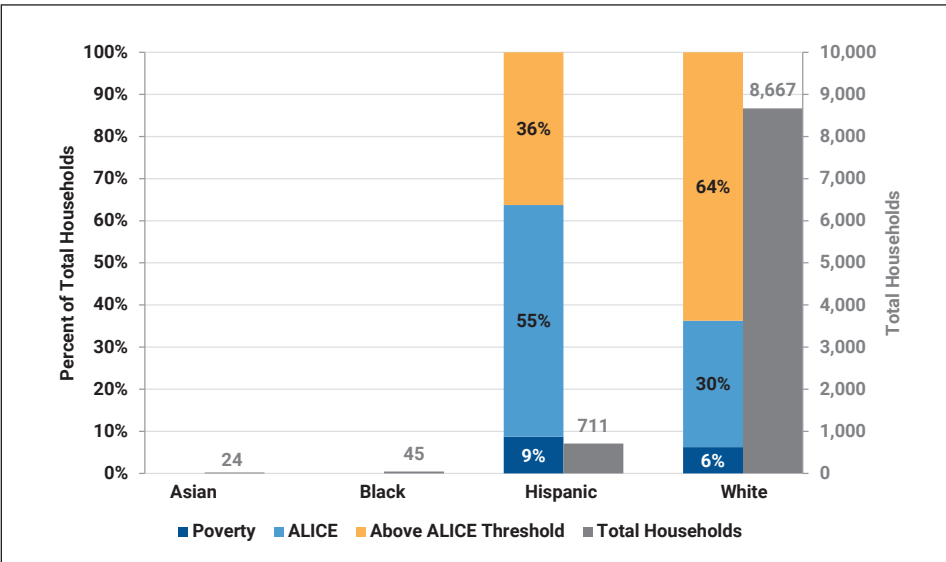

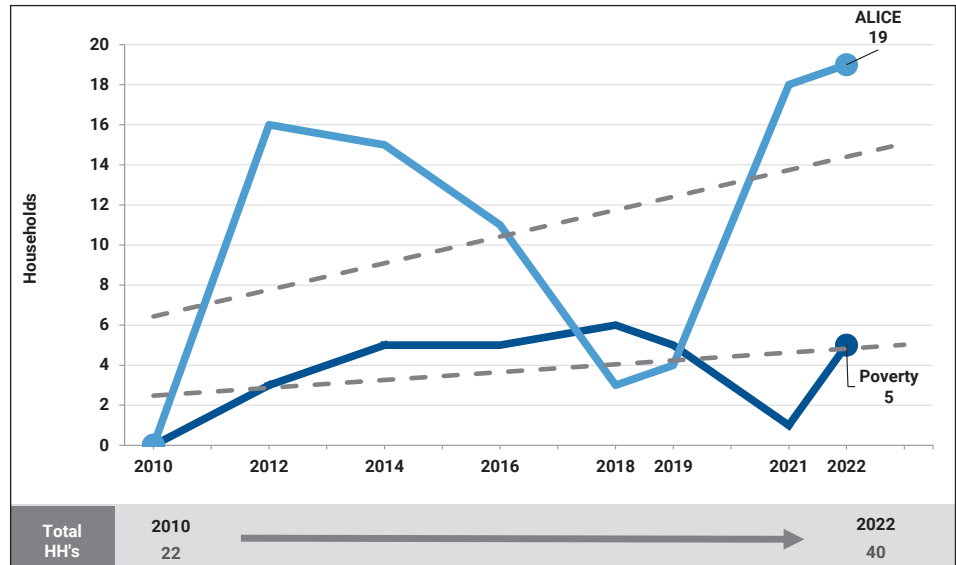

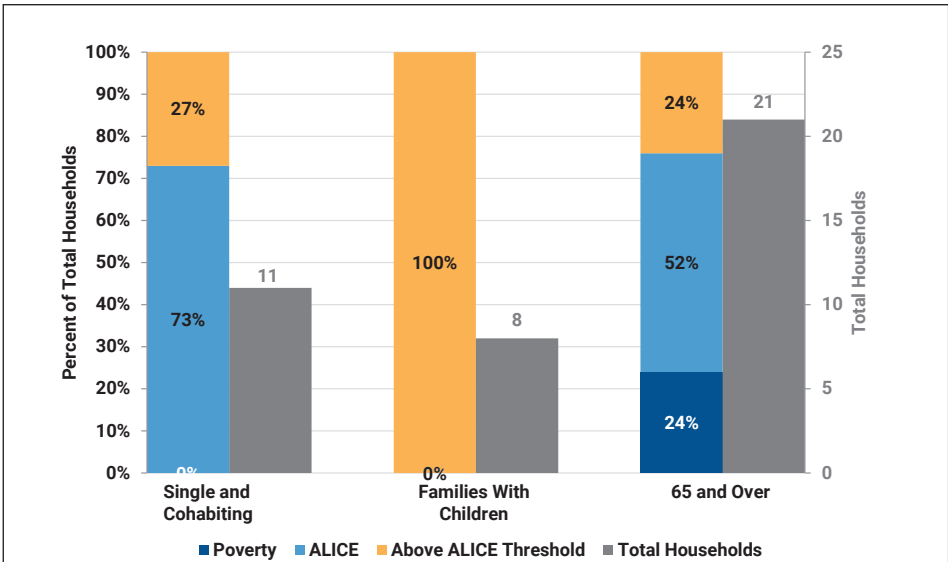

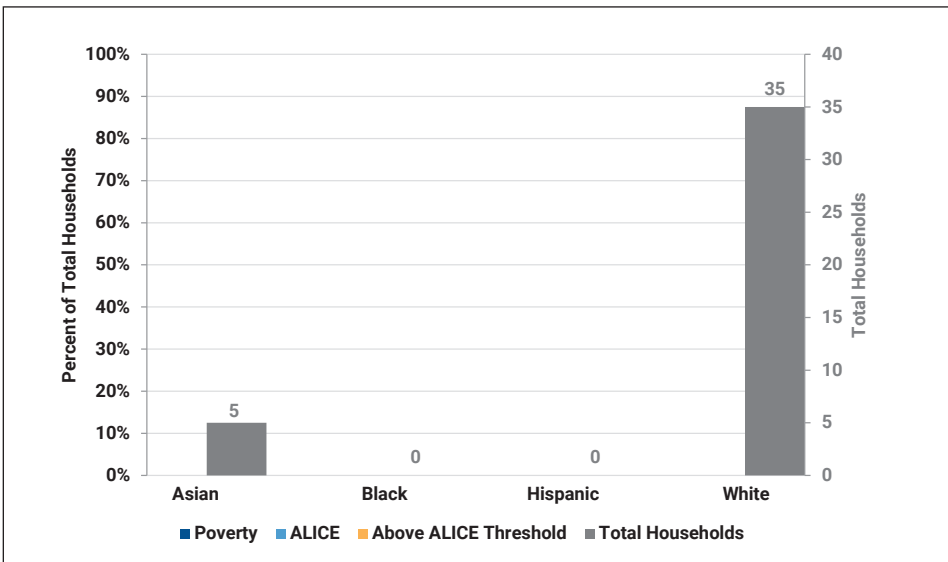

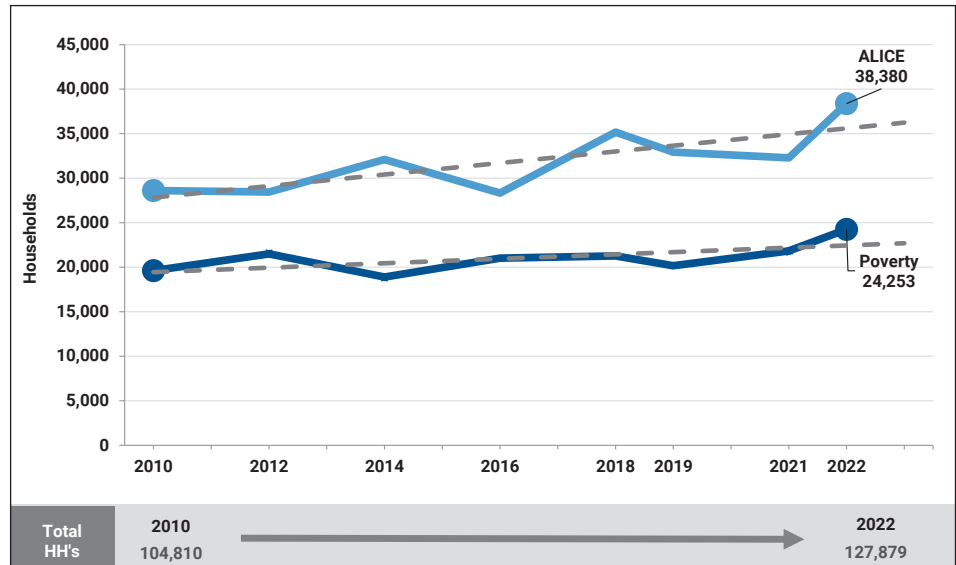

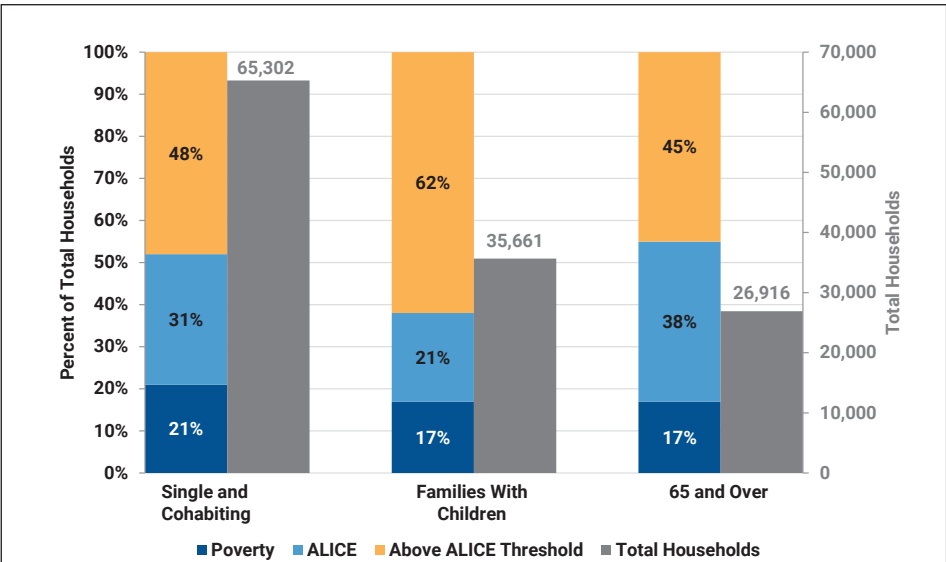

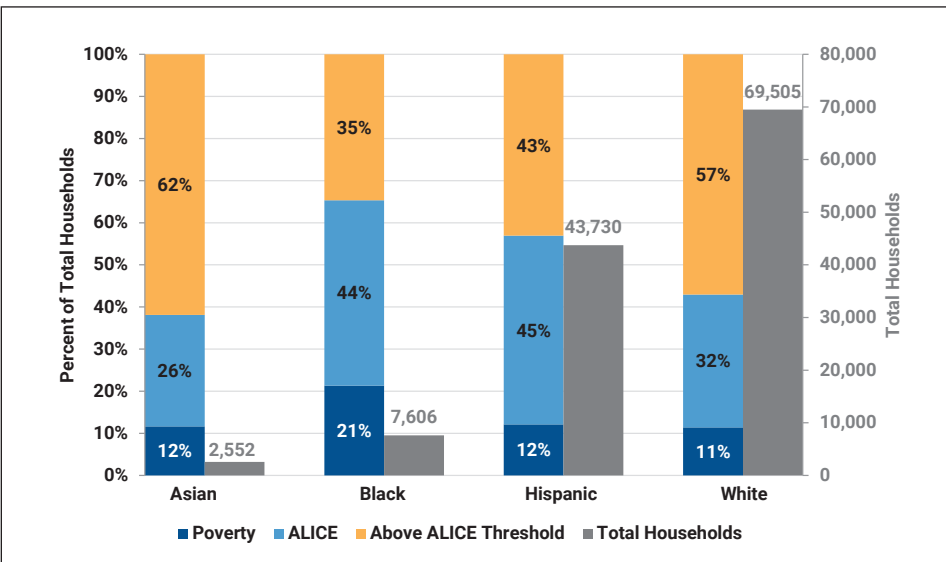

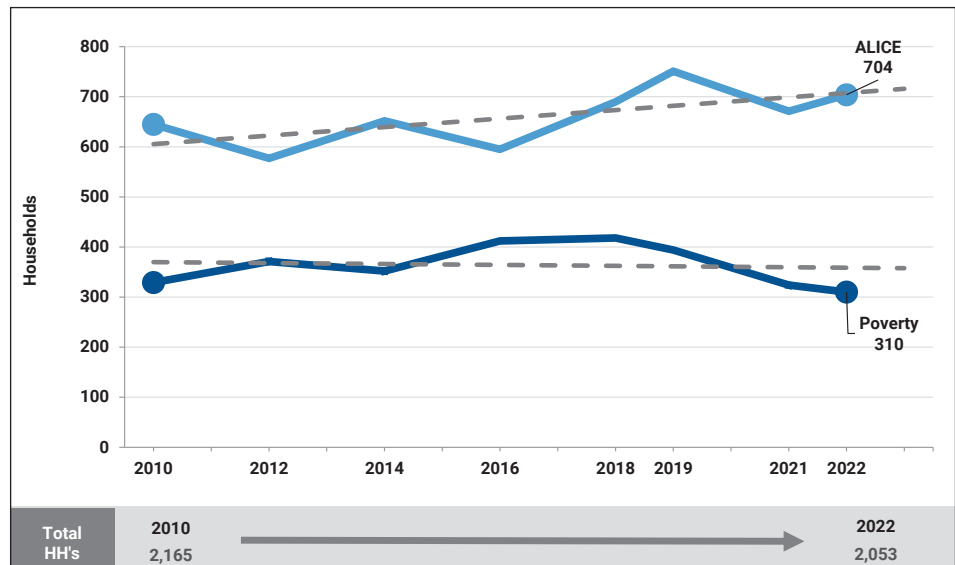

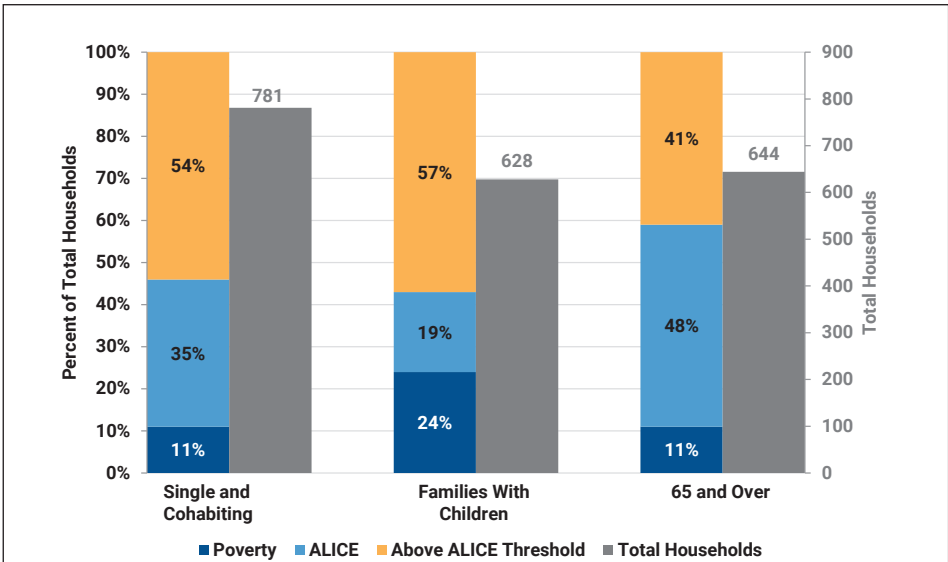

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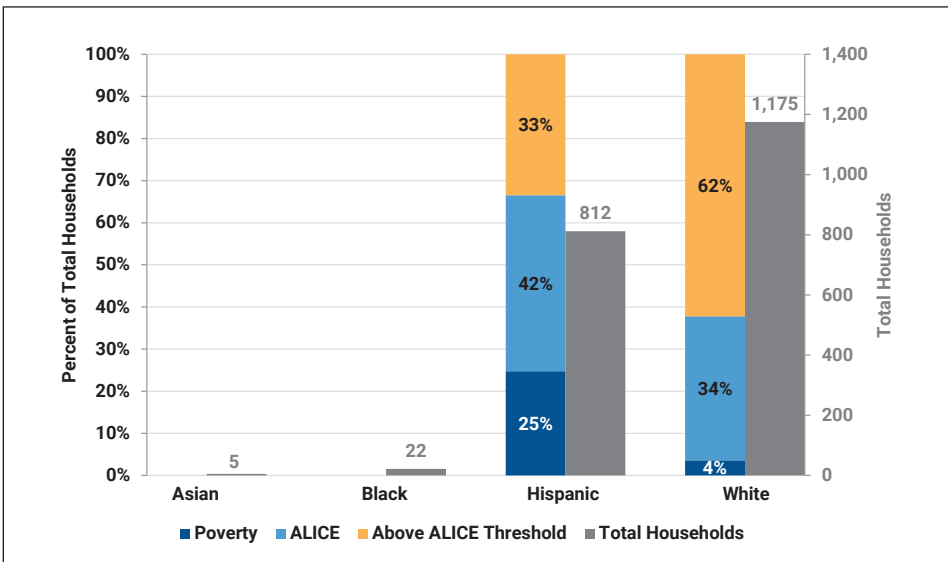

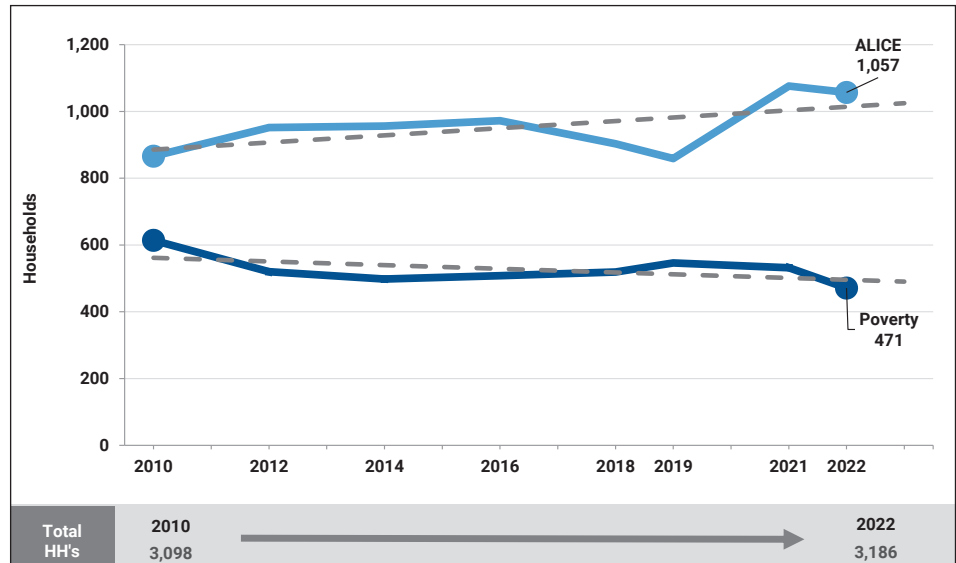

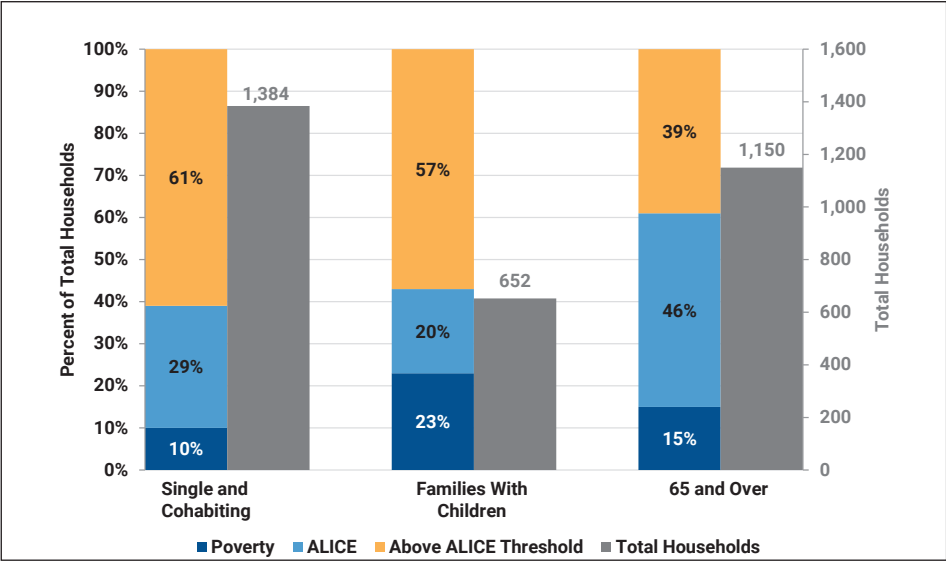

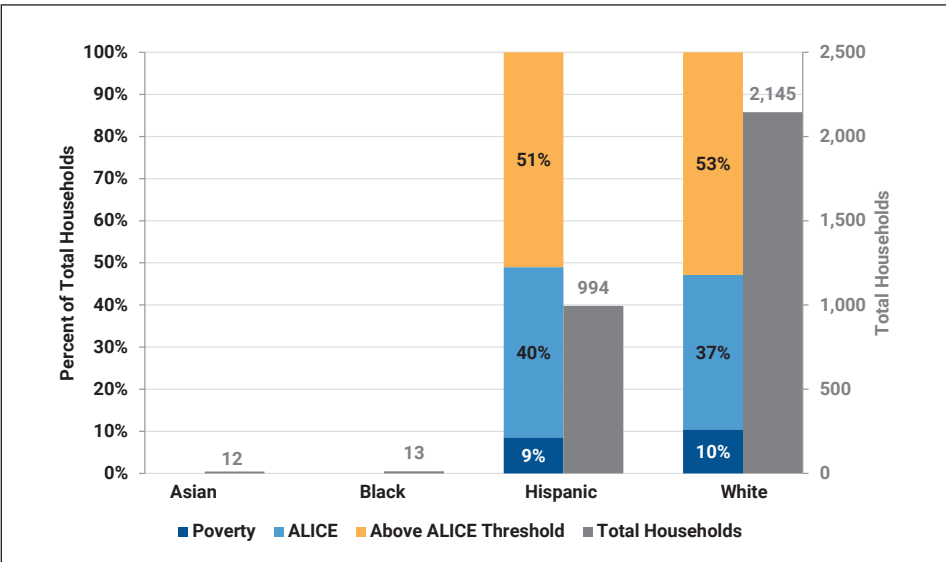

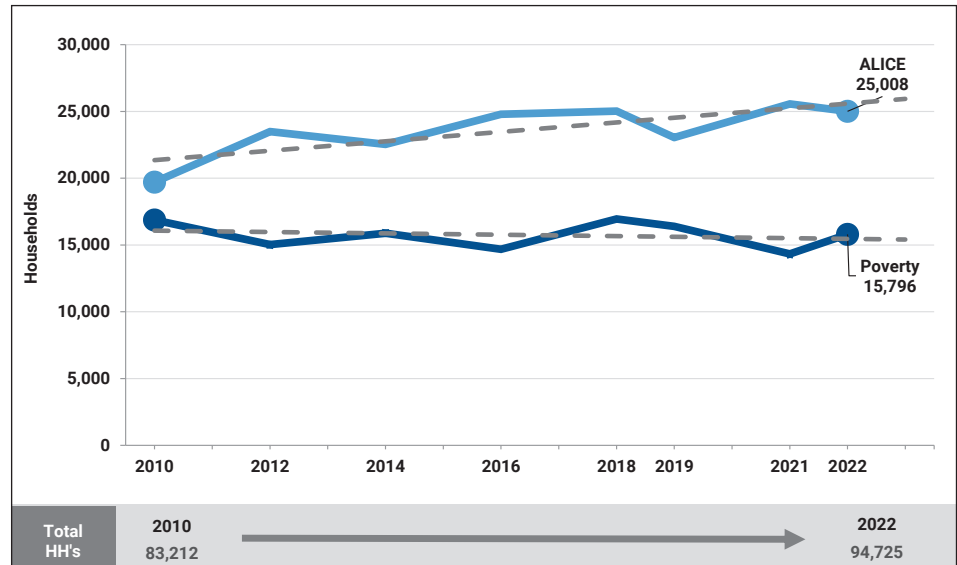

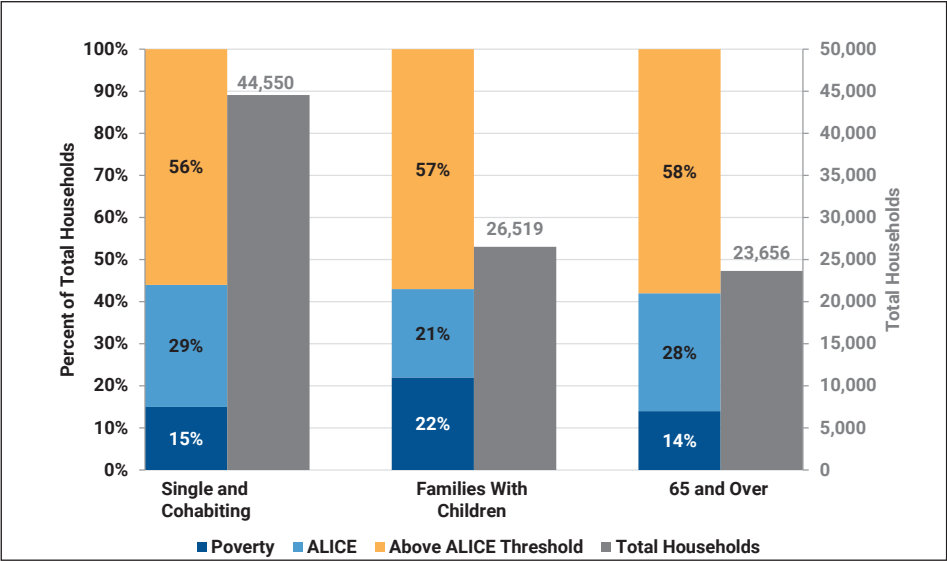

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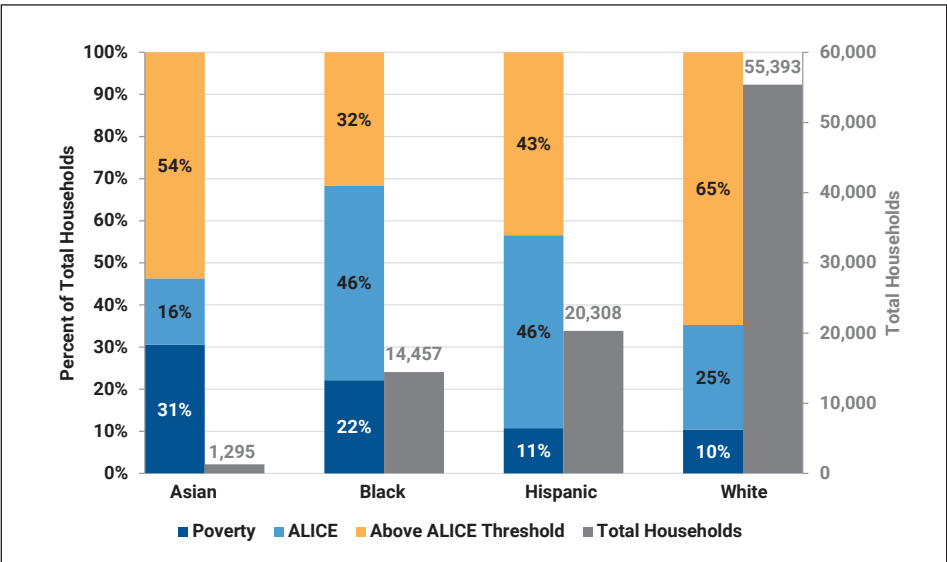
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, McLennan County, 2022

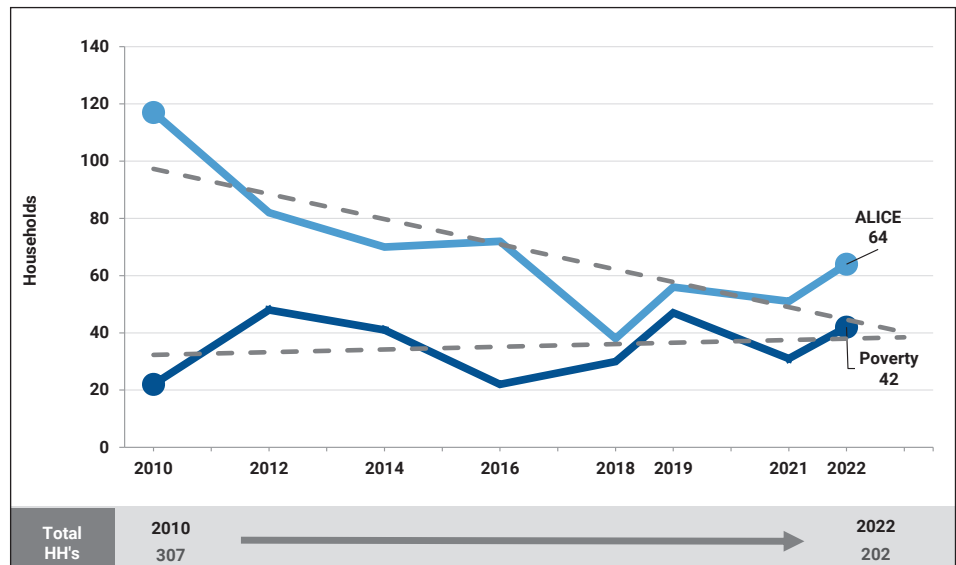

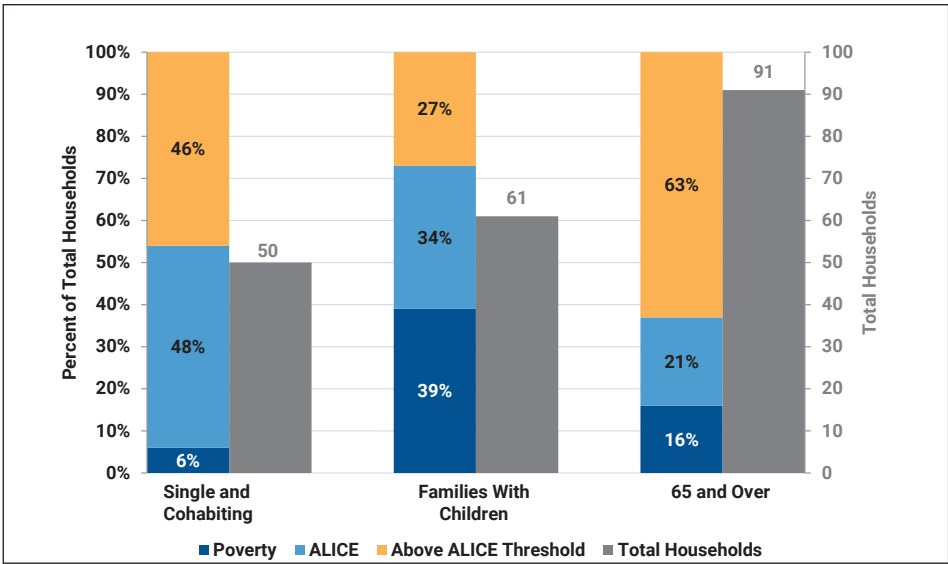

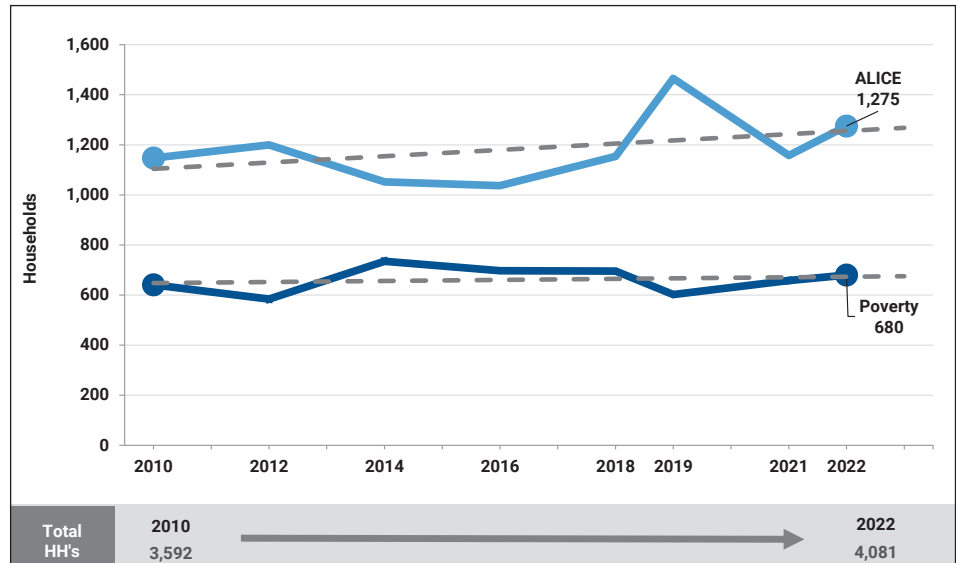

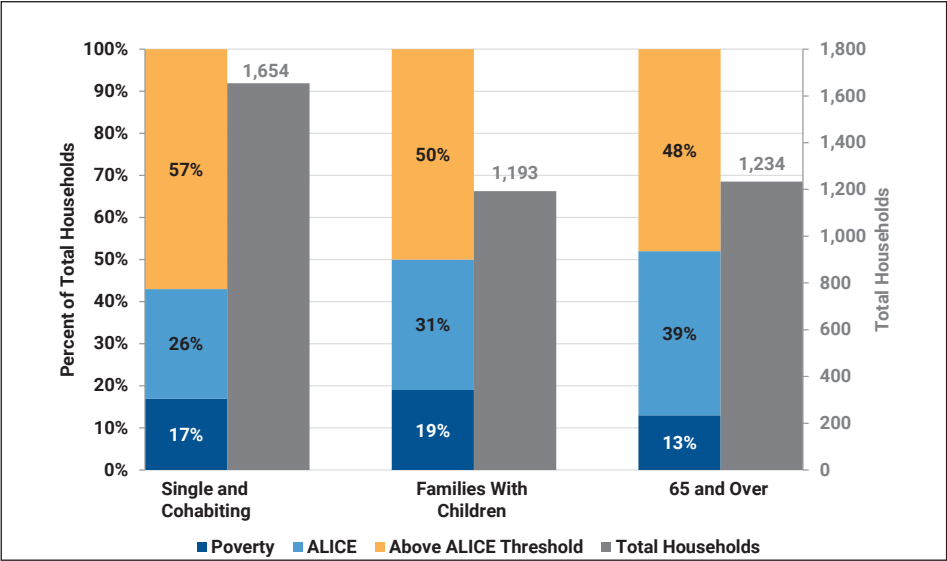

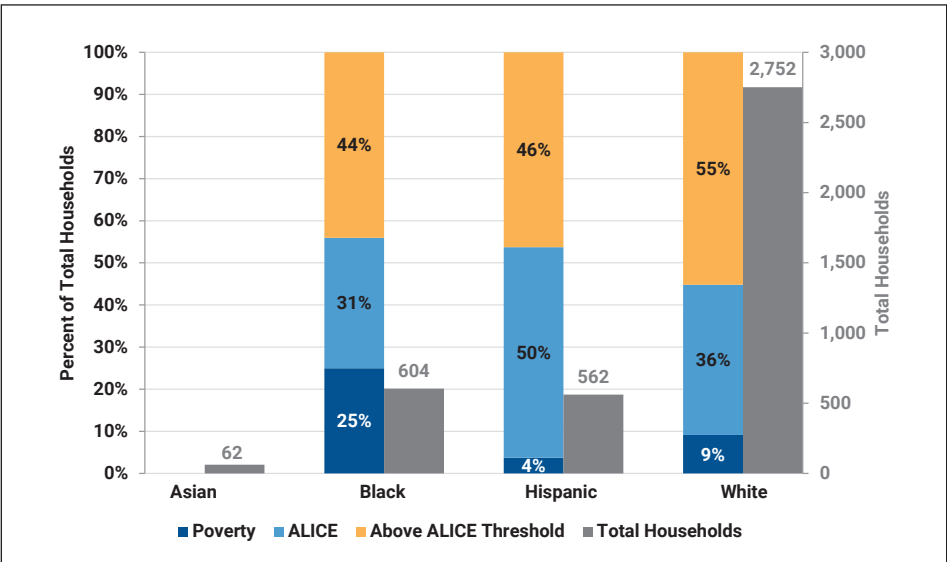

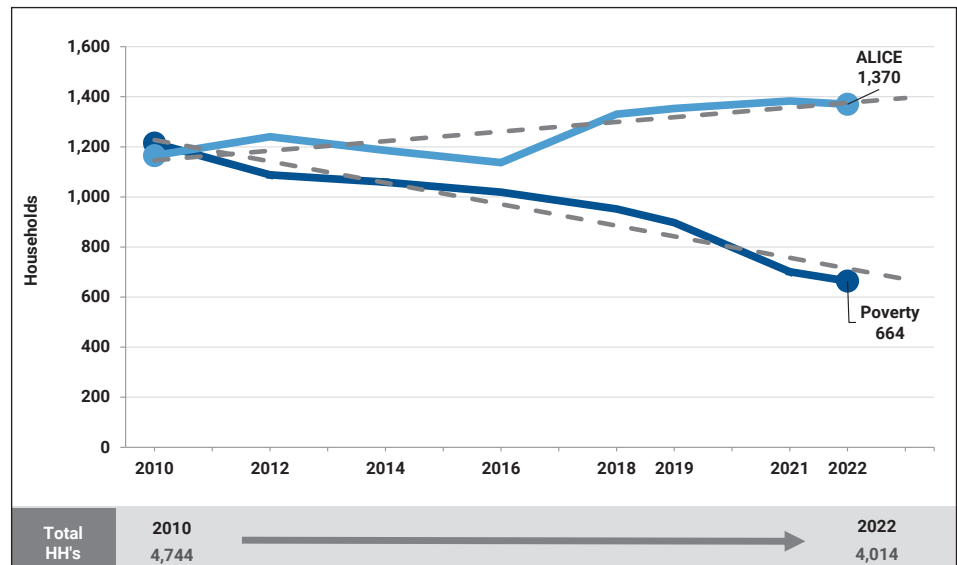

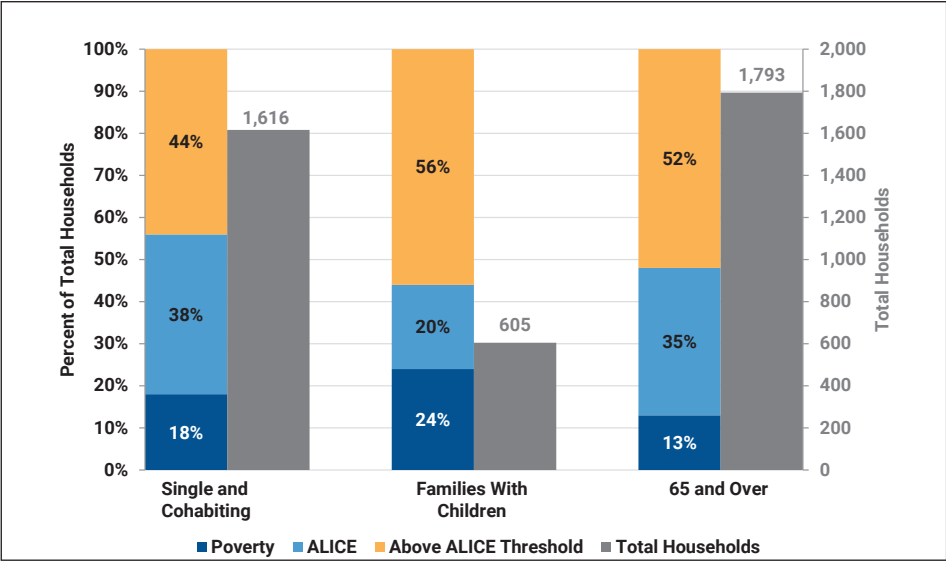

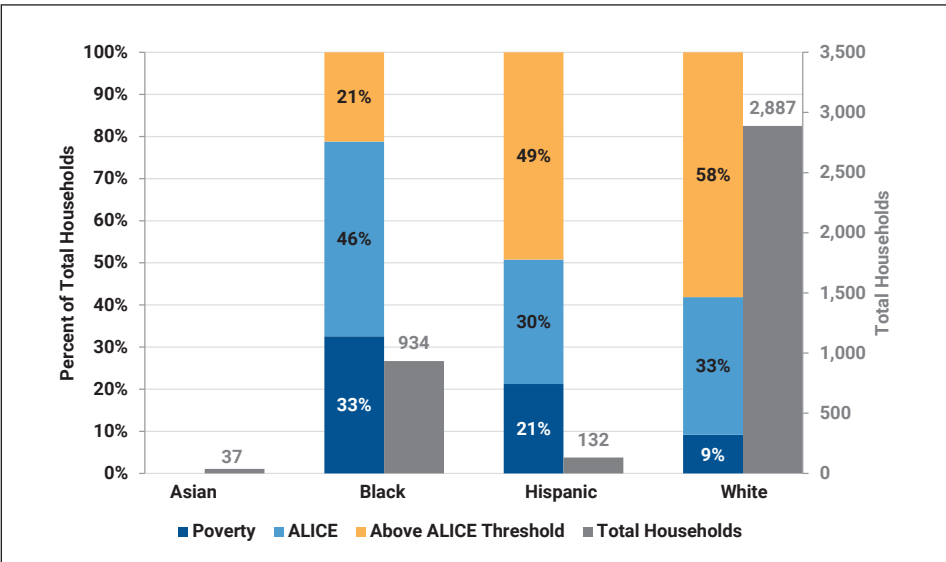

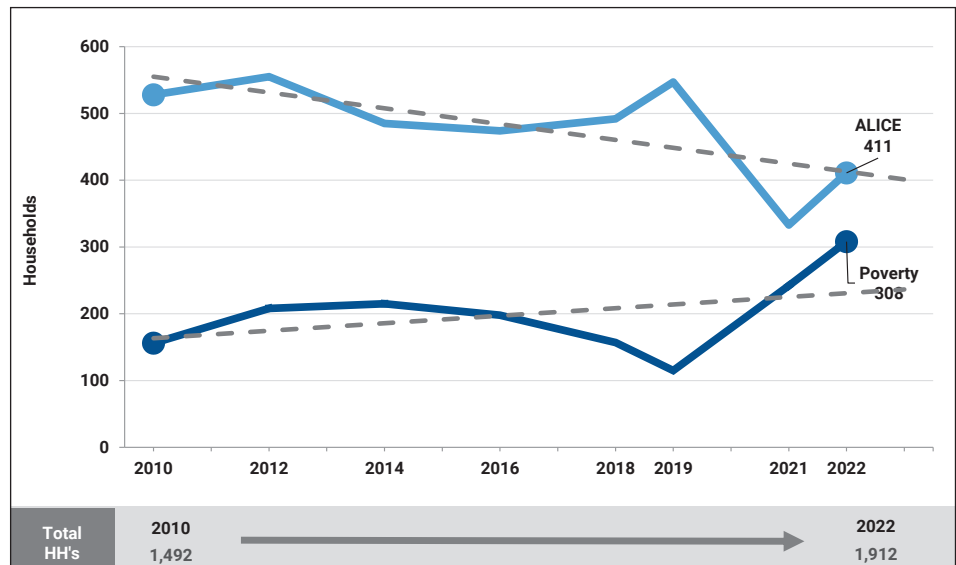

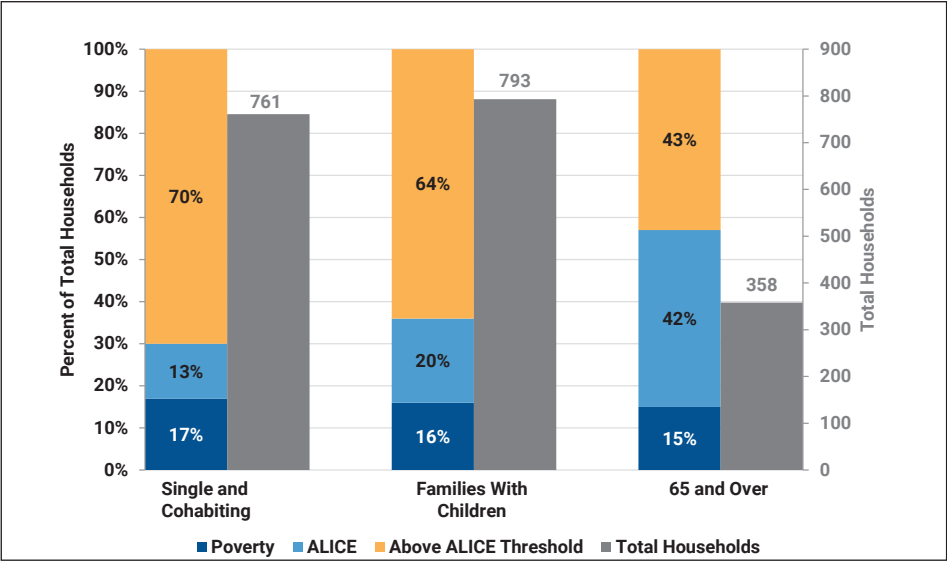

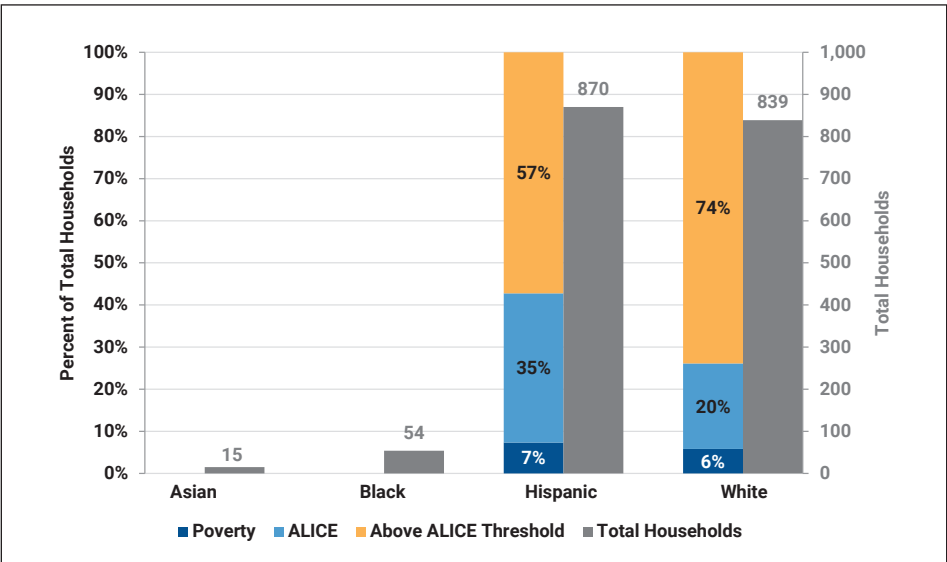

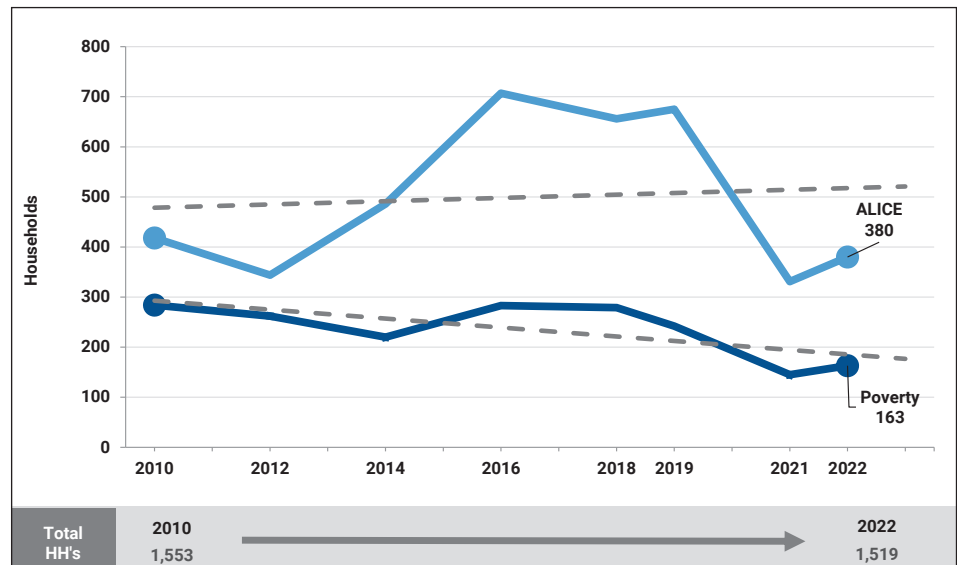

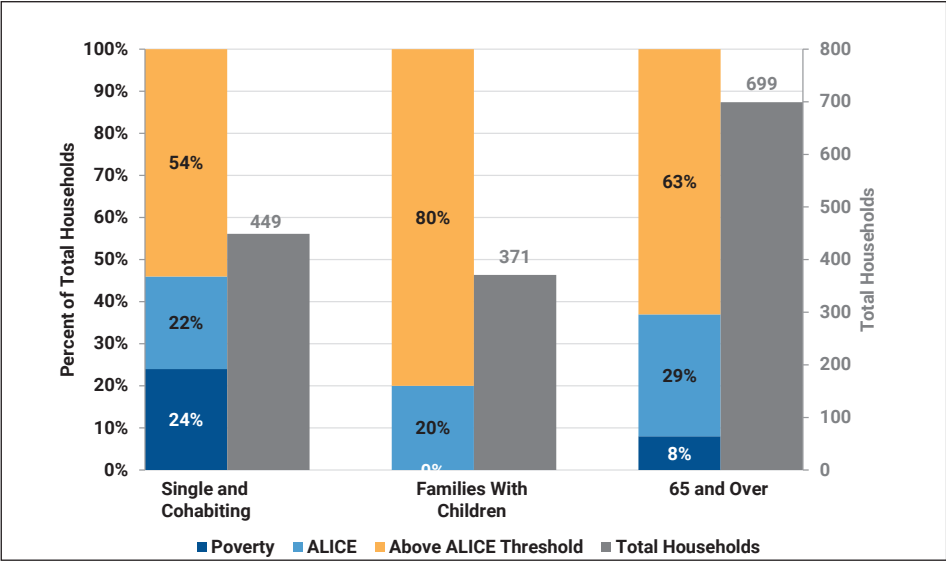

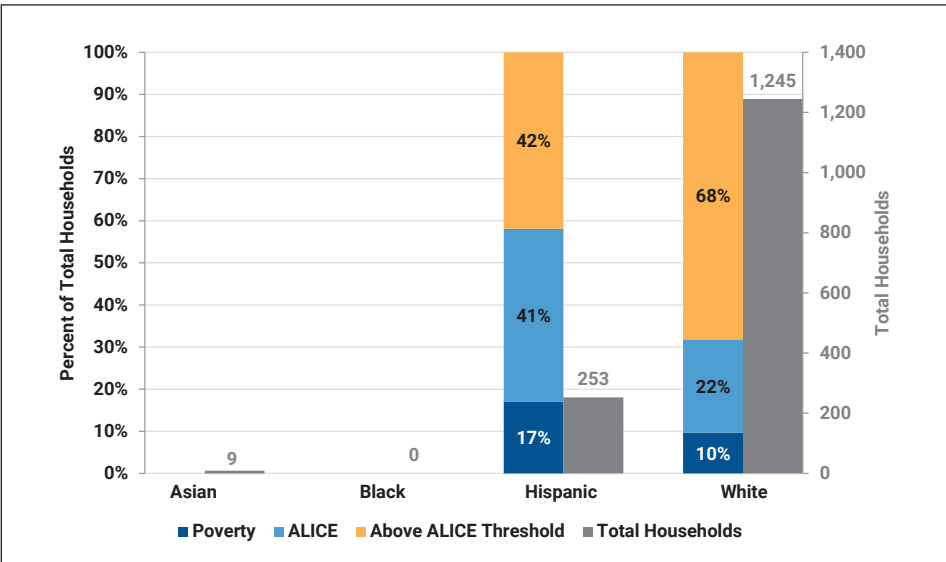

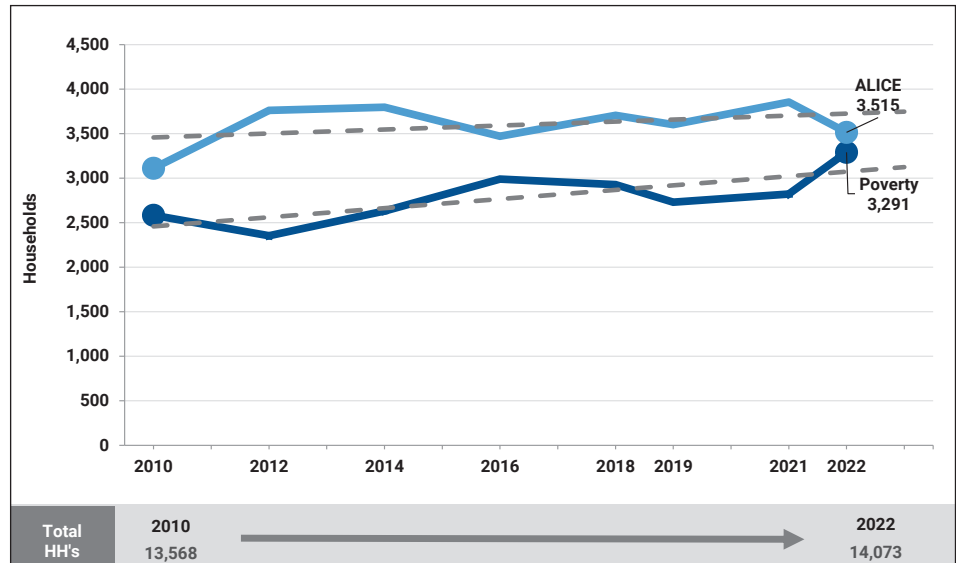

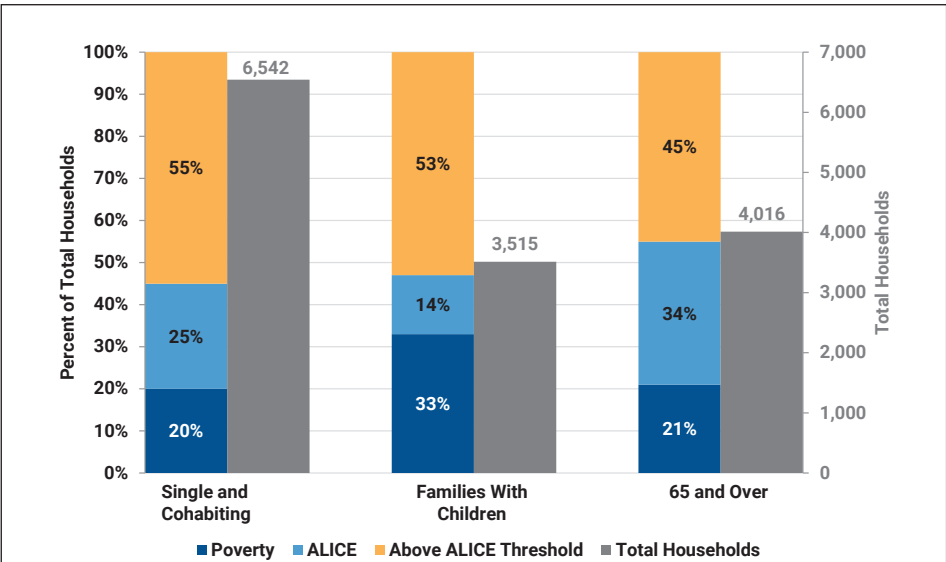

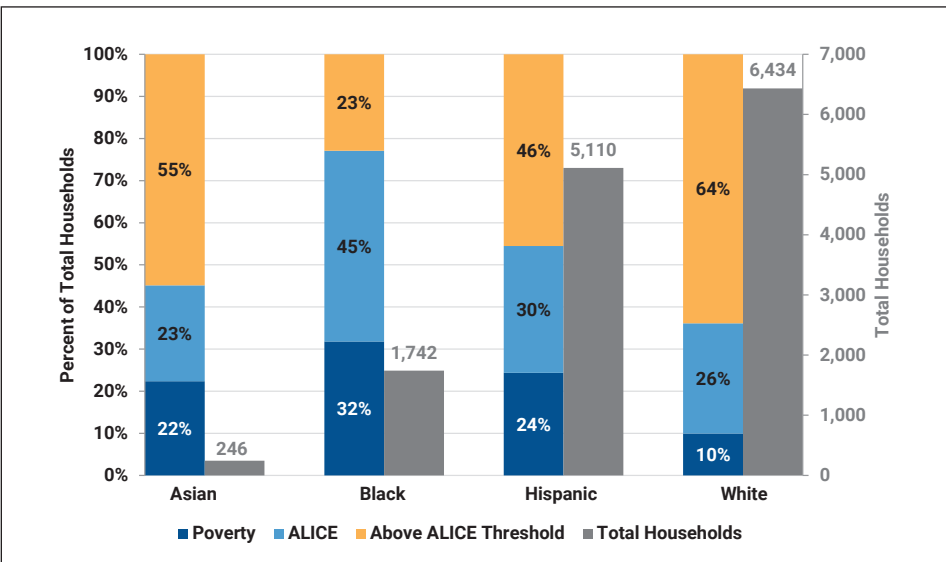

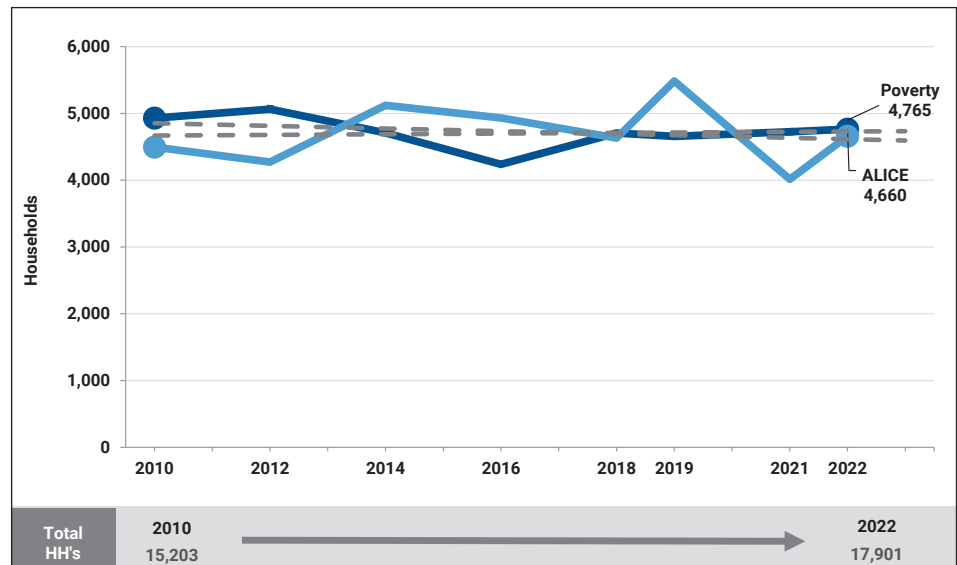

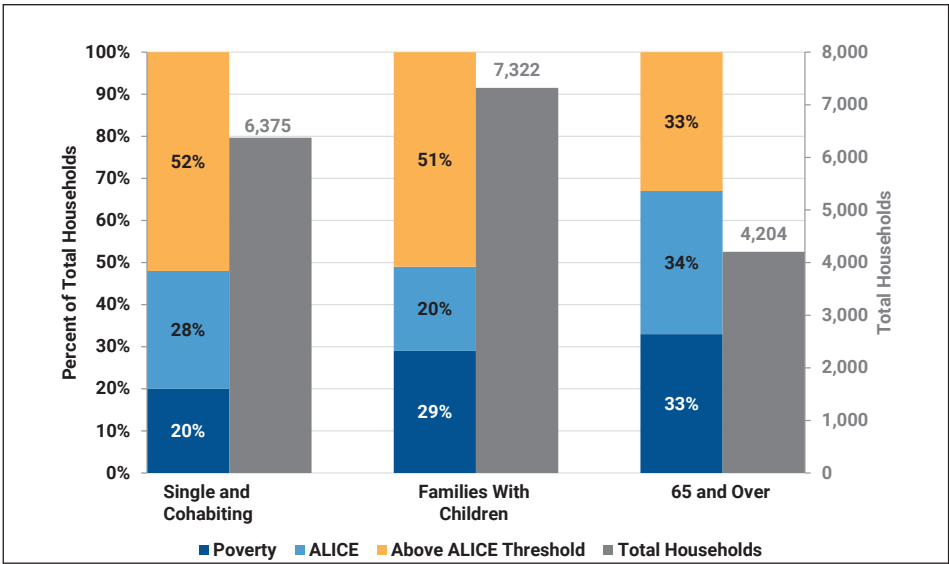

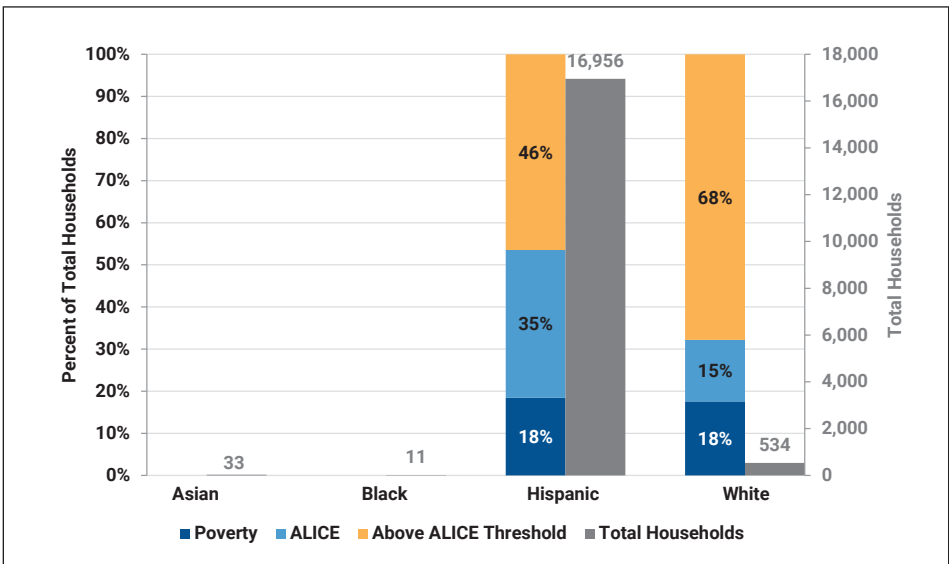

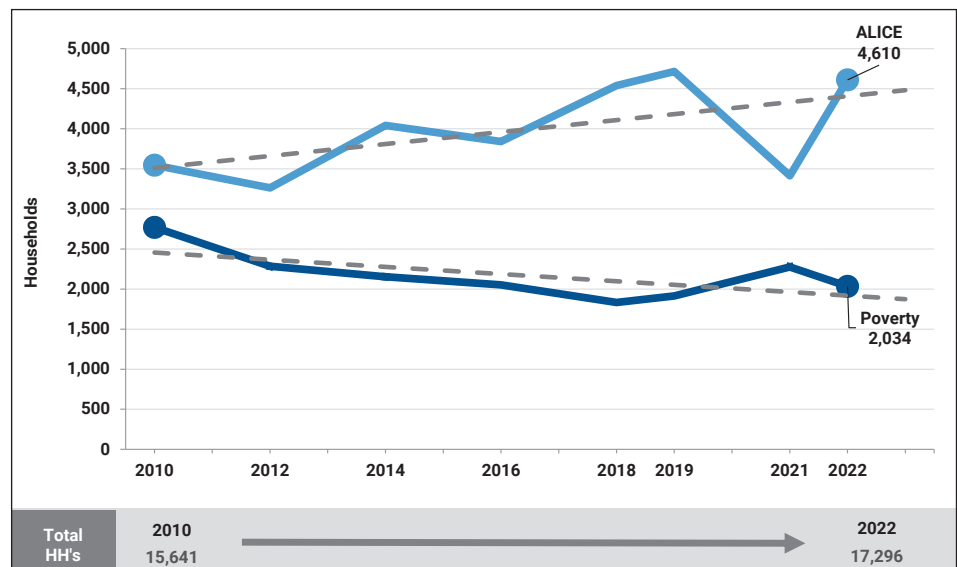

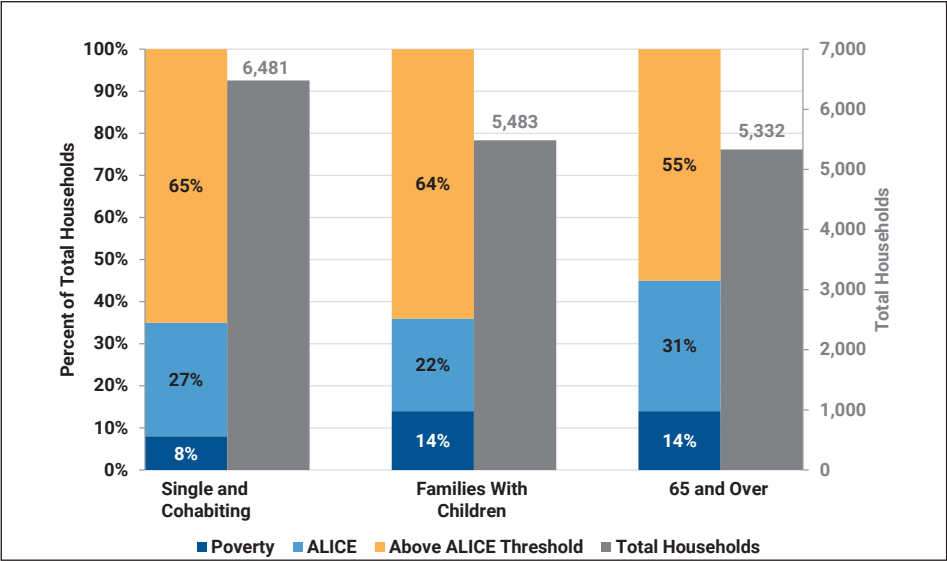

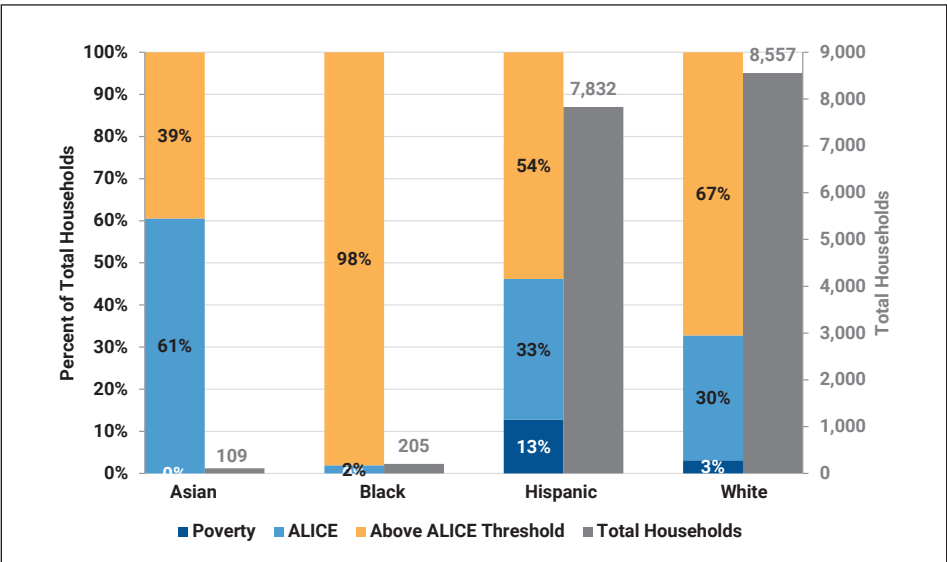

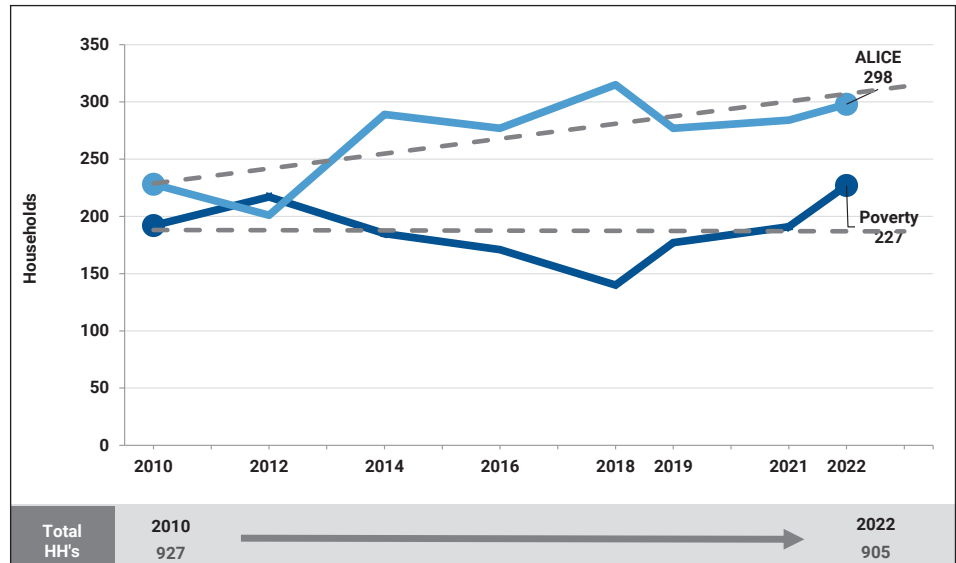

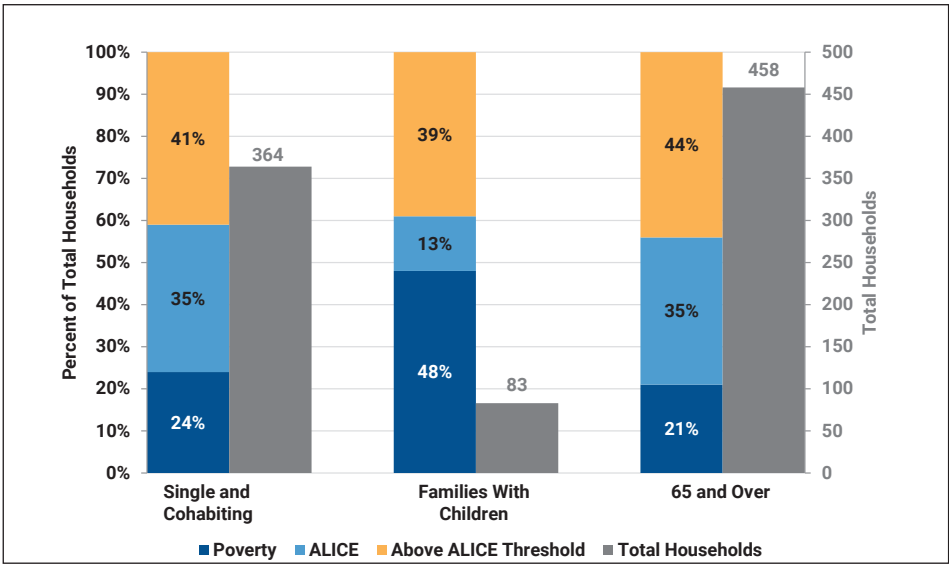

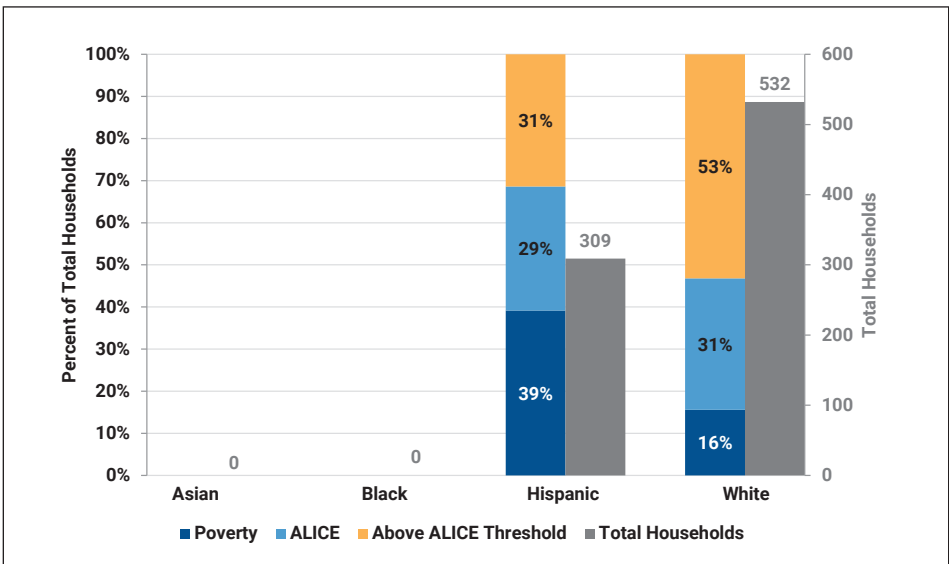

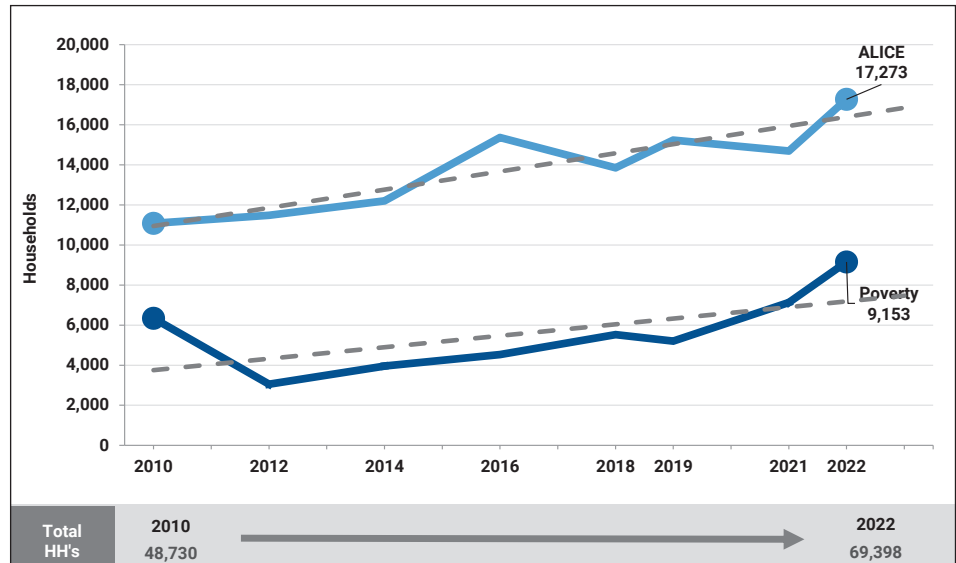

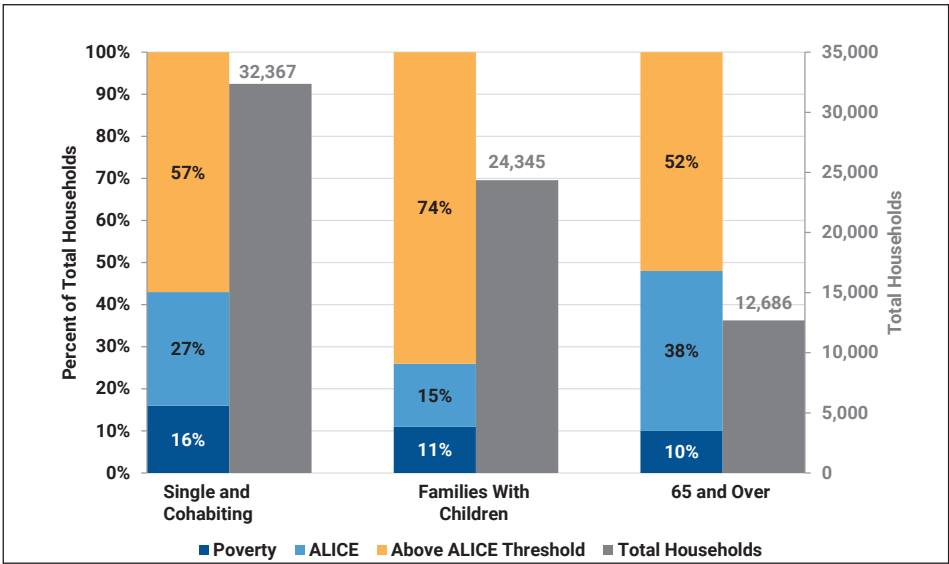

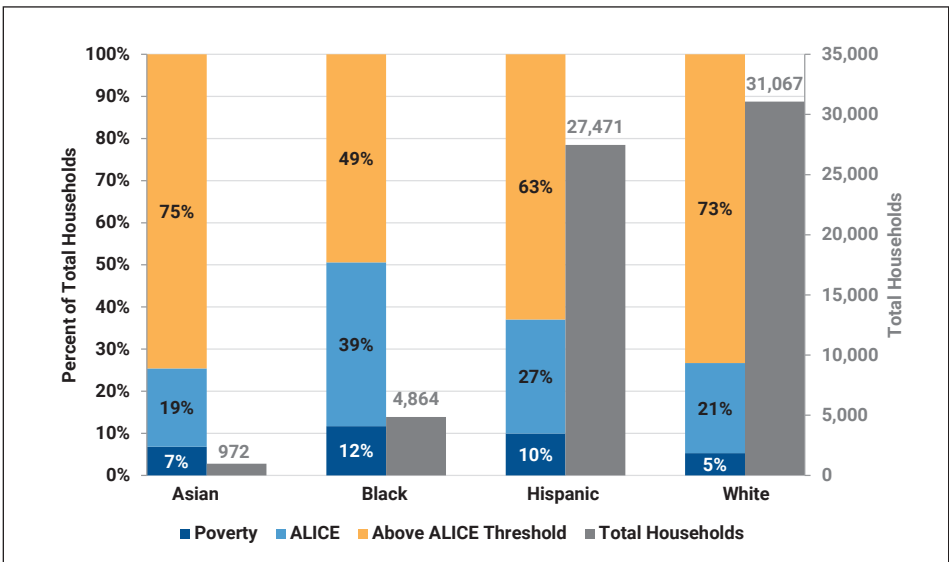

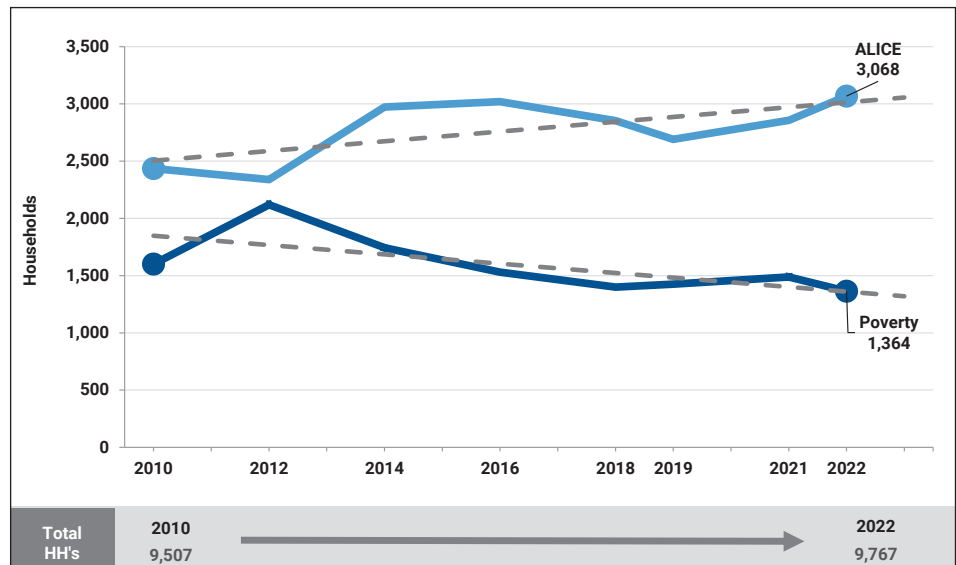

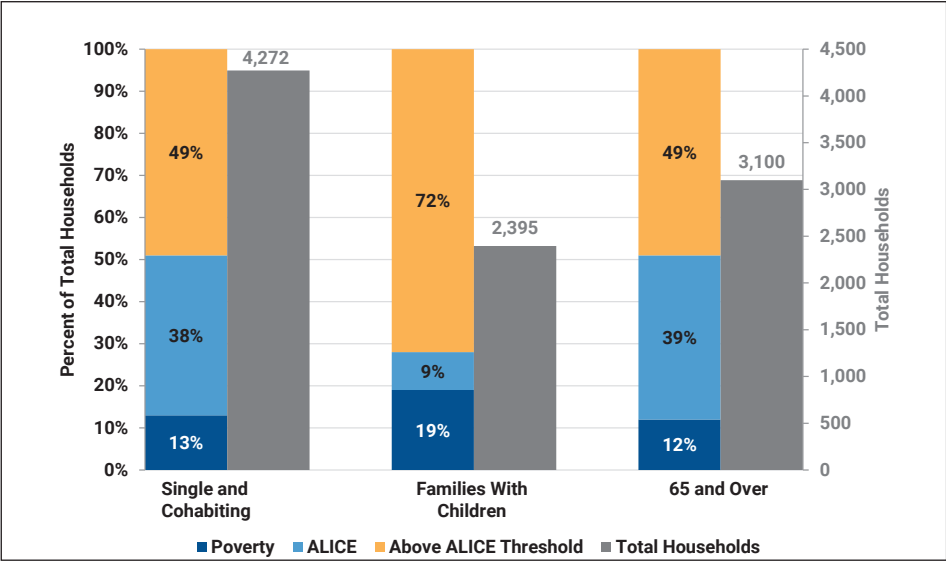

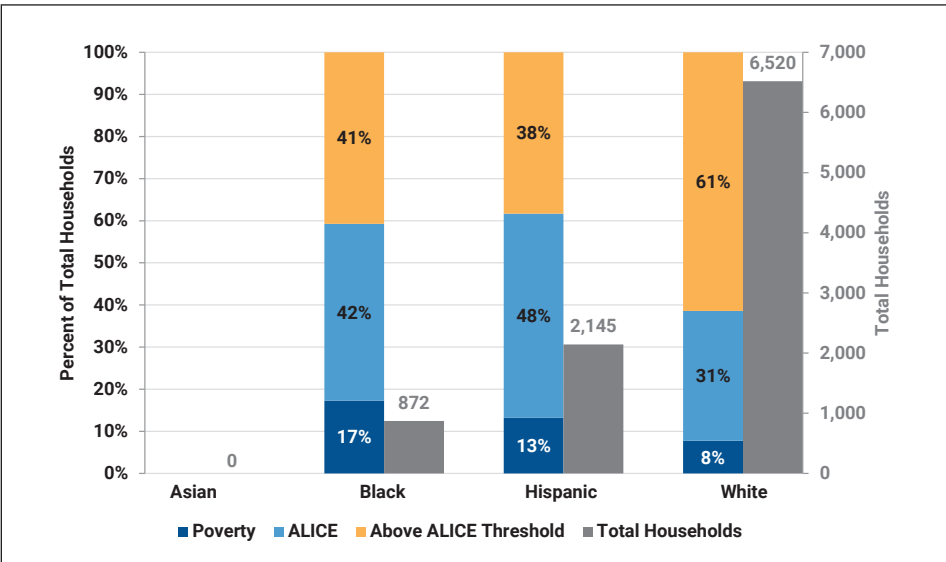

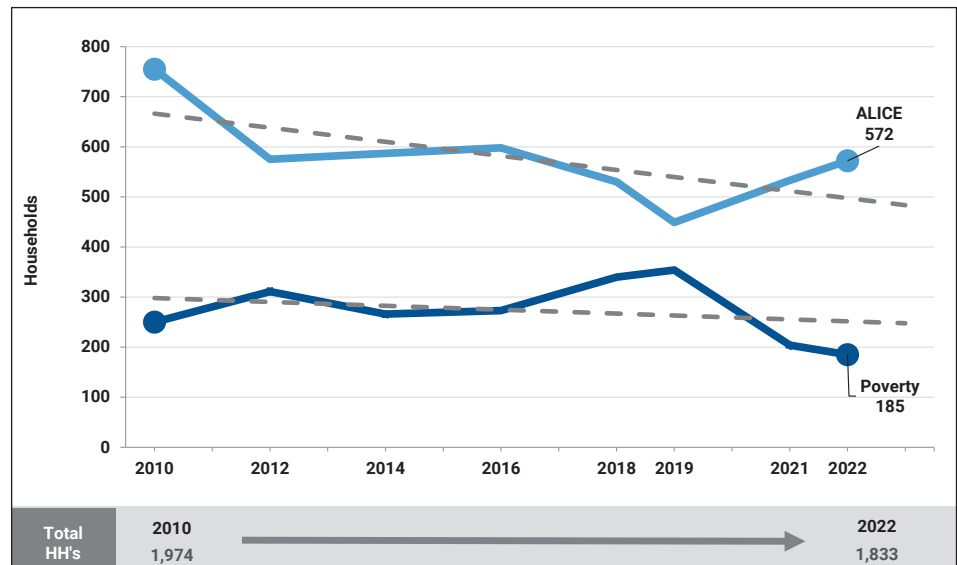

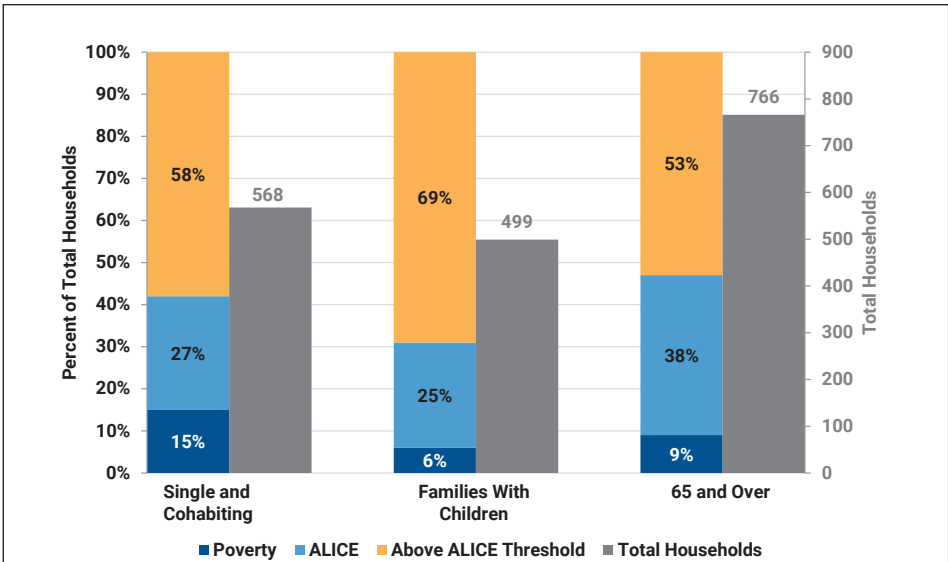

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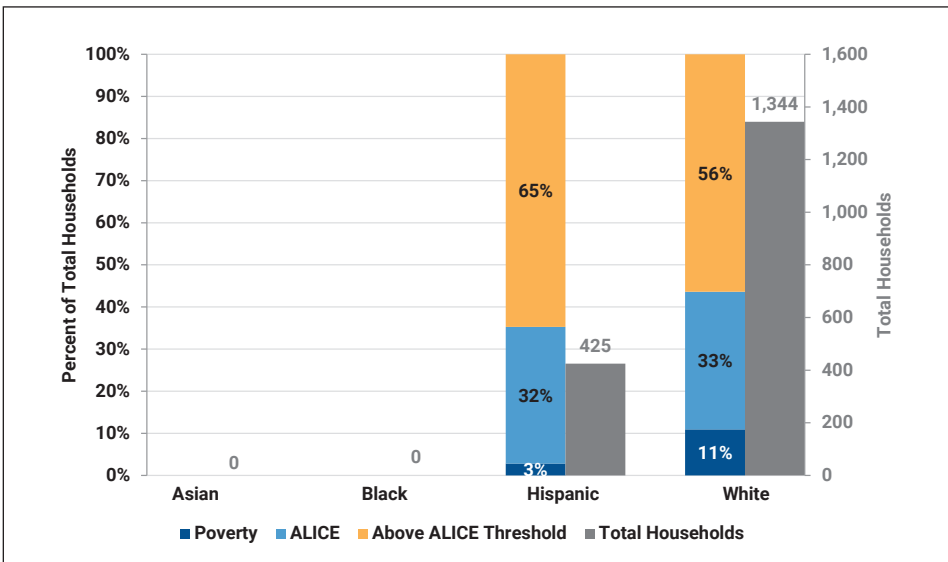

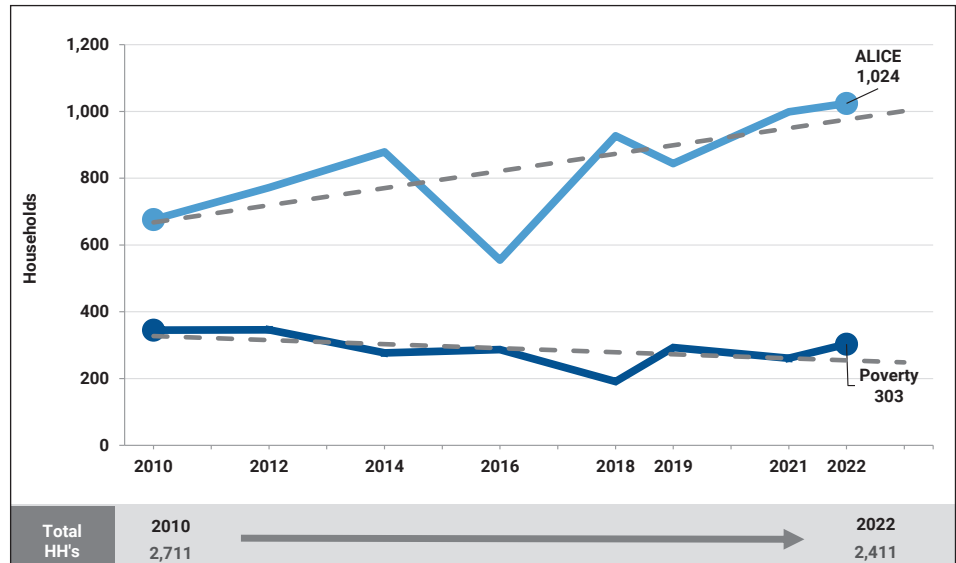

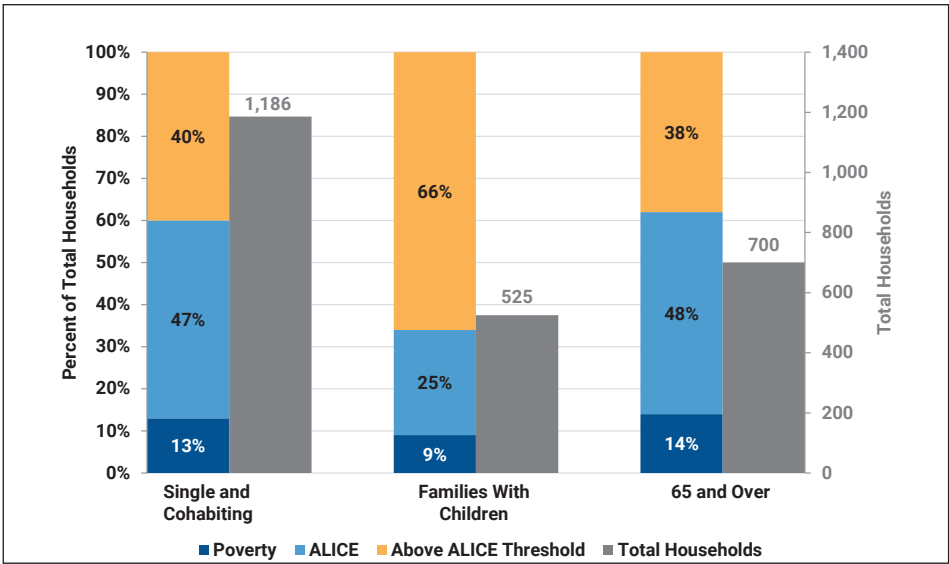

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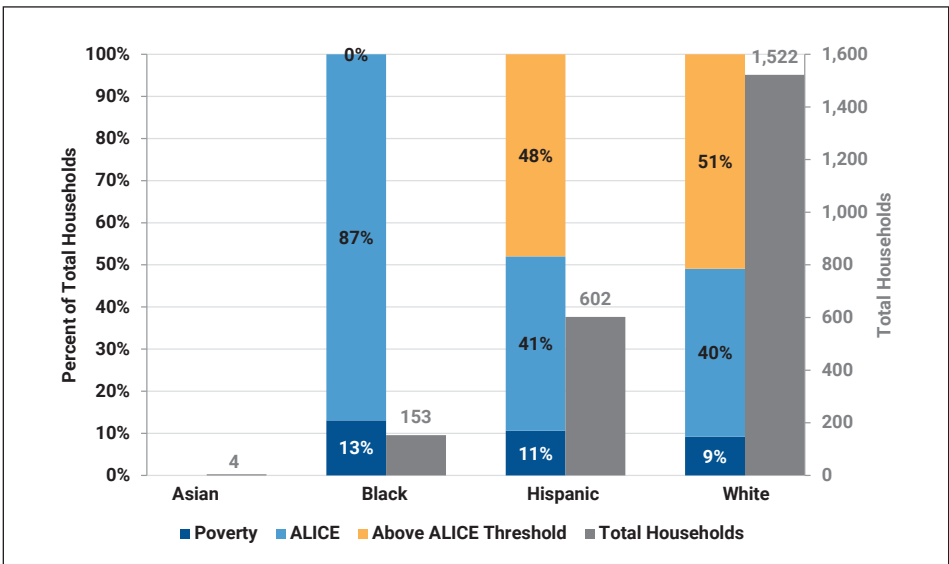

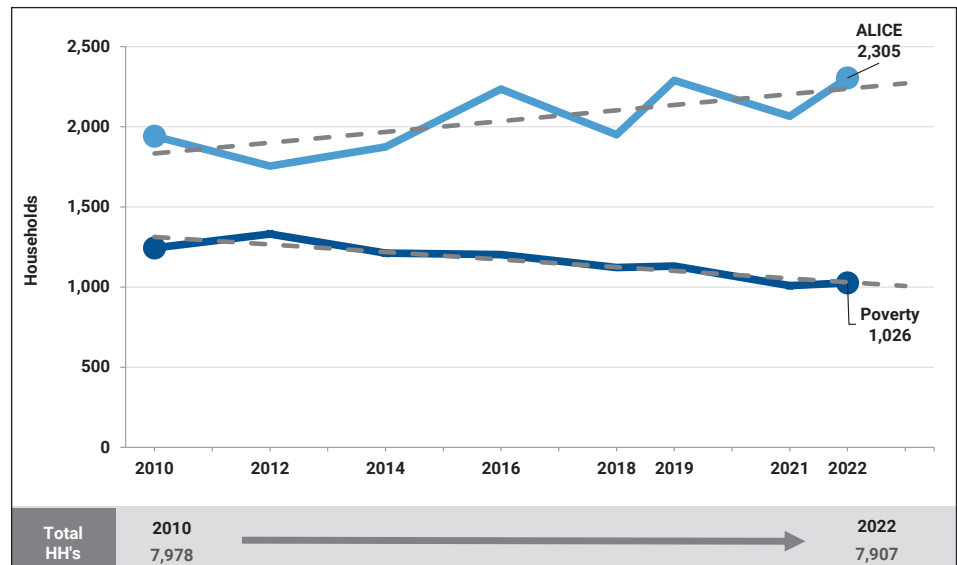

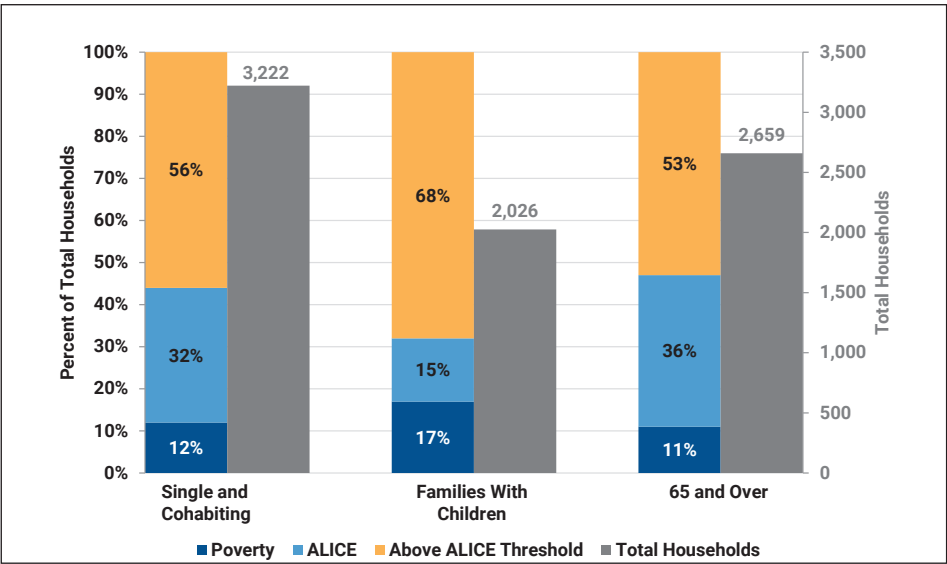

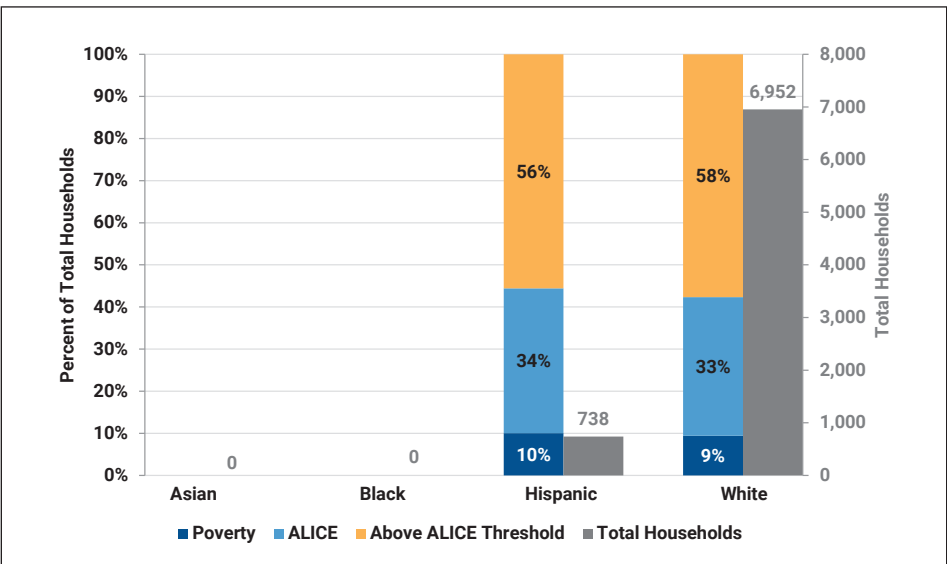

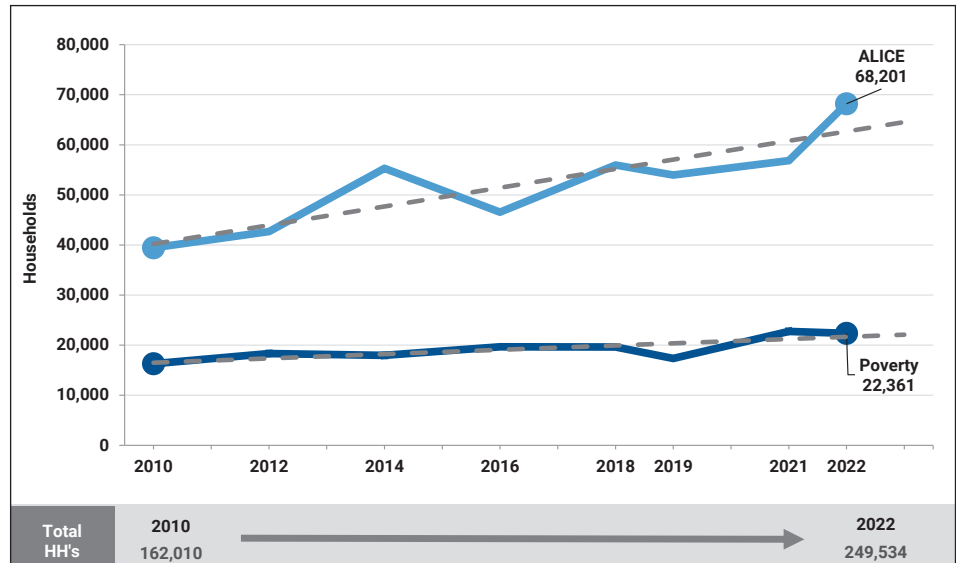

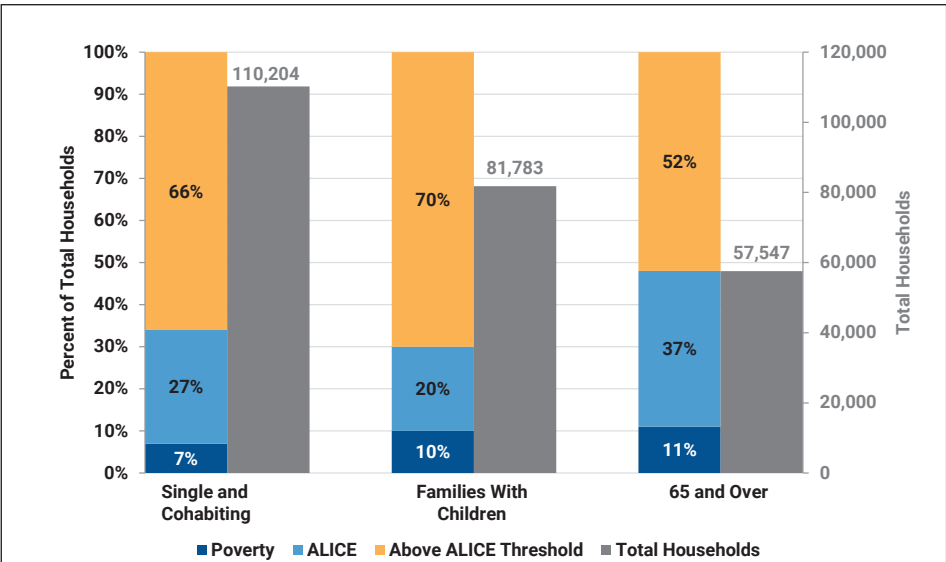

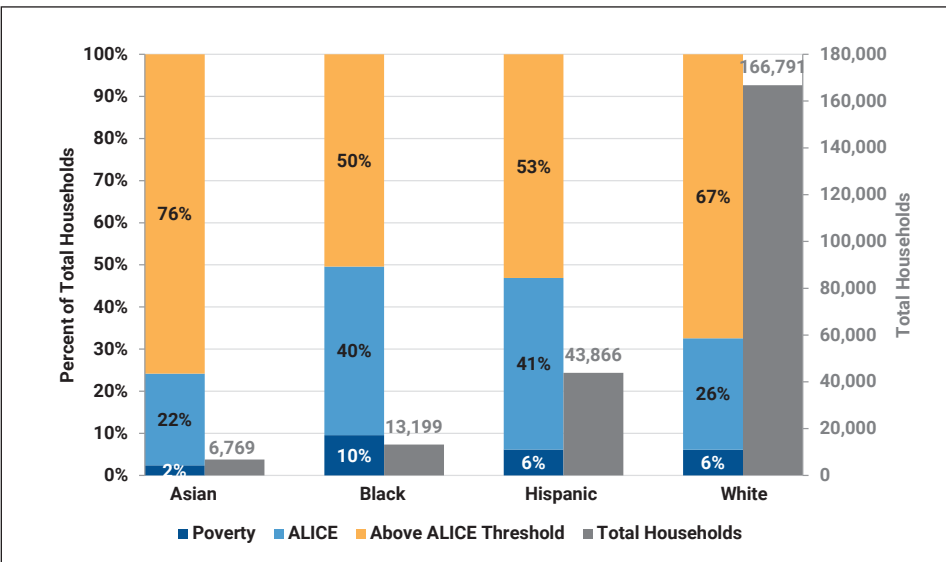

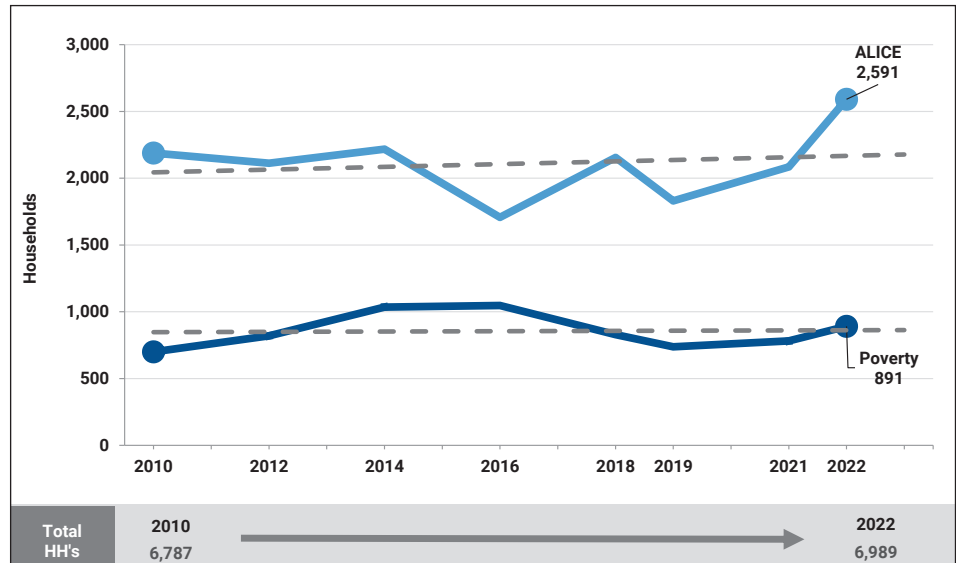

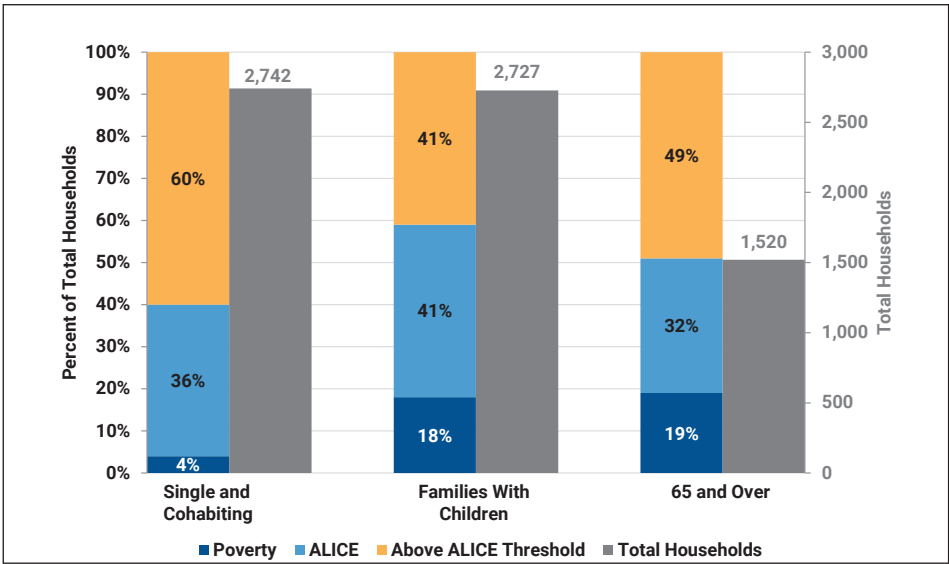

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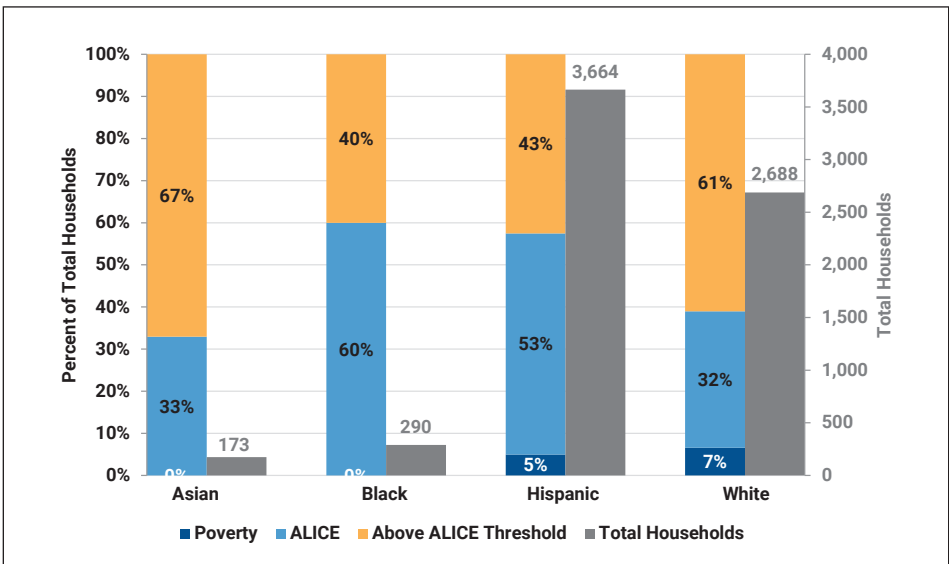

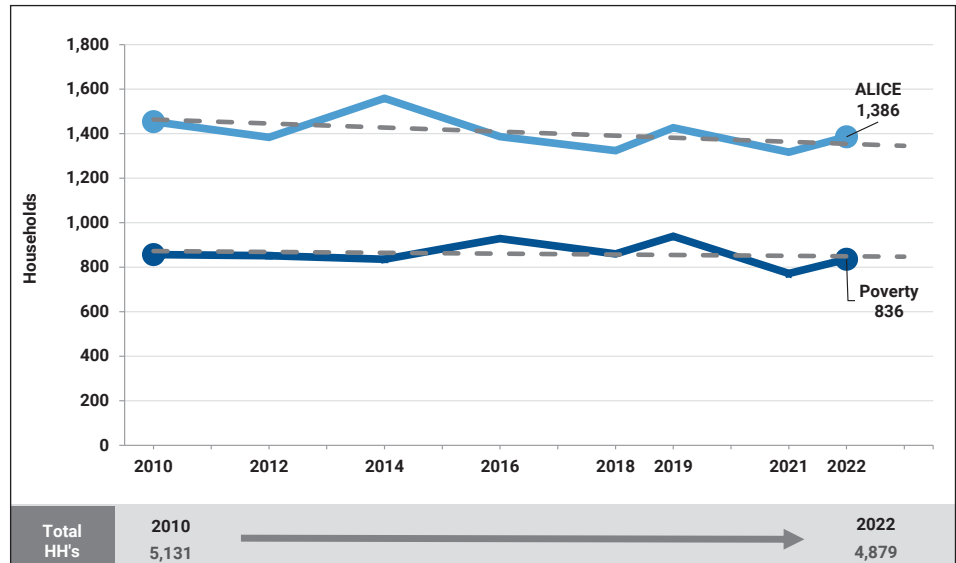

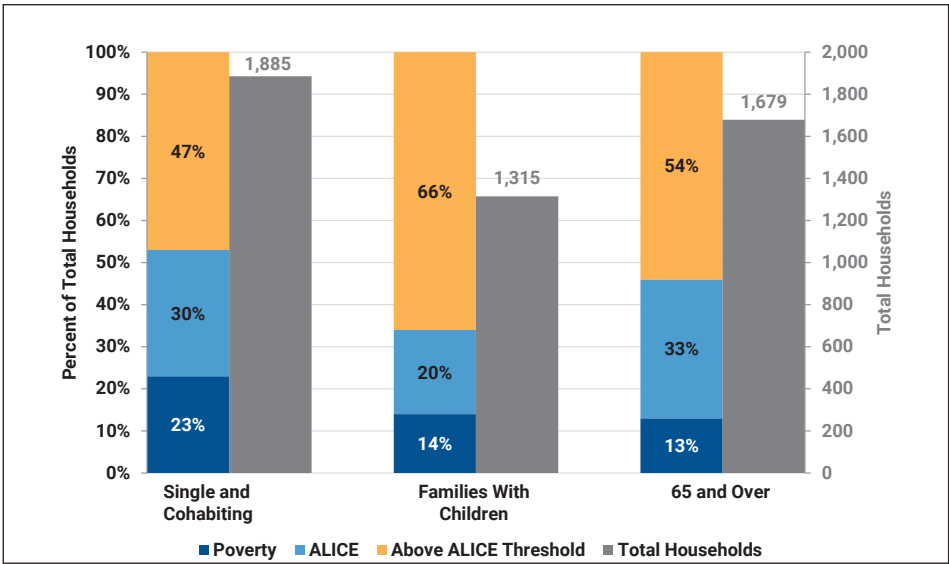

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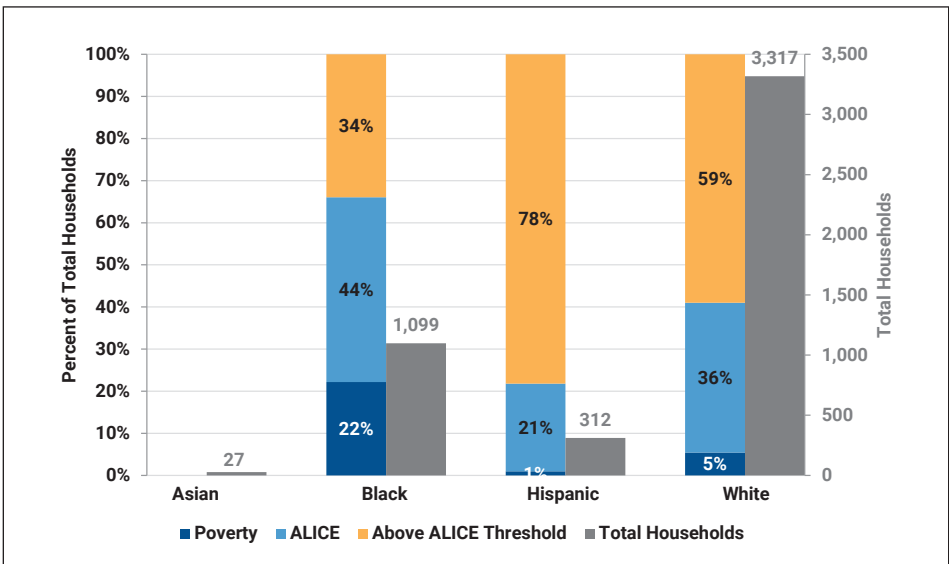
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Morris County, 2022

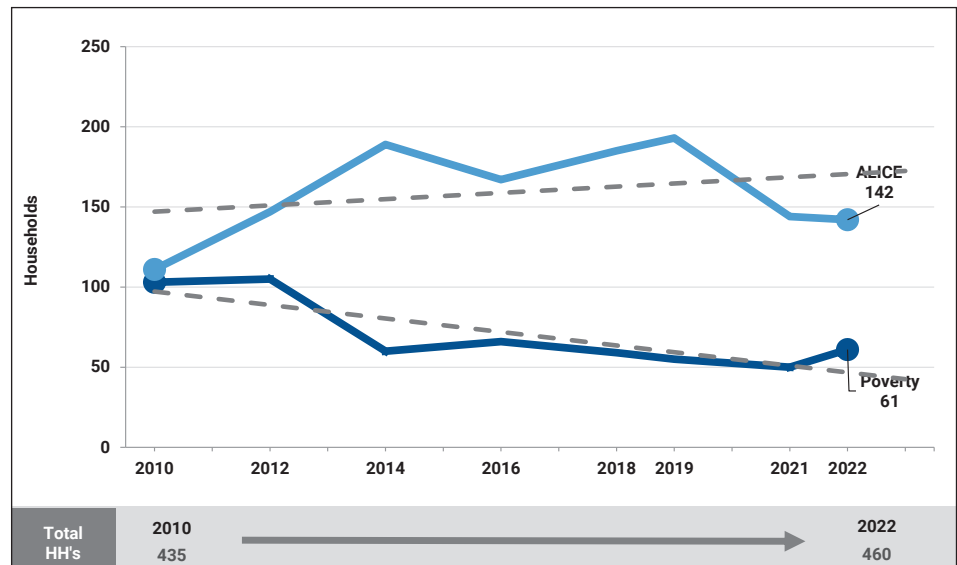

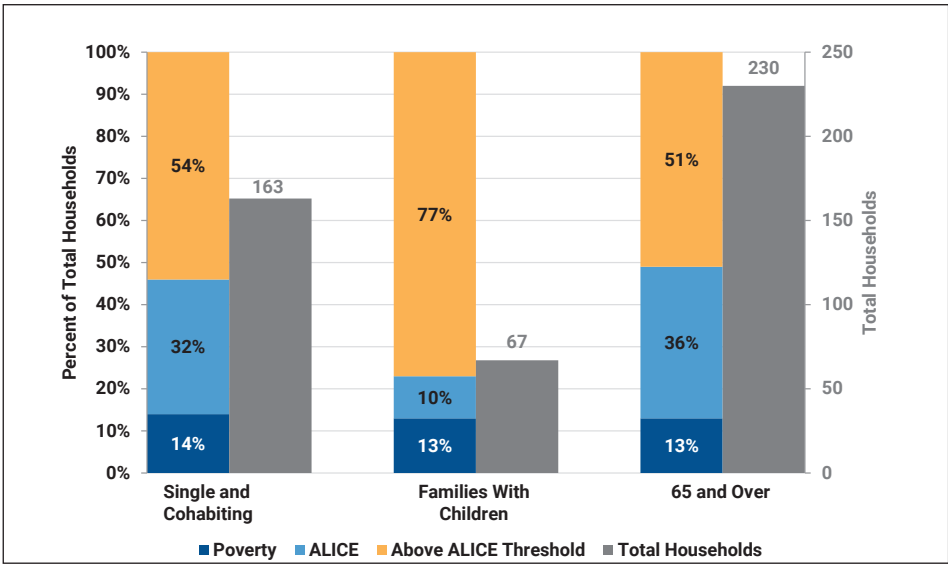

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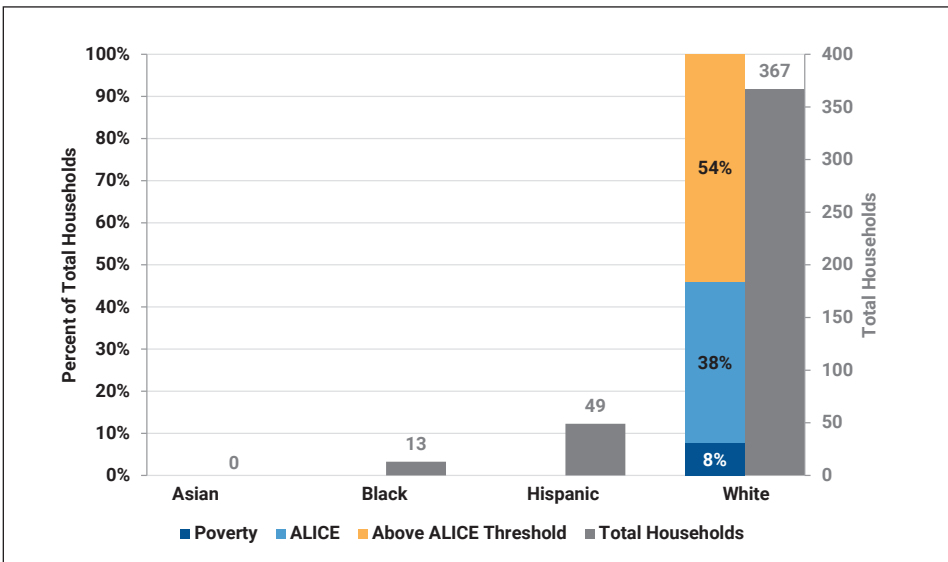
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Motley County, 2022

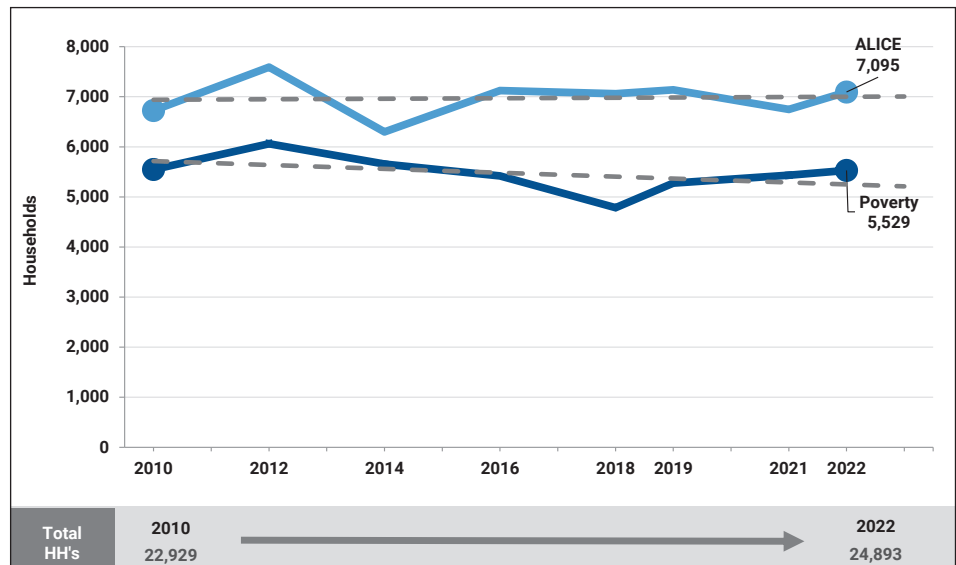

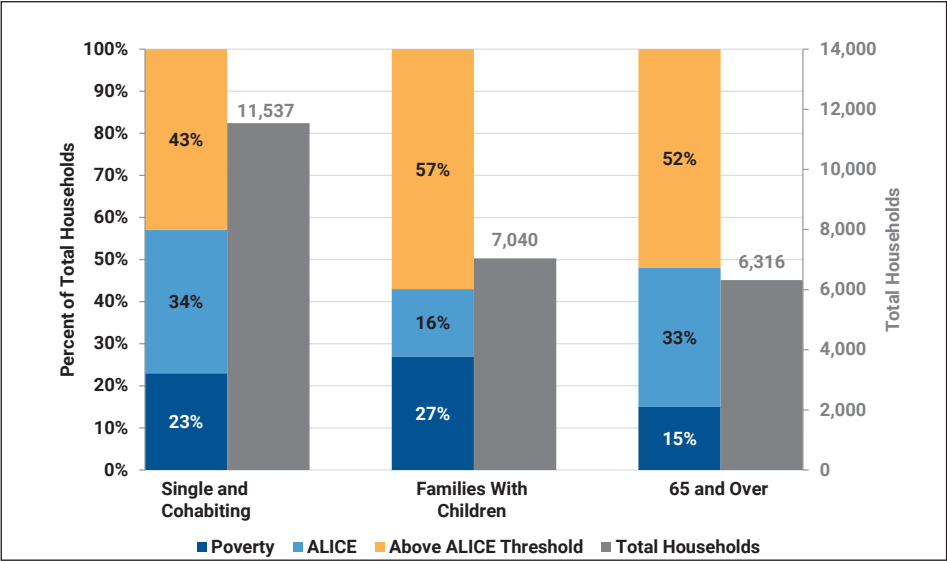

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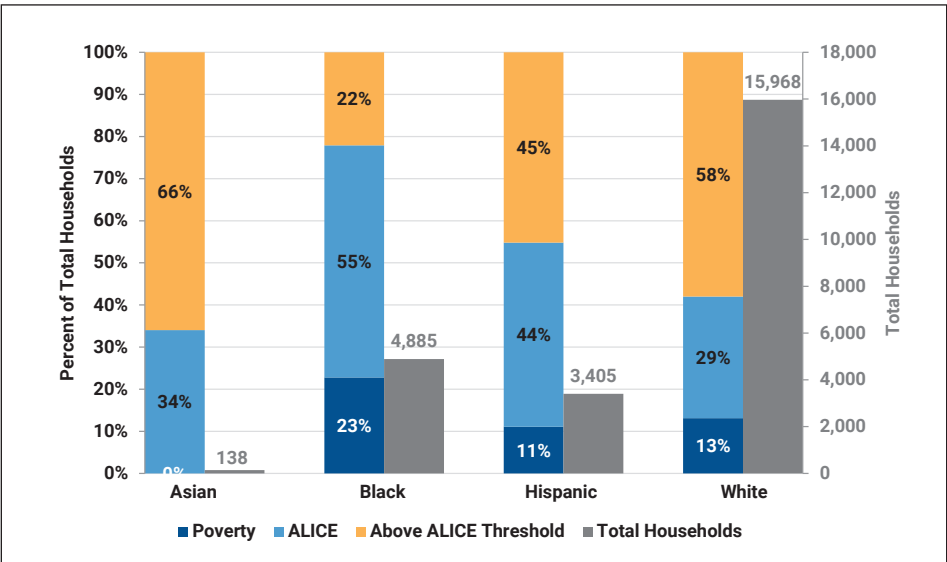

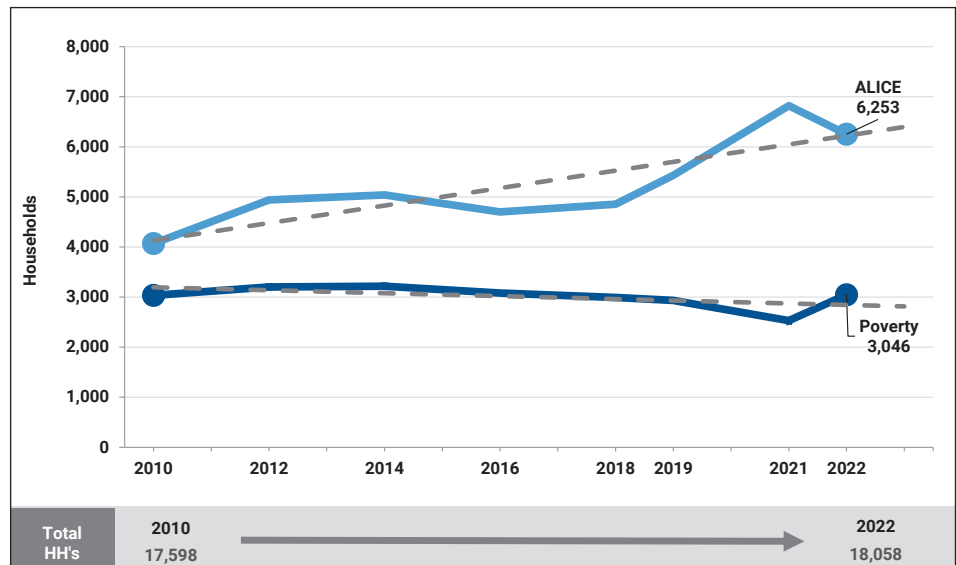

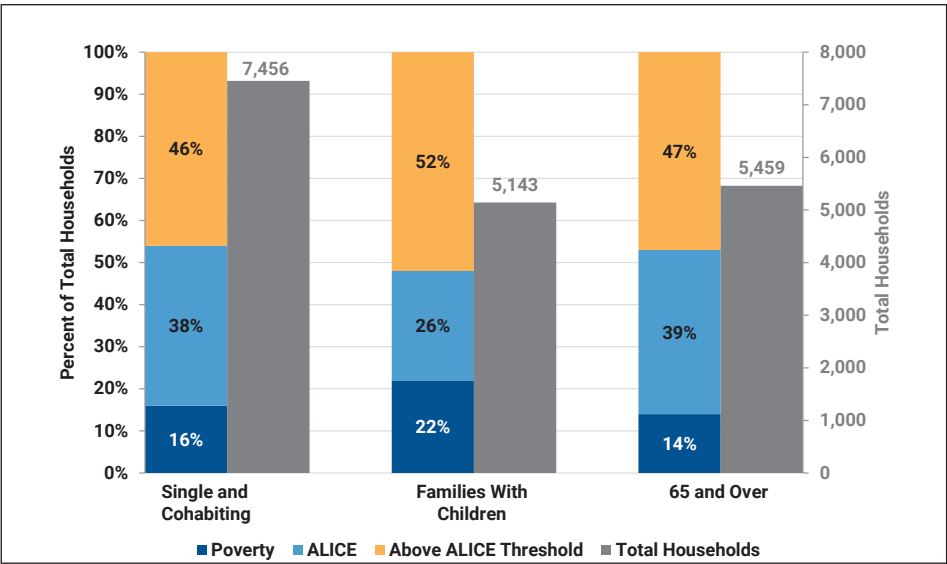

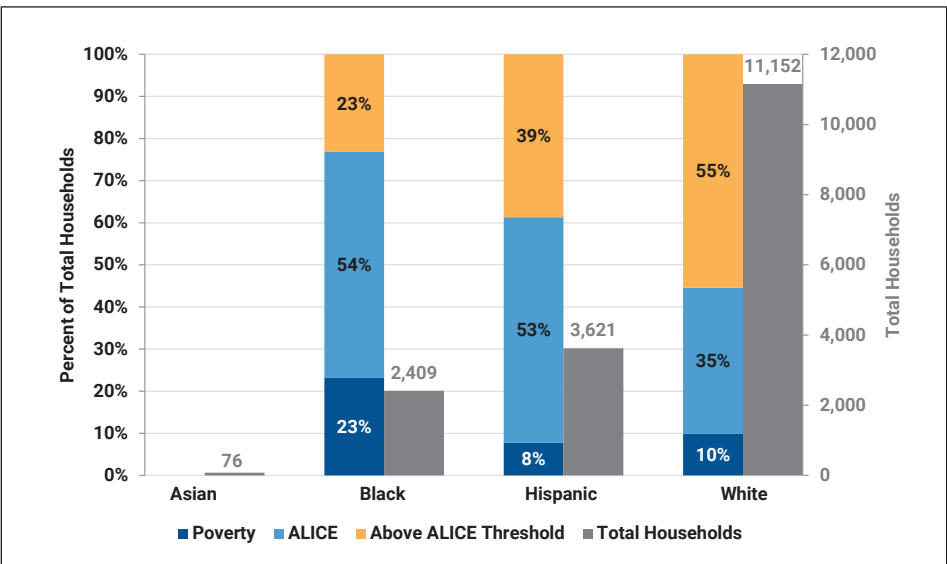

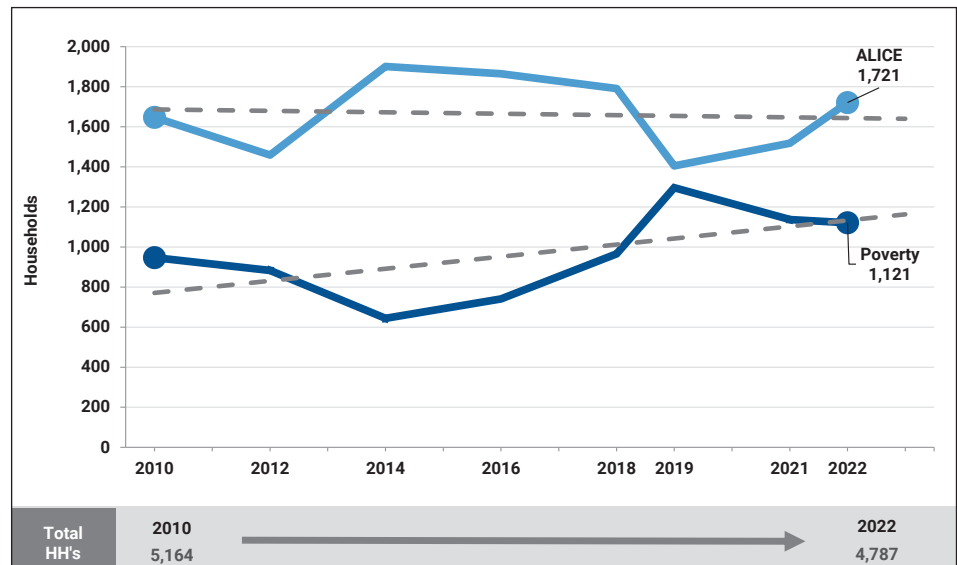

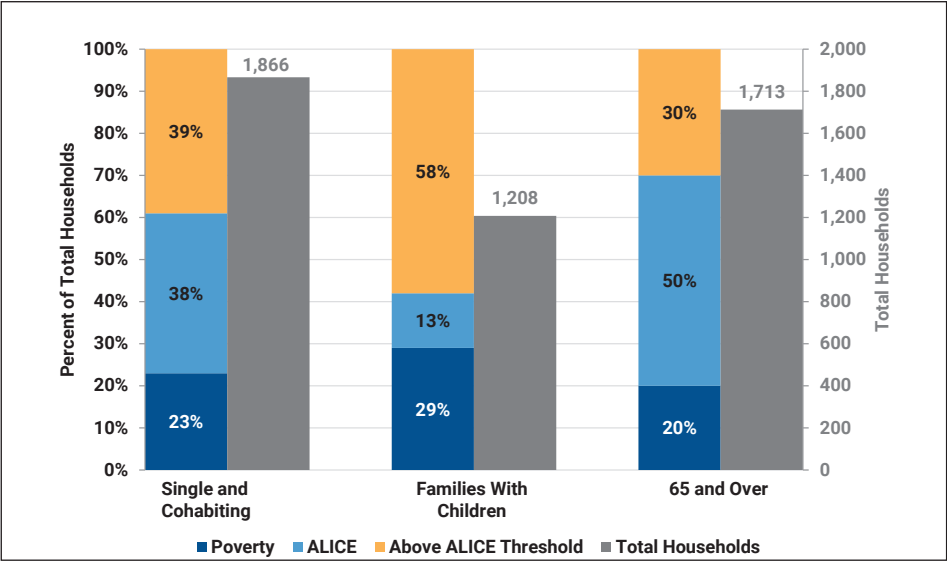

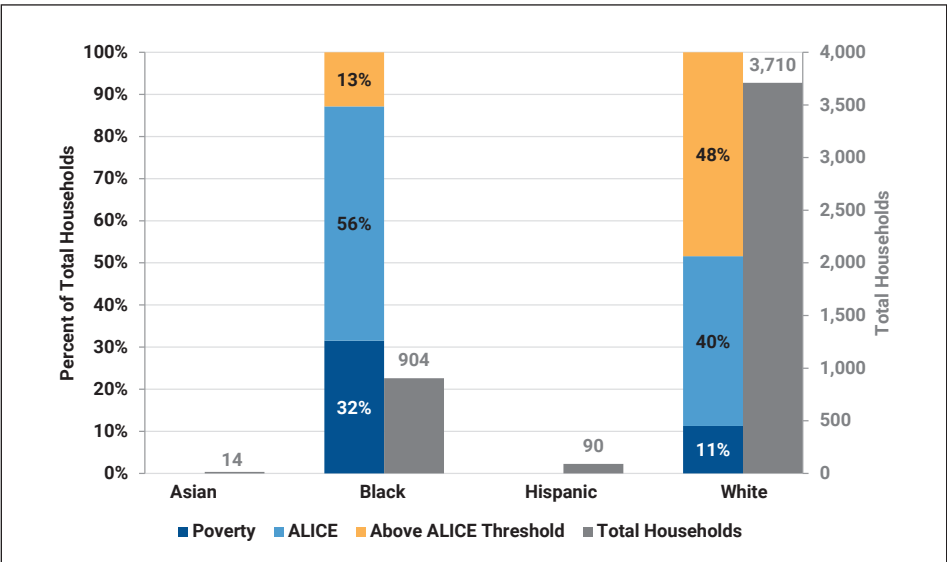

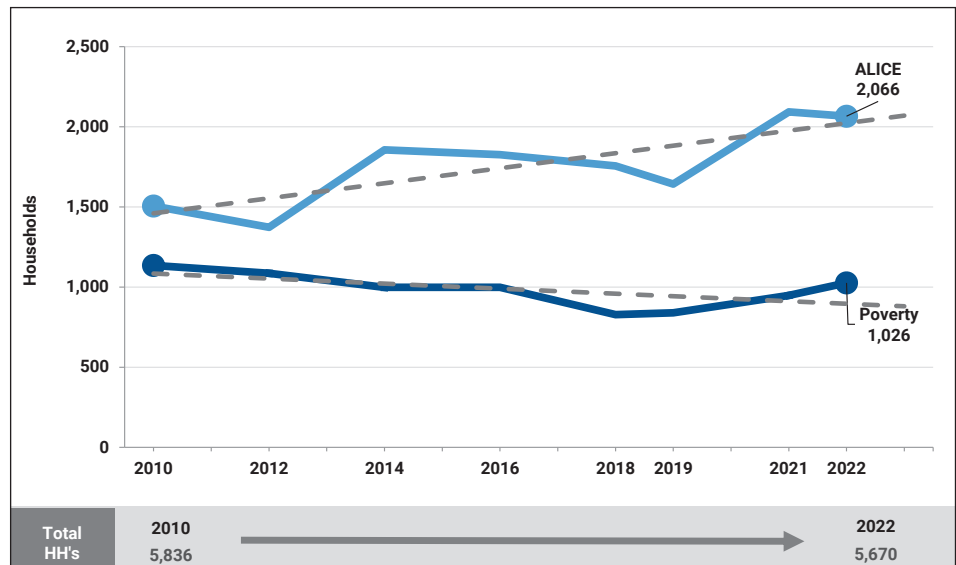

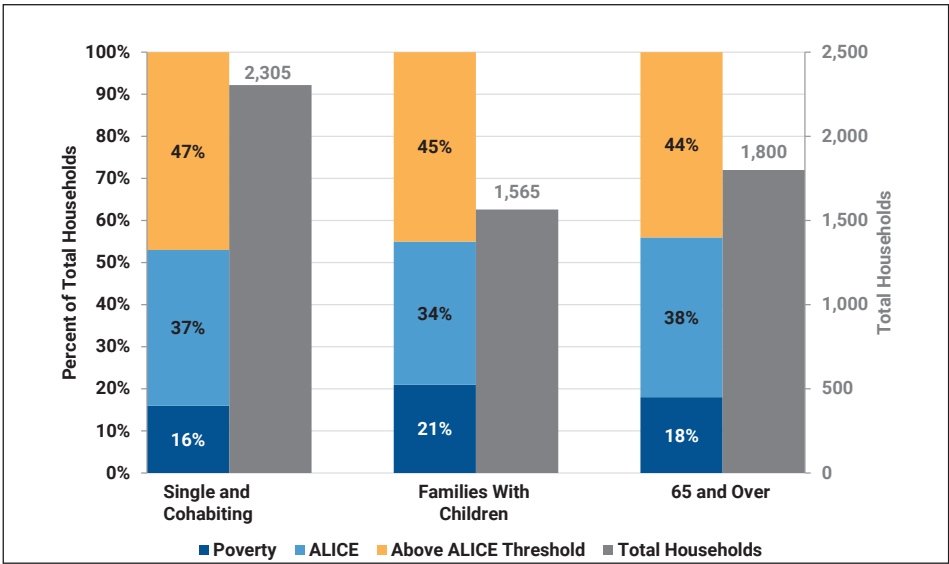

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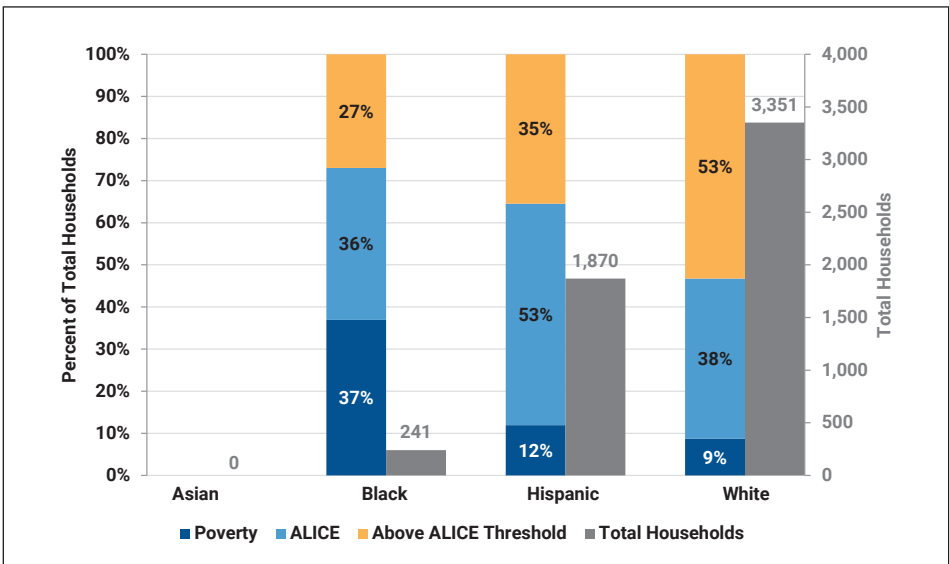

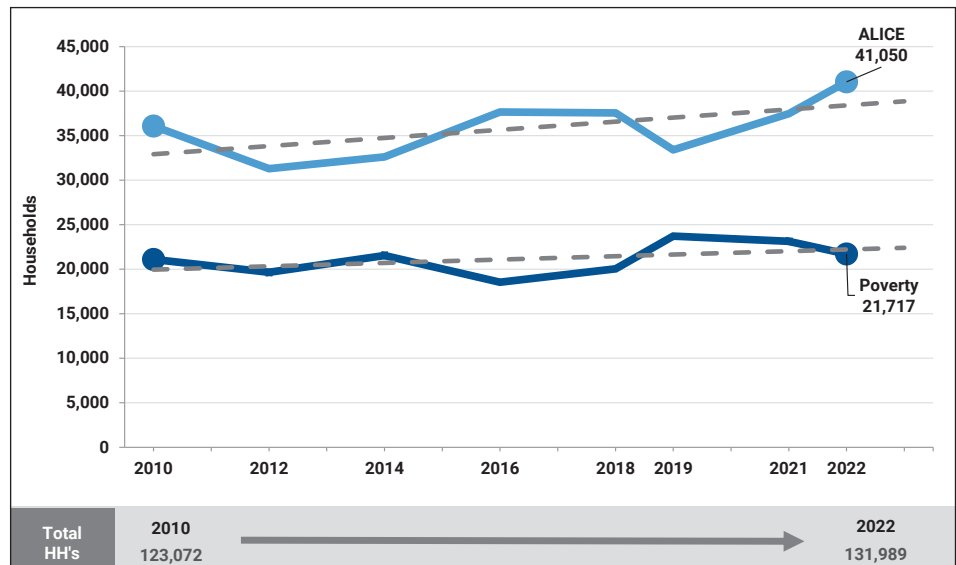

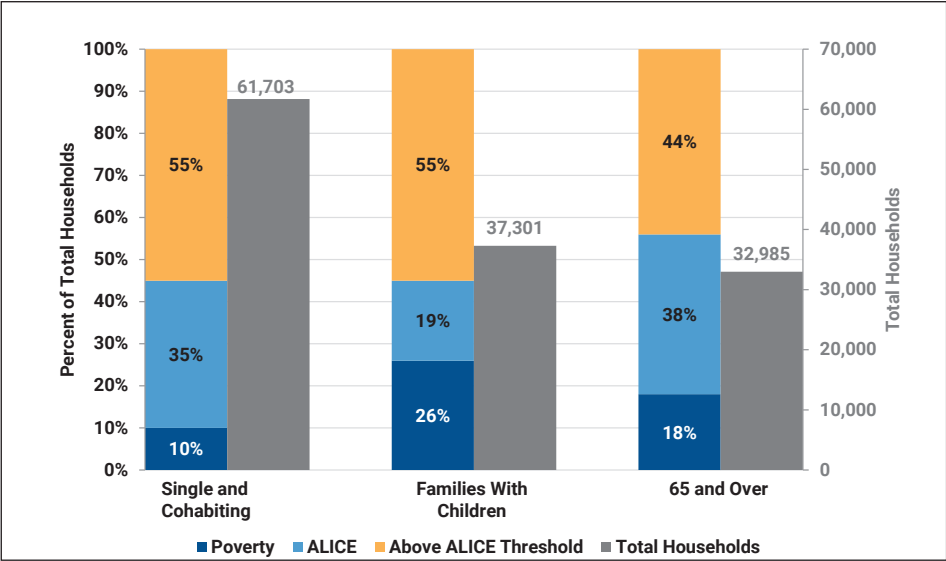

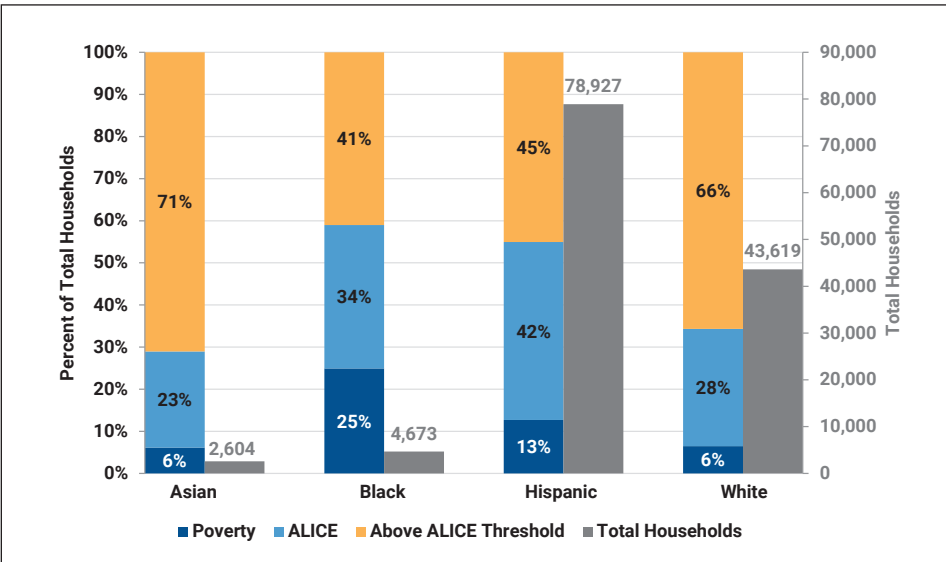

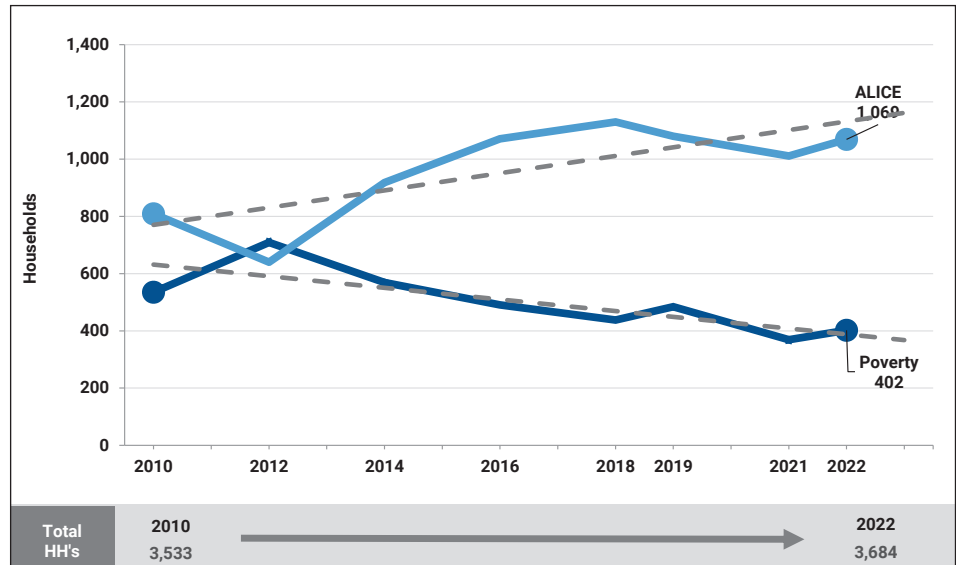

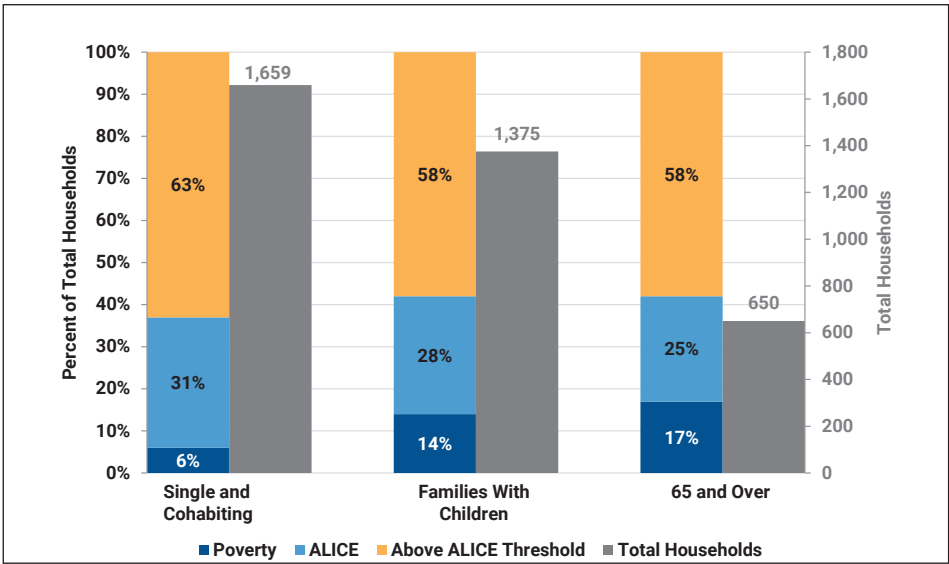

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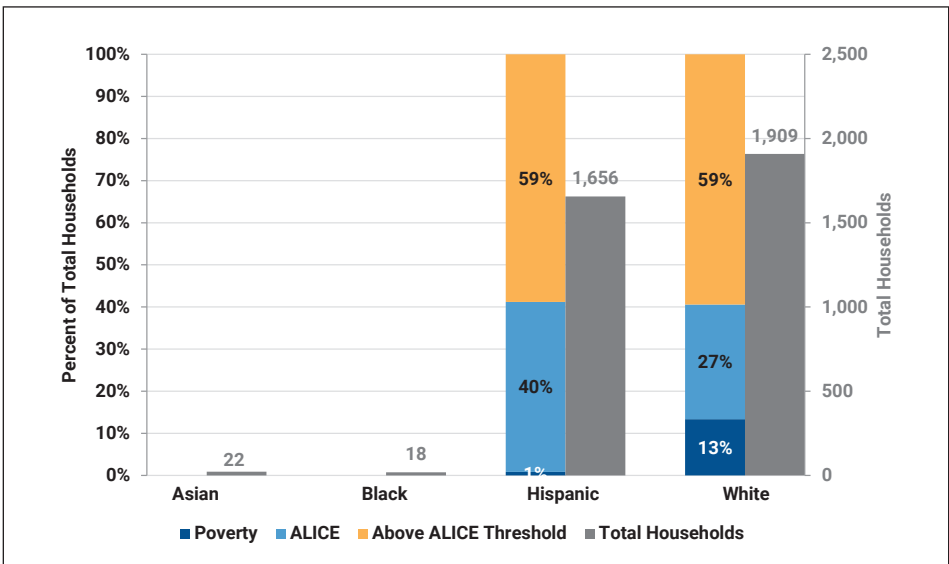

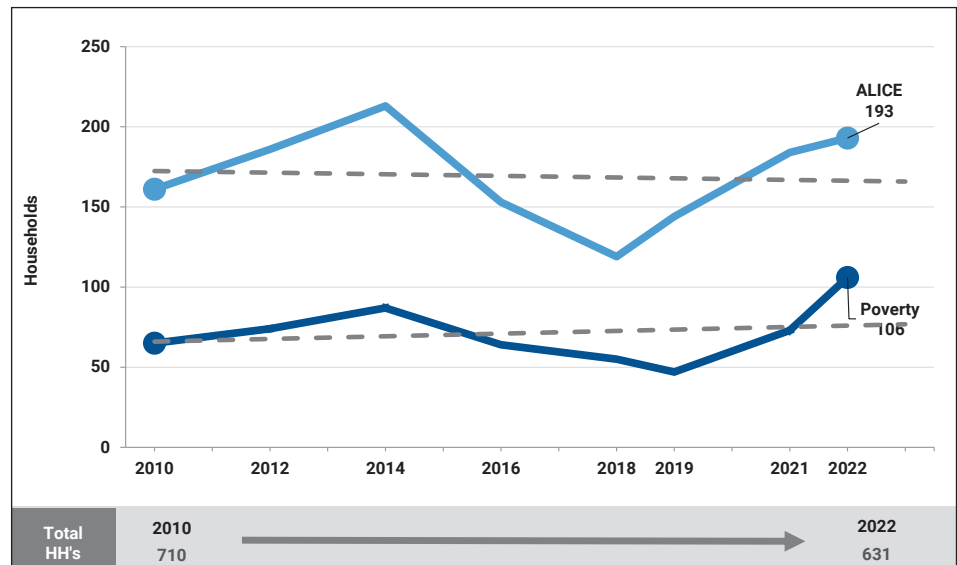

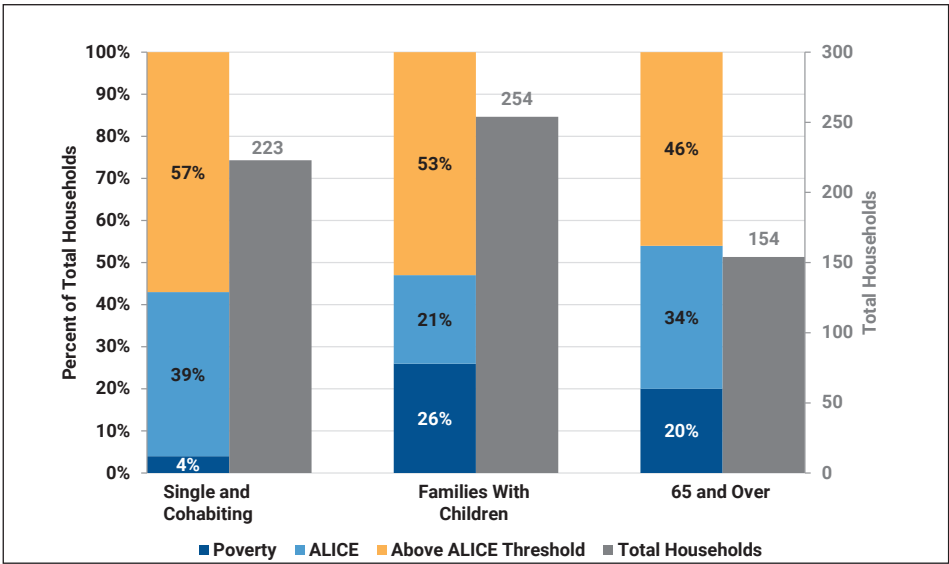
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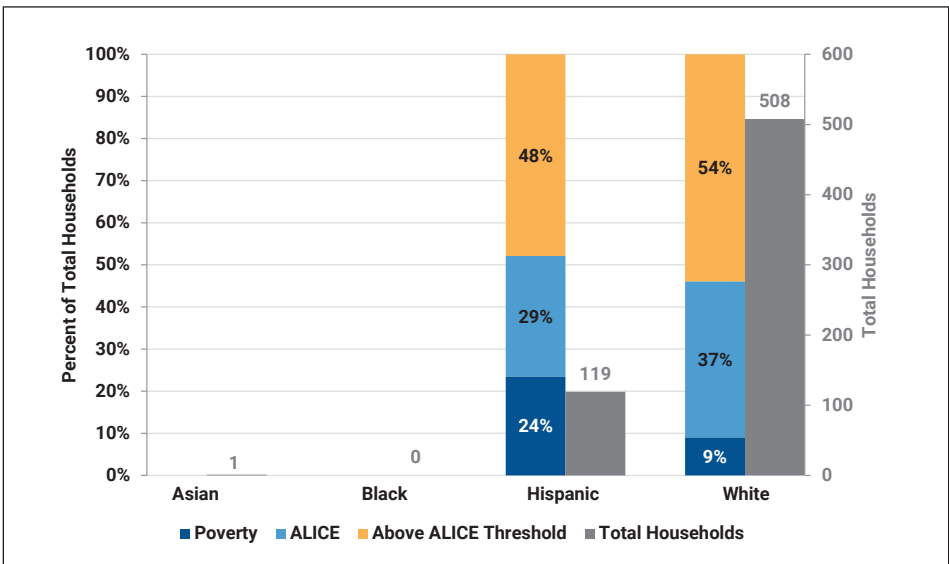

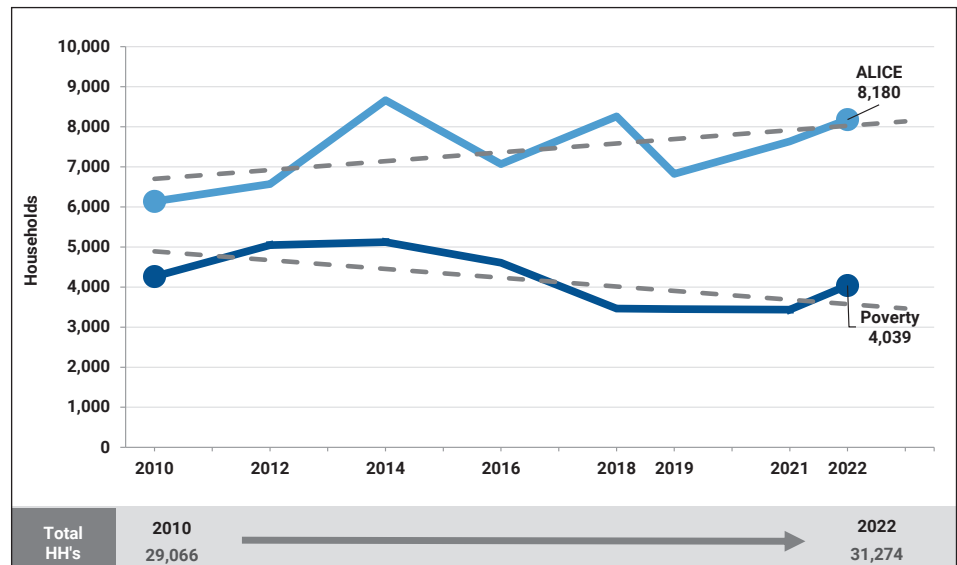

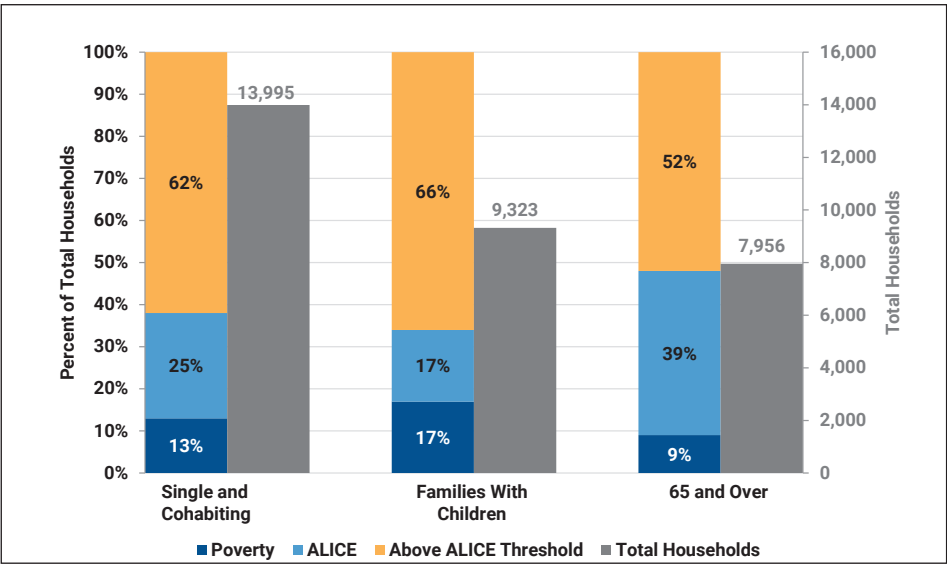

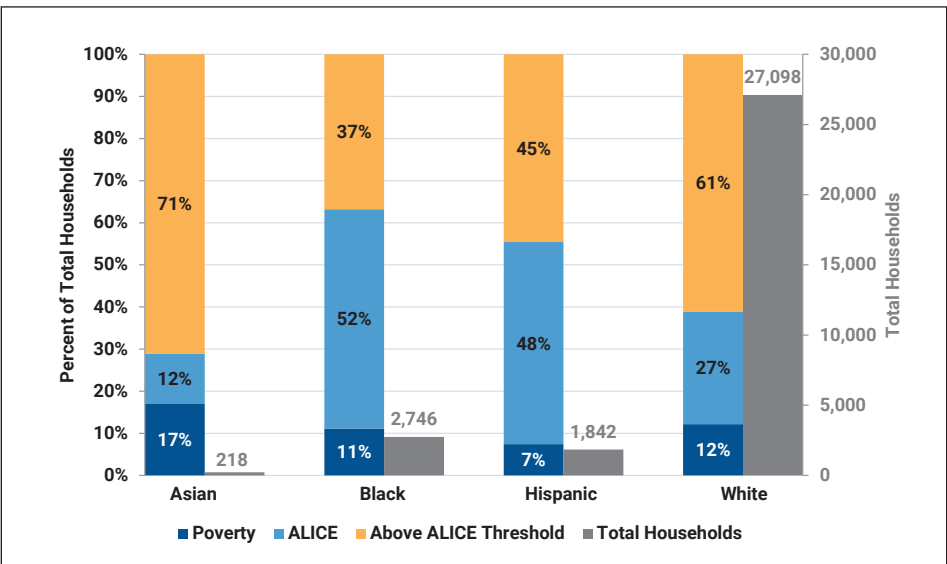

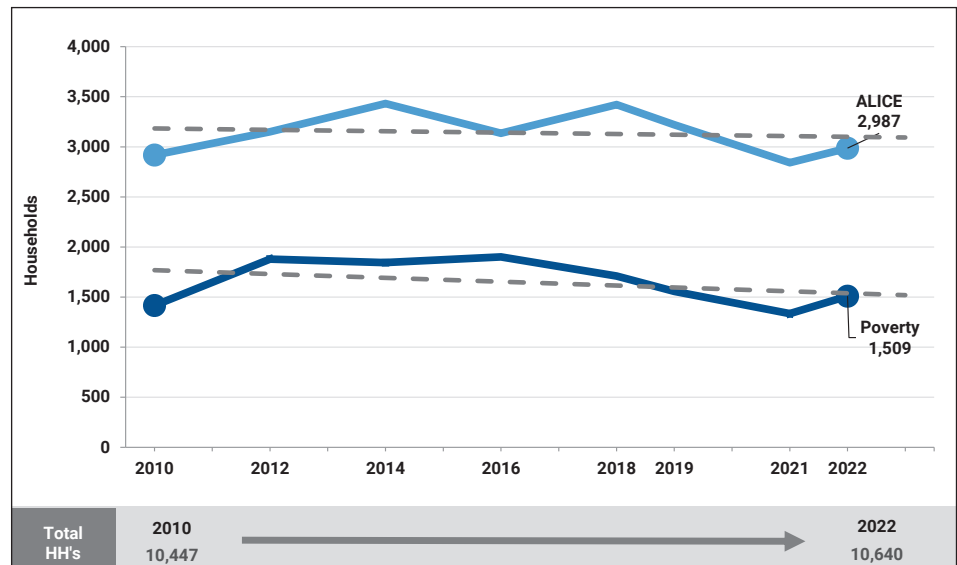

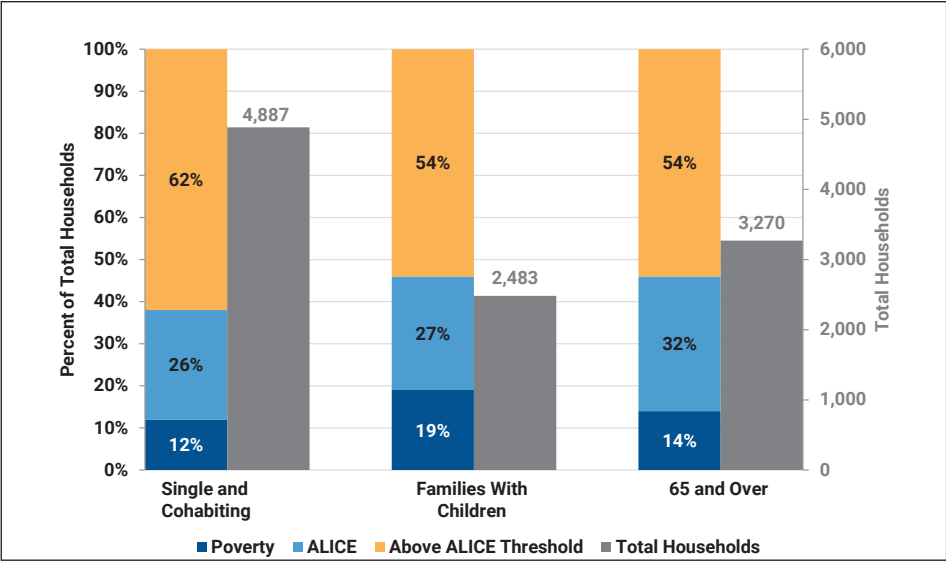

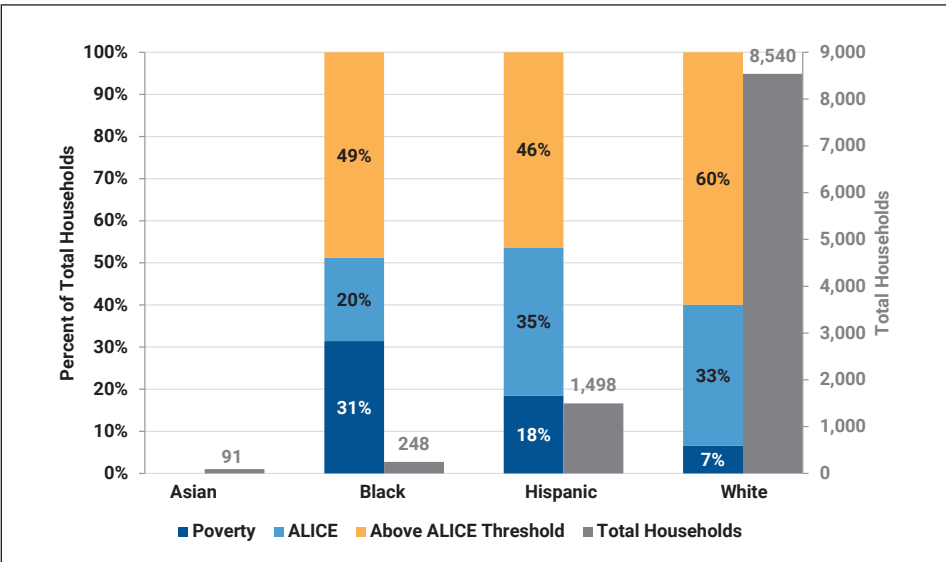

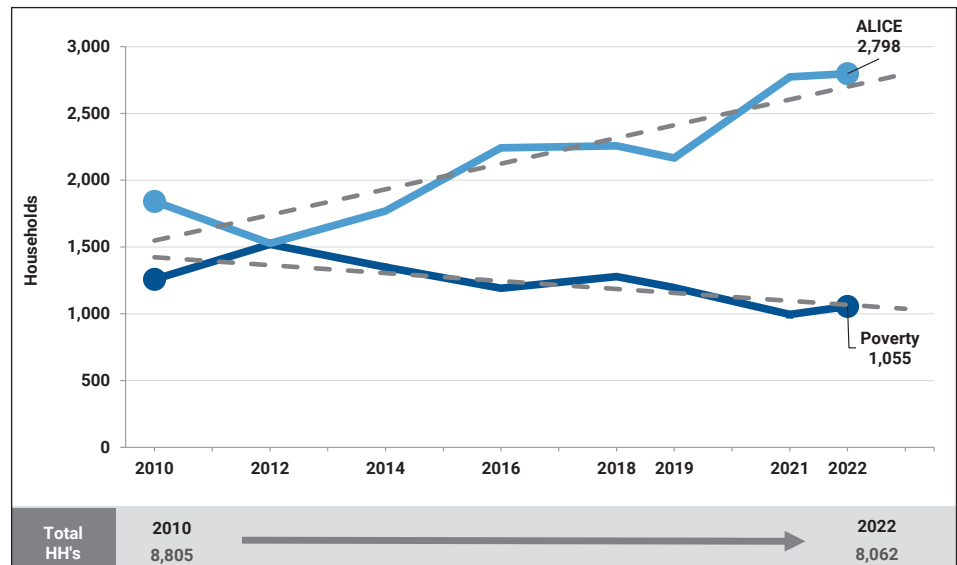

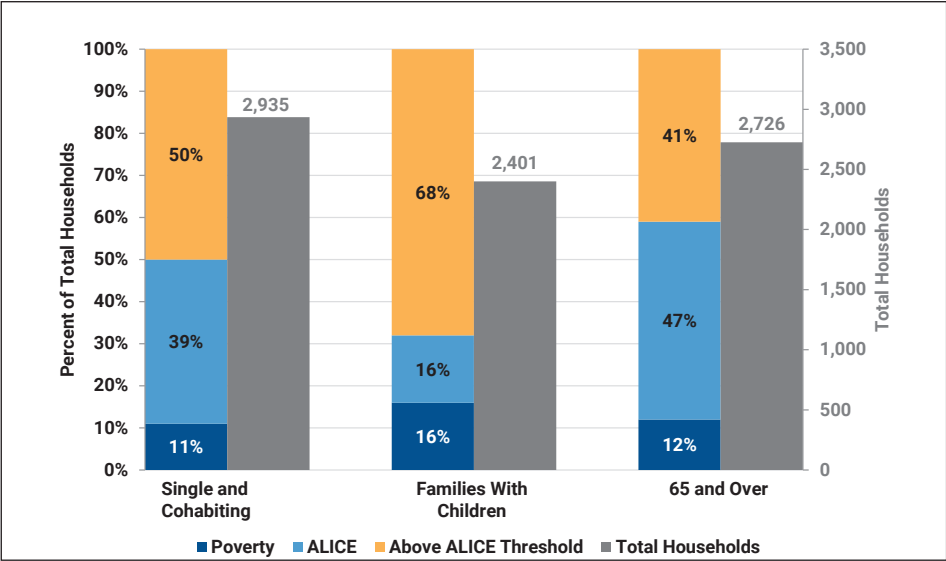

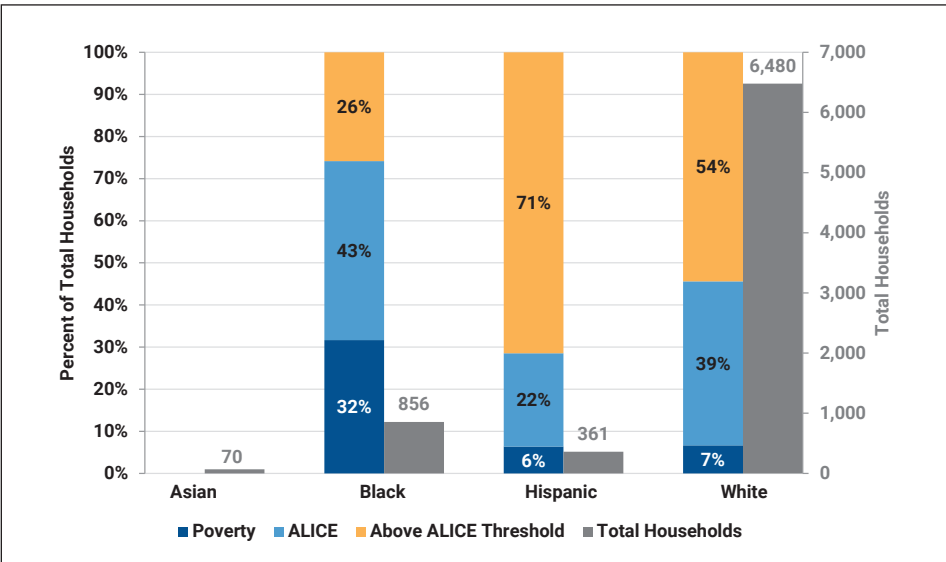

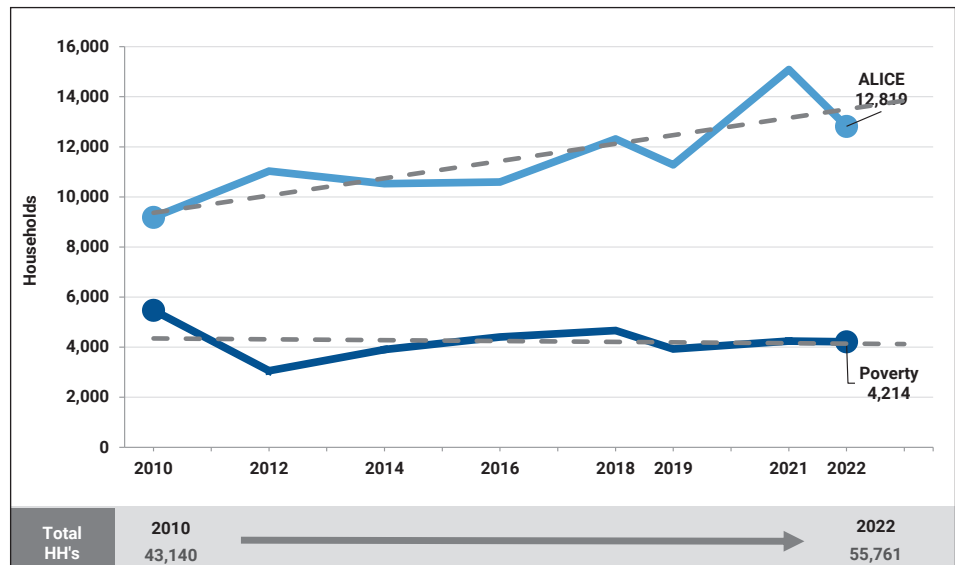

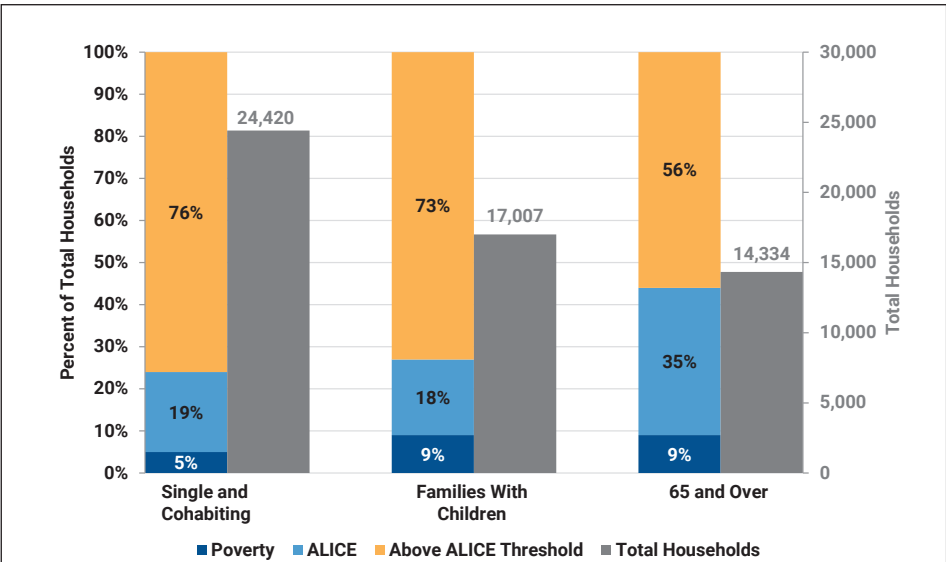

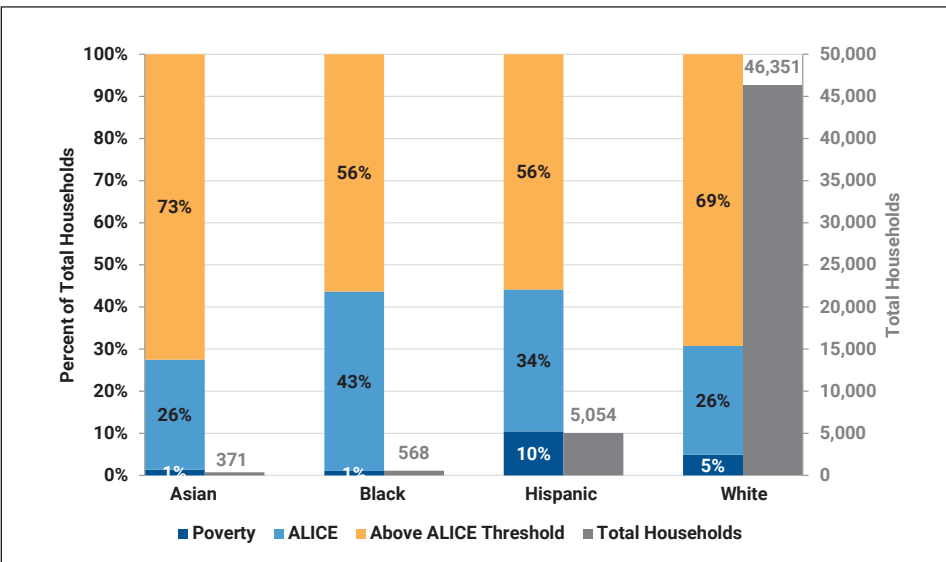

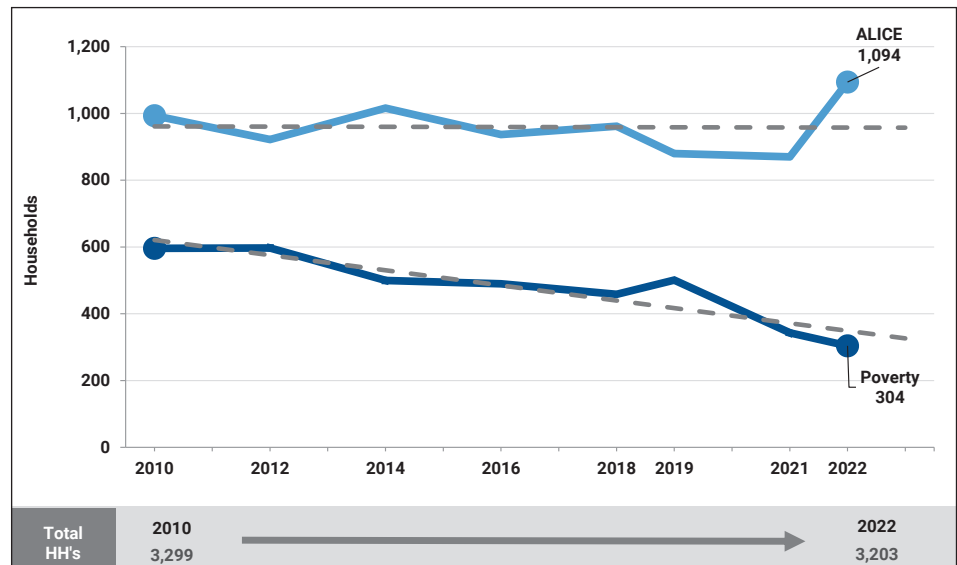

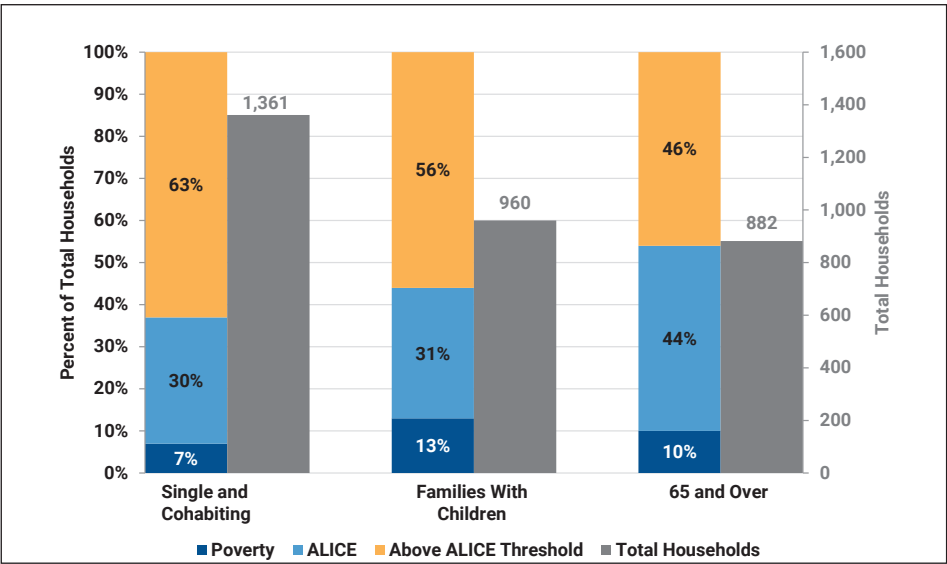

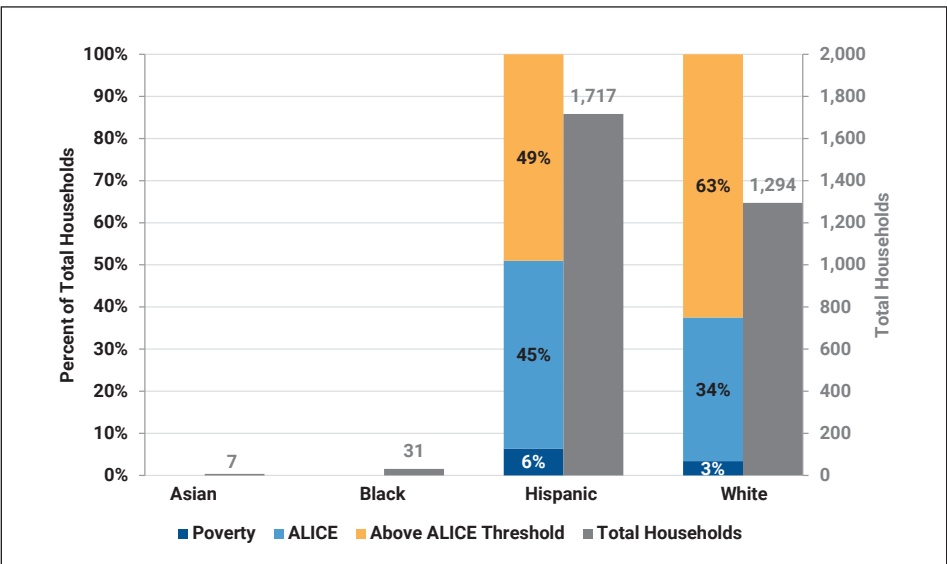

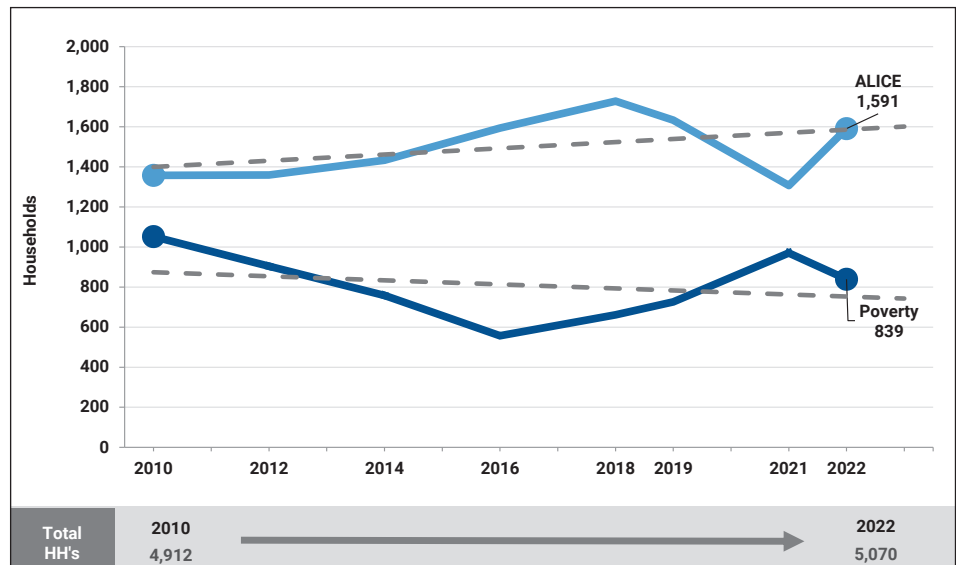

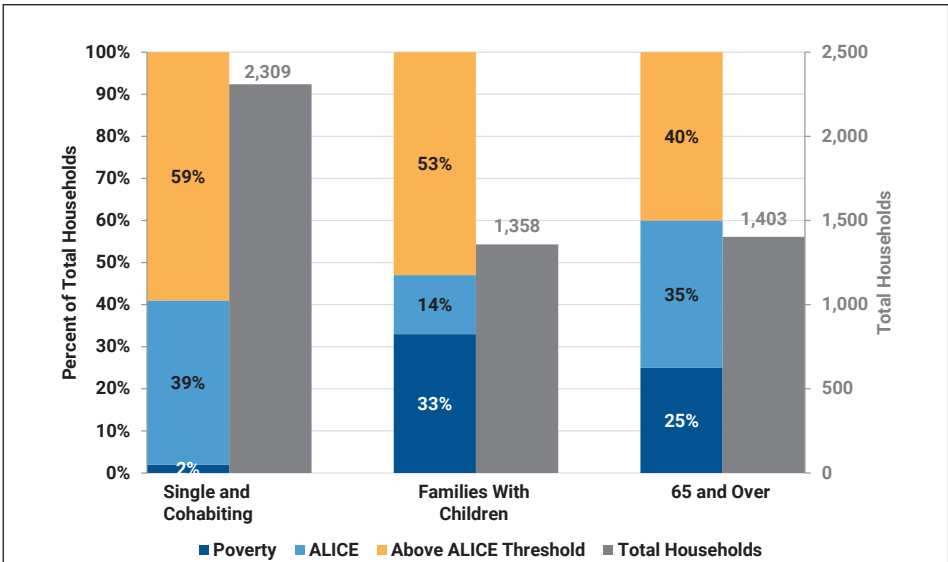

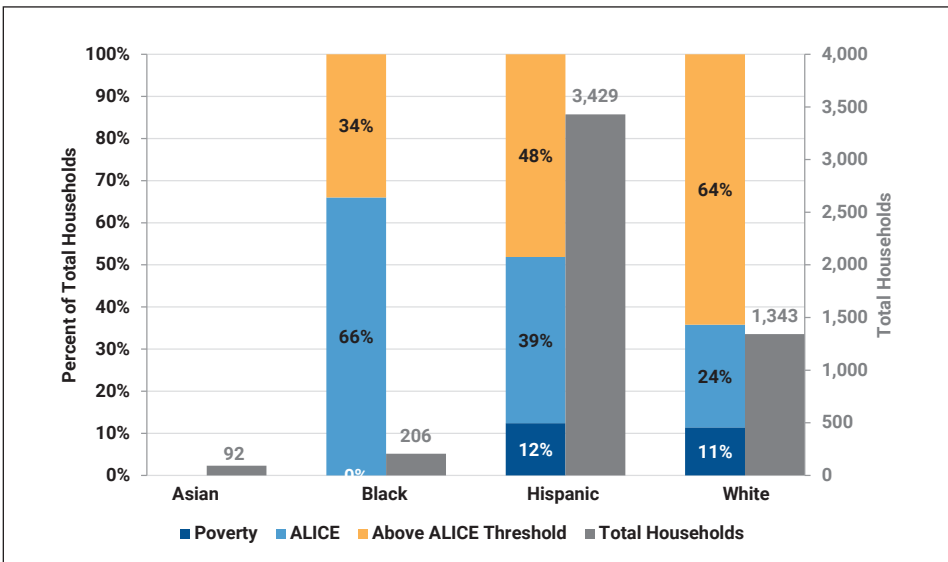

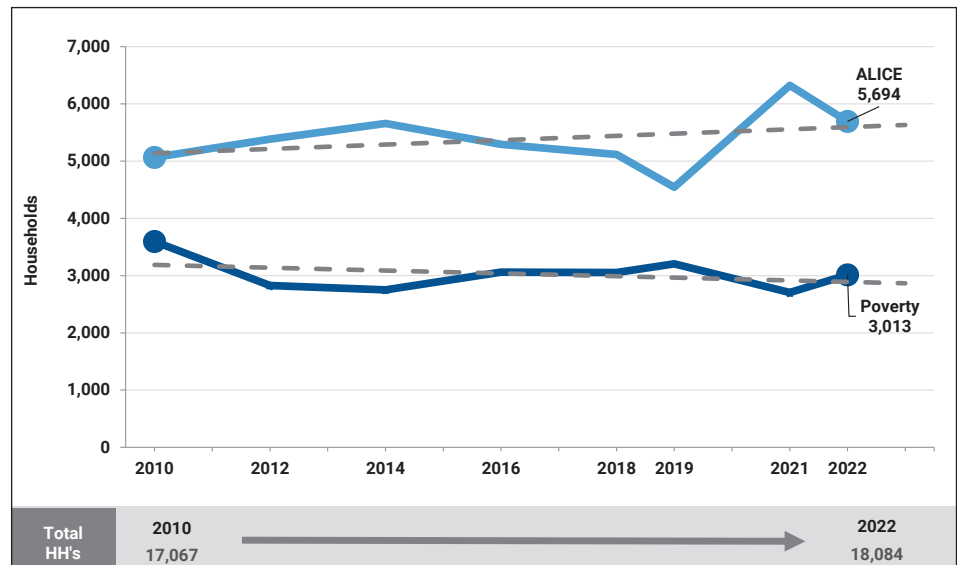

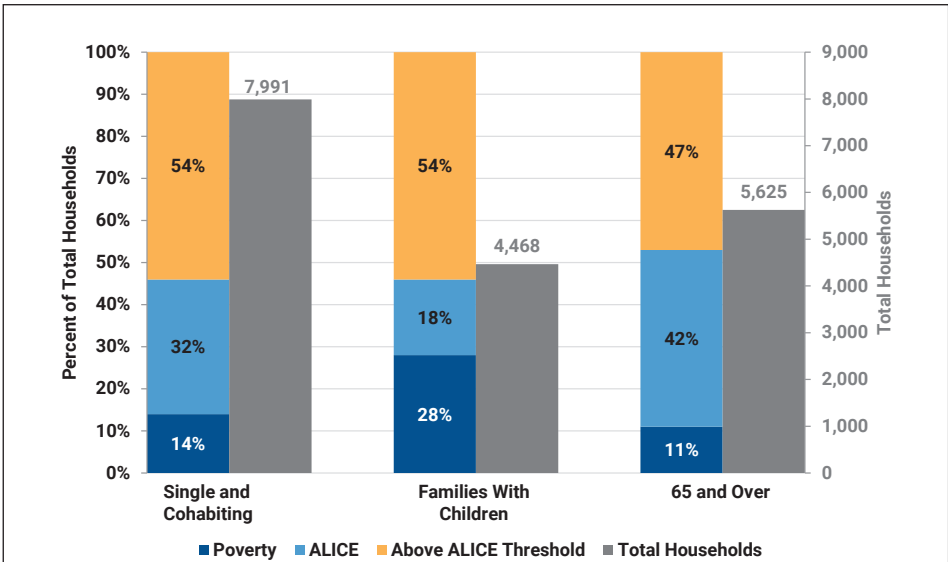

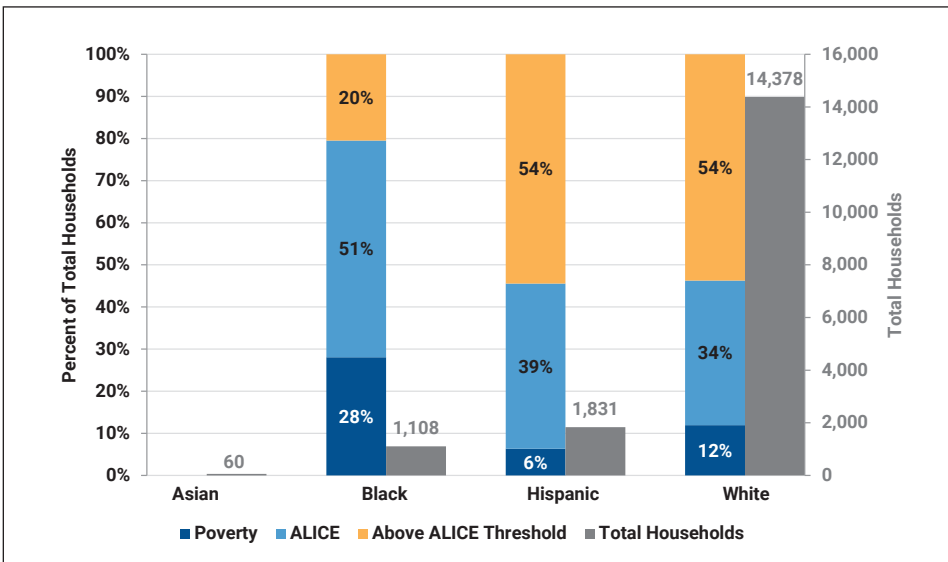

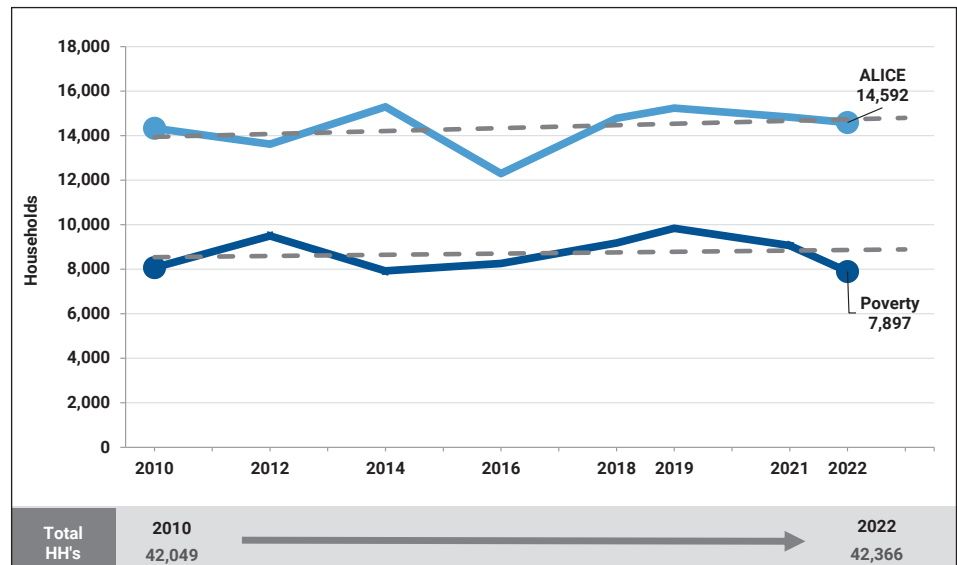

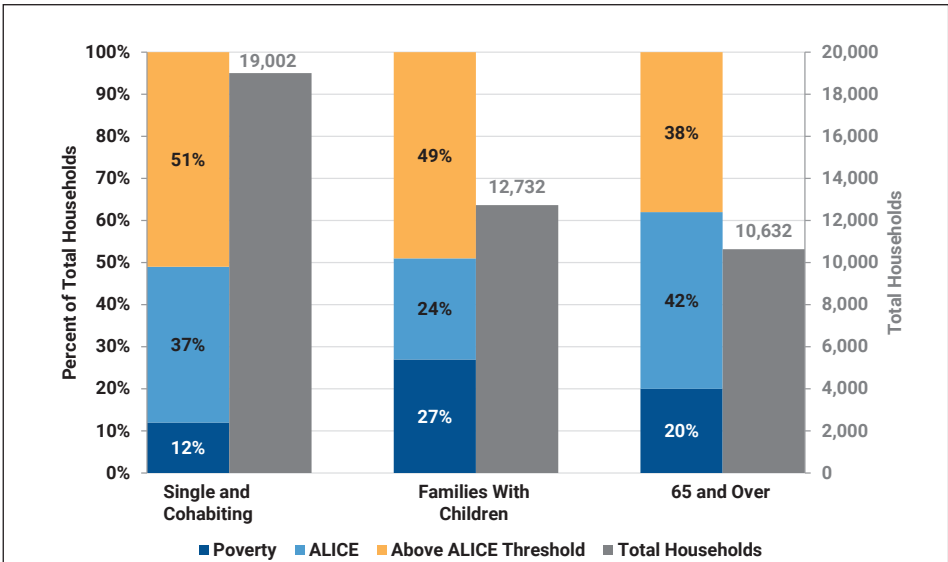

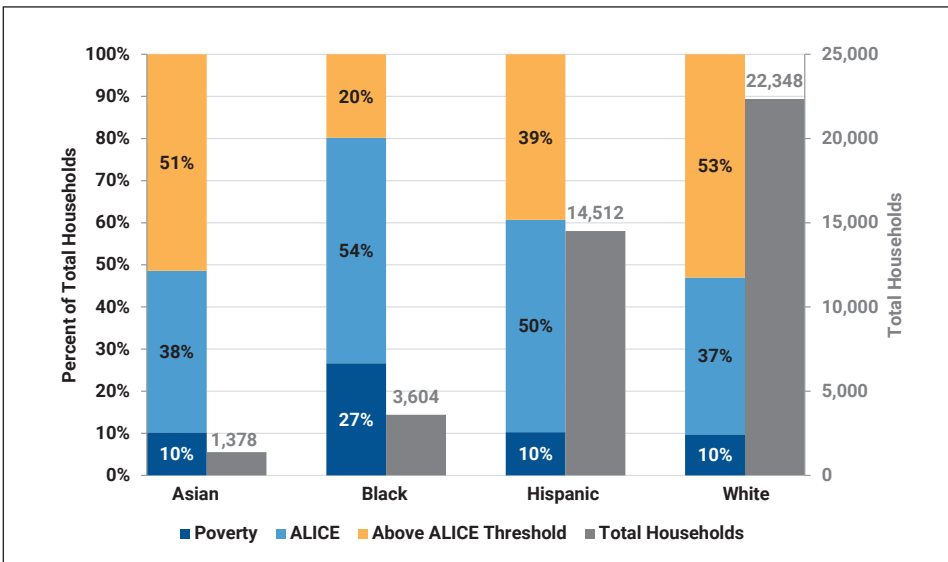

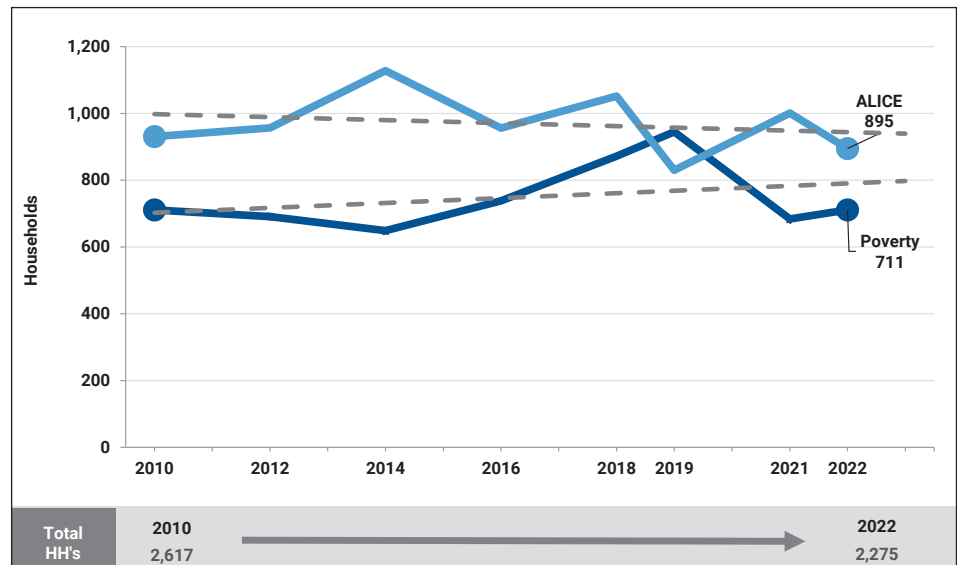

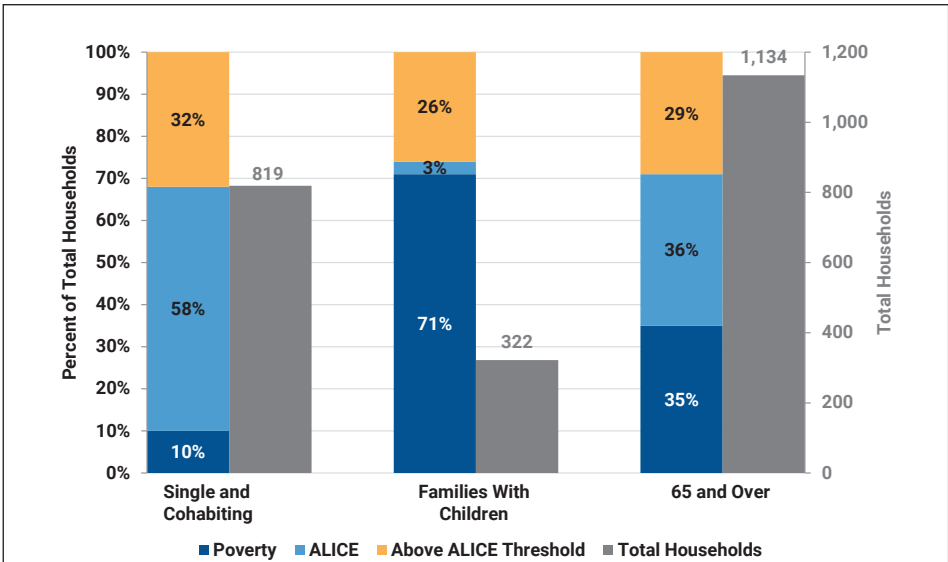

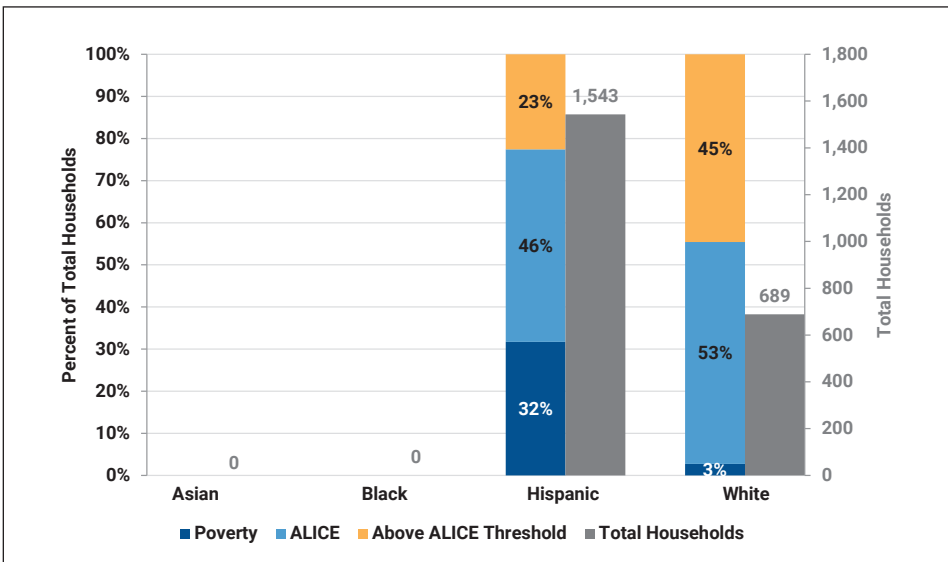

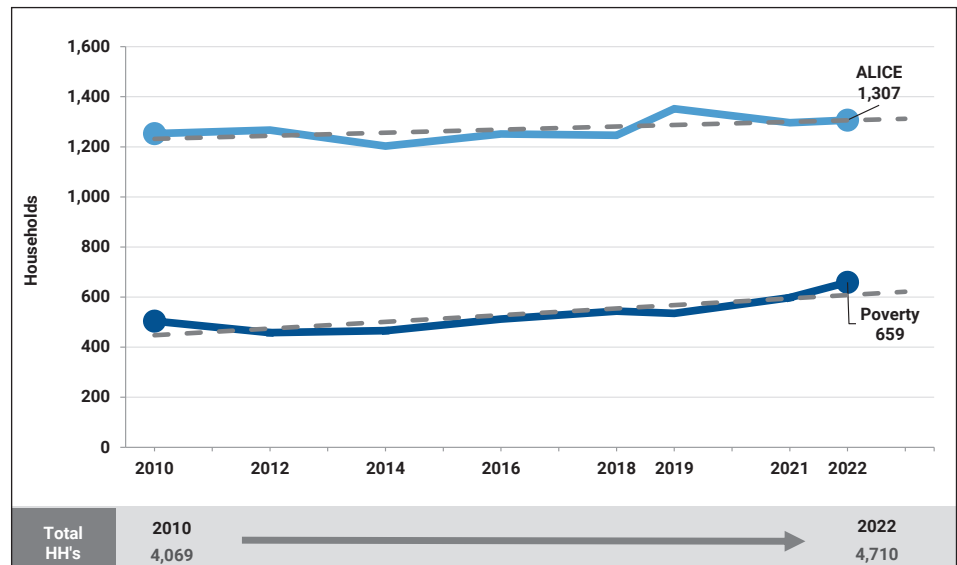

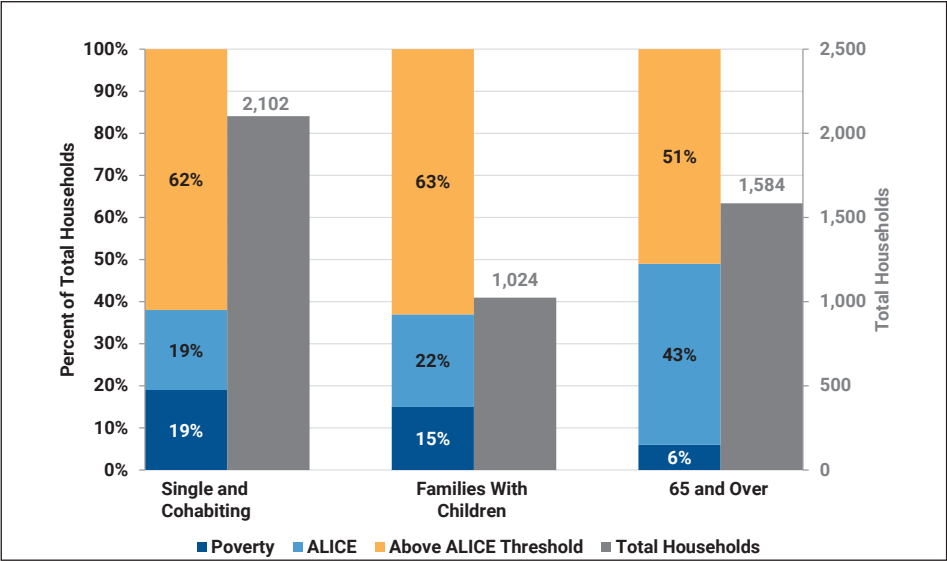

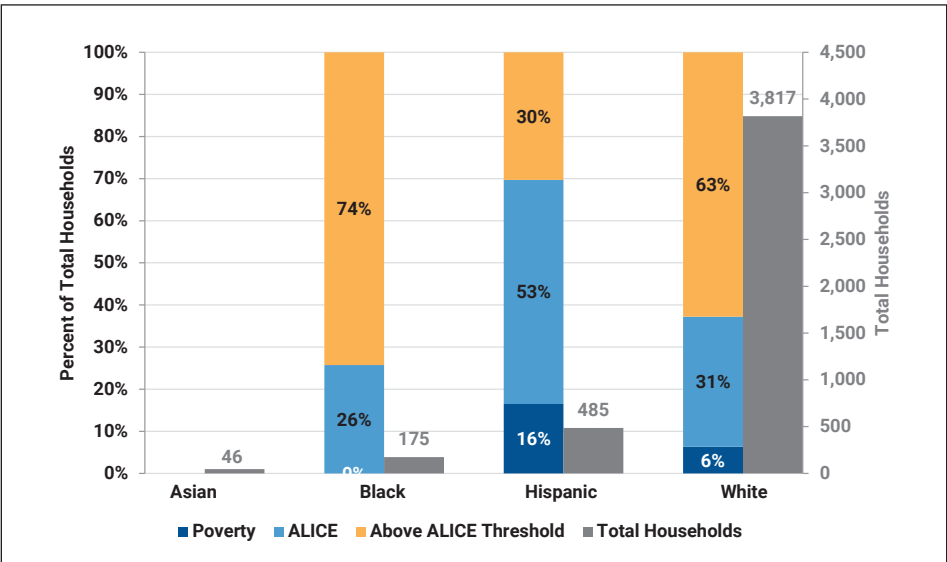

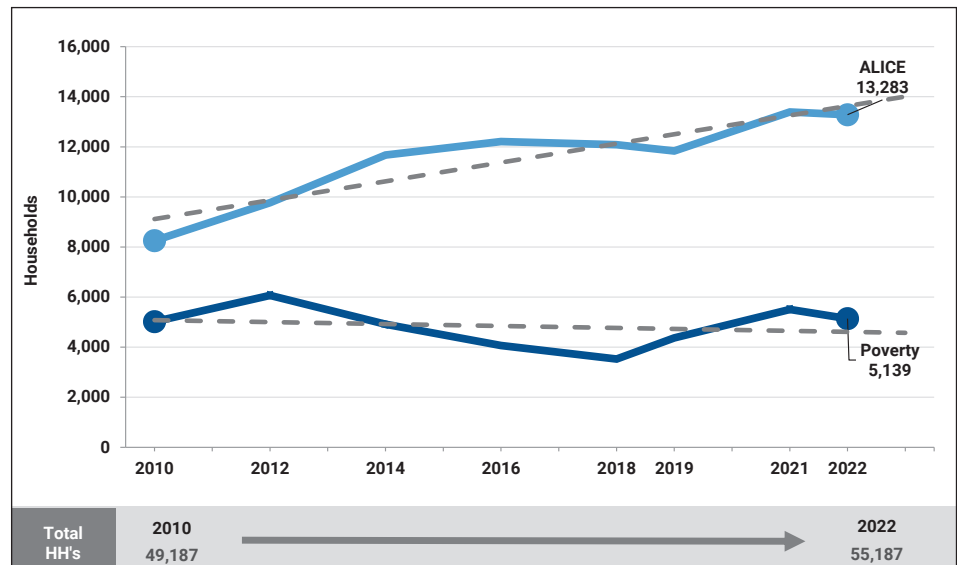

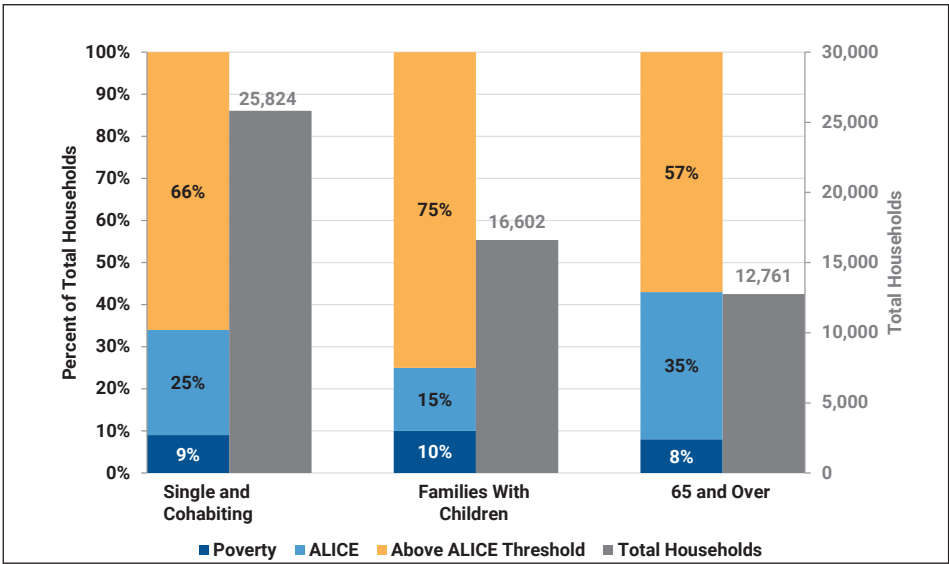

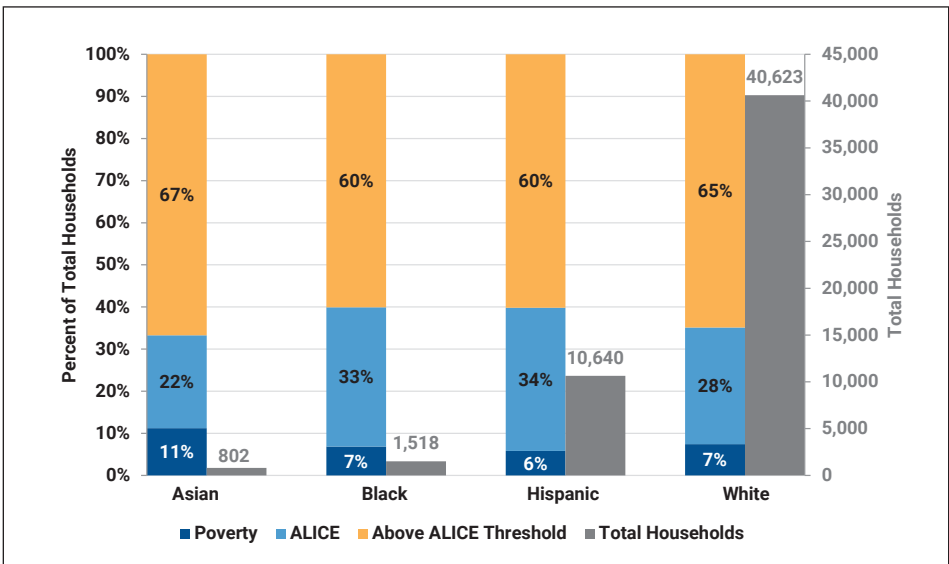

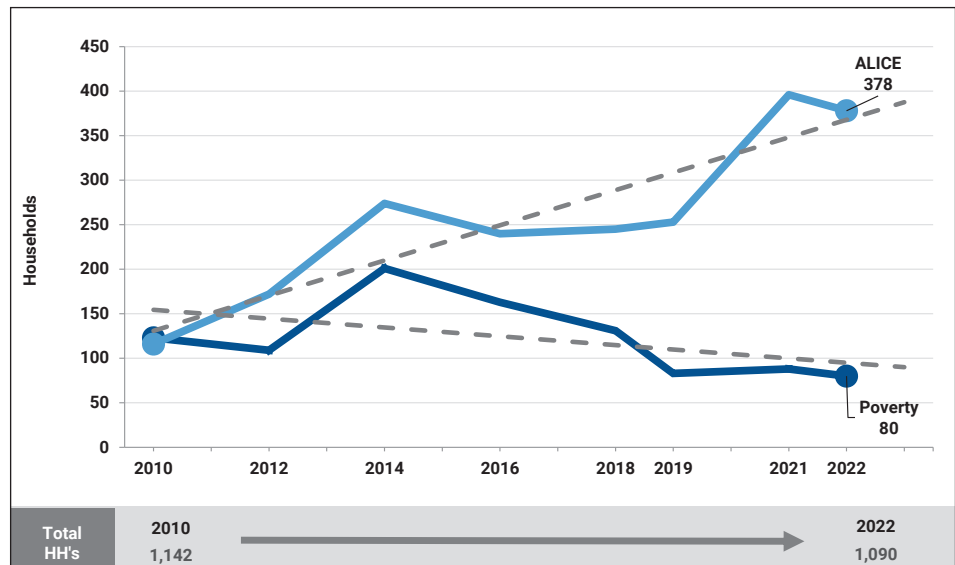

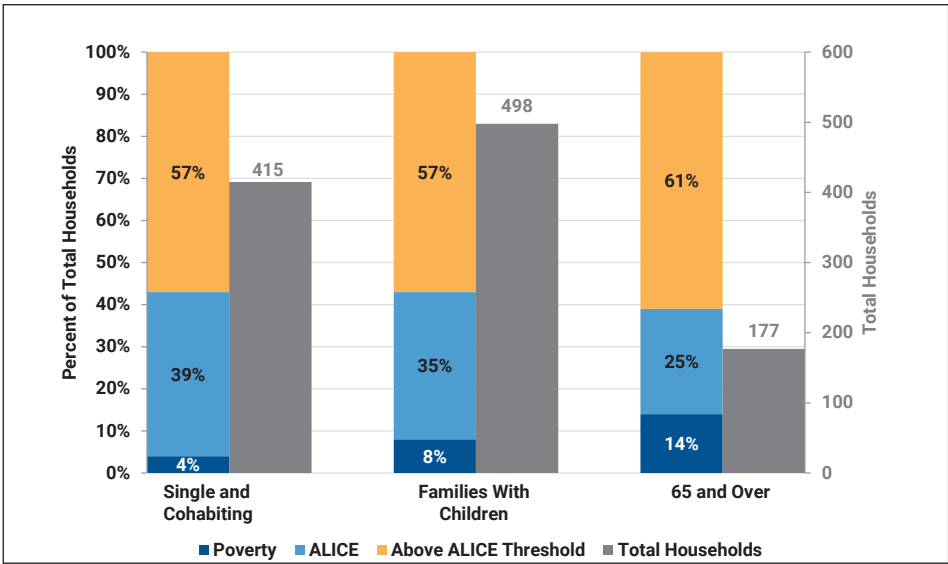

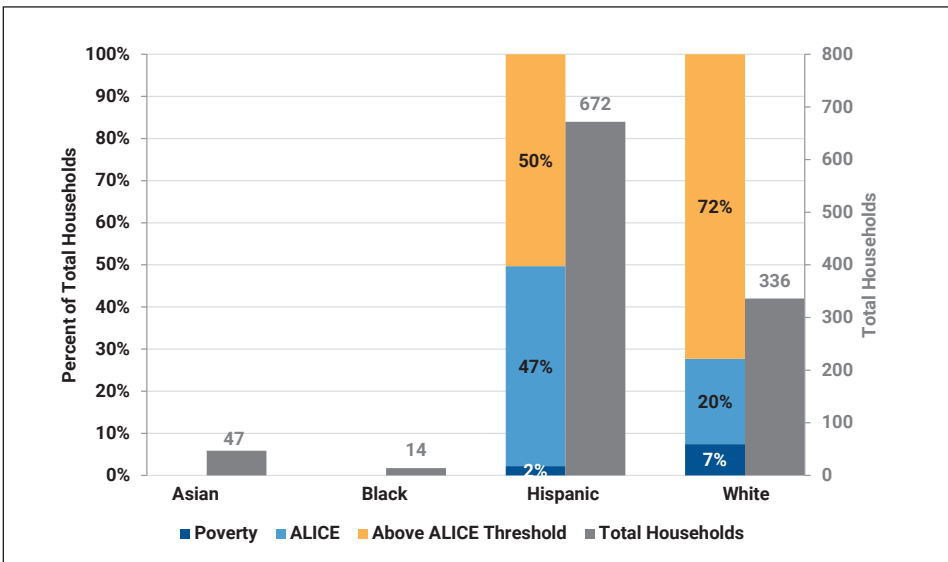

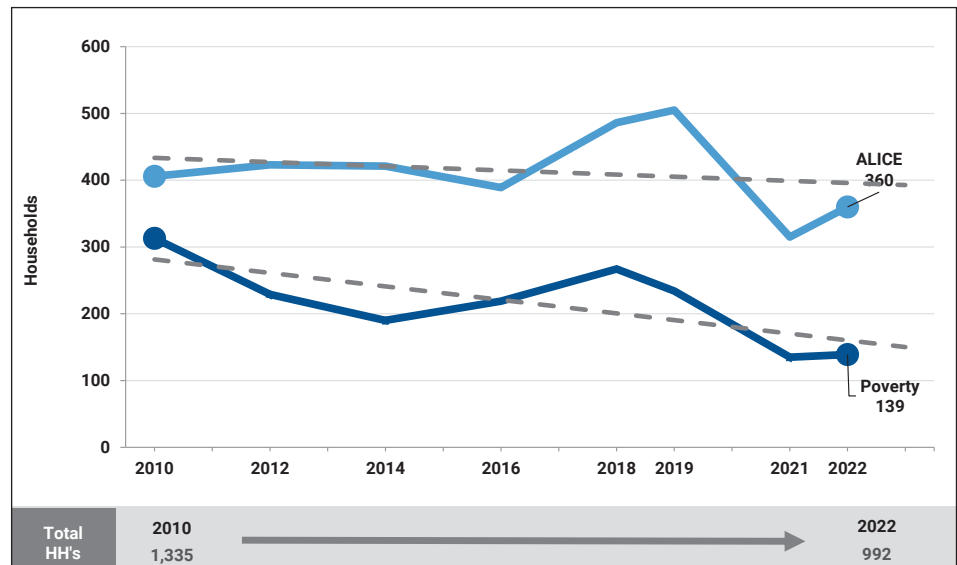

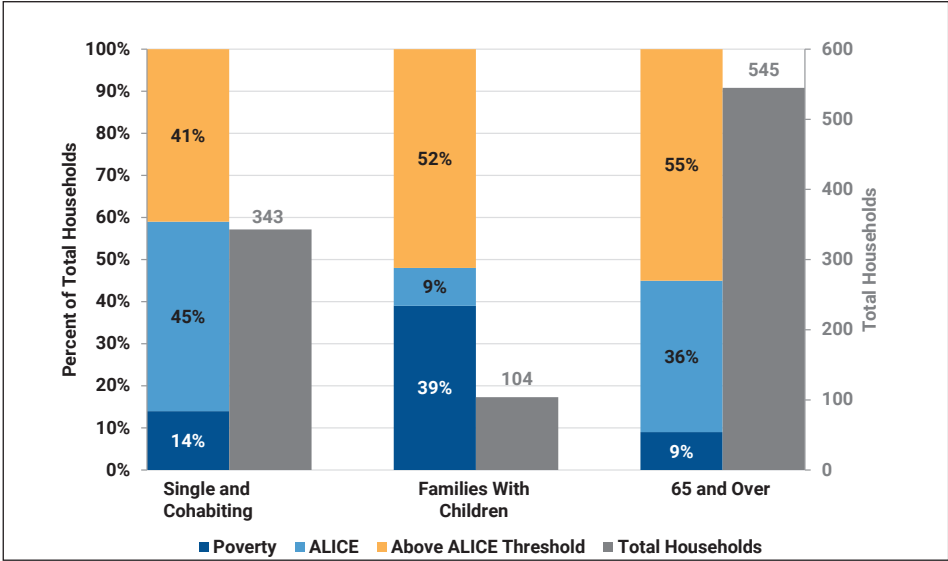

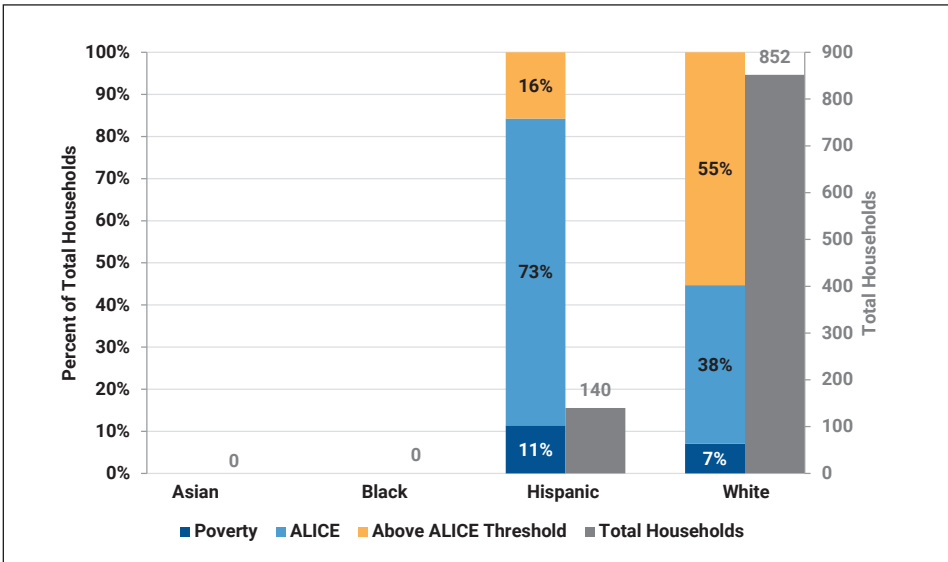

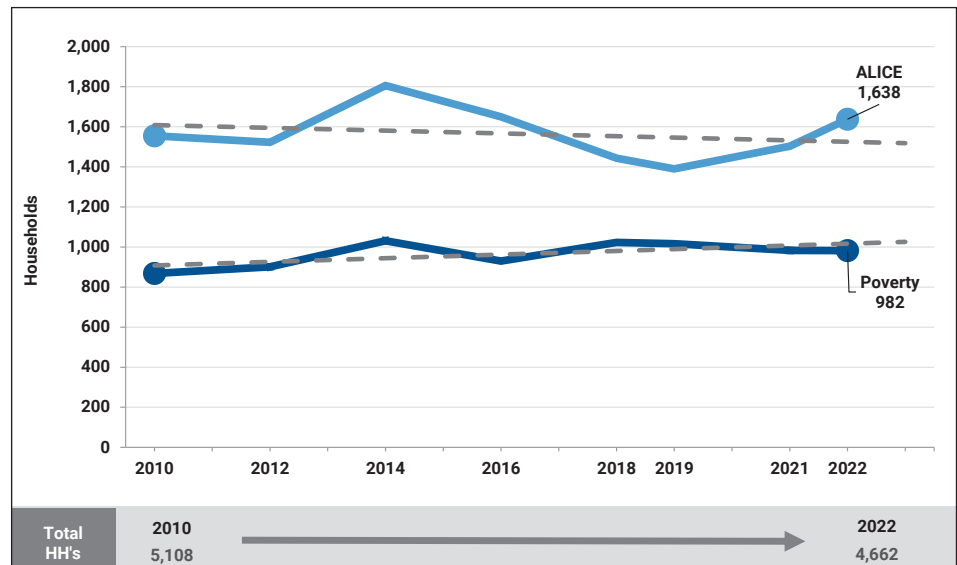

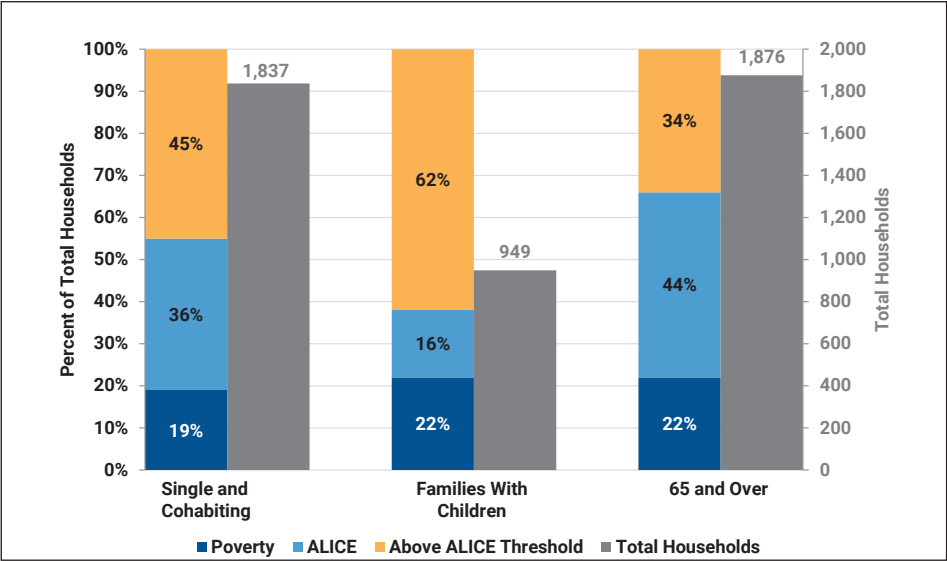

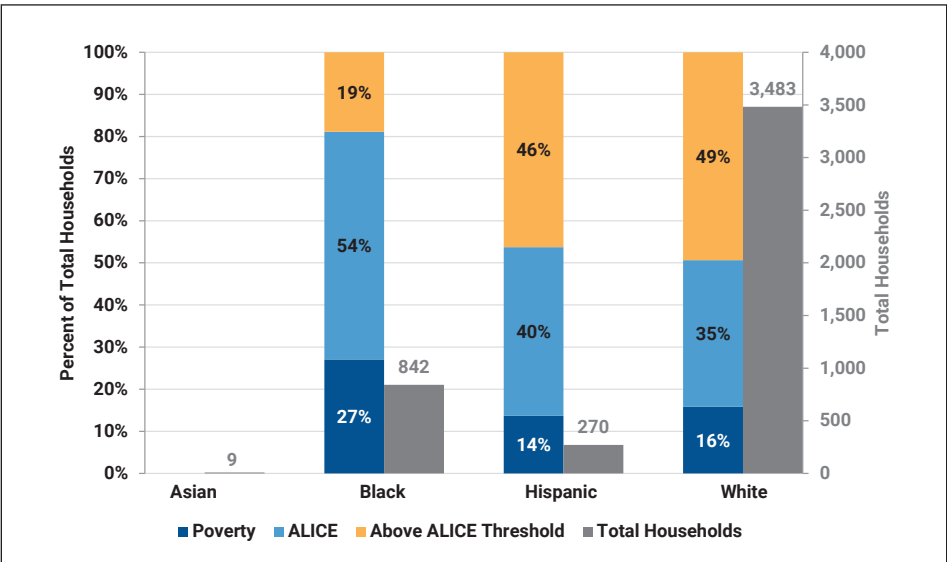

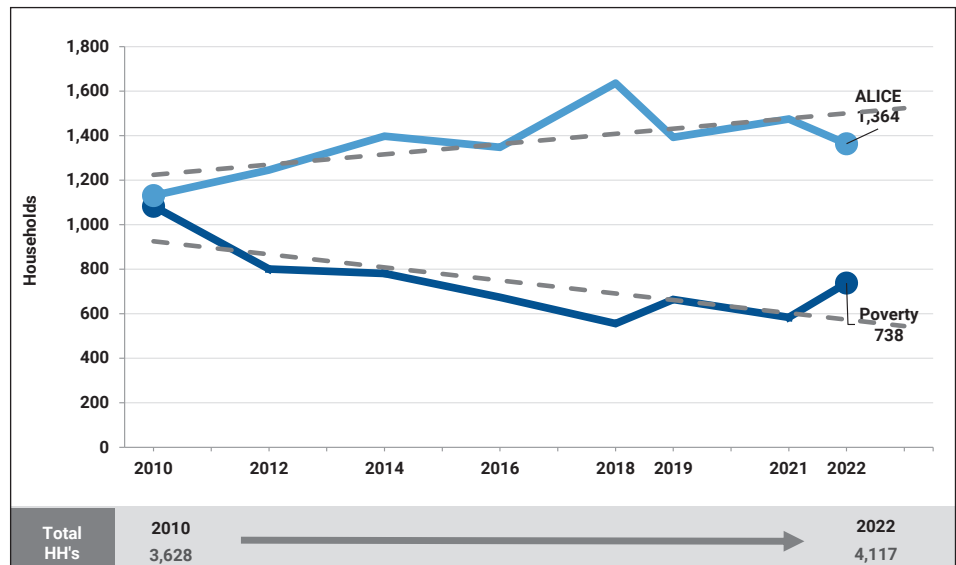

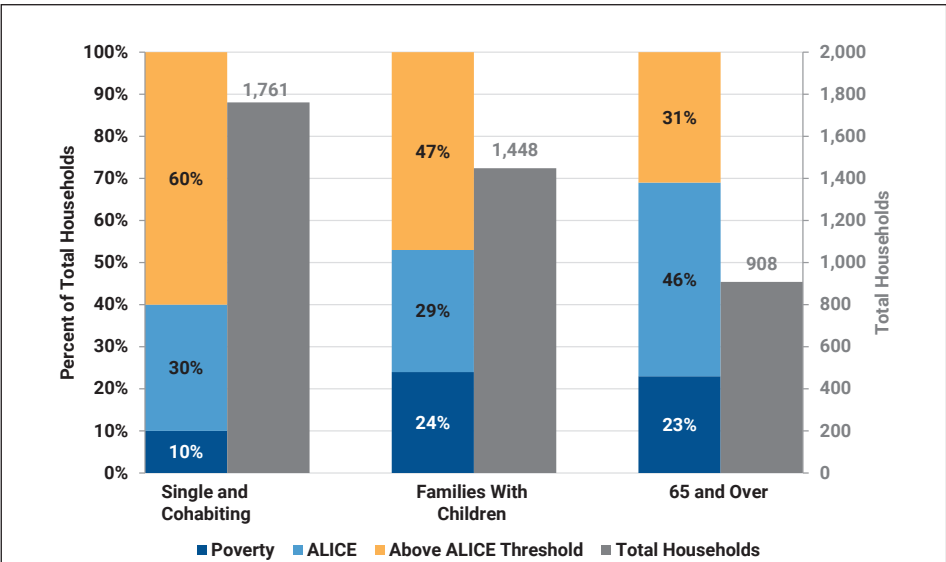

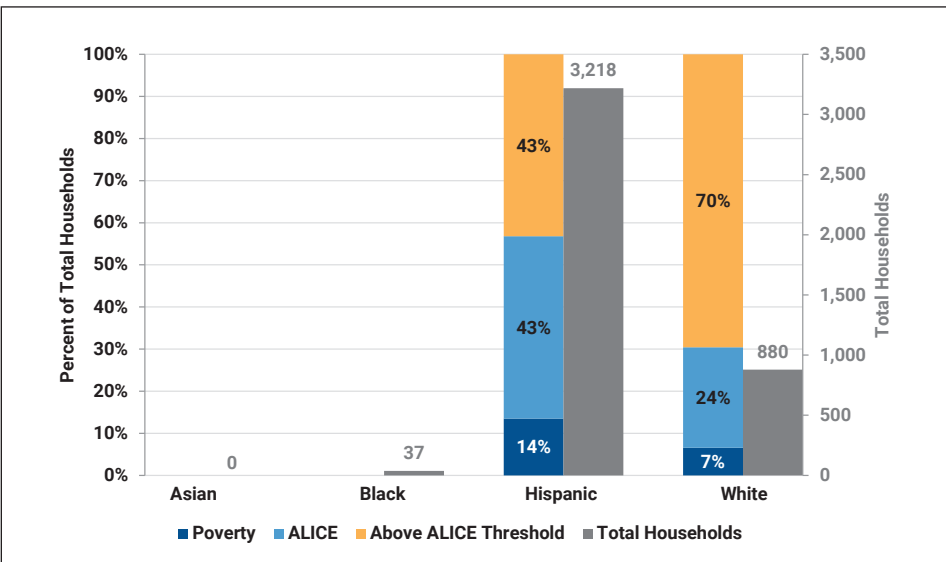

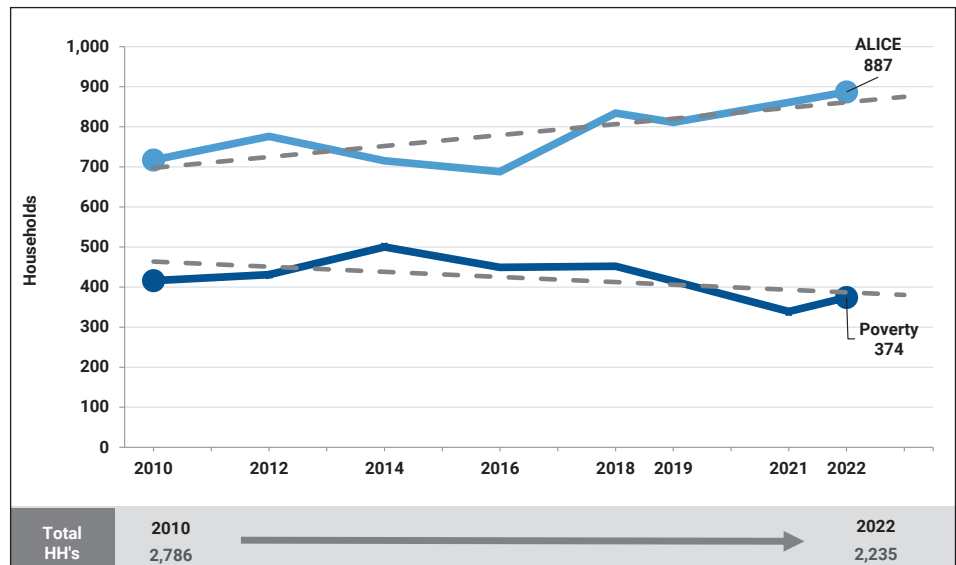

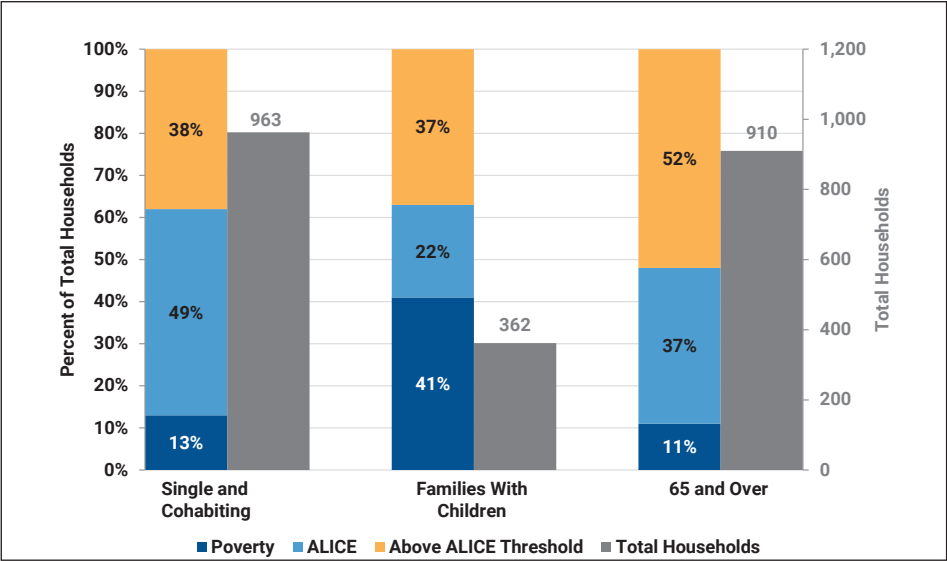

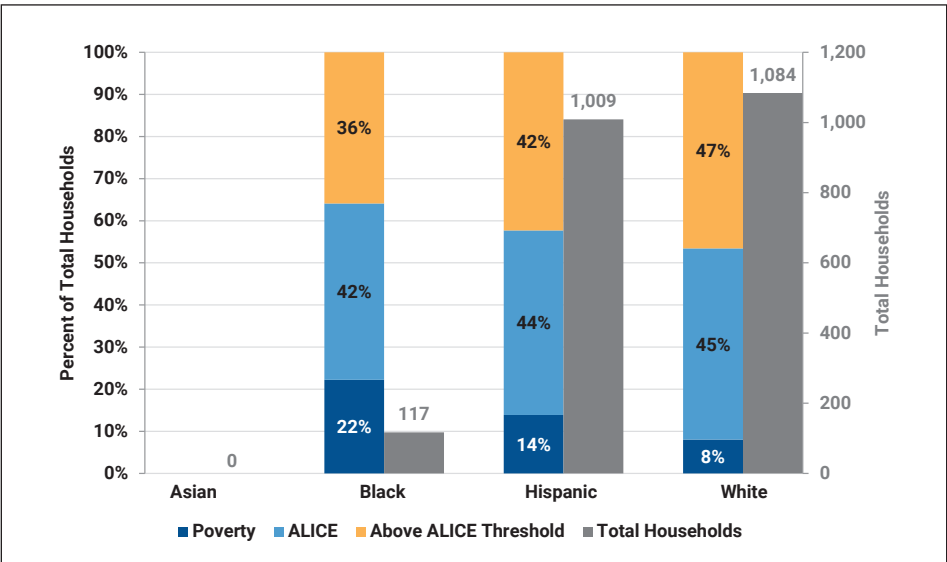

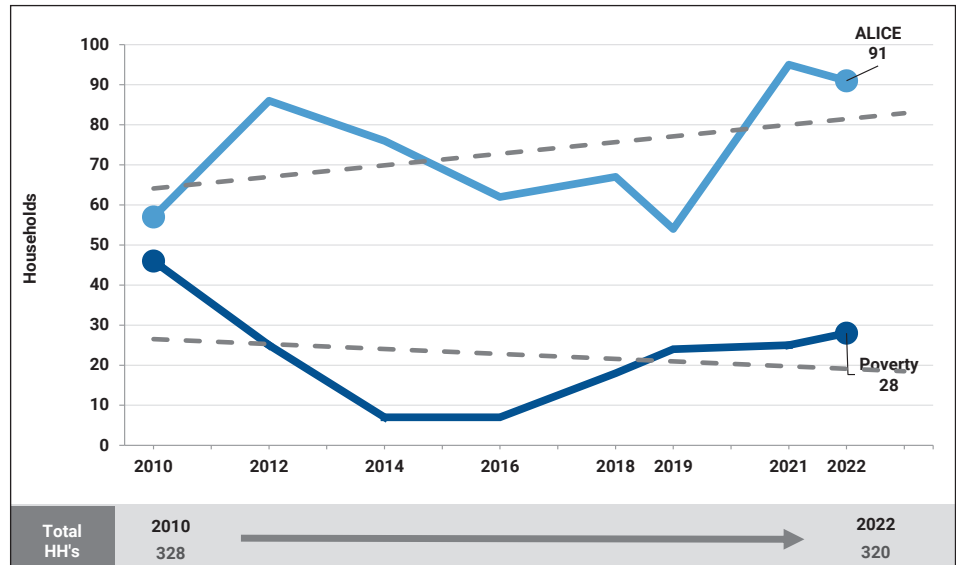

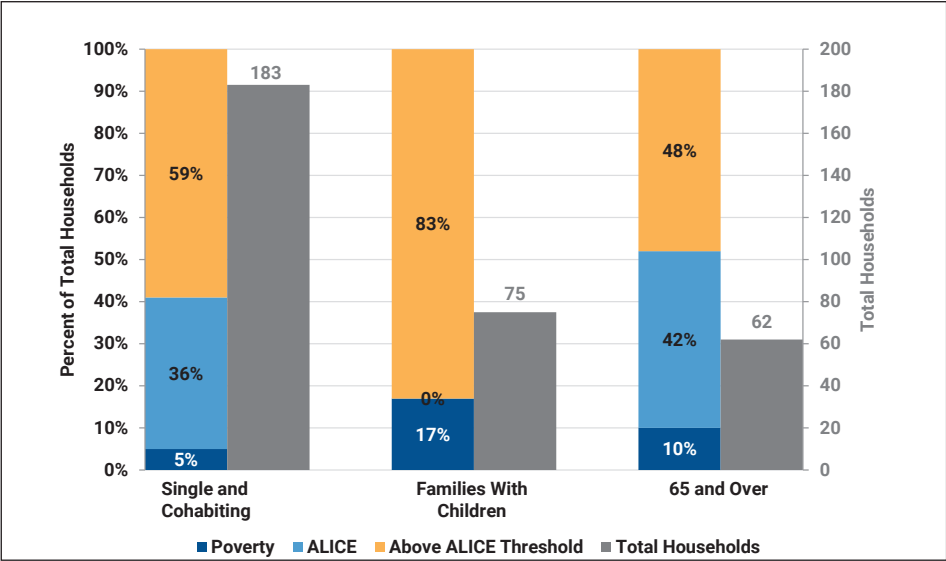

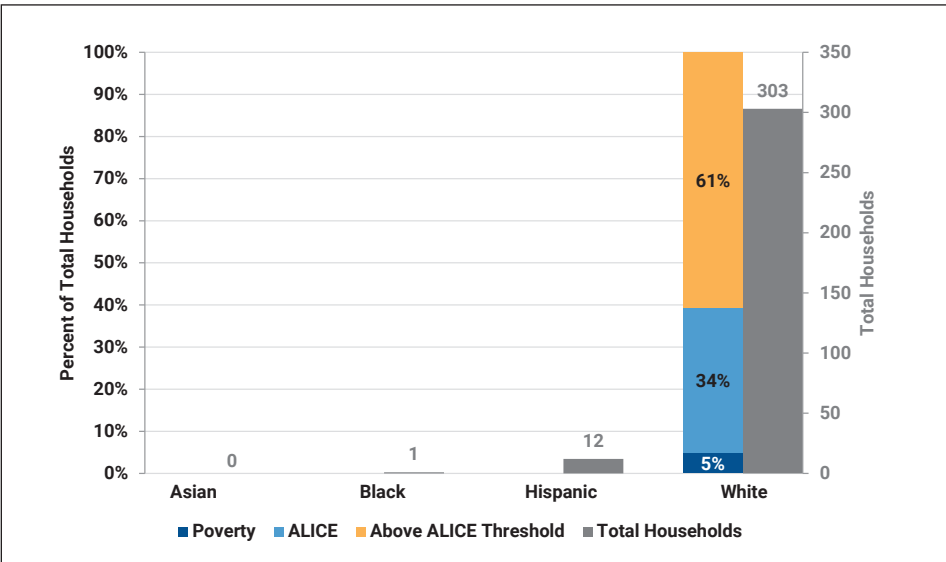

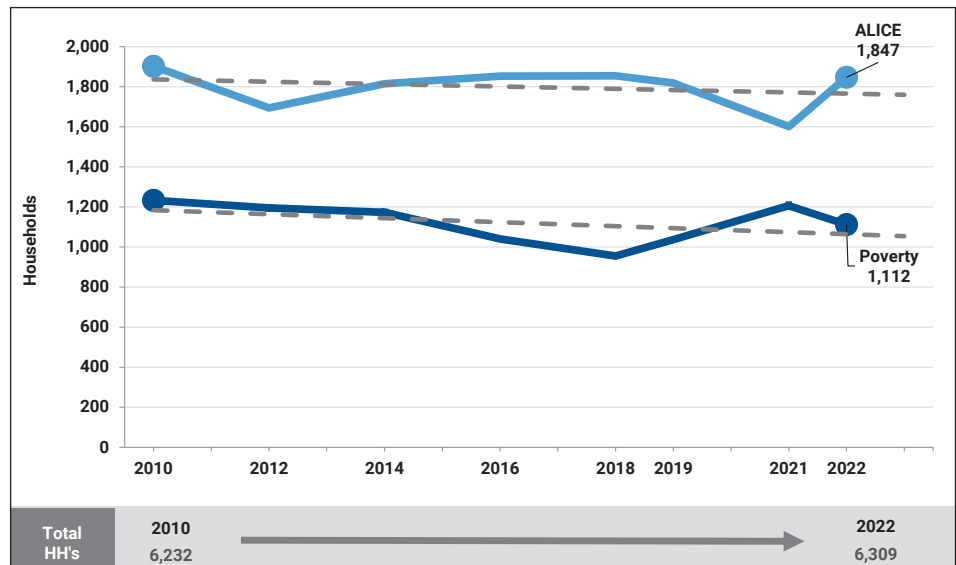

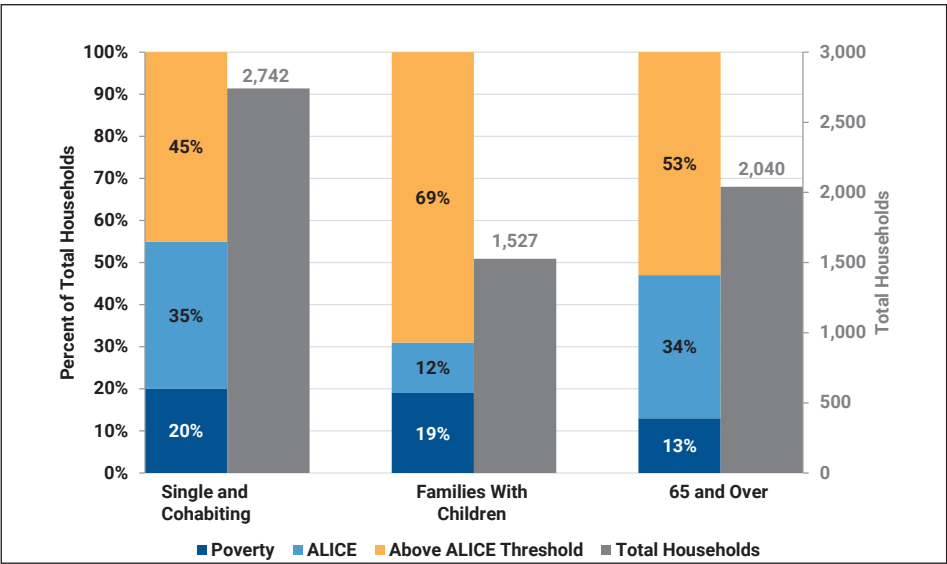

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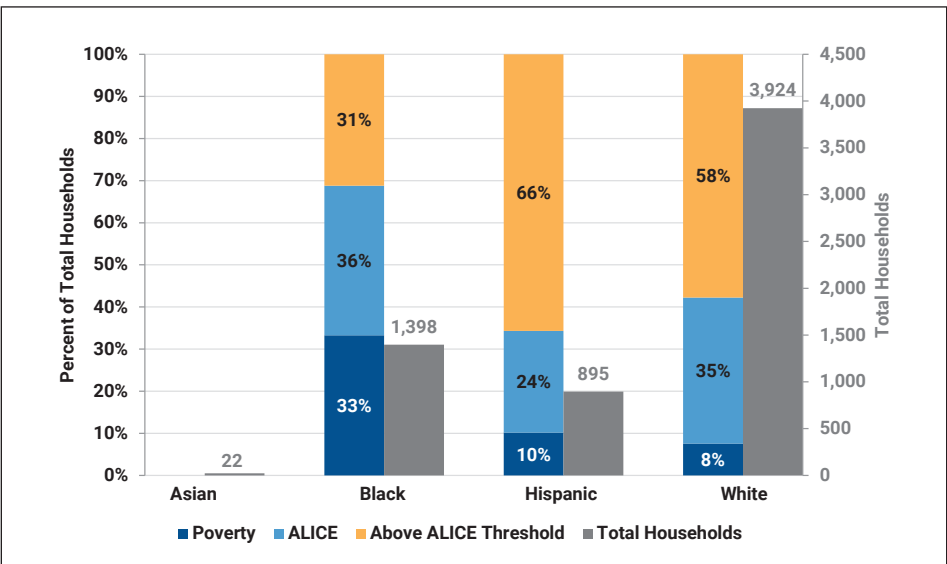

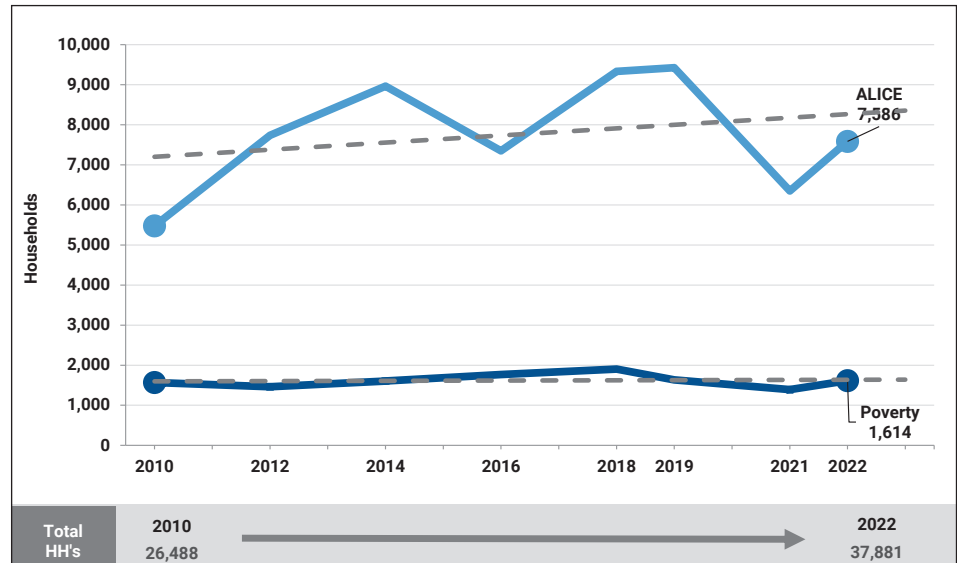

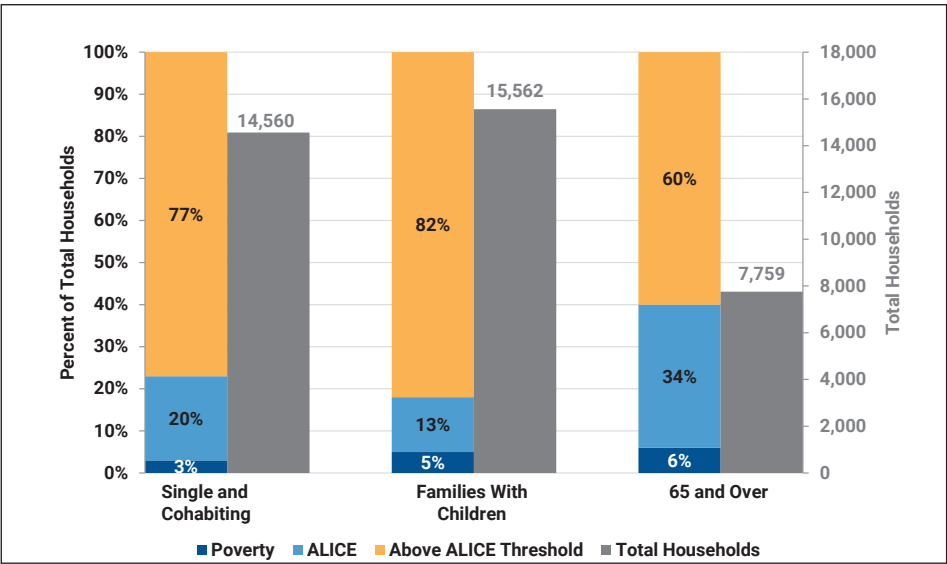

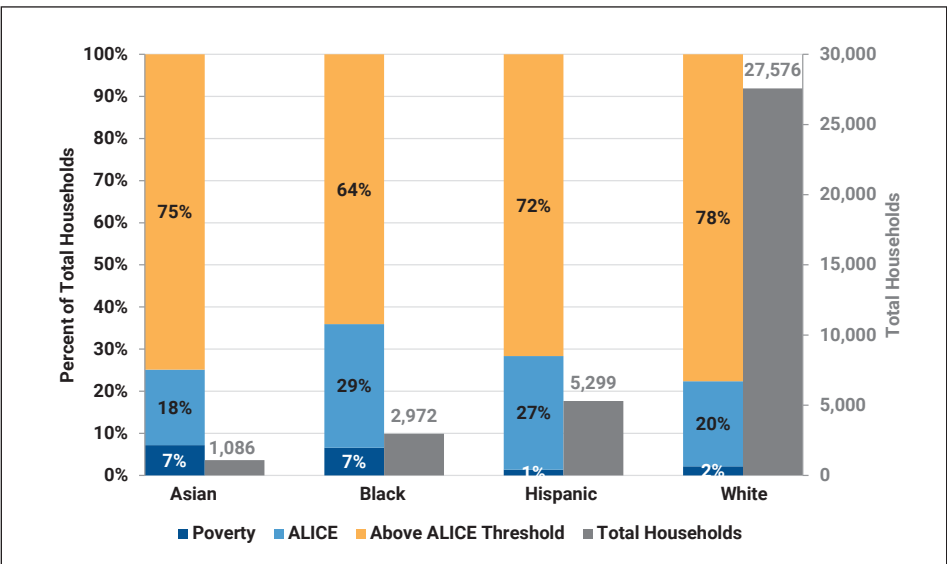

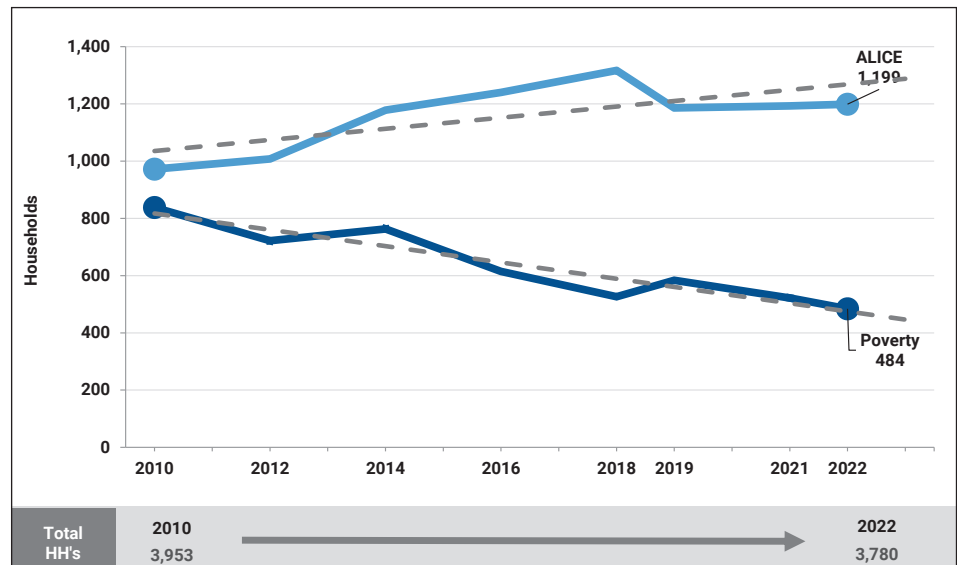

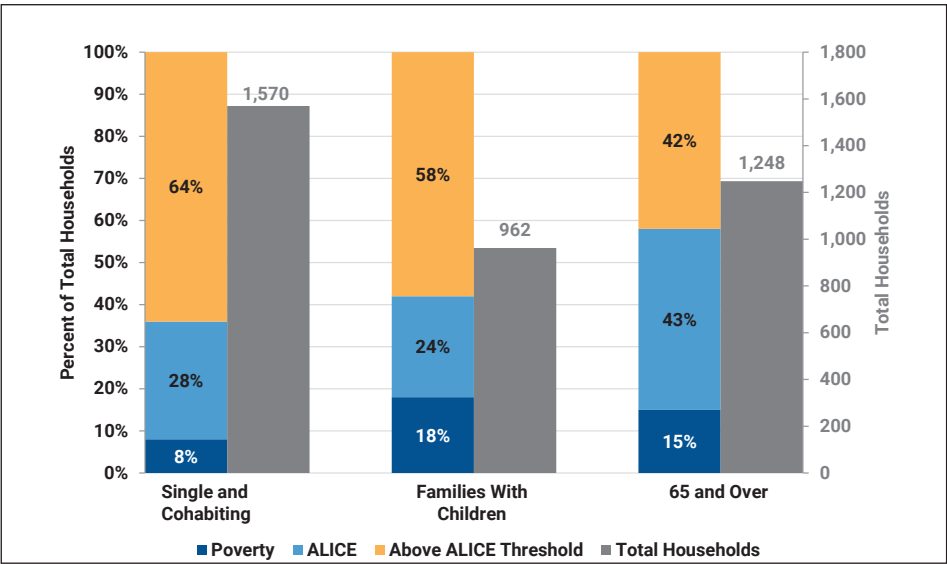

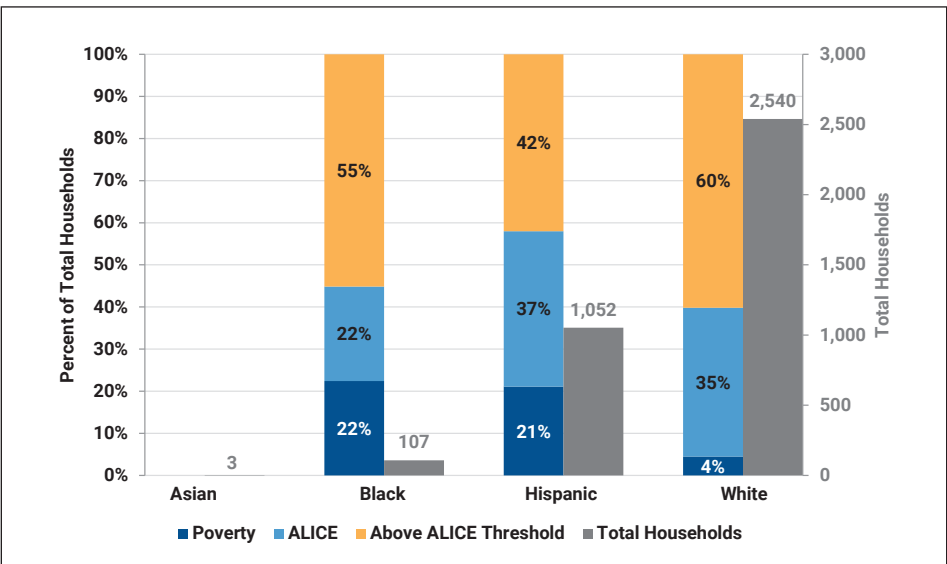

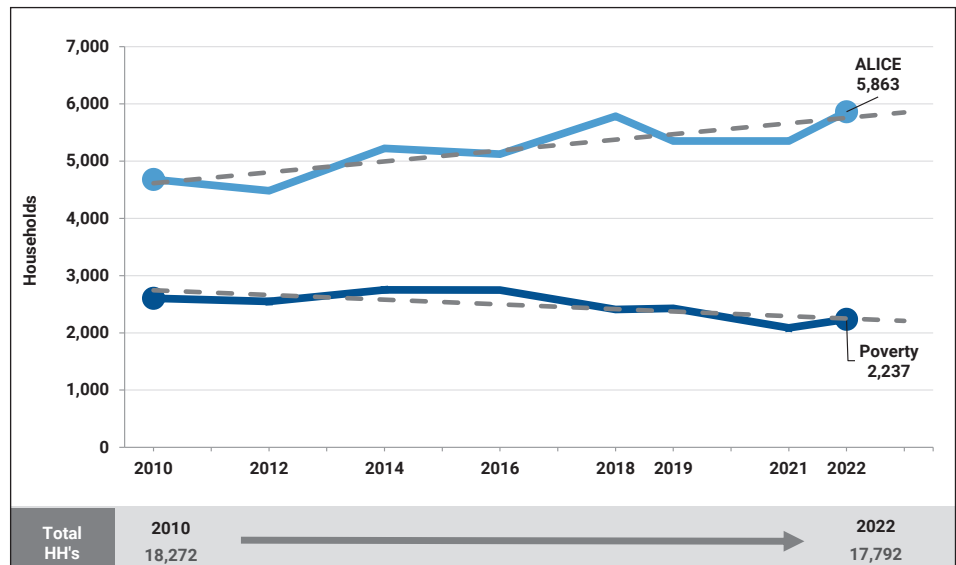

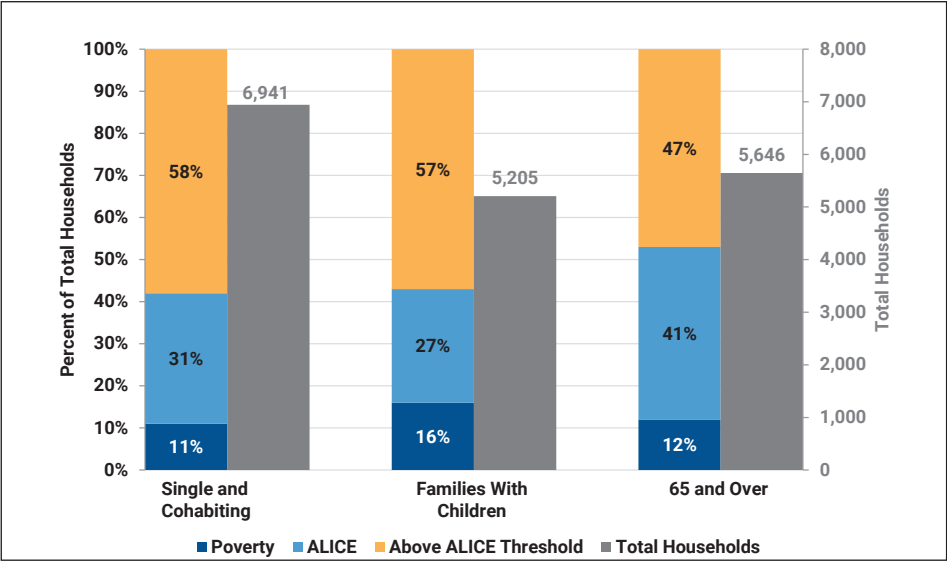

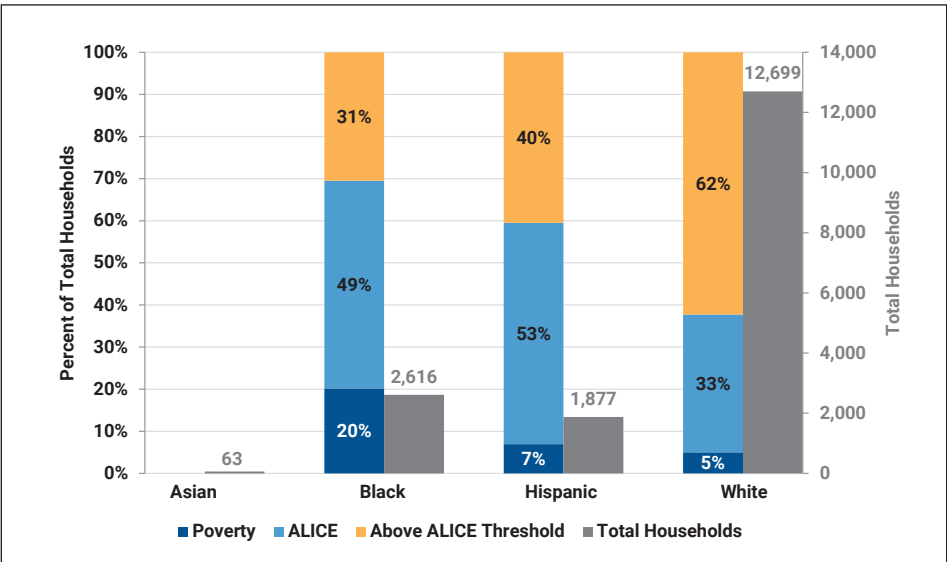

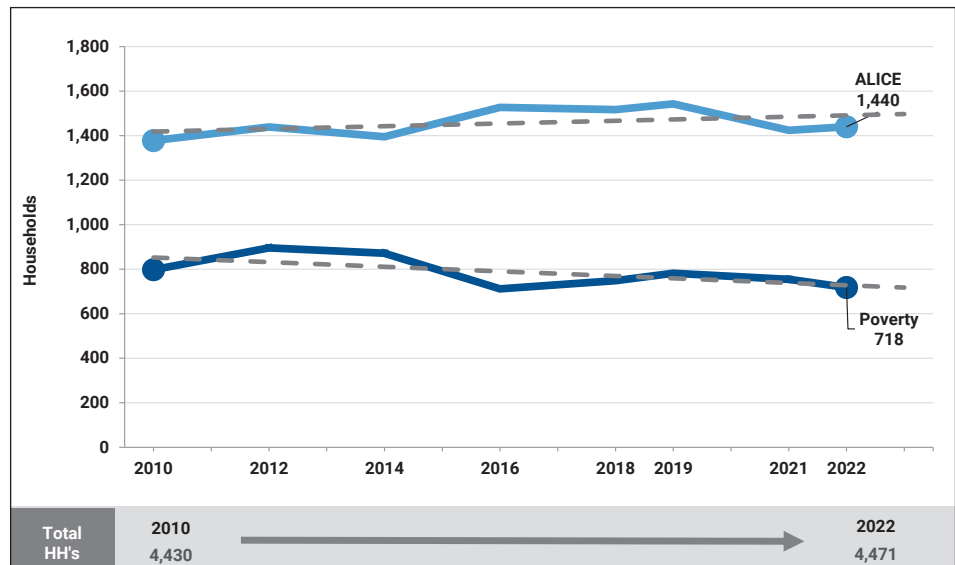

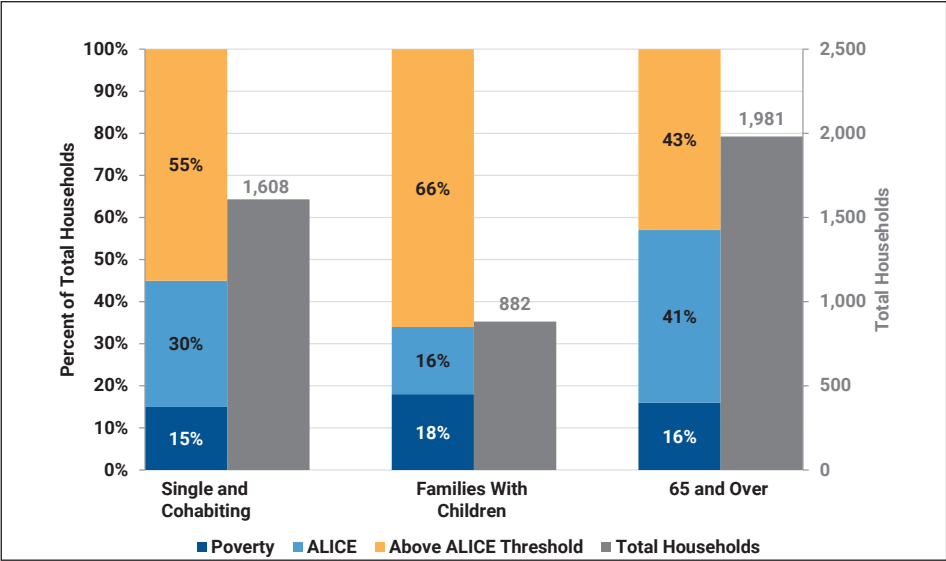

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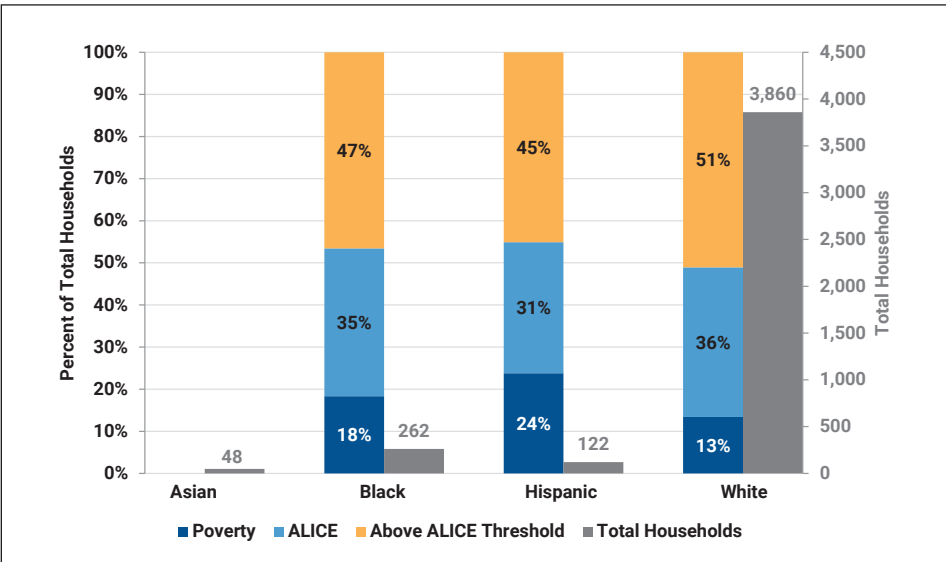

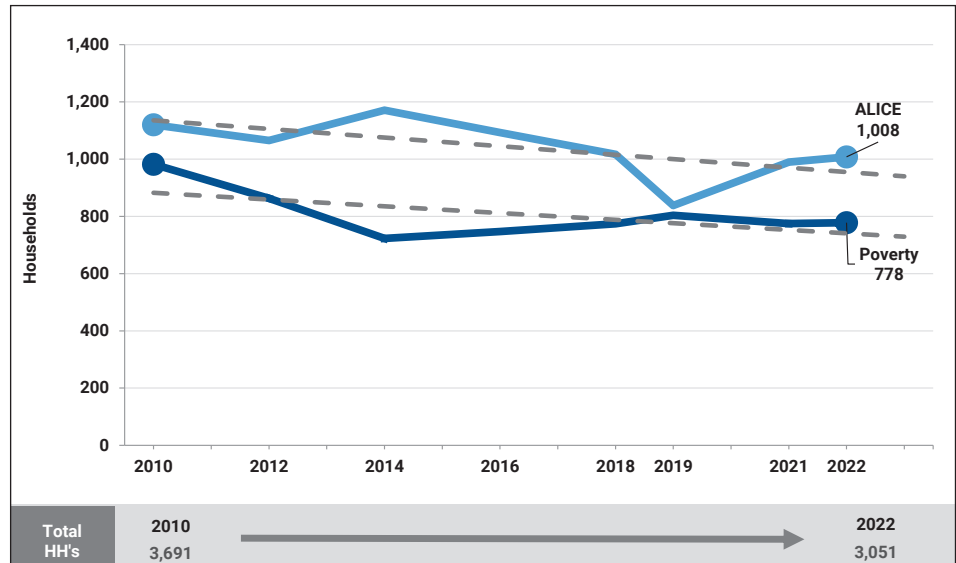

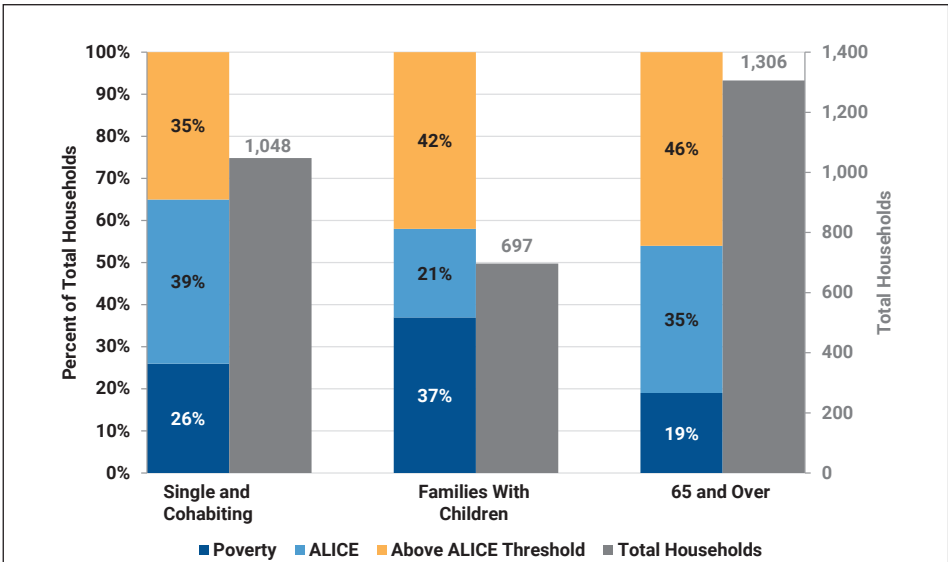

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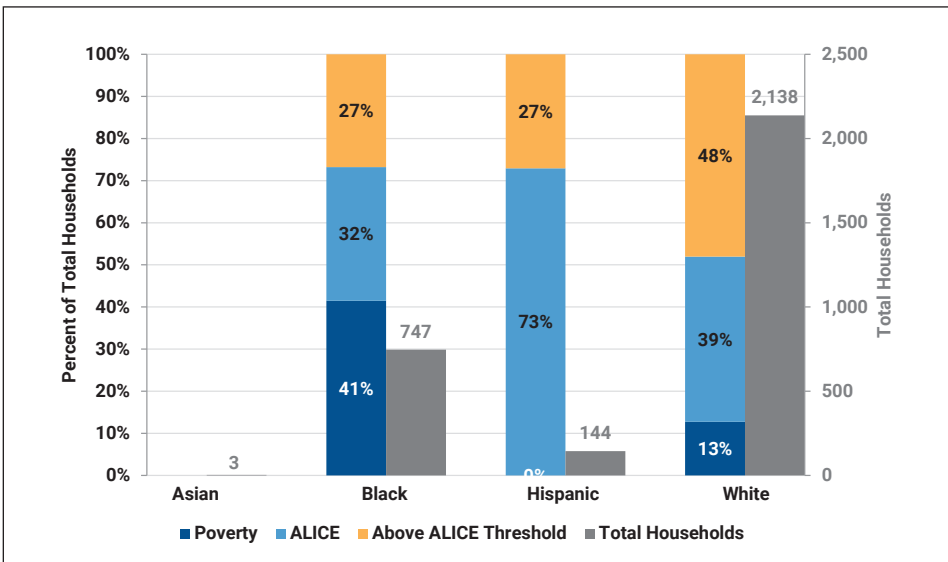

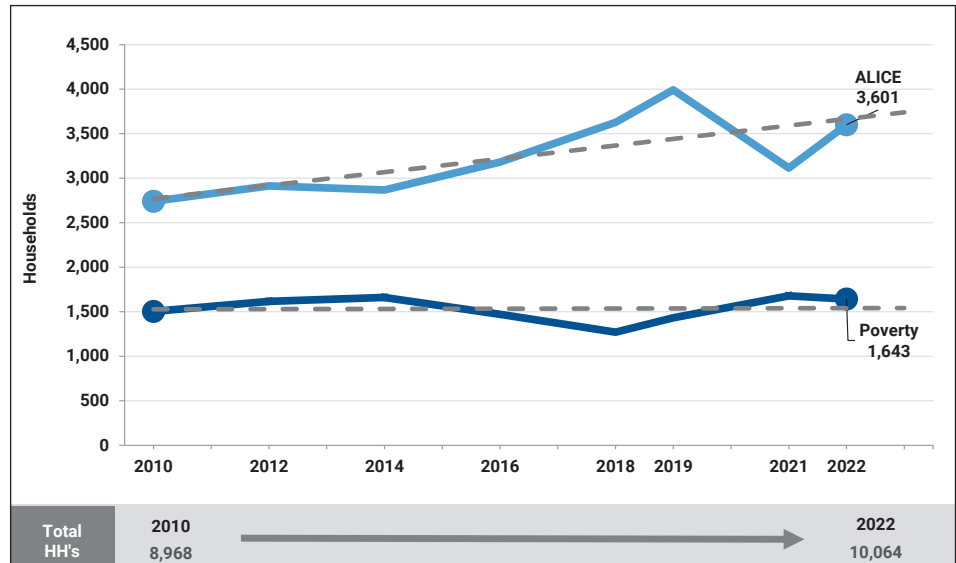

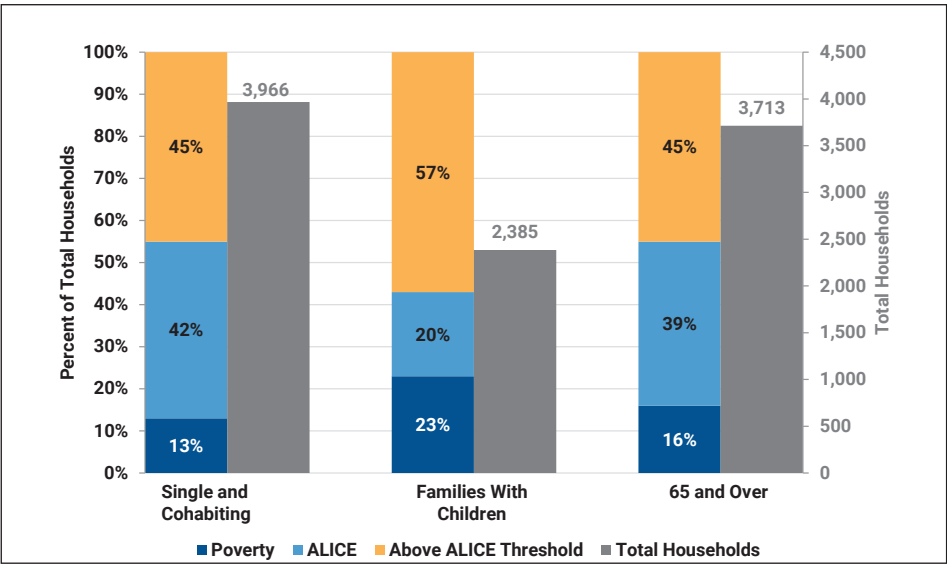

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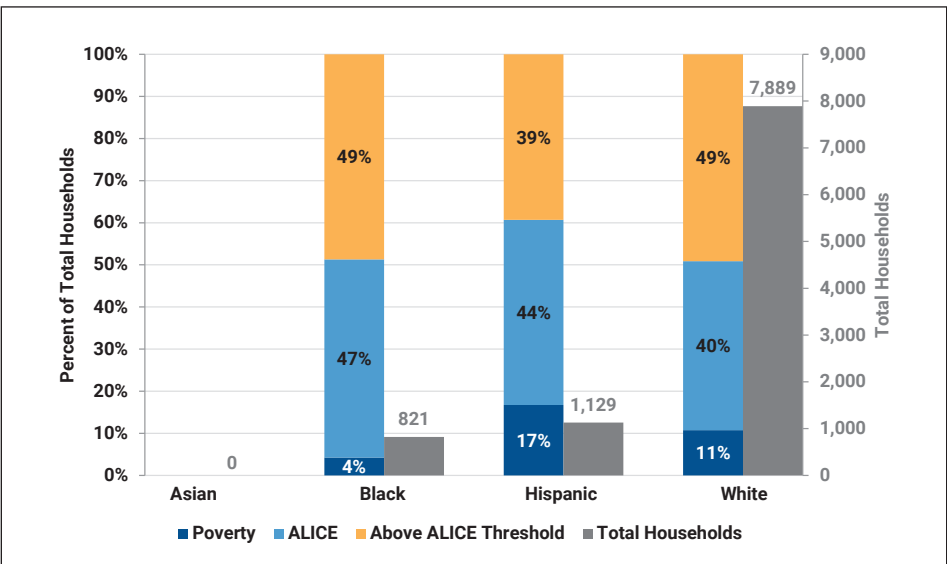

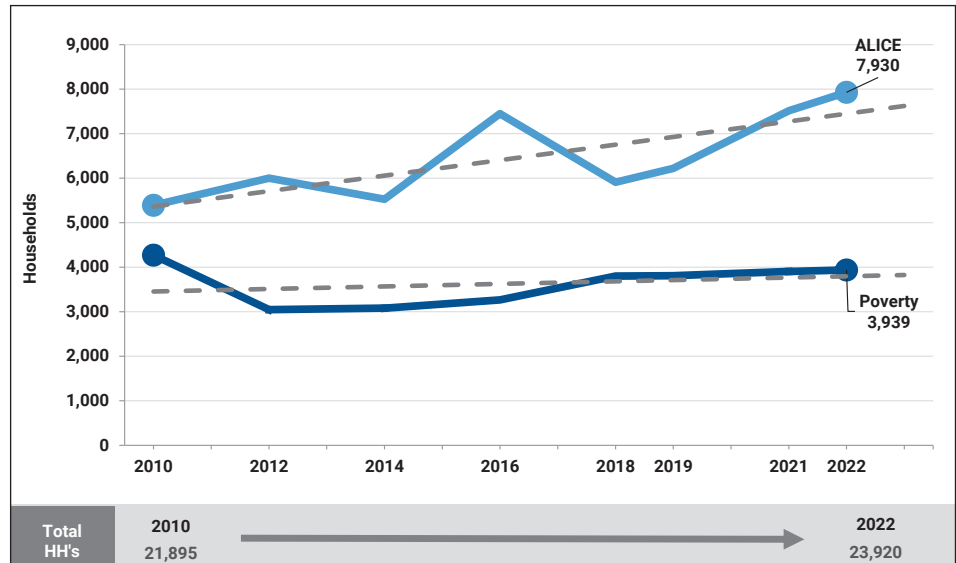

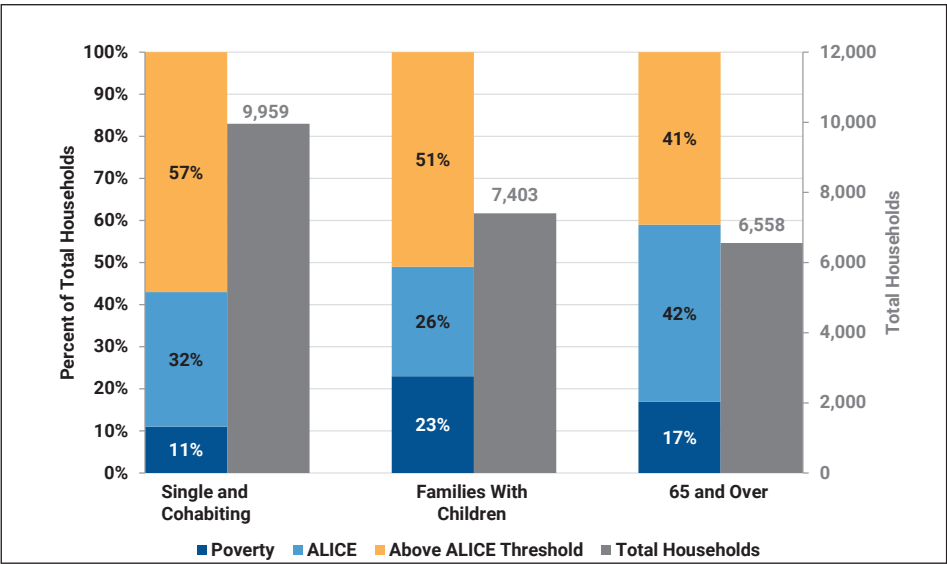

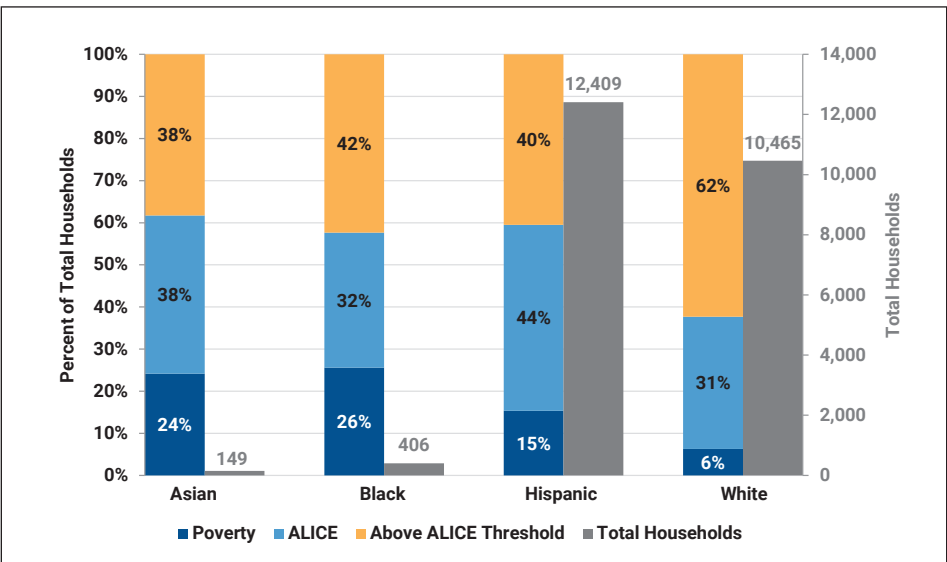

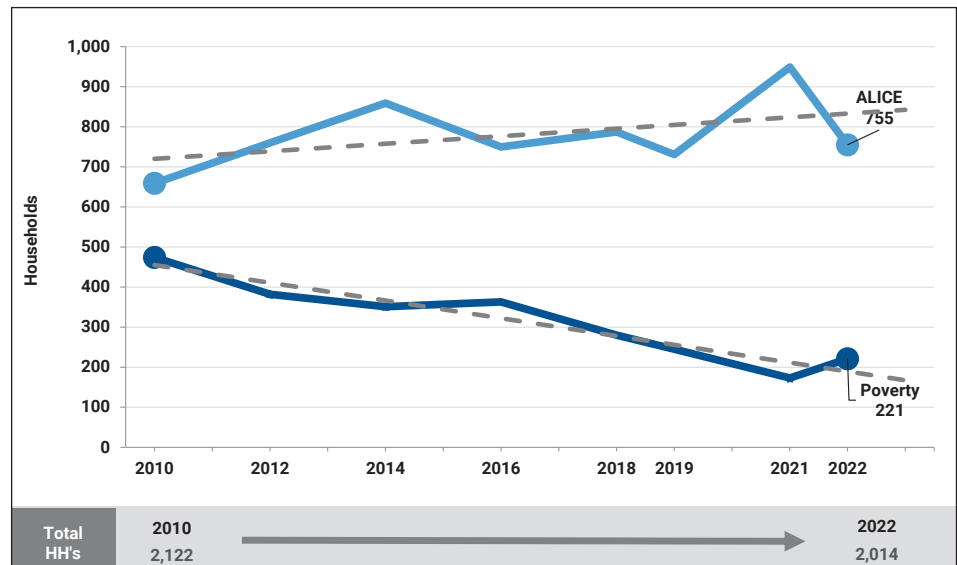

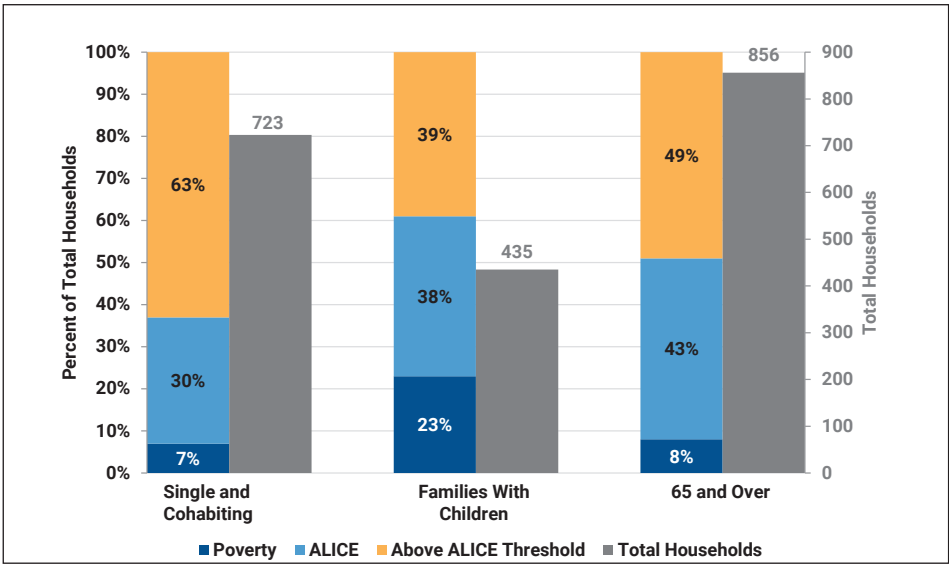

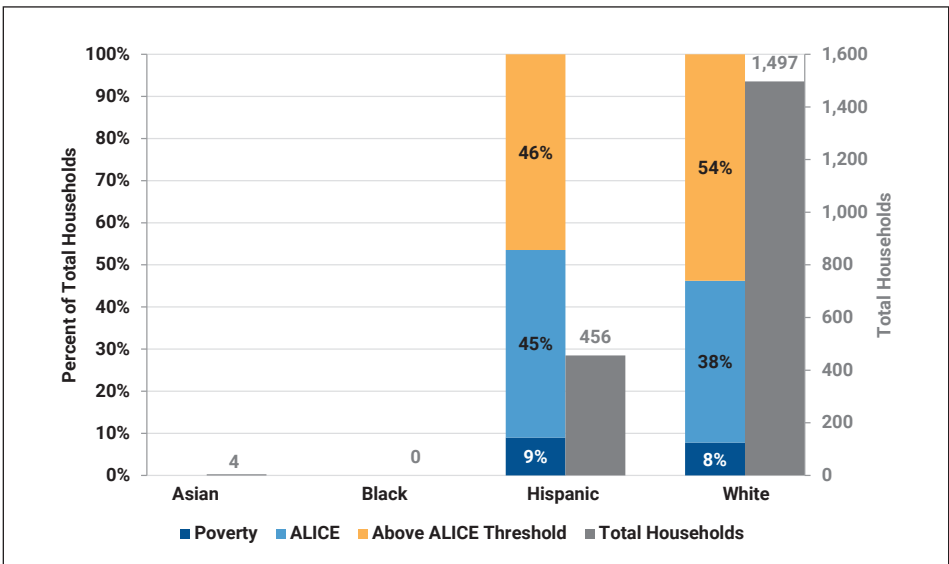

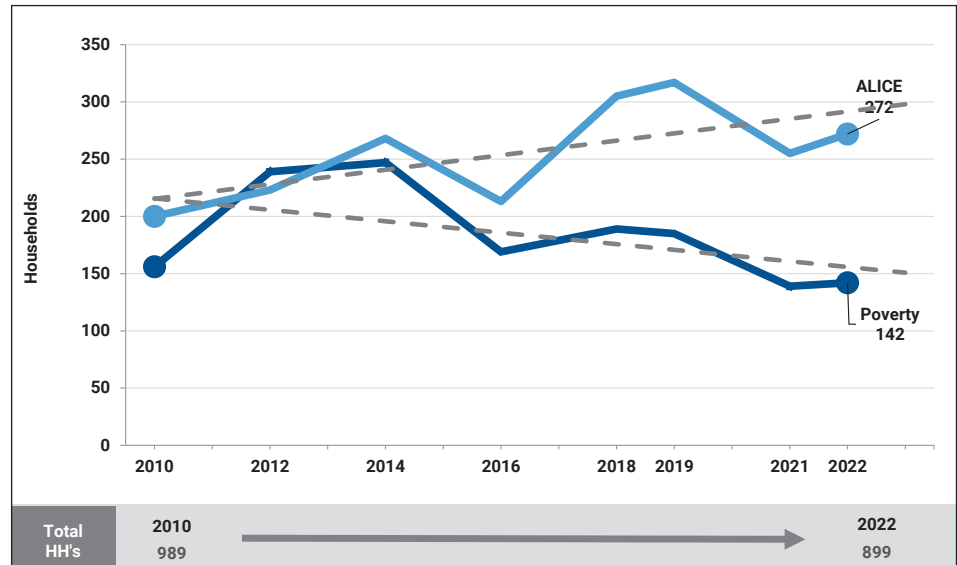

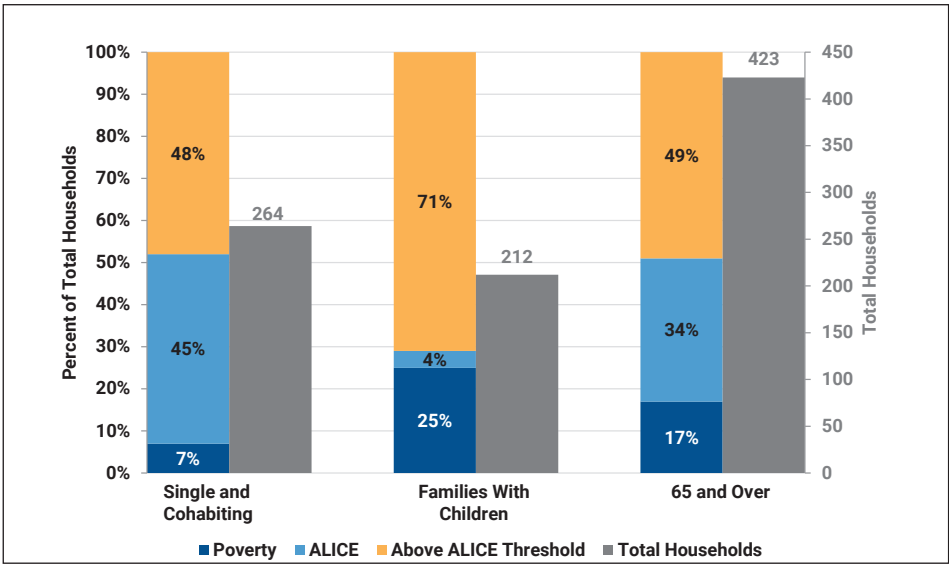

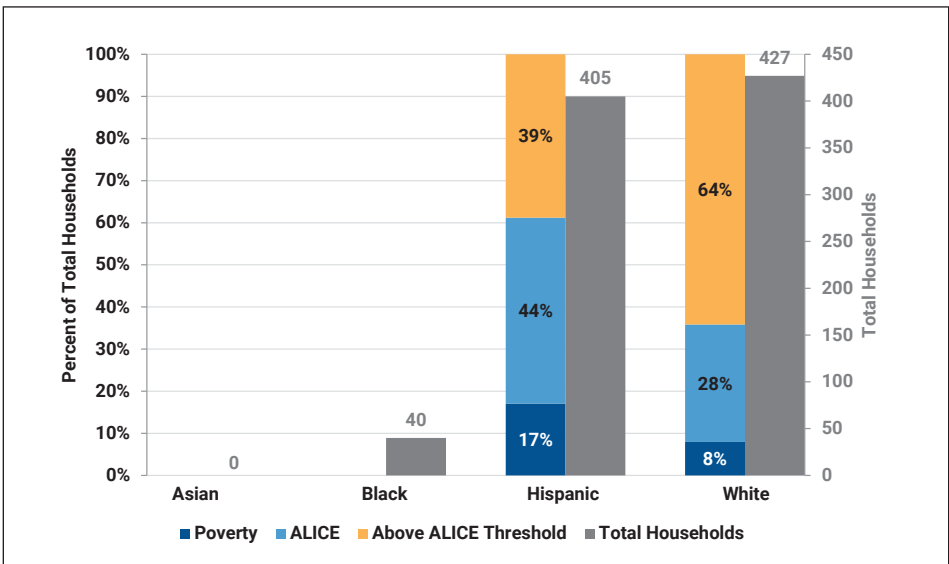

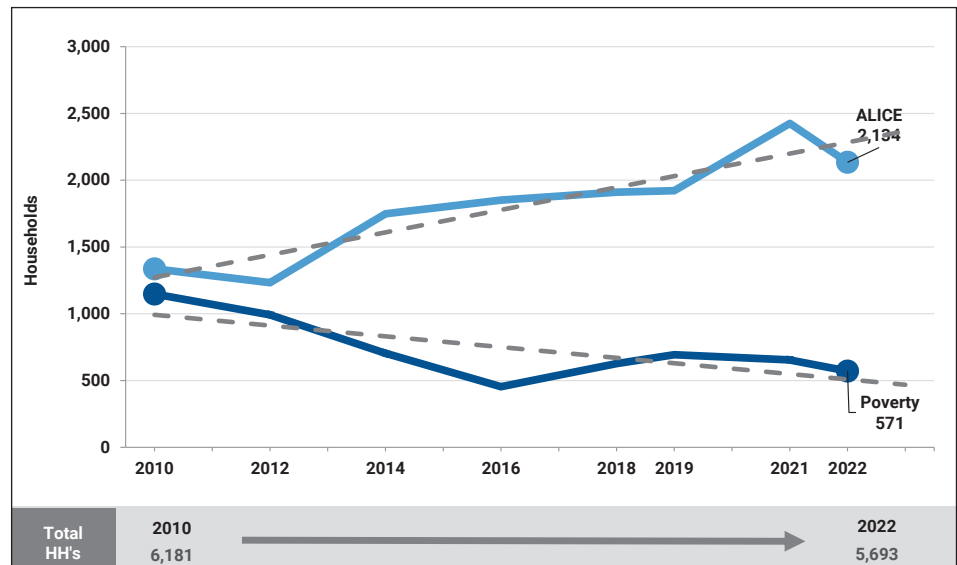

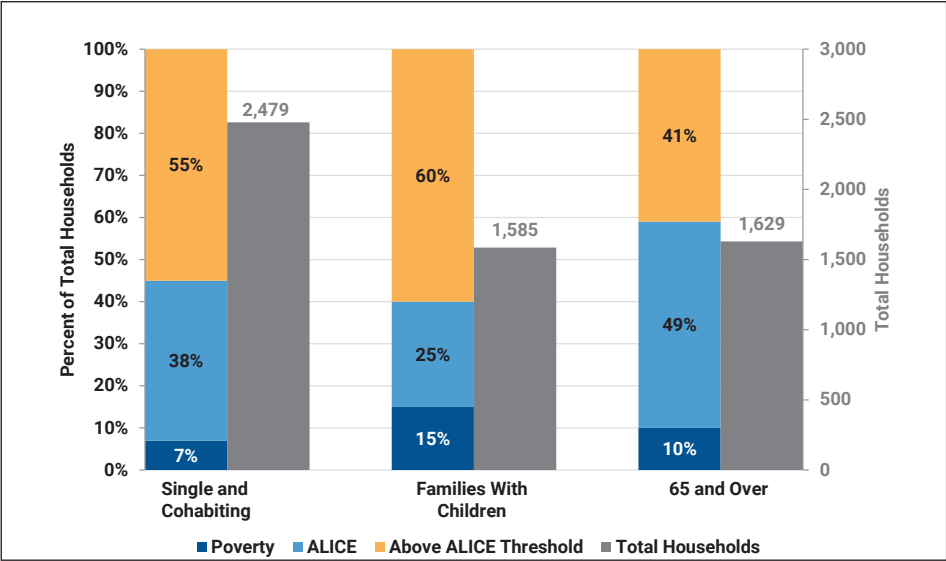

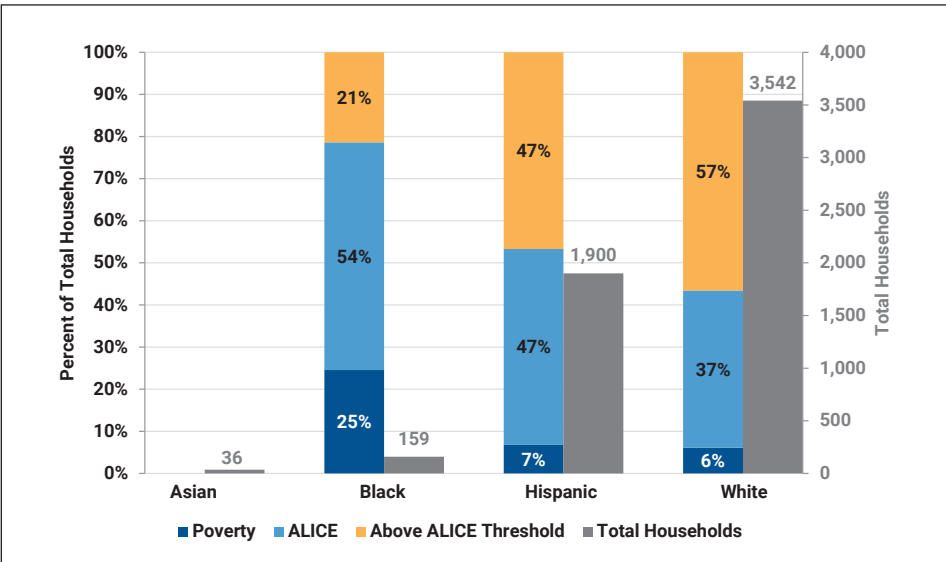

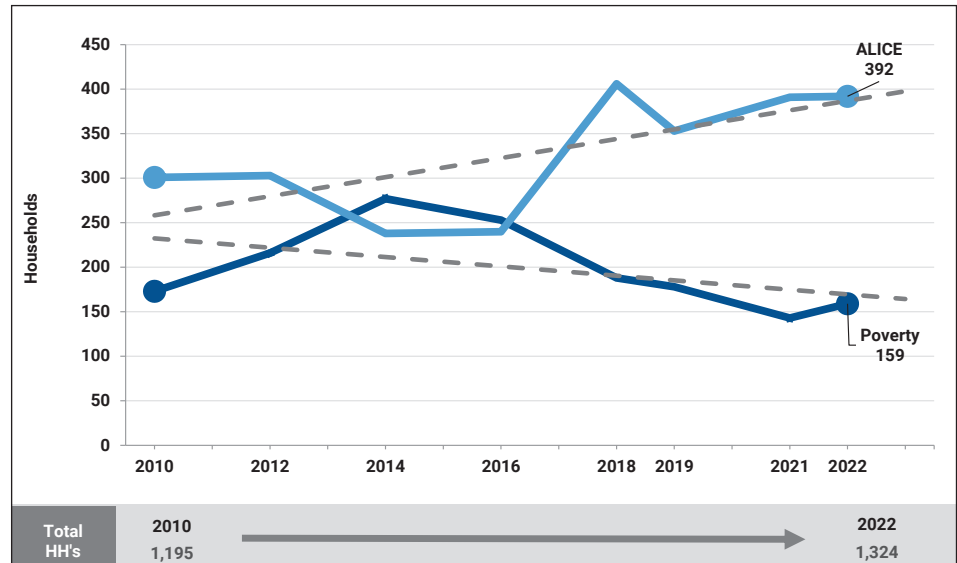

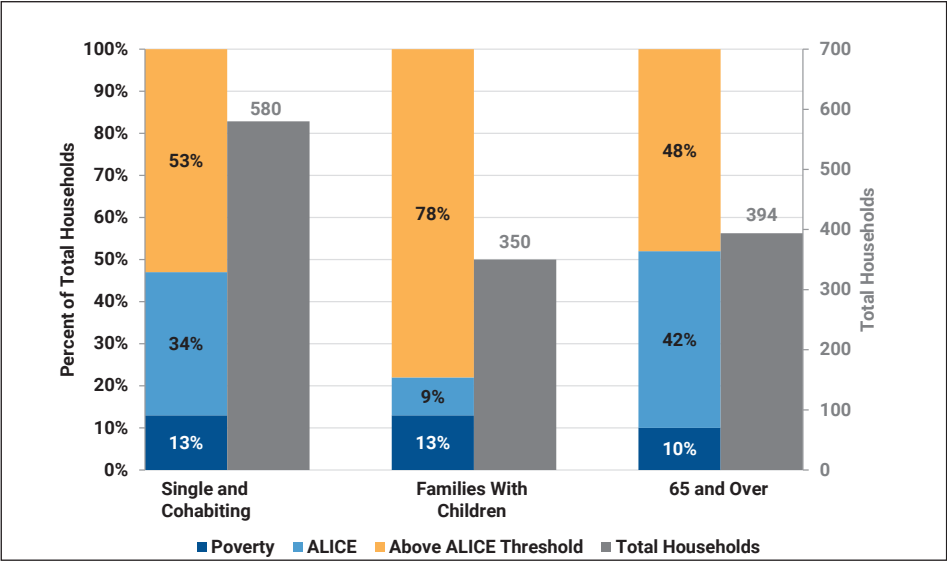

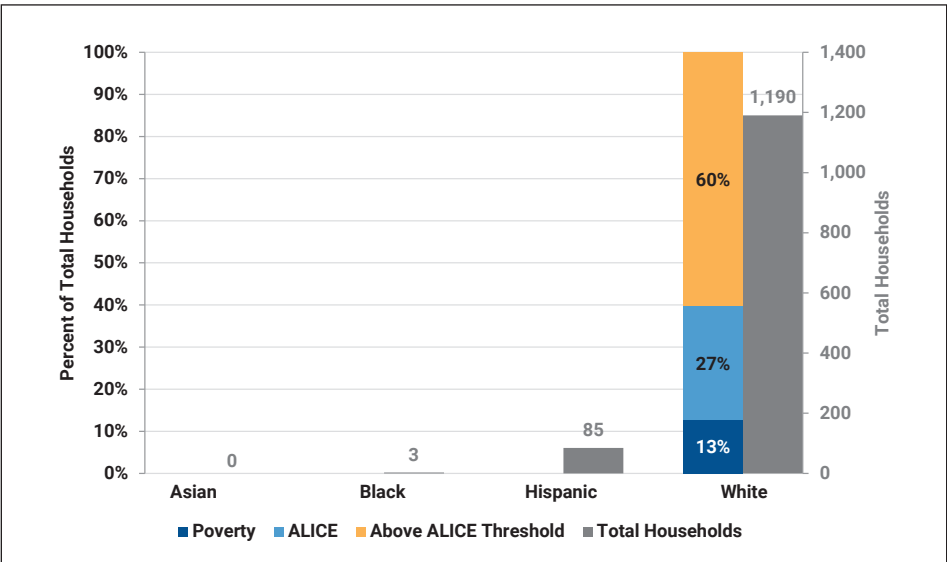

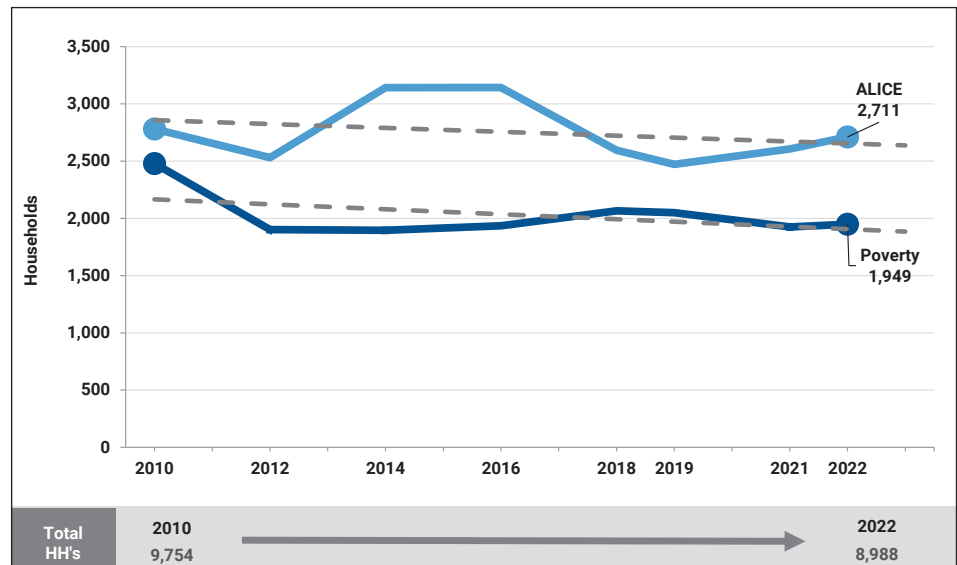

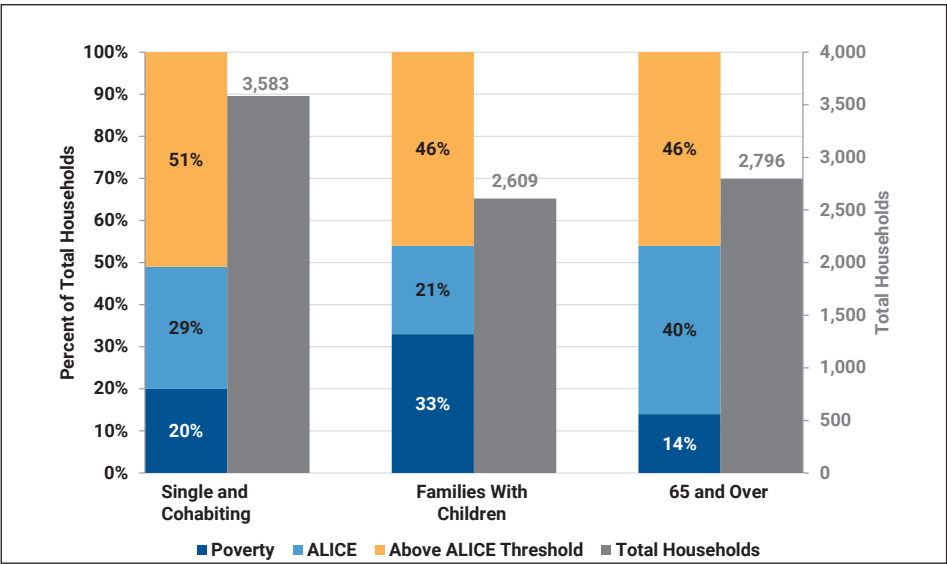

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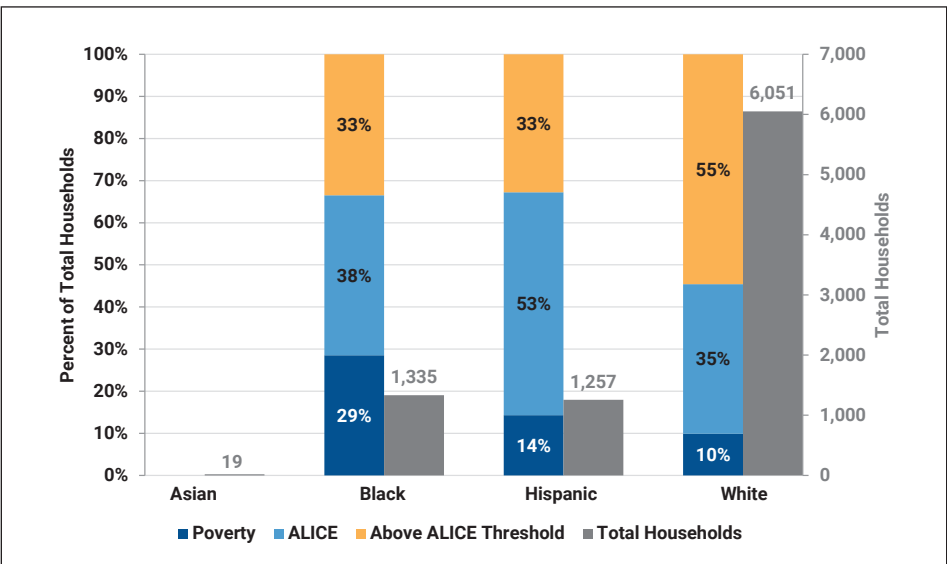

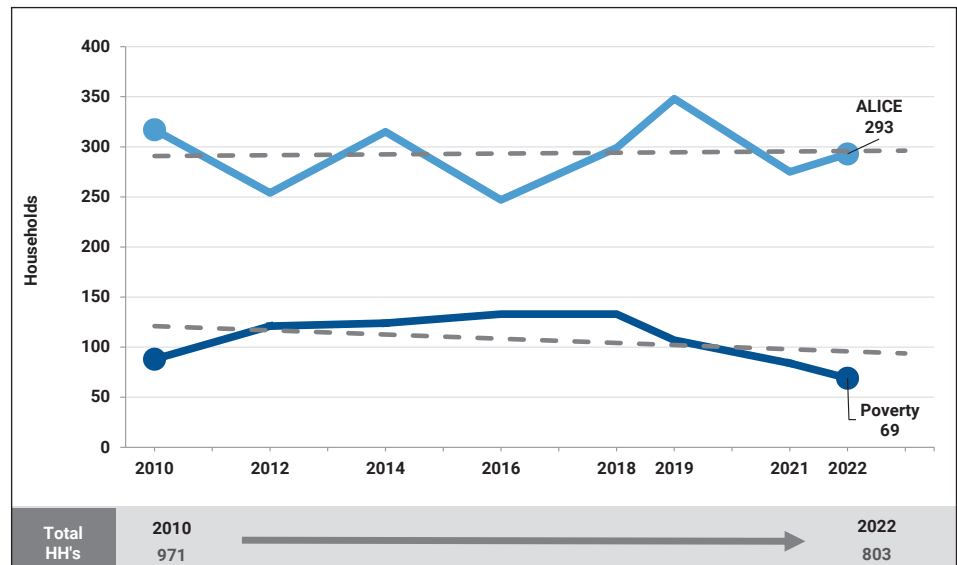

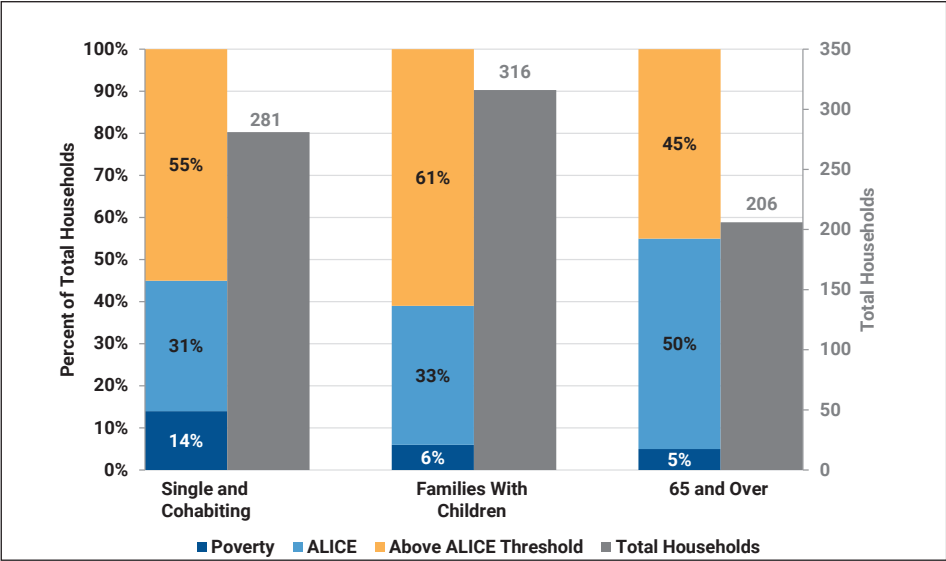

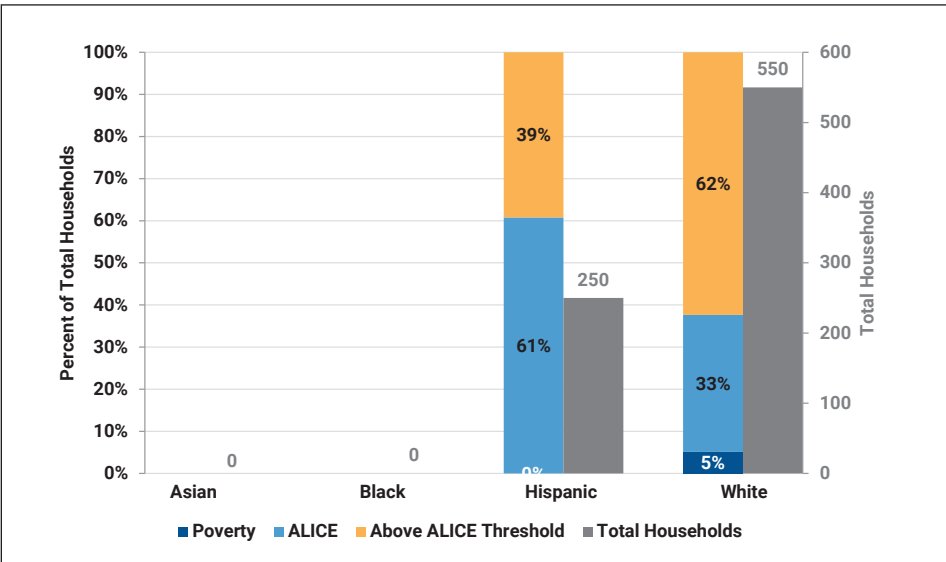

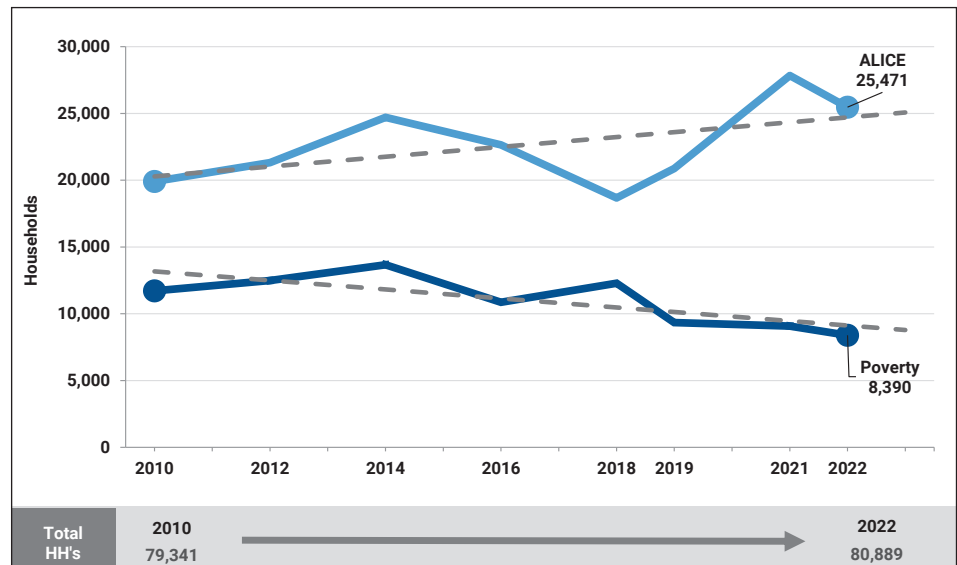

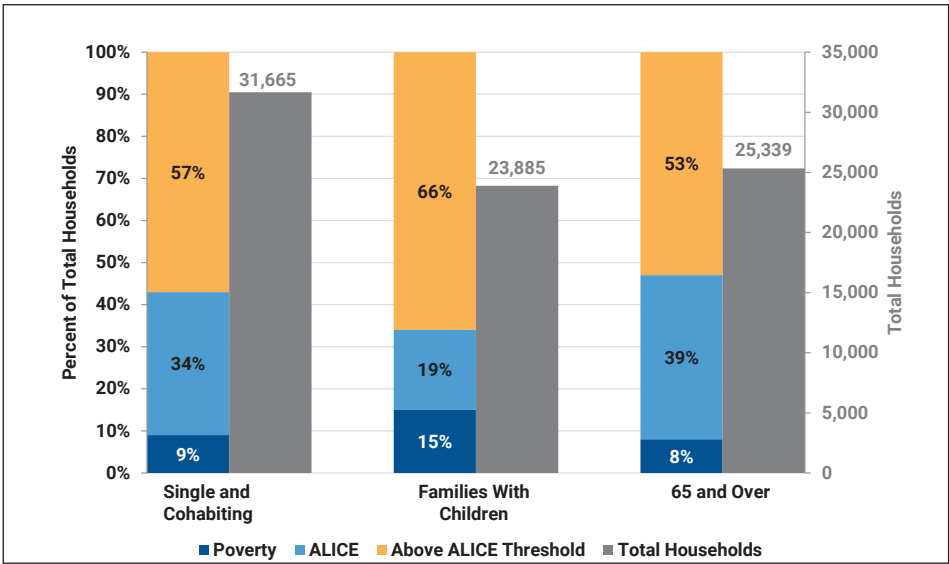

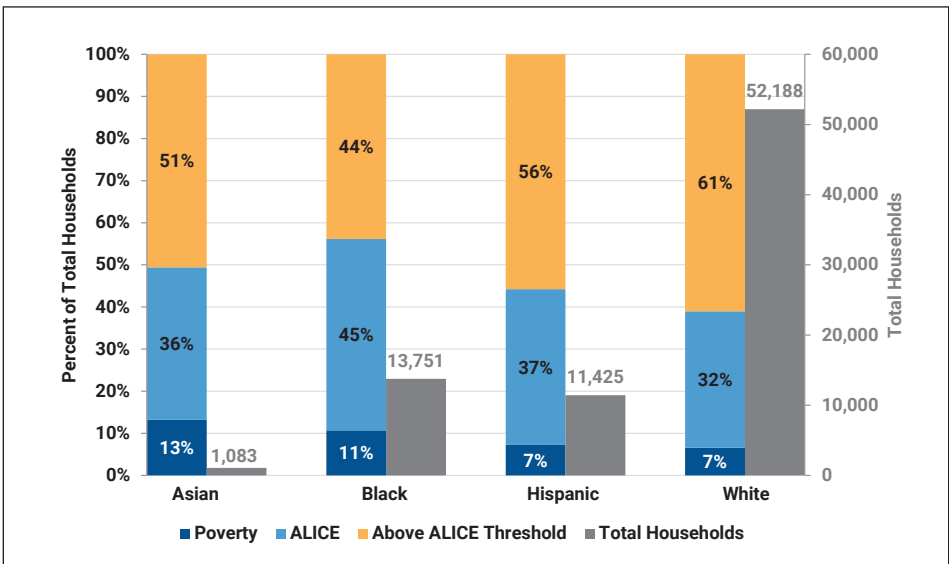

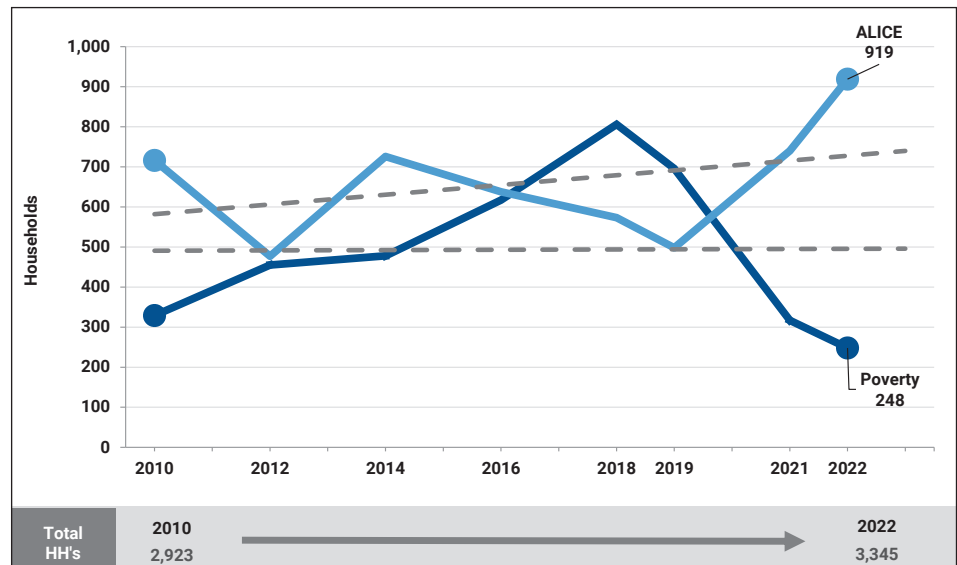

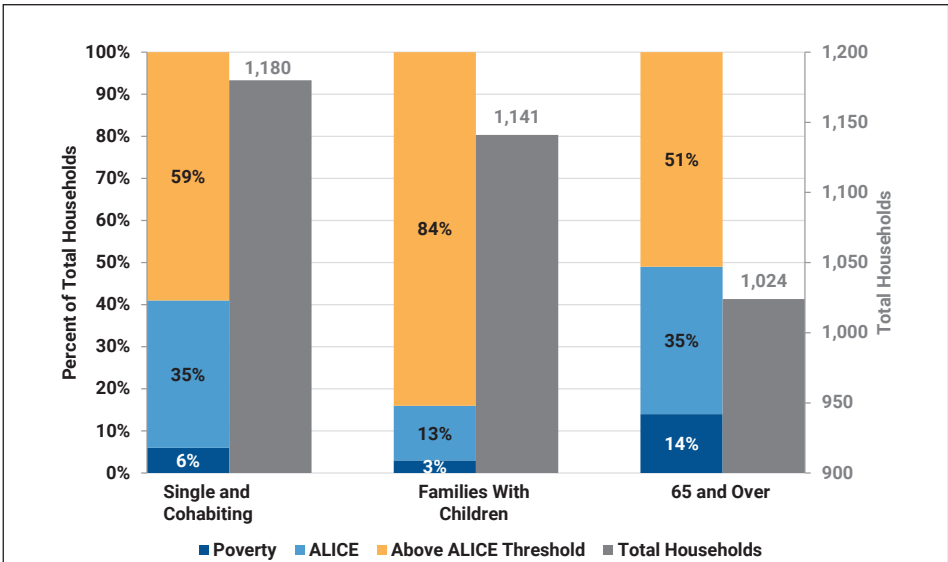

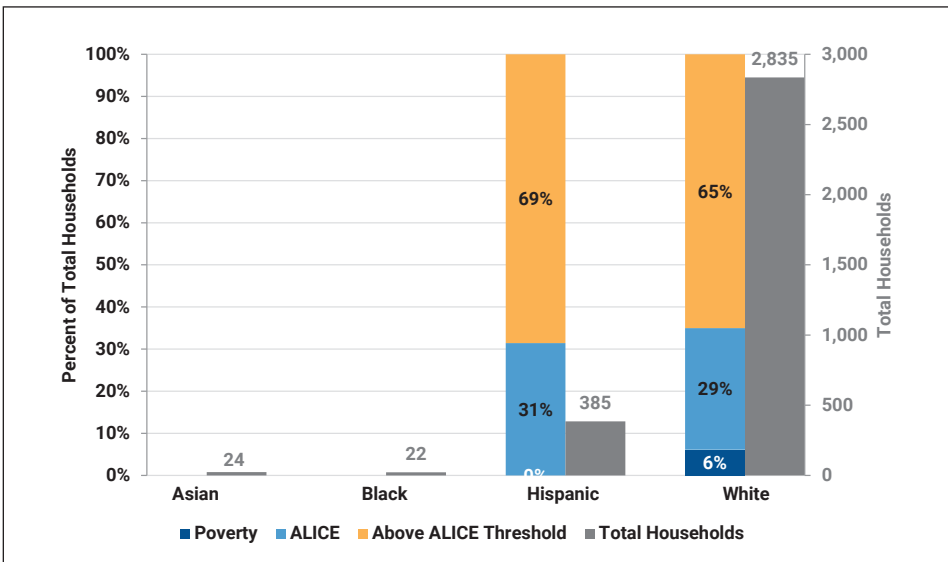

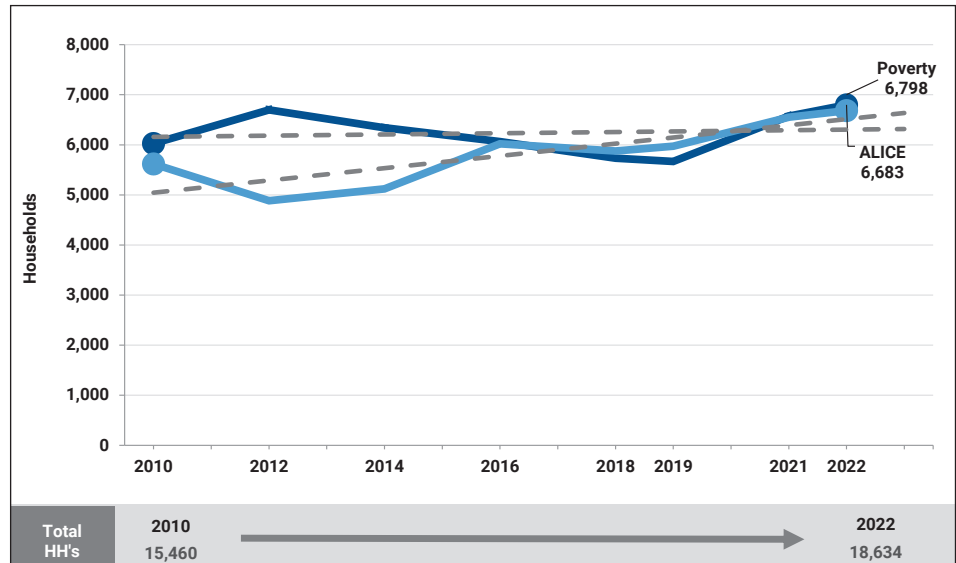

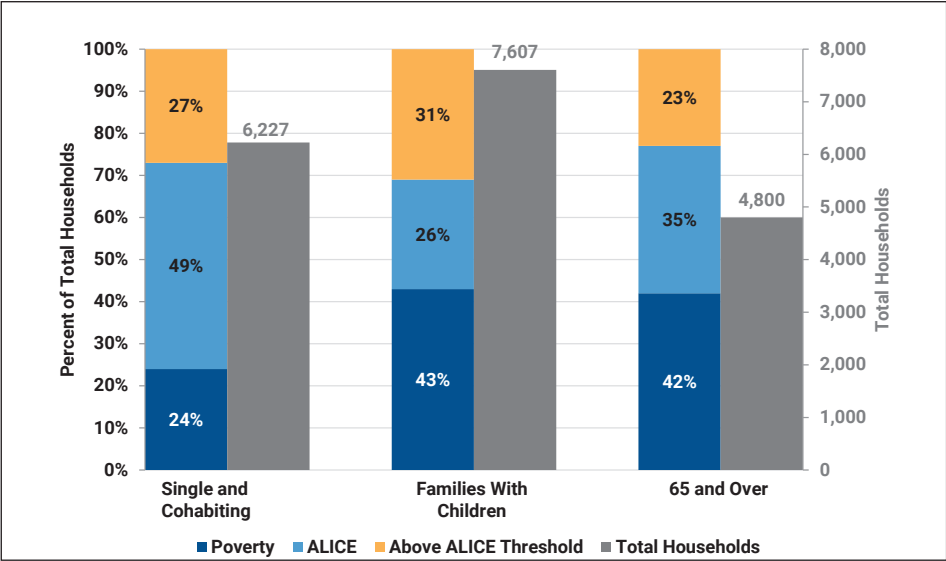

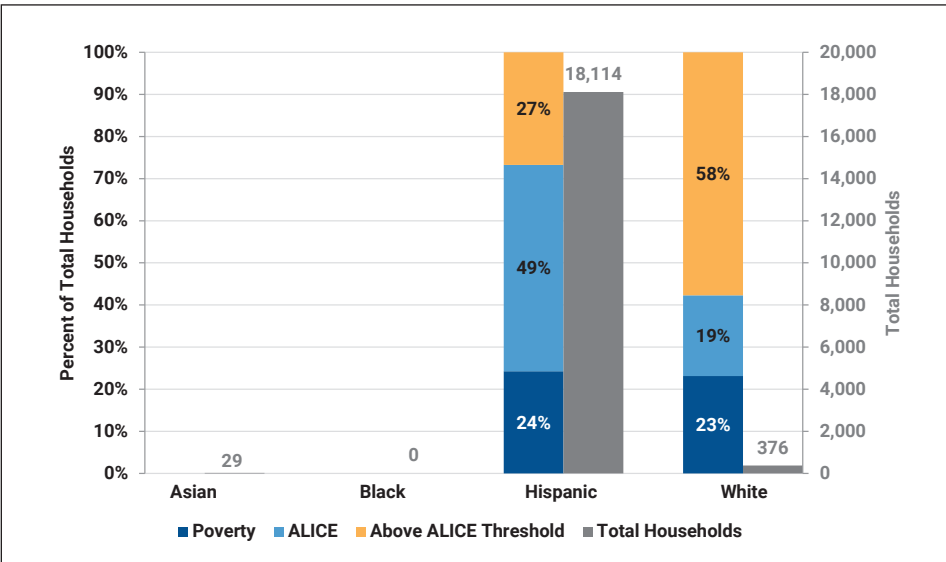

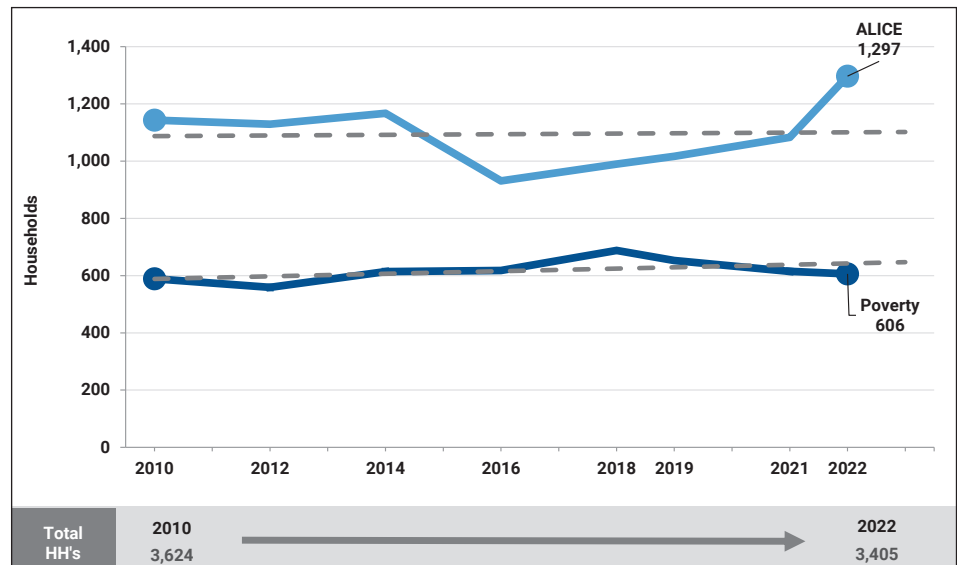

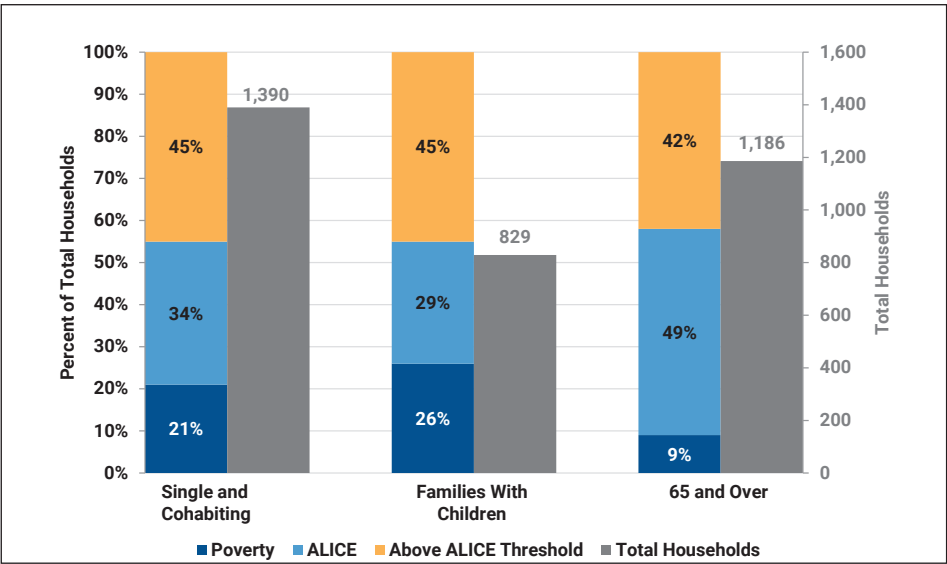

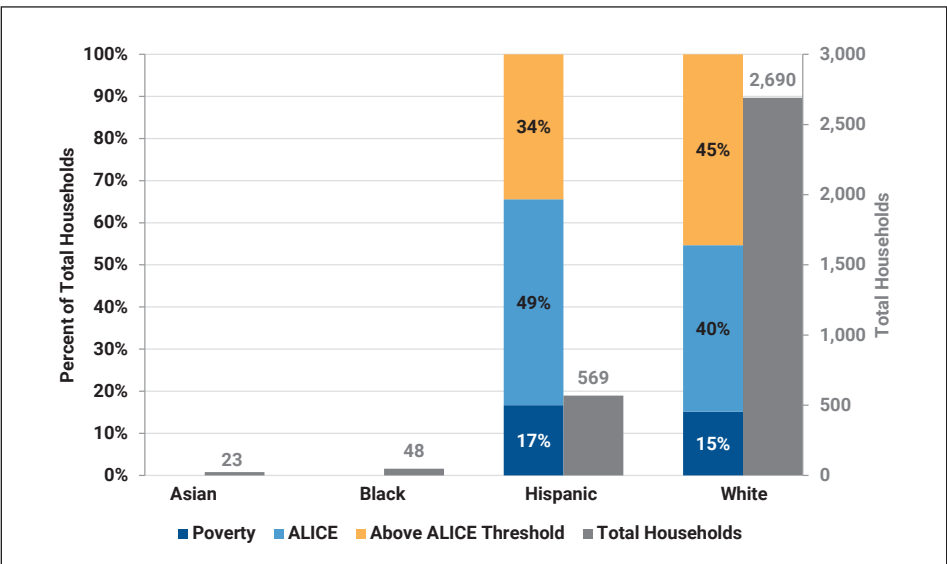

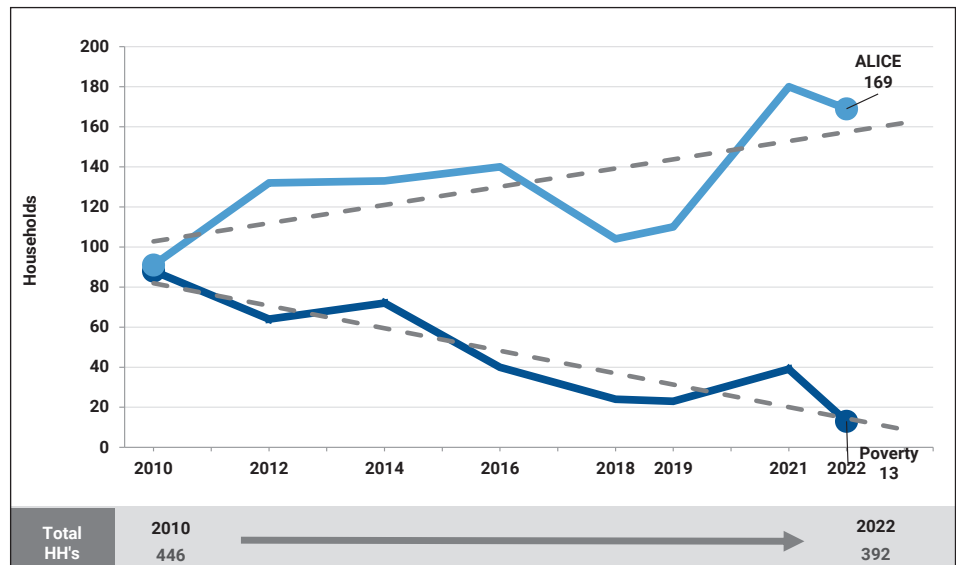

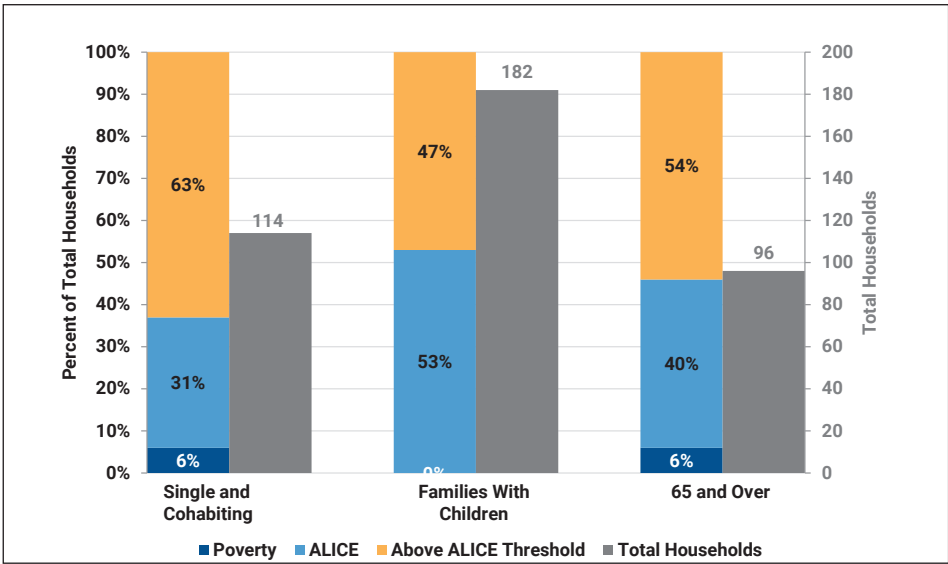

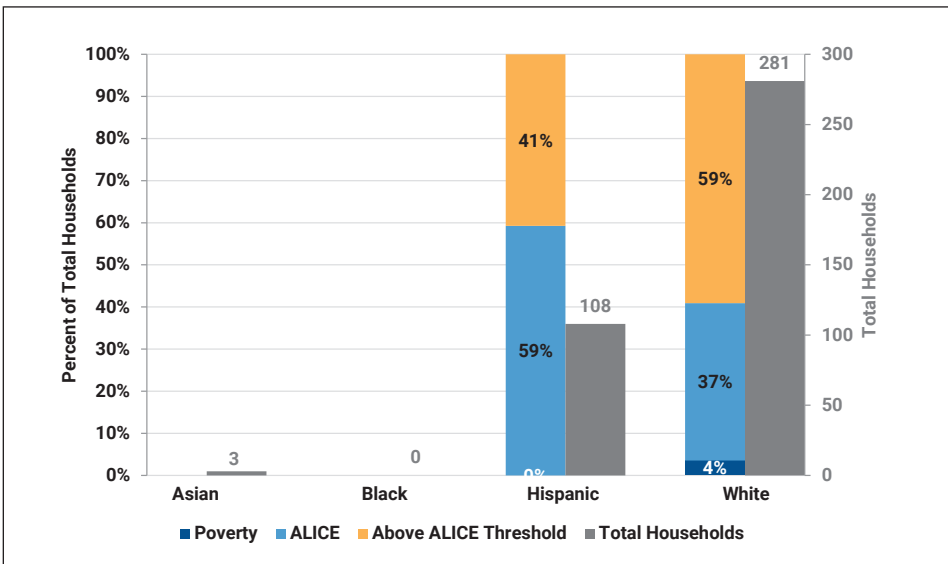

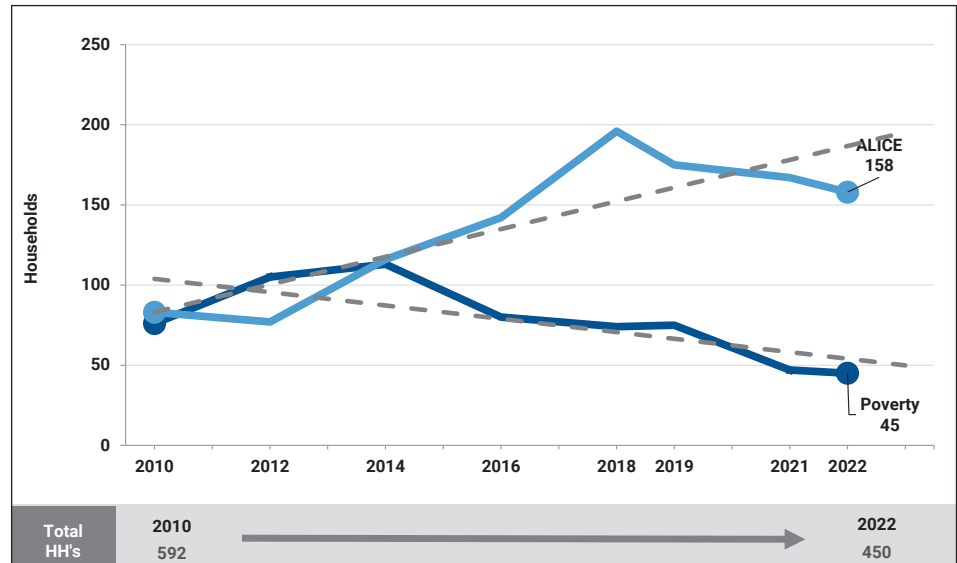

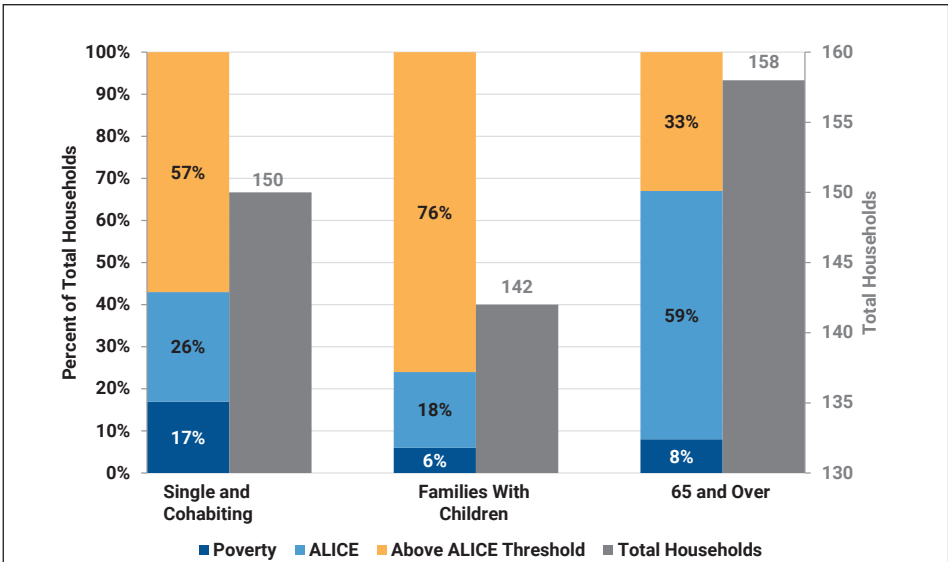

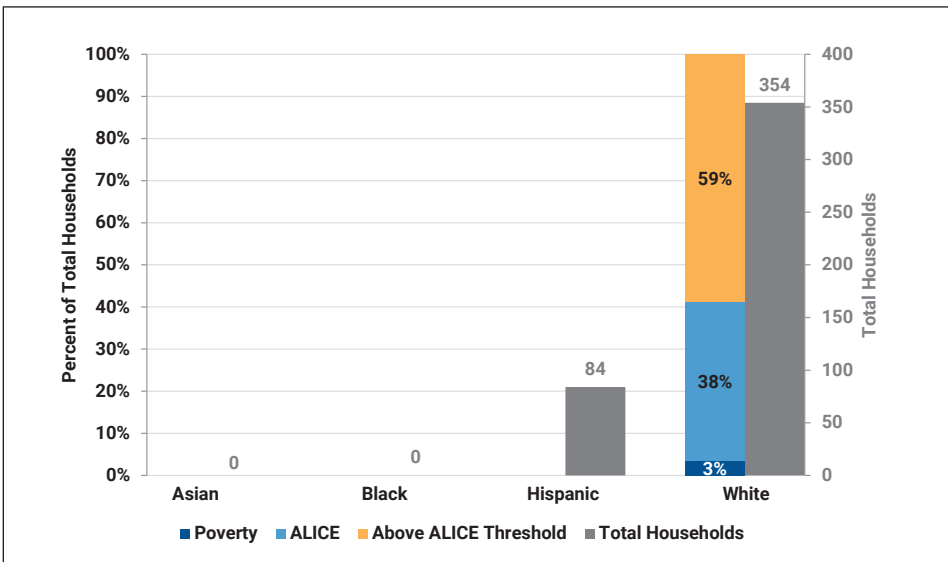

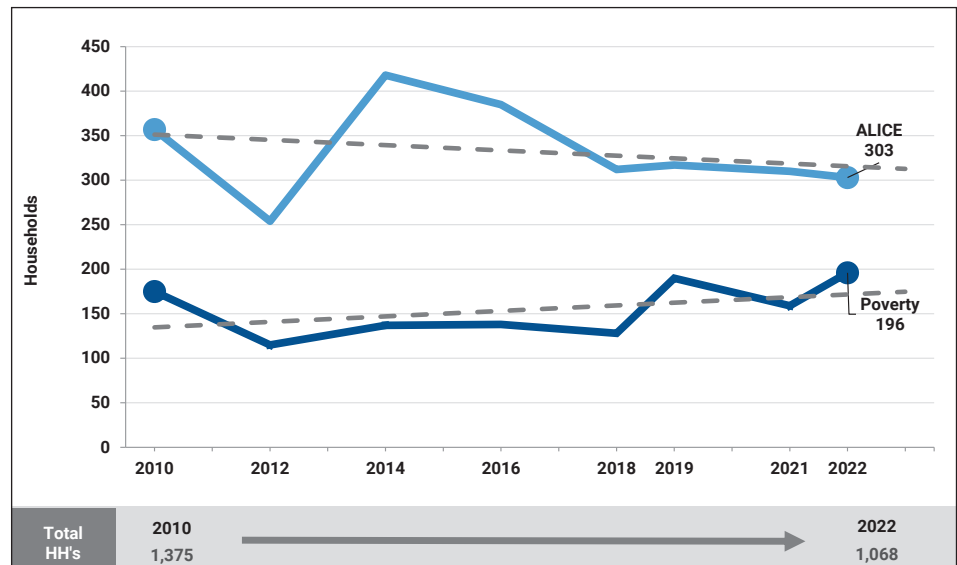

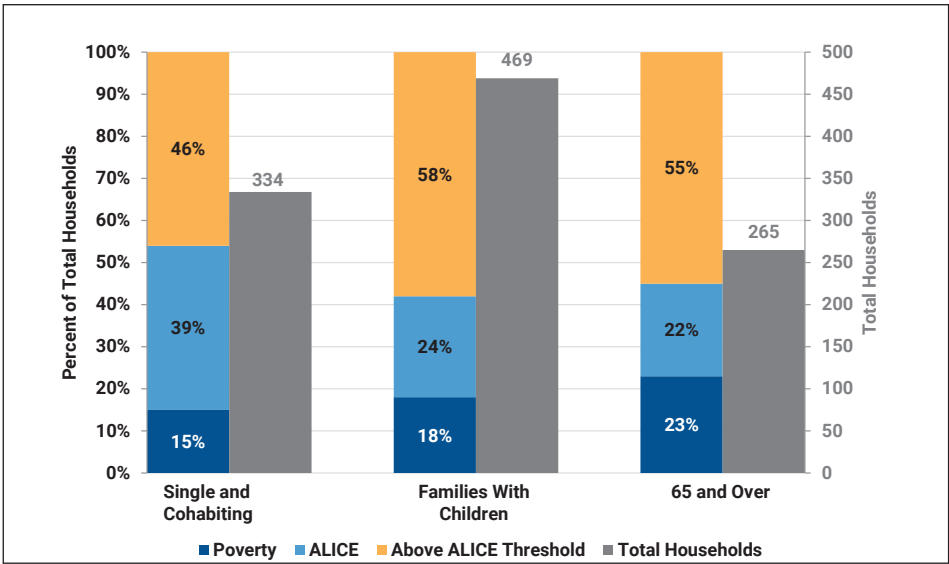

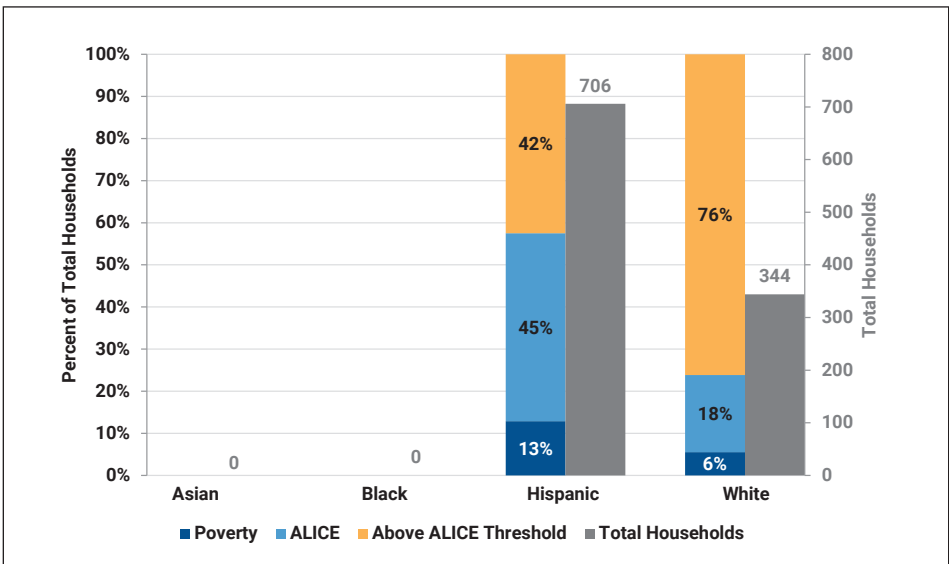

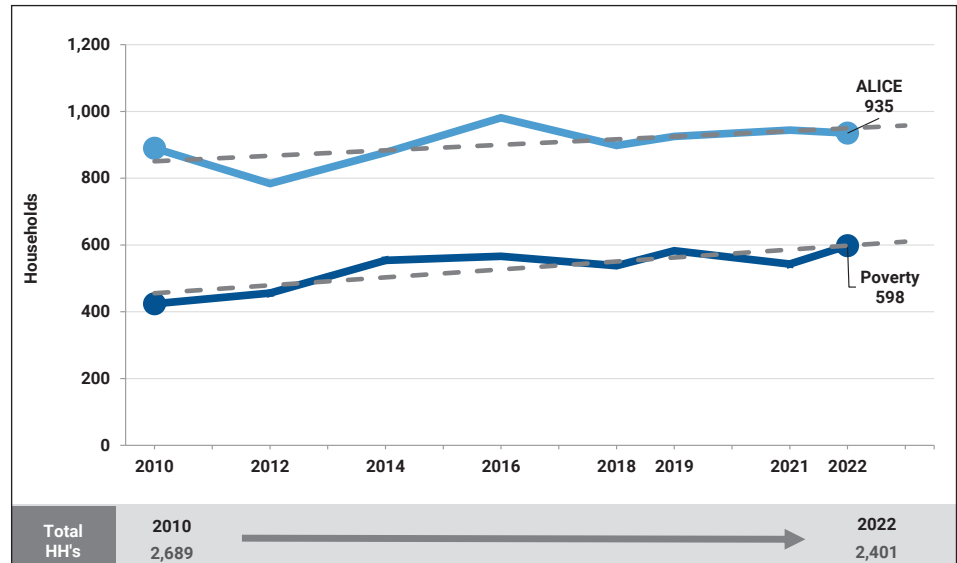

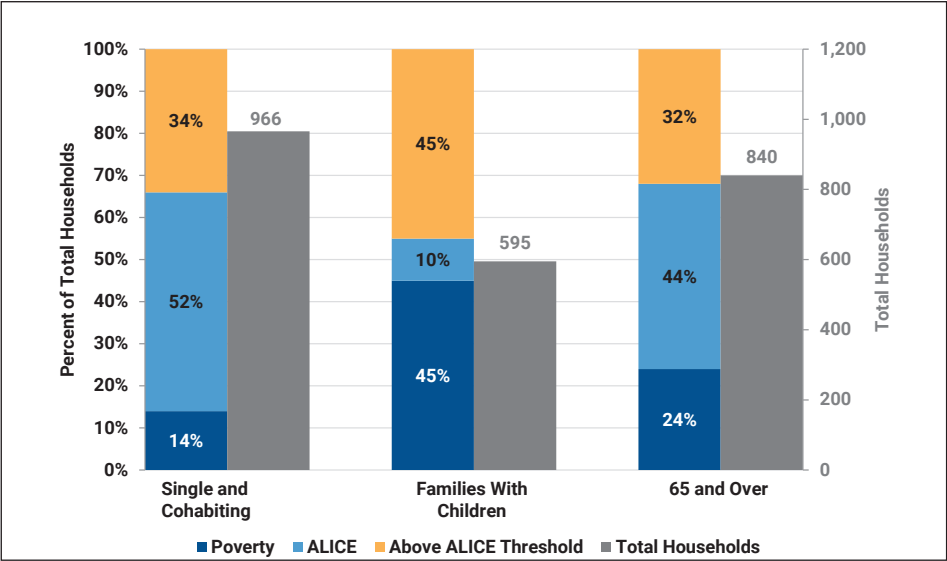

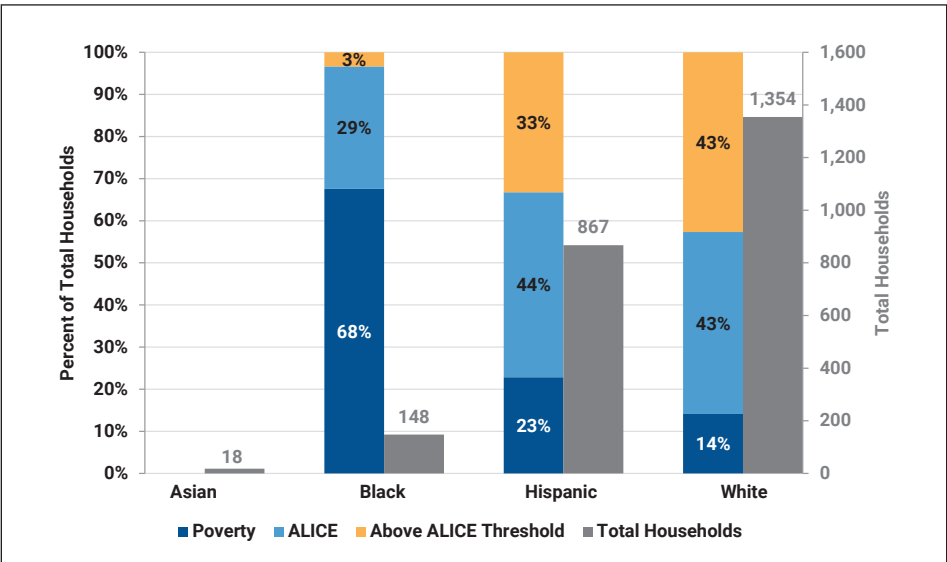

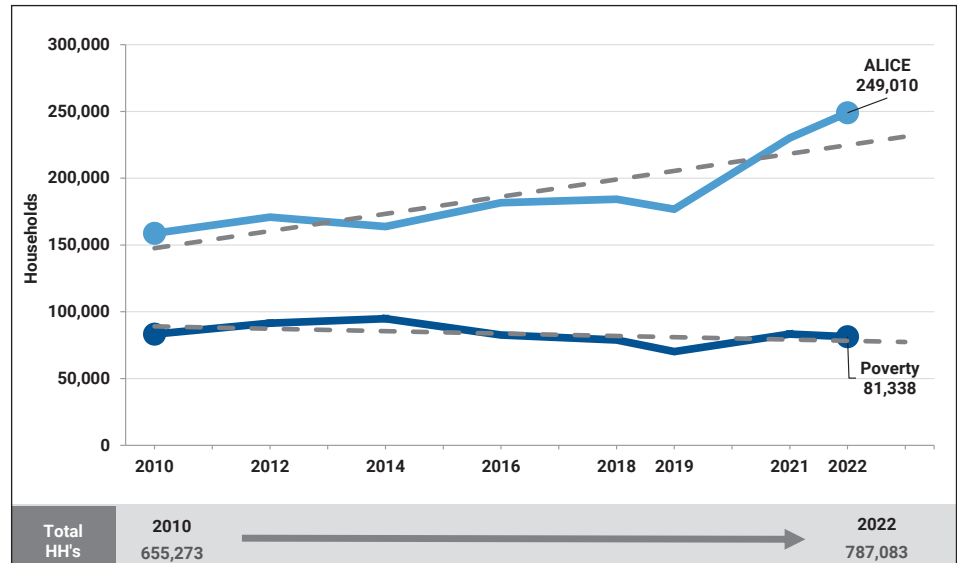

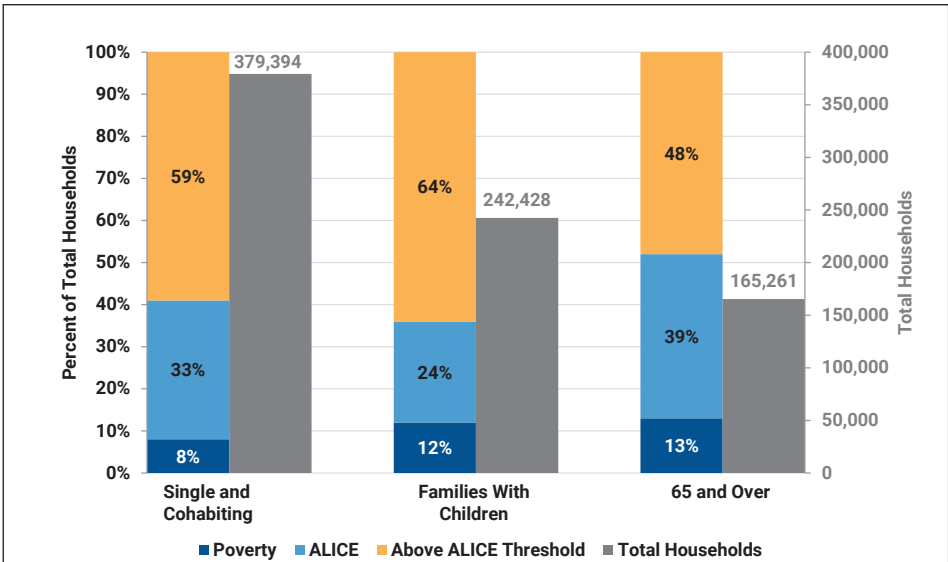

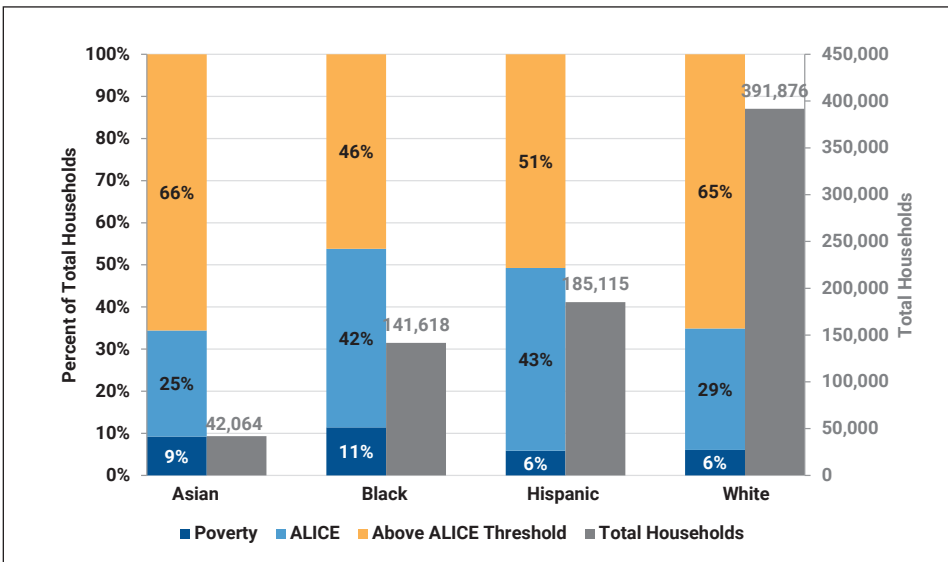

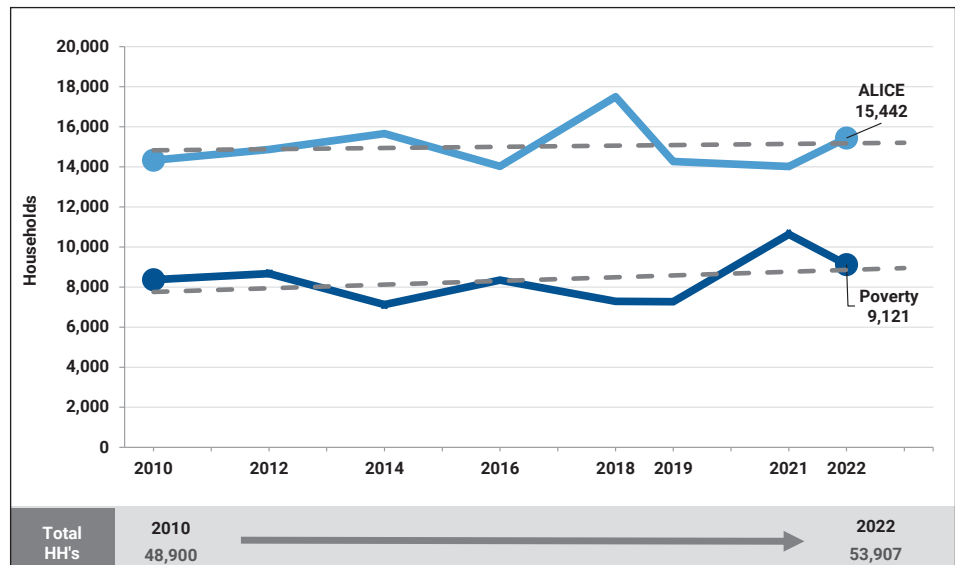

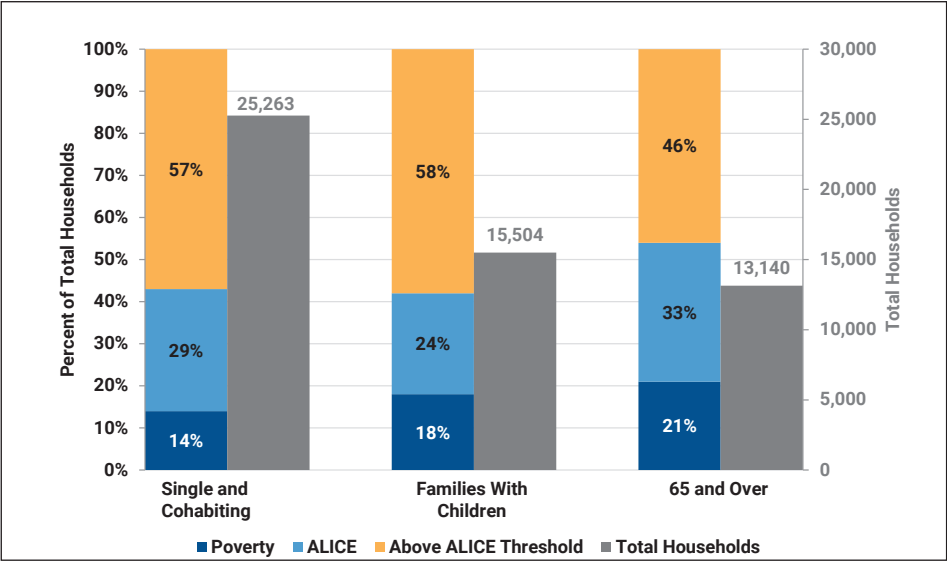

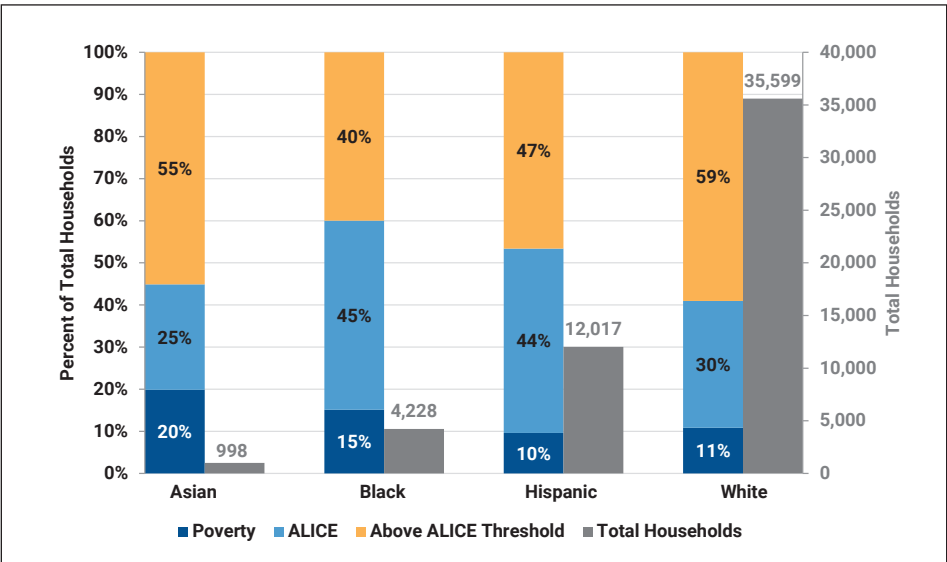

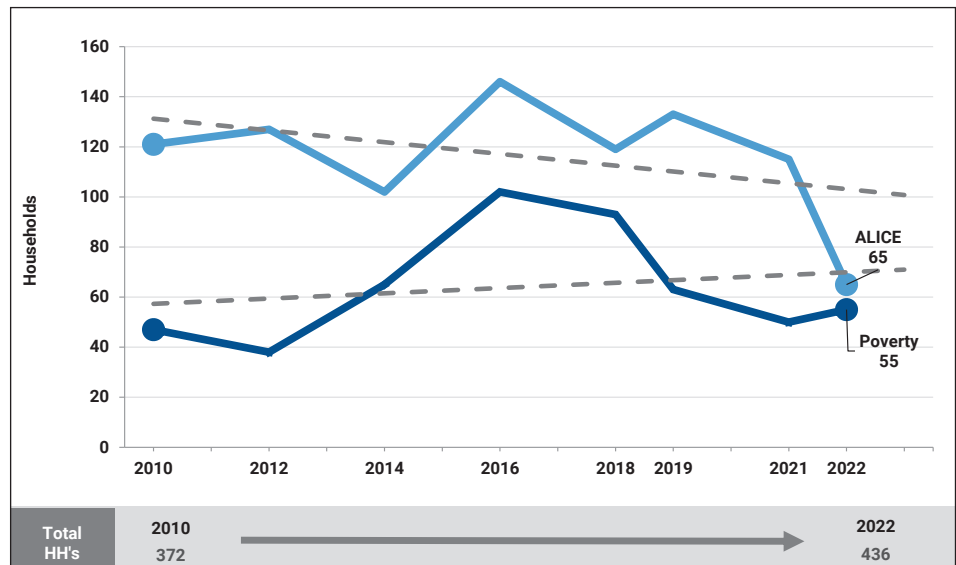

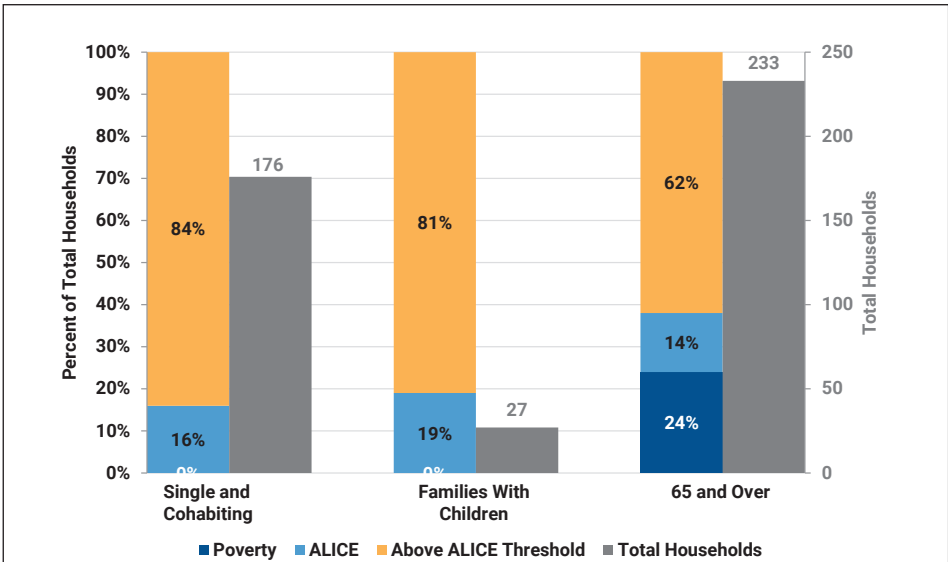

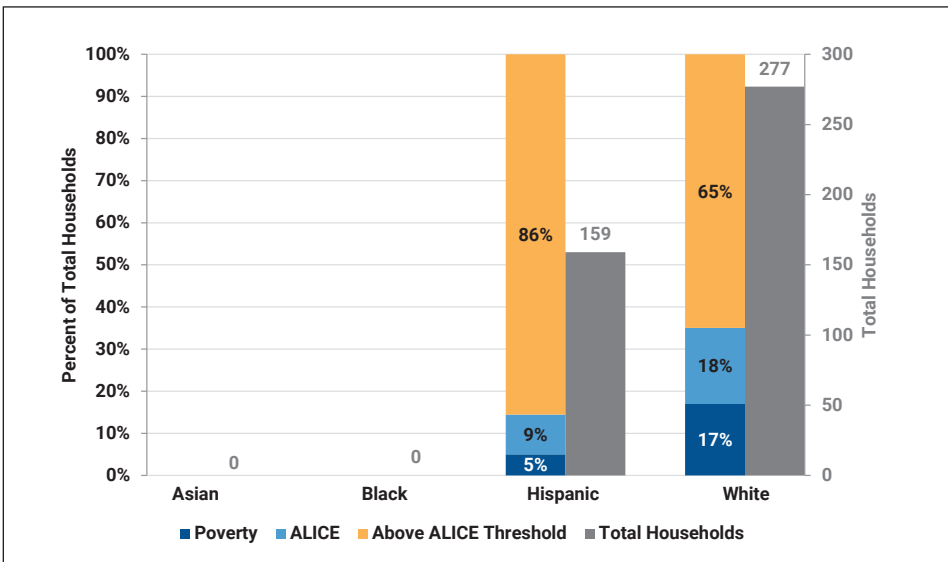

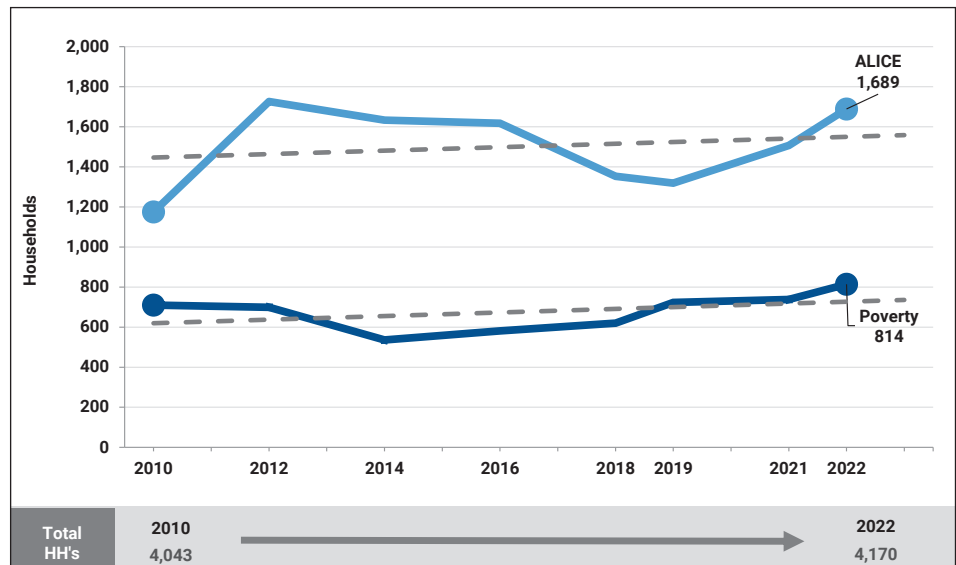

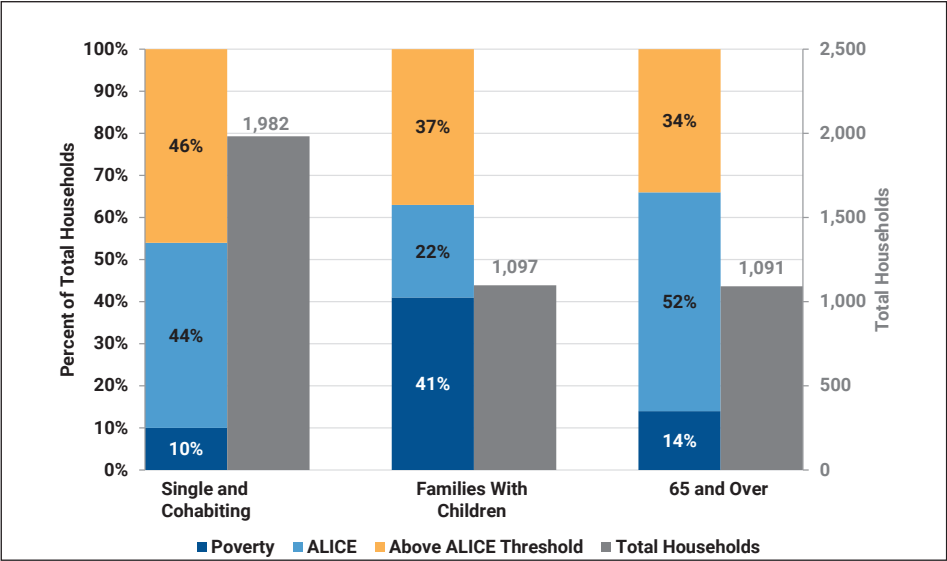

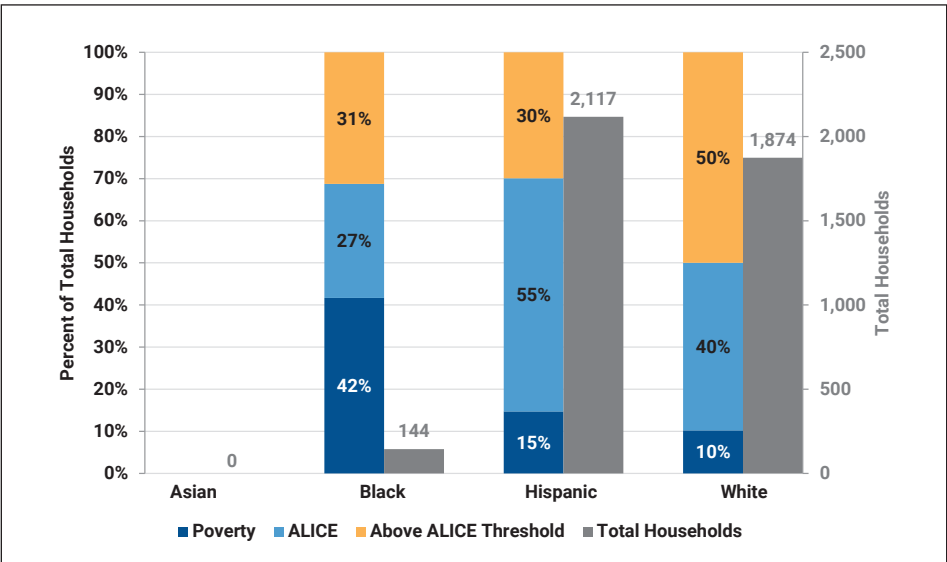

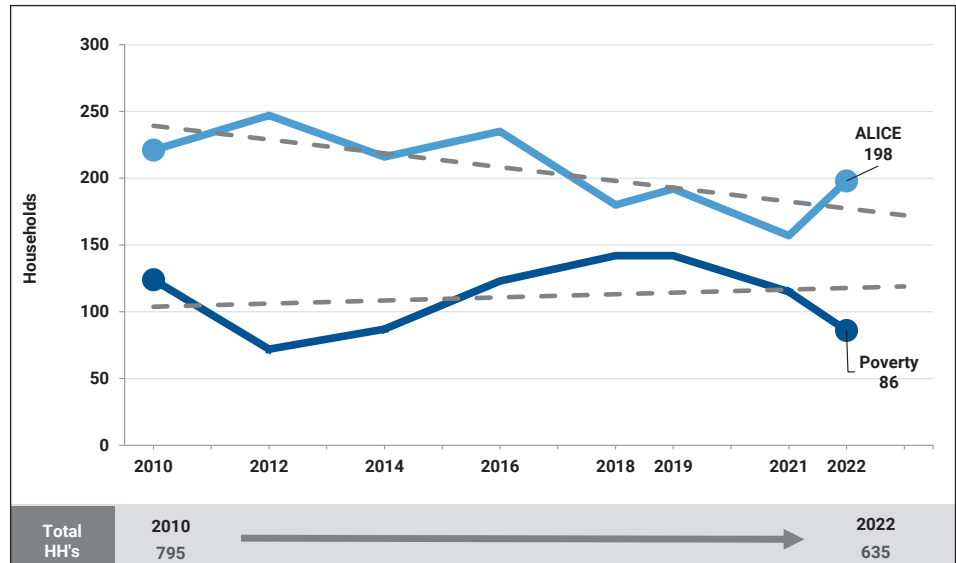

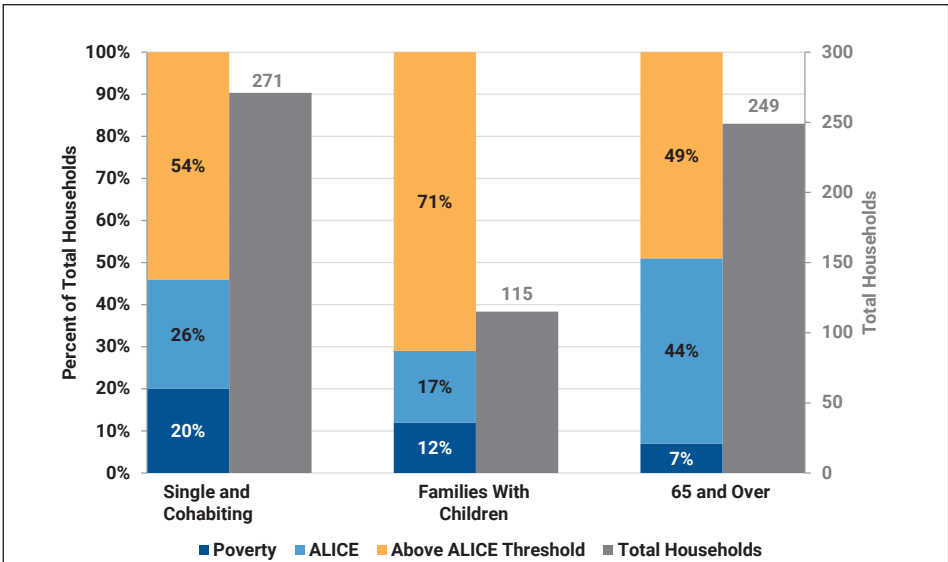

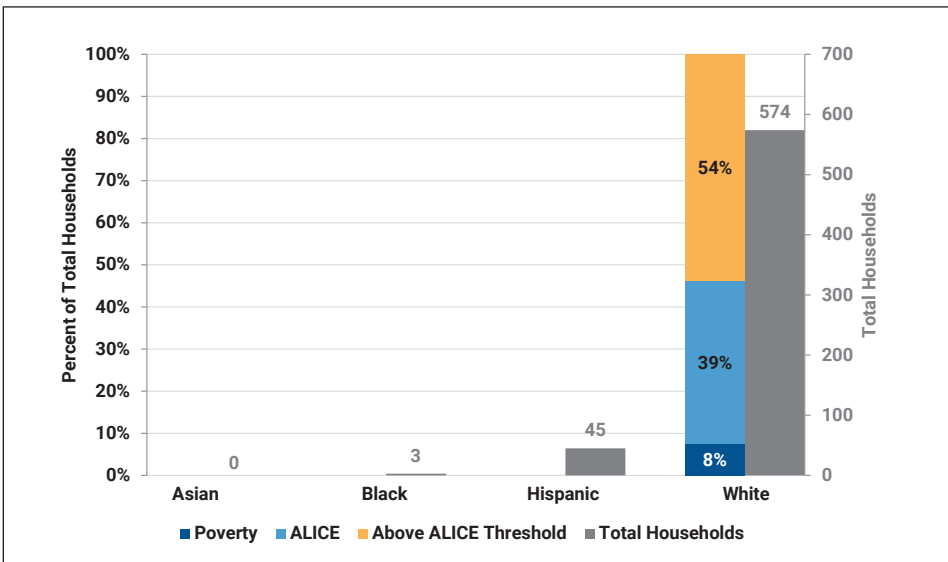

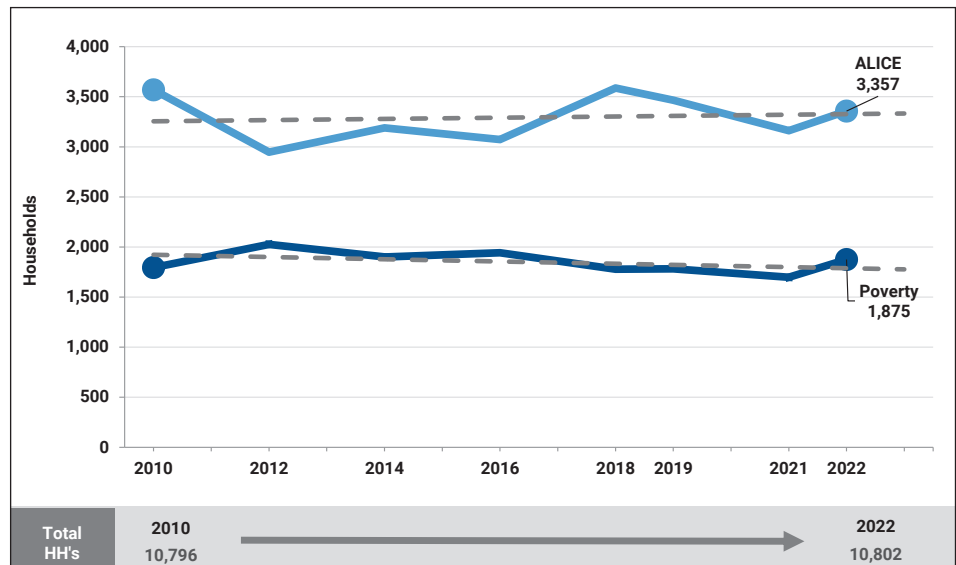

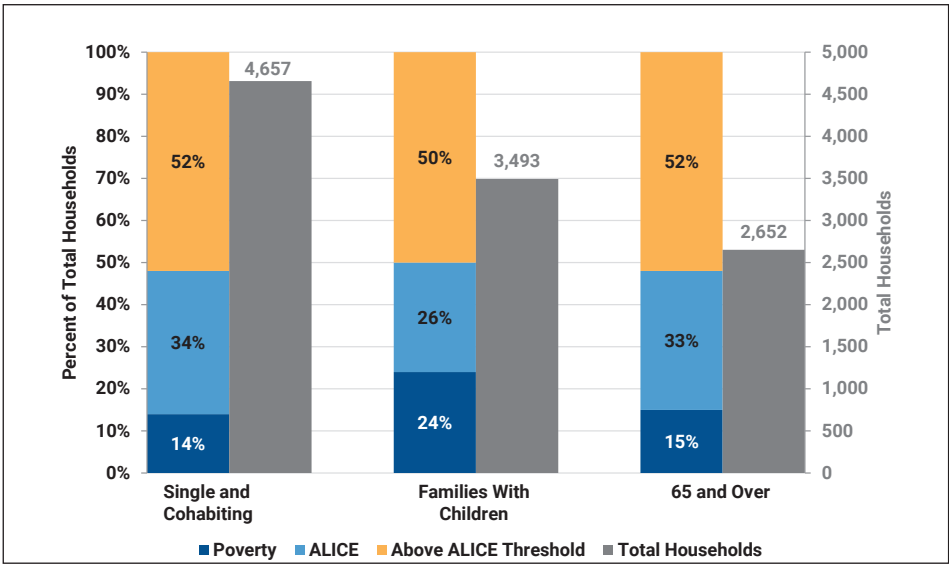

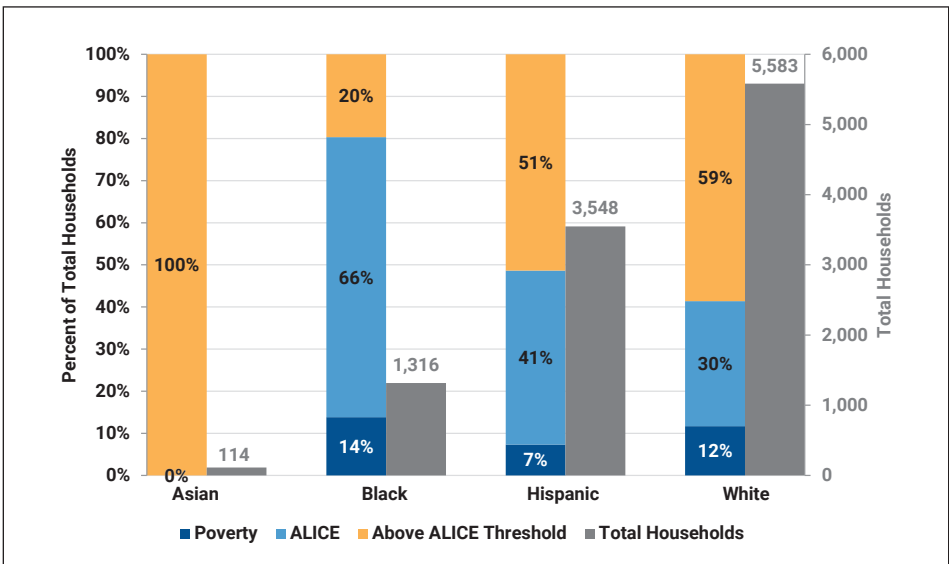

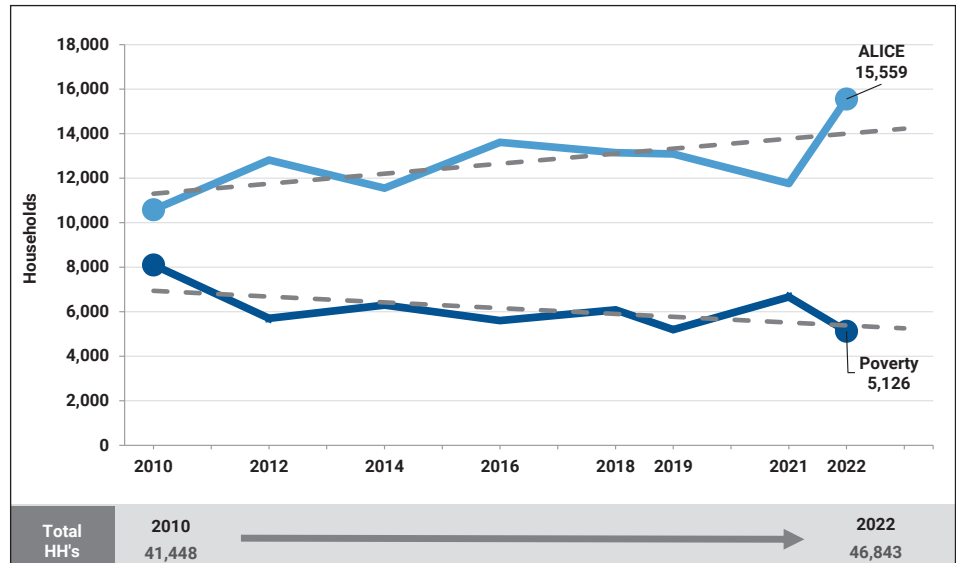

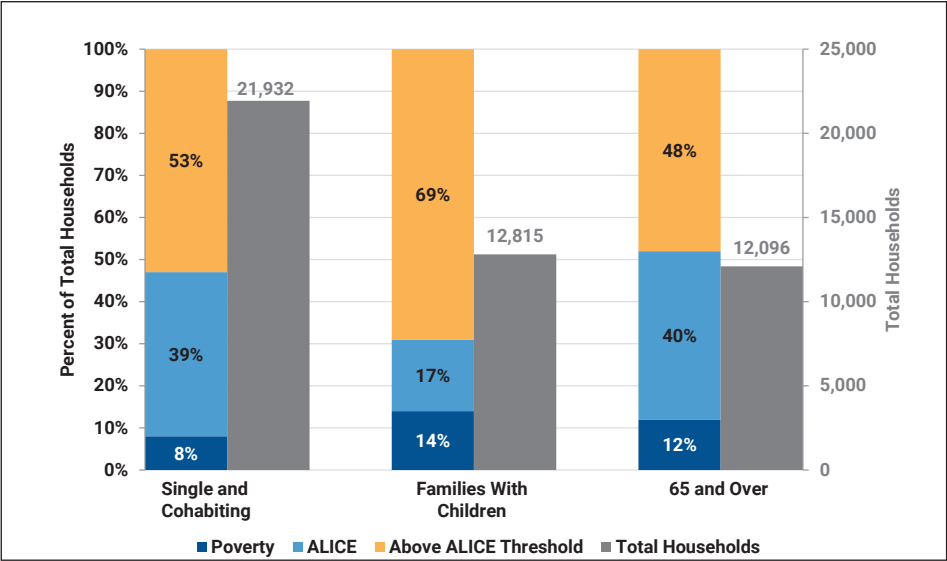

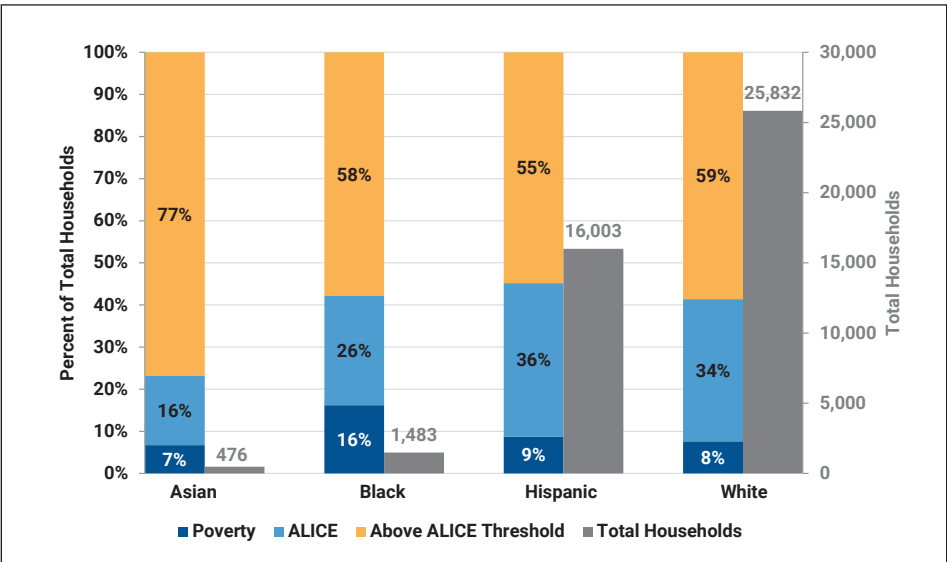

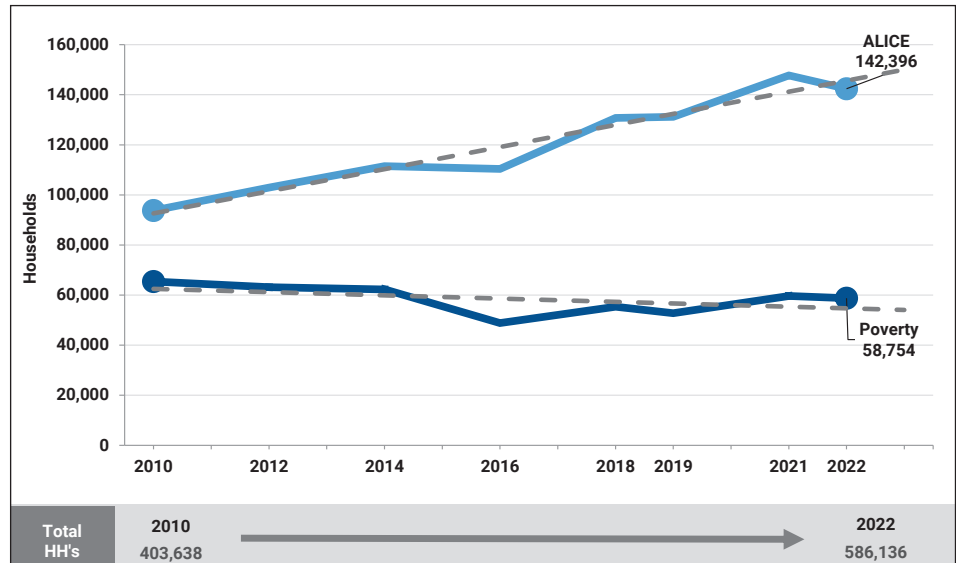

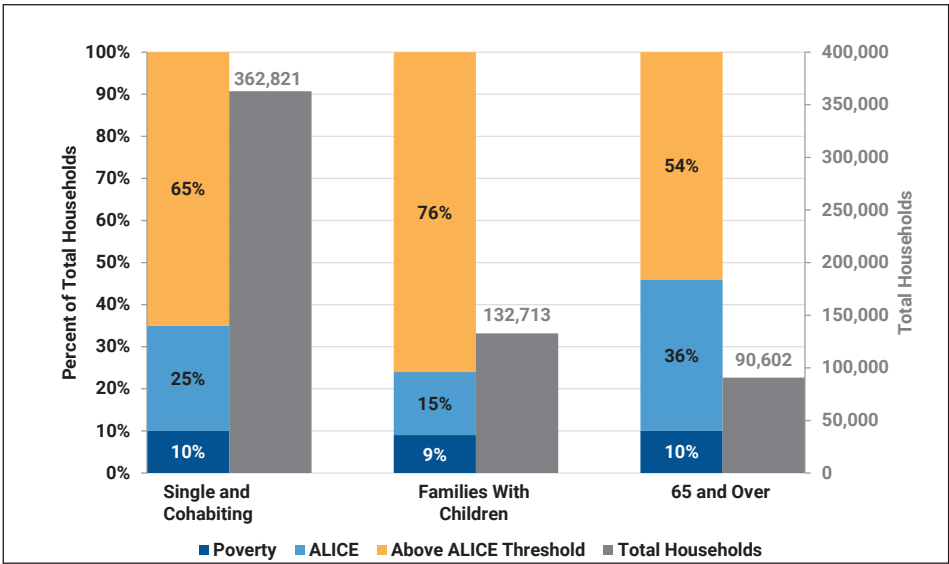

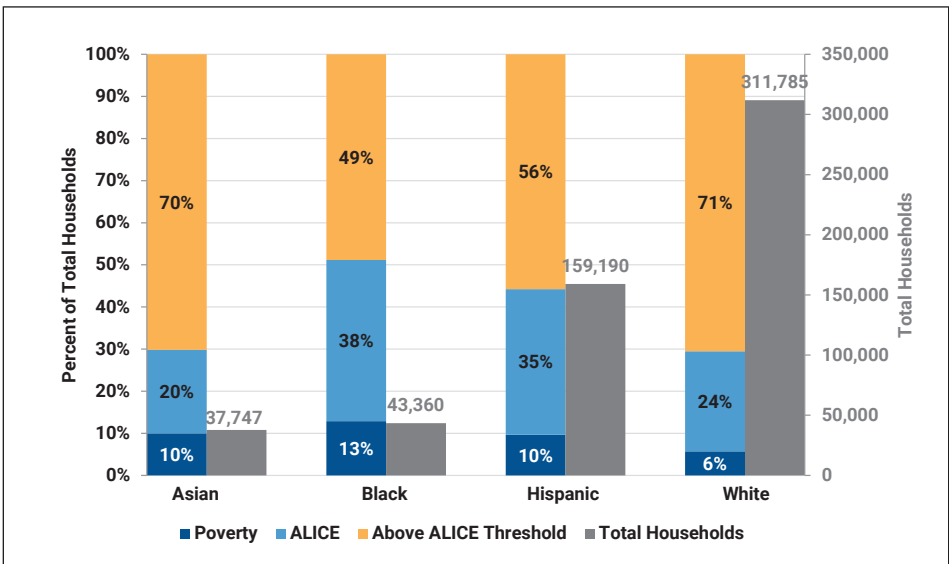

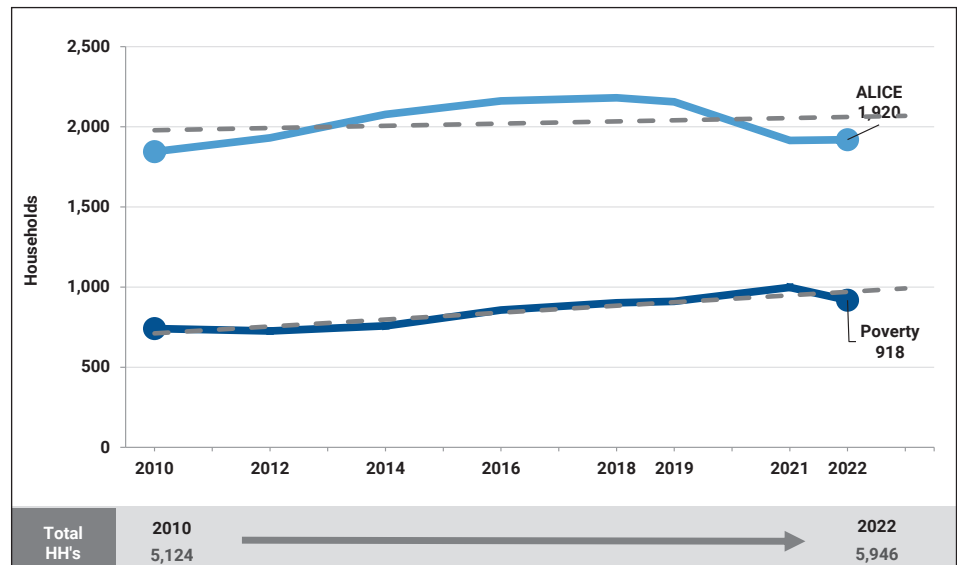

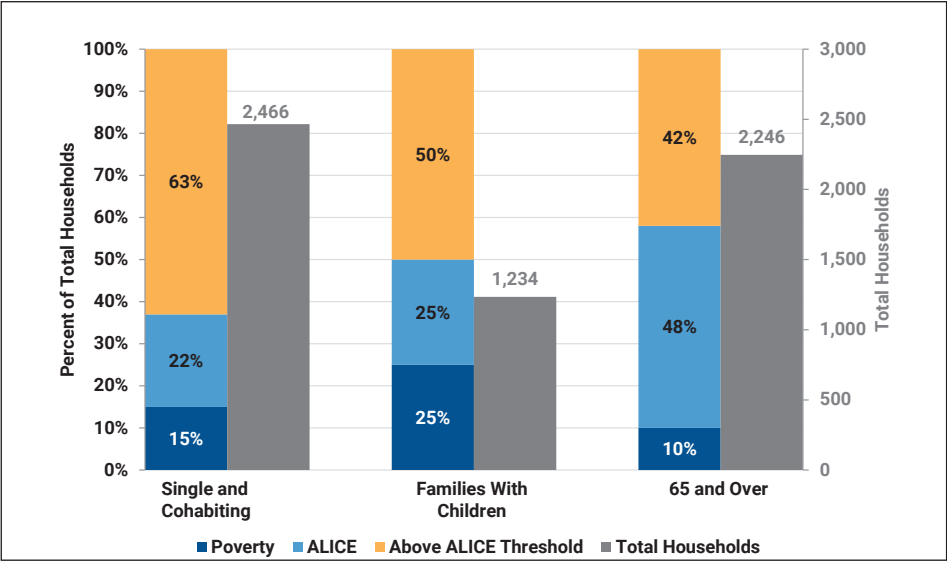

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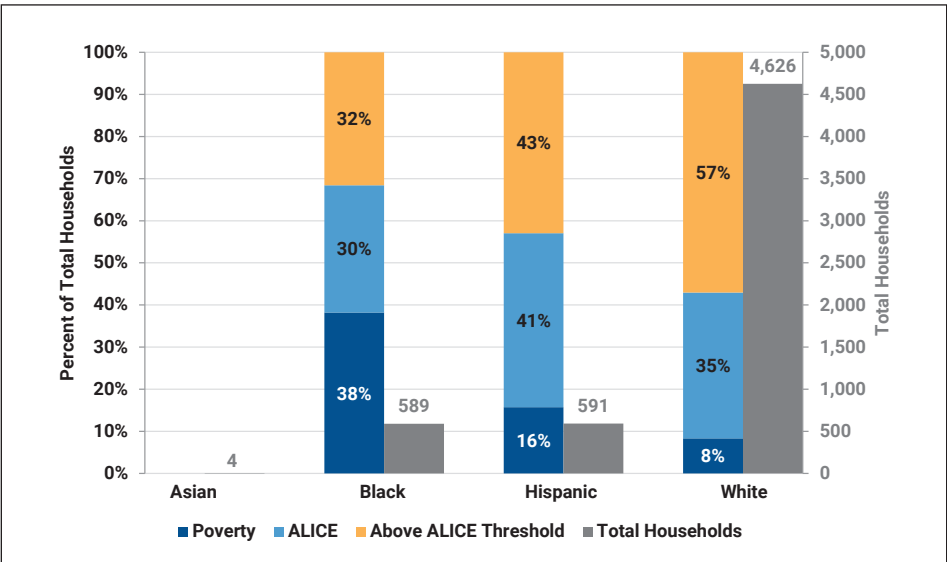

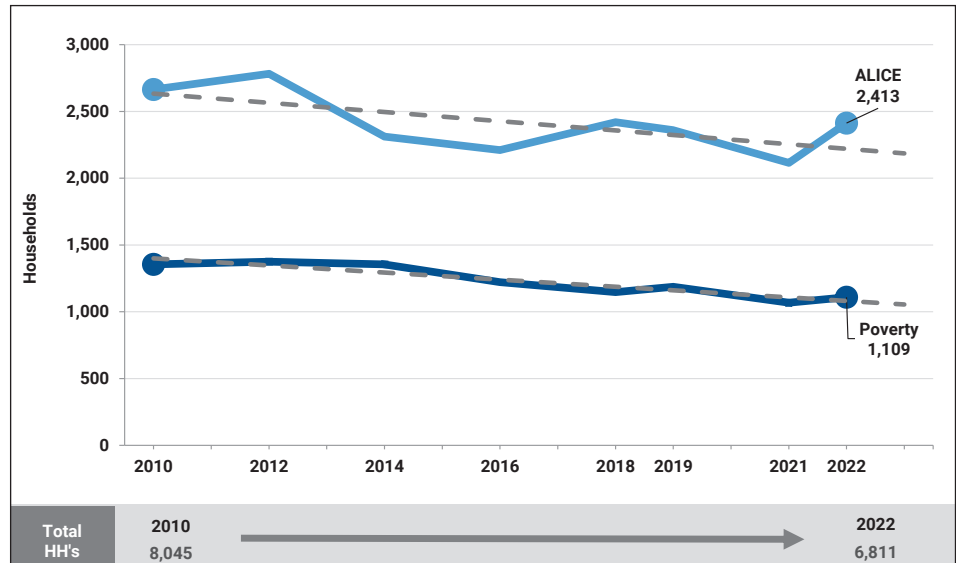

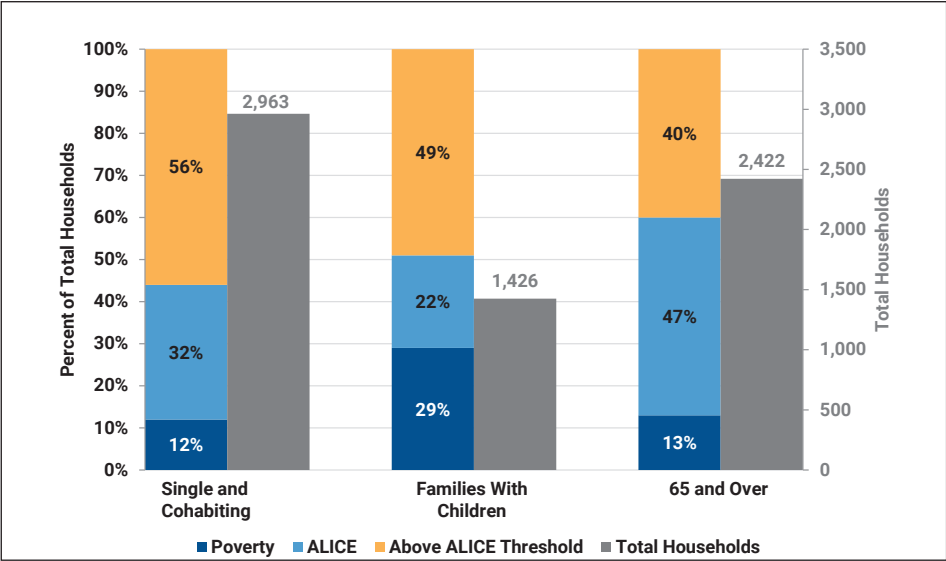

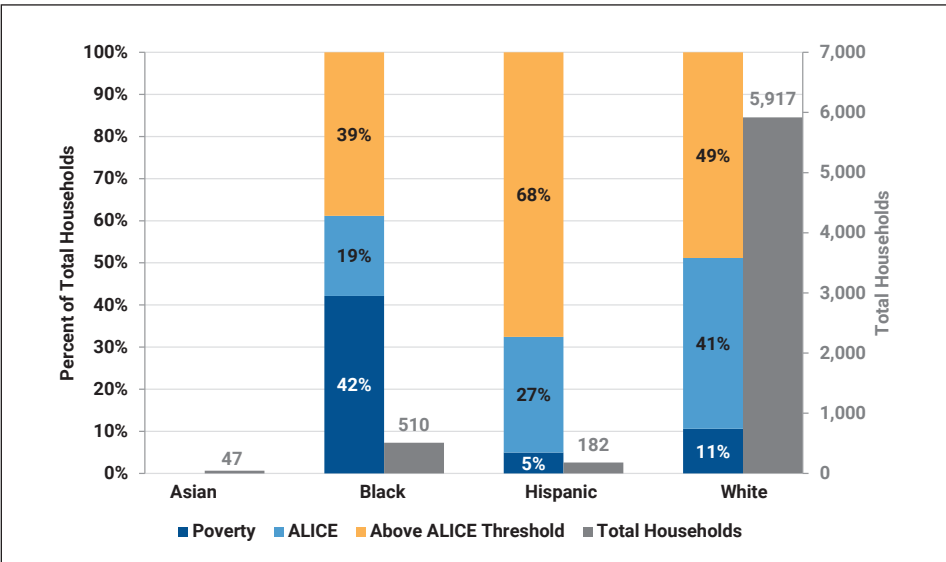

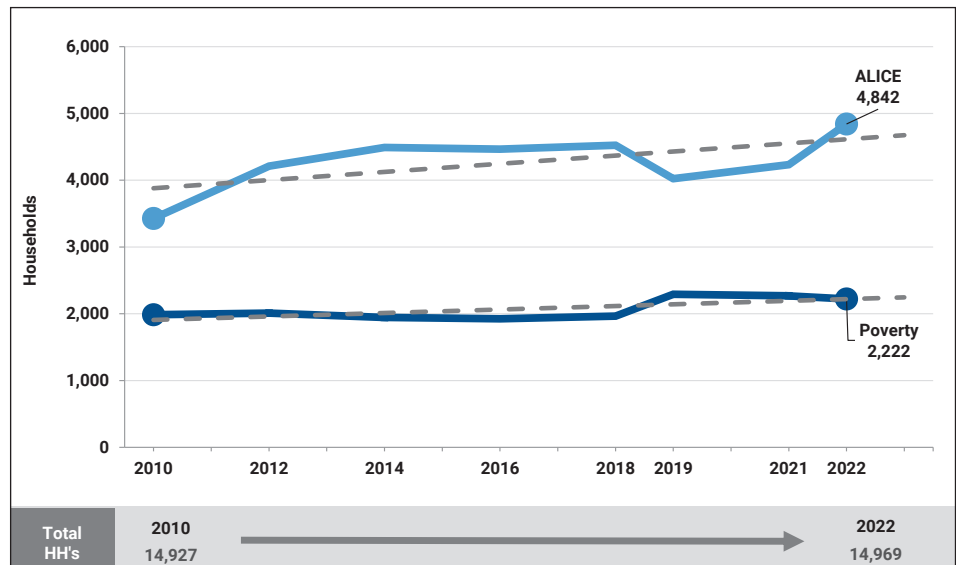

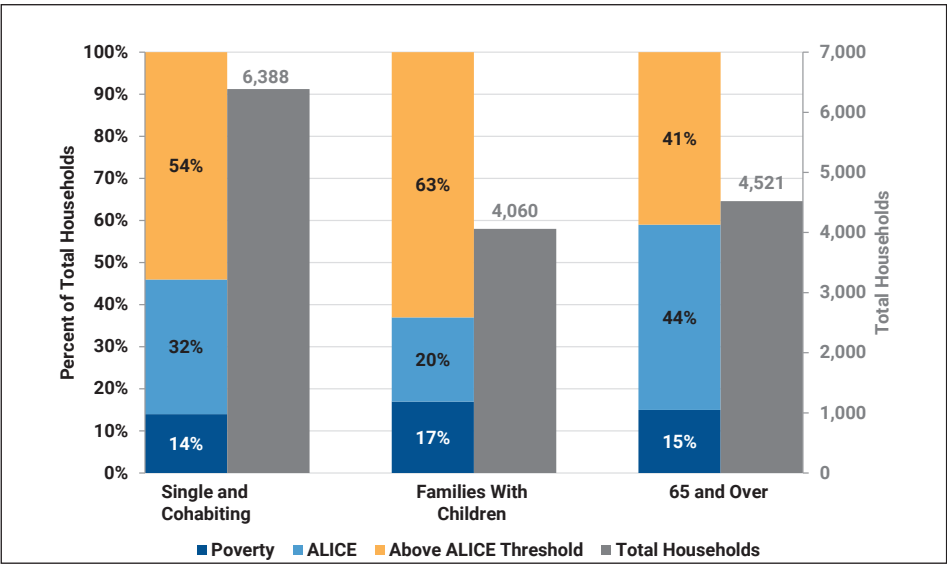

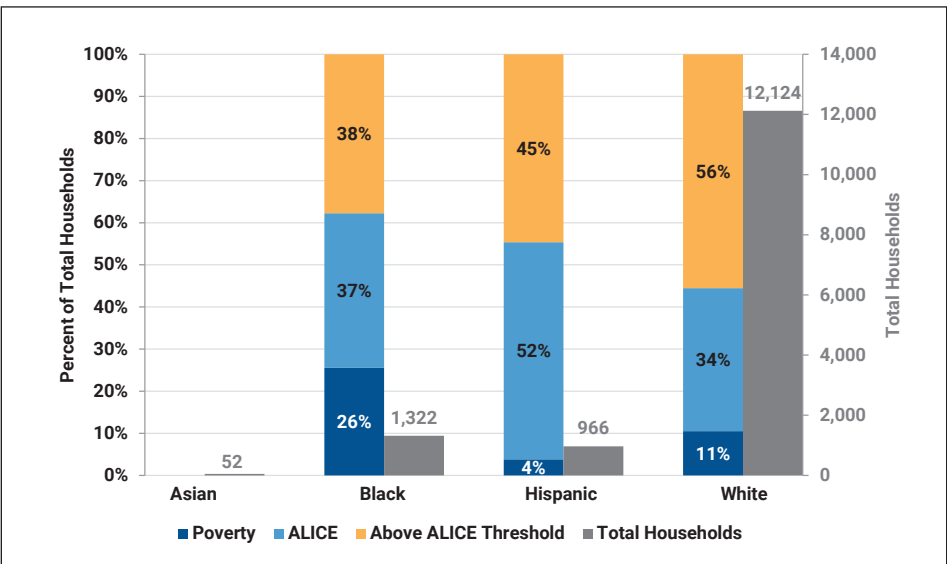

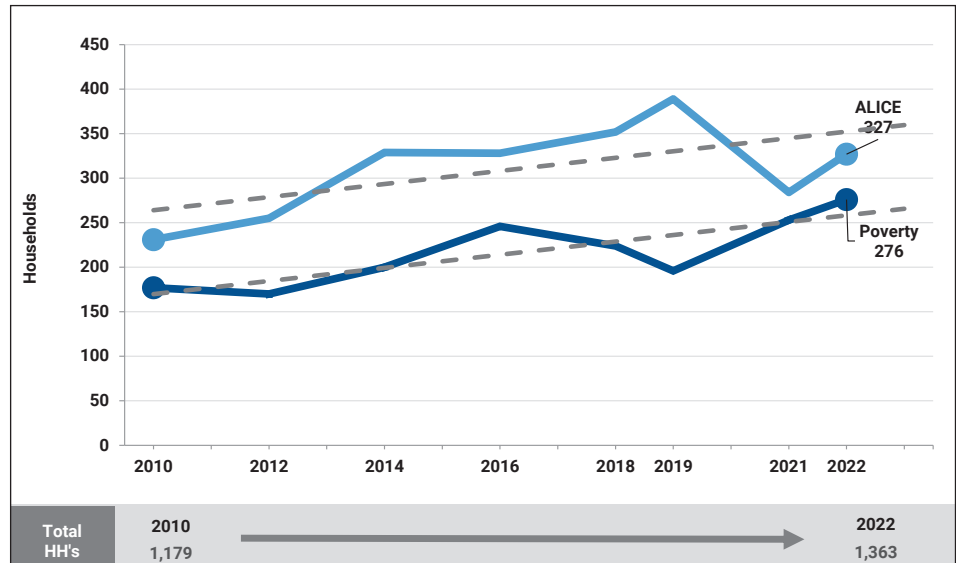

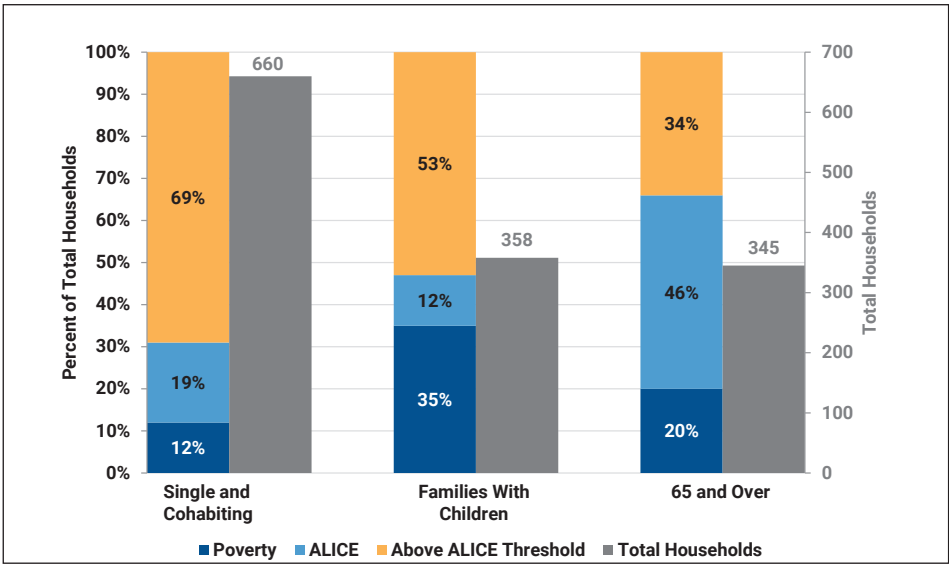

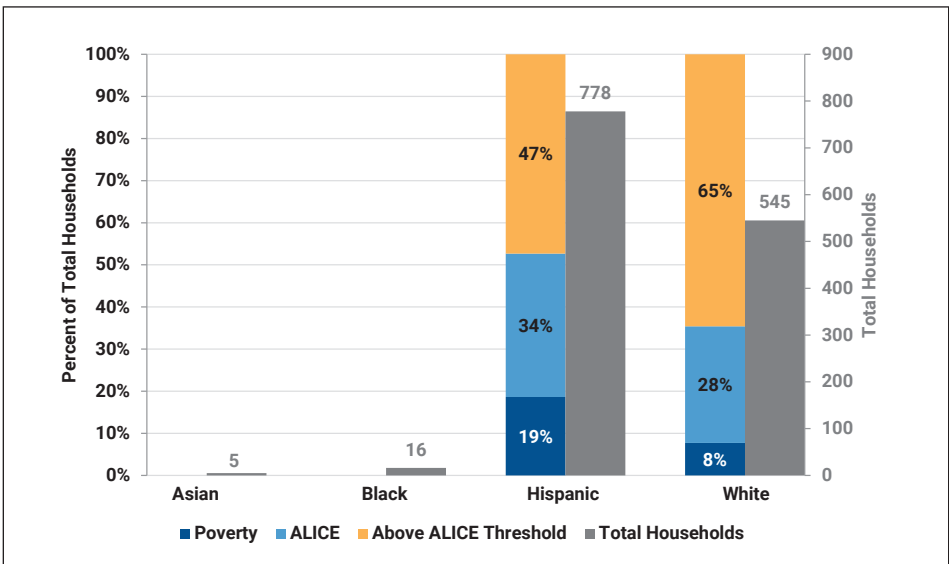

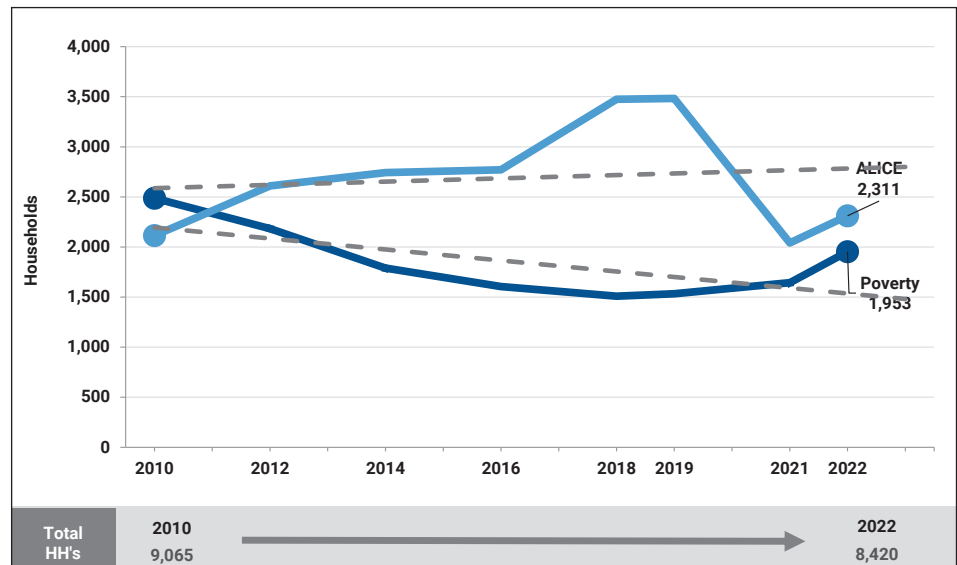

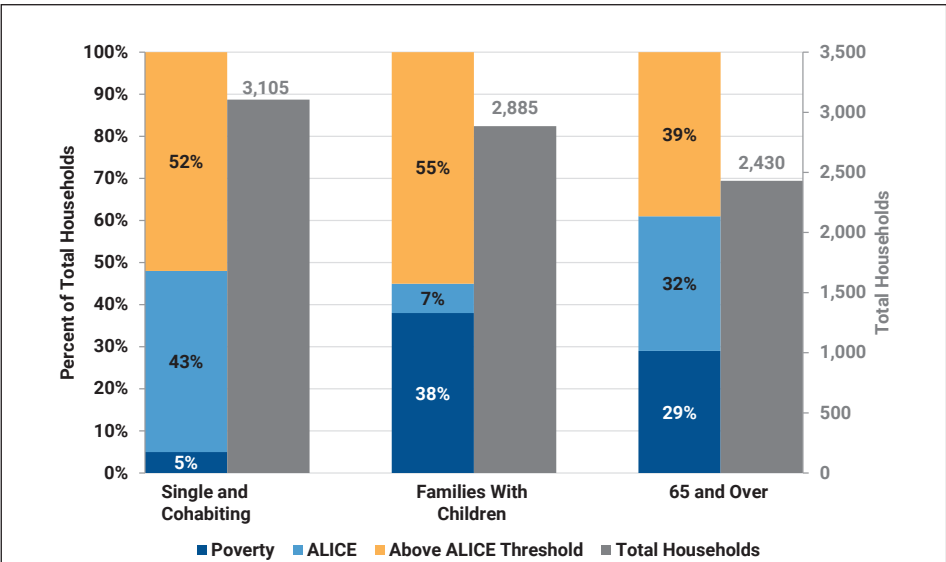

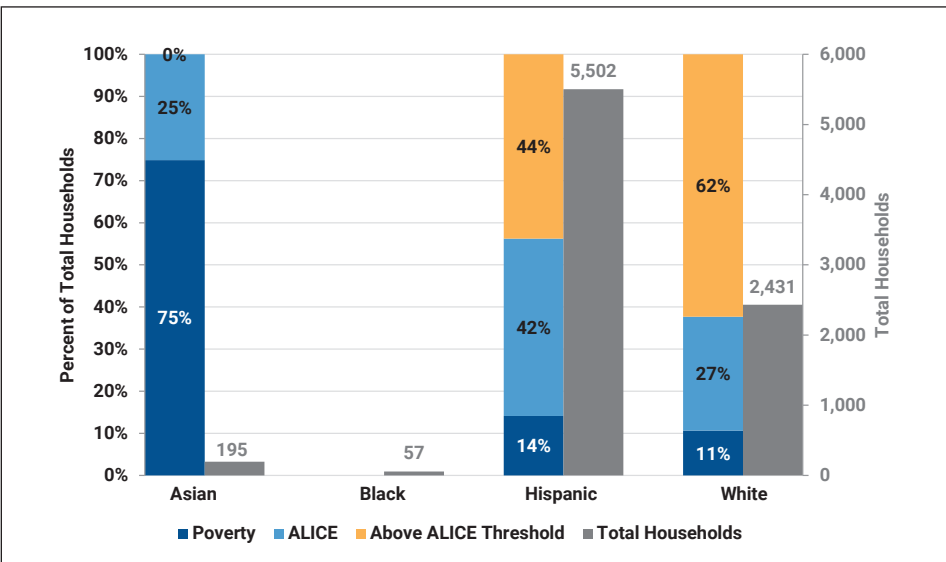

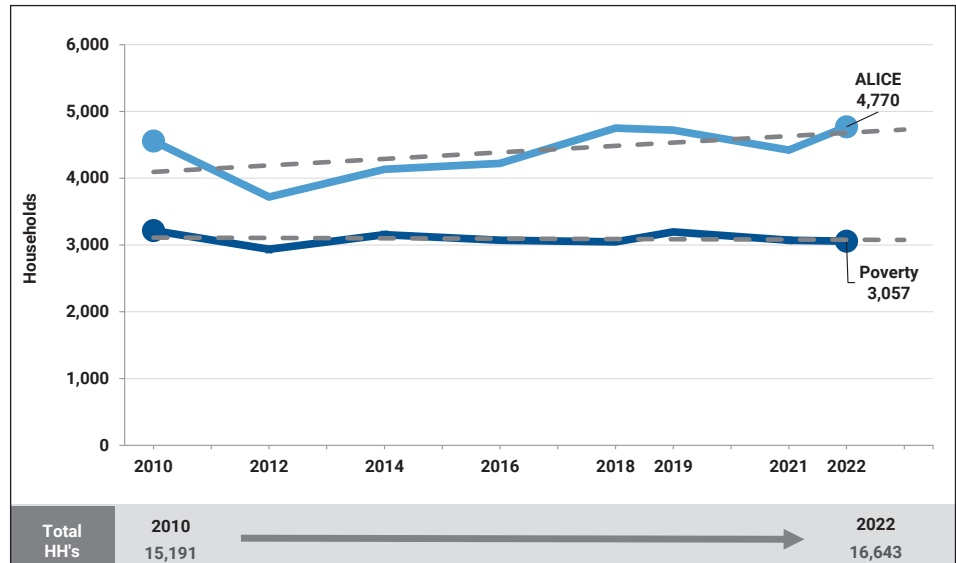

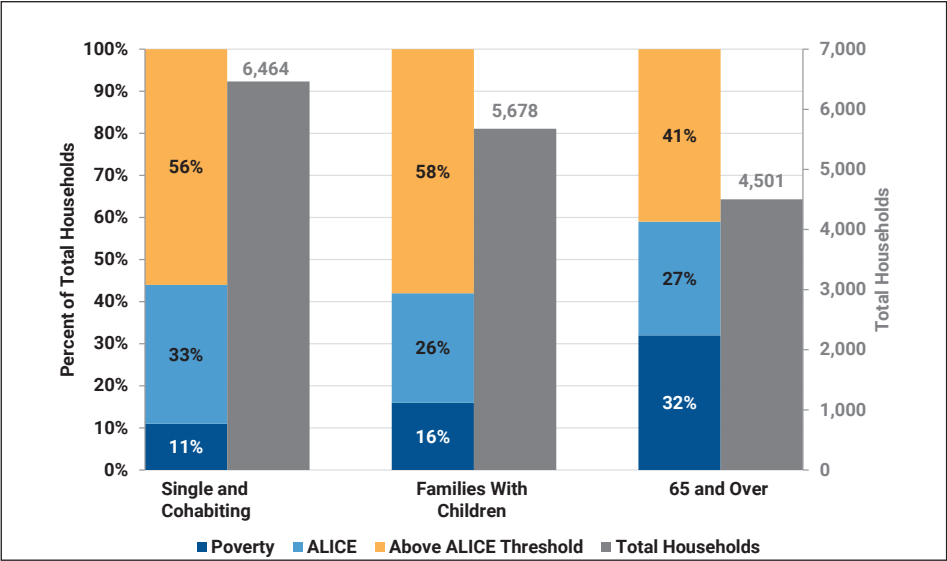

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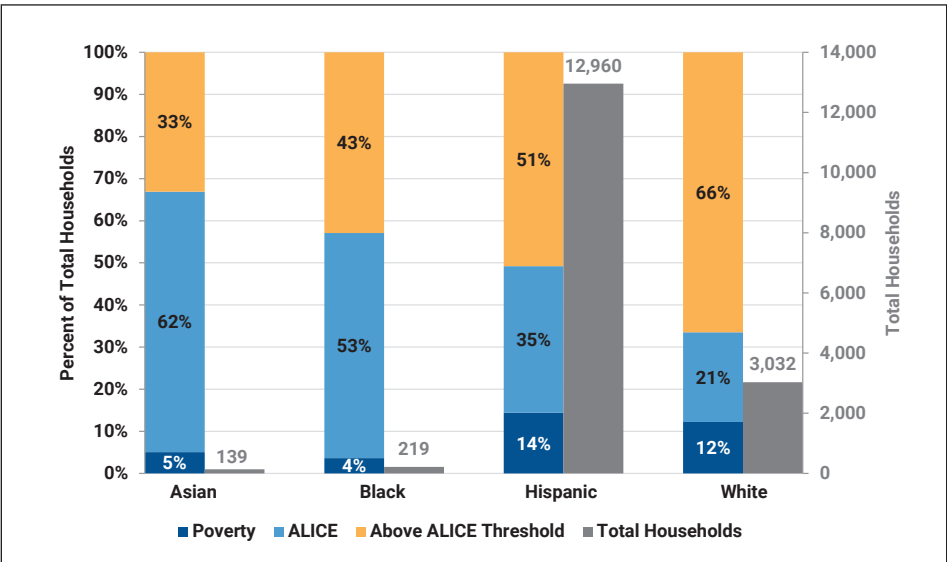

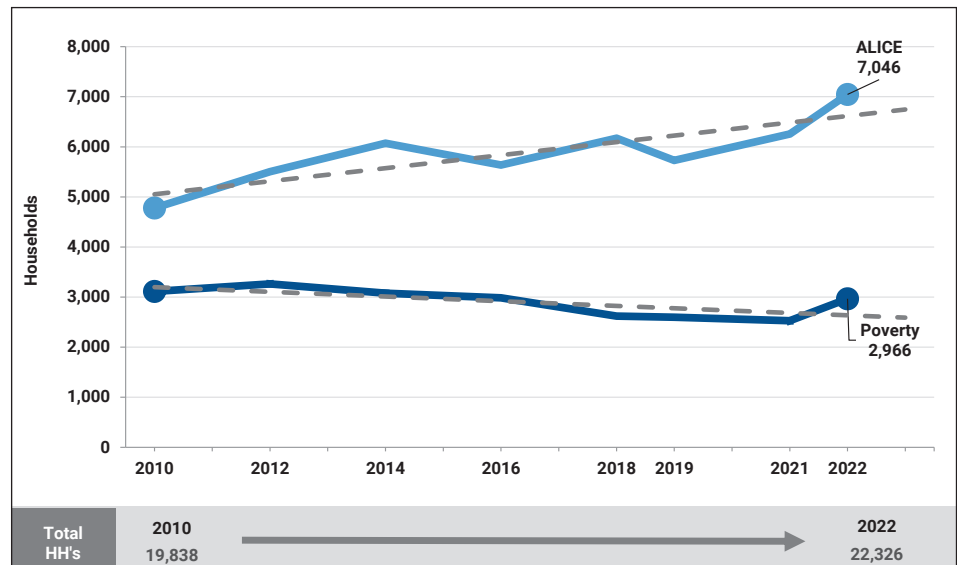

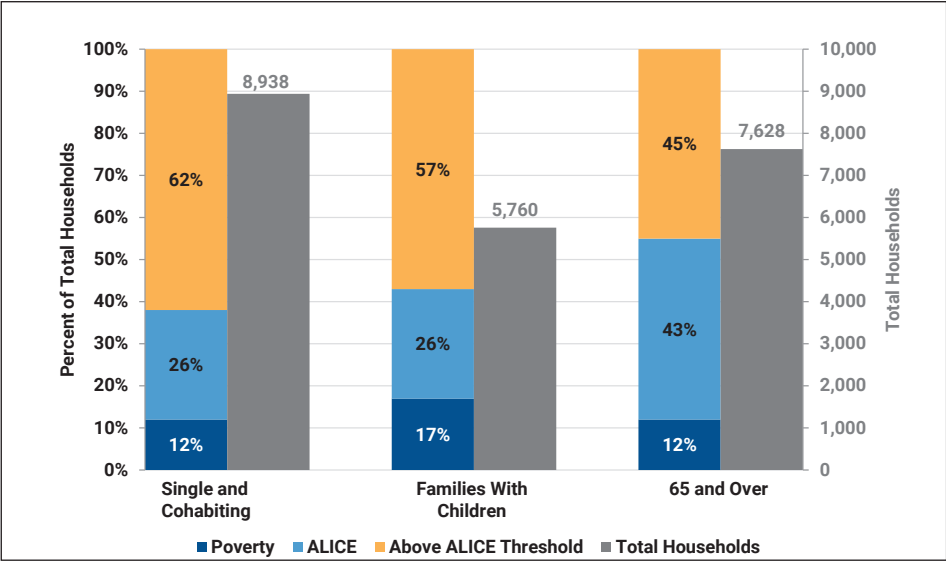

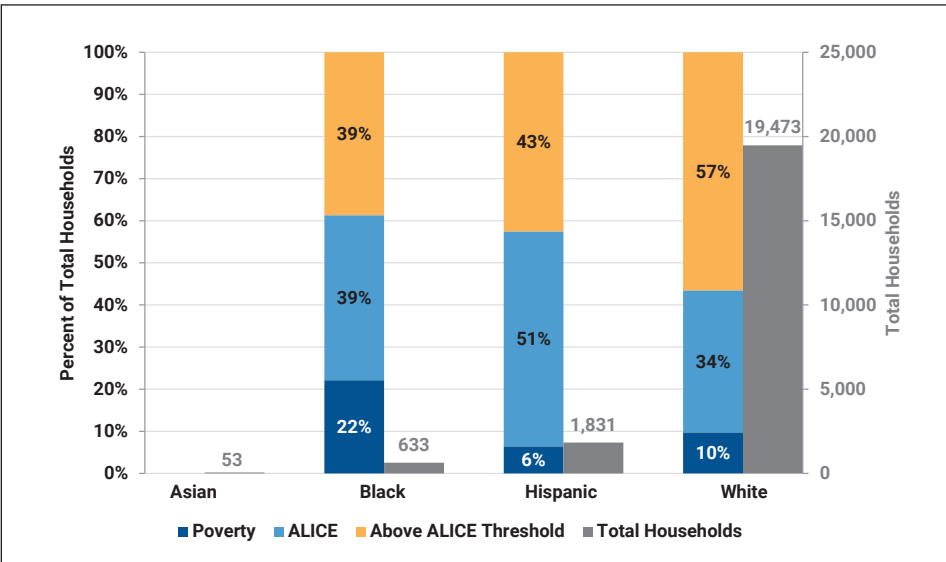

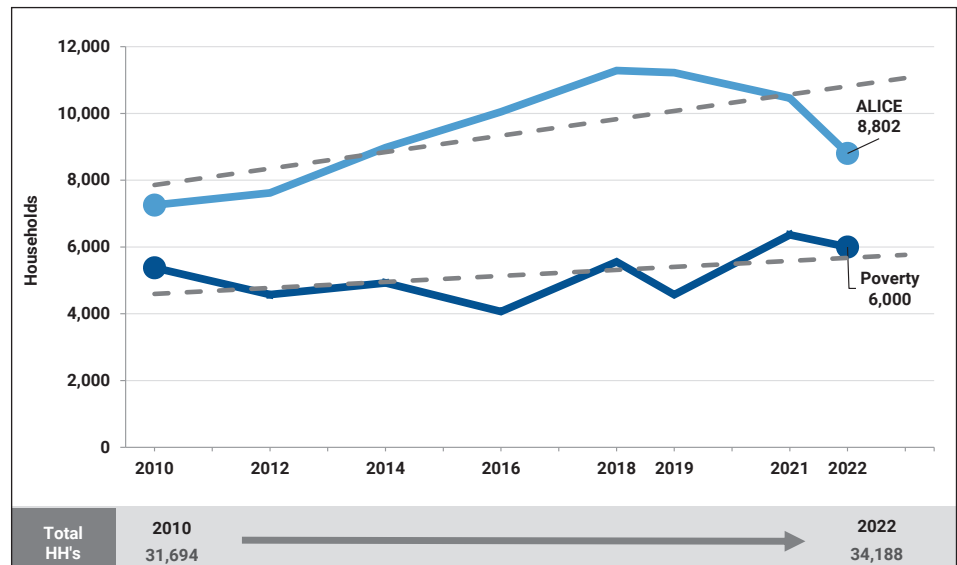

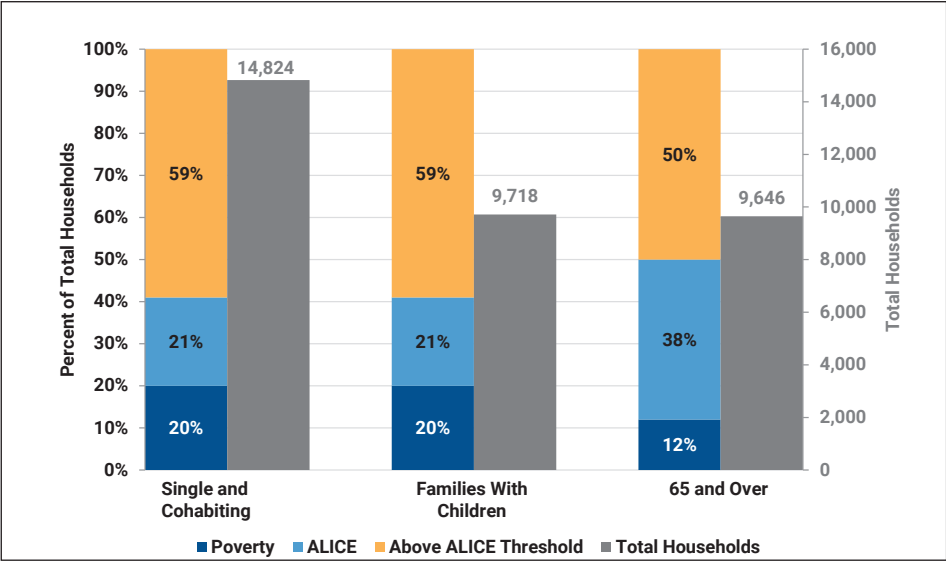

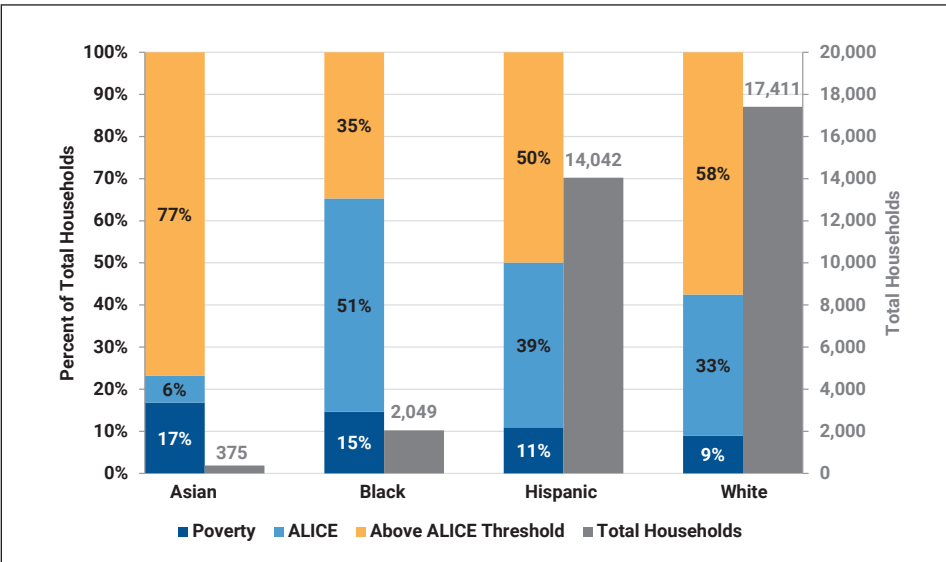

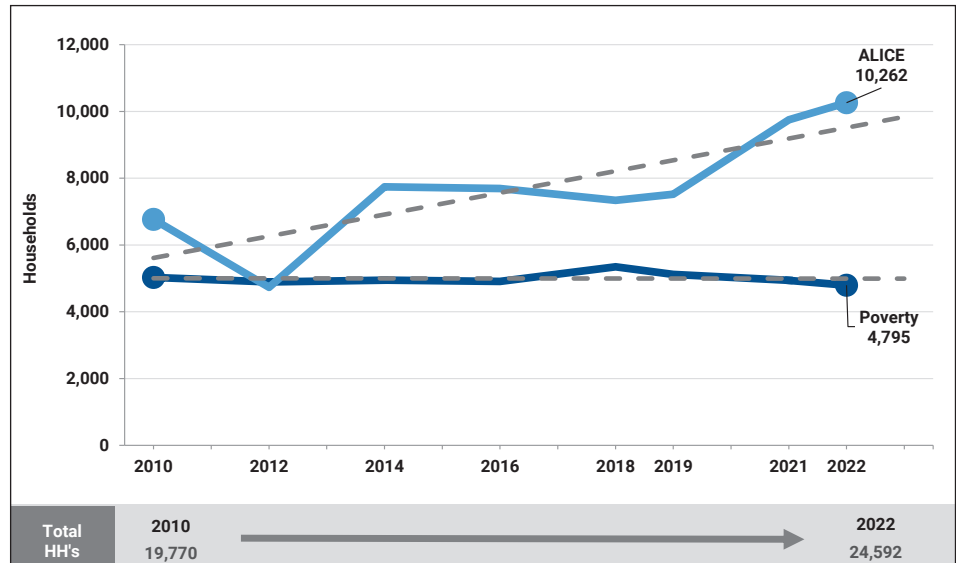

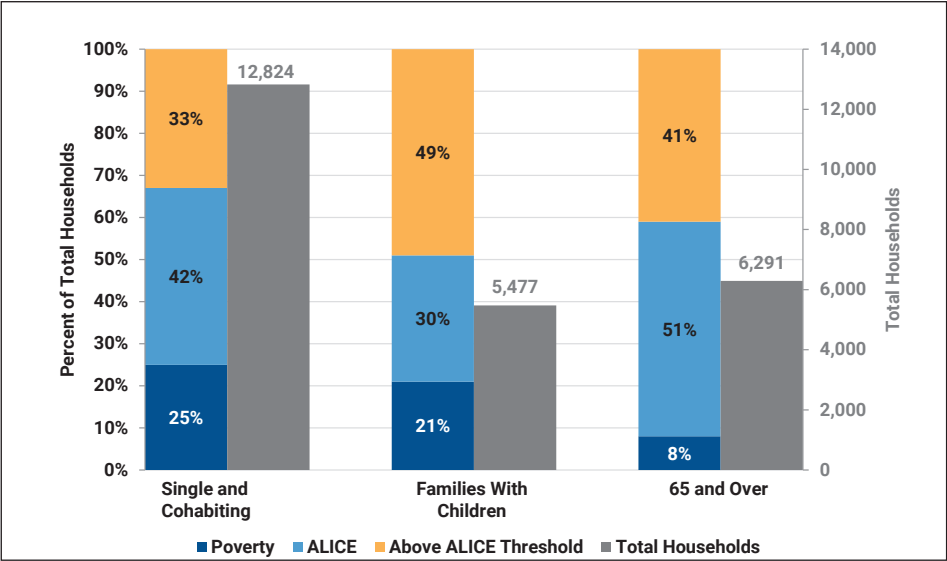

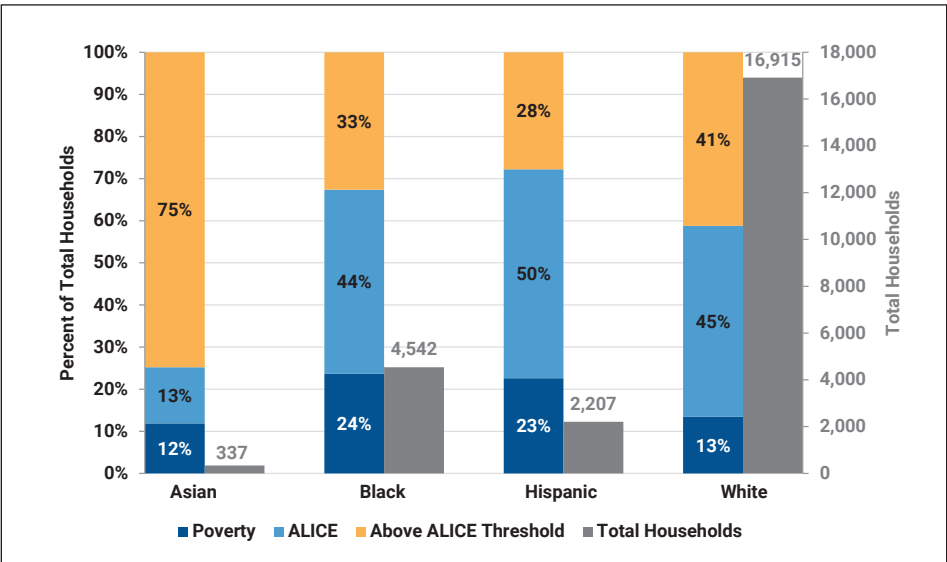

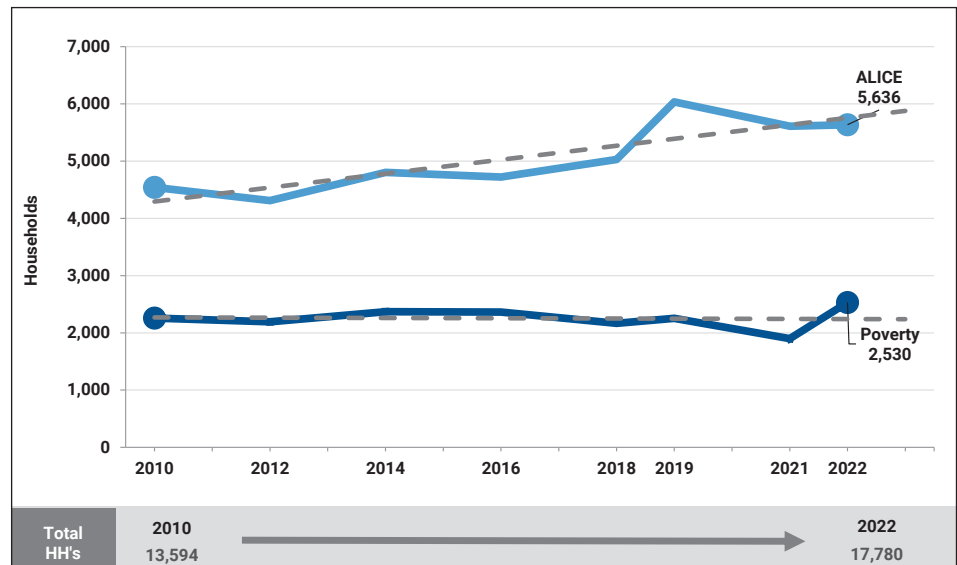

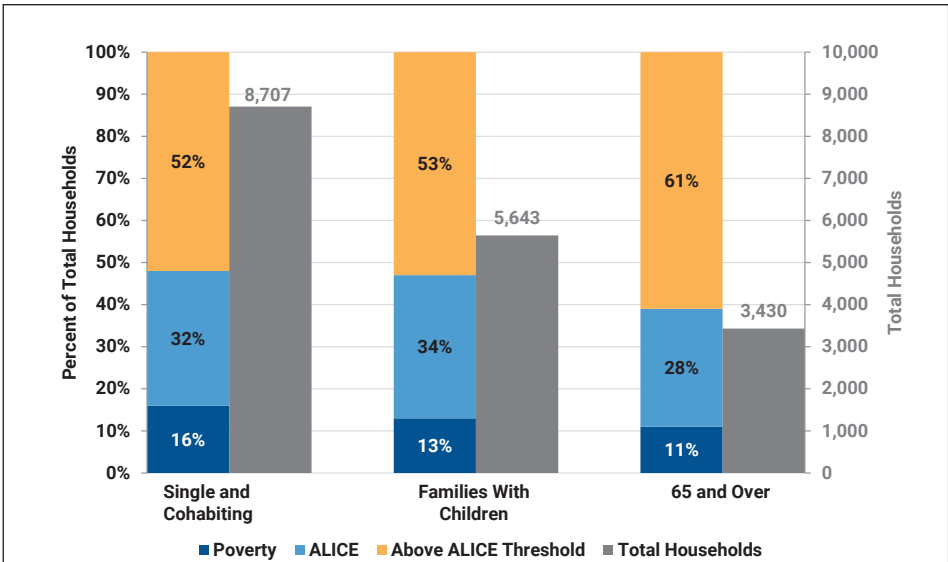

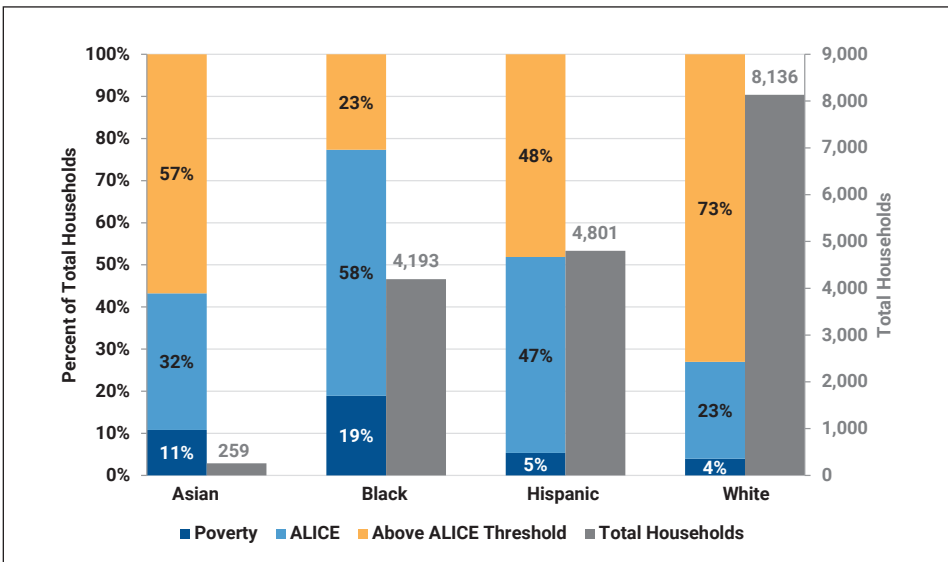

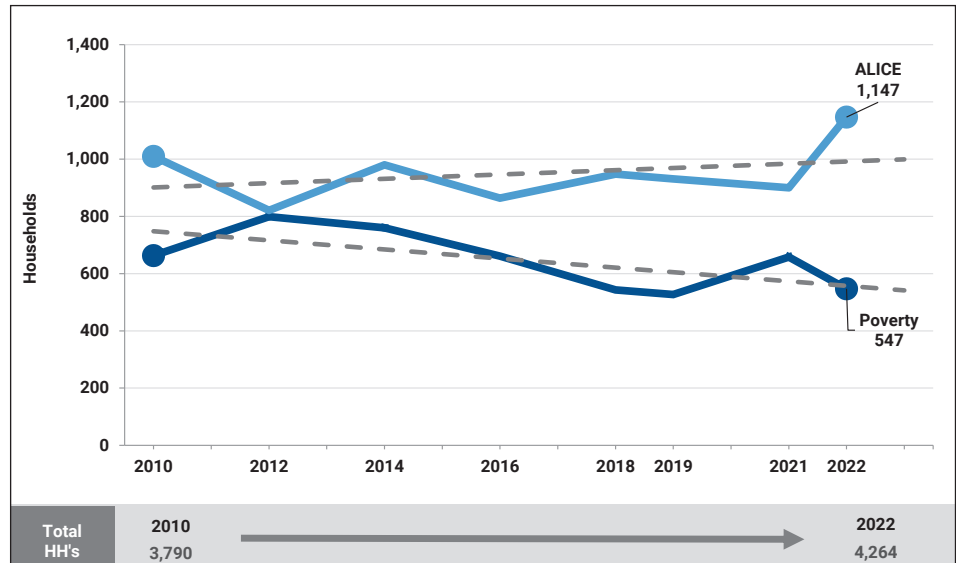

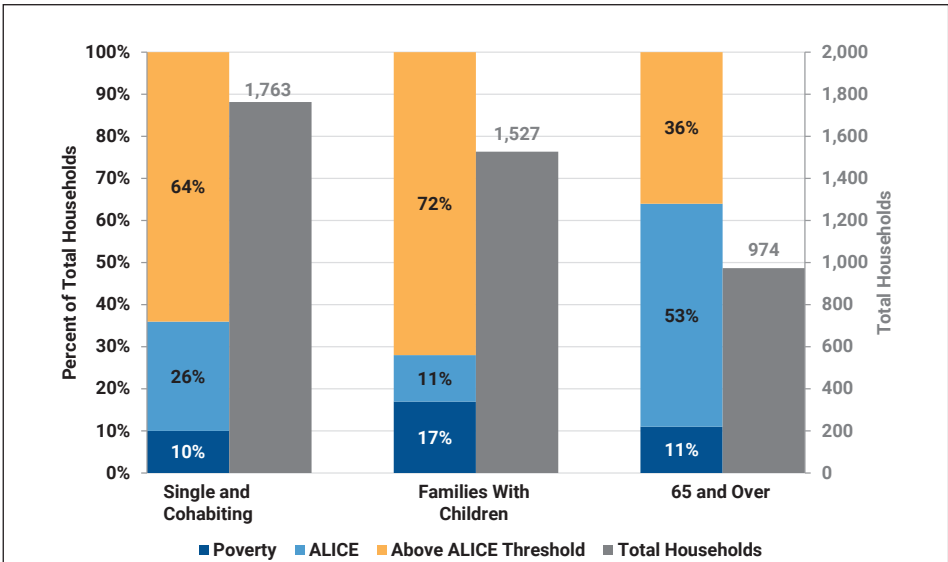

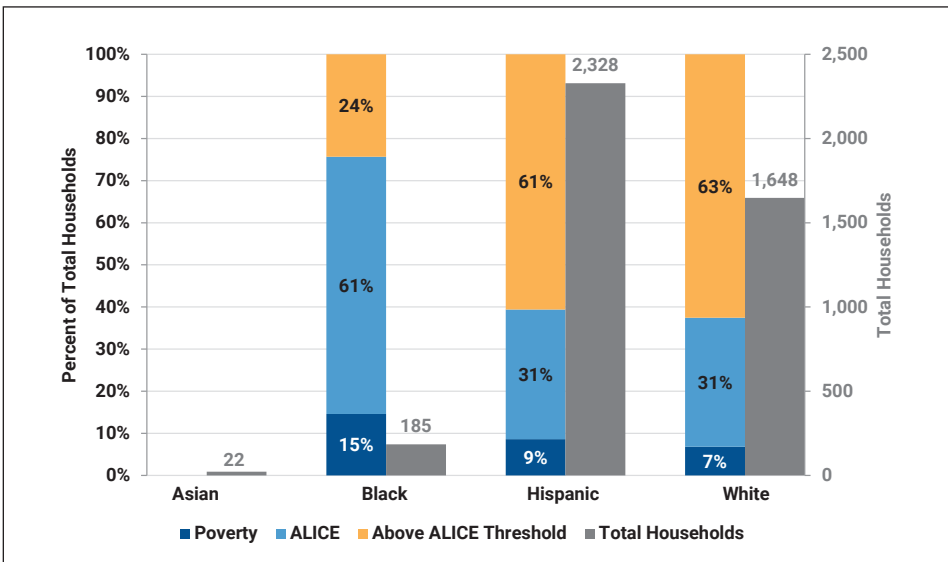

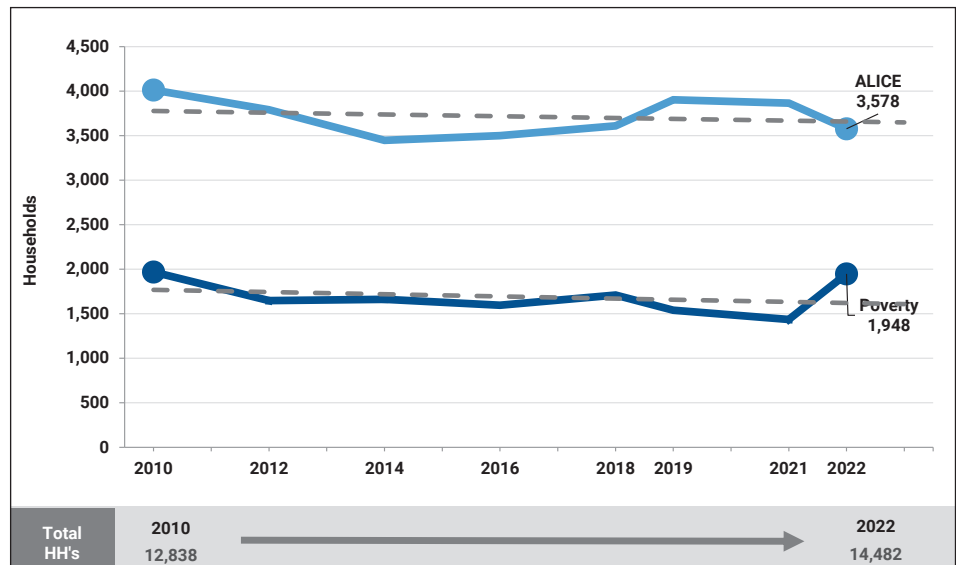

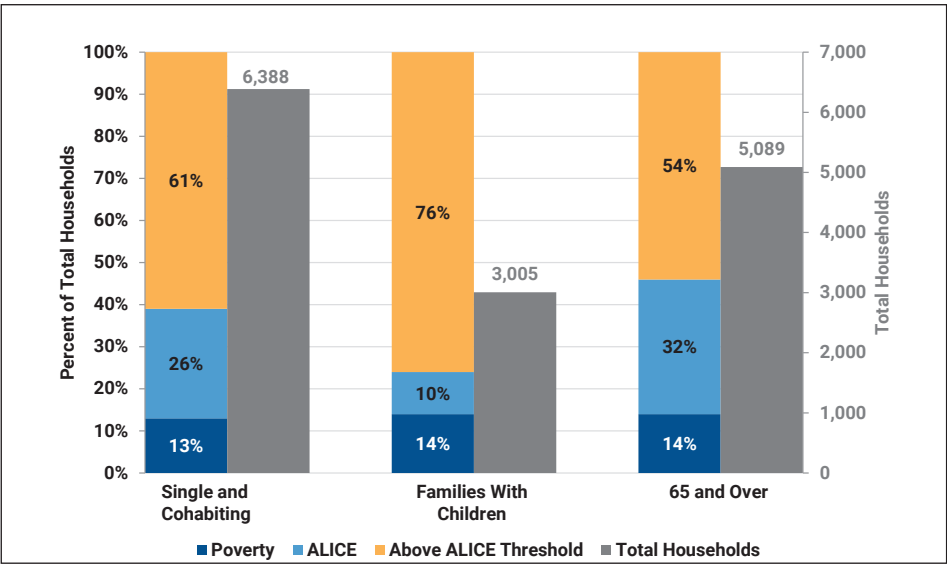

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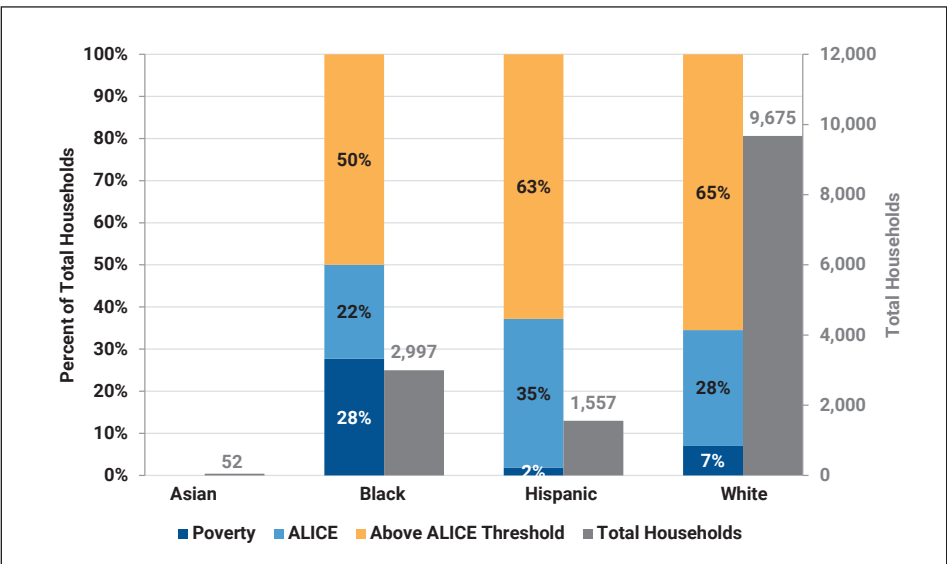

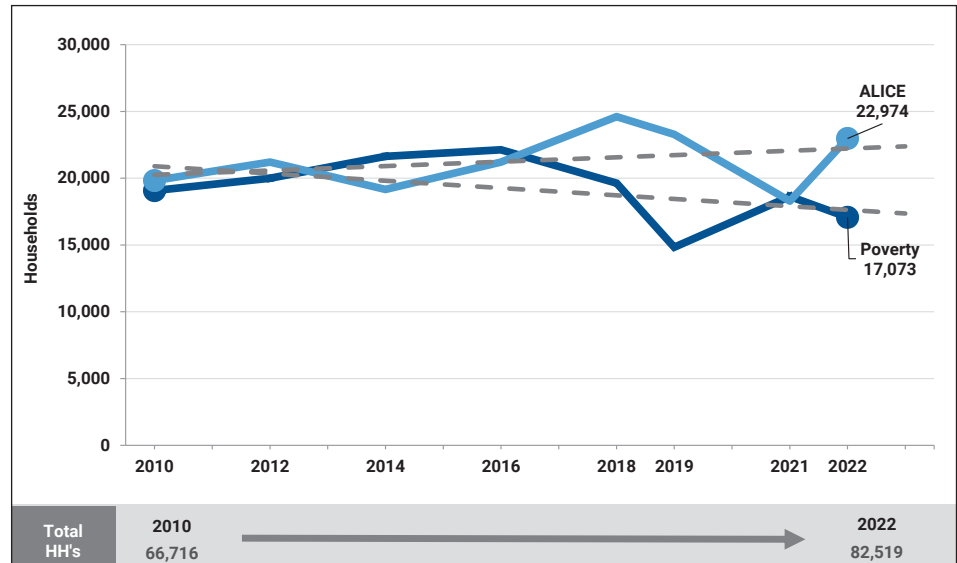

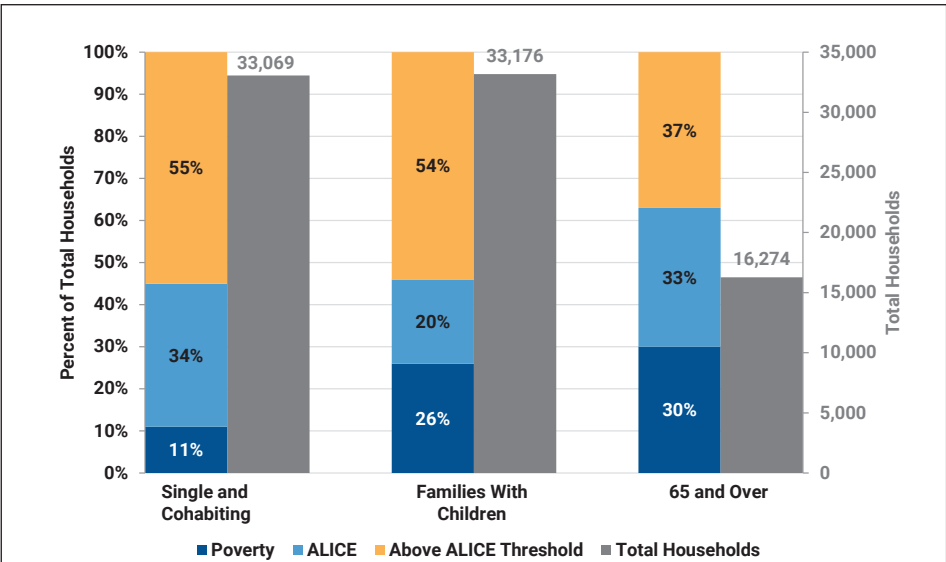

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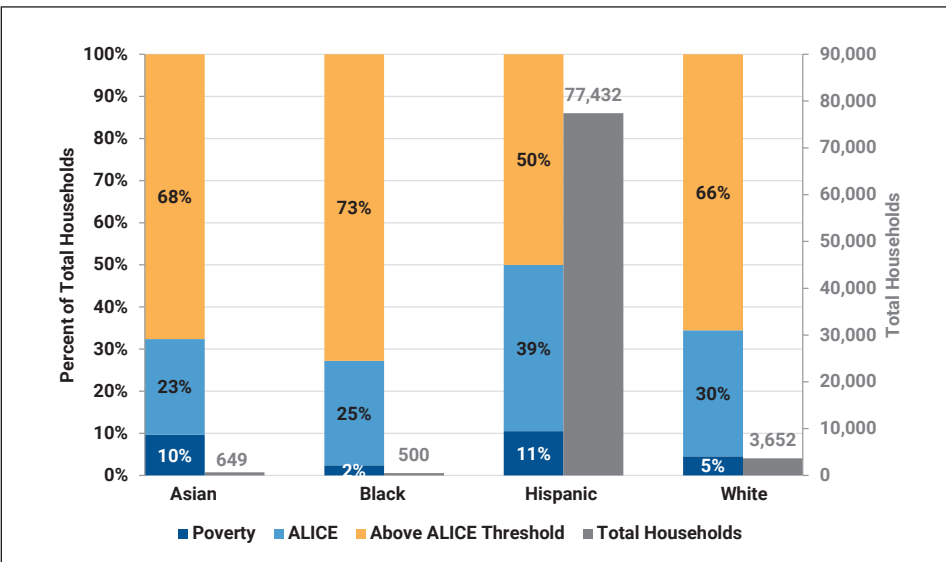

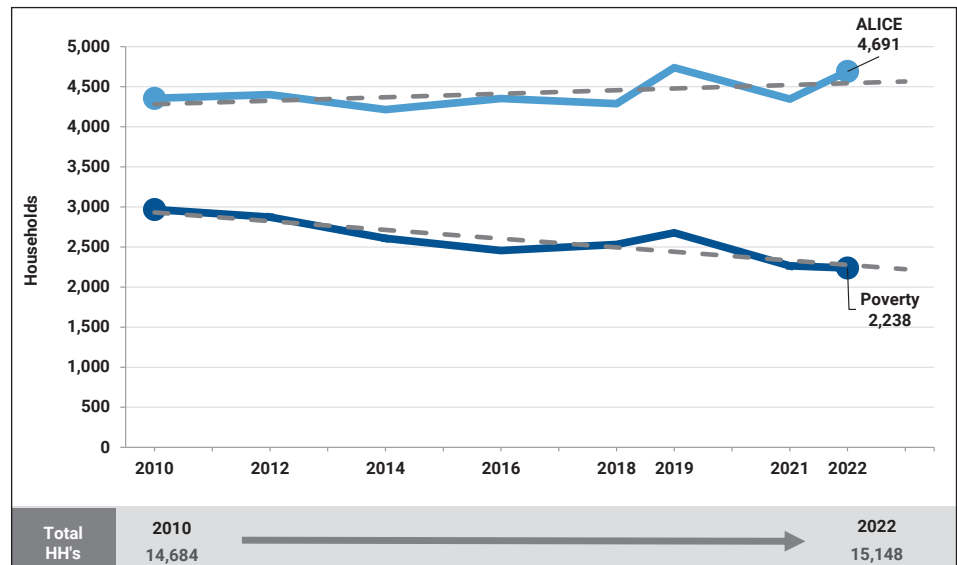

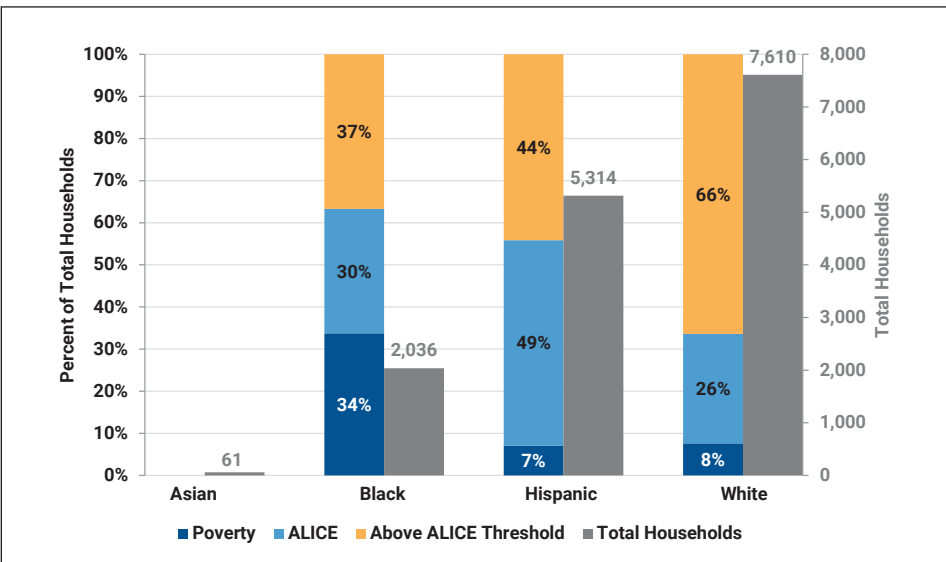

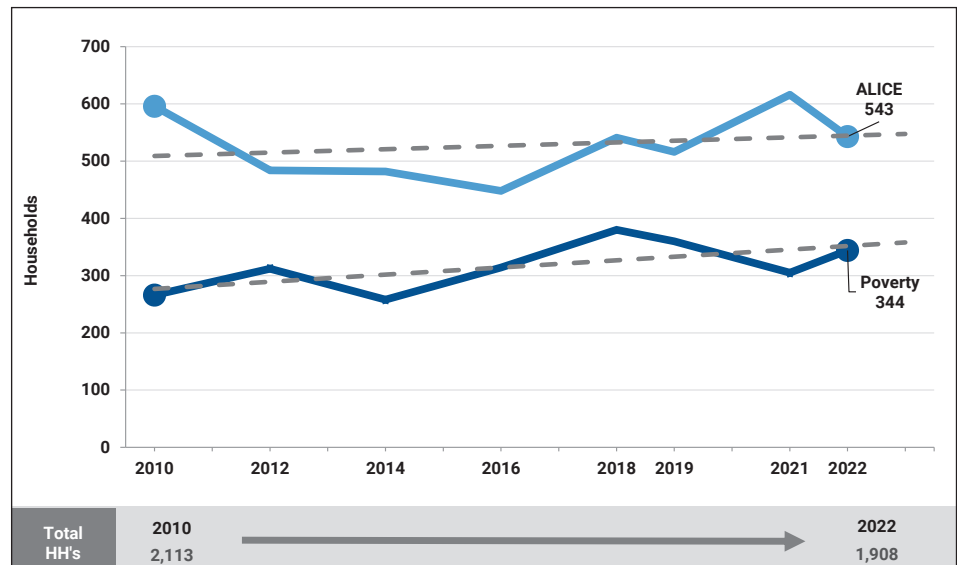

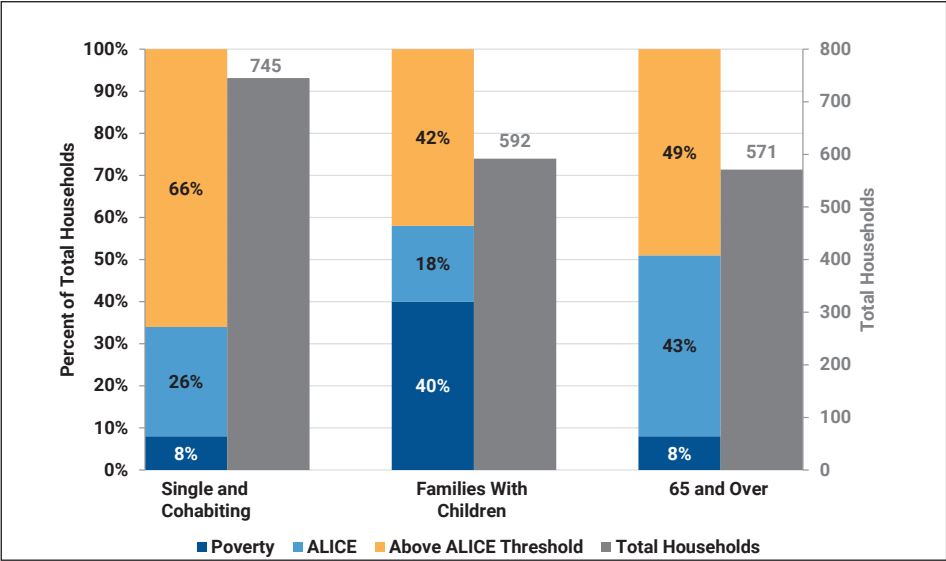

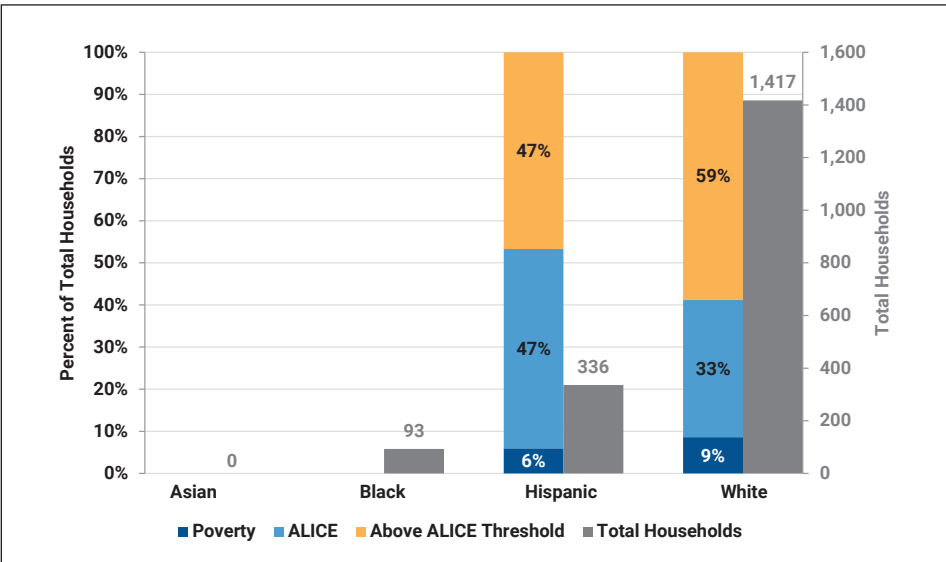

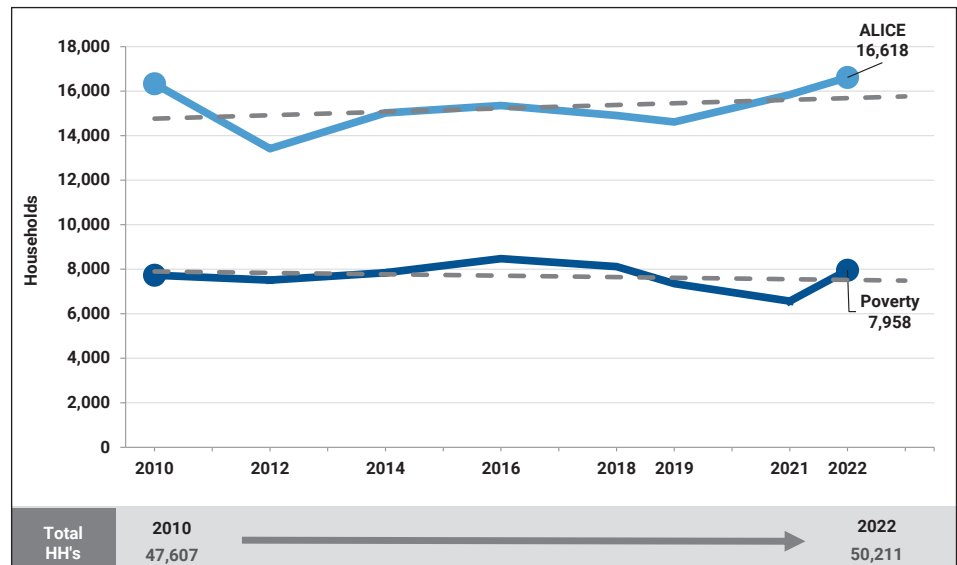

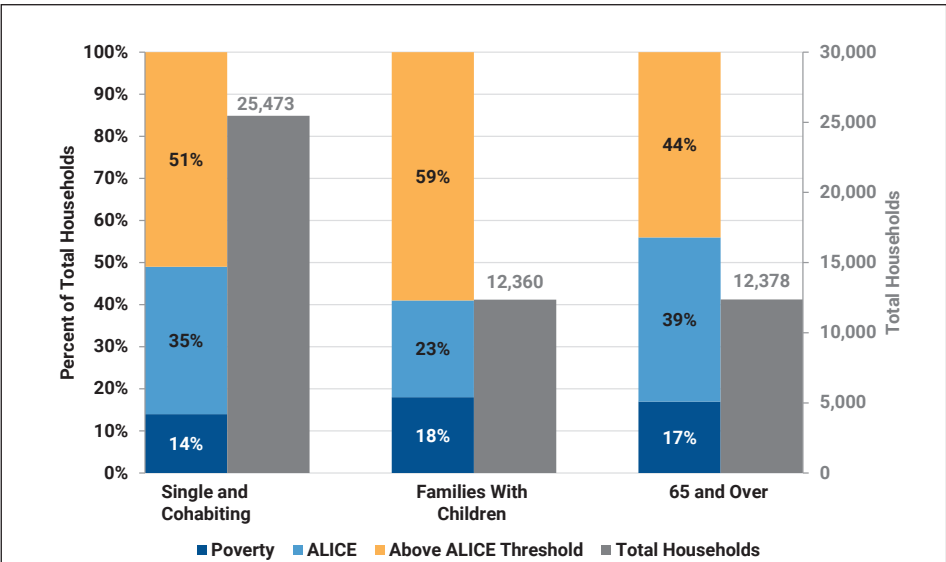

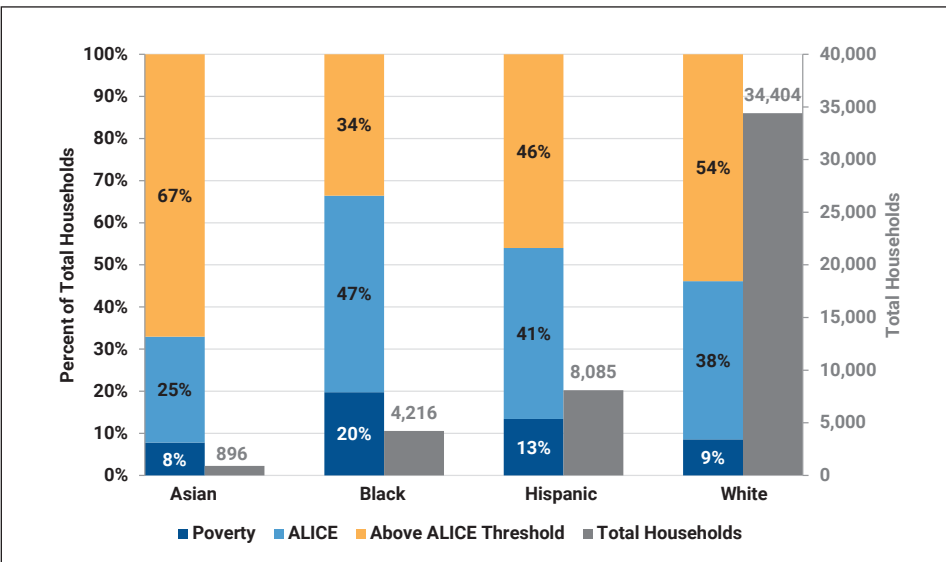

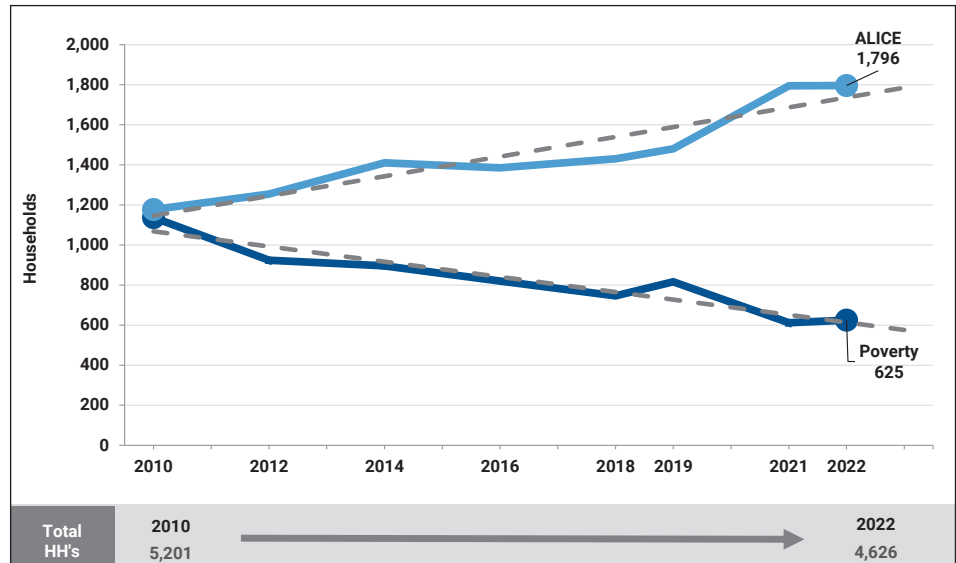

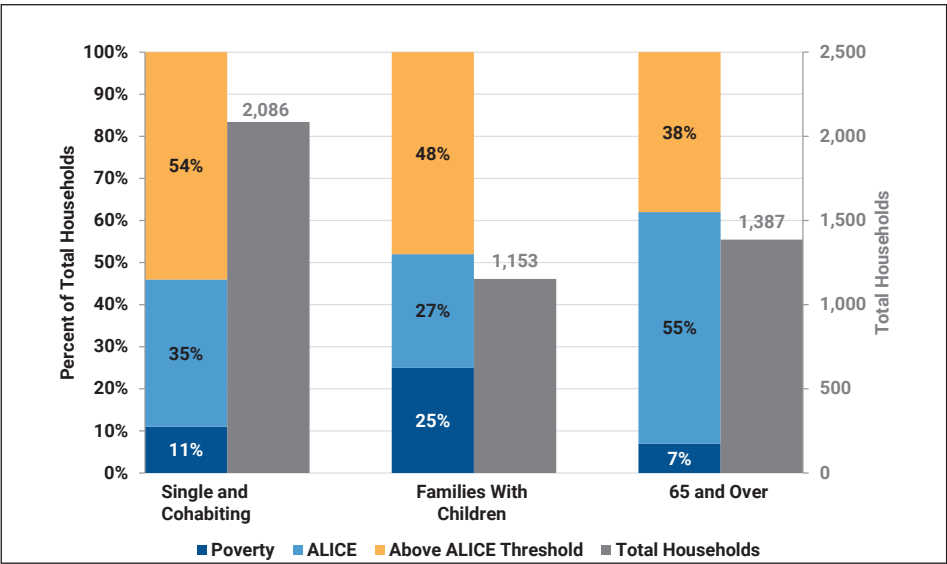

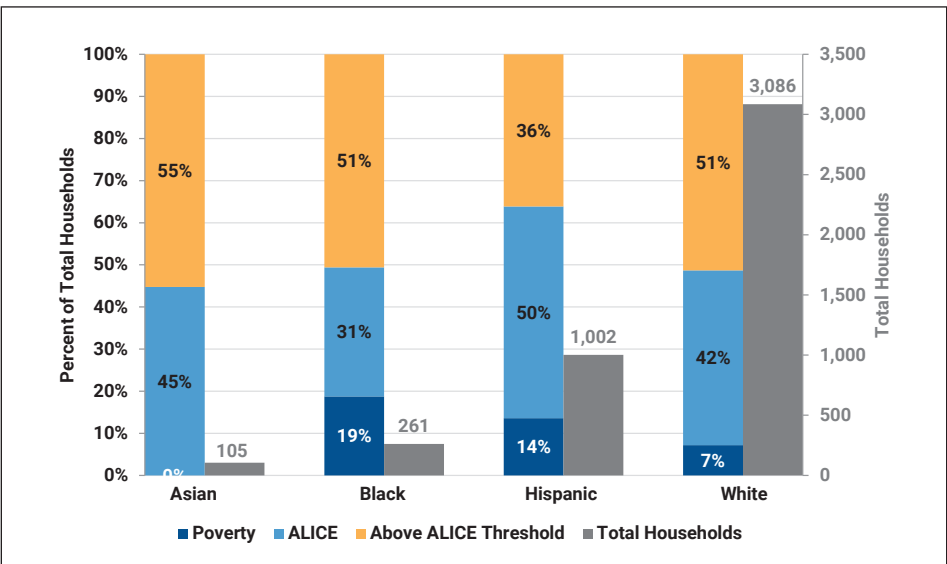

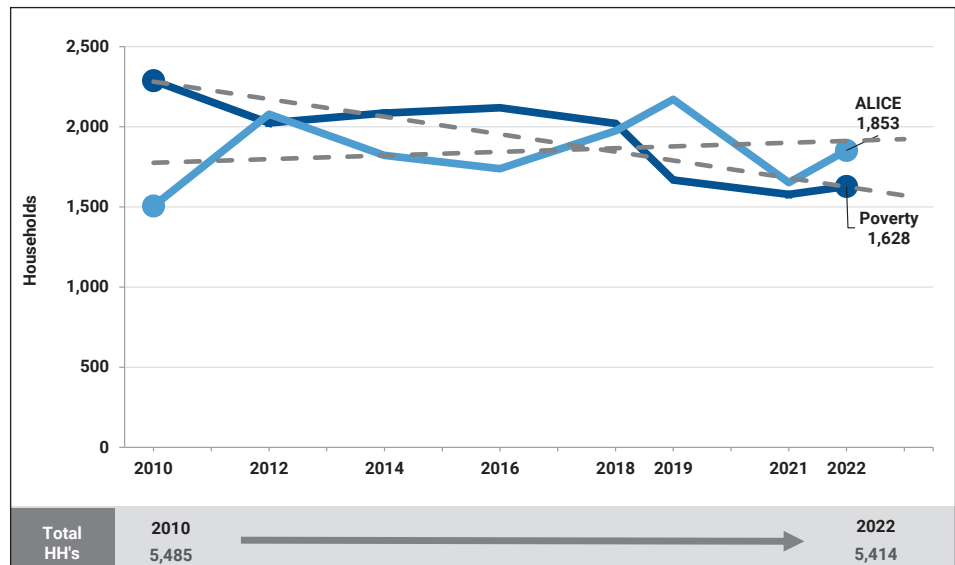

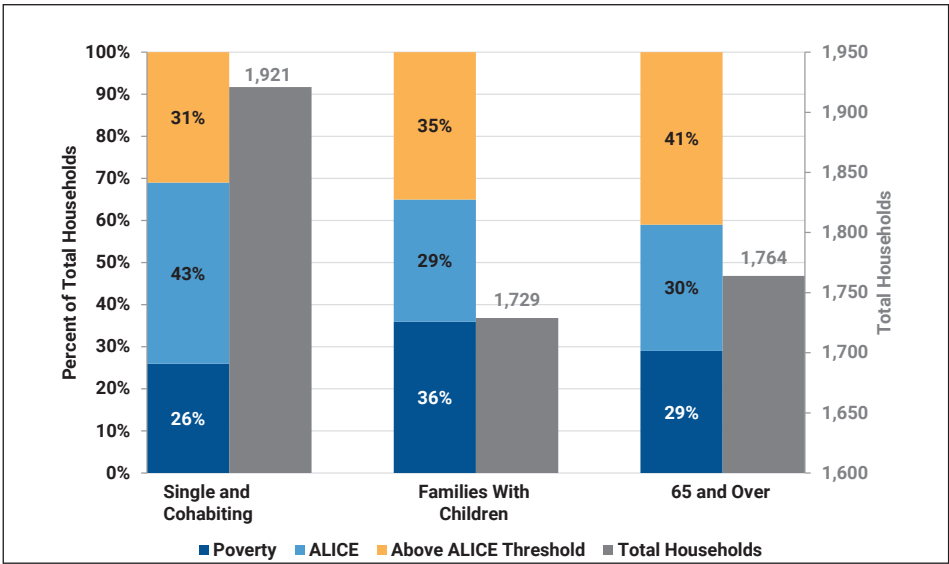

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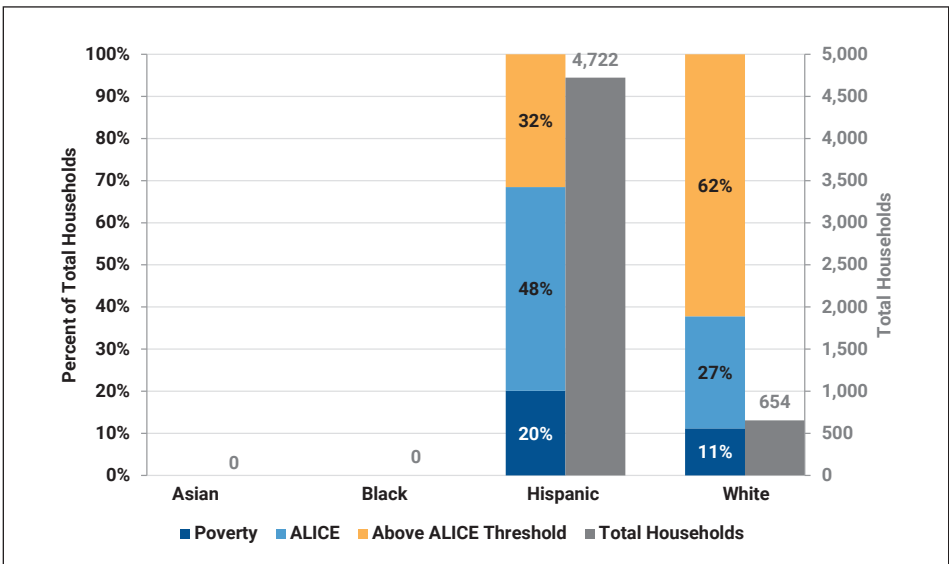

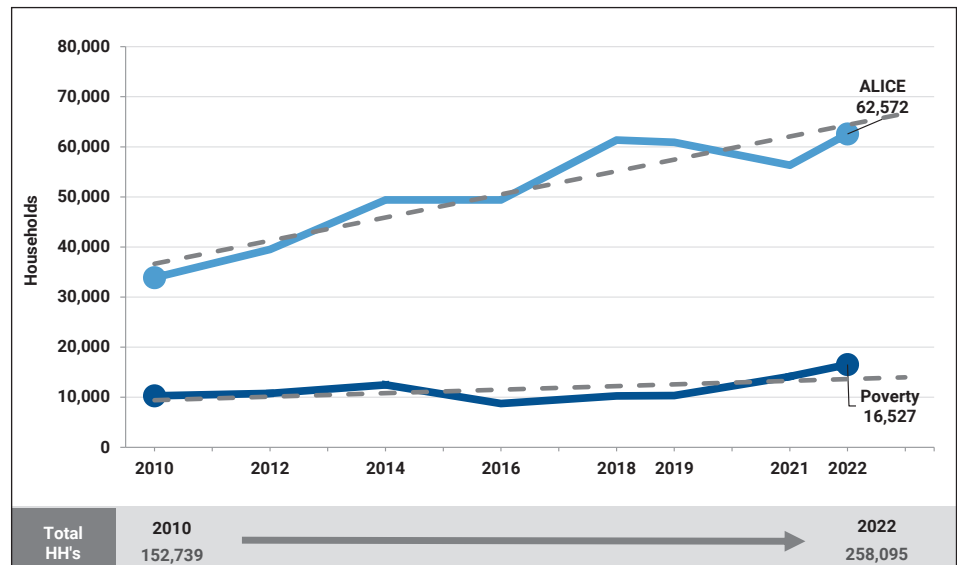

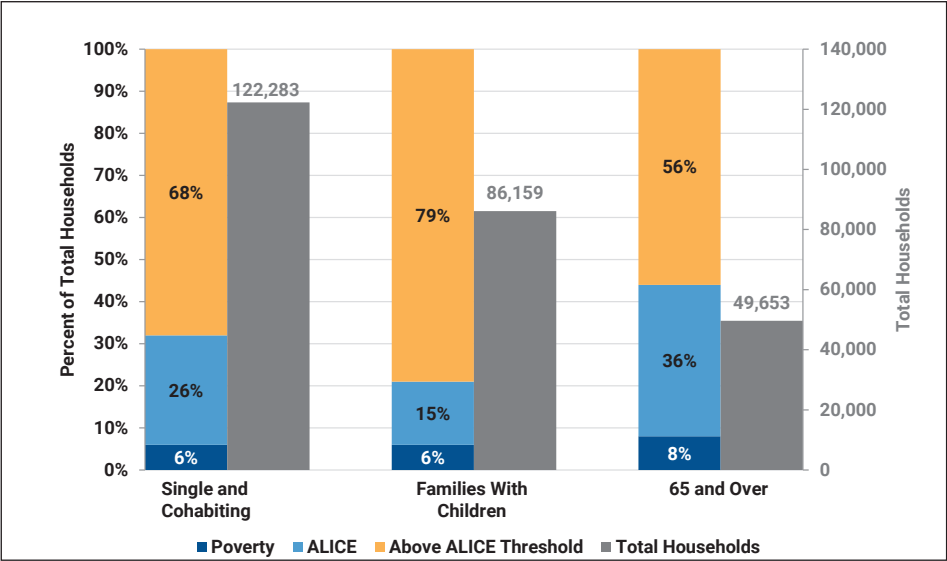

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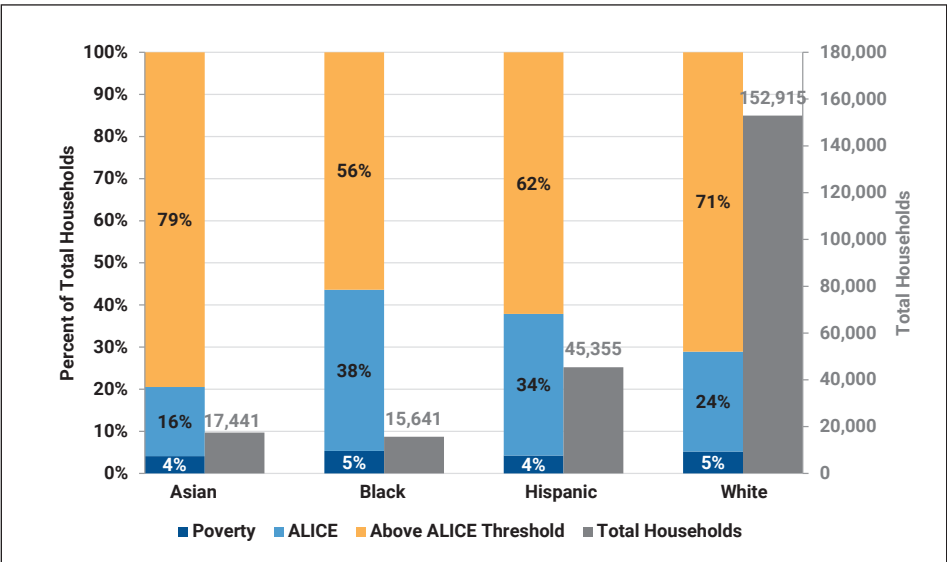

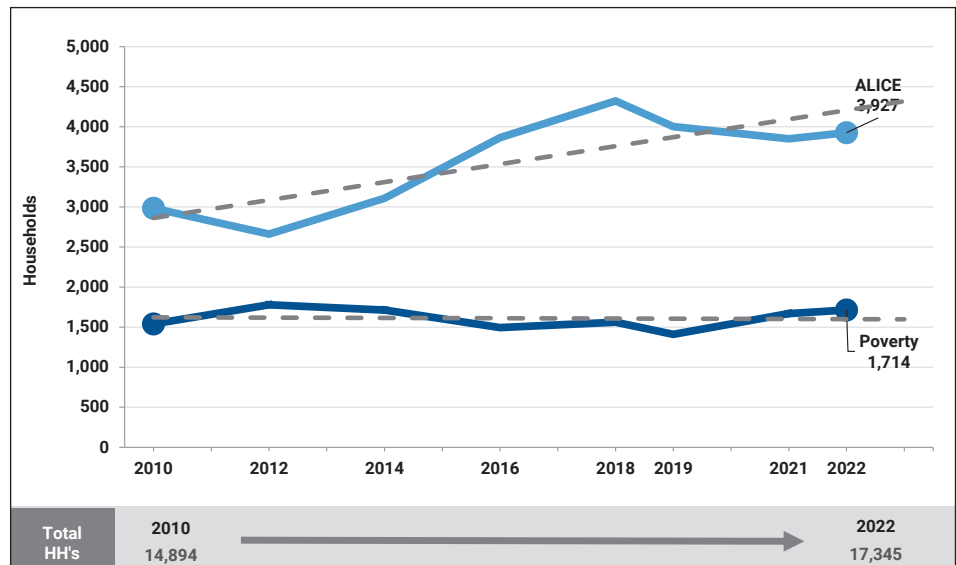

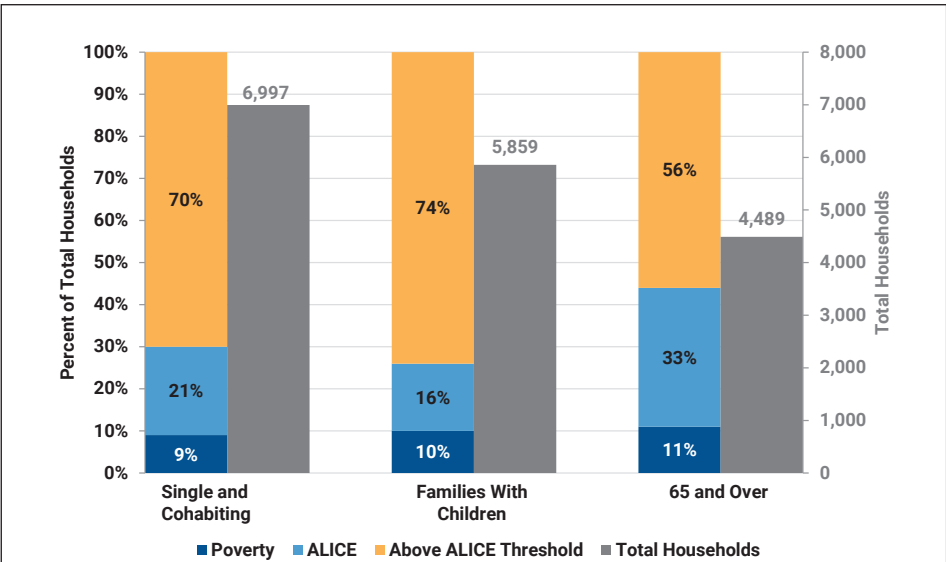

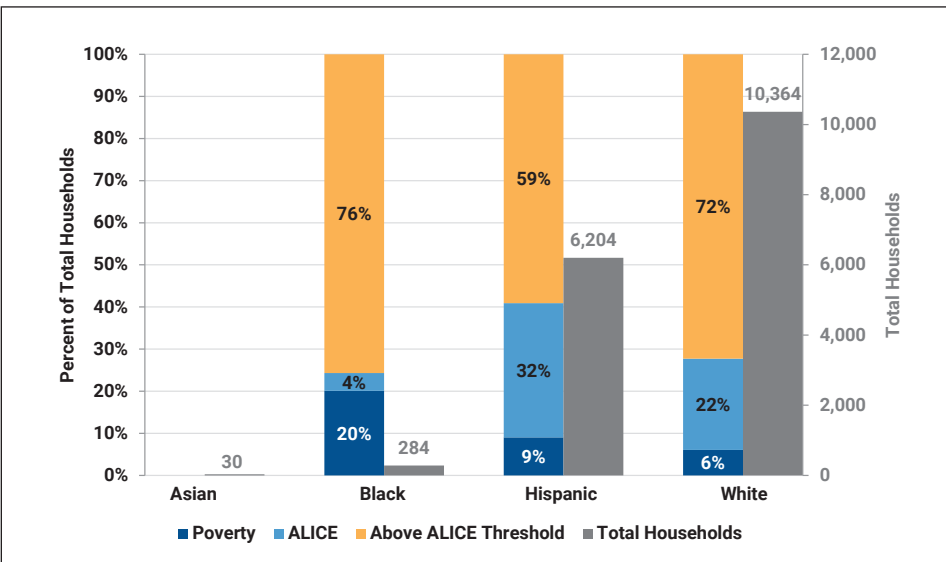

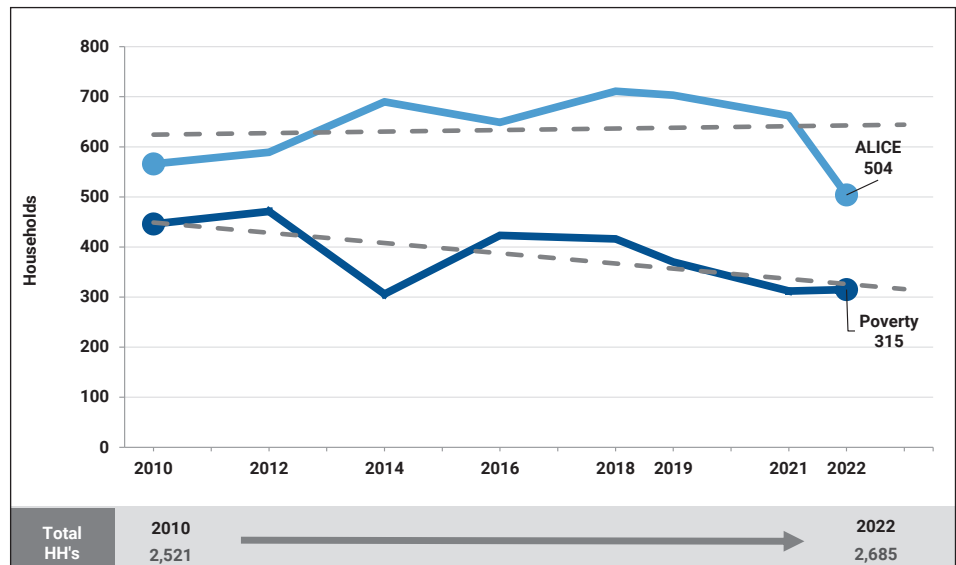

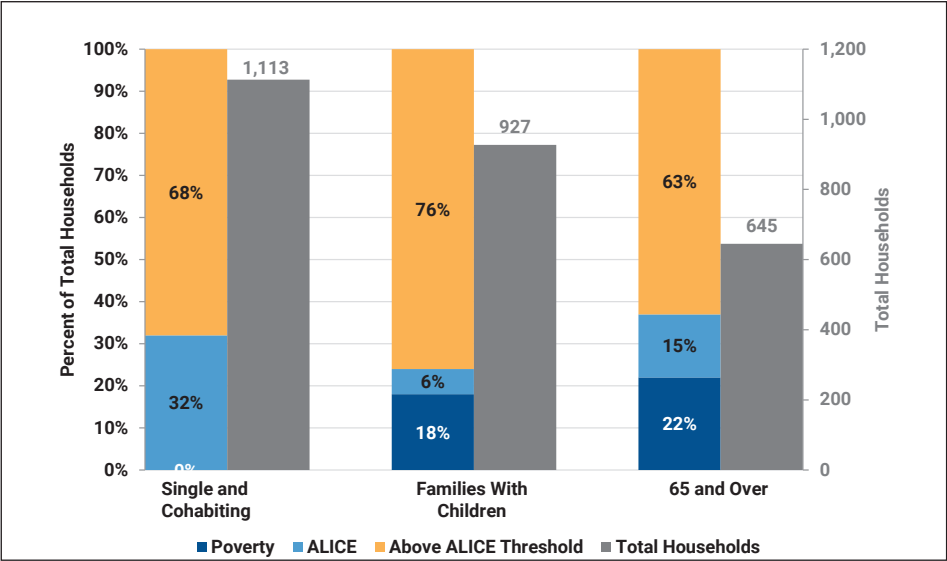

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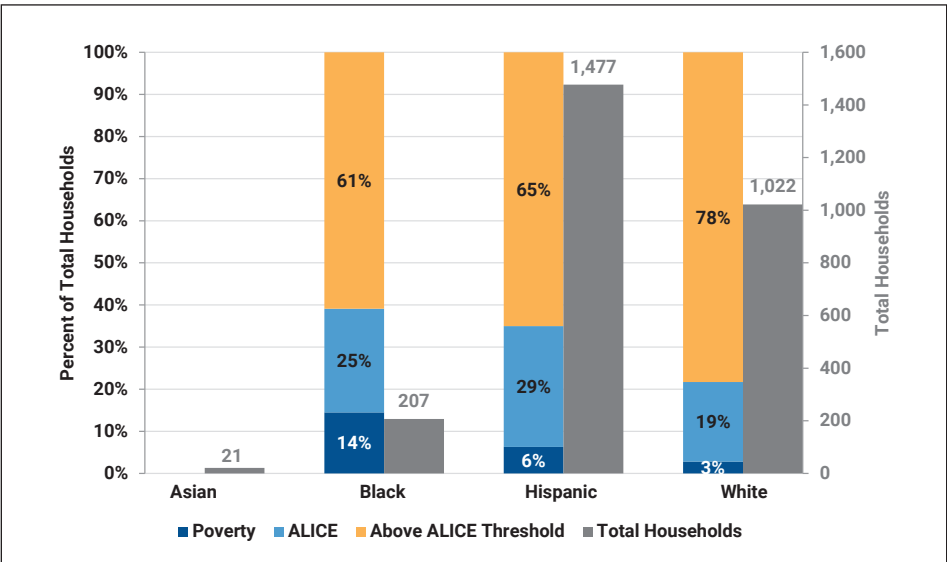

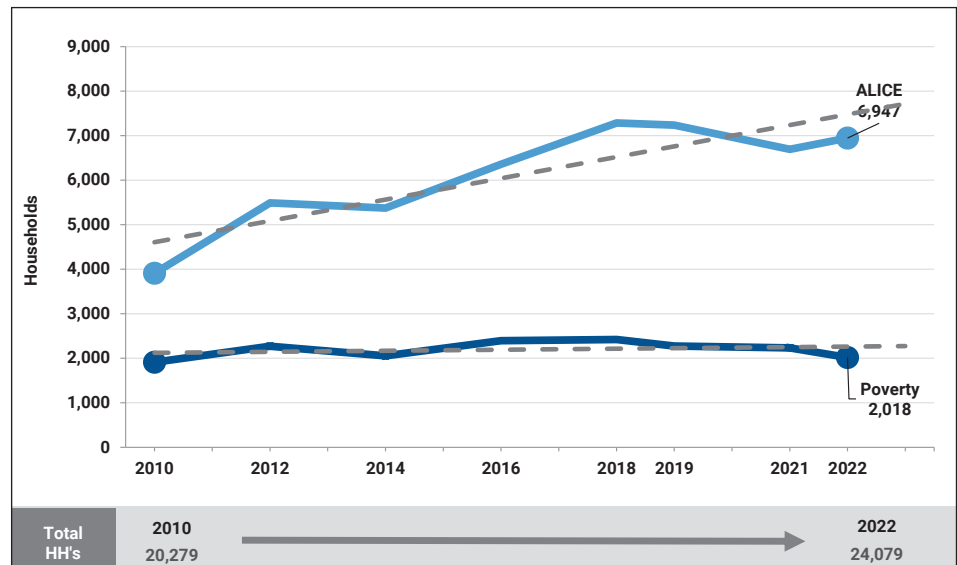

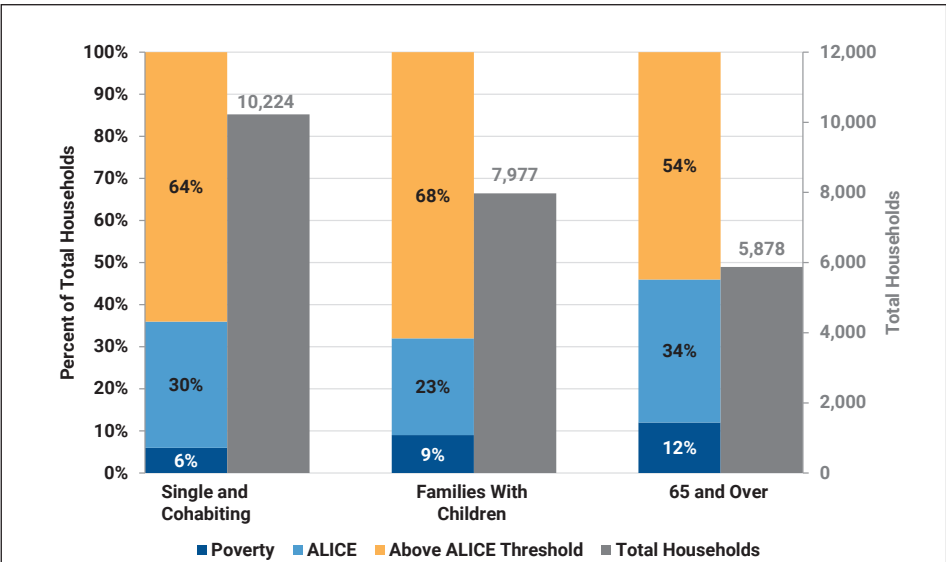

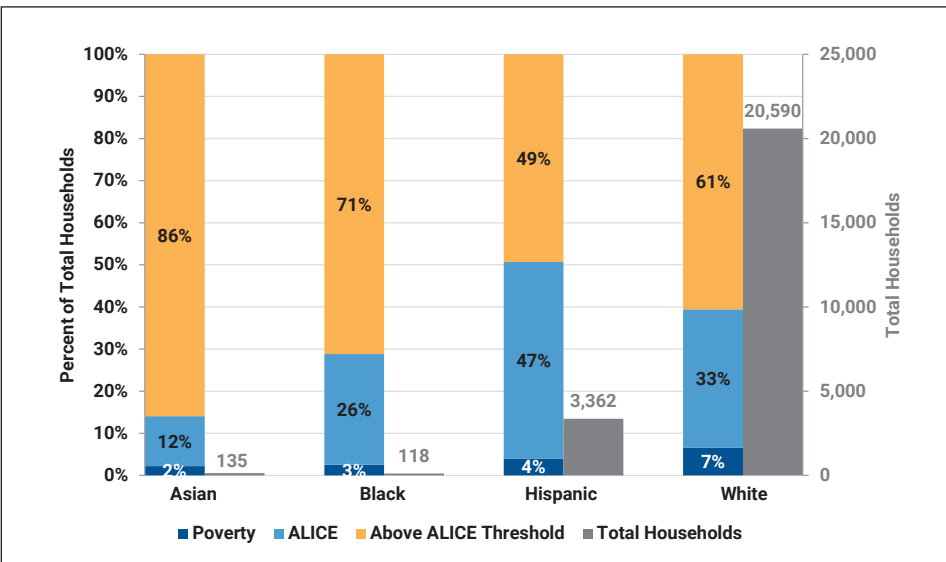

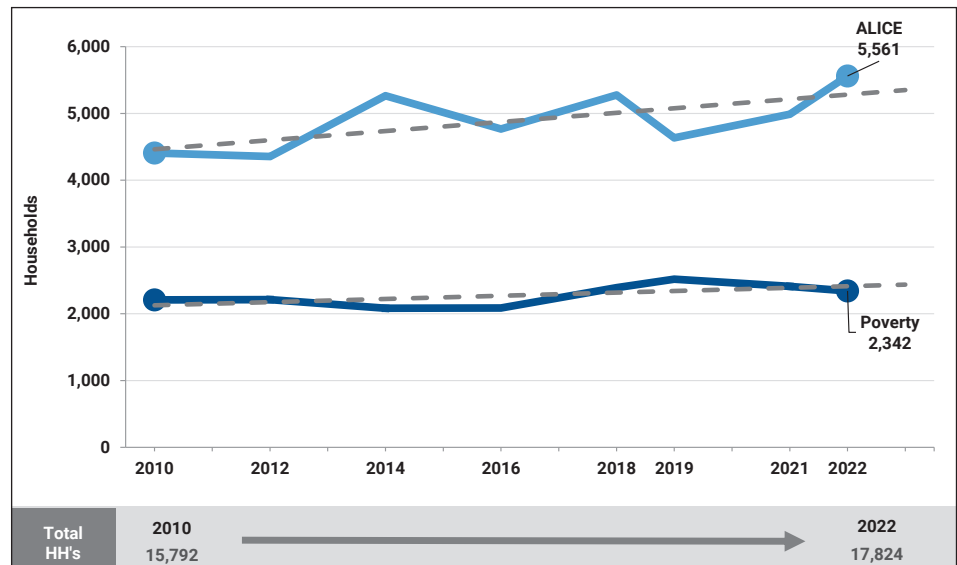

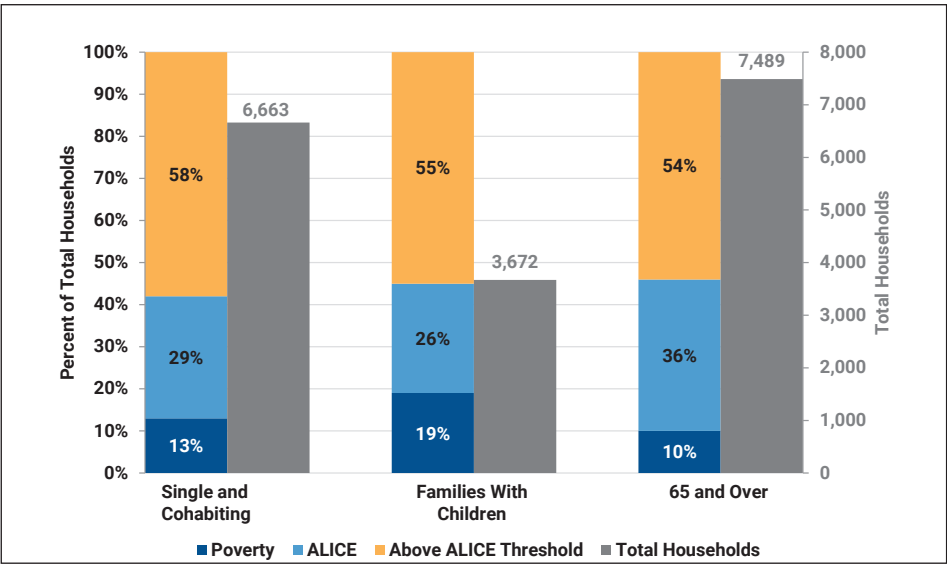

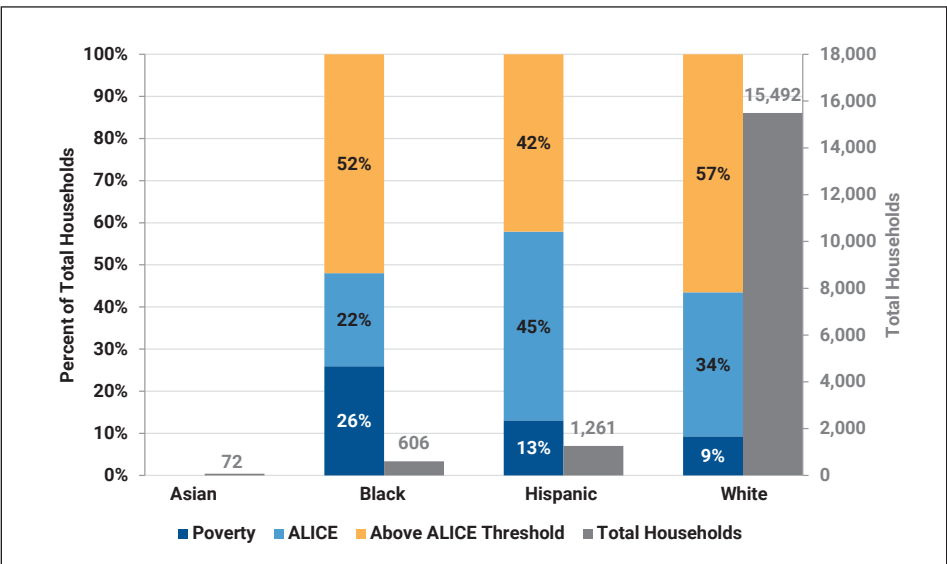

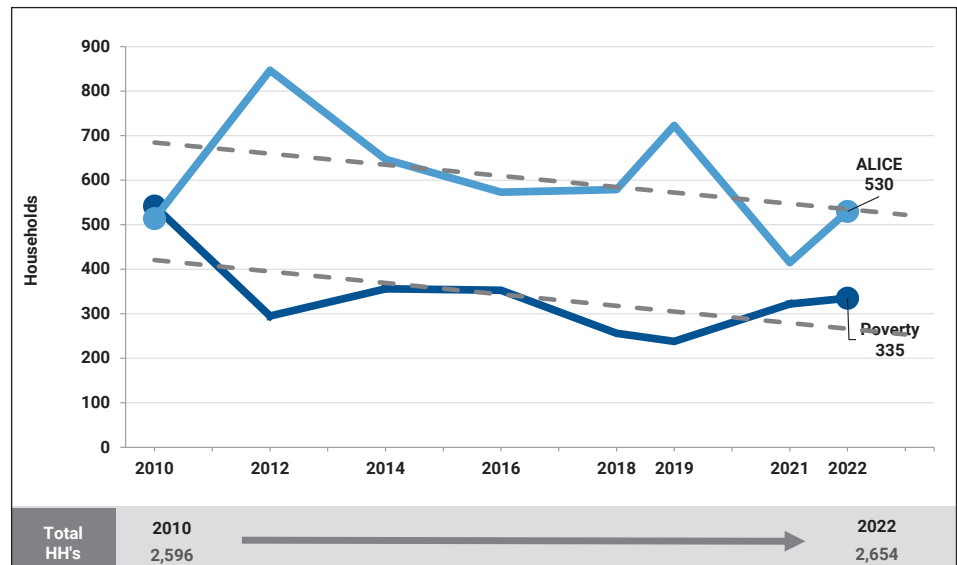

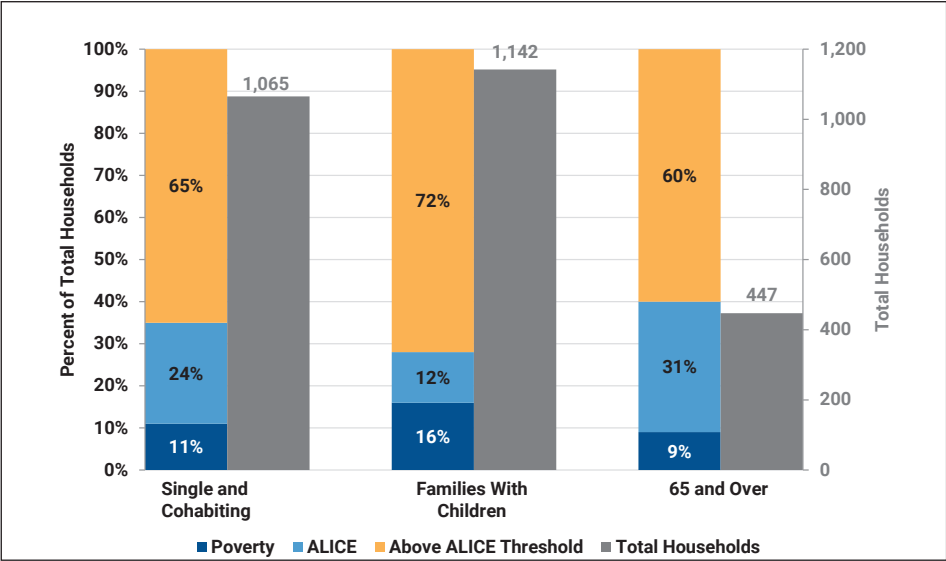

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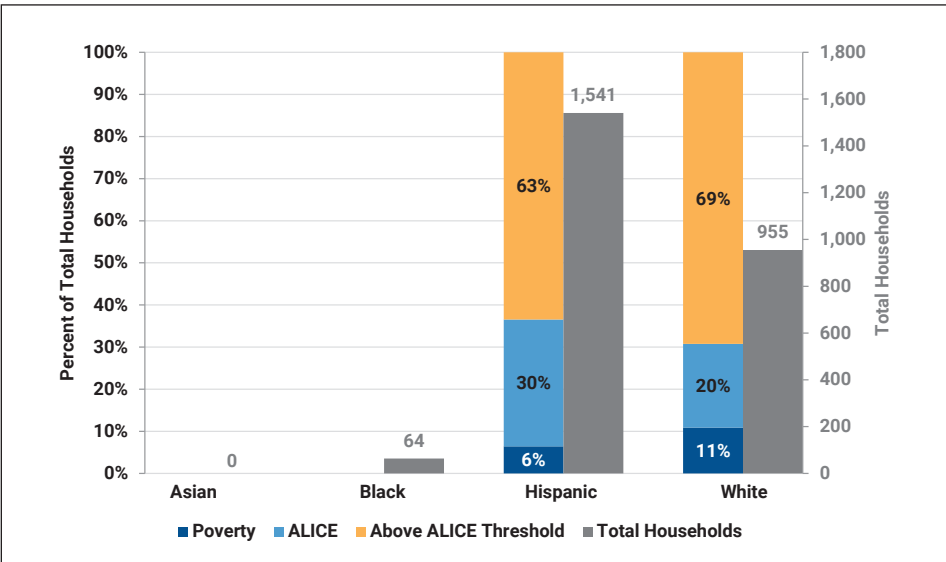
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Yoakum County, 2022

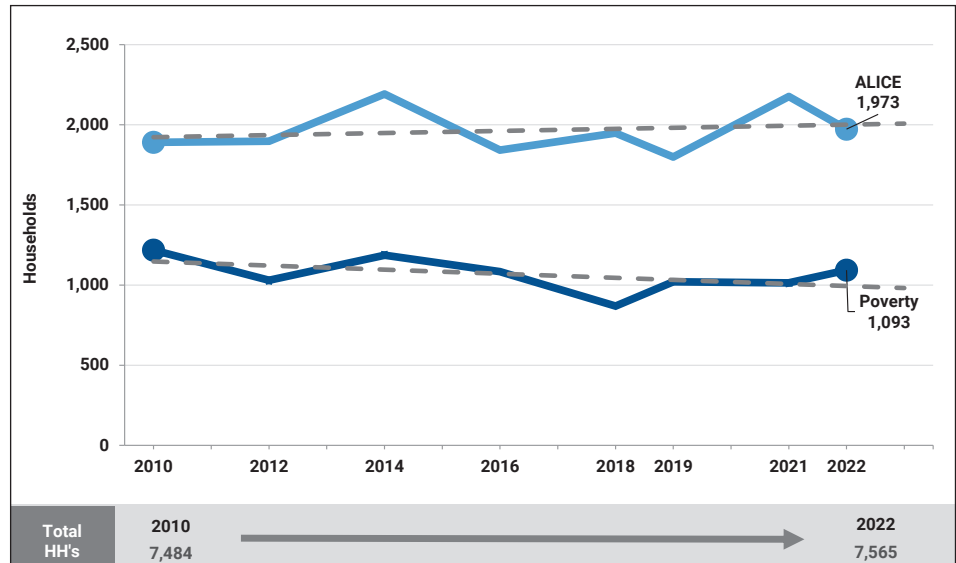

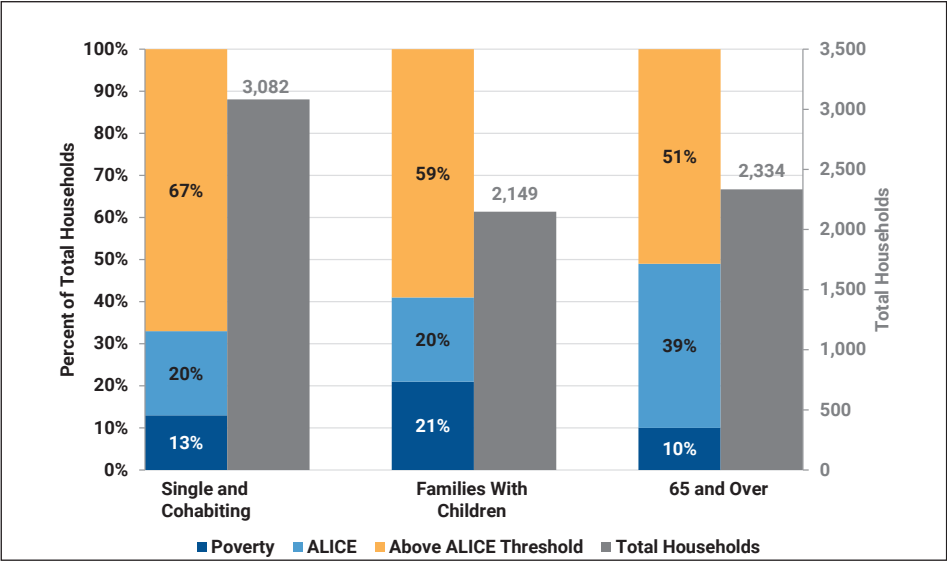
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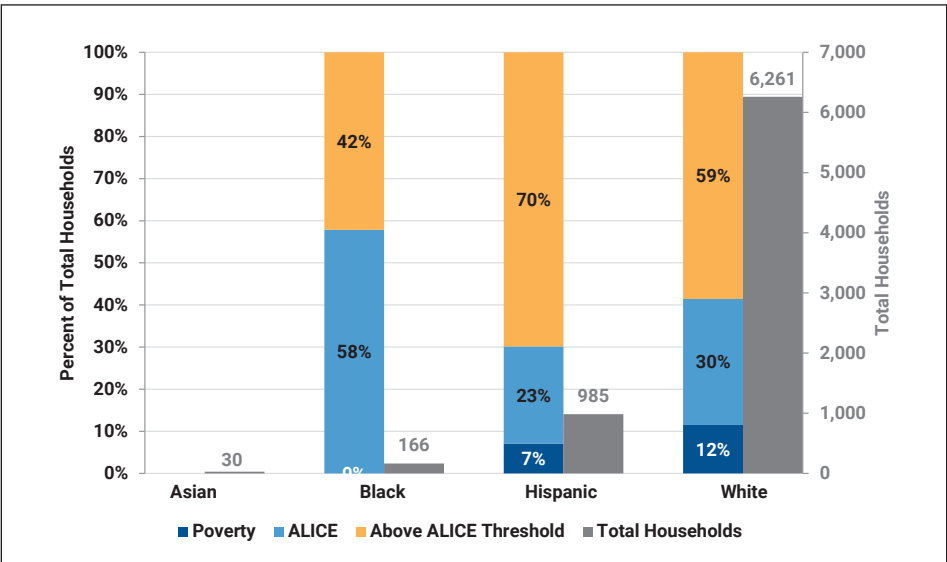
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Young County, 2022

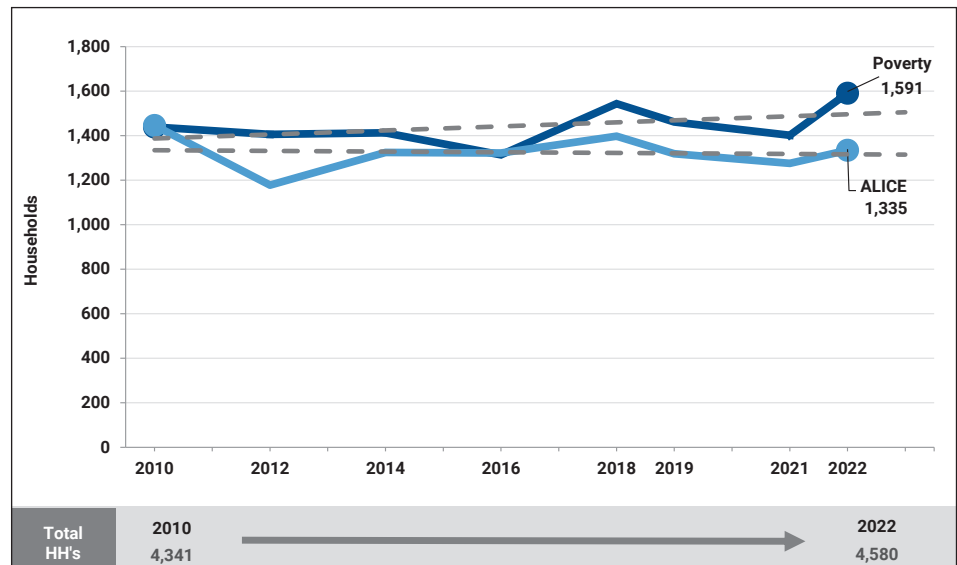

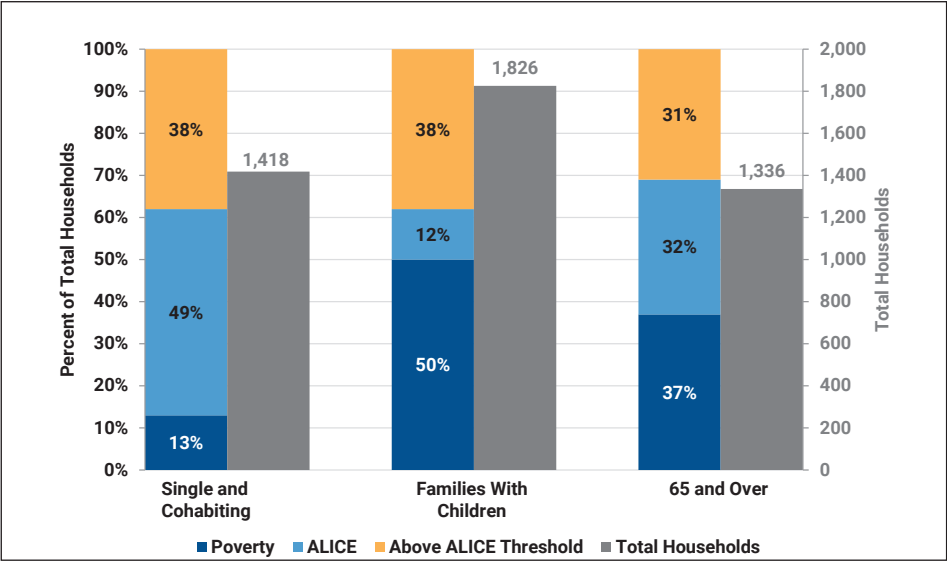

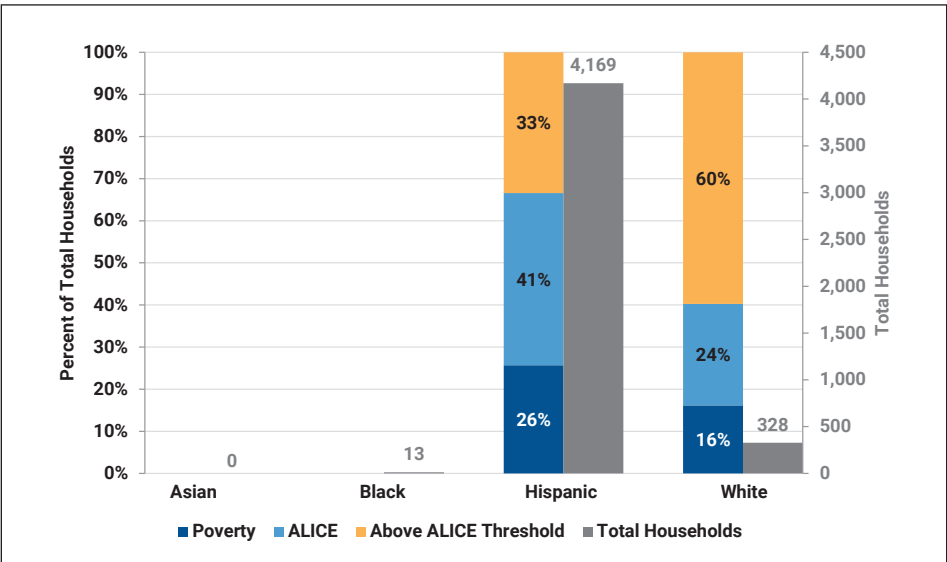

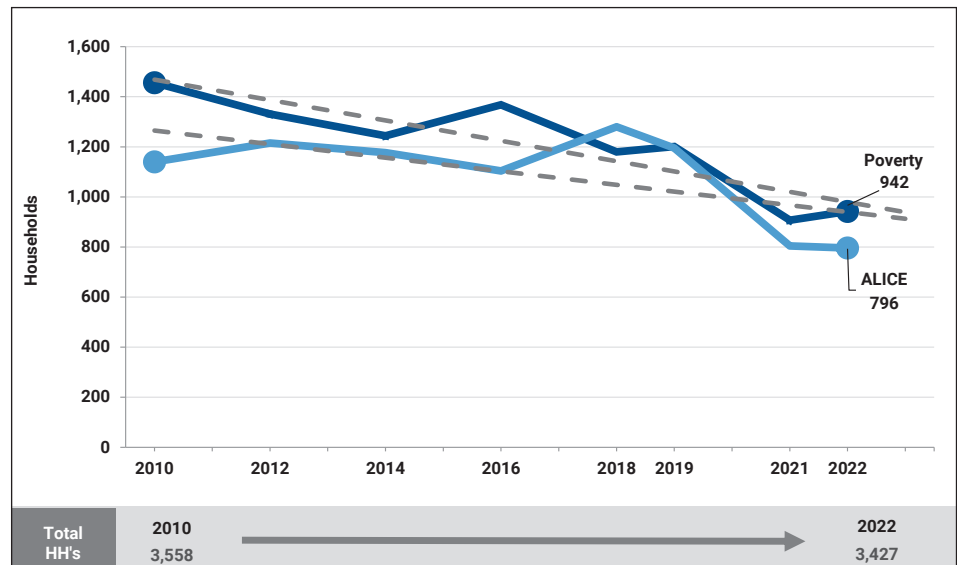

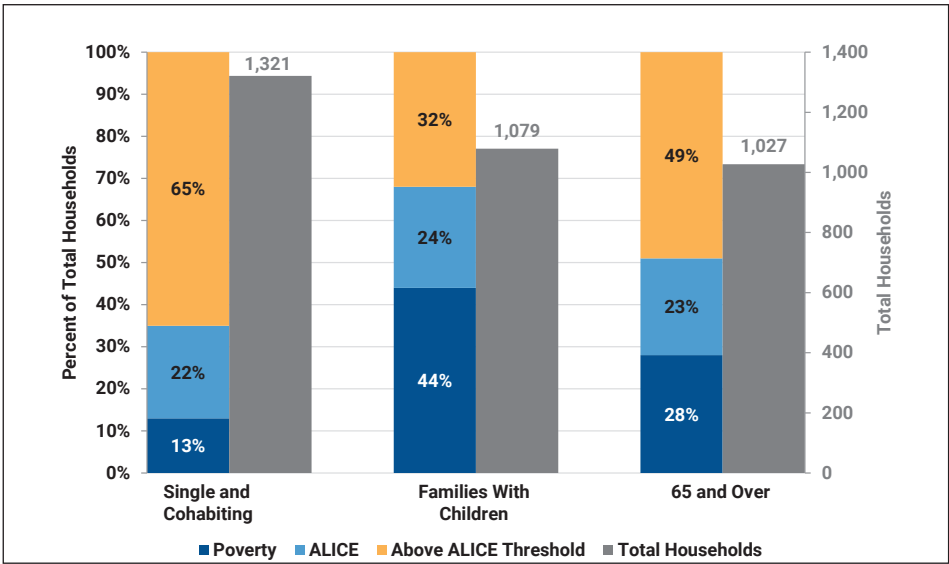
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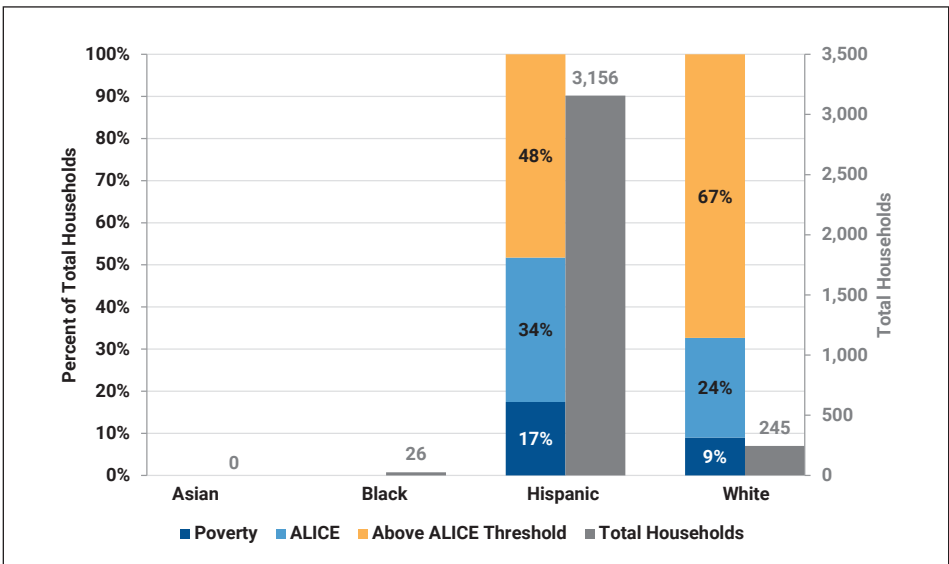
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Household Financial Status by Household Type, Zavala County, 2022
